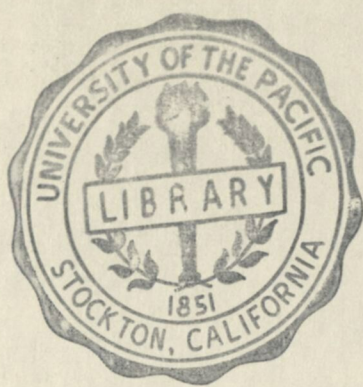



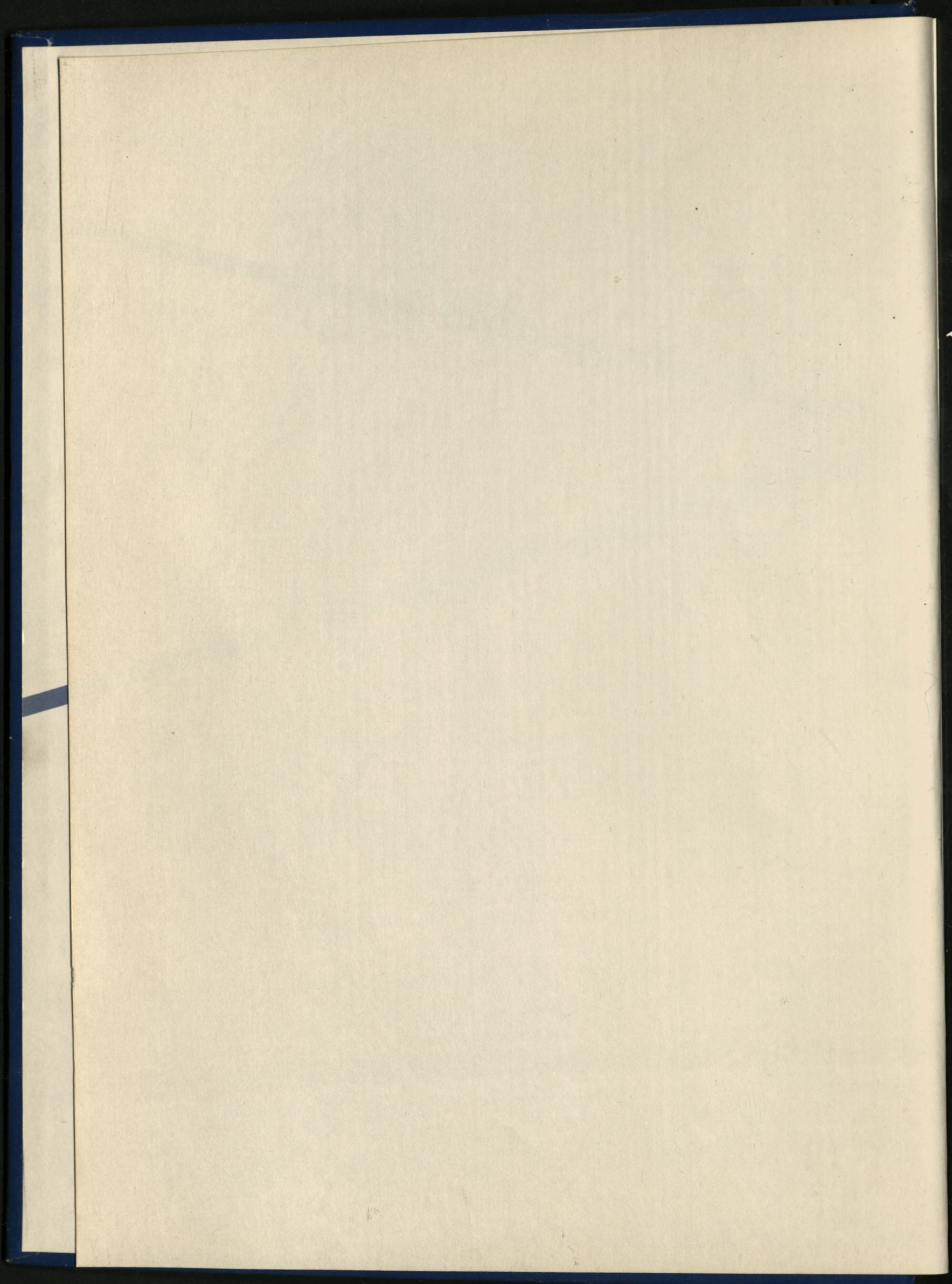

Hard times and difficult changes that have occurred in society over these past three years since the publication of the 1982 EPOCH have been reflected at our University. As a society we have seen international

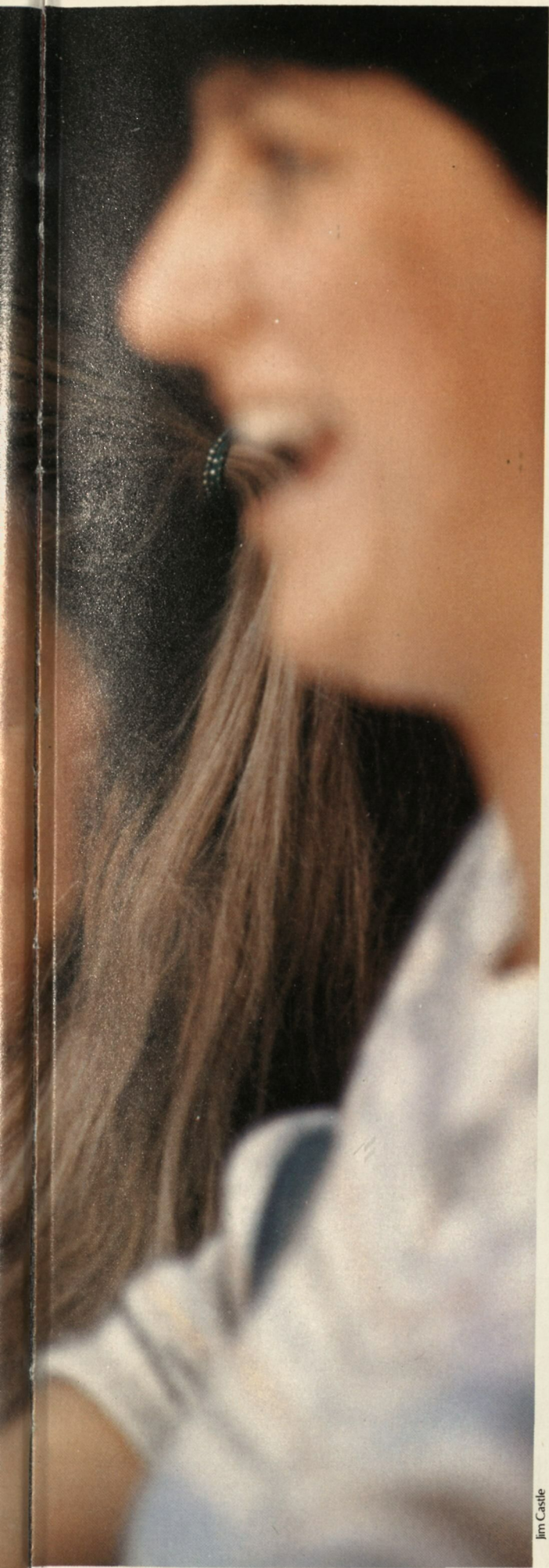
crisis, and national economic despair. On the University level, these societal changes have been represented in dangerously low enrollment and across the board budget cuts.

Realizing the Prophecy

The magnanimous novel *1984*, written by George Orwell, has been described as a hallmark of the year, a haunting vision of the future and a chilling prophecy of the future of mankind.

This legendary novel, written by Orwell in 1949, has profoundly affected our current society. It has introduced words such as "big brother" to refer to a usurpation of authority, "newspeak" to depict technical and computerized jargon and "doublethink" to represent a paradox. The host of powerful symbols invested in the novel have transformed the lives of all who have read it, and even those that have not. The world he painted in 1949 was a fantasy, yet its characters were real.

George Orwell was the pen name of English socialist Eric Blair. As a political writer and literary critic, he left behind the conviction that man was incapable of coping with the demands of his own history. The chilling symbols and concepts he presented in his novel *1984* were as familiar and relevant in society at the time the book was written as they are to us today.

Over the years, society has seen examples of his terms and symbols in many forms. We associate "big brother" with Stalin and Hitler, and Communistic ideals. The unintelligible babble of computers and politicians has been exemplified in the Orwellian term "newspeak." *1984* named things we knew of, but were too scared to identify.

1984 does not merely prophesize on the future; it reflects on the present and all that implies. It is not as much a prophecy as it is a warning, a warning that held as strong in 1949 when the book was published as it does today.

Some have said that the warning has succeeded; we are not in the society of *1984* that Orwell portrayed. This is true, yet the warning still stands. It is not only a warning against Communistic ideals or the political systems we associate with the term "big brother." It is a warning to all societies and all generations of what the future might hold.

1984 is here, but there's always 1985.

Stepping Into Space

What seemed a dream only a decade ago has become a reality. The space shuttle Columbia was fired into motion April 12, 1981. The Shuttle was manned by Commander John Young and pilot Bob Crippen.

Although the Columbia was the first to go into orbit, she has four sister ships. The Challenger, now in orbit, the Discovery and Atlantis, under construction and slated for voyages in 1984 and 1986, respectively.

Columbia's maiden voyage had a great impact on America as well as the world. It came as a reaffirmation of U.S. technological prowess, at a time when many Americans, and much of the world as well, were questioning that capability. Columbia blasted Americans out of their sense of futility and gloom.

The latest voyage of the shuttle Challenger heralded a very important first; Sally Ride became the first

U.S. spacewoman. Also during this flight, the shuttle released a West German scientific satellite. The device was manipulated using the shuttle's loading arm. When maneuvers were completed, the device was loaded back into the cargo bay and returned to earth.

The shuttle is a marvel of computer technology. The aerodynamically unstable shuttles are controlled by five on-board computers. During critical phases of flight, the first hour and a half of ascent and the last 45 minutes of re-entry, four of these identical computers operate in concert, monitoring the same information to provide sufficient support.

The shuttles provide many hopes and aspirations for the future. More than 100 satellites are planned for shuttle deployment over the next seven years by the telecommunications industry. Two have already been deployed, one owned by

Telesat Canada and the other by the government of Indonesia, for a hefty 12 million dollars apiece.

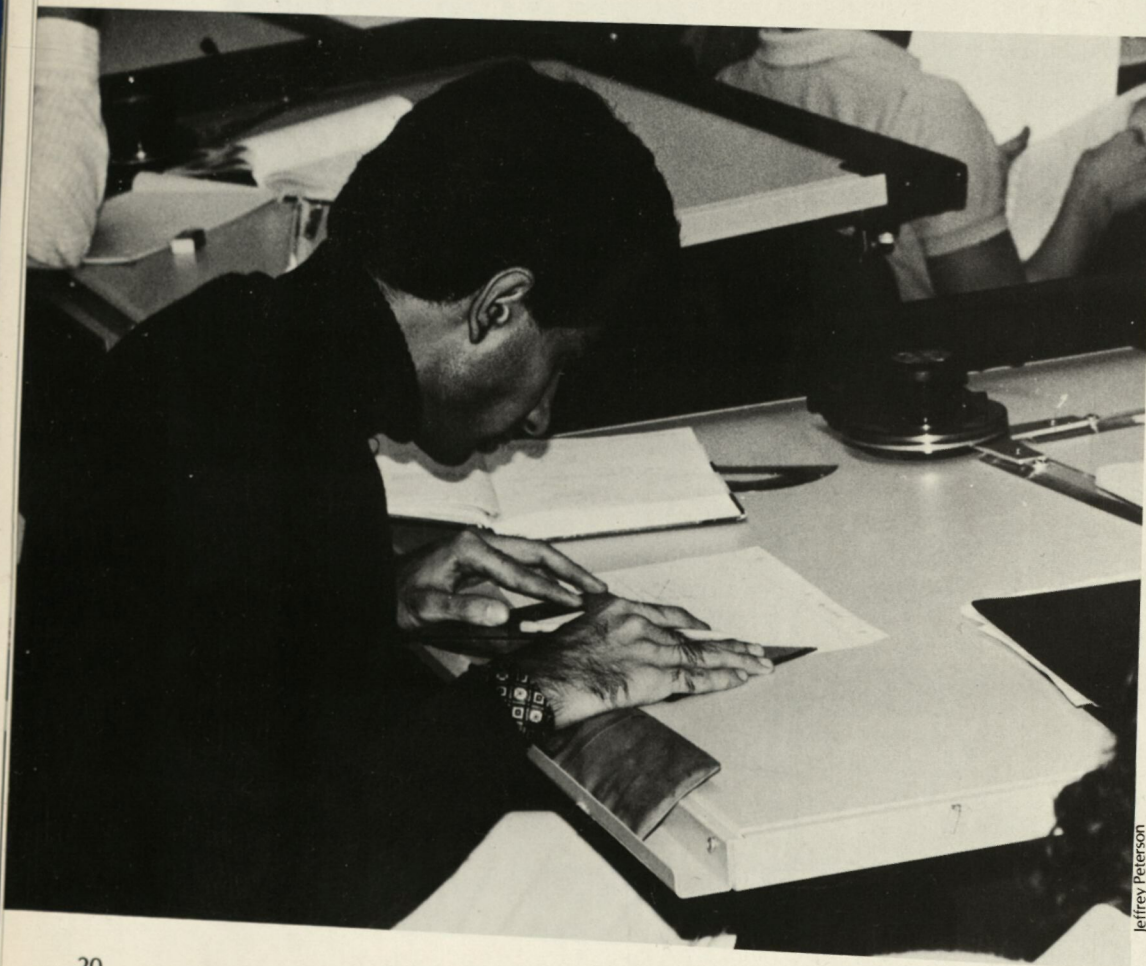
The shuttle offers the clean weightless vacuum of space, making it ideal for scientific experimentation. Scheduled for its ninth mission, the shuttle will place a European-built Spacelab complex in orbit for nine days.

The military has also been watching the shuttle program. It can function as a reliable new lift vehicle that can be employed again and again to put hardware into orbit. Within ten years, the Pentagon will be operating its own fleet of shuttles from a space command center in Colorado Springs, Colorado, and a launch site at Vandenberg Air Force Base in California.

