The student generation represented in this book has seen the height of American prosperity, and perhaps the depth of deflation; but its courage is high!

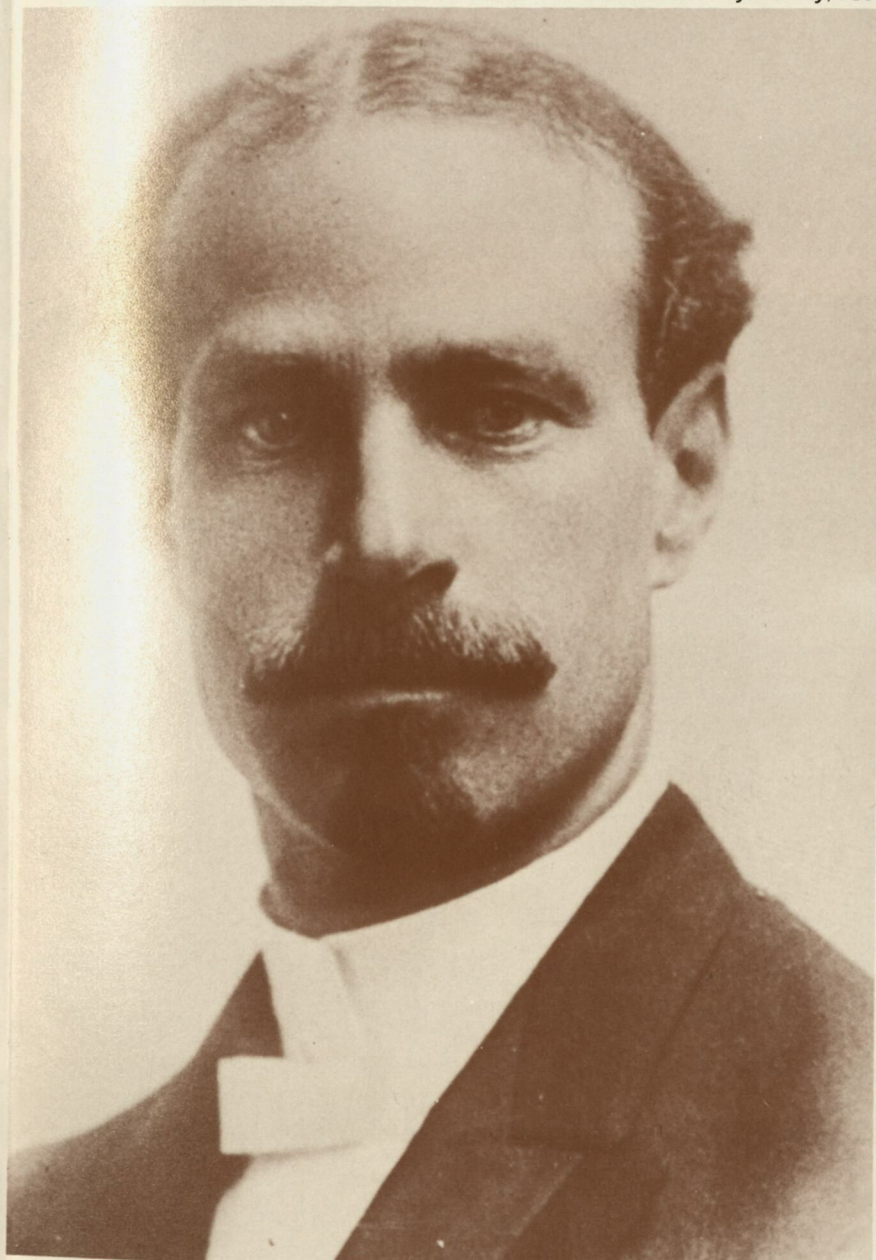

Tully C. Knoles

In 1848, a group of four Methodist ministers established an institution of higher learning in California with a goal of "the founding of an institution of the grade of a University." Despite primitive conditions, scanty funds and limited support, they appointed committees that applied for a charter and considered pertinent questions of location, organization, and funds.

In May of 1851, their goals were achieved, when a Board of Trustees was chosen, Santa Clara was established as the location, and the new institution was granted a charter. This was followed by the first graduation in 1958.

In the same year the University organized a course of medical instruction, the first on the West Coast. This eventually led to the Cooper Medical College, the first Western medical school.

The Civil War and ensuing hard times caused the University considerable financial difficulty. When it appeared as if the University might have to temporarily close, it was suggested that a tract of land, about 435 acres, between San Jose and Santa Clara, be purchased, and, except for 20 acres reserved for a campus, be divided into lots and sold to financially benefit the University. The plan was accepted and the University was transferred to its San Jose location in the fall of 1871.

The University has historically been recognized for the educational innovations it has pioneered. Several of the educational "firsts" conceived by Pacific were the establishment of the first Western coeducational campus in 1871 and the first conservatory of music in 1878. Pacific continues to be the first and only four-year private educational institution in California's Central Valley.

In 1924, Pacific was moved from the overcrowded scholastic environment of the Santa Clara Valley to the San Joaquin Valley. Stockton was selected as the location because it was "at the threshold of gigantic achievement."

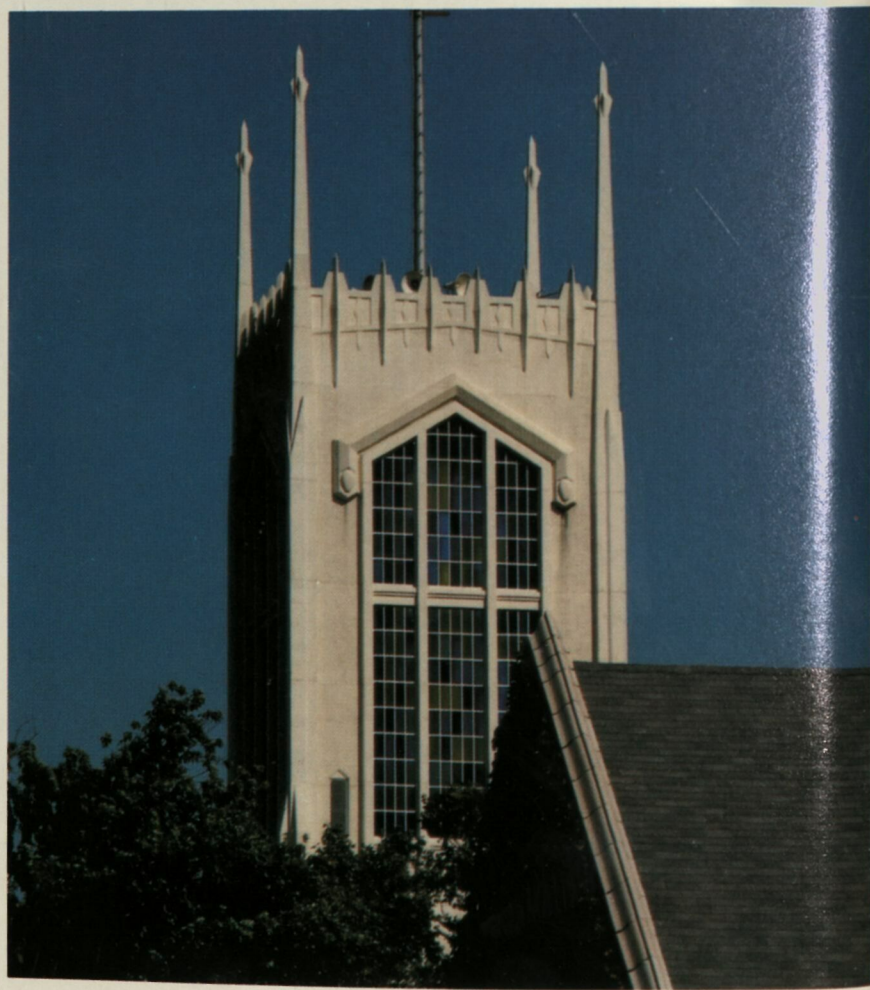
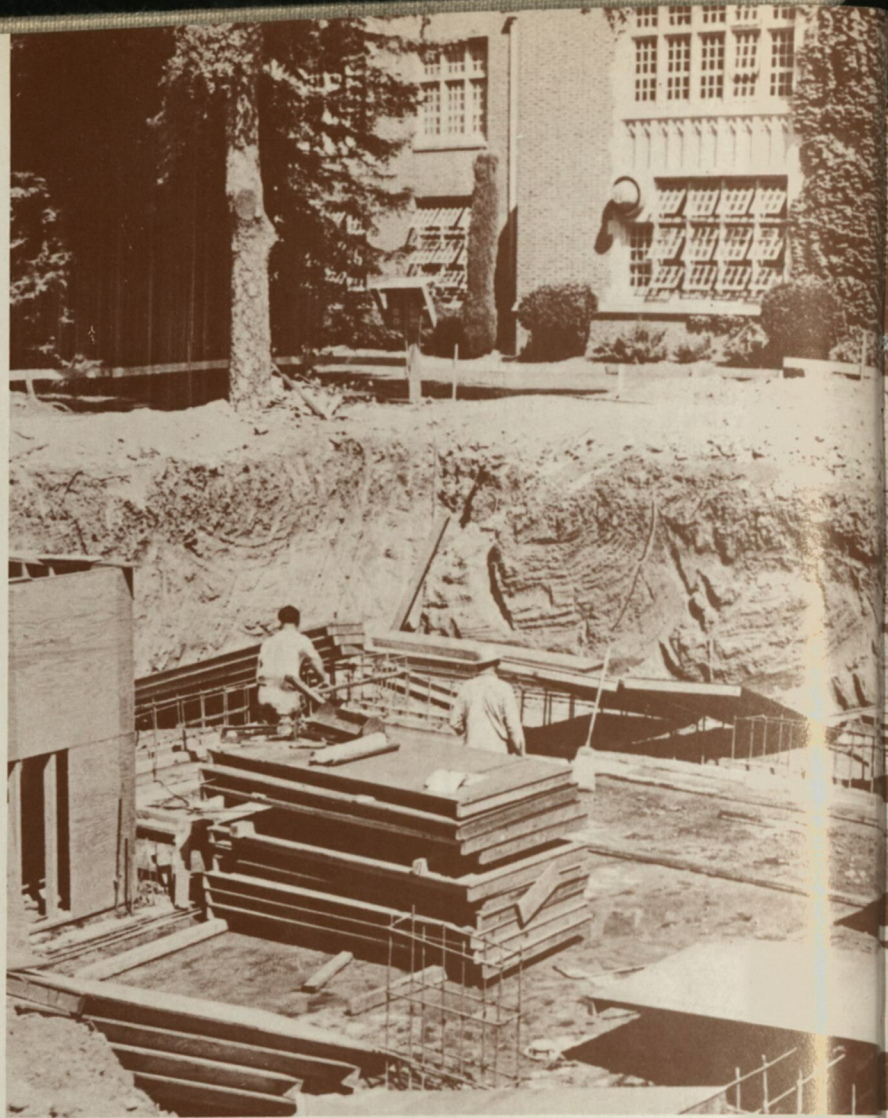

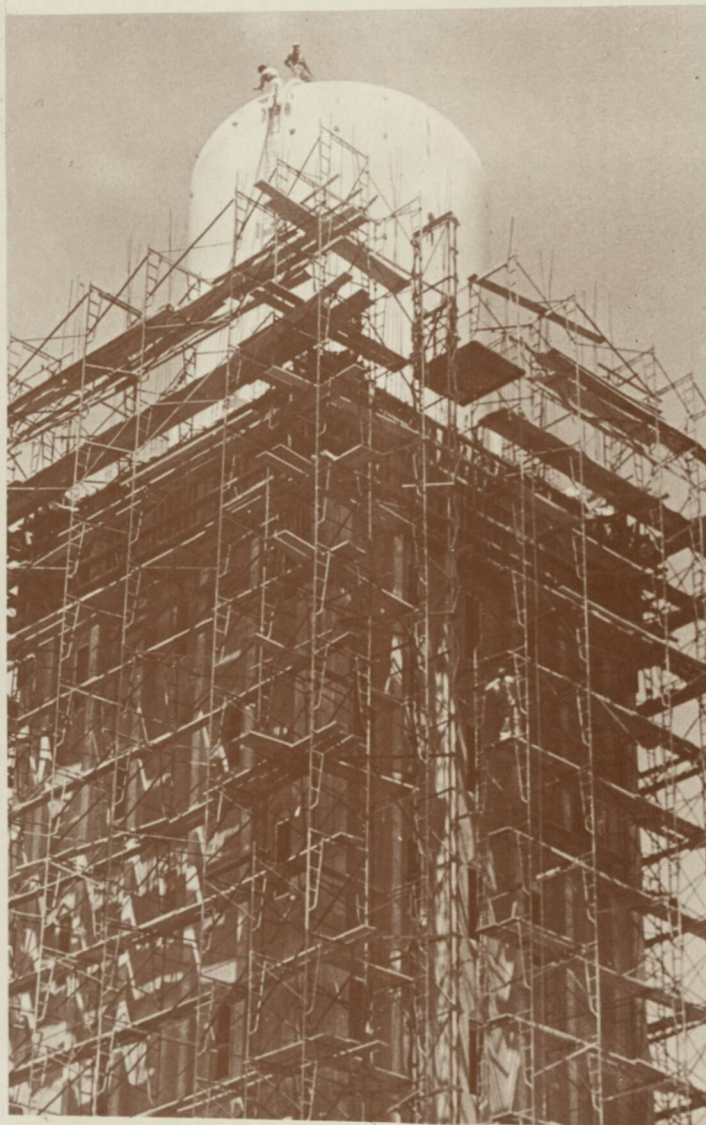

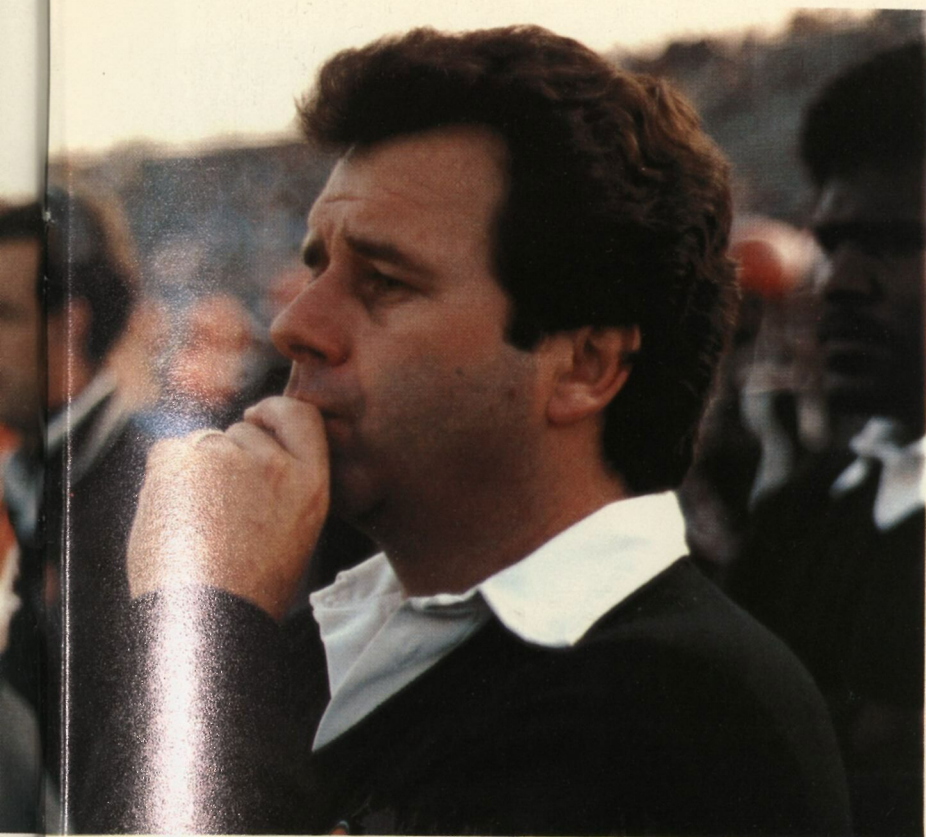

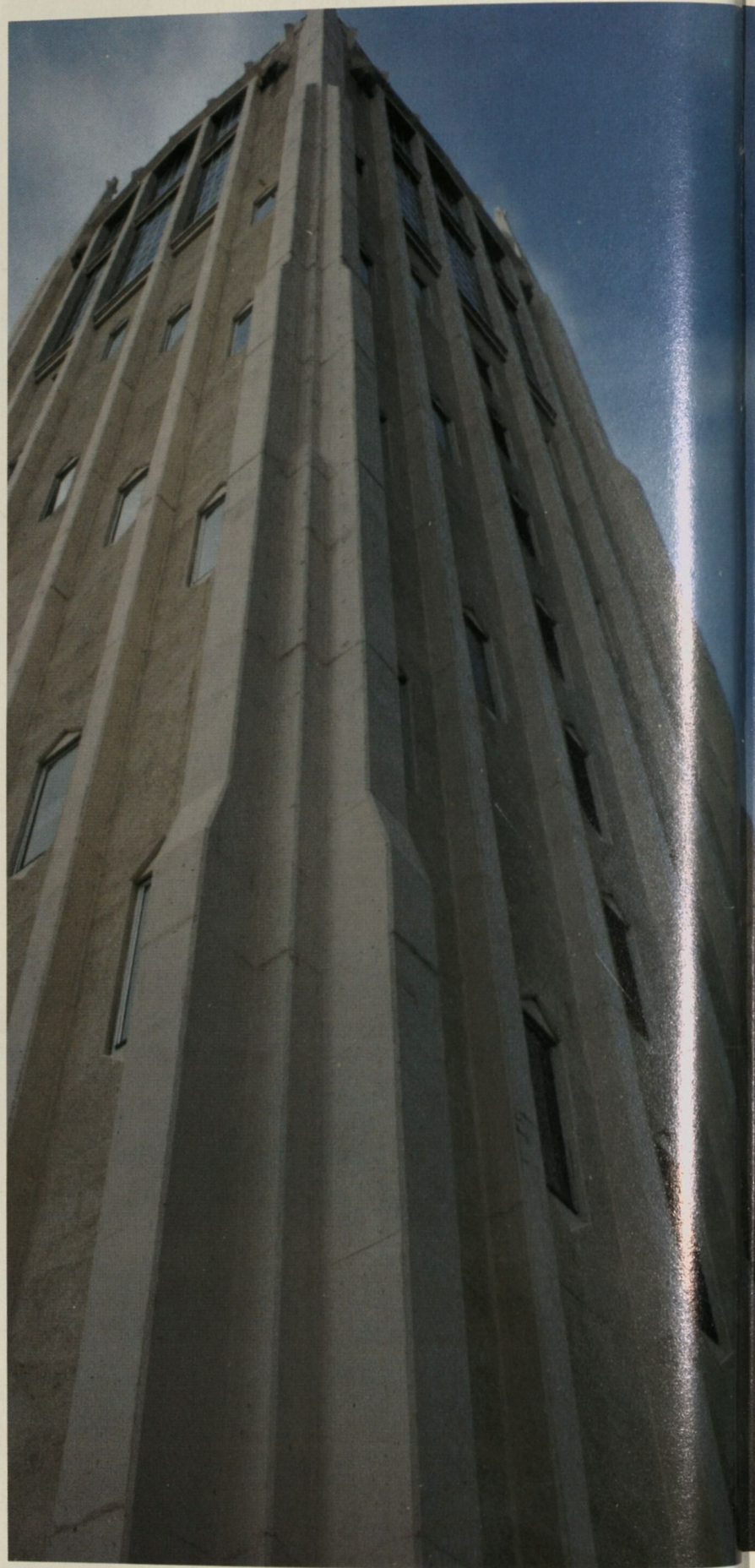
The most explosive growth and expansion of the University came under its second president, Robert E. Burns, who served as President of UOP from 1946 until his death in 1971. Under the direction of Robert Burns, Pacific opened up its School of Pharmacy and Graduate School, in 1955 and 1956, respectively. The University saw the establishment of the School of Engineering in 1957. Also under Burns, in 1962, UOP merged with College of Physicians and Surgeons, a San Francisco dental school, to establish the University of the Pacific School of Dentistry.

Also established in 1962, the "cluster colleges" were conceived to enable the University to "grow smaller while growing larger," according to Robert Burns, their creator. The purpose of the "cluster college" experiment was to operate smaller colleges, each with their own identity and specialization within a larger University. Raymond College, the first "cluster college" at UOP and in the entire nation, allowed students to formulate their own academic programs in the field of international studies. Raymond College was the first bilingual and bicultural college in the United States.

In 1966, the University was further expanded as McGeorge School of Law an independent Sacramento-based school, became part of the University. 1967 brought with it the formation of a third "cluster college," Callison College, which put major emphasis on Asian culture and international programs.

However, these "cluster colleges" fell victim to decreasing student interest. In 1977, Raymond and Callison Colleges merged into a unique year of study abroad, many spending it in Japan. In 1979, this school was absorbed into the College of the Pacific under the Center for Integrated Studies and the Center for International Programs. In the face of these closures, the College of the Pacific Department of Business Administrations became the School of Business and Public Administration in 1977.

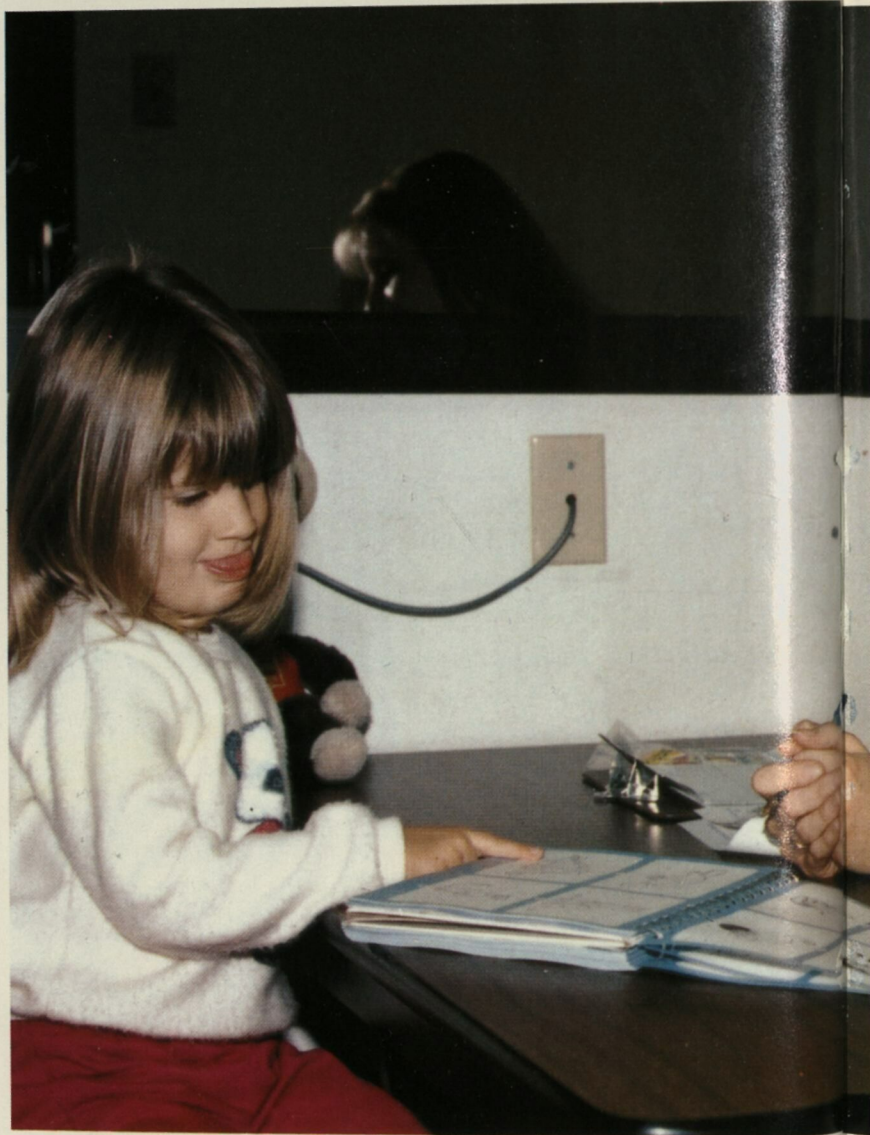
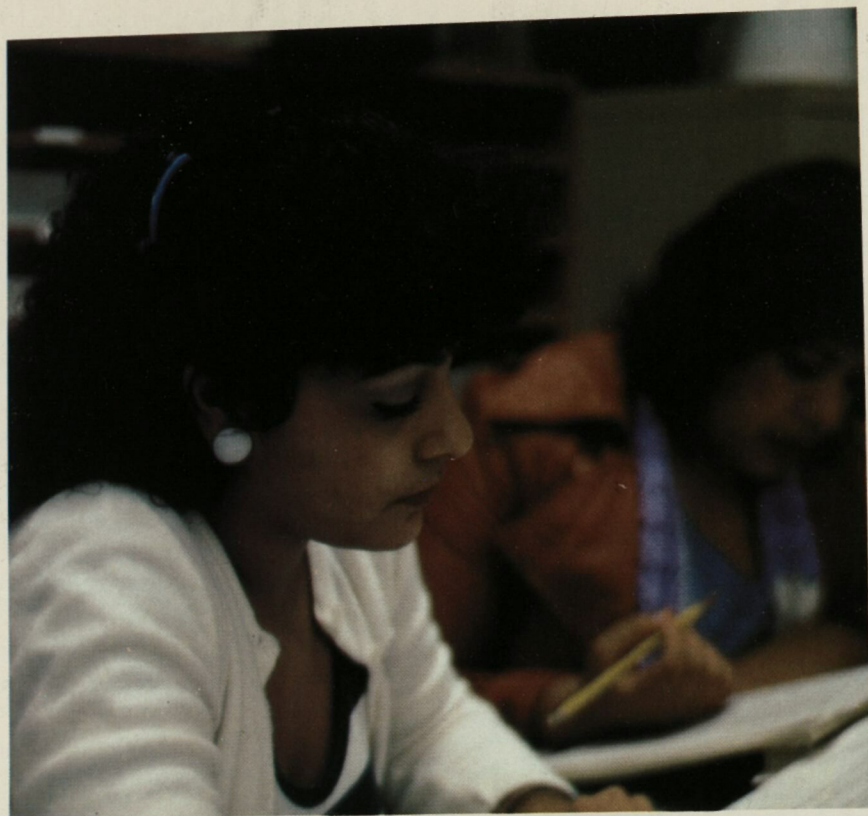
Last fall, the final "cluster college," Elbert Covell College, was reorganized as a program of International Studies to better serve the entire student body of the University.

Reaching Out

The responsibility of a university extends beyond the students, it goes past the gates of the grounds, and advances out into the community. UOP has recognized the needs of the Stockton community and strives to meet them in several ways.

First is the Community Involvement Program (CIP), a program coordinated through the School of Education. The purpose of CIP is to allow qualified Stockton residents to attend a university who might not otherwise have the opportunity. Entrance into the program is highly competitive. Through a much more rigorous process than for the general University, approximately twenty students are selected per year. Of the 700 who have graduated from the program, 70% have gone on to professions in the Stockton area. Dr. John R. Jones, who has been the program director since 1978, said, "I think we can be tremendously proud of these students. They go on to serve as role models for our students in all professions." Jones feels that CIP has contributed to an improved image of the University through commitment and service to the community.



