RESIDENTS LEAVE FOR TULE LAKE; NEW TRANSFERS.

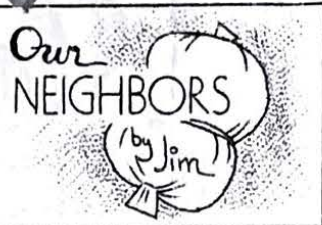

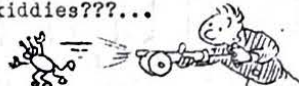

EDITORIAL

NEW ELECTION PLANS - MORE DEMOCRATIC

After a week of anticipation as well as mild campaigning, the election to be held today was suddenly called off in order to conform with the new rulings issued by the Western Defense Command.

To replace the previously outlined plan, a new form of organization known as the Advisory Committee is to be chosen from an elected panel of 21 members.

Though some time will be lost in bringing about this change, the new setup will probably prove of more value to the community than the other, since all residents, Issei and Nisei alike, and over 16, will be given the right to choose panel members.

It would also be more democratic in that English-speaking Issei and Nisei will be chosen on the Committee on a proportional basis.

4TH PRINCIPLE OF COOPERATIVES

DISTRIBUTION OF PROFIT

Profit shall be returned to the consumers who patronize the cooperative on the basis of the amount of purchase. Cooperatives consider profit as an overcharge that should be returned in proportion to the amount of goods purchased.

Sometimes cooperatives modify this principle and give back the net profit in the form of social services such as recreation centers, libraries, nurseries and even hospitals for the use of their members. This second method of profit return will probably be used in our relocation centers.

CORRESPONDENCE COURSES LAUDED

A convenient method for would-be college students, students, and graduates to obtain credits toward college degrees loomed in the horizon with the announcement made today by Service Supervisor E. B. Levy.

Referring to the list of correspondence courses now

available for those interested in college work, he said, "It was not until recently that we were able to get a complete list of all universities in the United States, which offer correspondence courses for credit.