The maiden voyage and subsequent voyages have been subject to delays, but as of yet, there have been no major setbacks. Upon the first re-entry, it was believed that the heat sensitive tiles on the Challenger's underbelly may not survive the 2000-3000 degree re-entry temperatures, yet they came through near perfect. Commander Young's first landing was also to be marvelled at. Young floated 3,000 feet beyond the landing spot, able to use its surprising lift to make a notably smooth touchdown. Simple and flawless, it seemed as if it had been performed countless times before.

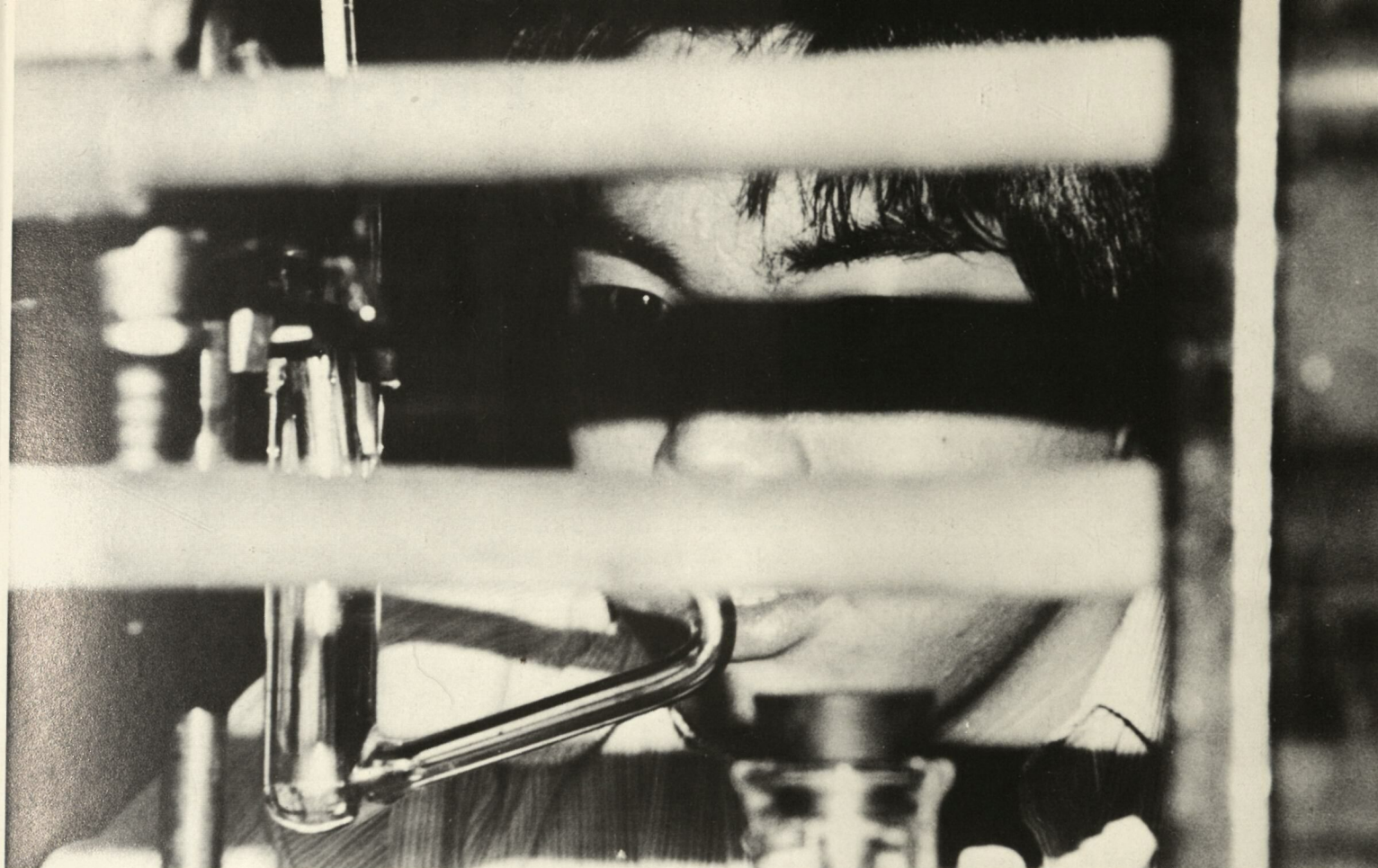
The Shuttle program marks an end to the great parachutes and swinging capsules of earlier space missions, splashing into the sea, never to travel into space again. America has finally come into the proverbial 80's with its space program. The Challenger, Discovery, Columbia and Atlantis have opened the doors of life in space.

Hosting Worldwide Competition



The "Games of Olympia" originated in 776 B.C. with one event, the stadium race. The Greek founders developed these "Olympics" over the centuries to be more than just a sports competition. Rejuvenating the vitality of the involved countries and bringing together competitors and fans on an equal base renews the spirit of camaraderie through the sharing of victories and defeats.

Vasily Kuznetsov, while speaking

about this international brotherhood, said, "If everyone in the world were an athlete we would have a much better chance for peace. We would break records — not each other's heads."

1636 brought a temporary revival of the Olympics that lasted 200 years. In 1896, they appropriately appeared once again in Athens. Every four years we see a modernized version of this second revival. The IOC, International Olympics

Committee, works diligently to ensure regular celebration of the games, to update and perfect the games, and lead potential athletes that are amateurs to the games.

Los Angeles, the site of the 1932 Olympic Games, will be graced once again by the Games in 1984. This summer will bring nineteen tough competitions to LA, including the most popular events of Track and Field, as well as Gymnastics.

Commencing these 1984 Olym-

pics will be the customary torch-lighting ceremony in Greece. The torch will then be flown to New York City, from where it will continue the journey over 12,000 miles, the longest torch relay ever. Final stop will be the Los Angeles Coliseum, the site of the opening ceremonies, on July 28, 1984.

With more than 140 countries participating, Los Angeles will explode with business from the amount of tourists and participants

entering the city. 600,000 visitors will watch the Games and spend their dollars within a sixty-mile radius. An enormous amount of funding is necessary for the city to set up adequate facilities for the Olympics, yet because of the many sponsors — ranging from "official snack food" to "official tennis shoes" of the 1984 Olympics, the taxpayers will not be burdened with the entire expense of this venture.

The spirit of the Olympics can be

felt on many levels, from the President of the U.S. Olympic Committee, William E. Simon, saying, "I think we're going to field the strongest team we've ever fielded," to the campus level, where we find "The Official Dorm of the 1984 Olympics;" a brightened outlook and renewed sense of patriotism has resulted.

Internationalize Pacific

Of growing importance at Pacific is the need for cultural awareness. The influx of foreign students has made necessary many changes in programs and facilities.

Officially opened on March 18, 1983, the Bechtel International Center provides unification of the Offices of International Services and International Programs. The Bechtel Center also provides a lounge, a small seminar room, many work areas, and a library. The comfortable atmosphere of the Center makes it an ideal place for intercultural conversations and interaction.

The main objectives of the Bechtel International Center are to foster intercultural interaction and to further internationalize the campus. To meet these goals, the Bechtel International Center sponsors special unifying programs and events such as the "World on Wednesday" series. This particular program drew standing room only crowds to hear the message of knowledgeable speakers. With help from Dr. Cortland Smith, speakers such as Gallo Palza, former President of Ecuador, were brought to enlighten the Pacific campus.

The Office of International Programs, newly established in 1980, operated its programs out of the Bechtel International Center, including 44 various programs designed to send students to over 20 different countries. The programs include an orientation course in preparation for studies abroad, the trip itself, and a follow-up program providing an analysis of the program and learning experience. The overseas portion of the program varies in length and is normally held in conjunction with one or more private universities.

Established in the fall of 1978, the Office of International Services handles the orientation and advising

of UOP's foreign students. The Office strives to ease the difficult transition of foreign students moving to the U.S. To do this, the OIS works closely with the Academic Skills Center, the Career Planning and Placement Center, the International Students Association, and the Student Advising Office. The OIS focuses on helping foreign students with educational as well as personal concerns.

The Office of International Services also helps to internationalize the campus by hosting a program on American Educational Systems and sponsoring the International Speakers Bureau. The Bureau provides organizations and schools with the opportunity to hear both students and faculty from Pacific speak on topics of international interest.

In the future, the Bechtel Center

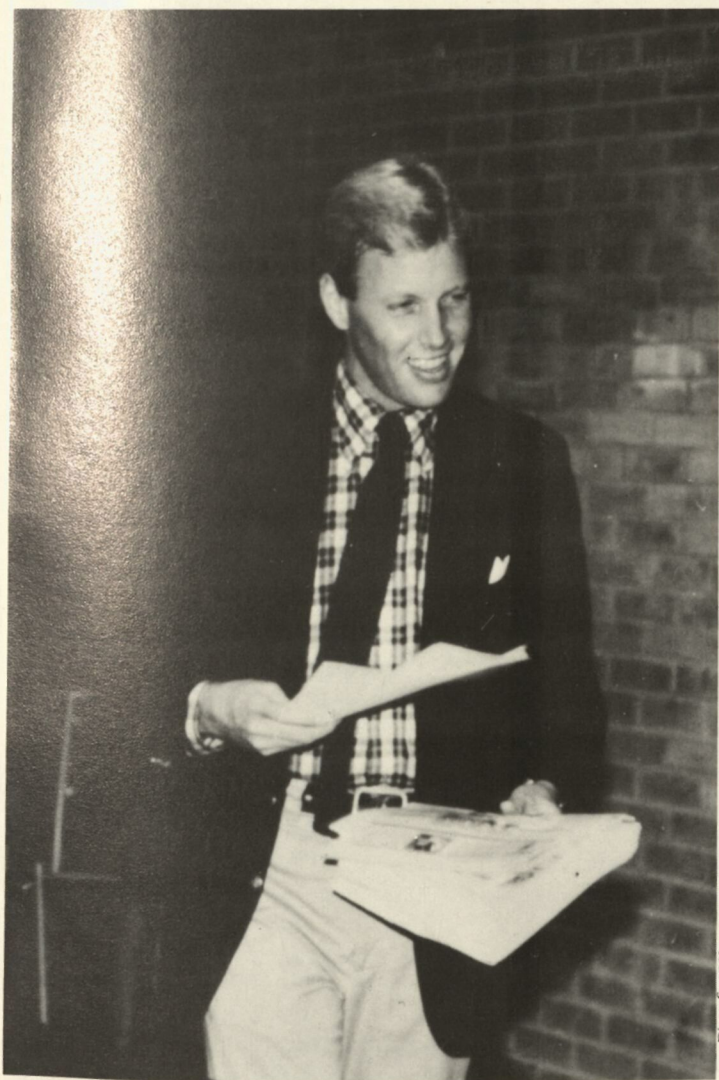
looks forward to expanding their library and the number of studying-abroad programs offered. By expanding the library, — the Center hopes to provide more students current information on as many foreign countries as possible. The Center also strives to expand the choices available for students wishing to study in a foreign country.

Students should soon see an expansion in existing programs plus opportunities to visit third world countries. These plans will make the Bechtel Center an even stronger and more effective facility at Pacific.

A Vote for the Future

The year 1984 brings a new political race with the Presidential Elections emerging in November. Elections take on a unique importance as our government handles concerns of monumental importance.

The main issues candidates will be addressing this year include environmental protection, civil rights, ERA, taxes, education, abortion and defense. Although each of these issues holds individual importance for certain special interest groups, the topics receiving the most attention are those that affect the largest number of voters. Taxes and nuclear weapons are two issues that have come to the forefront, making an enormous impact on the population as a whole.

Obviously, the candidates are very cautious when speaking about any major topic. The experienced candidates attempt to gain support from as many major sources and groups as is possible. This type of campaigning is visible in most of the candidates vying for the Democratic Nomination. This group

includes Walter Mondale, John Glenn, Former Governor Rueben Askew, Senator Alan Cranston, Former Senator George McGovern and Reverend Jesse Jackson.

Of these politicians, Mondale and Glenn dominate the competition so far. Both have stated that they want to avoid nuclear war, yet neither has commented whether they would increase or decrease nuclear weaponry. Mondale has asserted that he would use them in a war situation, but would not make the first move; whereas Glenn has stated that he wants to be perceived as capable of using nuclear weapons should the situation warrant it. Although former astronaut Glenn trails Mondale currently in the polls, there is no way to predict who will ultimately become the Democratic candidate.

President Reagan, running for re-election as the Republican candidate, has previously stated his opposition to nuclear war. He even made a proposal to decrease nuclear weapons, although increasing the build-up in Europe. Like

Mondale, Reagan is against making the first move, but advocates retaliation. After the primaries, this race for the Presidency will obviously heat up tremendously.

In recent years, the voter turnout for electing public officials has dropped enormously. Young citizens eligible to vote show less interest in the elections than ever before. Despite the possible reasons for the low turnout, there is no legitimate excuse for anyone not voting. Voting allows the people of a democracy to show their support and exemplify their opinions of the government. No citizen has validity criticizing the government or its policies if he has not even shown his support through the voting process.

Since we're fortunate enough to have a say in the running of our government, we should take advantage of the opportunity to get involved. As students, we should turn the polls around and show that the youngest crowd does have an interest in the future of America!