The High School Equivalency Program (HEP) provides a unique service to the youth of the Stockton community. Through a United States government grant, HEP allows youths, ages 17-24, who have dropped out of high school and whose families incomes come from migrant or seasonal work, to complete their secondary education. The program helps prepare the students for the General Educational Development tests. Graduates from HEP are assisted with placement in colleges, vocational training, or pertinent employment. HEP students live in dorms on campus and have access to University facilities. There are certain rules, which if broken, are grounds for expulsion from the program. HEP is an opportunity to help students who want to help themselves.

The Communicative disorders Department in the College of the Pacific, headed by Dr. Roy Timmons, offers the Speech and Hearing Center. Here the students apply their newly learned skills in a laboratory situation while people from ages 3 to 80 from the area benefit from therapy. This department is fourteen years old as it currently exists, but the fundamental program has existed for about 35-40 years. Dr. Timmons has been the chairman of the department for thirteen years and is proud of what has been accomplished. He boasts of virtually a 100% employment rate for graduates from the program.

We have just traveled as far as the southwest corner of the campus. Now, for a change of pace, let's jump Pacific Avenue to an old brick building across from Burn's tower. Since 1976, this has been the home of the Anderson "Y." Not only does the Anderson "Y" provide services for the campus community, but it also serves Stockton with volunteer projects. In one service, UOP students tutor Stockton school children who have motivation and academic problems. A second program allows volunteers from the campus to visit young men at the California Youth Authority interacting through conversation, tutoring, and recreational activities. Thirdly, truancy advocacy and prevention program has two objectives:

(1) improving public school attendance by encouraging and motivating Stockton youth from correctional systems and (2) improving their attitudes about themselves and others. These programs give college students the chance to help others and become active in the Stockton community.

We can be proud of what Pacific is doing for its home community. Reaching out to its neighbors, young and old, directly and indirectly, can only foster the pride and the image of the University in the eyes of the people of Stockton.

Pacific, Hail

Ding! Dong! Ding! Bells are ringing throughout the University of the Pacific to the sound of "Pacific Hail," the University's alma mater. The bells of Burns Tower have been ringing out the hour of the day for the past 18 years, when they first arrived at Pacific. Some people have heard these bells for years, while others are hearing them for the first time, but no matter how many times people hear the bells, they are delighted. There are those who are deceived by them and others who are enlightened. Are you familiar with the prominent and well-known bells of Burns Tower?

A "bell" as defined by the American Heritage Dictionary of the English language, is "a hollow metal instrument, usually cup-shaped with a flared opening." The bells of Burns Tower aren't these ordinary cup-shaped bells. The Burns bells are long narrow tubes, locked up in protective boxes and stored in the basement of the Tower, and are only removed for repair or replacement.

The keyboard instrument which plays the bells is called a Carillon. "The Carillon of Faith" at UOP was a gift to the University by Mr. Paul Davies of San Jose, in honor of his wife, Faith Crummey Davies, class of '25. The \$30,000 instrument is a service to the Stockton community as well as to the students, said Dr. Charles Shilling, a piano and organ professor at UOP's Conservatory of Music.

"Pacific Hail" is heard every night at 11:00 p.m., and the bells are also heard at 12:30 p.m. and 5:30 p.m. through a device called a "Melody Player." The Melody Player is set on a timer located in the Tower lobby near the actual bells, and is set to play the tunes daily. Also set on the timer are the traditional Westminster Chimes, heard before the bells strike the hours of the day.

Dr. Shilling has been in charge of the bells since they arrived on campus in 1964. He taught himself to play the Carillon by playing it daily for over two years. He currently teaches some of his students to play the Carillon and he still plays it himself on special occasions. After 18 years, Dr. Shilling is the only person on campus with a complete understanding of the complex instrument. "I'll never leave. I don't know

what the University will do," said Shilling jokingly.

A total of 122 miniature bronze bell units, including 61 Flemish bells and 61 Harp bells are located in the Tower lobby. The console has expression pedals for Harp Bells, Flemish Bass Bells, and Flemish Treble Bells. Harp Bells don't have the overtone quality of the Flemish Bells; they produce sounds similar to those of a harp or flute.

Tones are produced and amplified over one million times by specially designed electro-mechanical equipment. Eight speakers located at the top of the tower and four speakers placed at the base of the stained glass windows help to provide the tonal equivalent of over 10,000 pounds of cast bells, tuned to finest standards.

Dr. Charles Shilling said the bells do not break down very often and added that upkeep costs are low. "We've only

had to replace the chimes and two times since 1964 the bells' maintenance costs out of a general UOP fund."

Dong! Ding! Dong! The bells of Burns Tower are ringing. Hurry to their classes carefully, and think about the UOP they carry with them much more behind the tones than you think.

Terminal Knowledge

UOP's advanced computer system is emerging and growing with Northern California's futuristic computer industry. The average student at UOP does not graduate with having had some contact — and/or possibly conflict — with one of the on-campus computers, either administrative or academic. The use of the UOP com-

puter system is not just limited to engineering and computer science majors; many of the different schools and departments are now taking advantage of the exceptional speed and power of the computer system and the diversified opportunities it offers to the students.

There are three locations on campus

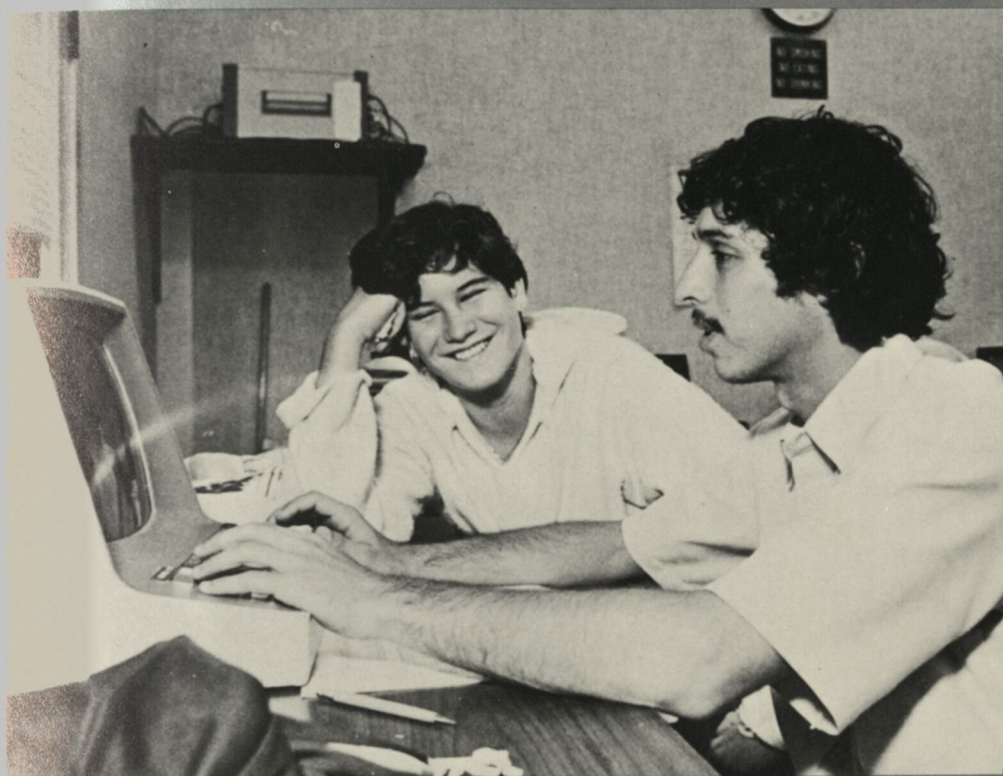
that house UOP's entire computer system. The most widely used, is the Computer Center, situated across from South/West dormitory. The Computer Center provides 45 terminals and is open for over one hundred hours per week. This facility is staffed by many well-trained teaching assistants to come to the rescue of frustrated students. The second system available for use is in the basement of the Classroom Building. This system is usually restricted for the use of the more advanced computer science majors. The third system located in Baun Hall serves engineering students as a teaching aid in the logistics of computer engineering.

There are many diversified and varied computer courses offered to UOP students. These languages include the following: COBOL, a common business-oriented language primarily used in business applications; BASIC, Beginners All-Purpose Symbolic Instruction Code; PASCAL, the most widely used language; ALGOL, Algorithmic Systems Language; and FORTRAN, one of the earliest developed compilers, predominately used for scientific math applications. There are other computer languages available, including PL/I (Programming Language I) and C-Systems Language. With these diversified languages being offered, UOP students are able to choose from a number of computer courses that suit their individual needs.

The UOP computer system has experienced extensive growth during the past few years. For this very reason, our system is expanding to meet the growing and changing needs of the UOP students, including the rapidly expanding number of computer engineers and computer science students. Many additions and modifications are constantly taking place in order to keep system growth at a rate which is needed at UOP to keep our students abreast of the changing computer world.

The computer science faculty and staff at UOP have been widely known for their excellence and rapid growth in the past few years. UOP's computer engineering majors and computer science graduates have a strong foundation for establishing themselves in the evergrowing computer industry.

Marching

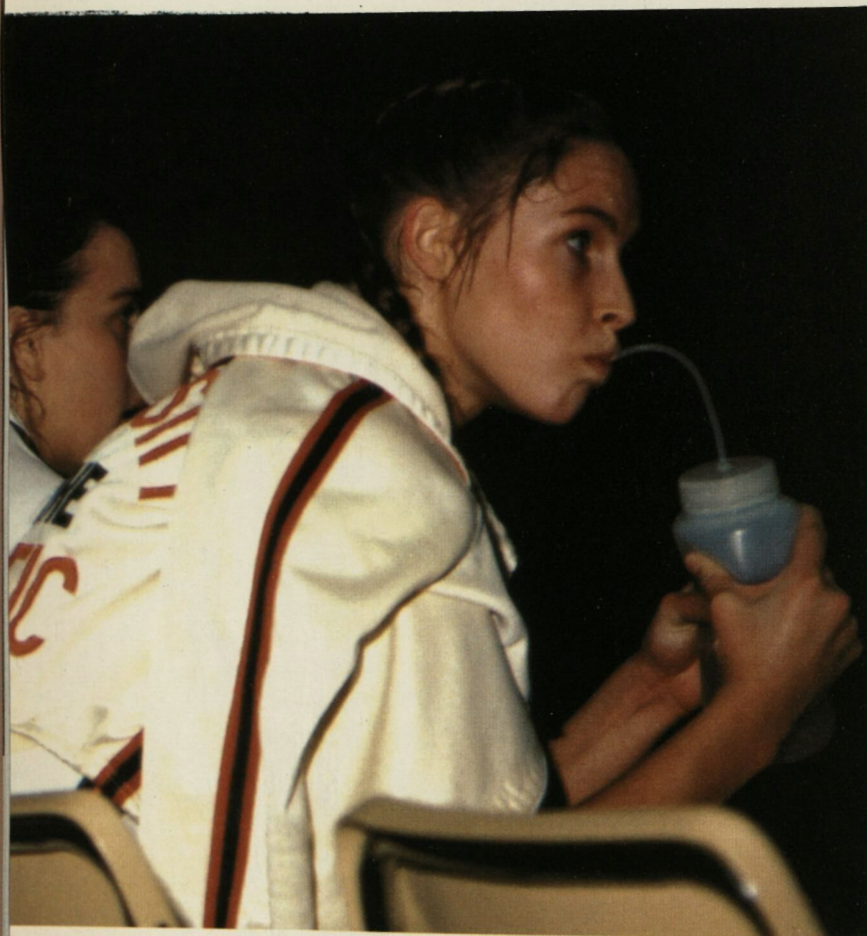
"You've come a long way baby!" Sound familiar? Yes, but this is not a cigarette advertisement. We are referring to the woman of today, especially at the University of the Pacific.

In the 131 year history of this institution, women have evolved from common graduates, housewives, and secretaries to doctors, lawyers, and star athletes. Granted it's been a few years, but the evolution didn't really gain speed until the Women's Rights Movement of the early seventies, and it took just ten short years for women to be recognized as one of the most untapped resource of the eighties.

The most acknowledged change has been that of the role of the female student-athlete, a very rare occurrence in the early nineteen hundreds. The only women's sports at this time included

tennis, golf, horseshoes and basketball, which were only played among the different women's groups such as sororities and dorms. Rules have changed drastically since then. For instance, basketball rules are now similar to the National Basketball Association (NBA).

In the mid-thirties, women such as Babe Deidrickson were capturing the lime-light and actually earning their living playing sports. Although this was a start, it took the next thirty years for women's intercollegiate athletics to get off the ground. This was sparked only after Debbie Meyers, a five-time gold medalist in the 1968 Olympics, and Wilma Rudolf, 1960 Olympic track star, won the hearts of millions for their fantastic athletic performances. The NCAA remained an all-male inter-

collegiate association up until 1981.

In 1976, Terry Liskevych took the reins as UOP's head volleyball coach of the ten intermural team. In just five short years, Liskevych turned the program around and brought it to its current status of a NCAA Division I national-ranking powerhouse team for the past four years.

Athletic scholarships allowed Terry Liskevych to recruit the top women in the nation and give the female student-athletes opportunities previously only received by men.

In the past, UOP has produced such greats as Eddie Le Baron and Tom Flores. Yet, Pacific's hopes for its first national championship may lie in women's sports.

NO MINORS ALLOWED

A sign posted on a fraternity house entrance states, "No Minors Allowed," a non-alcoholic beverage is served at a party, and security officers patrol nearby; all of these are illustrative of the alcohol policy issued to UOP students in the latter part of 1982.

The idea of an alcohol policy came to the campus in 1980 because of the administration's concern about a faculty-student cocktail party that may not have been altogether legal. The facts were that alcohol had always been banned on campus grounds.

It was then that administrators realized that a change in the rules was needed if the school was to have any control in such matters. The new rules have somewhat taken the responsibility of libel damages off the shoulders of the University, and have forced students to practice the principle of "responsible drinking."

The alcohol policy, adopted in October of 1981, "permits students of legal drinking age to consume and possess alcoholic beverages on University premises so long as it is restricted to the privacy of their own living space as determined by contract, or at a duty registered event which permits the serving of alcoholic beverages."

In no way does the policy presume an end to all parties and drinking, but it has cut down on the number of open parties available to students. Terrie Smith, '84, a member of Tri Delta sorority, recalls the period of the time before the alcohol policy. "I remember when I was a freshman, just the first week I was here there was a party every night, and you could always count on Omega Phi parties on every Thursday night throughout the semester."

Alcohol itself has not only presented legal problems, but according to surveys across the country, college campuses are plagued by alcohol abuse in general.

It is estimated that 20,000 students last year lost their lives through alcohol abuse. Such drinking games popular to most campuses across the country account for many of the deaths. "Chug-alug" has caused many incidents of blood poisoning, and the latest game, "quarters," has taken many lives when the quaters lodged in

their throats and the students suffocated. Such tragedies are not unknown to UOP. Only last year, a young coed, just a month before her graduation, lost her life in an automobile accident related to alcohol abuse. Another girl remained in a coma for many months after a spill down a stairway during a fraternity party.

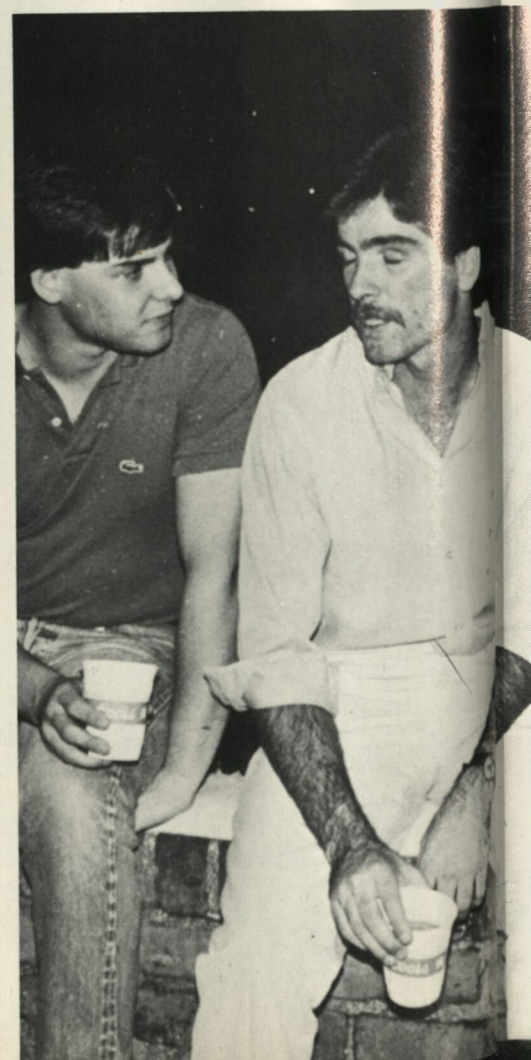
Because of the concern and liability for such incidents, the University of the Pacific hosted a workshop entitled "Greeks and Alcohol: Approaches to Responsible Drinking." Dr. Thomas Goodale, a well-known authority on alcohol education and Vice Chancellor of Student Affairs at the University of Denver, conducted the day-long event for some 60 Greek and staff members from California and Nevada colleges and universities. Dr. Goodale spoke on how to drink responsibly and conduct parties in the same manner. "The peer pressure to drink and to drink heavily is tremendous," said Dr. Goodale, adding, "But there are ways to make alcohol not the focus of every party." He suggested that at Greek functions, particularly during rush, fraternities might add a few "dry" days to their schedule. Dr. Goodale also advocated alcohol abuse programs on college campuses.

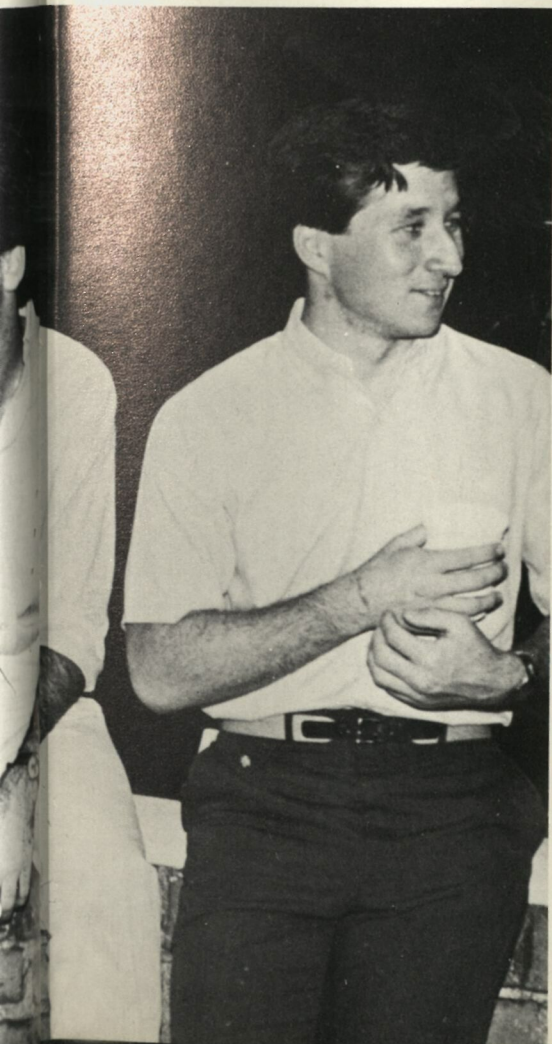
UOP is in the process now of implementing such a program. A \$21,000 grant from Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, if approved, will pay for an alcohol abuse director who will train pharmacy students in assisting other students with alcohol related problems.

Greg Boardman, Director of Fraternity Programs, feels that all this publicity toward alcohol abuse, though not instrumental in changing attitudes at present, has at least made them aware of the consequences in the future.

If all goes as planned by the administration, alcohol consumption will be greatly controlled at Pacific by the institution of the new alcohol policy. Although opposed by many students, particularly Greeks, the new policy will undoubtedly have a great restrictive affect on "open parties," unregistered drinking events and on campus alcohol-related accidents.

"Initiation of Winter Term"

Pacifican, Oct. 23, 1970

Twelve years ago, Winter Term and the entire 4-1-4 semester system came into existence here at Pacific. Yet for those of us here now, who have known Winter Term to be an outstanding and unique experience, we will also see it end. To us it will become but a memory of academic diversity and social interaction.

In 1968, a group of UOP professors went to Colorado for an educational conference. They returned to Pacific with many new and innovative ideas, one of which was the conception of a winter term. This group of professors later became known as the "Danforth Committee."

"The Danforth Committee recommends the adoption of a winter session of four weeks duration coming between the fall semester . . . and the spring semester . . ."

They proposed that Winter Term would be used to "develop the self-discipline needed for independent research, to provide the opportunity for more concentrated inquiry, and to allow for continuation of interdisciplinary study begun in the freshman year program." Their desire was to provide the whole world as a classroom for independent study and research.

The commencement of Winter Term in January of 1970 came close to doing just that. It not only offered many intriguing courses here on campus, but it also offered students a chance to study different areas of the world. The following, for example, were all a part of the initial Winter Term: Biology in Baja, Encounter with Israel, January in Paris, and The Desert in Winter.

Presently, an African safari, a skin diving expedition in the Caribbean, and the study of theatre in Vienna and London, are very popular off-campus courses. After this January, Winter Term will cease to exist.

Due to lack of interest? Obviously not! Anyone who attended the "Save our Winter Term" rallies, instigated by students in support of the continuation of Winter Term, in the fall of 1981, knows better. As far as the students were concerned, Winter Term was an attribute of Pacific, one they wanted to continue, and they banded together to prove it. Students at Pacific have not been so united under one issue

since the early 1960's. However, they failed in their efforts to save Winter Term.

What happened? Why was Winter Term cancelled? "Freedom being a fragile state, the program has a great margin for failure on the side of both the student and the college. A primary objection to Winter Term has been that students will not take the term seriously, but consider it a vacation, a time to goof off and spend a month skiing." **Pacifican**, Oct. 23, 1970.

Granted, some students have abused Winter Term just as some faculty have. Does that constitute a reason for annihilating the program? According to ASUOP President Joe Hartley, "The death of Winter Term is the fault of both the faculty and the administration." Mainly because if students were abusing Winter Term, then it was the faculty's responsibility to keep them purposefully directed; if faculty were abusing it, then it was the administration's responsibility to keep the faculty in check.

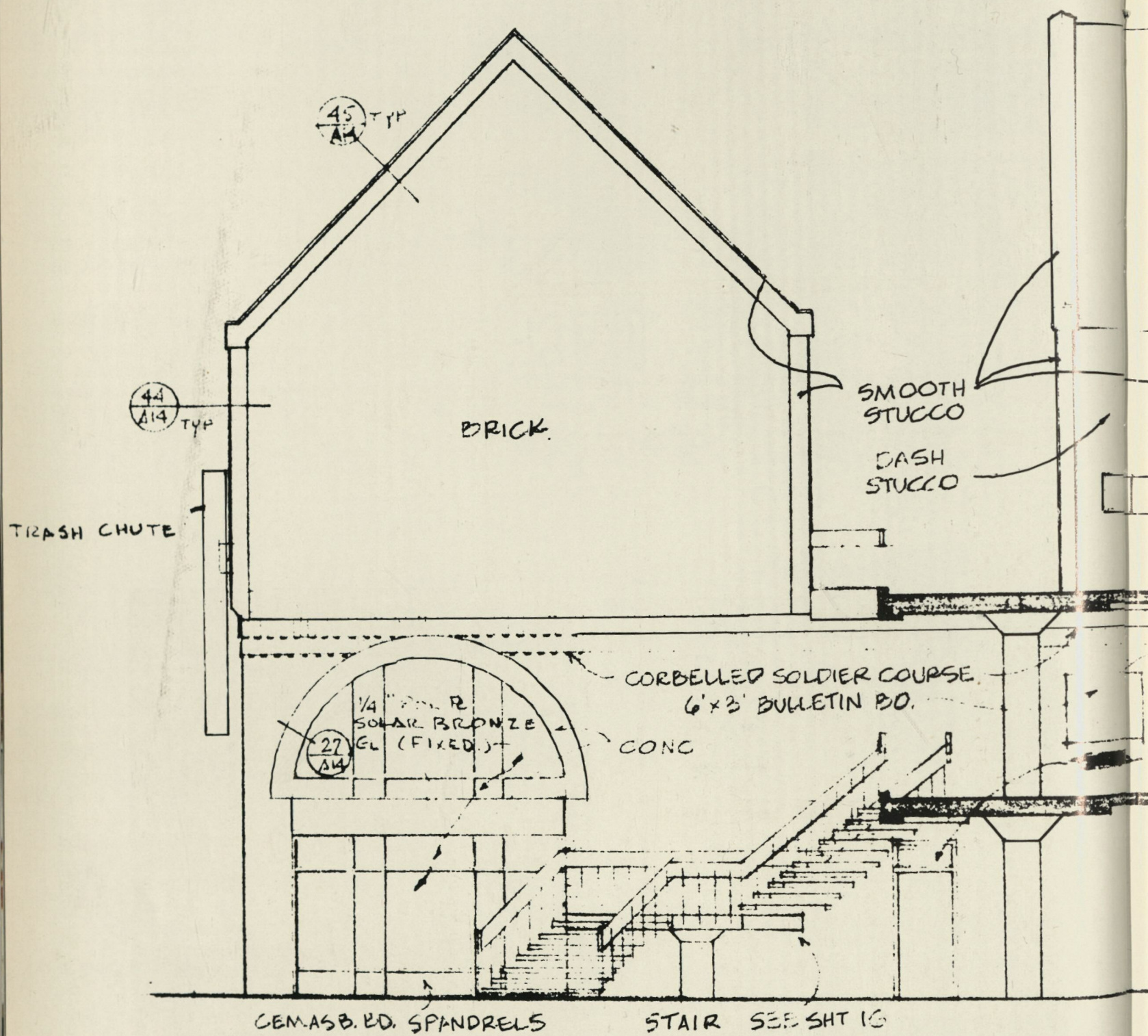
According to current Professor of Communications, Dr. Duns, who was a member of the 1968 Danforth Committee, "Some faculty members abused Winter Term as a result of not being responsible to ask people to work."

