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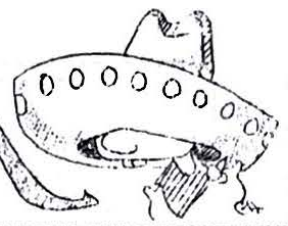

SIGNUP ADVANCE CREW FOR RELOCATION REGISTER TODAY

A representative of the United States Employment Service will be here TODAY at the Visitors' Booth to recruit the following advance workers for relocation: 10 hospital attendants, 15 hospital maids, 1 hospital secretary, 2 hospital clerks, 10 cooks, 10 cooks' helpers, 10 dishwashers, 20 waiters, 1 butcher, 2 bakers, 1 store manager, 2 retail clerks, 4 recreation leaders, 1 social worker, 2 carpenters, 1 electrician, 1 plumber, 10 stenotypists, 5 clerks, 10 guides (high school or college men preferred), 10 truck drivers and 70 laborers, for a total of 198 men Center Manager A. Nicholson announced Friday.

3 CENTERS TO RELOCATE SANTA ANITA BEGINS EXODUS TO ARIZONA, WYOMING TODAY & THURS.

Three down and three to go!

Three Assembly Centers were affected by the latest army proclamations. Santa Anita will begin evacuation today with 600 persons leaving for the Colorado River Relocation Project at Parker, Arizona, and 600 more following on the 27th.

On August 30, 3450 more residents from Santa Clara,

city of San Jose and part of Los Angeles, will start relocation to the Heart Mountain Project at Vocation Park County, near Cody, Wyoming.

Merced is scheduled to leave for Granada, Colorado, capacity 4500, with an advance party of 212 workers leaving last Monday.

North Portland, Oregon, will relocate 500 workers from Washington to the Heart Mountain Relocation Project in Wyoming on August 29 and 30. The balance of the center will leave on September 6, at a rate of 600 a day, to the Minidoka Relocation Center in Idaho.

The assembly centers still unaccounted for are Fresno, Tanforan and STOCKTON.

NEW MESS PLAN EFFECTIVE NOW

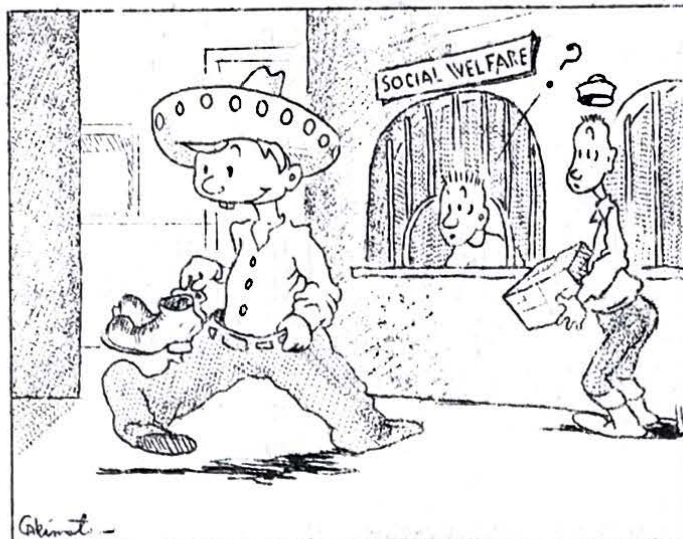

SIX NISEI ORATORS PRESENT OPINIONS

LARSON, HUMBARGAR, LEVY COMMEND SPEAKERS

"I know now that my interest, my affection, my understanding (of the Japanese people) has not been misplaced," said Miss Elizabeth Humbargar to 1000 Center-ites, as she enthusiastically lauded the six young Nisei speakers at the Speech Exhibition last Saturday night in the grandstand.

Miss Owens Larson, another Stockton High School faculty-ite, summarized the speeches and in part stated, "Education means to learn to know other human beings--their habits, their souls, their aspirations--things they sprang from."

George Matsuoka, who spoke on the "Preparation for Peace" declared, "...the ways to prepare for peace are through the channels of enlightened education and moral rearmament, and through the maintenance of family unity.... And to paraphrase the words of President Roosevelt and Winston Churchill, let us move together with unbounding hope and determination into the storm and through the storm toward the light that is ahead."

Ken Siga, the second speaker, encouraged the continuance of well-organized recreation, "Shining

like a candle in the dark, recreation will, in this moment of unfortunate circumstances, help us cross the river of defeat by its power of giving us the foundation to get physically and morally strong, to be mentally awake, and to be free from the depression of partial confinement."

Citing education as an important element in preparing for peace, Miss Helen Kurosaki said in closing, "Let us say that education is equivalent to food for our mind, religion as shelter for our souls and recreation as clothing for our body, with cooperation and unity as other vital necessities of life to live the helpful, fuller and more successful life desired."

Jim Doi, advocating genuine interest in the co-operative system to assure its success declared, "...appreciation of the co-op way of life, competent (Continued on page 4)