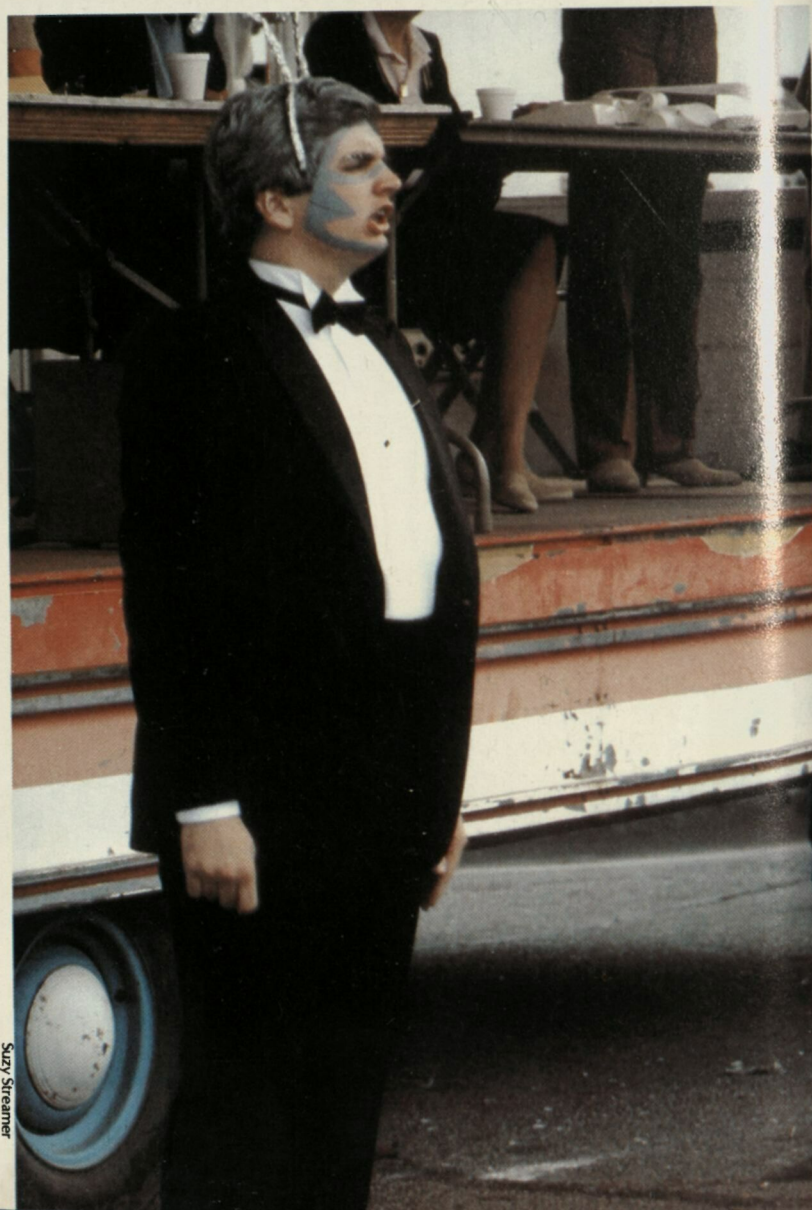

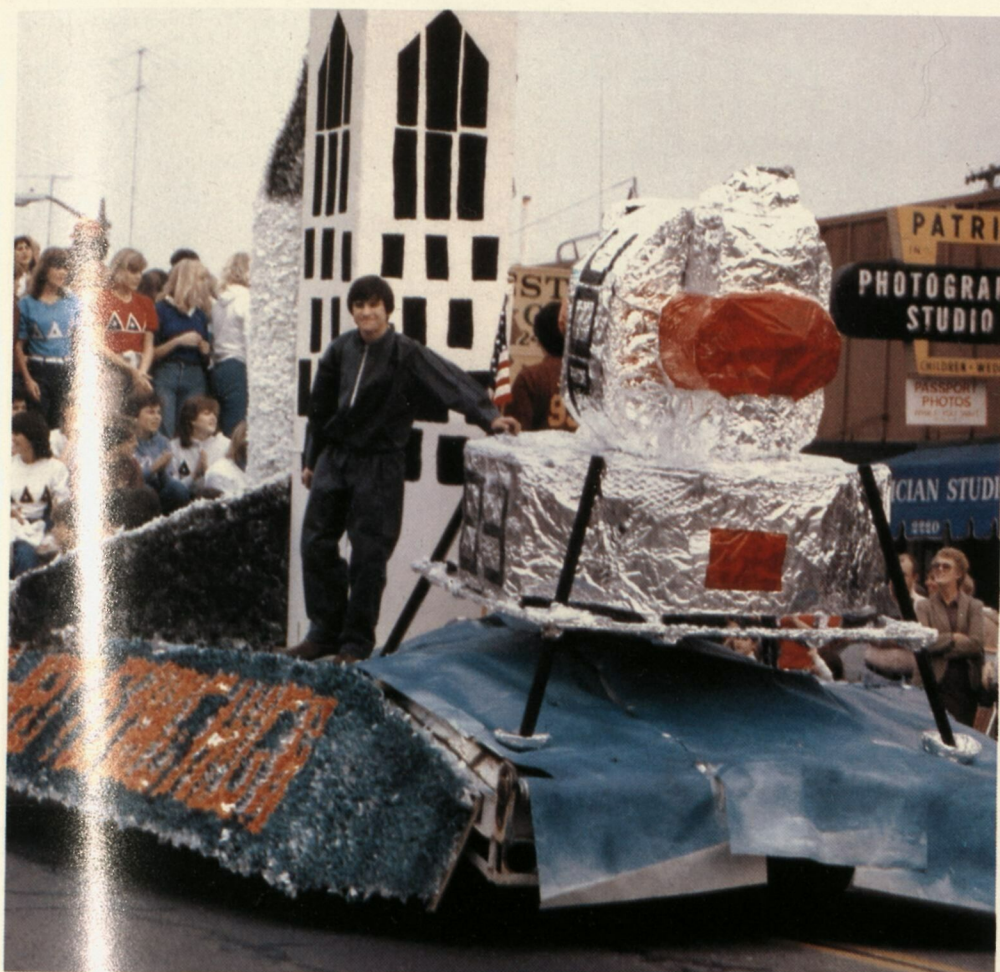

Before the traditional football game, this year resulting in a loss to competitor Idaho, a barbeque was held on the practice field.

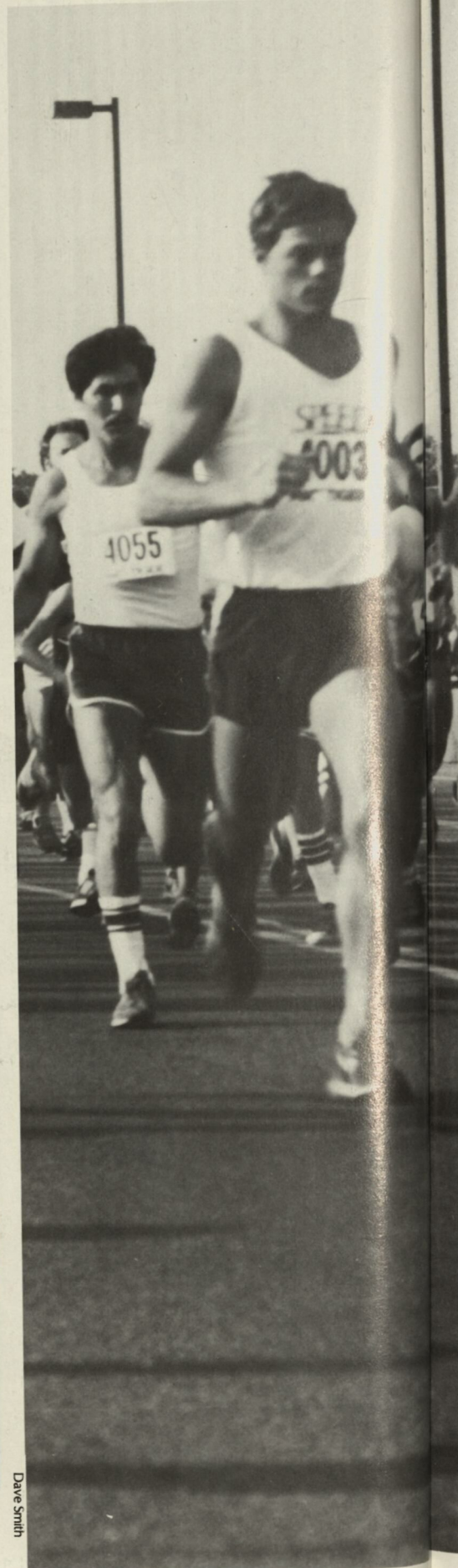
Tradition combined with new events characterized Homecoming 1983; a time when alumni were welcomed home by the school spirit and enthusiasm of current Pacific students.



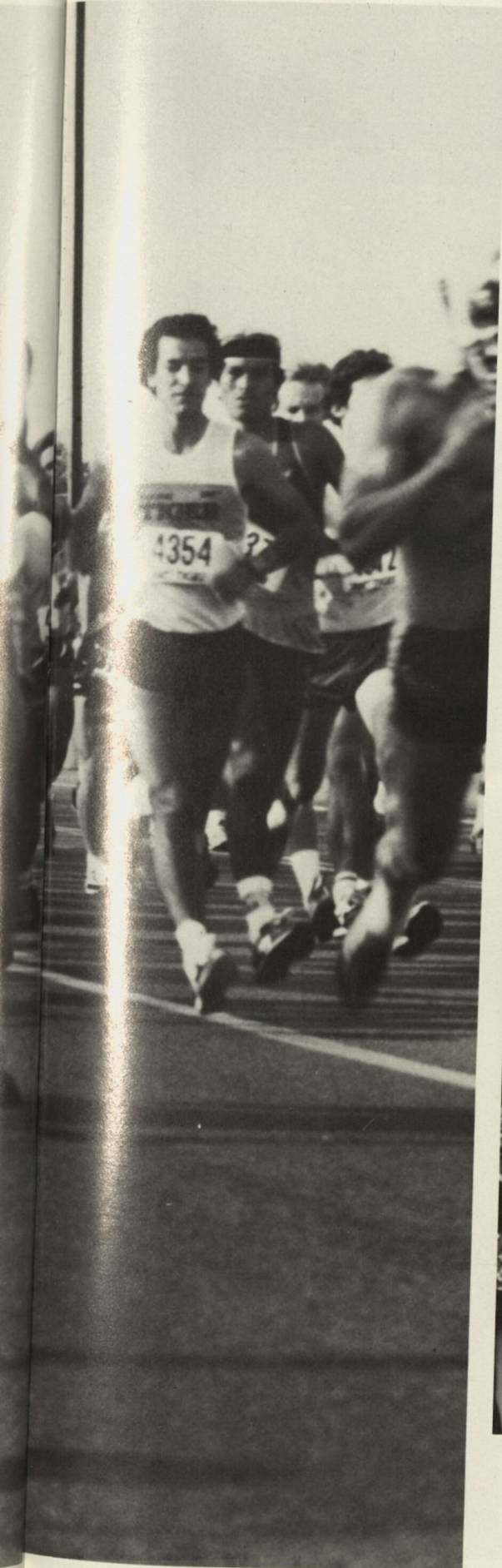

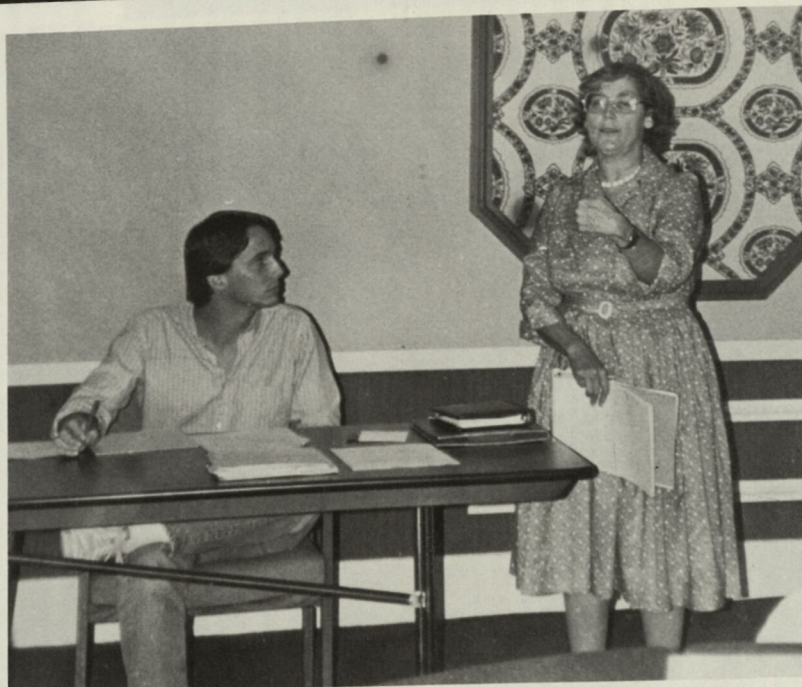
Senate

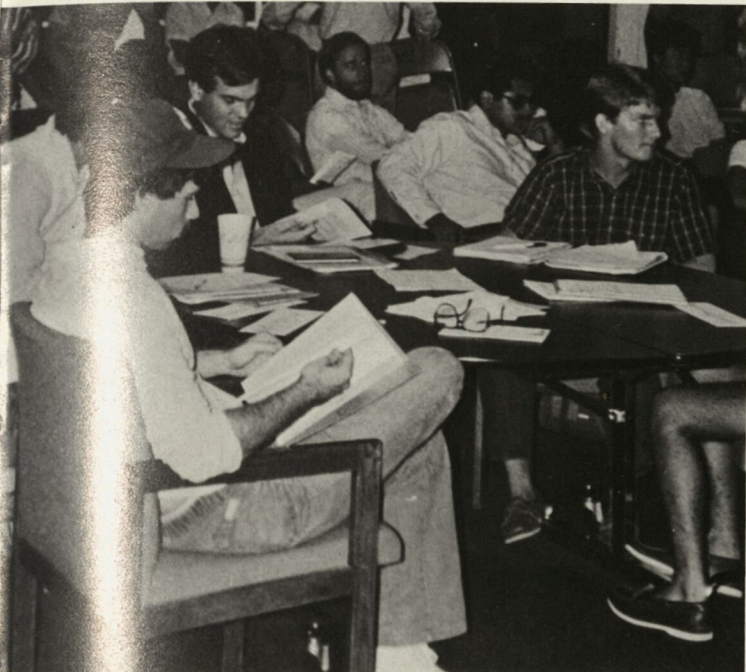

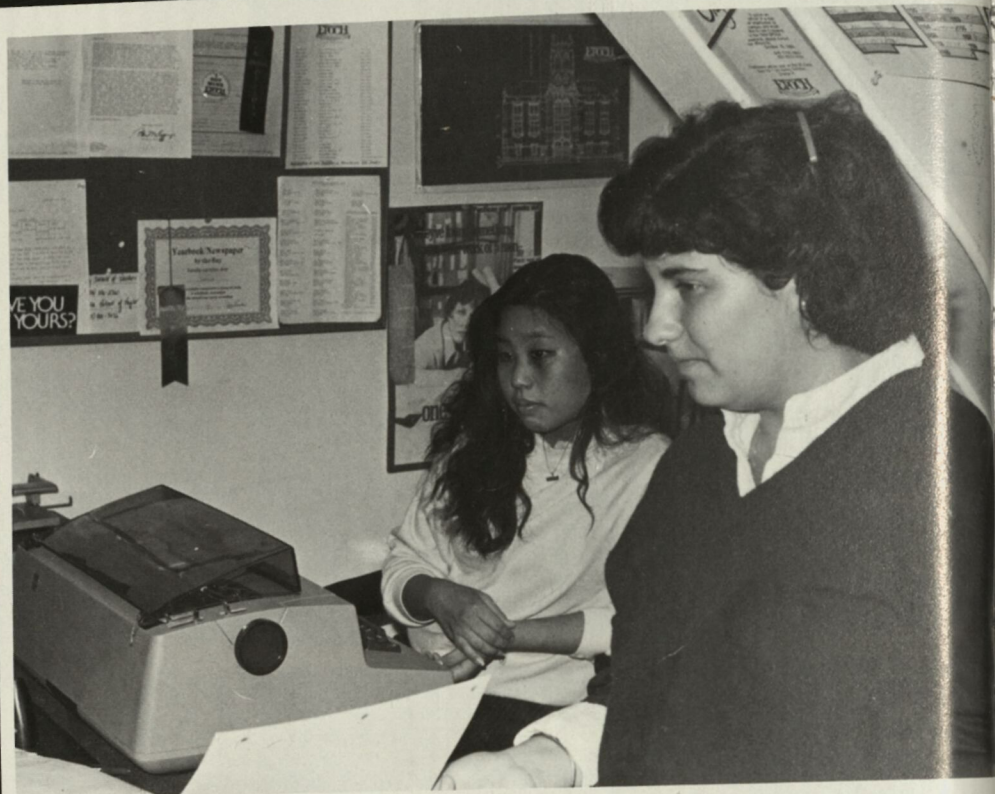

At this time, due to student apathy and lack of support from the administration, publication was discontinued for the next nine years.