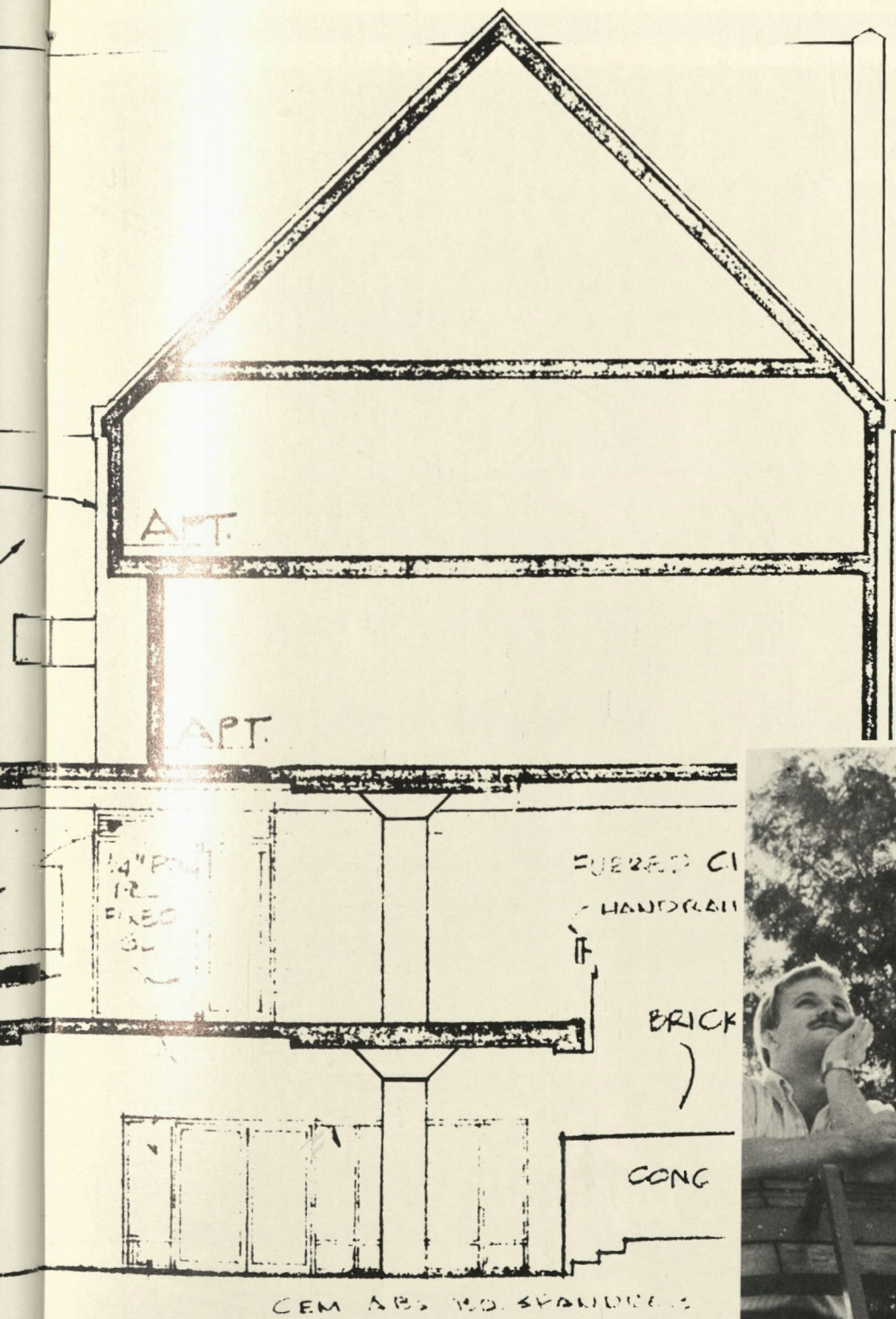
He also feels that the program should have been continually evaluated by the administration, which would have provided a good check and balance system and insure its longevity.

Dr. Duns regrets losing Winter Term; "Pacific has gradually eliminated all aspects which made us unique and allowed us to experience innovation and new ways of learning. Change is becoming more and more difficult at Pacific and is something that will haunt us in the future."

So there it is; Winter Term is dead forever. As students who have gone through this Winter Term, we should fondly remember our experiences of past years. Don't be surprised if in the wind you hear the melody of "Funeral for a Friend."

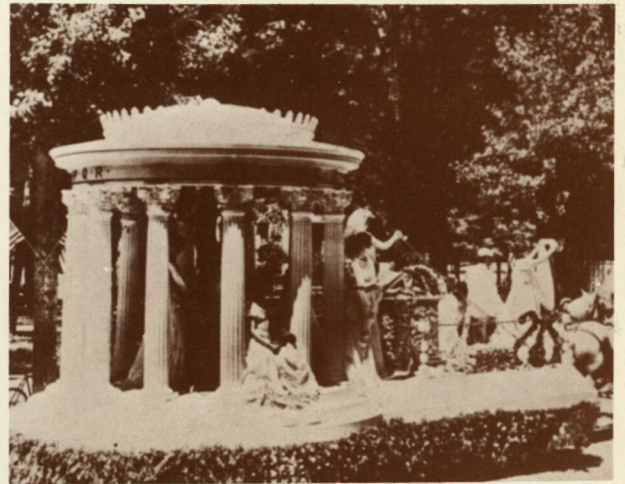

Reviving Traditions



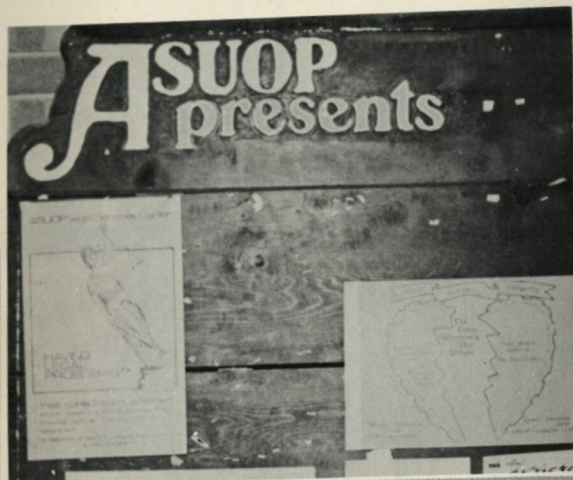

Associated Students

Pacific's student body as a whole has always been represented by student government in some form. The major group of representation in the past years was the Pacific Student Association, which worked along with the Associated Women Students to benefit the interests of the students. In 1971, these two groups and various dorm councils formally merged into the Associated Students of the University of the Pacific, more commonly known by the acronym ASUOP.

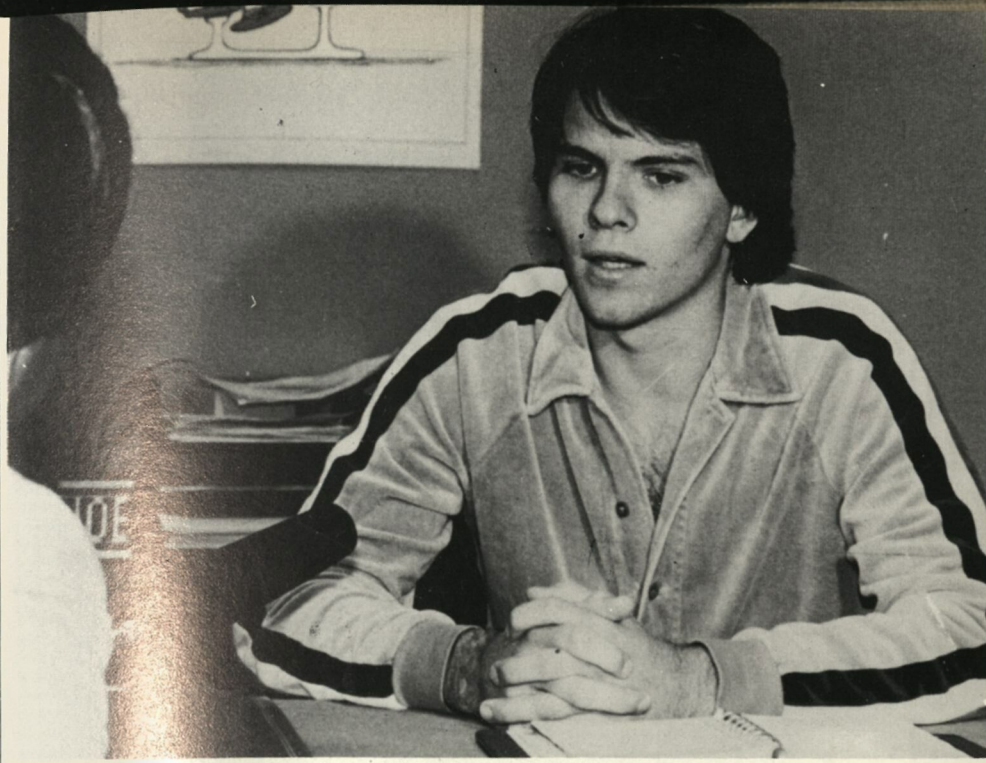
The main goal of ASUOP is to utilize the resources of the student body as a whole for the greatest benefit to each individual student. To facilitate accomplishment of this aim, ASUOP is organized into executive, judicial and legislative branches.

The executive branch is composed of the President, Vice President and the Executive Board of Directors. Each of the nine members on this Board of Directors is appointed by the President and is responsible for different services or programs funded by ASUOP.

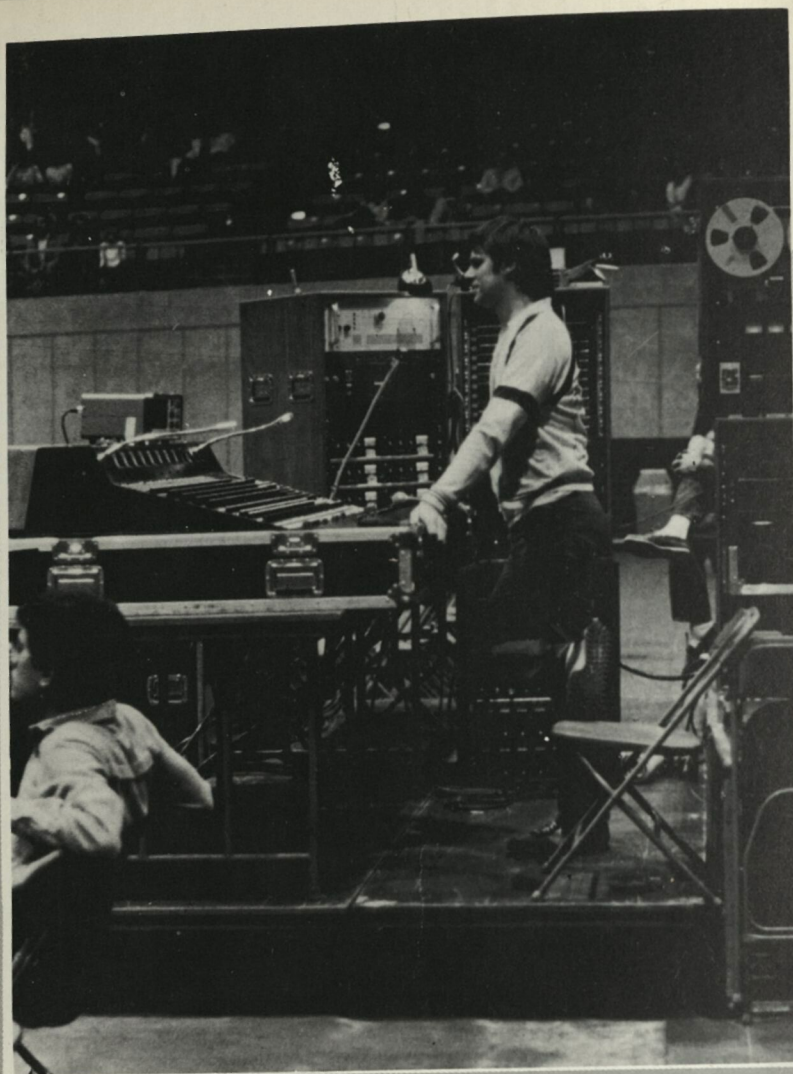
The judicial branch of ASUOP is designed to act as a check over the executive and legislative branches. Current revisions in this branch have been induced by the ASUOP Self Study Report of March, 1982, which proposed a Supreme Court and a Court of Inquiry.

The third branch of ASUOP, the legislative body, is more commonly known as the Board of Supervisors. The Board has a guaranteed system of representation and a set constituency on which it bases its legislative decisions.

ASUOP President Joe Hartley was elected in March 1981 and completed an unprecedented second term in office. As President, Joe was the students' chief spokesperson and the government's chief administrator. His wide range of responsibilities included everything from hiring the executive Board of Directors to handling emergency situations.

Linda Haverty's main responsibility in her office of Vice President was the management of the legislative branch. She was also involved in student concerns as well as acting as the President's right hand man.

In her Academic Affairs directorship, Cathy D'Angelo was last year's liaison between the students and the academic side of Pacific. The three major areas her responsibilities' focus on were student representation, grade grievances, and student information.

Cinema Director Dean Sorensen was in charge of all ASUOP movie presentations last year. Along with planning weekday matinees, the responsibilities of the Cinema Director included scheduling the popular recently-released weekend presentations.

The power behind the Forum directorship rested with Jonathan Hill last year. As Forum director, he brought popular speakers and guest lecturers to the University for the interest and benefit of the campus community.

As Office of Publicity director, Laura Cosby was responsible for advertising all ASUOP events, and for publicity of campus clubs and organizations as well as the individual student. The many-faceted duties of publicity and advertisement comprised the job of director of the Office of Publicity.

With the recent opening of the Spanos Center, the job of ASUOP Social Director has been greatly expanded. Last year Steve Alexander programmed everything from big-name entertainment to dances, comedy acts, and a new program spotlighting up-and-coming entertainers called "Catch a Rising Star."

Ann Heinsen, is serving as Travel Service director, maintained a full-service travel agency in ASUOP last year. The Travel Service director specialized in local, domestic, and international airline reservations and ticketing.

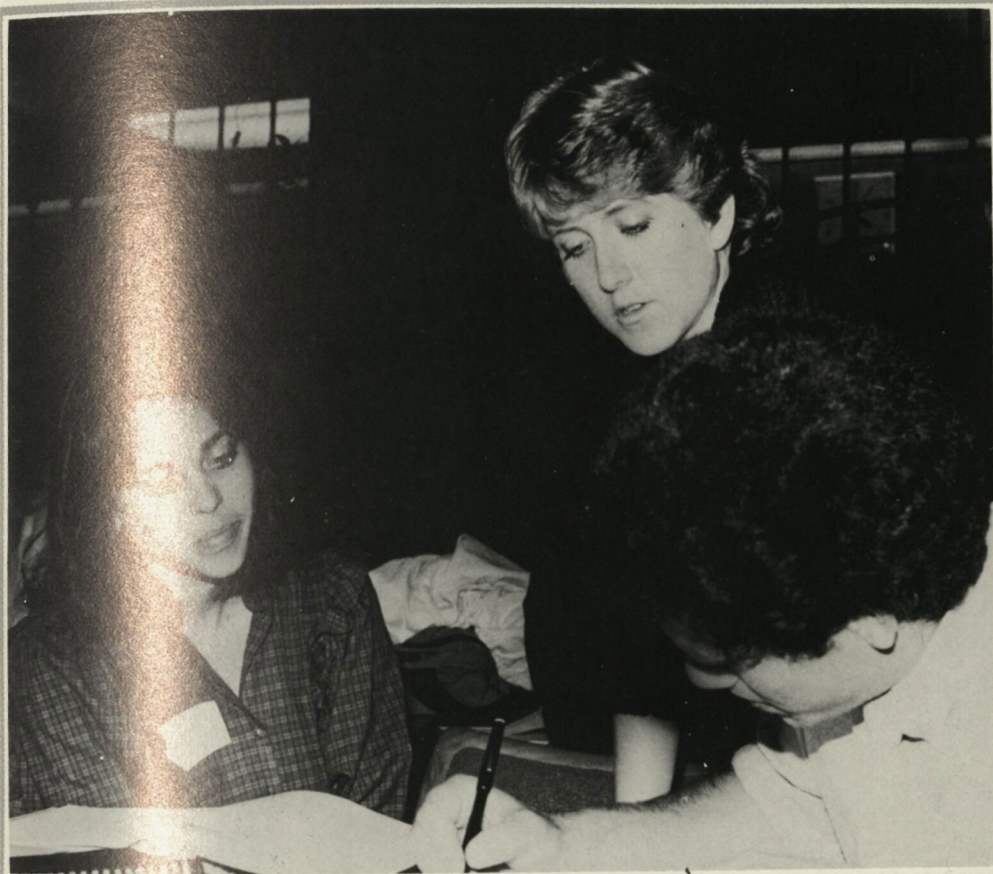
ASUOP Grocery Store director Jesse Chavez was responsible for the operations of a completely student-owned and student-operated retail food outlet on campus.

Board of Supervisors



In the year 1980, an ineffective and non-representative ASUOP Senate was replaced with the current legislative body of ASUOP, the Board of Supervisors (B.O.S.).

During the 1980-81 academic year, while the Board was still searching for its purpose, procedures and powers, it began establishing its own framework. Since this time, the Board's structure has been strengthened as bills have been passed, stands have been made and struggles have been fought and won.

The Board was composed last year of elected representatives from each living group (dorms, frats, sororities, and off-campus groups) and constituent school representatives.

Last year the Board of Supervisors centered on developing an effective committee system. The Board continued to be the ever-growing voice in the ASUOP decision-making process.

Spanos Rocks



A new epoch arose in the game of live music production this year as the University of the Pacific joined the league of big time concert promoters.

On September 17, 1982, Quarterflash, a Portland, Oregon band, rocked the Spanos Center with their smooth and catchy beat. Opening band Steel Breeze, from nearby Sacramento, brought the crowd to their feet and by the time Quarterflash was in full swing, all the fans were dancing.

On October 8, Spanos Center fans were treated to two fine hours of San Francisco's own Jefferson Starship. However, the concert operated at a substantial financial loss because, according to ASUOP President Joe Hartley, "We just didn't sell enough tickets." Although the Spanos Center was set up to seat 4,500 people, total attendance to the Starship show was only 2,471.

The Little River Band and opening group Randy Meisner entertained a near sell-out crowd November 10 at the Spanos Center. This concert proved itself as the most successful, both in music and attendance, of the concerts sponsored by ASUOP last fall. Despite the financial difficulties encountered by ASUOP in the first-time job of concert production, the Spanos Center proved itself as a quality arena for large concerts and ASUOP established itself as a qualified concert producer. These three concerts have opened the door and are very good indications of what can occur at the Spanos Center in the future.



From Boxcars to Riches



From Boxcars to Riches

ASUOP, of the students, for the students, by the students — they've come a long way, from boxcars to riches!

The associated students at the University of the Pacific, alias ASUOP, has indeed come a long way. In fact, all the way from literal boxcars to the plush and sophisticated office they now maintain in the University Center.

But how did it all happen? When did it all begin?

ASUOP (previously known as PSA, Pacific Student Association) has been around basically as long as the University; however, it has changed drastically from time-to-time to stay in tune with each passing generation. At one point in time, ASUOP was literally housed, temporarily, of course, in old railroad boxcars.

Pre-boxcar era PSA, as it was known then, was a very regimented governmental body which reflected the signs of the times.

PSA, at the end of the 1960's, exemplified their era. They were much more interested in taking a stand against the Vietnam War than in football games and pep rallies. However, what resulted from this in following years was a striving by ASUOP to become much more involved in academic and University affairs. They had had enough of administration being forced on them and desired more control in the academic and overall University decisions. And, surprisingly enough, they received it. "In the area of academics, we have put more students on the many University committees." Thomas White, ASUOP President, 1973.

With the opening of the University Center in the mid-1970's, ASUOP greatly expanded their already functioning services with the introduction of the movie theatre, the travel service, the grocery store and a coffee house, now the Rathskellar.

The opening of the Center, allowing ASUOP to expand their services, made the \$75 student fee tangible — students had something to hold in their hand. They could begin to see

what their money was being spent on.

Even since the opening of the University Center, ASUOP has come a long way.

"Student officers have gotten better. In fact, they've become almost frighteningly professional." Naranjado, 1973.

ASUOP's sophisticated and plush offices, completely renovated this past Winter Term, are nothing less than what you might see in an office in downtown San Francisco. Indeed, they have become professionals.

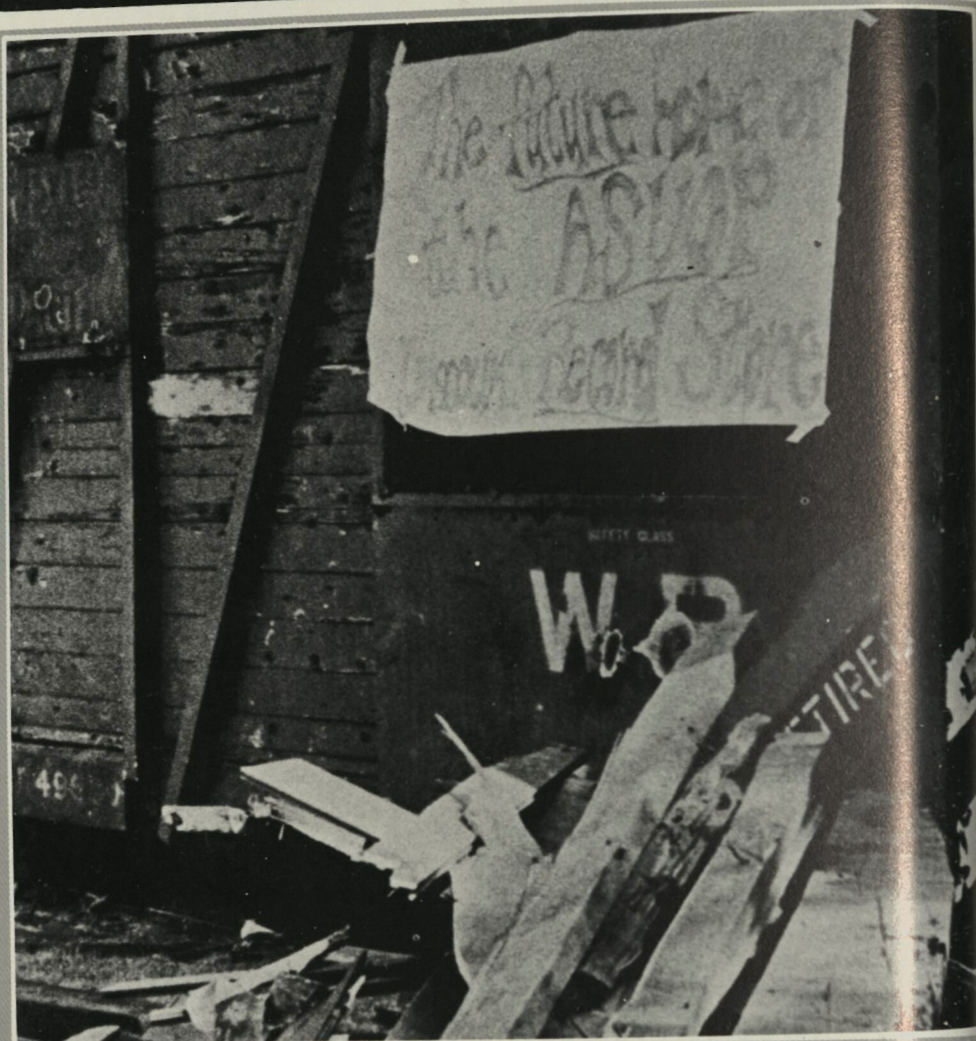
"The world of computers, calculators, and data processing has conquered the formerly disorganized world of the ASUOP office." Naranjado, 1973.

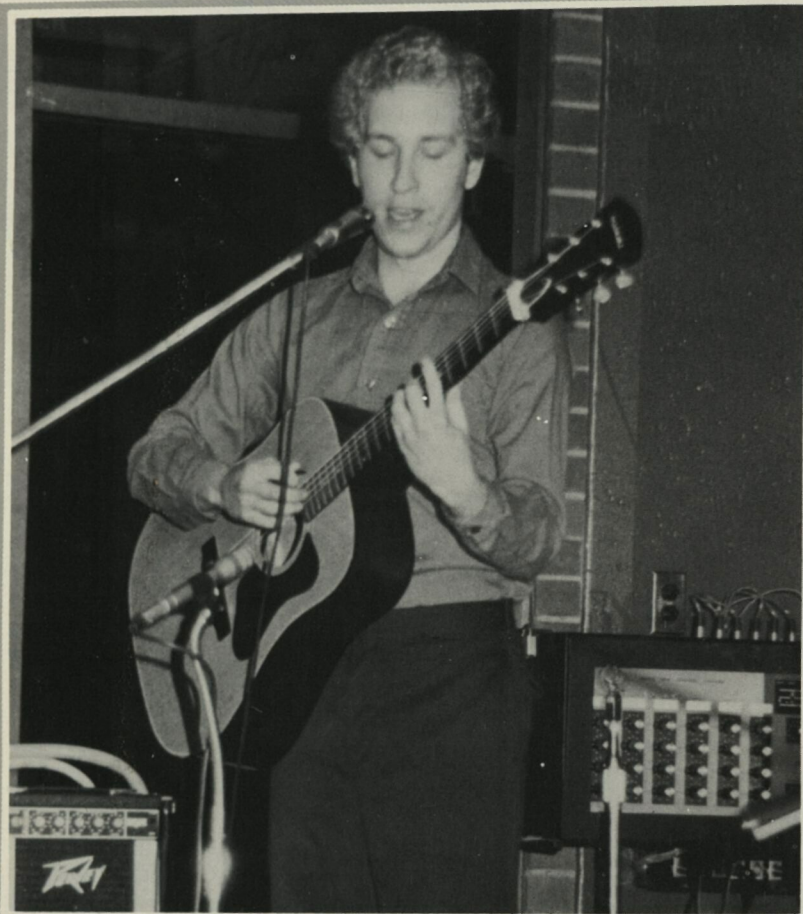
Ulla Norrup, Art Committee Director, with the assistant of the UOP Art Department, presented a variety of exhibitions displayed in the University Center Gallery.

