# School Community GOES BEHIND THE SCENES of Future San Francisco Campus

University of the Pacific's plans for a dynamic dental school campus in the heart of San Francisco are moving from paper to the real world.

The recently purchased seven-story structure is located at 155 Fifth Street (between Mission and Howard Streets) in the South of Market, or SoMa, neighborhood. The building offers nearly 400,000 square feet of space and a large footprint, making it particularly well suited for the needs of the dental school.

In December and March, alumni, students, faculty and staff had opportunities to get behind-the-scenes tours of the pre-renovated space and a chance to experience the school's future neighborhood.

The first-floor design plans include a great hall, café, flexible auditorium, and separate entrances for patients and tenants. On the second and third floors, the plans call for eight small group practices to replace the existing four large group practices. Other changes include redesigned spaces for orthodontics, pediatrics, oral surgery, special needs and other clinical services. The fourth and fifth floors will feature flexible learning environments, a new simulation laboratory and space for research, offices and administration. The building will be designed to meet the LEED Gold standard, making it among the greenest dental schools in the world.

The University's Facility Planning Committee is working with lead architect SmithGroupJJR and numerous planning groups involved in clinic equipment, learning environments, technology and office areas.

Renovations have begun on the interior of the building, which has been completely stripped down to its structural core. Next will be exterior renovations to remove the building's existing façade, which will be completely replaced. Interior renovations are expected to continue up to another year and a half, with the school planning to take occupancy in mid-2014.

The new campus will also provide space for University of the Pacific to use for non-dental programs. Two floors of the building will initially be rented out to commercial tenants, but will provide future space into which the University can expand in later years.

"This new campus is being designed to serve not only students of today, but future generations to come," said Dean Patrick J. Ferrillo, Jr.

The generosity of the Dugoni School community will be a vital part of making the project a reality. The school is currently in the leadership gift stage of a major capital fundraising campaign to support the project.



#### **Donor Insight – John Cagnone**

Many students, faculty, staff and patients eat in Café Cagnone at the dental school every day. Could you share with us the Cagnone family connection to the school?

My association with the school is through my late brother, Dr. Leroy Cagnone. Leroy graduated from this dental school, then the College of Physicians & Surgeons, in 1959. After serving 29 years



as a member of the faculty and later as the associate dean for academic affairs, he retired in 1989. Leroy was one of the founders of the Cioppino dinner for incoming dental students and began the humanistic teaching model along with others at the school. Upon his retirement, we established the Dr. Leroy D. Cagnone Scholarship Endowment in his honor. Leroy passed away in 1998 and the dental school's café was renamed in his memory in 2004. It is a tribute to his involvement with the school and his dedication to students.

What motivates you to give to the school on a regular basis? Why are you supporting the campaign for a new building?

I've supported the dental school because I consider it an honor for me and my family to have been a small part of this truly outstanding Dugoni School of Dentistry. I also feel it's a good

investment in the future to support this wonderful institution. The new building provides a great opportunity to contribute and be a part of the future success of the school. This worthy endeavor will play a significant role in student education for many years to come. It will be a better school and will offer more to the students. It's a big project and the new school won't be built unless we support it!

When you talk to others about the Dugoni School, what comes to mind? How do you describe the school to others?

I describe the family atmosphere of the school. Everyone is happy—students, staff; the school has a wonderful humanistic approach and such good people working there. I've stayed in contact with members of the school community for many, many years now since they're such outstanding people.

I feel good about supporting a school that acts like a family.

Anything else you would like to share about your personal motivations for engaging in philanthropy?

It has been gratifying to support the Dugoni School over the years and to receive letters of appreciation from the students who have benefitted from my family's scholarship endowment. Many of them expressed their satisfaction with the educational experience they received, and their intention to support the school in the future themselves. My brother, Leroy, was very fond of the school. It's good to support something in life, and I feel the dental school is a worthy cause.

Mr. Cagnone is retired and was formerly a printer and typesetter at University of California, Berkeley. He lives in El Cerrito. The Cagnone family have been generous and loyal donors to Pacific Dugoni and involved with the school for more than five decades.

nia vintners. A silent auction was followed by a gourmet dinner and live auction, and the opportunity to Fund-A-Need — and help put a smile on a child's face with a direct donation to the Kids in the Klinic fund.

Participants helped ensure that underserved children have access to care at the school's Hutto Patterson Pediatric Clinic and Redmond Family Orthodontic Clinic. Kids in the

In California, 500,000 children miss one or more days of school each year due to dental problems. More than 24 percent of children in California have never seen a dentist. The Dugoni School is a lifeline for low-income families with nowhere else to go for their children's oral health care. Thanks to the generosity of alumni and friends, Pacific Dugoni continues to do its part to help provide care to those in need.