In 1982, the tradition of a Pacific yearbook was reestablished with the publication of the 1982 **EPOCH**. This name was chosen for the book because the word "epoch" can be defined as "the beginning of a significant period of time during which striking things will occur."

The publication of this 1984 **EPOCH** has proven the definition of the title to be true. The 1984 **EPOCH** was produced by a 30 member staff and a five member editorial board. In this third year of **EPOCH** publication, many advances were made in production, organization and campus relations. 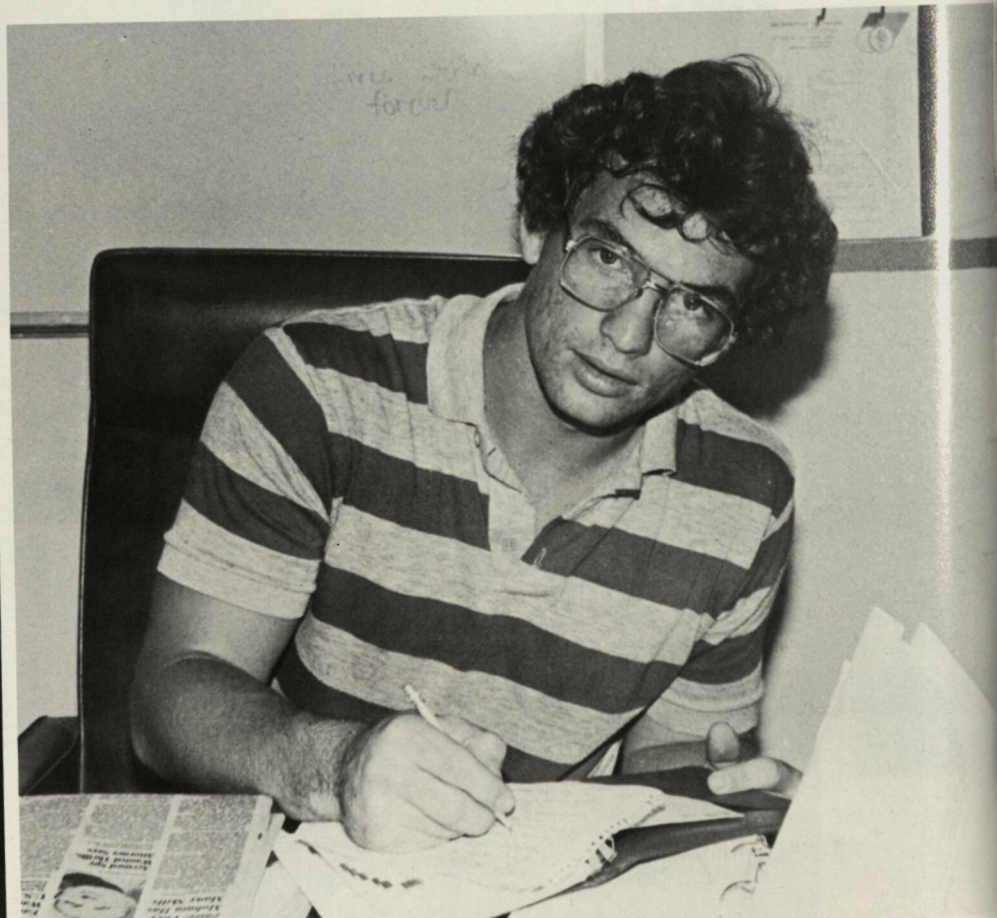
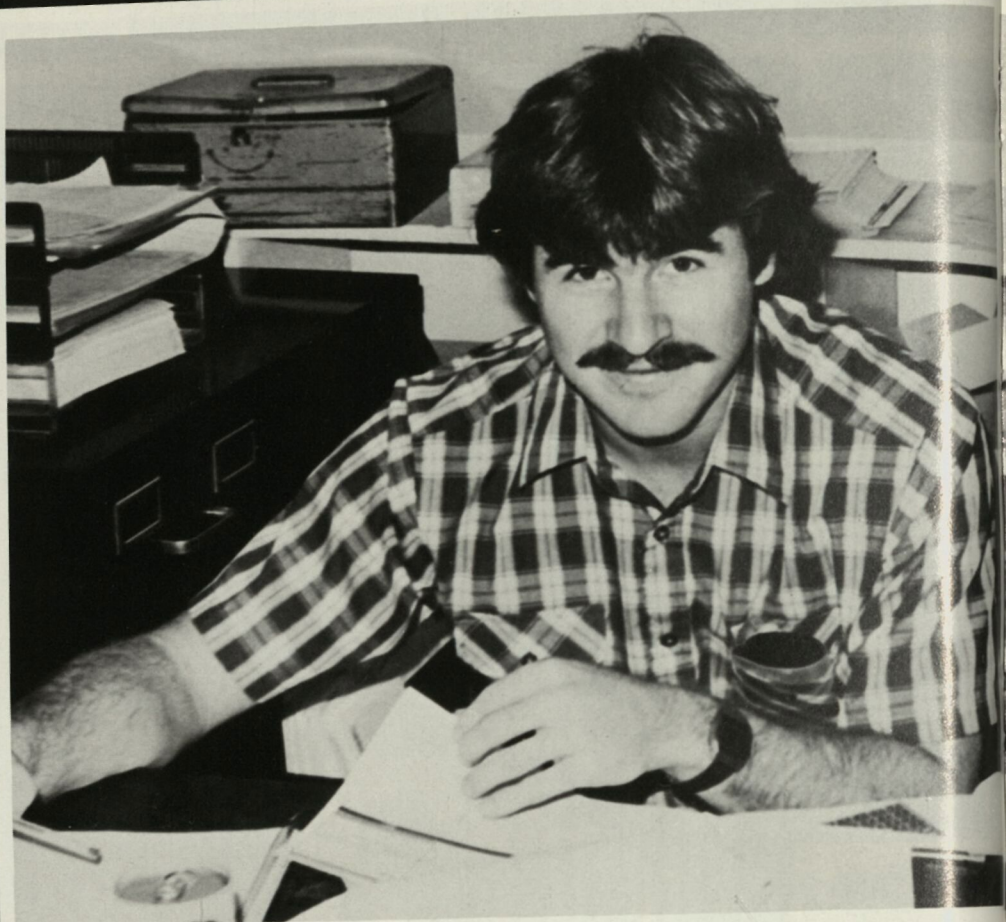
The University of the Pacific's weekly newspaper, **The Pacifican**, consists entirely of student editors, staff and organization. With a staff of 27, **The Pacifican** experienced better organization and higher quality production last year.

UOP's first newspaper began publication in the fall of 1908, making it one of the nation's oldest college weeklies. Called the "**Pacific Weekly**," the original paper continued regular publication until 1971.

KUOP

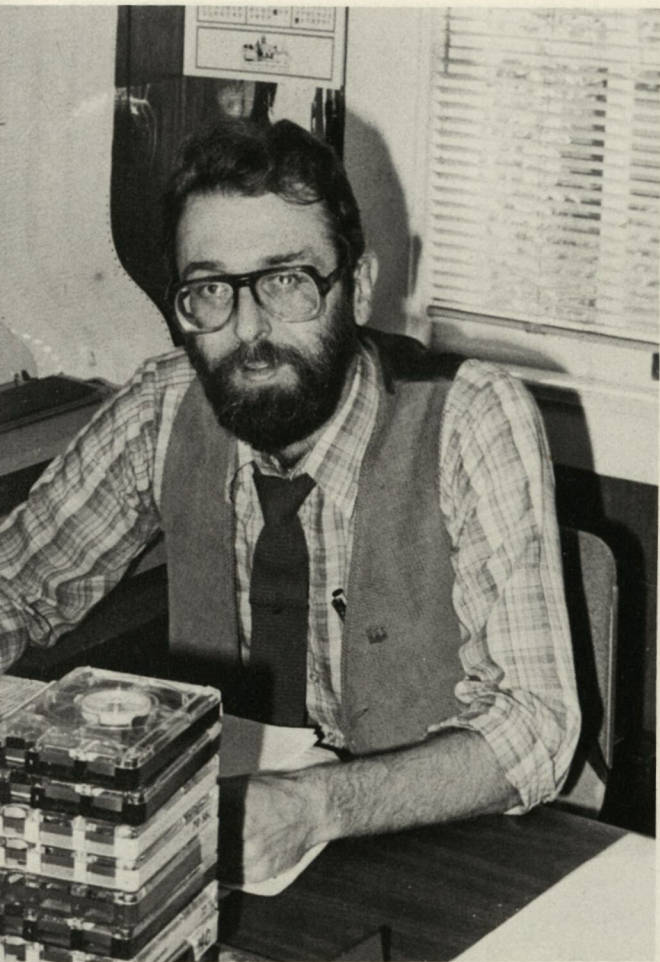
The University of the Pacific's licensed radio station, KUOP, FM 91.3, is San Joaquin Valley's only public broadcasting station.

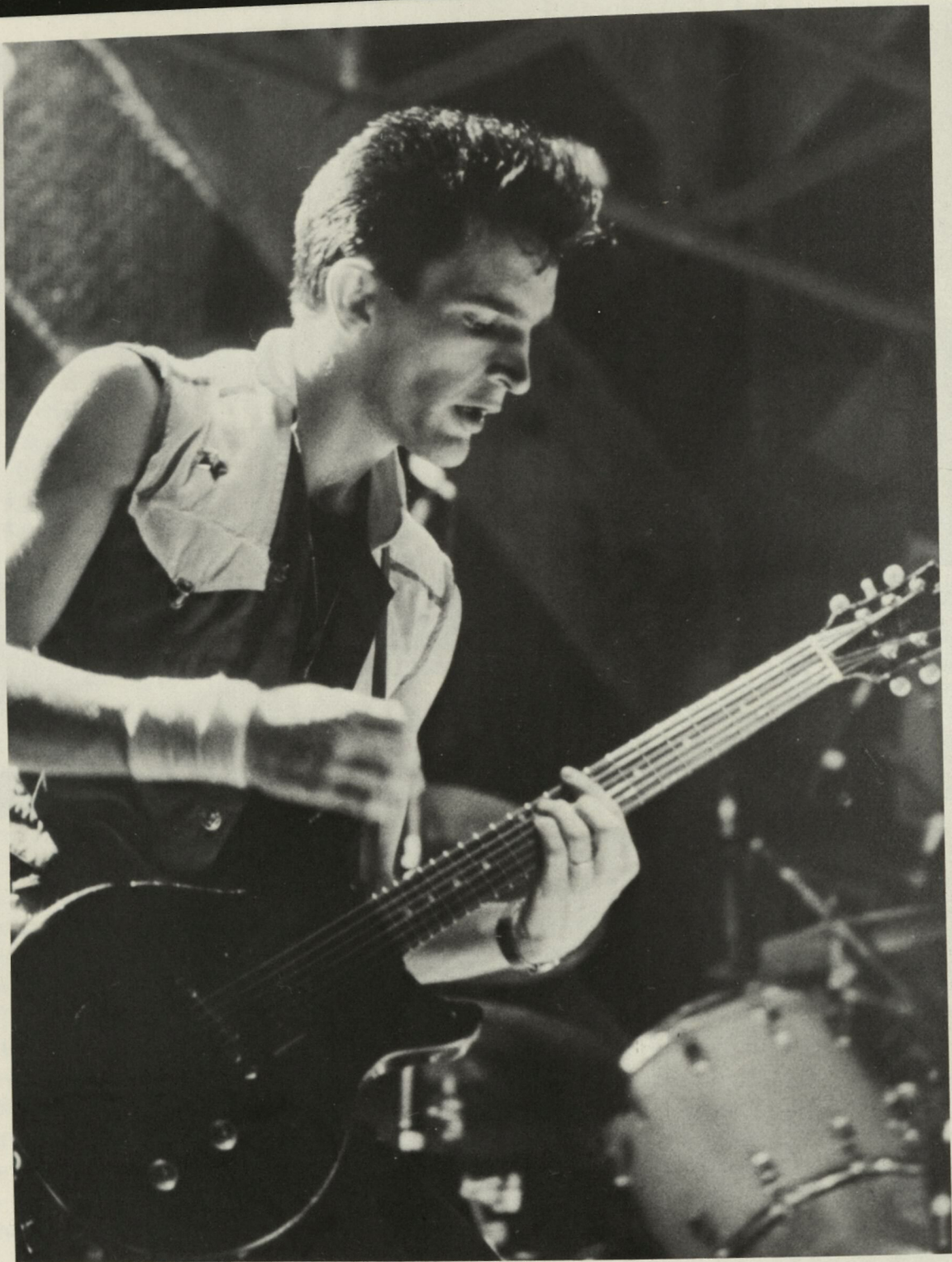
With last year's transmitter move to Mt. Oso, KUOP broadened its power to 7000 watts, thereby tripling its previous service area. KUOP now extends its wide variety of classical, jazz, folk, bluegrass, dixieland, swing, fusion and soul music as far north as Sacramento and as far south as Merced. KUOP transmission reaches east to Yosemite and west to the northern portion of San Francisco Bay.