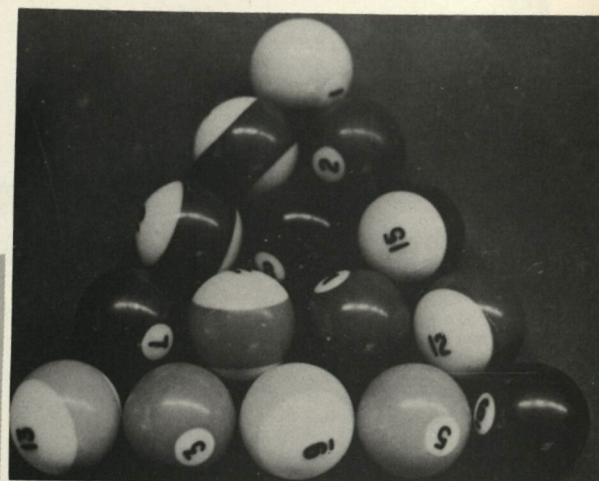

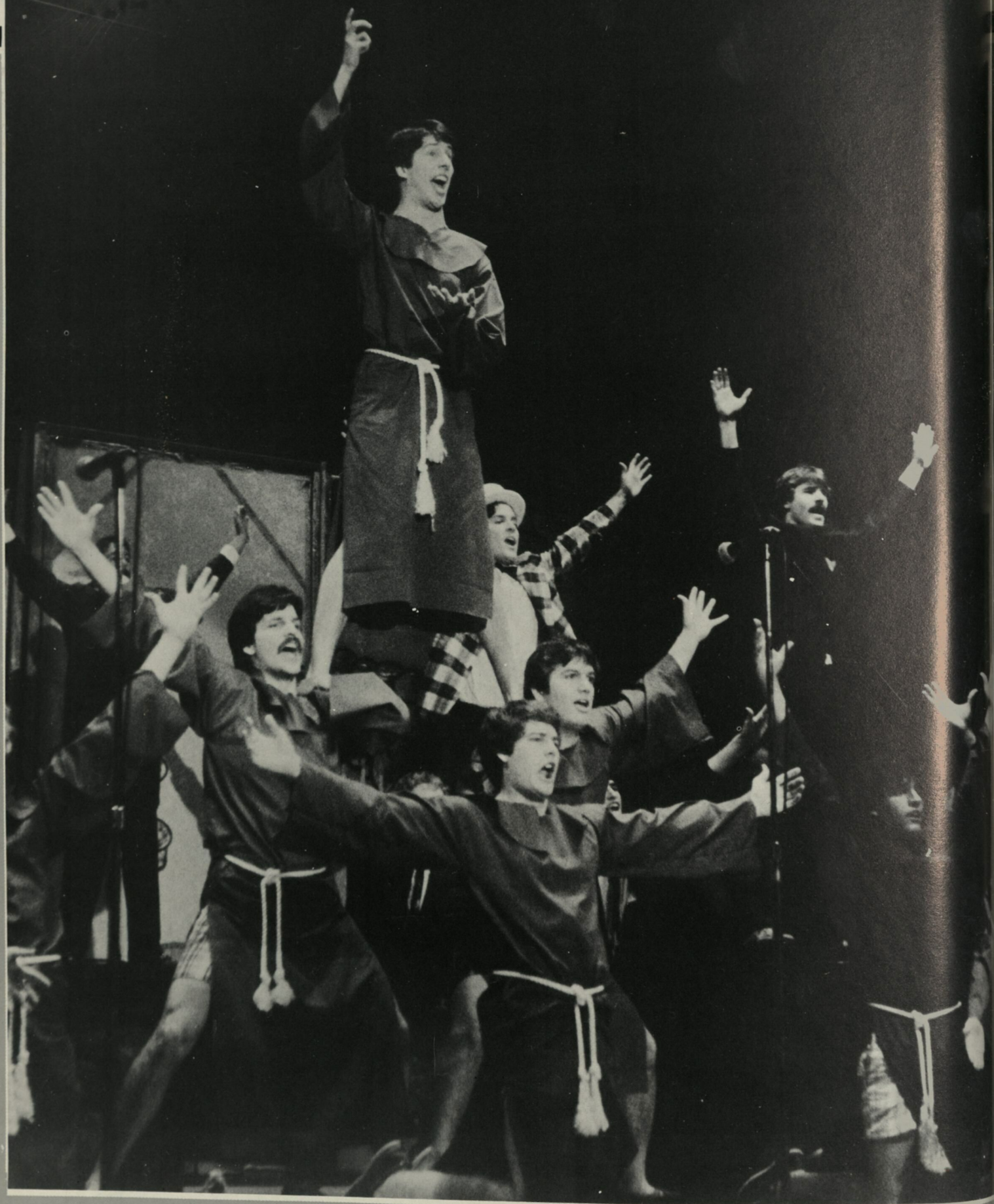

Band Frolic

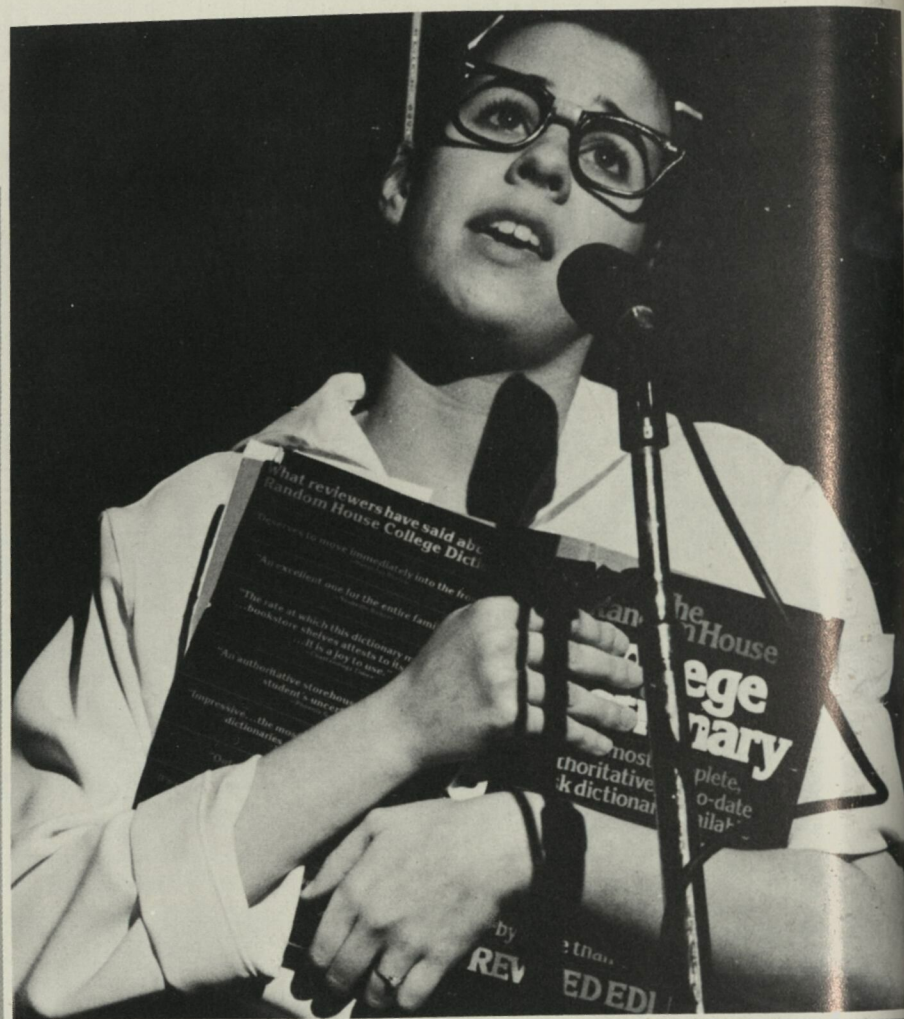

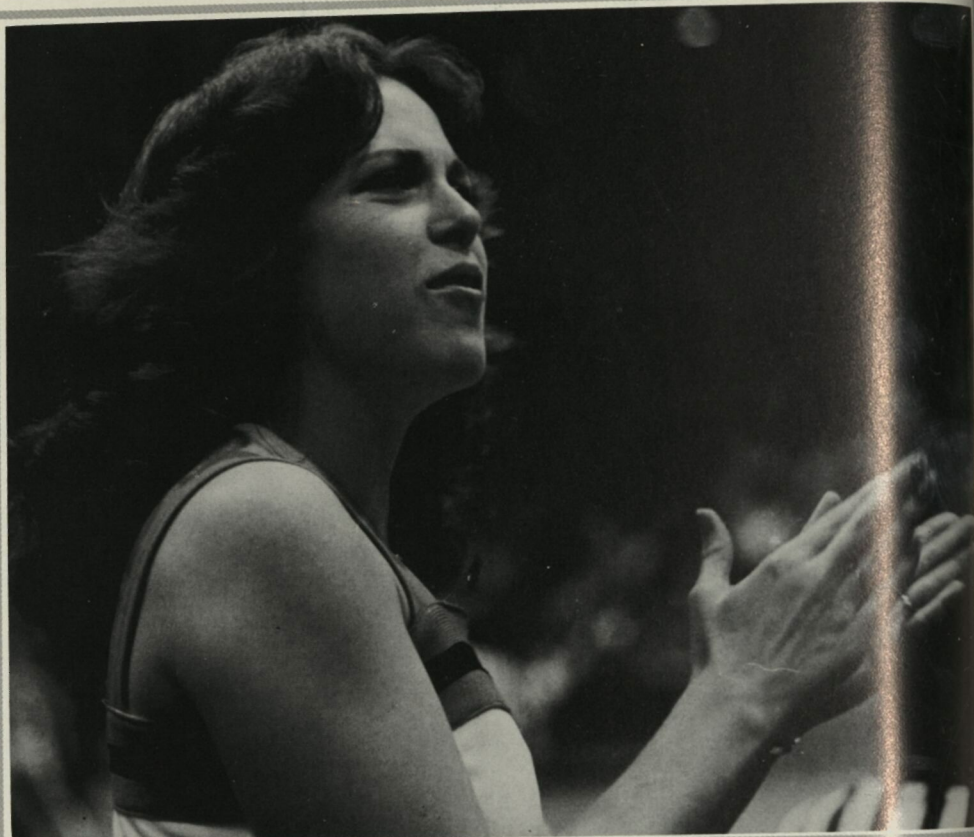
Spirit Squad

KUOP



1983 was a significant year in the history of KUOP-FM, California's only public radio station based in the central valley. The year brought with it the sign-on of a new and more powerful KUOP, broadcasting a stereo signal from atop Mt. Oso, 2,714 feet above sea level, to San Joaquin and Stanislaus counties, and significant portions of Tuolumne, Calaveras and Amador counties.

This transmitter move, allowing the Station to increase its potential audience from 350,000 to one million people was made possible by over \$17,000 and a Public Telecommunications grant from the federal government of \$51,000.

In keeping with its public broadcasting purpose, KUOP maintained a diversity of programs such as All Things Considered, Radio Drama, Morning Edition, Soul, Jaz and Classical Music. The transmitter relocation to Mt. Oso also meant that 3% of the California population is now reached for the first time, by a reliable public radio signal.

KUOP is licensed to the University of the Pacific, which maintains the premise of knowledge and social awareness of individuals and the community.

Playing an important role in the UOP communications Department, KUOP provided approximately 60 students with "hands-on" experience in production, programming, promotion and management in a full promotion and management in a full-service, public broadcasting station.

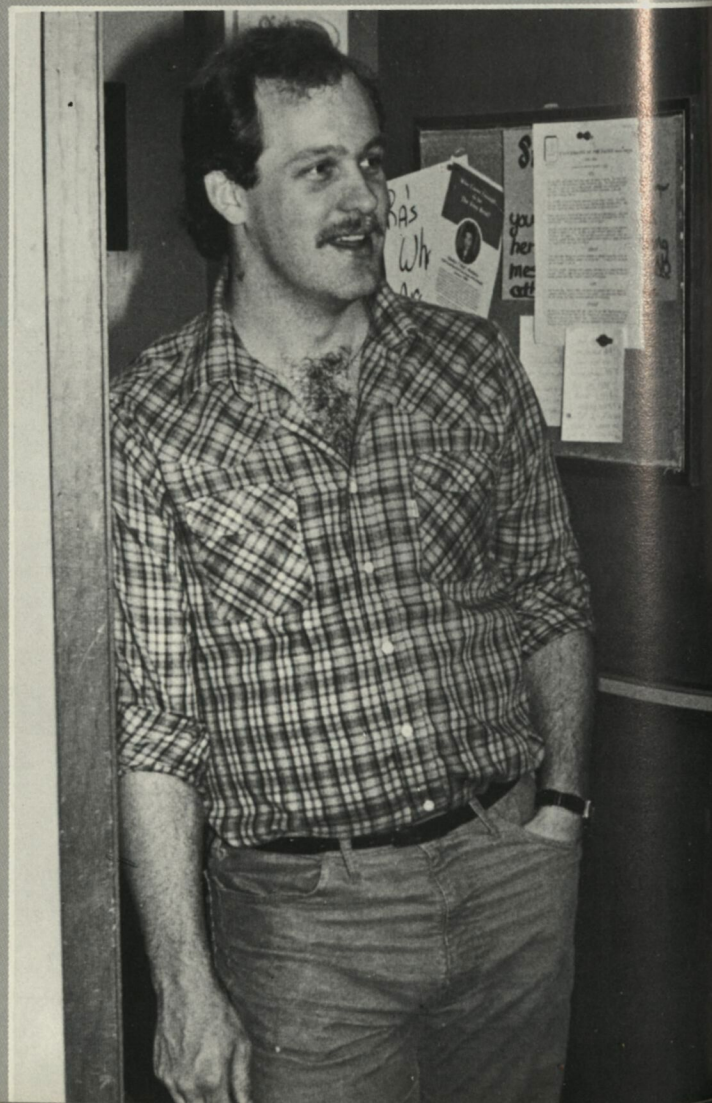

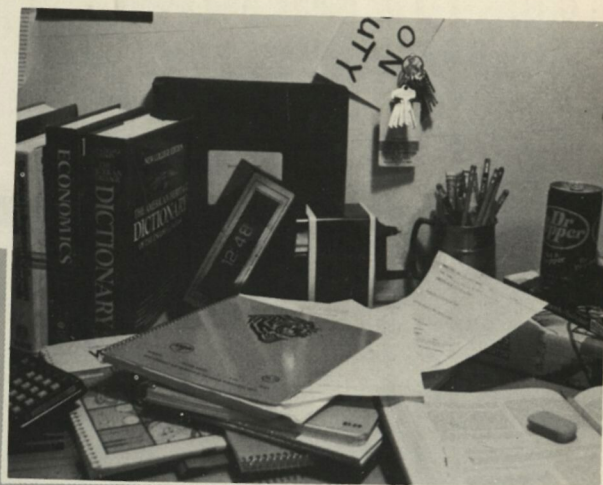
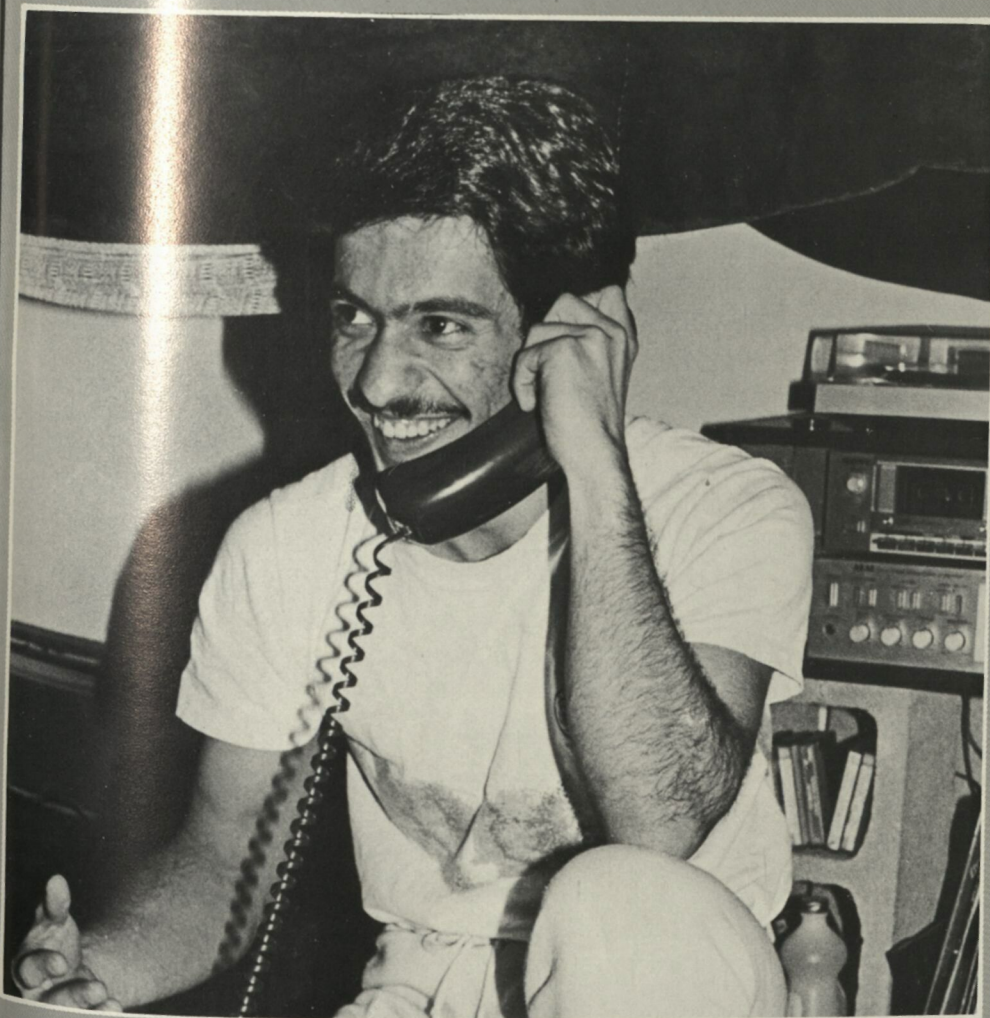

The R.A. makes the dormitory a home by helping develop a community, developing behavior guidelines, aiding in hall government and being a friend.

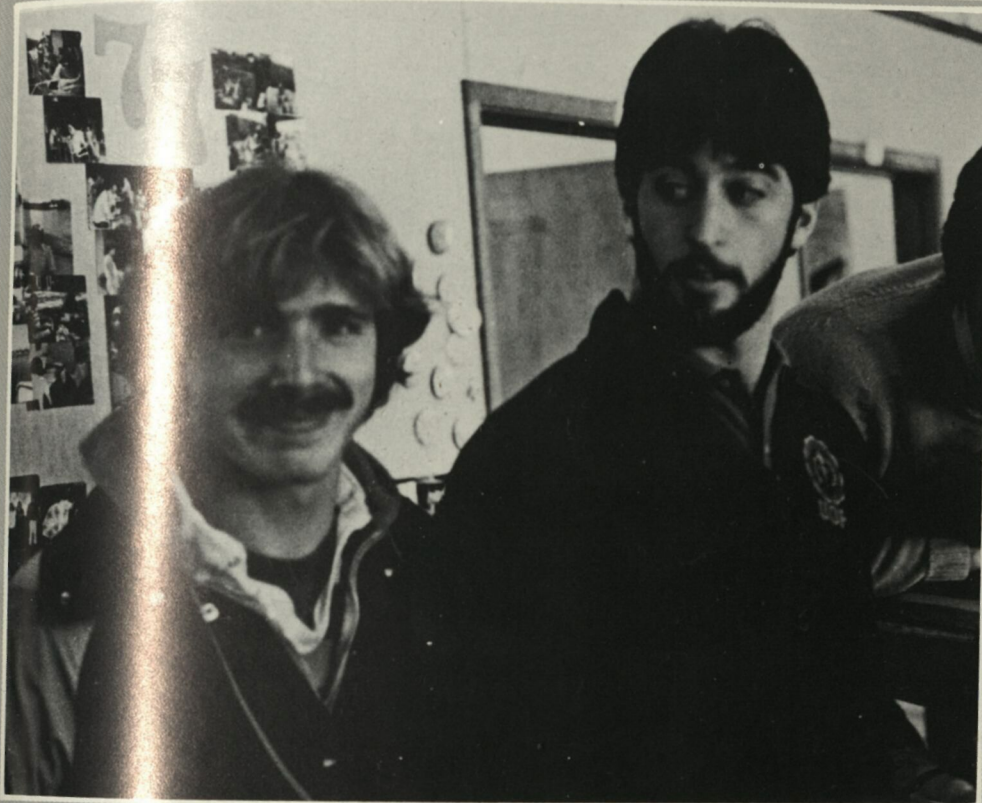

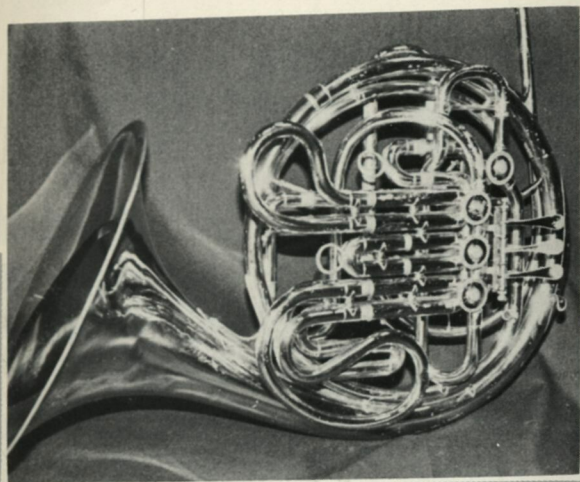
Two other functions Student Advisor involved themselves in were conducting workshops at the Academic Skills Center and recruiting at surrounding high schools.

The ever-expanding goal of the Student Advising Program is to aid all University students by guiding them through personal and academic problems while preparing them for the adjustments they have to face at Pacific.



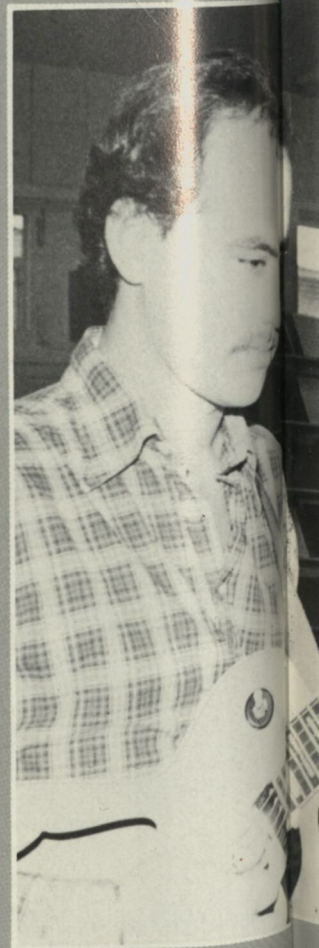

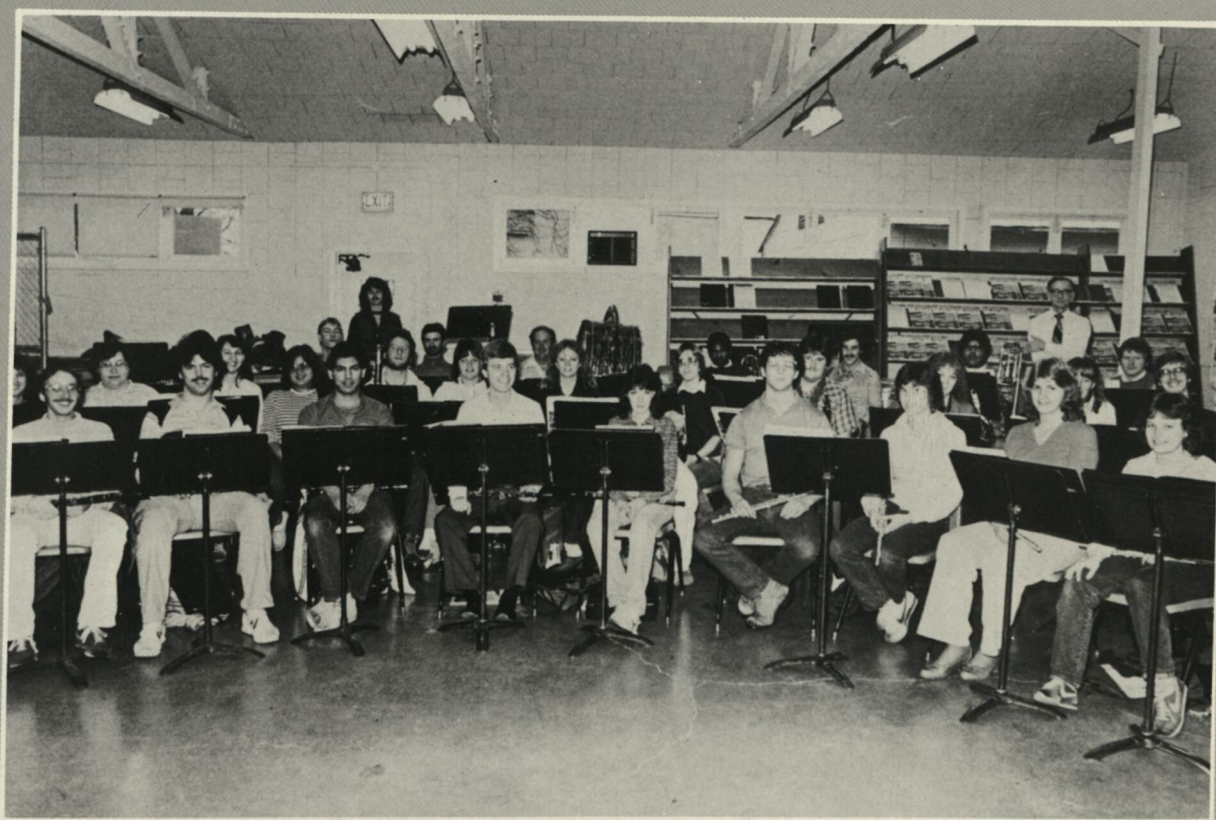


UOP Bands

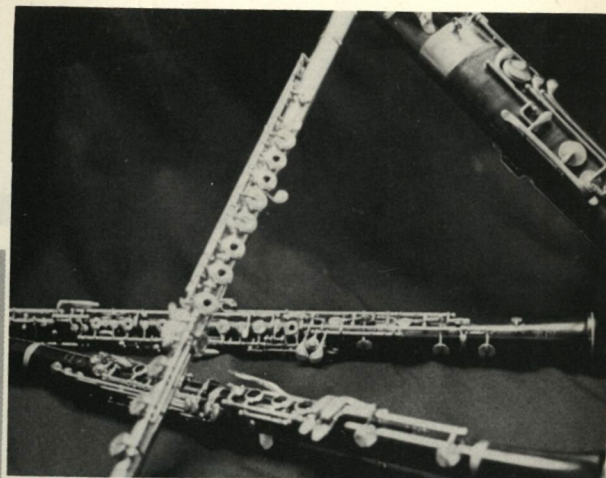

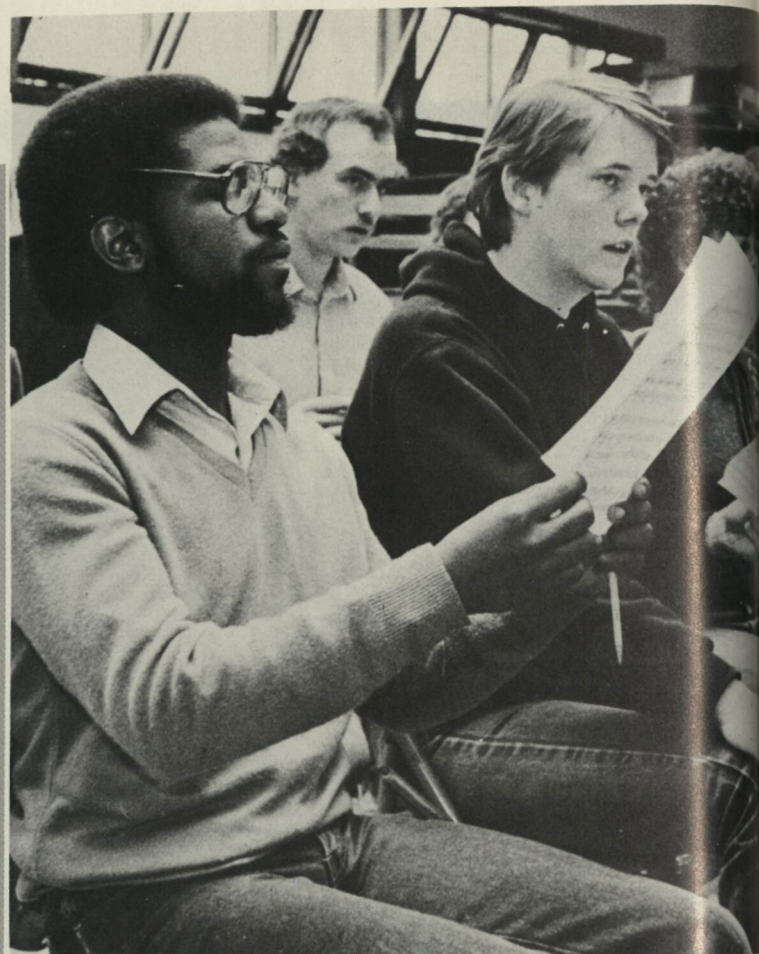

The "Tiger" Marching Band provides an opportunity for students to participate in marching, tall flag or dance line. Their repertoire consists of rock, pop and traditional football music.

