ELECTION PLANS APPROVED

RULES AND REGULATIONS

The following rules and regulations governing the new election setup, in compliance with the orders from the W.C.C.A. Headquarters, have been submitted by the management and present Advisory Council.

ELECTION WILL BE HELD ON AUGUST 17.

DEADLINE FOR NOMINATIONS IS AUGUST 14.

1. Each barrack will select two persons, one man and one woman, to act on the block nomination committee and act as registration clerk.

2. A. A meeting will be called of the barrack nomination committee representatives in each block, at which time a temporary chairman will be elected to accept nominations for a chairman.

B. The chairman will call for advisory committee nominations and two English-speaking Issei and two English-speaking Nisei will be nominated to be voted on at the final block election.

C. The chairman will call for nomination of five persons to act as a block election committee; this committee will not include persons who have been nominated as advisory committee candidates.

3. The three candidates in each block receiving the highest number of votes will be considered elected as members of the advisory committee panel, excepting that at least one Issei or Nisei shall be in each block group.

4. The six persons who receive the least number of votes, in proportion to number of registered voters in their respective blocks, will be automatically eliminated.

This elimination will be without regard as to whether or not the person is Issei or Nisei.

VOTERS REGISTER MON. ELECTION ON AUG. 17

Though S.C. election plans were temporarily retarded, the management and the present Advisory Council are accelerating the final steps toward undertaking the new election procedure as ordered by the W.C.C.A. Headquarters in San Francisco.

The rules in regard to procedure of nominations have been submitted and have gained the approval of the San Francisco Office.

Present Block Representatives will begin the registration of voters, persons over 16 years and older, on Monday.

The meeting for nominations will be held at the mess halls next Friday at 8 p.m.

Voting by secret ballot will be held on August 17, 8 to 11 a.m., 1 to 5 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. at the far end of the mess halls.

"I think it's wonderful.....this distinction you've achieved," he began. "One advantage of a man

who lives long is that he gets to know some people who lived long ago. I want to say that modesty in receiving honors is something that belongs to great people."

For examples, he cited esteemed and renowned persons whom he knew well. One was the famous inven-

TROOP 19 - FIELD DAY WINNER!

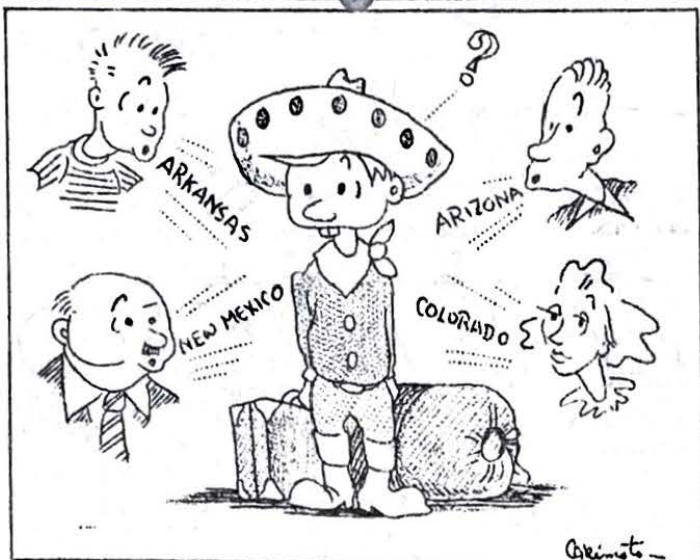
The Center's Boy Scouts had their big day last Wednesday, 2 p.m. when they had their first Field Day.

FIRE-FIGHTERS, READY FOR ACTION

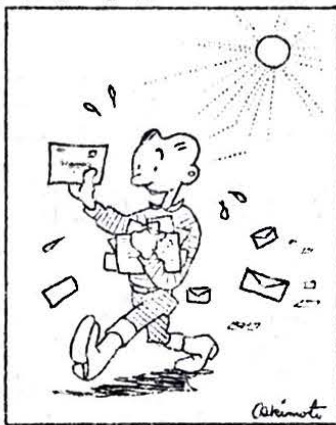

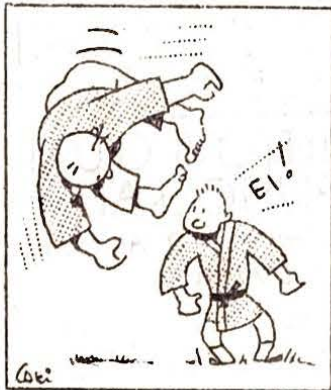