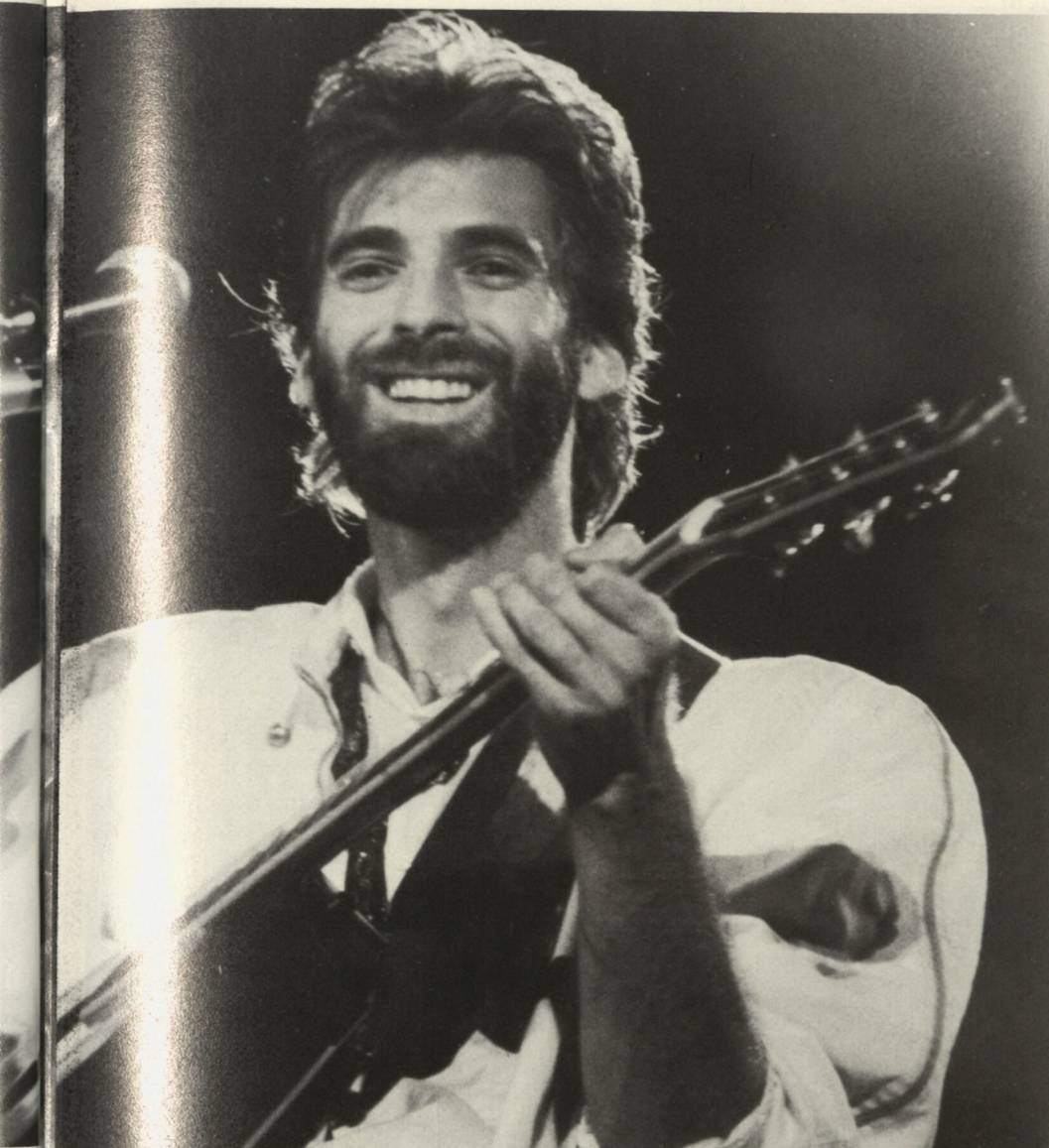
Along with this wide variety of music, audiences also receive news information and public affairs programming. Since the transmitter move to Mt. Oso, KUOP brings public radio to an additional three percent of California's population not previously serviced by National Public Radio broadcasting.

Staffed at 60 employees, including seven full-time professionals and approximately 50 student workers, KUOP looks forward to larger and higher quality services. The management of KUOP seeks to expand the station's services beyond the Stockton core area and to upgrade programming provided to newly-acquired listeners.









UOP last year set new precedents and made terrific strides toward the future in hosting top notch concert performances.

In the early fall, **Molly Hatchet** rocked the Conservatory of Music with their own form of Southern rock. **Target**, a four-guitar group, opened up the concert that included such Hatchet favorites as "Flirting with Disaster" and also many hits from an upcoming album.

The second major concert of the year, **Kenny Loggins**, was the second time the Spanos Center sold out in UOP history. The only other band to accomplish this was **Alabama** during the 1982-83 school year. The Loggins Show opened up with comedian Louie Anderson who delivered a raucously funny routine. Loggins joined the rocking crowd by treating them to such hits as "Whenever I Call You Friend," "Heart to Heart," and other hits from his days with Michael McDonald as well as Loggins and Messina hits such as "Your Mama Don't Dance." He encoored for a third time with his legendary hit "Come Celebrate Me Home." Loggins recorded the Spanos Center concert for two reasons, "partly for our scrapbook and partly for a future live album," Loggins commented. The concert was truly Loggins at his very best.

The politically activist lyrics and radical beat of **The Clash** invaded the Spanos Center early in the spring with an elaborate stage set-up including seven television sets. **The Clash** played mostly oldies throughout the evening throwing in "Rock the Casbah" and "Brand New Cadillac" to keep the crowd satisfied. **Los Lobos**, and electric mariachi band opened for The Clash with traditional Mexican folk songs and rock standards.

The Pretenders closed the concert year at Pacific with a late February performance in the Spanos Center. **The Alarm**, an English and American rock and roll band from Wales, opened for the group. **The Pretenders** presented both old and new favorites. They played "Back on the Chain Gang," "Middle of the Road" and encoored with "I'm Special."

ASUOP Concert Director Rolly Steele deserved special commendation for making this year a trend-setter for future years of UOP concert hosting!

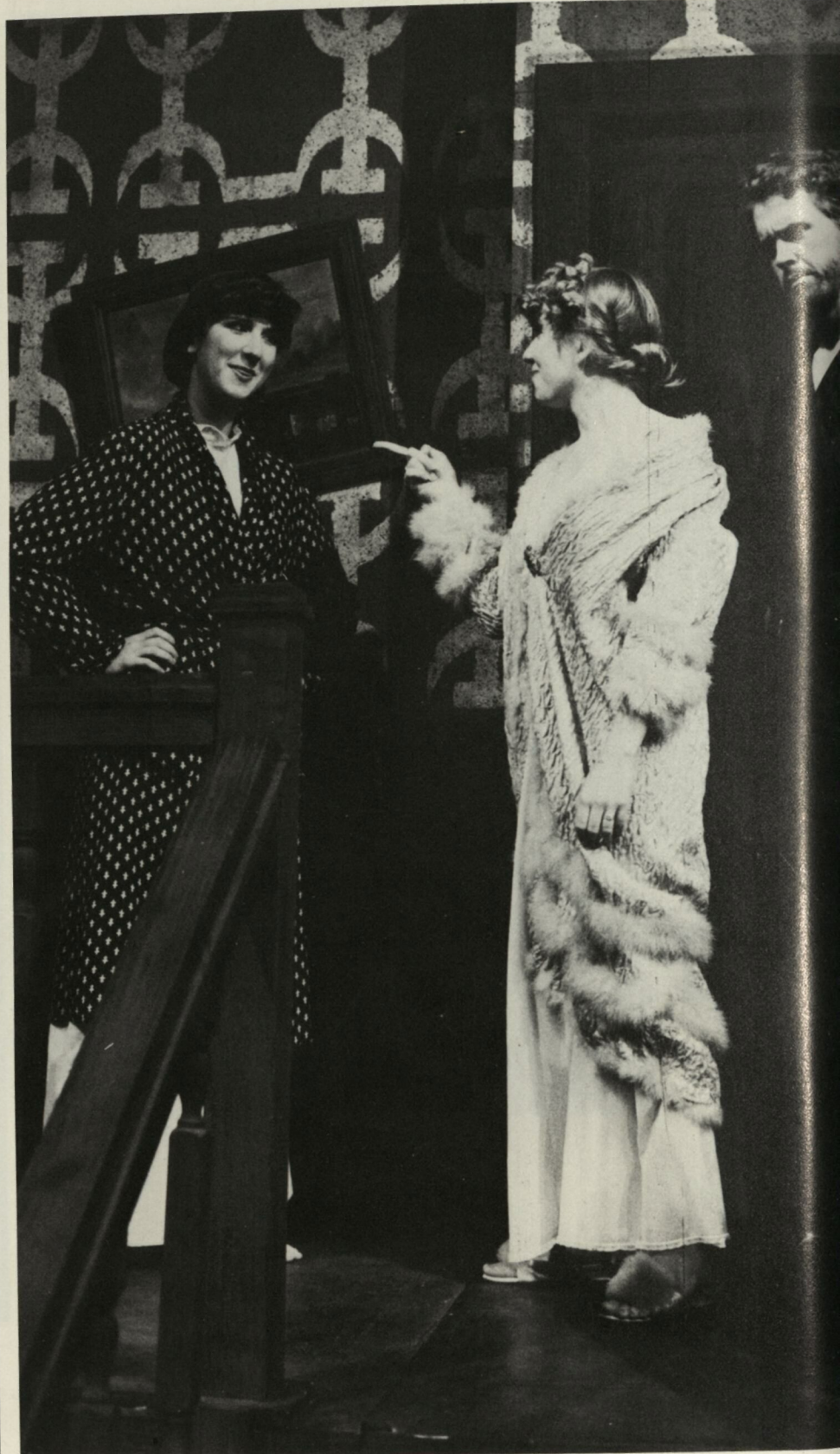
Ms. King has been active in theatre since graduating from Smith College in Massachusetts. She has combined her commitment to social change with her theatrical pursuits.