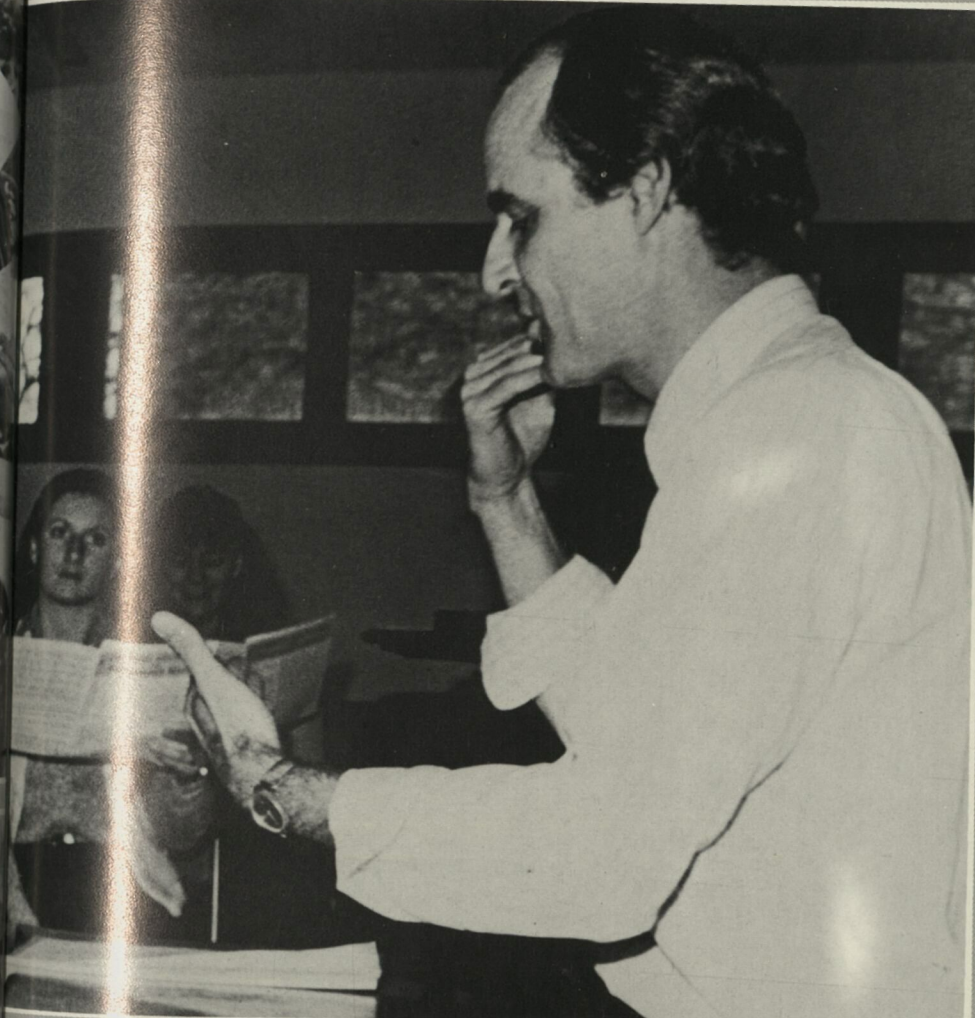

A Capella Choir



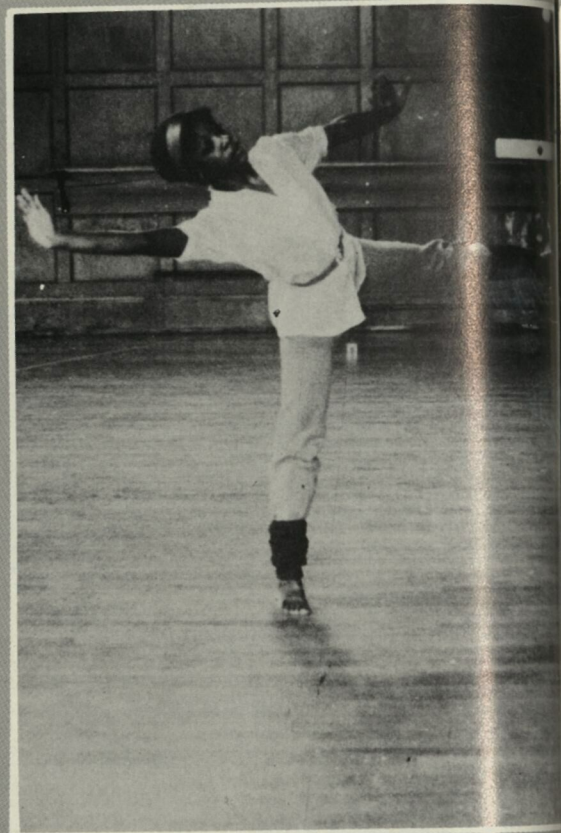

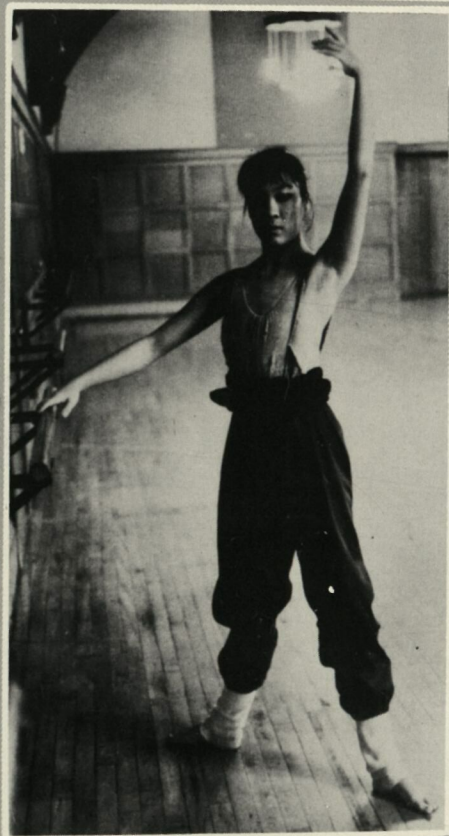
The significant accomplishments and continuity of this respected choral group emphasize the distinguished history of Pacific and the Conservatory of Music.

Pacific Dance Ensemble

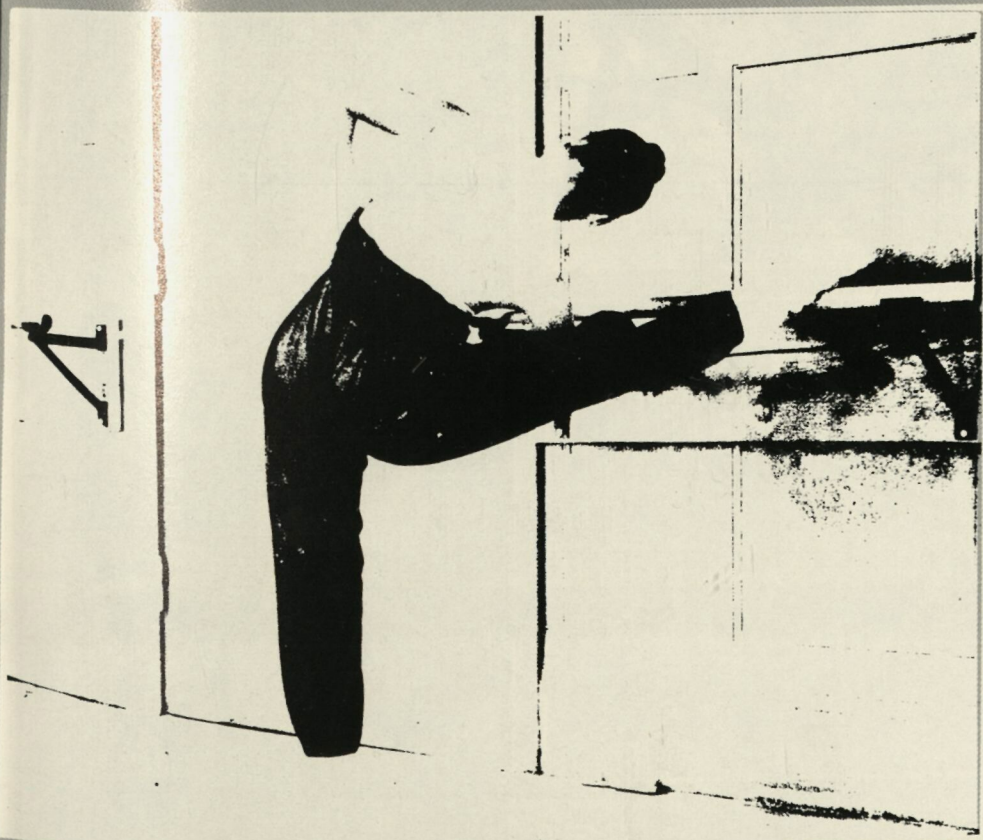

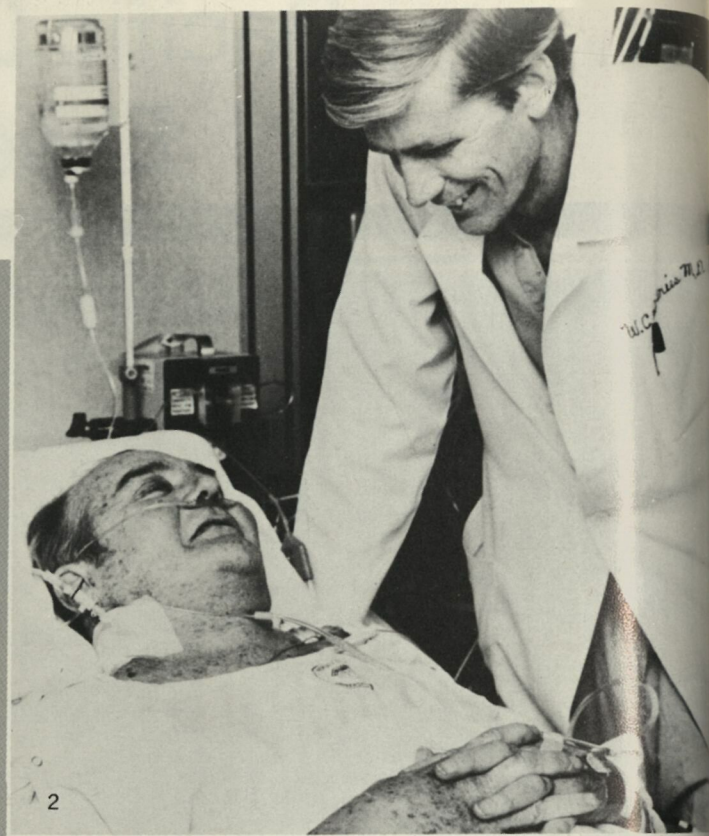

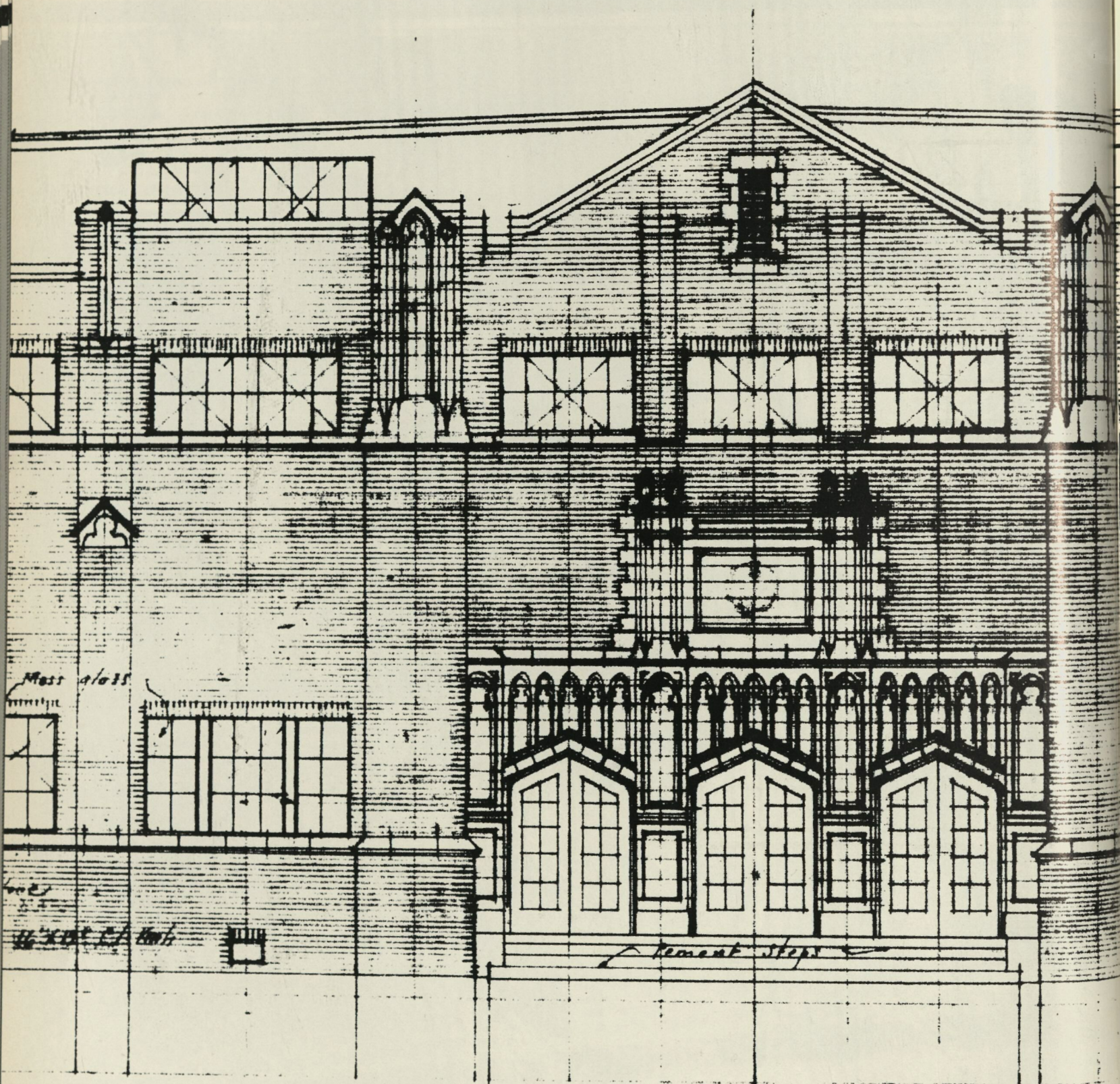

1982 was the worst season the UOP Tigers have seen under Coach Bob Toledo. The 2-9 overall record and 1-4 league finish tied the 1976 record under Coach Chester Caddas.

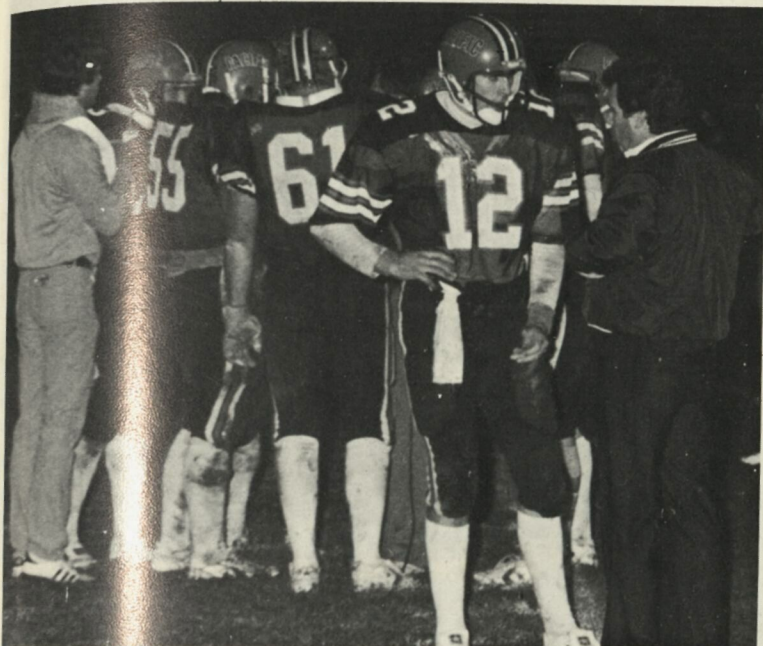
Losing to UC Davis 23-22, Utah State 14-12, and Long Beach State 32-31 in final seconds of all three

games prevented the Tigers from achieving a decent record of 5-6. Pacific's only two wins were over Nevada-Las Vegas 29-27 and Cal State Fullerton 31-0, their season finale.

Statistically, UOP outgained foes in yardage and picked up more first downs, but were plagued by fumbles

and interceptions which obliterated the most important statistic, scoring.

1982's Most Valuable Player Award went to Gary Blackwell, an All-PCAA first team pick who led UOP and the PCAA in rushing with 661 yards total, making him Pacific's number nine career rusher with 1622 yards. The

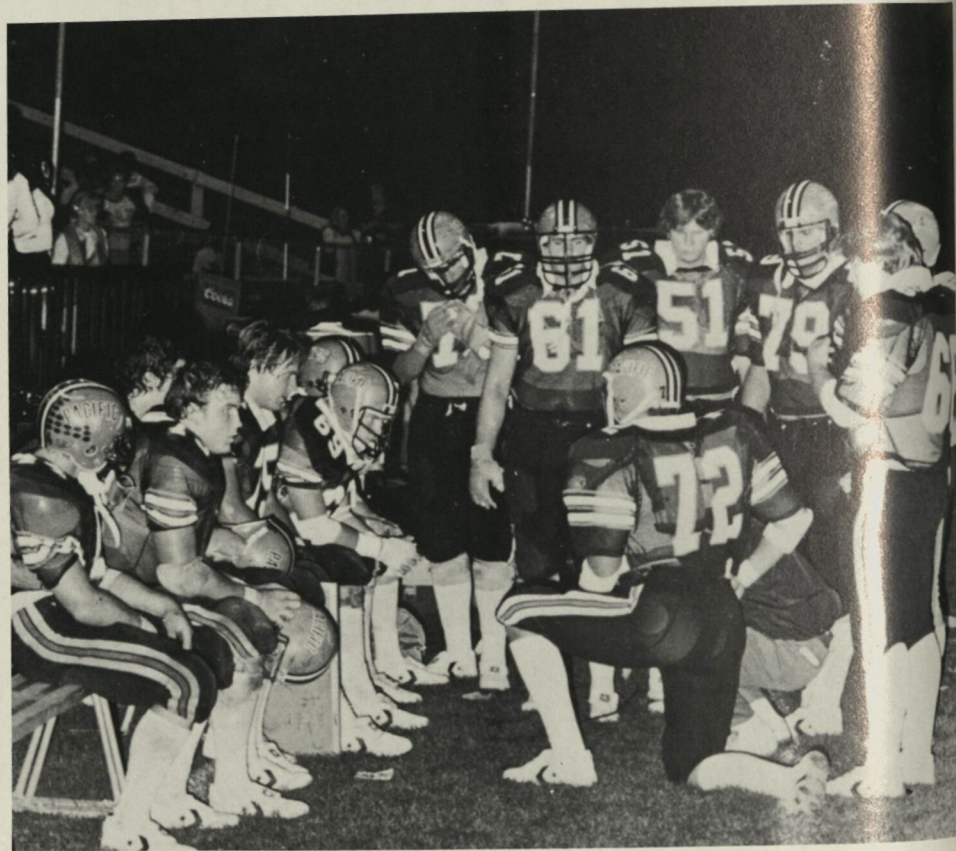
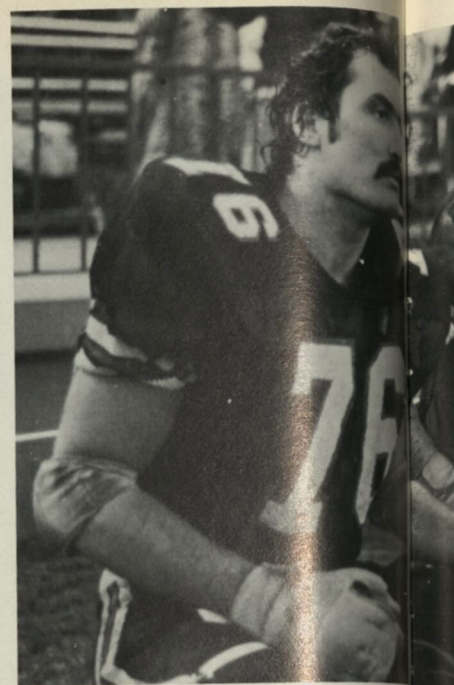

Graduating only thirteen seniors, Pacific has a great deal of potential, dedication, and enthusiasm for the coming year.



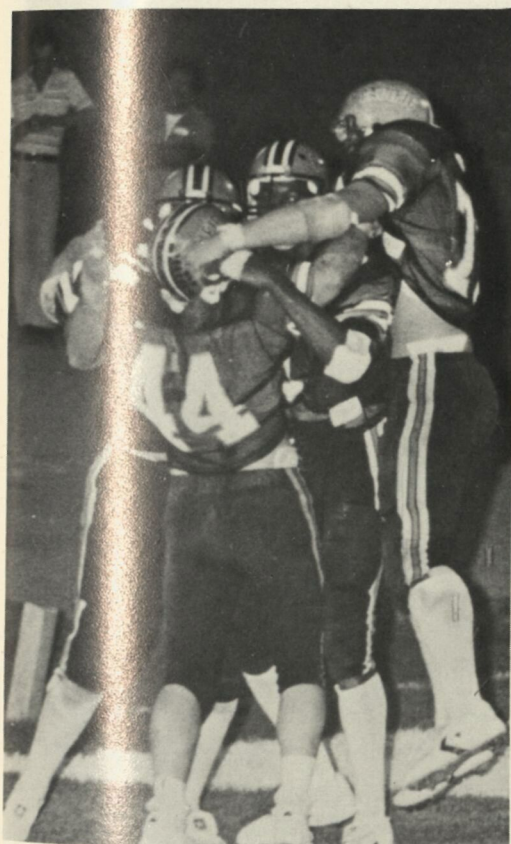
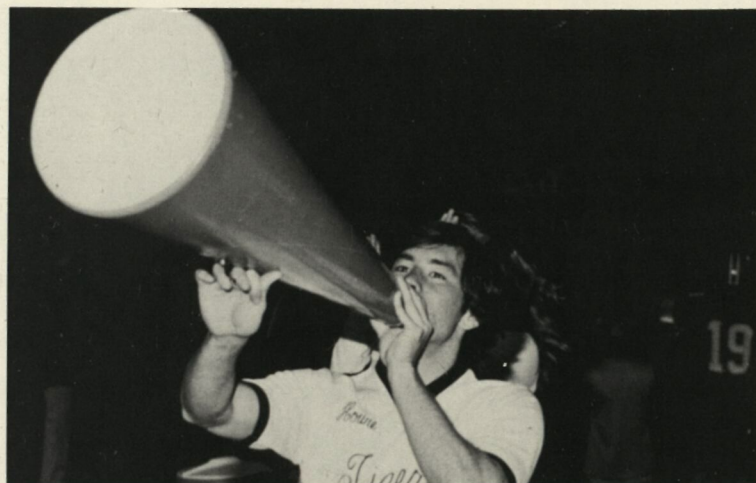
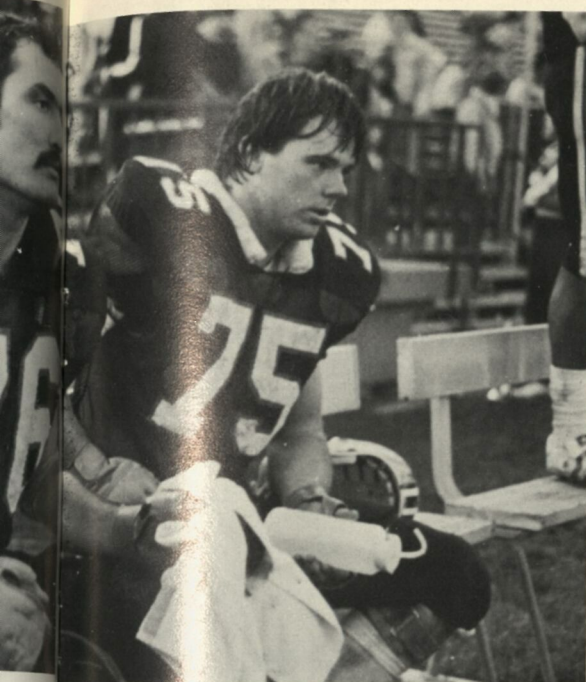
In just three short years at the helm of the University of the Pacific football program, Head Coach Bob Toledo had established a winning team and community attitude that promised to make 1982 the brightest season for the Tigers in some time. Falling short of his expectations, however, Toledo closed the door on a bittersweet tenure at Pacific after his team compiled an overall 2-9 record making '82 one of the worst seasons UOP has seen since

1976, also 2-9.

Toledo announced his resignation after the San Jose State 31-0 slaughter which left the Tigers 1-9. The poor record wasn't the only reason why Toledo resigned. The Athletic Department was asked to cut approximately \$200,000 from its budget following a large deficit suffered by the University. "The San Jose loss was the straw that broke the camel's back," said Toledo. "I don't have any animosity or hard

feelings toward the University, but with the cuts that were going to be made, things were just going to get worse. It's just not meant to be."

When hired in 1978 at the age of 32, Bob Toledo was one of the youngest head coaches in the country in Division I. The intent of the program was to become more competitive at the Division I level. Improvements that were to take place — initially to be paid for by a group of booster — included budget,



scholarships, personnel and the school was to be more flexible in admitting borderline students.

While at Pacific, the now 36 year-old Toledo had compiled a 13-30 record. However, prior to his coming to UOP, Toledo had never been a part of a losing team either as a player or as a coach. Toledo enjoyed a standout playing career. He starred for San Francisco State in 1966 and 1967, quarterbacking the Gators to first place in the

Far Western Conference as a senior. He received runner-up honors the previous year. San Francisco State posted a combined mark of 16-5 in Toledo's two seasons.