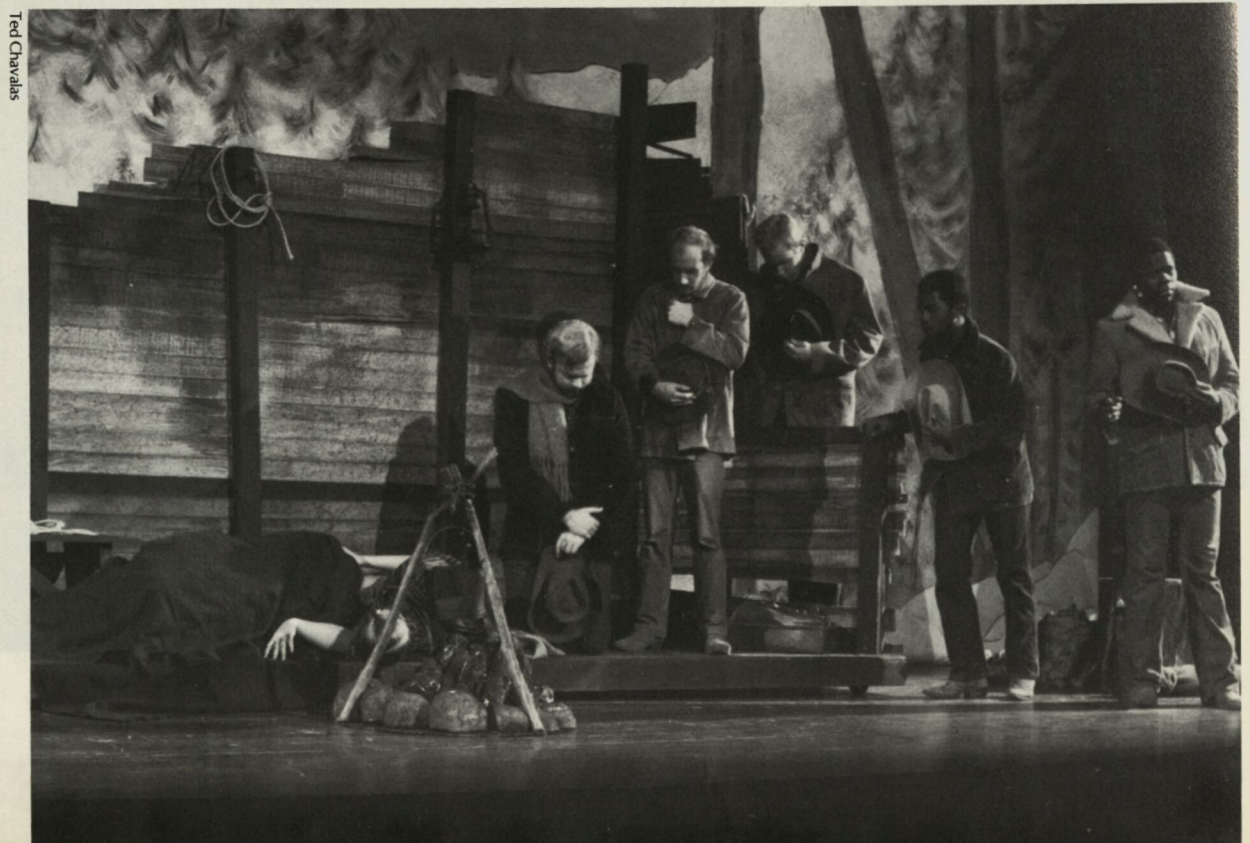

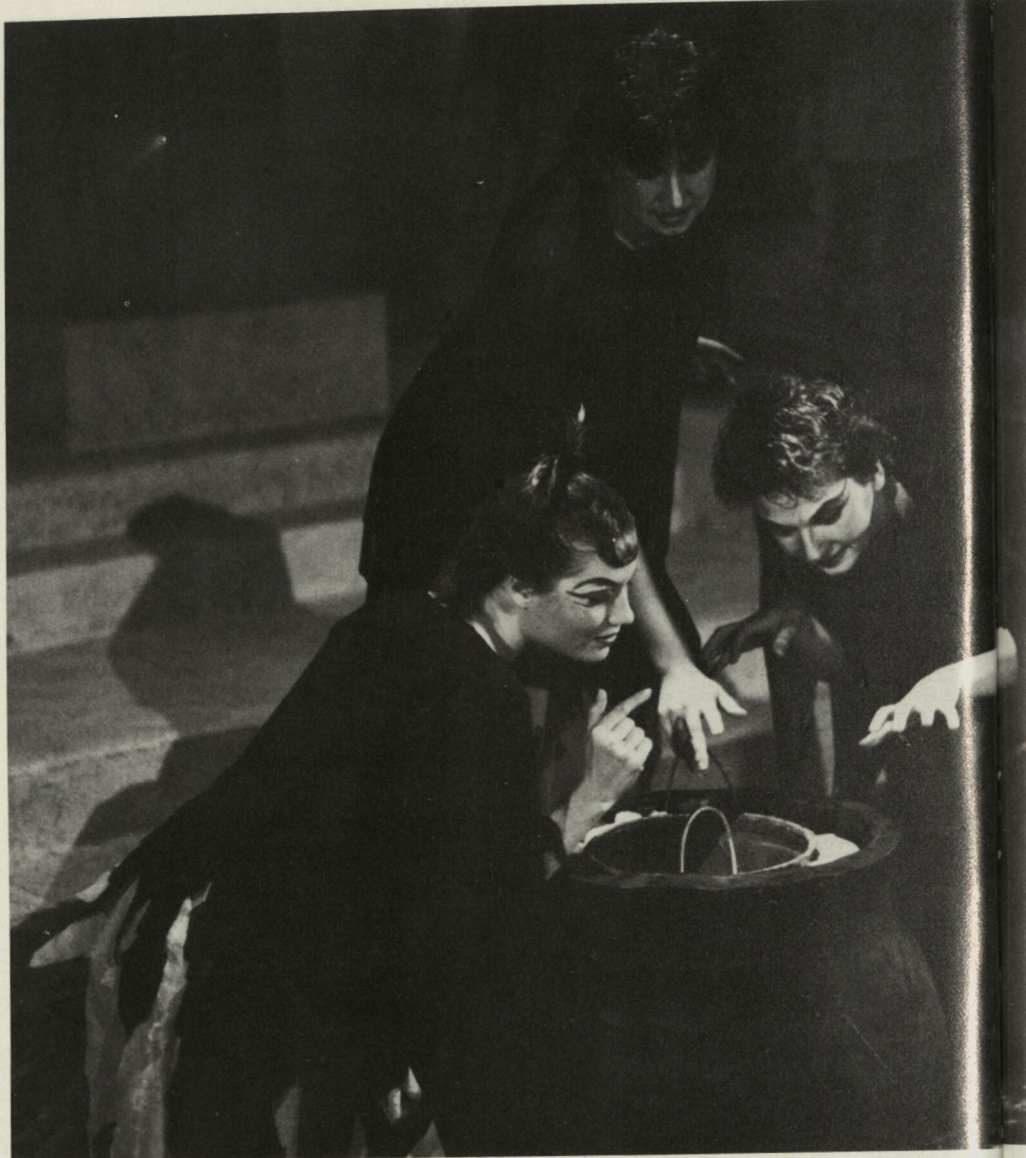

Although the position requires much perseverance and dedication, the rewards to both the residents and staff are innumerable.

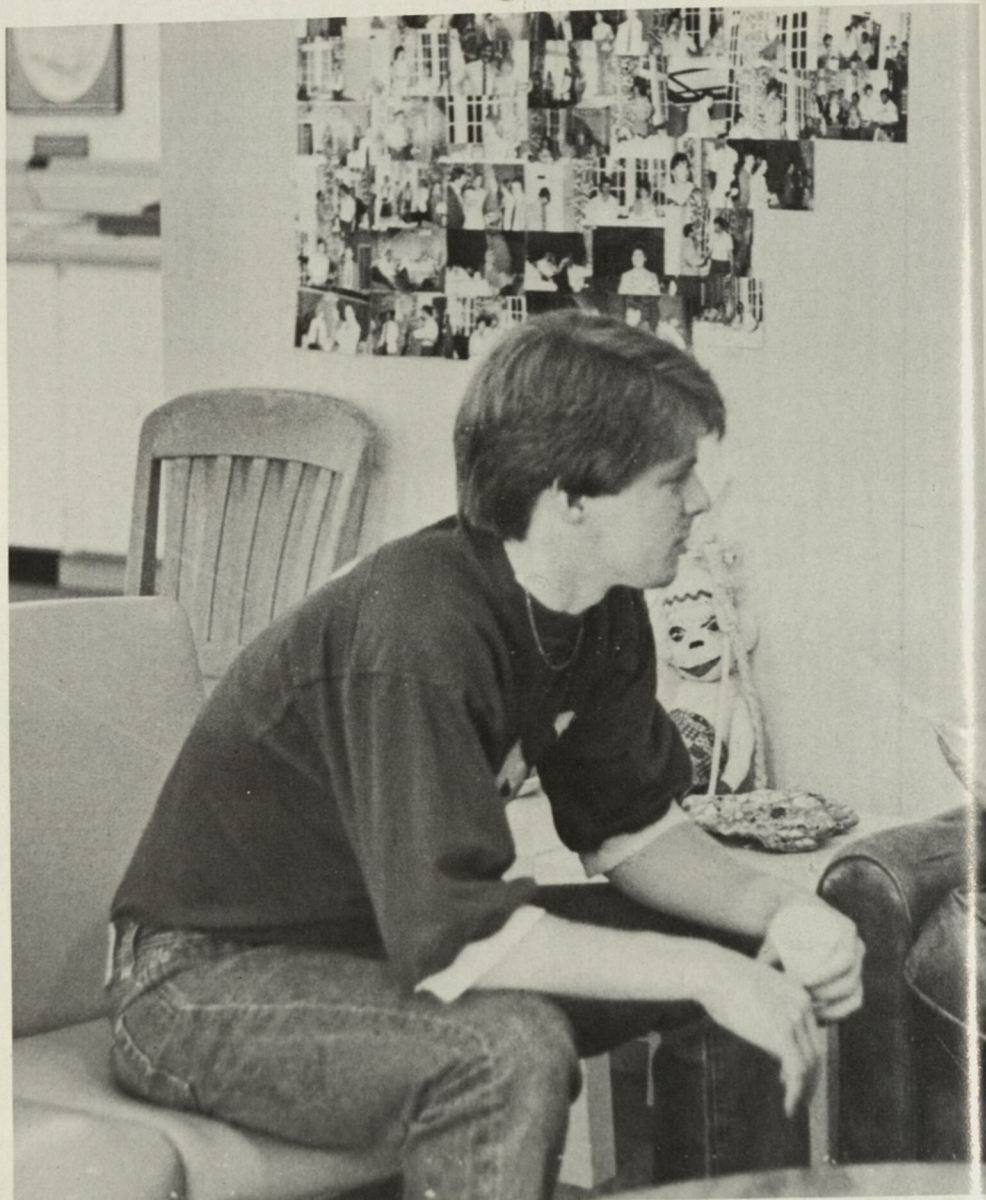
Student Advising

In preparation for advising, candidates go through a complex series of steps before being selected. Advisors are chosen according to their ability to interact with others and listen to their problems and concerns.

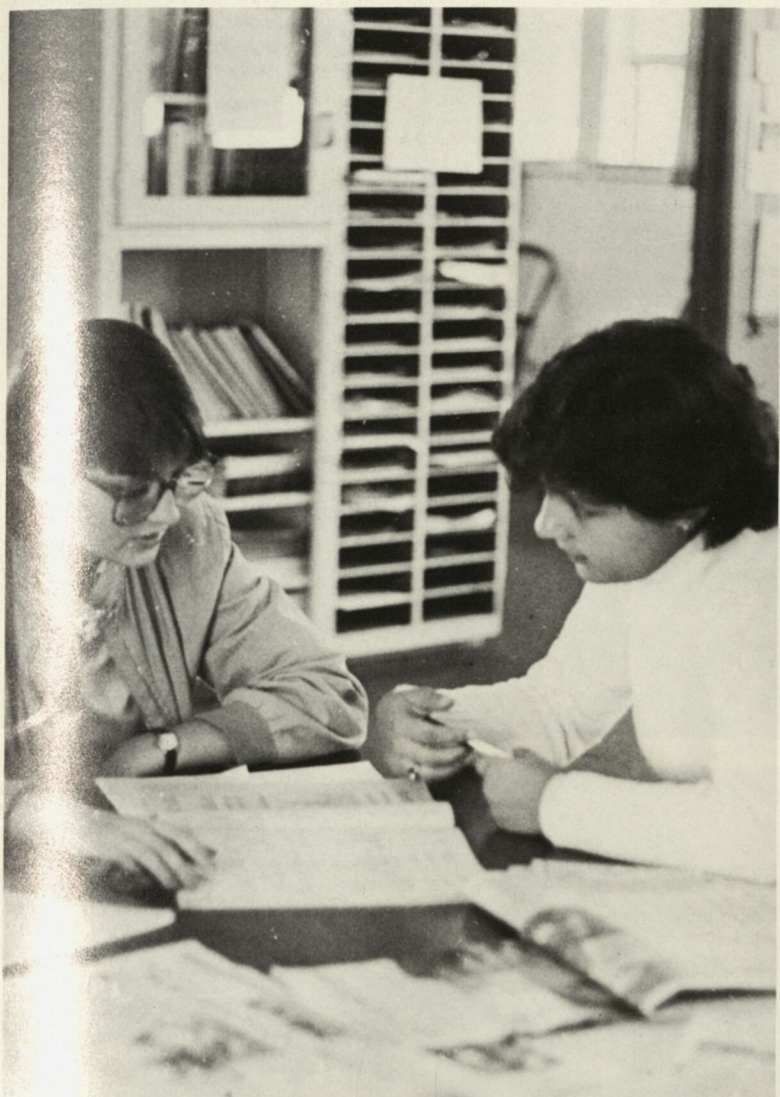

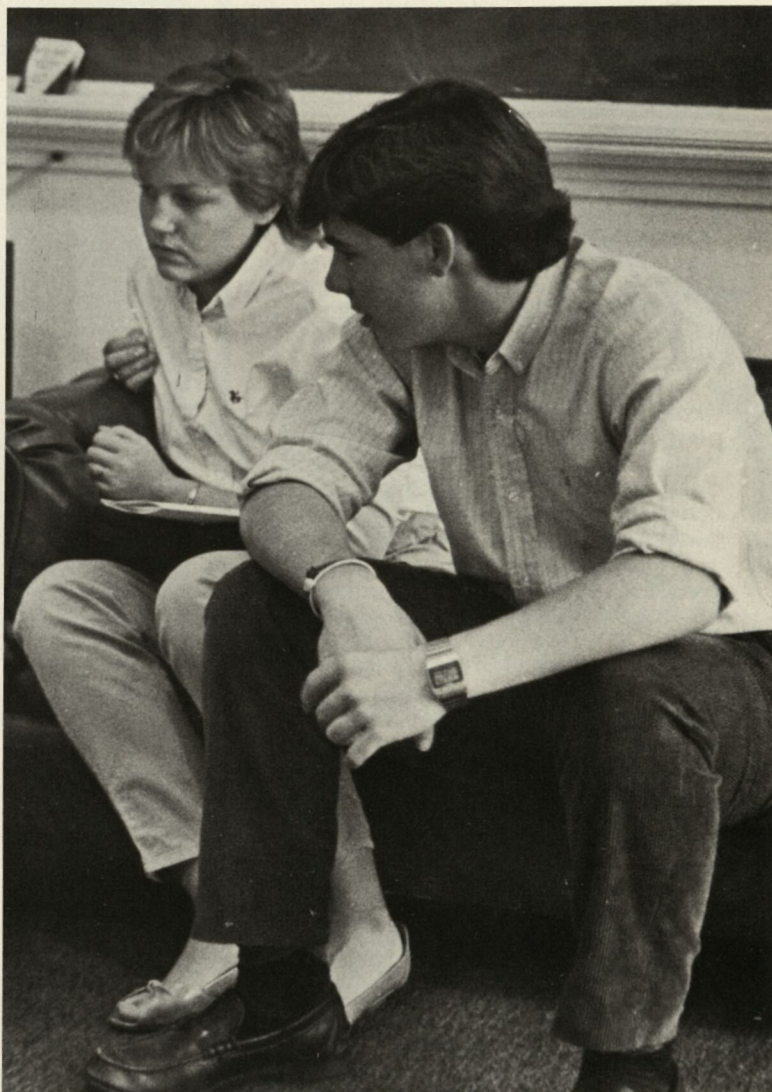

The band specialized in playing pop and jazz favorites and hopes in the future to travel with winning UOP teams.

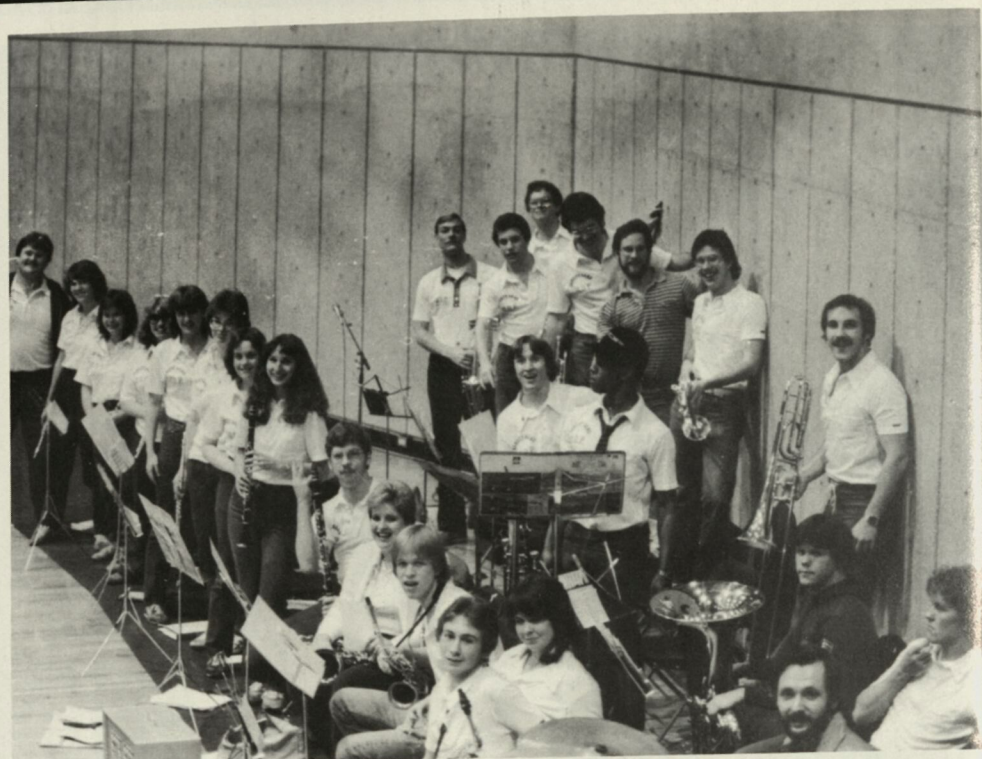
The UOP Jazz Ensemble last year consisted of 18 members. These people, chosen by auditions, were not required to be music majors.

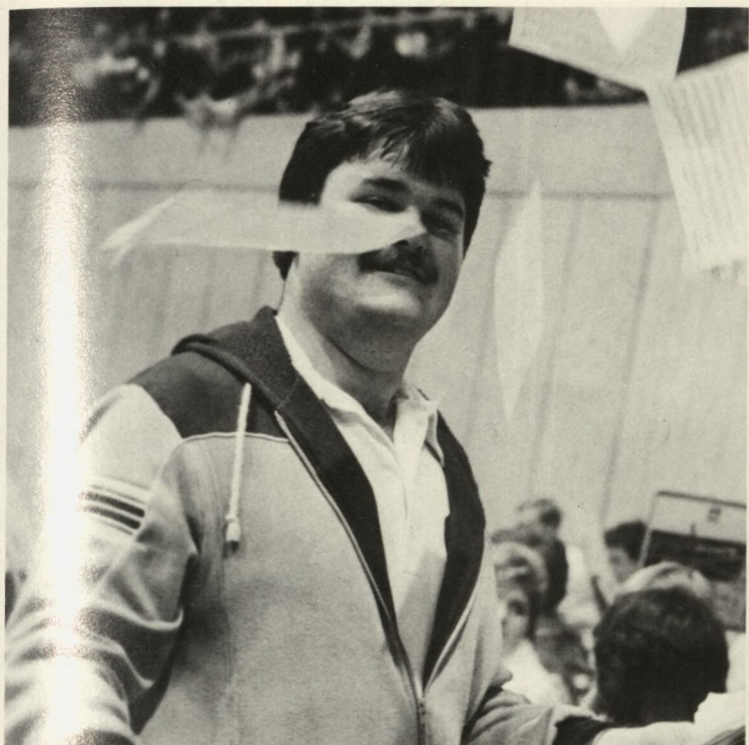

The Pacific Wind Ensemble has been a part of the University for 15 years. Last year the Ensemble had 39 members with both music and non-music majors participating.

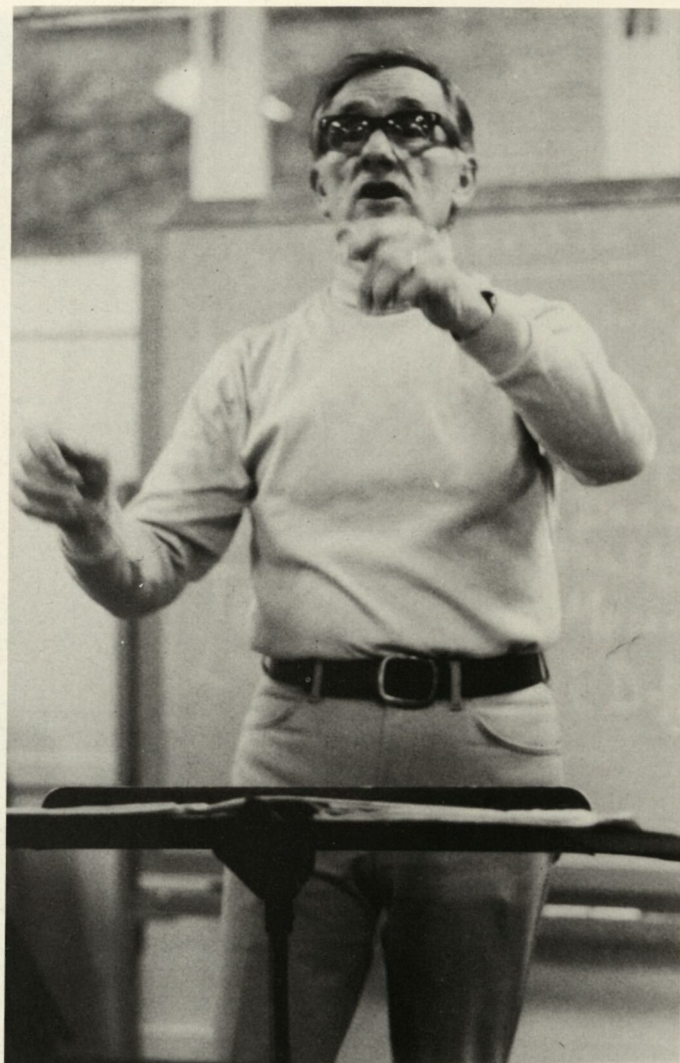

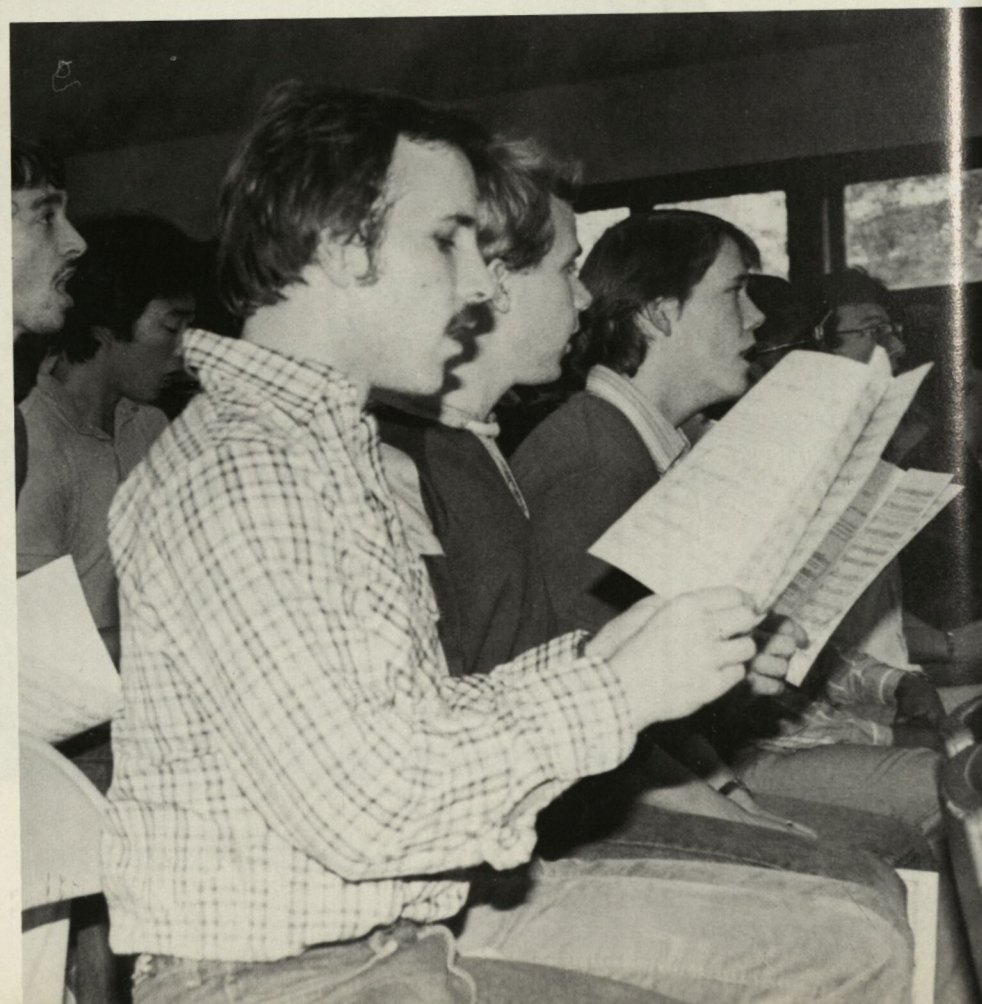
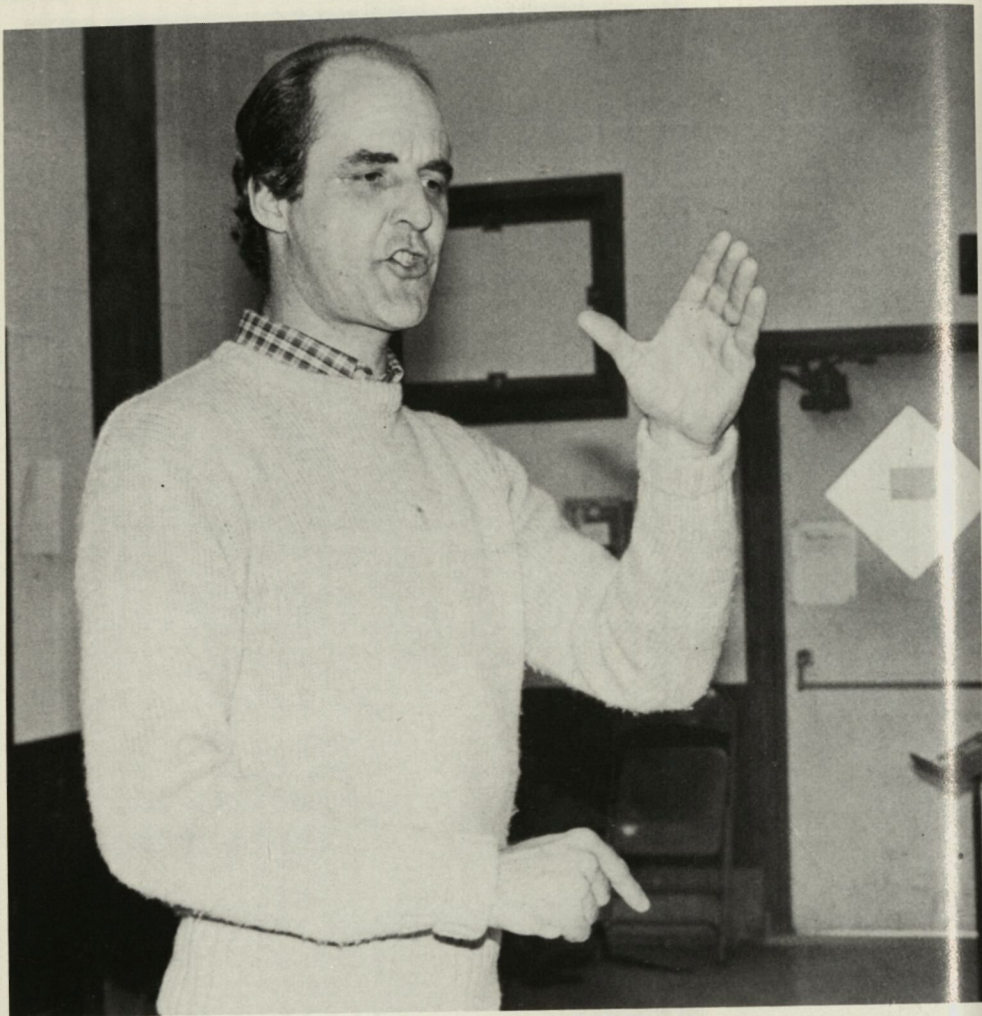

Formed in 1981, the Pacific Dance Ensemble allows faculty and students to perform a diverse repertory choreographed by company members and guest choreographers.