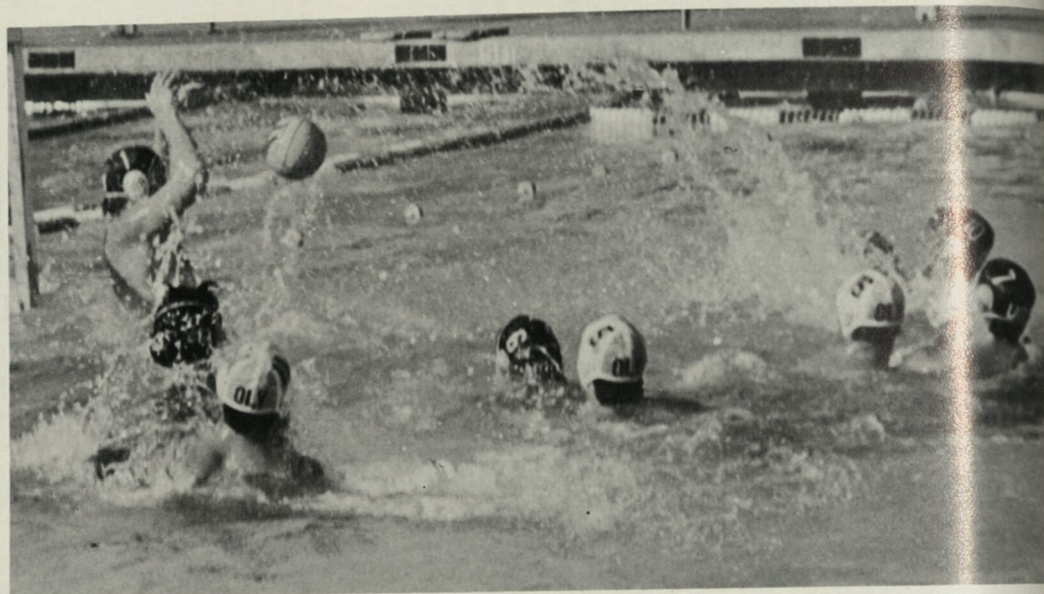
Preceding his acceptance of the job at UOP, Toledo had coached USC's defensive secondary for three years. Next word before his stint at USC he served as head coach at UC Riverside. He compiled a 15-6 record into two years, until UCR dropped football in

1975.

University of the Pacific will honor Toledo's five-year contract. Toledo remarked about the impending future, "I'm going to take my time and not rush into anything."

PCAA championships. The Tigers finished the season ranked seventh in the nation.

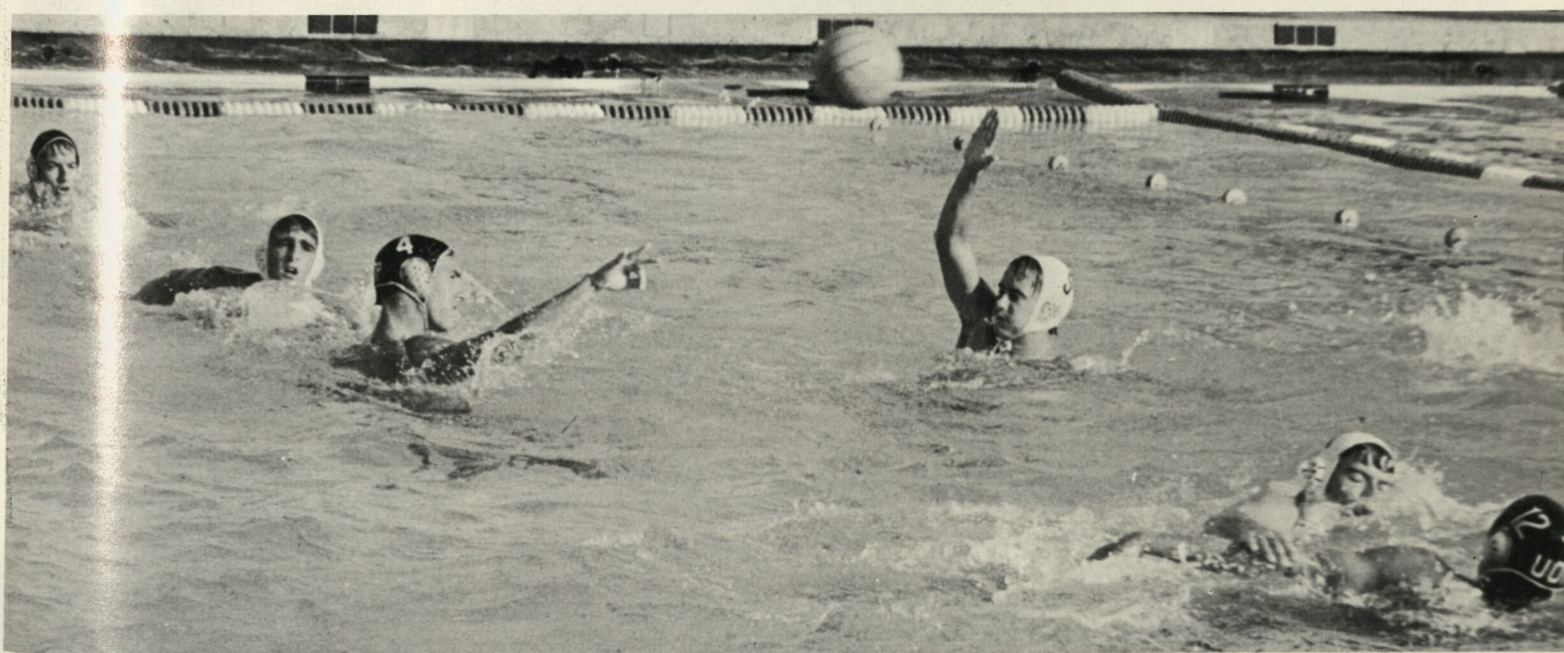
Throughout the season, UOP showed spurts of strength, tying PAC-10 power UC Berkeley for first place at the UOP Invitational and overwhelming

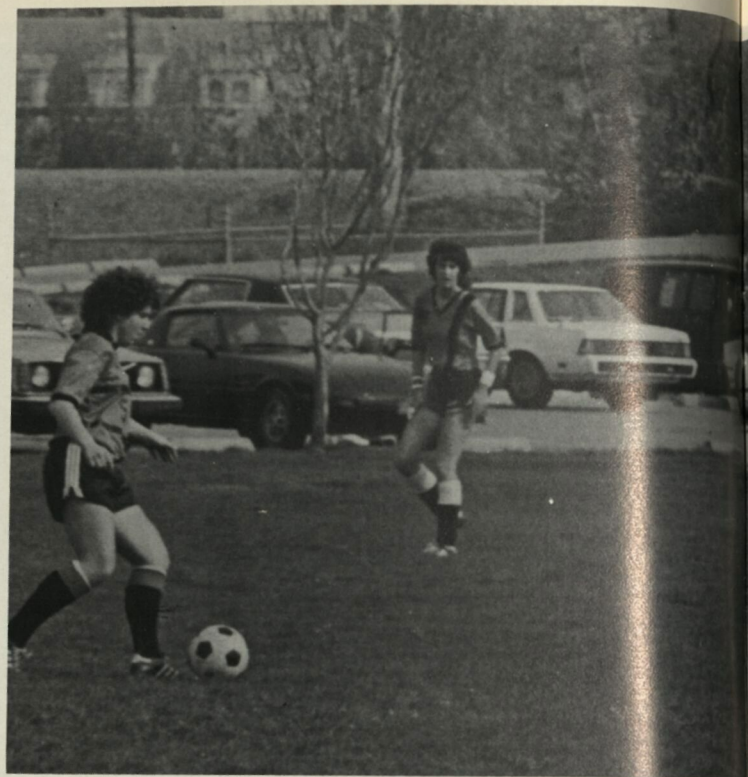

Field Hockey

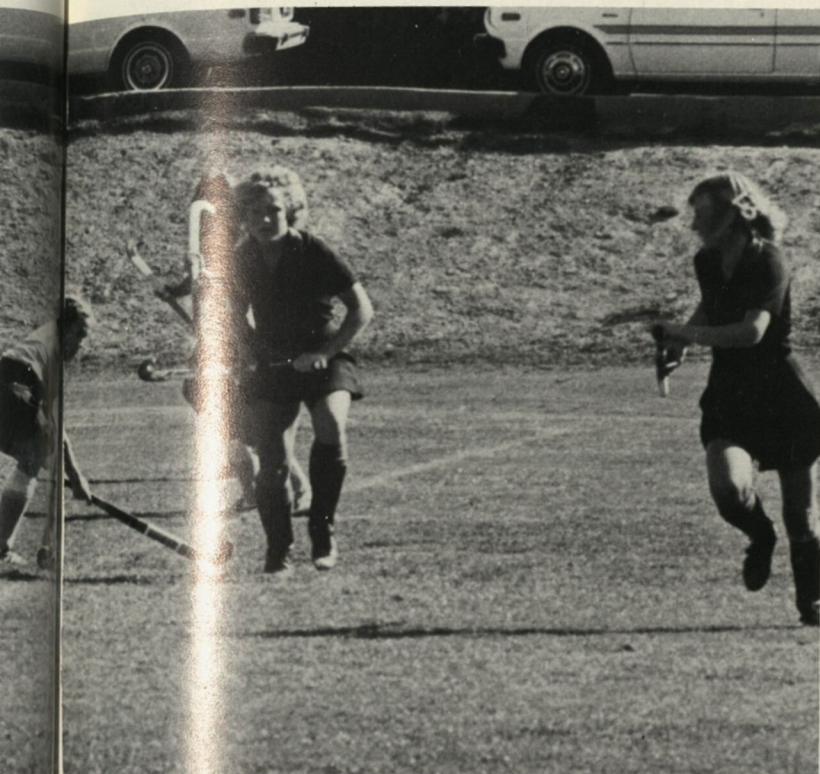

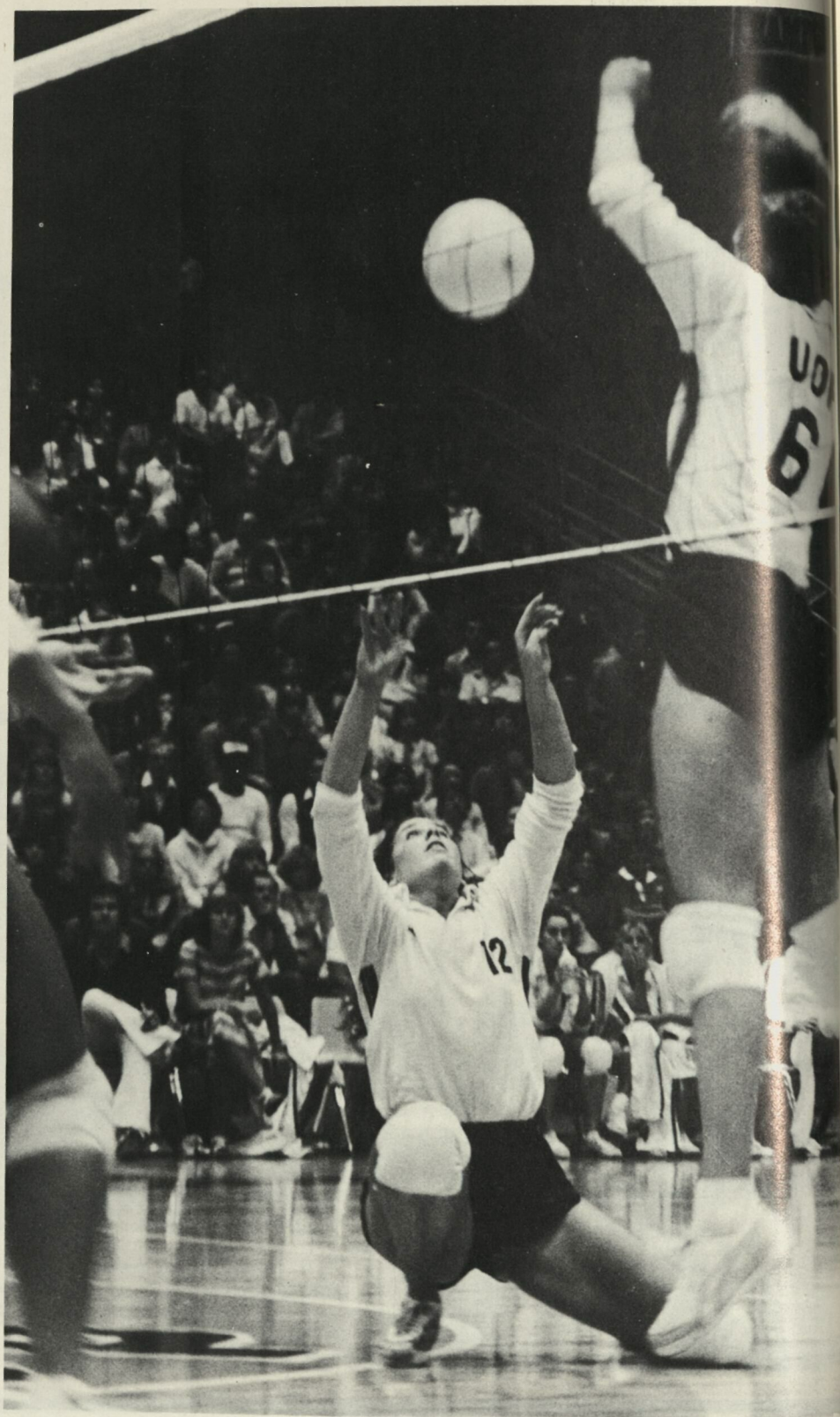
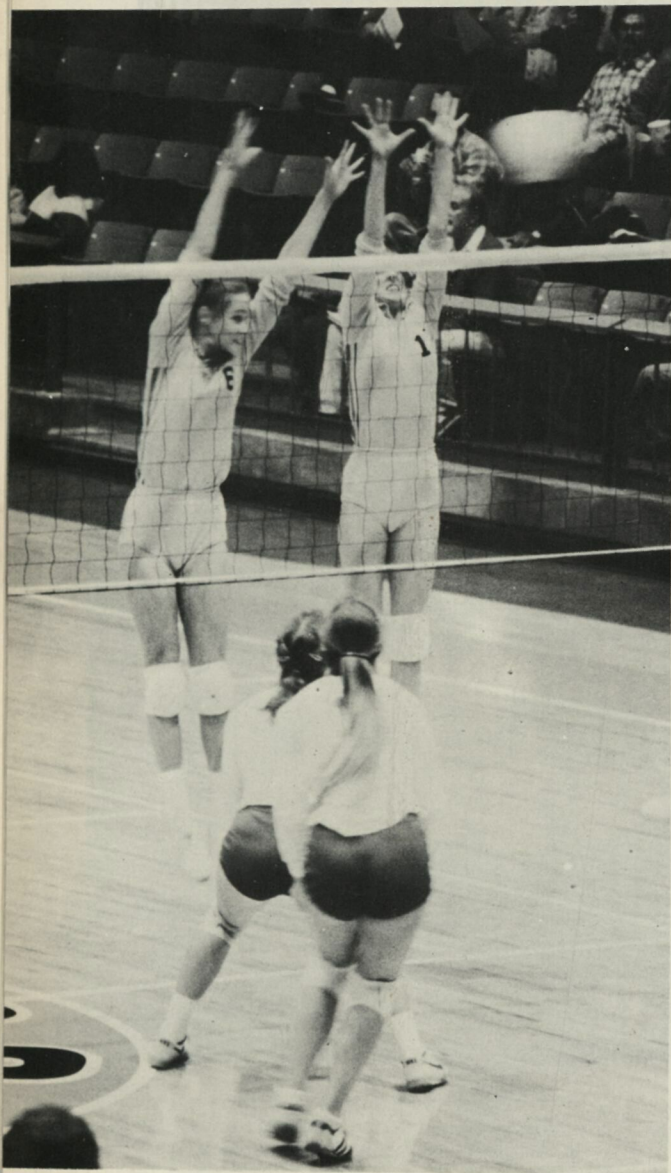
Two of the Tigers were among the elite in the top national ranks; Luci Lagrimas and Laryl Belles were chosen for this special honor. Luci Lagrimas

Volleyball

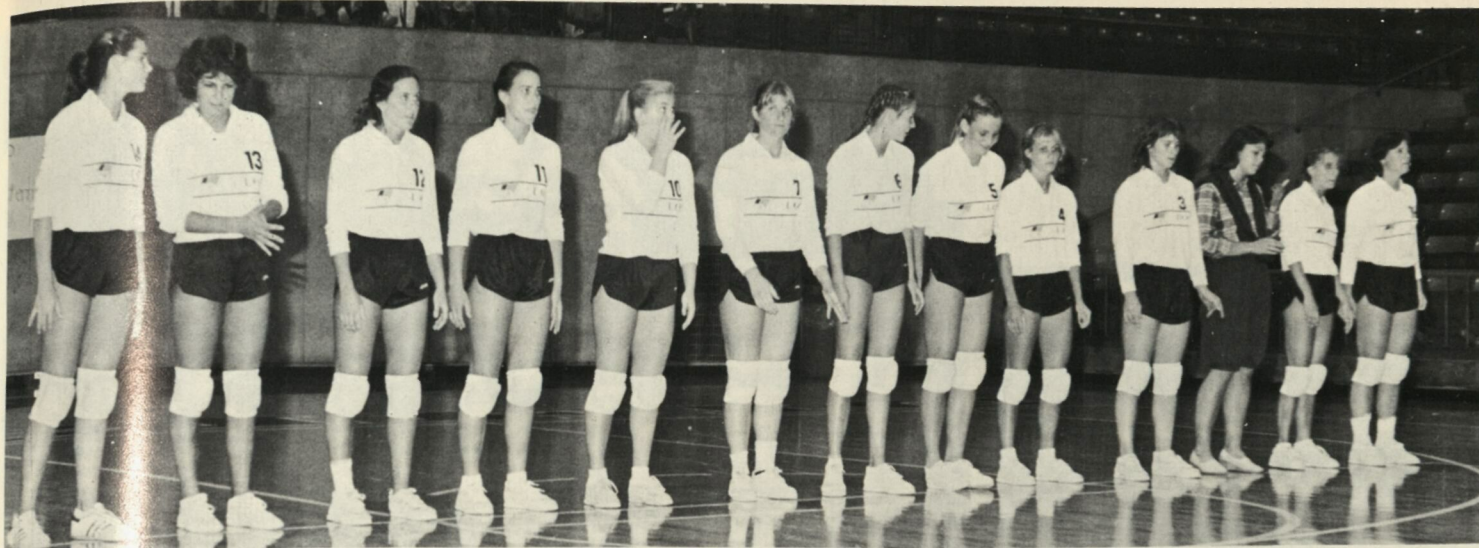

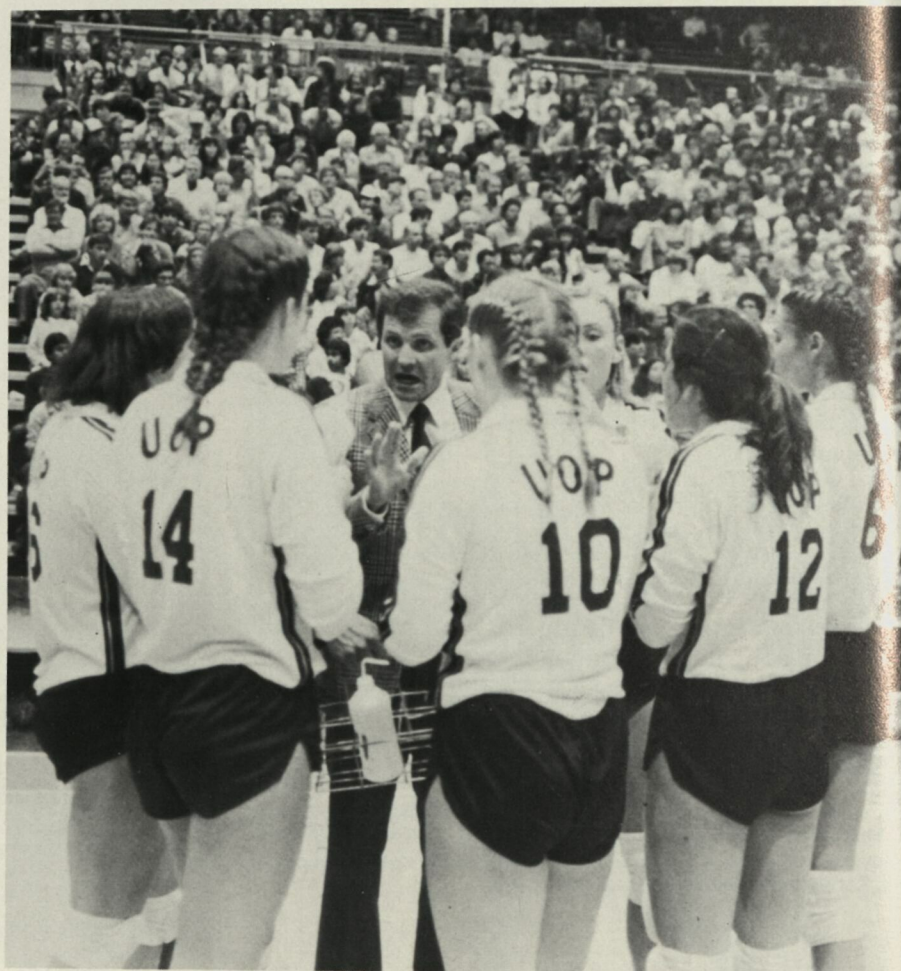
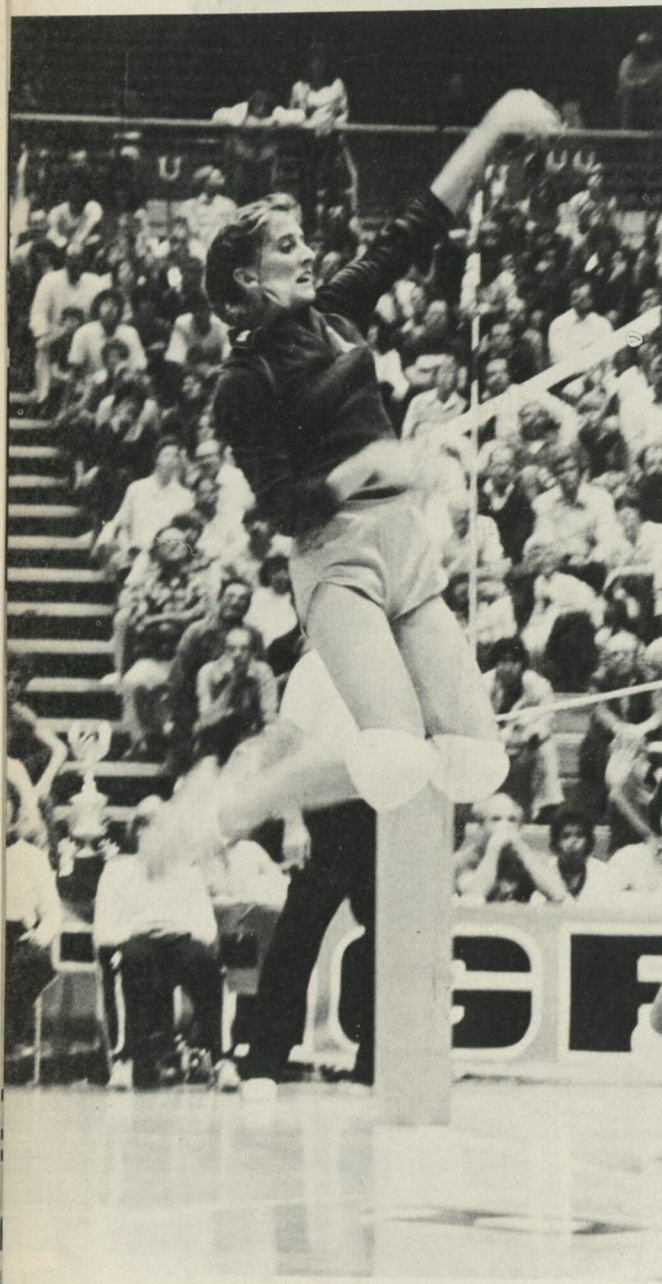

Although the team consisted of five

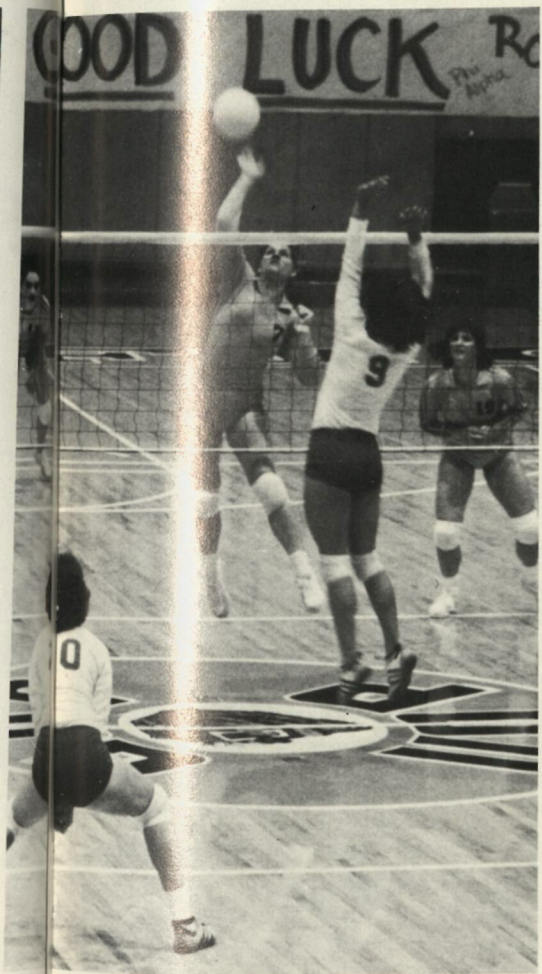
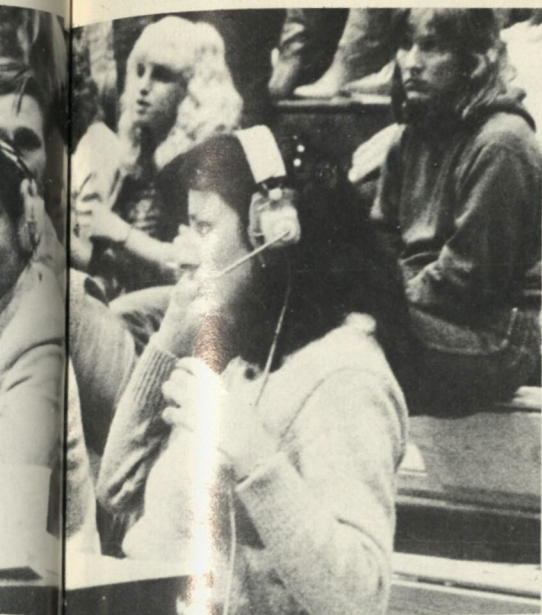

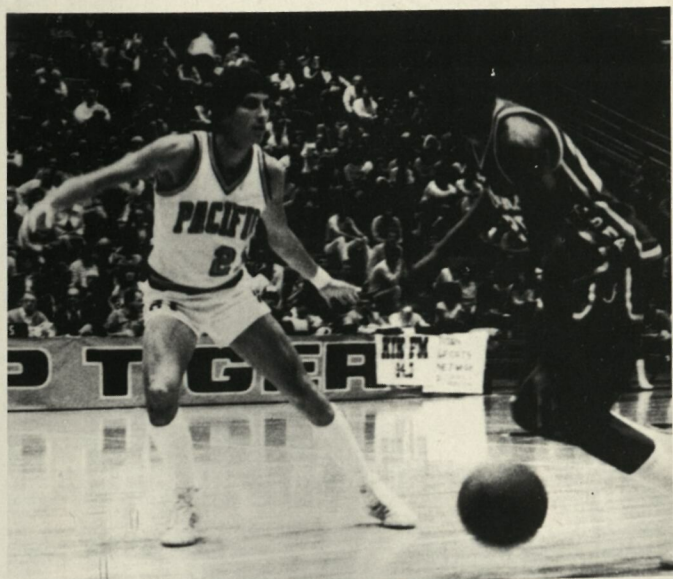
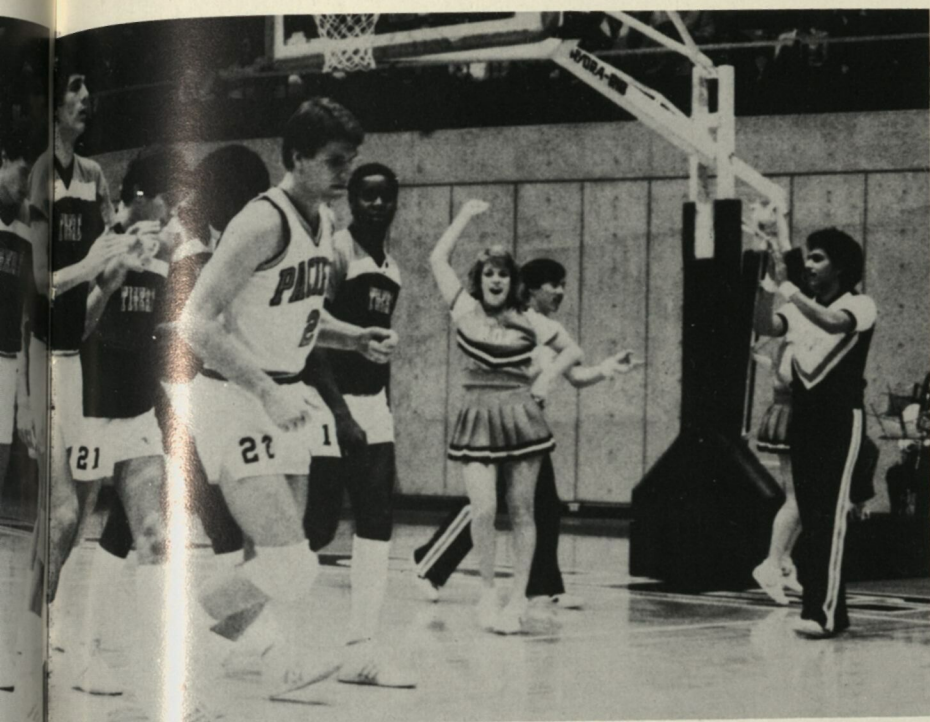


17-game conference road losing streak with a 72-70 overtime victory over UC Santa Barbara. Enthusiasm and determination were evident when Pacific's

leads the nation in defense with a 59.2 average.

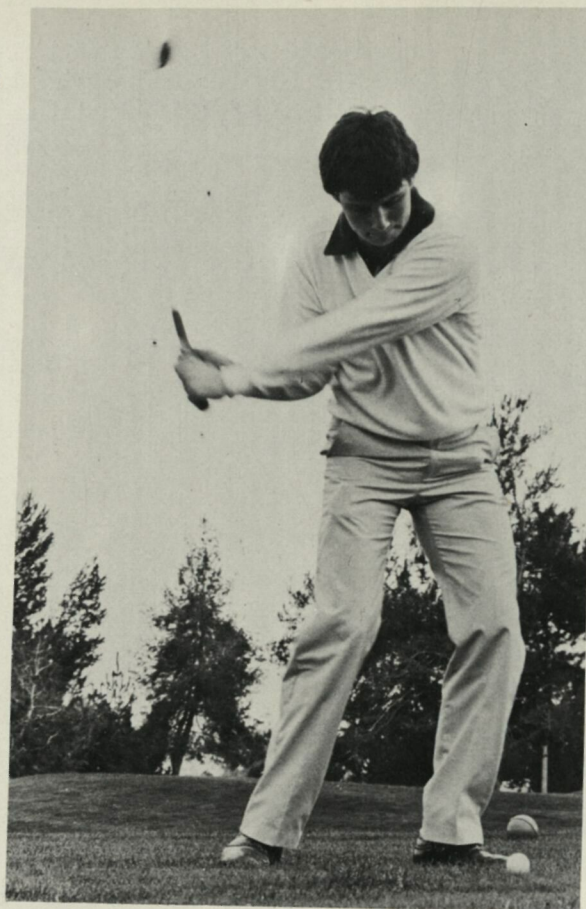
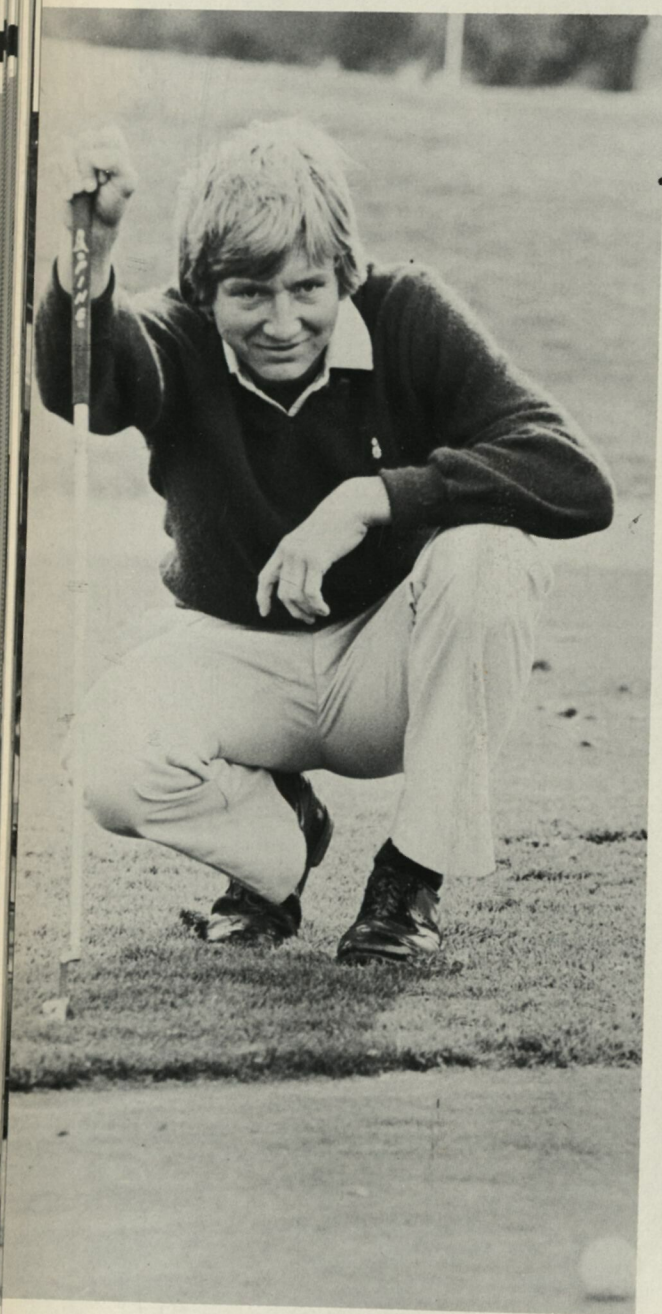

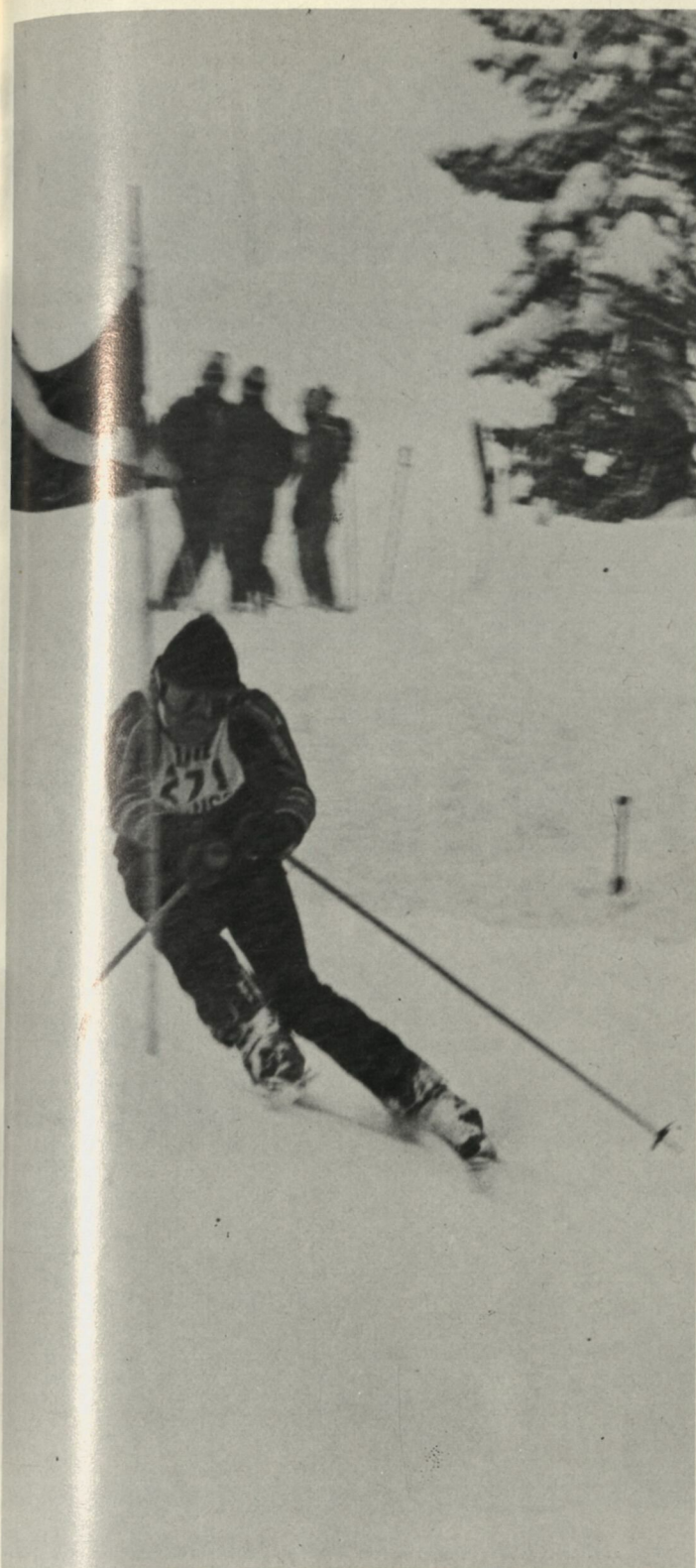
The Tigers boasted a talented squad

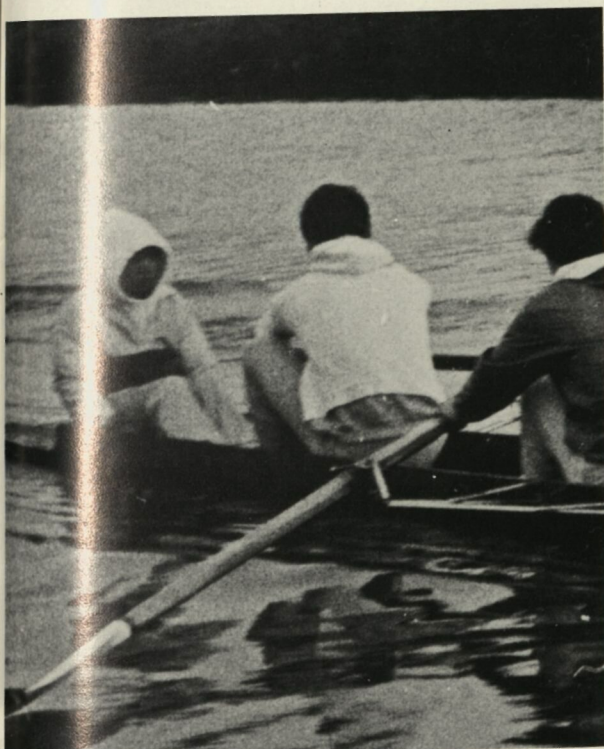

Few people realize that at 5:30 in the morning, while they are sound sleep, the UOP Crew Team is out on the California Delta, training to be the best they can be.

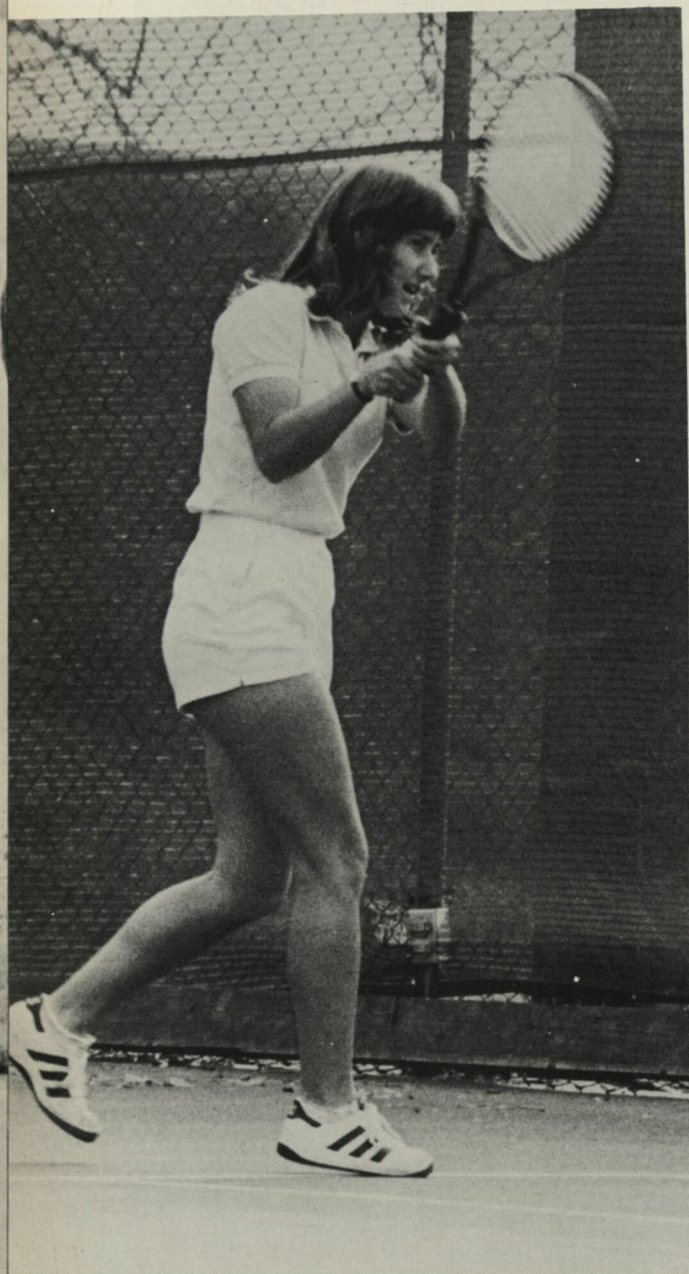
For the first time, Pacific is participating and competing at the col-

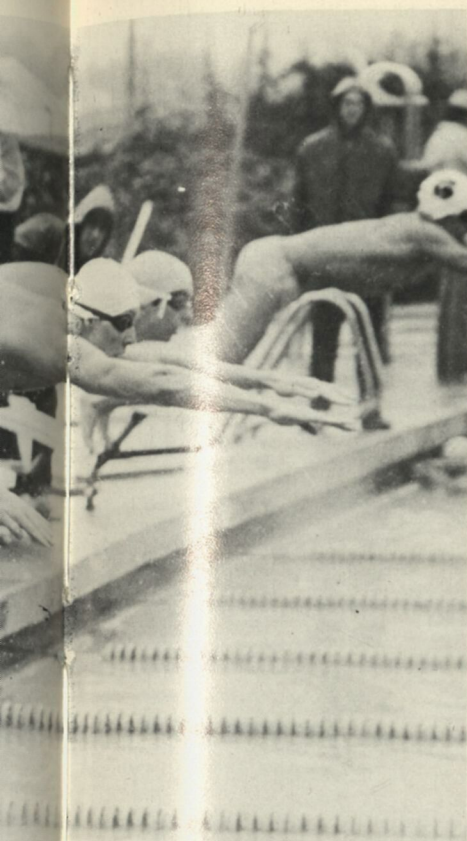


The 1983 UOP Swim Team had a very successful season and many outstanding efforts despite the unsatisfactory pool conditions at UOP

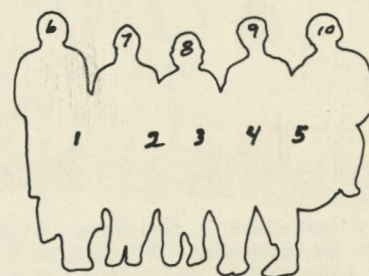
Recognize Stand Outs

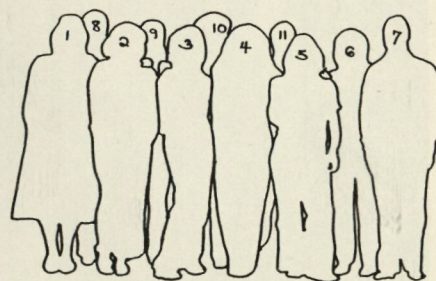
Provide Services

They have sponsored such activities for their schools as Homecoming floats, parties, dinners, trips, lectures and movies, all to serve the needs and interests of the individual student.

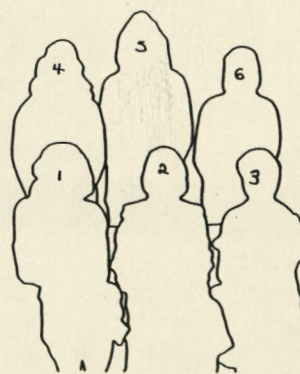

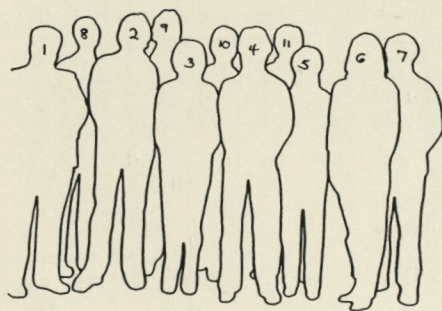
Offer Experiences

Board of Regents



The Board of Regents is the supreme governing body and legal entity of the University of the Pacific. Originally called the Board of Trustees, it has served as the policy-making body of Pacific since the conception of the University.

The Board is a self-perpetuating body consisting of 35 Regents appointed for six-year staggered terms of office. The Regents all have in common a sincere interest in the University today, as well as the future growth and development of Pacific. Additionally, most Regents are actively involved and hold influential positions in their own communities.

The Board of Regents acts on recommendations given to them by the President, who represents the Board in carrying out all University policies. It is the responsibility of the Board to formulate and institute University policies, ranging from academics to finances. The Board also, with the consent of the administration, appoints the President.

The Regents hold quarterly meetings at which major issues facing the University are discussed, and an annual retreat to familiarize new members with the procedures of the Board and to discuss the future.



President

Stanley E. McCaffery resumed his position as President of the University of the Pacific this past year after one year of world-wide travels while serving as President of Rotary International. During his year abroad, McCaffery carried with him a theme of "World Understanding and Peace Through Rotary" to the 70 countries he visited.

Back in the position of President, McCaffery this past year represented the Board of Regents in carrying out institutional policies. Although he delegated responsibility to the various cabinet members, executive officers and administrative officials, he was ultimately responsible to the Board for the complete institutional program.

During the eleven years in which McCaffery has served as President, he has seen many changes occur in the trends of society, and has also witnessed the adaptation of the University to these changes. According to McCaffery, the position of President had also had to redefine itself to better respond to the transformations constantly occurring at the University.

McCaffery cited one of the major changes as being the establishment of a Presidential cabinet to work closely with the President in the making of administrative decisions and policy matters for the University. This cabinet consisted of the four vice presidents; Academic Vice President Clifford Hand, Vice President of Student Life Judy Chambers, Vice President Executive Assistant Cliff Dochterman and Financial Vice President Robert Winterburg.

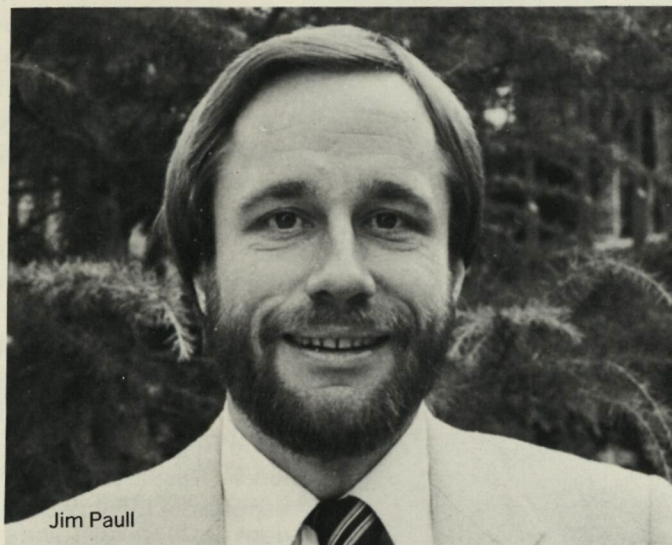
The second major alteration President McCaffery saw in the changing role of the Presidency was the "development of a closer relationship among faculty, students, administration, and alumni in the governance and policymaking of the University."

Looking to the future, President McCaffery sees, "A further growth and expansion at Pacific accompanied by the continuation of high standards of academic excellence."

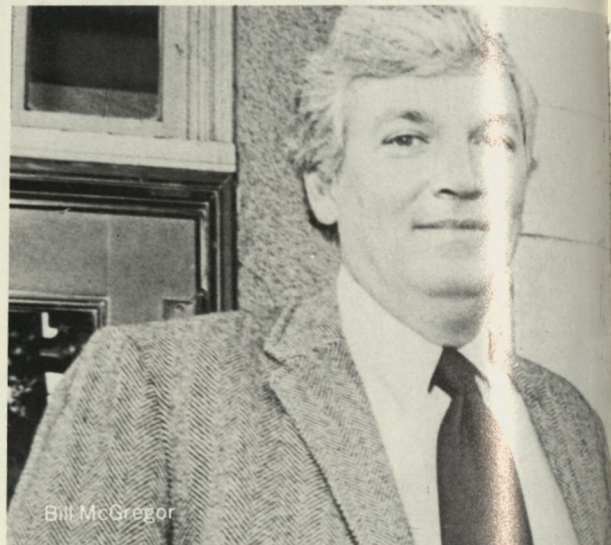

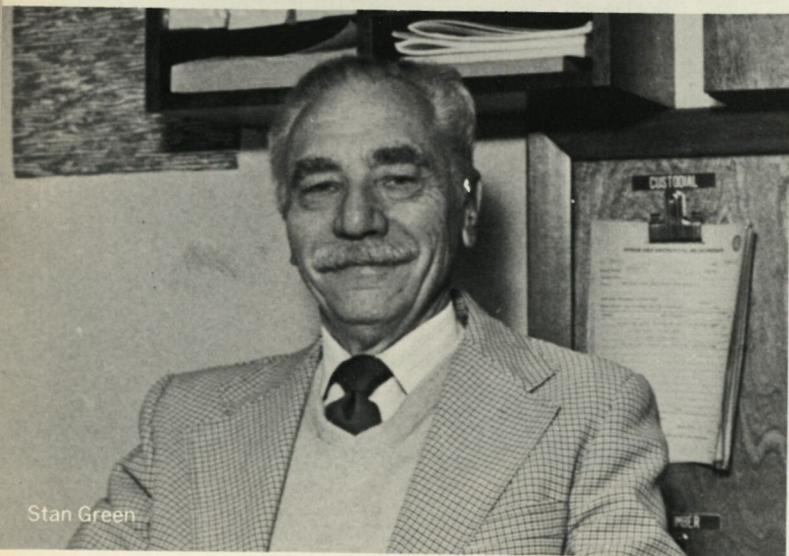

Kay Davis last year served as Associate Dean of Students and Director of Special Student Services. Her duties entailed chairing the Academic Regulations Committee, advising the honor societies and Panhellenic, conducting Parents' Orientation and overseeing the University's social calendar.

Director of Auxillary Services, Paul Fairbrook, was in charge of housing, the bookstore and food services last year.

Housing Director Stan Green handled residence assignments, maintenance of buildings and future need of residence communities.

As Director of Residential Life, Jess Marks supervised the resident assistant and directorship programs of the living communities.

Bill McGregor, Director of the Career Planning and Placement Center, helped prepre students for entering the job market after graduation.

As Director of the University Center, Jim Paull was responsible for formation and implementation of Center activities.

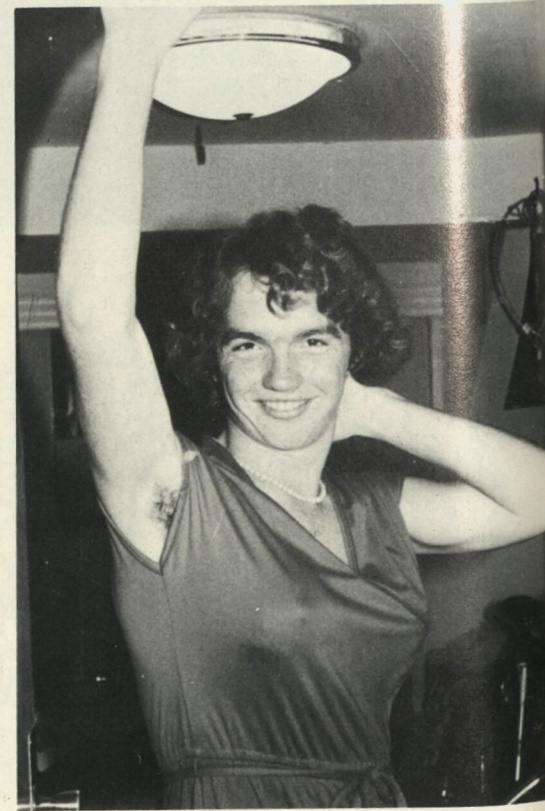
South / West residence hall is composed largely of upper-classmen who prefer its quiet and relaxed atmosphere as well as its congenial spirit.

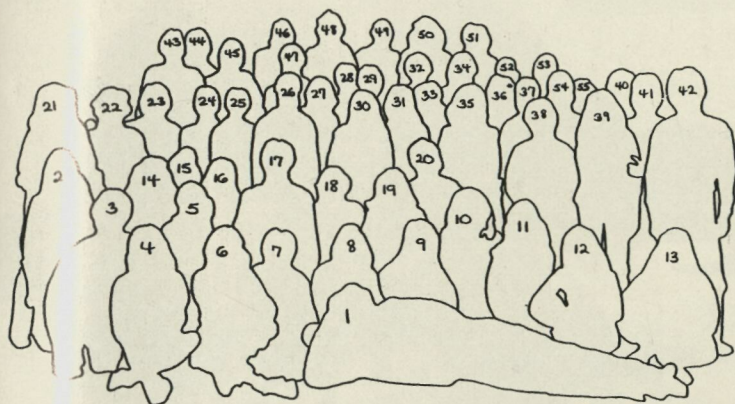
With representatives of many cultures, religions, and ethnic backgrounds, living in John Ballantyne last year was an experience in diversity.

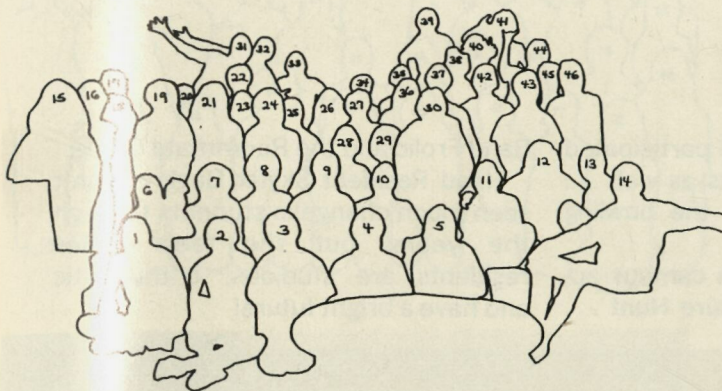
Price House

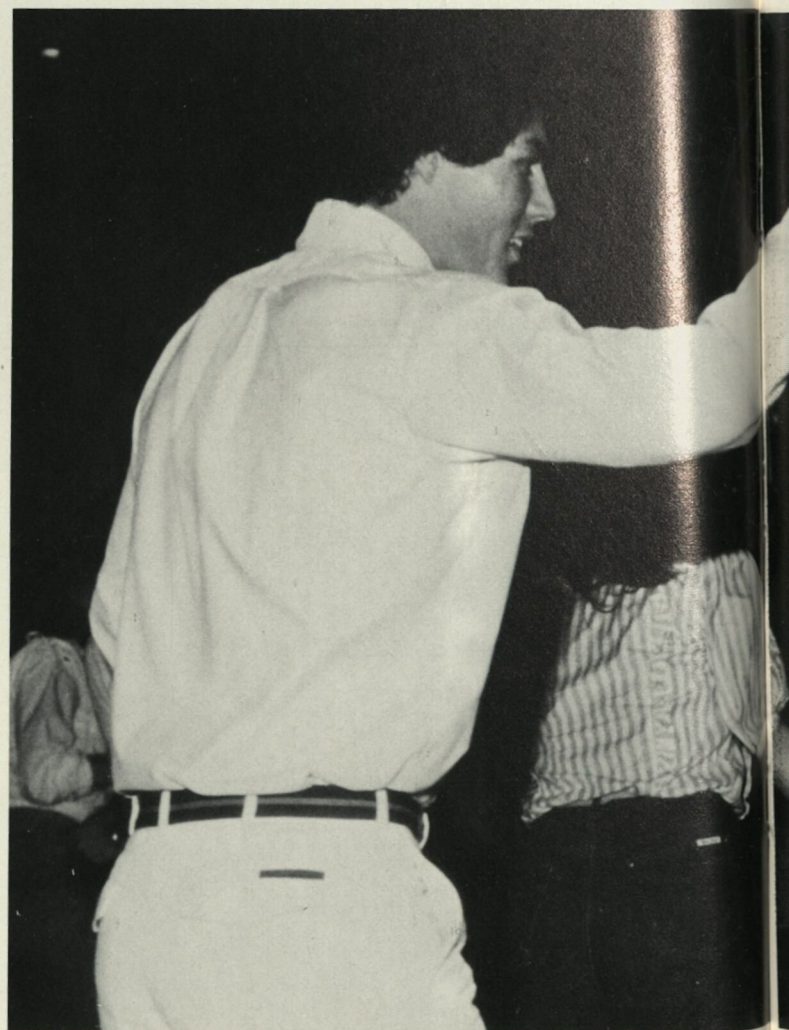
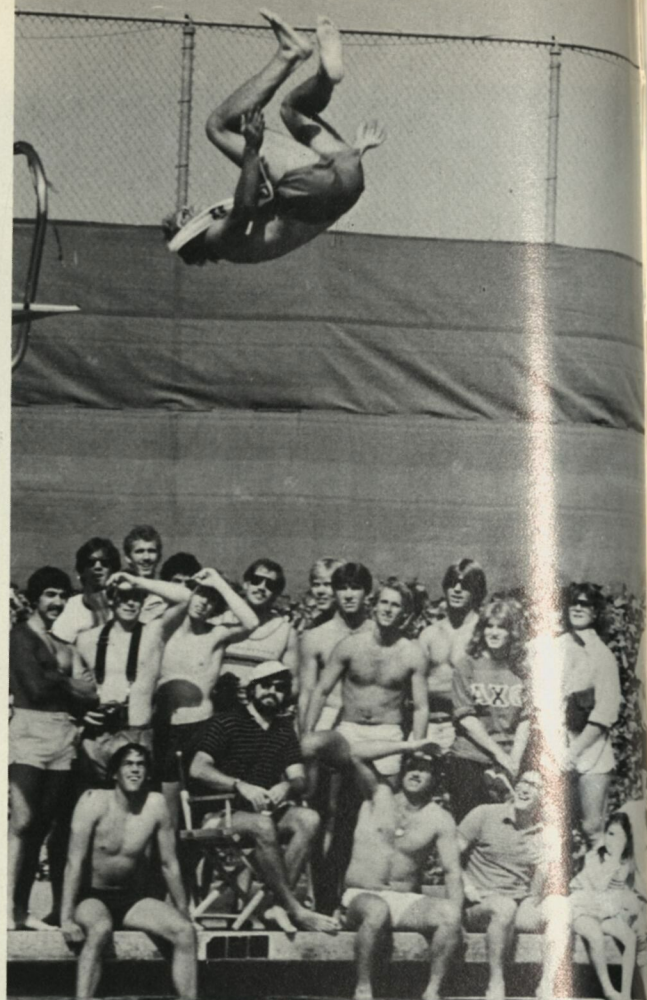
Greek Week

Anchor Splash had many winners, but one that especially stands out is "Mr. Anchor Splash" himself, Archania's Dan Charleton.

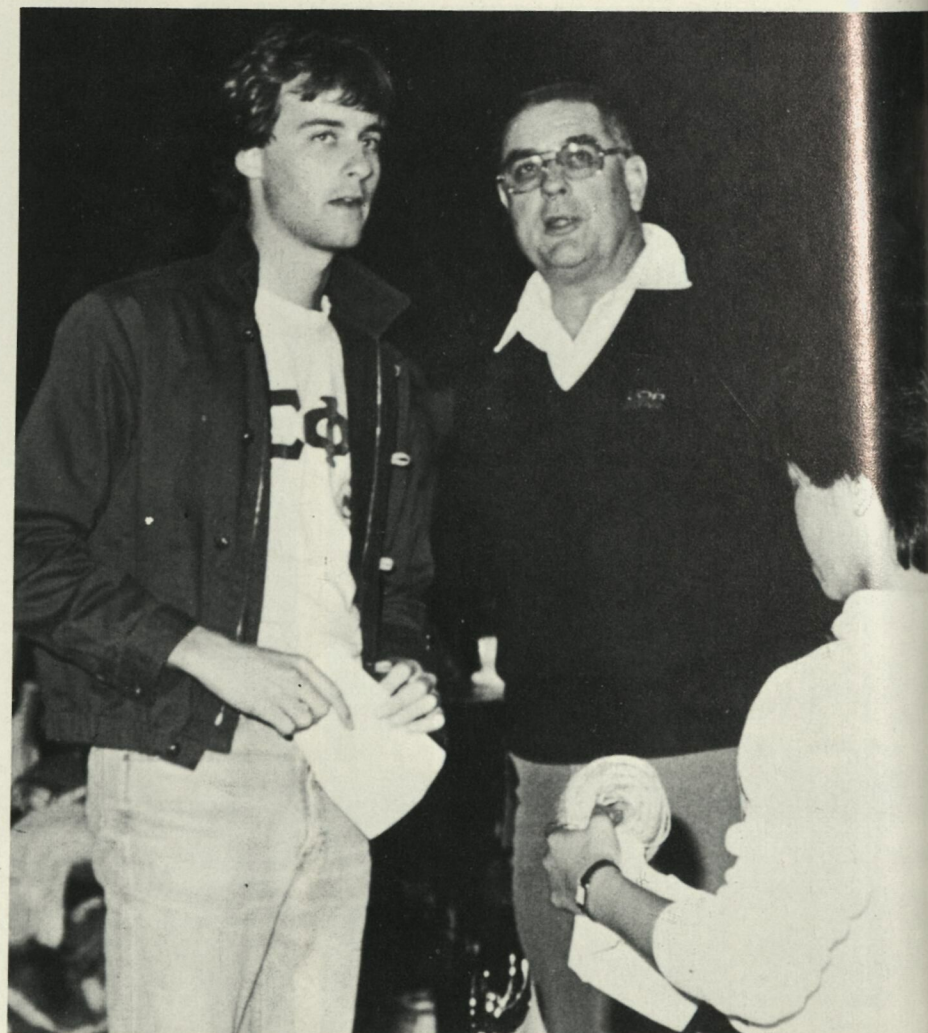


Interfraternity Council

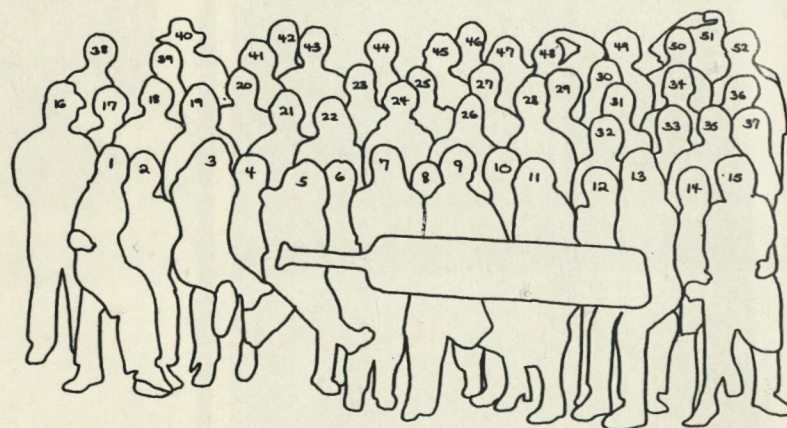
IFC also co-sponsored UOP's annual Greek Week, including new activities that made it better than ever. IFC also helped the fraternities in the delivery of the New Student Directory.

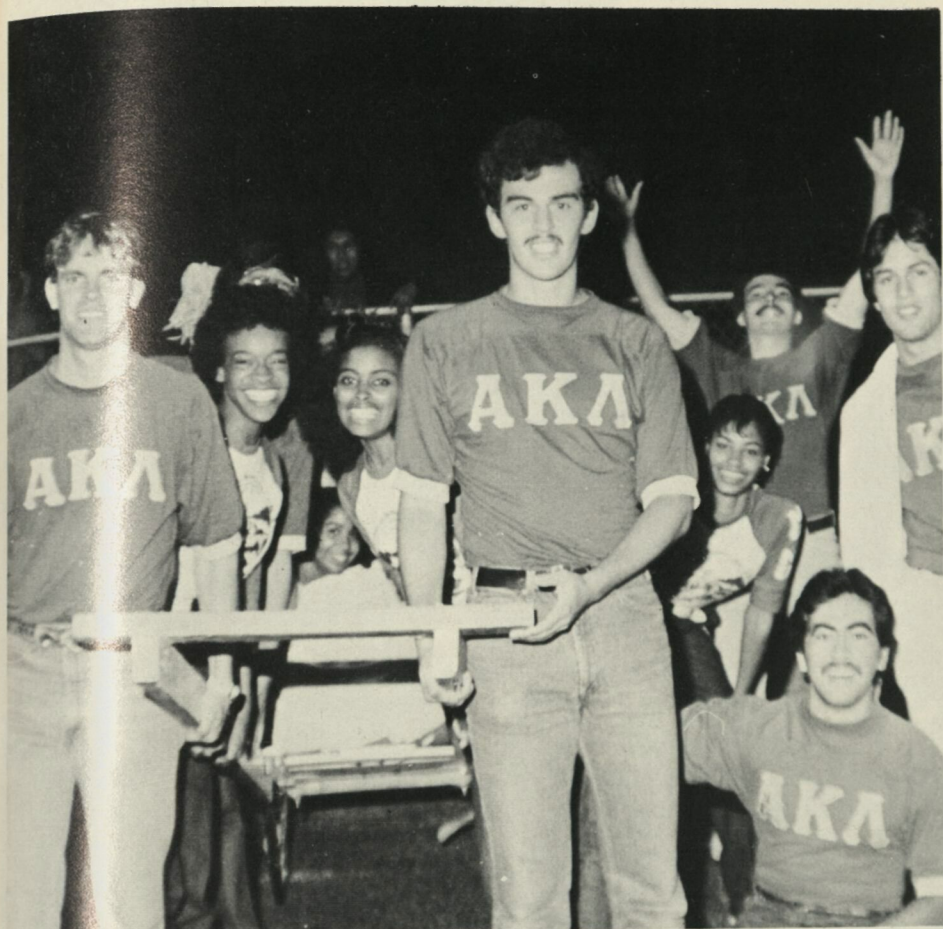

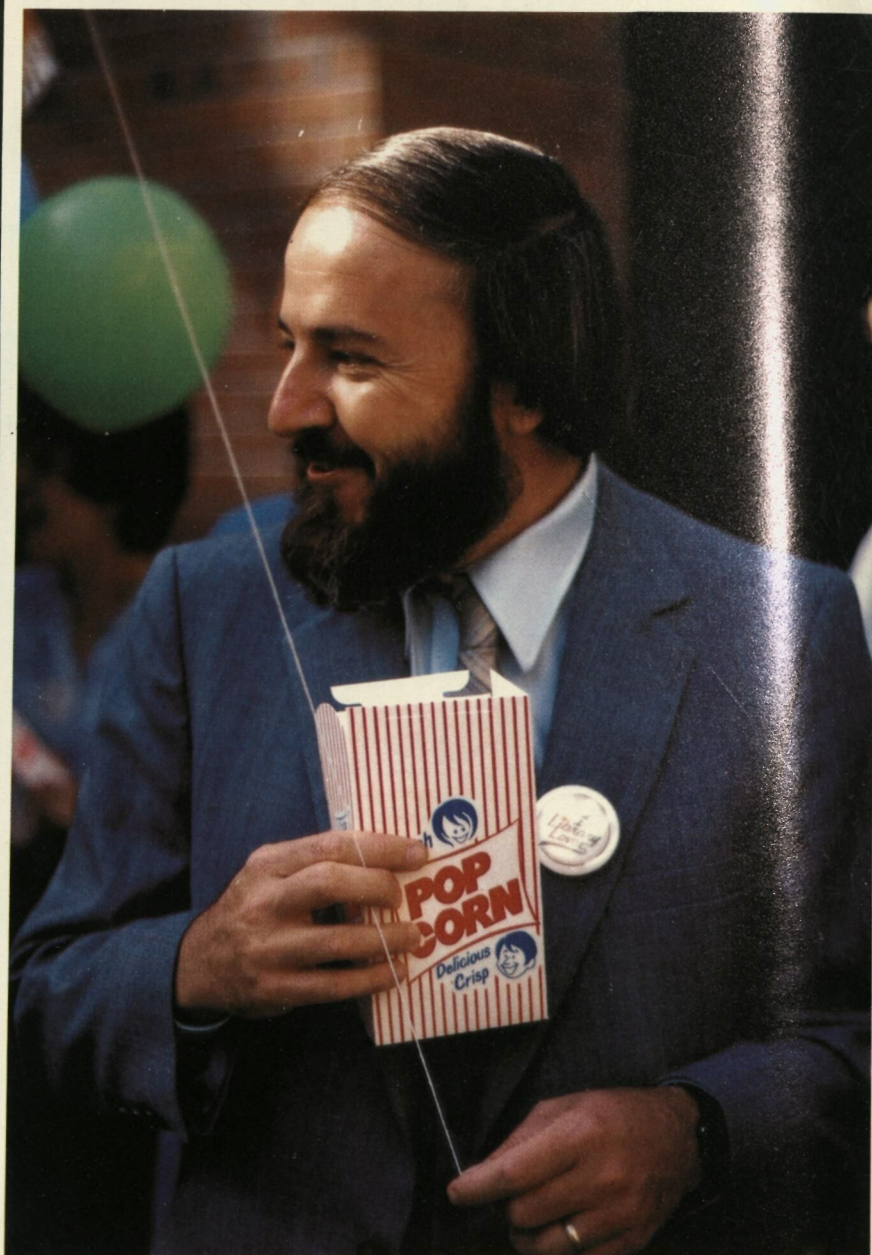


Closing

The academic year of 1982-1983 has brought with it many changes. One of the major changes cited by current UOP President Stanley E. McCaffery has been, "the drop in enrollment and consequential financial difficulties which have resulted. He continued to say, "This situation today prevails at not only UOP, but at almost every college and university in the country whether public or private."

Enrollment to Pacific dropped by an unexpected 170 students this year, putting the University at a \$1.25 million deficit caused by a reduction of 5% in attendance.

This year also marked the closing of the last of the "cluster colleges." President McCaffery said, "Sadly, in many ways, student interest in the 'cluster colleges' has declined." McCaffery maintained, "The University did its best to support these schools and encourage prospective students to consider entering them. However students have become more career-oriented and now want a more structured academic program than the 'cluster colleges' could provide." This is a societal trend we see occurring throughout the United States today as students are increasingly interested in an education to provide them with a career rather than a liberal academic program.

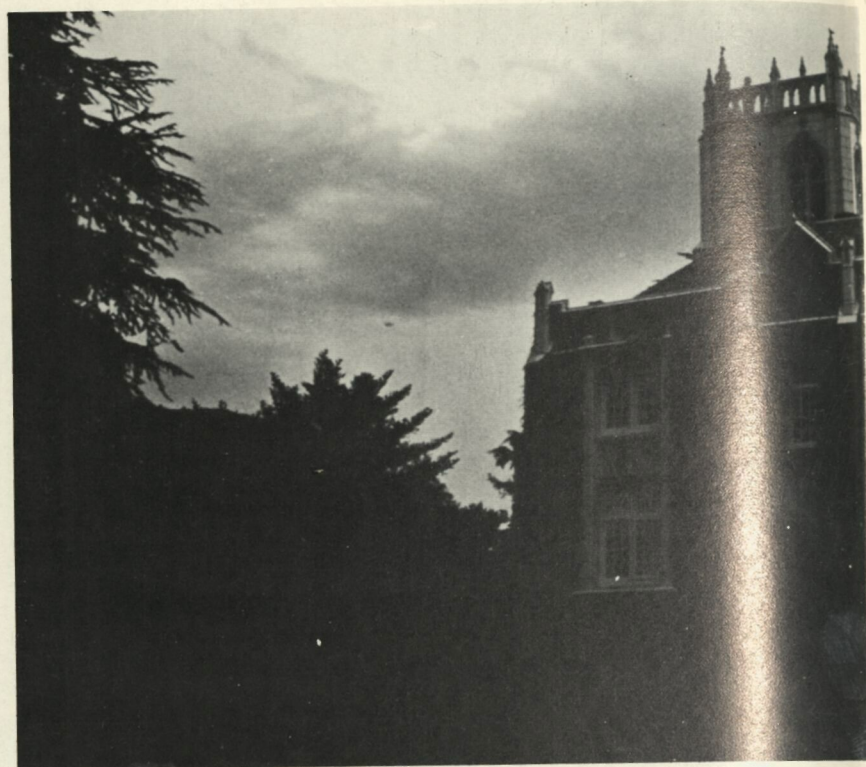




Several years ago, as the University anticipated a decline in student enrollment and interest in the "cluster colleges," Raymond and Callison Colleges were merged into two programs under the College of the Pacific; the Center for Integrated Studies and the Center for International Programs.

"Elbert Covell is now being phased out to be integrated into other College of the Pacific programs," commented McCaffery.

The UOP schools which have shown unequalled growth in recent years are the School of Engineering and the School of Business and Public Administration. President McCaffery commented, "The School of Engineering grew from 50 students in 1971 when I came here, at a time when many engineering schools across the country were closing their doors due to the failing economy and overabundance of engineers in the job market, to the 500 students it had in 1982." He sees potential for the School of Engineering to grow to 750-1,000 students. He however stressed that enrollment will be maintained on a small and selective basis in the future.









The School of Business and Public Administration, created due to increasing interest within the College of the Pacific business departments, currently has 575 students and is expected to continue to grow with the interest of the students. McCaffery said "We expect the establishment of a Master's Degree of Business Administration program to be an added strength for the school in the future."

McCaffery feels that another development soon to take place at Pacific is the strengthening and growth of the School of Education due to the changing job market.

Also being considered is a School of Performing Arts, which would combine the current Conservatory of Music, Drama and Dance Departments. The administration hopes this would coordinate and strengthen the three separate programs.

After a belt-tightening period of perhaps several years, the University will continue to have a program of excellence and quality, placing personal interest in the individual student with an emphasis on teaching and of the students total University experience. Over these next few difficult years we may have to face, Pacific will remain as a prominent and strong institution. As we approach the year 2,000, Pacific will grow even stronger and will be prepared for a new phase in the life of the University.

Colophon

Known as the Naranjado since 1886, the 1983 EPOCH, Vol. 2, is the 71st volume of the University of the Pacific's yearbook. Printed by Taylor Publishing Co. in Dallas, Texas, and represented by Gary Donnell, this book was published with the support of the Associated Students of the University of the Pacific. With a press run of 1275, the book contained 320 pages and was sold for \$22.50.

Produced by a staff of student volunteers, this book operated under a break-even financial budget that received revenues solely from sales and portrait commissions. Layout design is by Catherine M. Connolly.

Cover: The cover is 150 points 9x12 collegiate weight binders board. Material is SMB13 sailcloth letterpressed with brown ink #883. Design is from the original 1923 architect's plan of the Conservatory of Music at the University of the Pacific in Stockton, CA.

Binding: The binding in Smyth sewn, rounded and backed, with headbands and footbands.

Endsheets: The endsheet is 65 Hammerhill offset tan #012 with black #001 ink. The design is the proposed 1922 architect's plan of the University.

Division pages: Division pages are reproductions of the original architect's elevations of various campus buildings dating from 1923, 1962 and 1972.

Paperstock: Paperstock is 80 pound Tahoe Gloss Enamel, except for pages 1-36 and 305-320, which are 100 pound Tahoe Gloss Enamel.

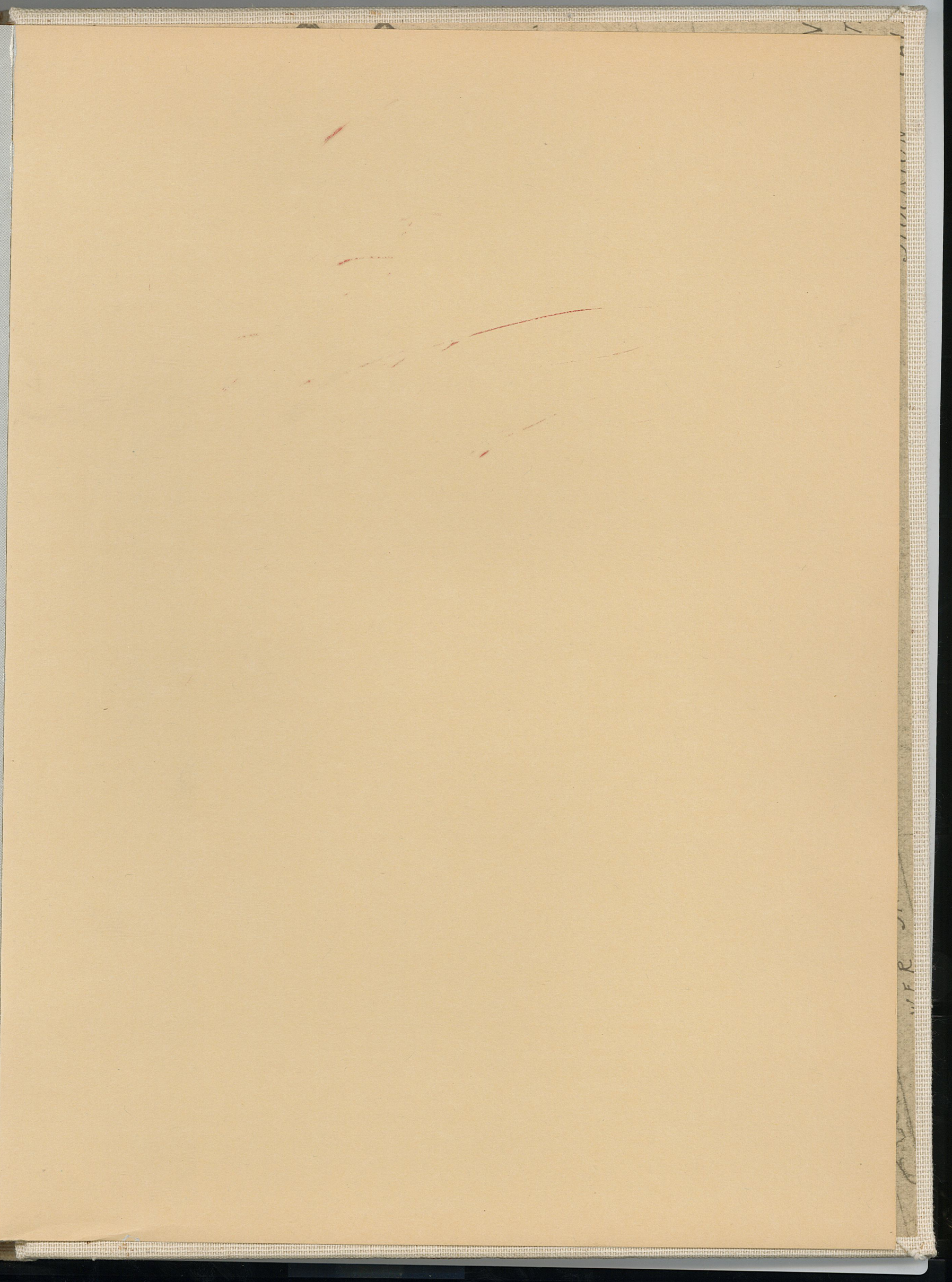
Second color: Russett Brown #44 is used on pages 4-29. Silver #RLS21370 appears on pages 18-19 and 22-23.

Photography: Black and white photographs were reproduced by a 133-line elliptical dot screen and printed by Miller Perfector Presses. All four-color was separated by a Hell Laser Scanner at the Dallas Plant and printed by Miller Four-Color Presses. Over 700 frames of Kodacolor 100 and 4000 frames of Tri-X film were exposed by student photographers. Senior portraits and the majority of residence hall and Greek groups were taken by the Picture People, Inc.

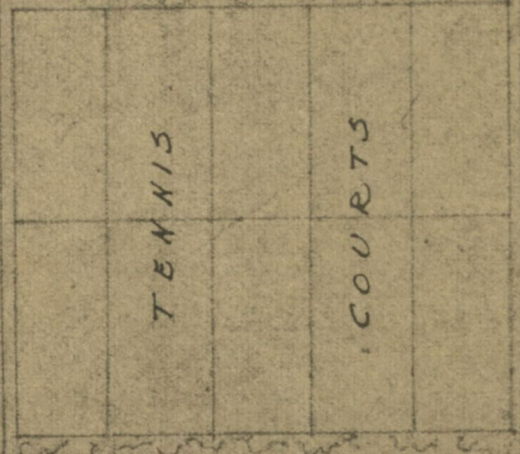
Typography: All typography was set with the Cyber-comp Typography Program. News gothic 23(ng) was used in 6, 8, 10 and 12 point throughout the book.