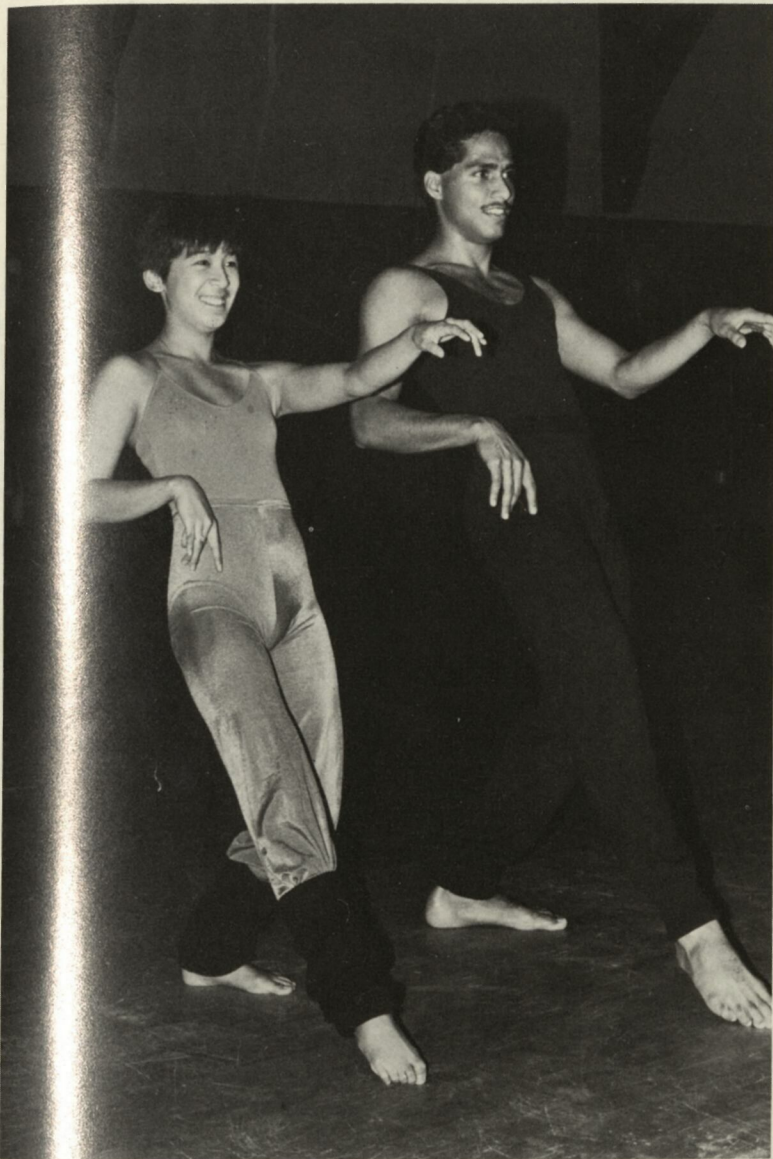

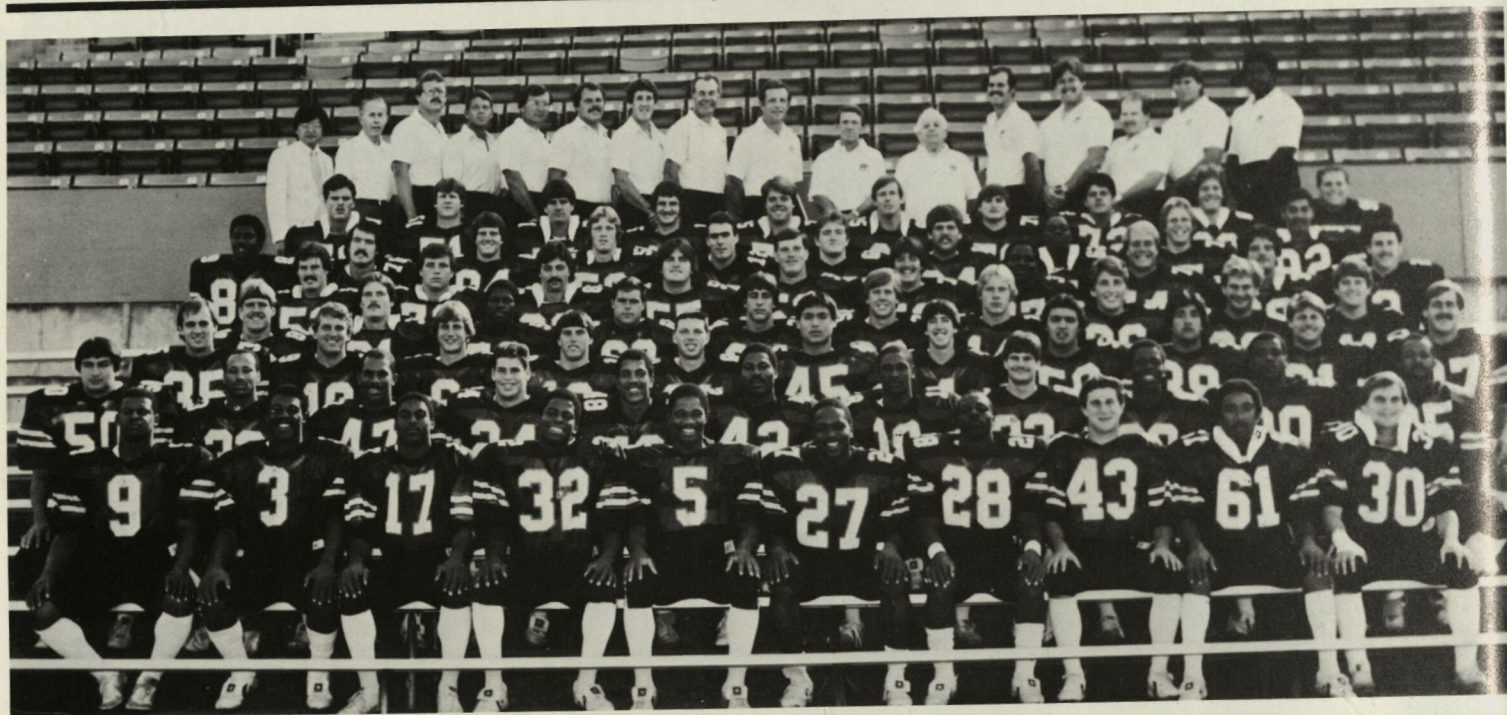
throwing the ball 70 times a game to win, we'll do it."

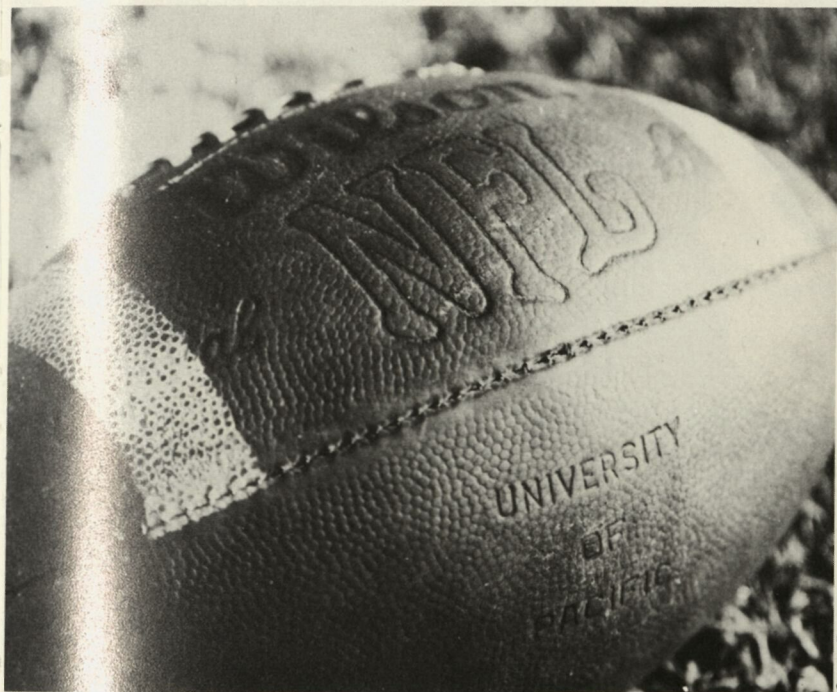
San Jose. The final game was played at Hawaii, but left UOP with another loss.

player I feel is most improved is Bill Wolsky."

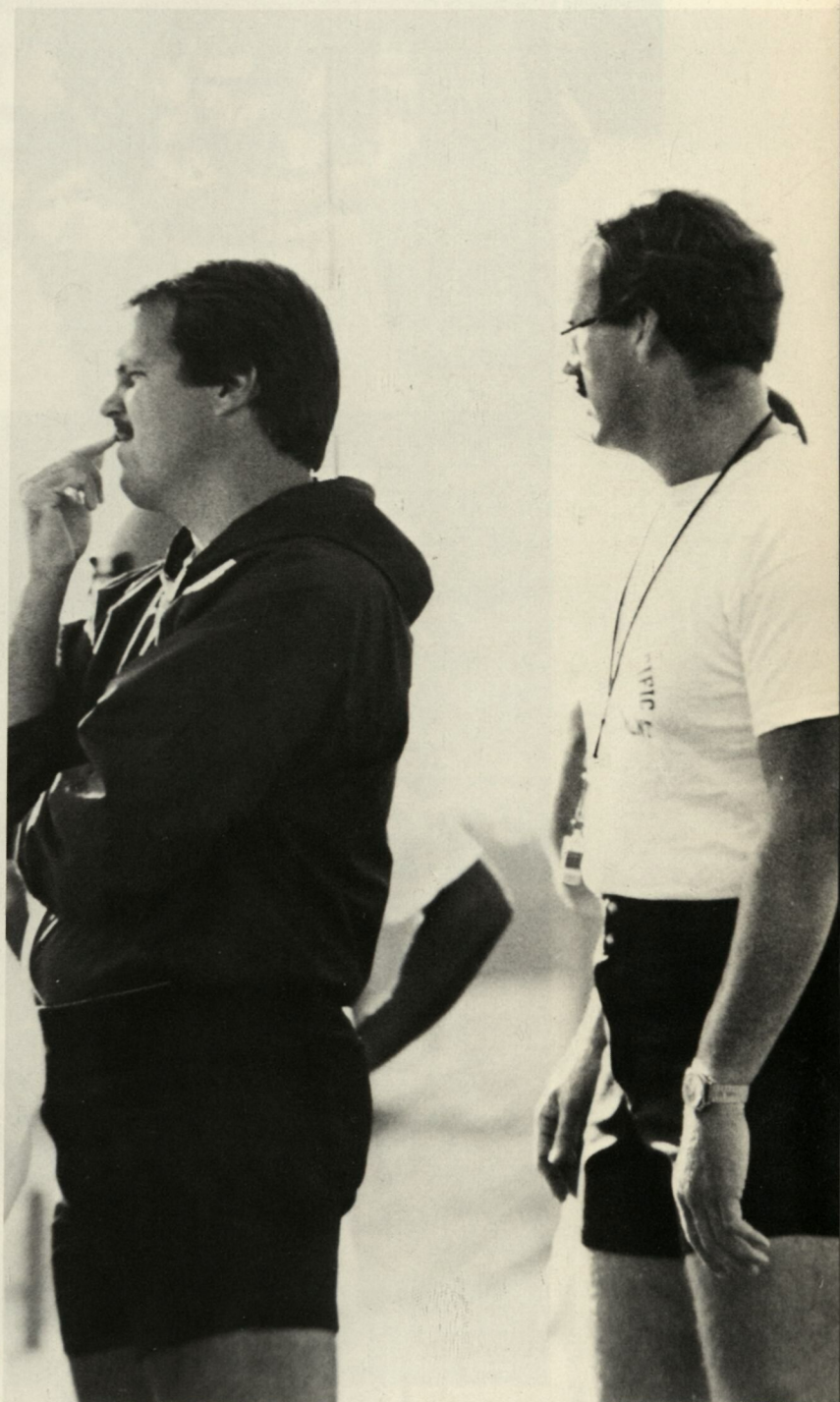

lent season. Head Coach, Terry Liskevych commented that, "This is the best team we have ever had here at UOP."

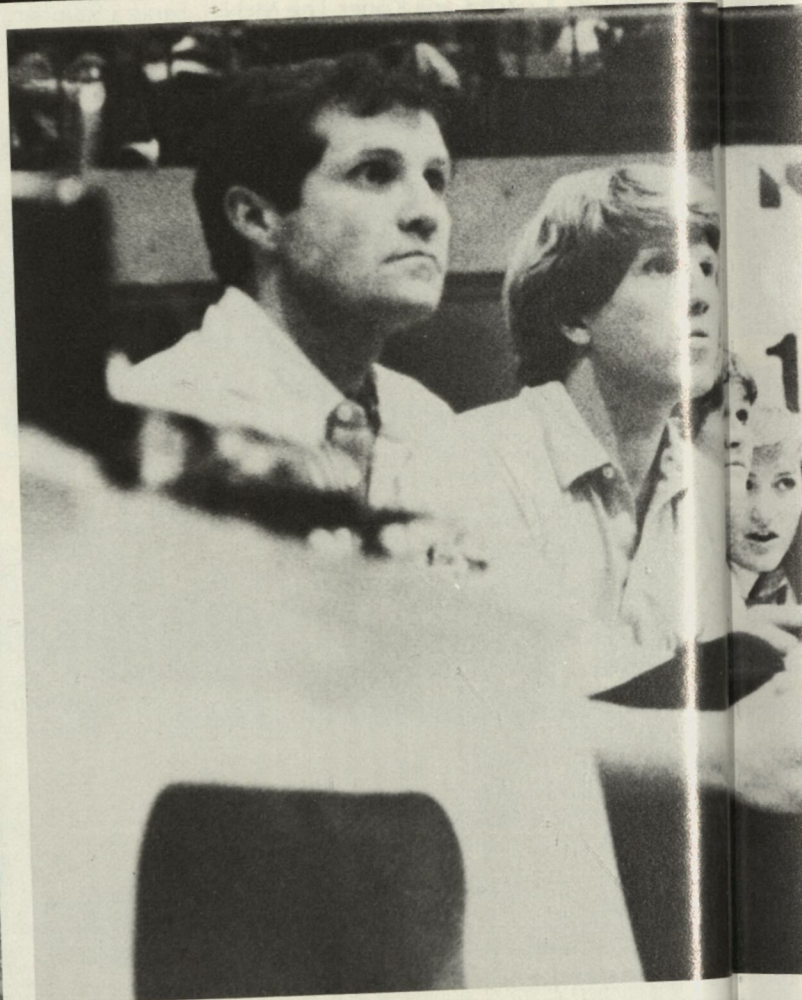

during the season. We just hit a flat spot in the season and UCLA was up. It was a bad time for a flat spot and the two were a bad combination."

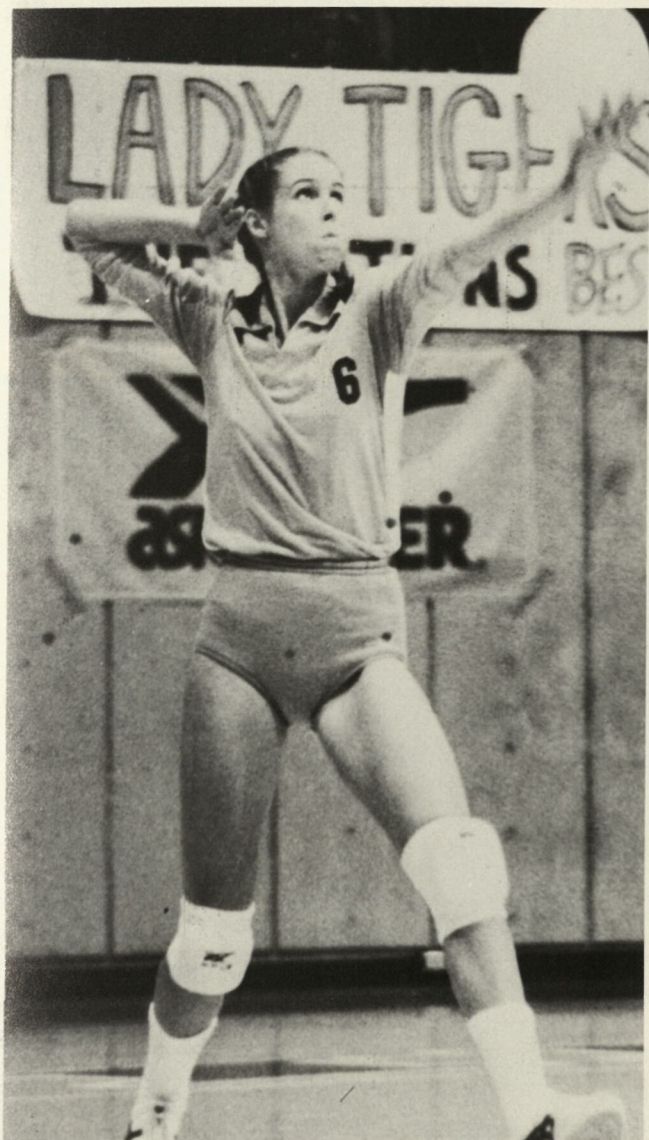
Again this year, the Wahine Rainbows of Hawaii were Pacific's big-

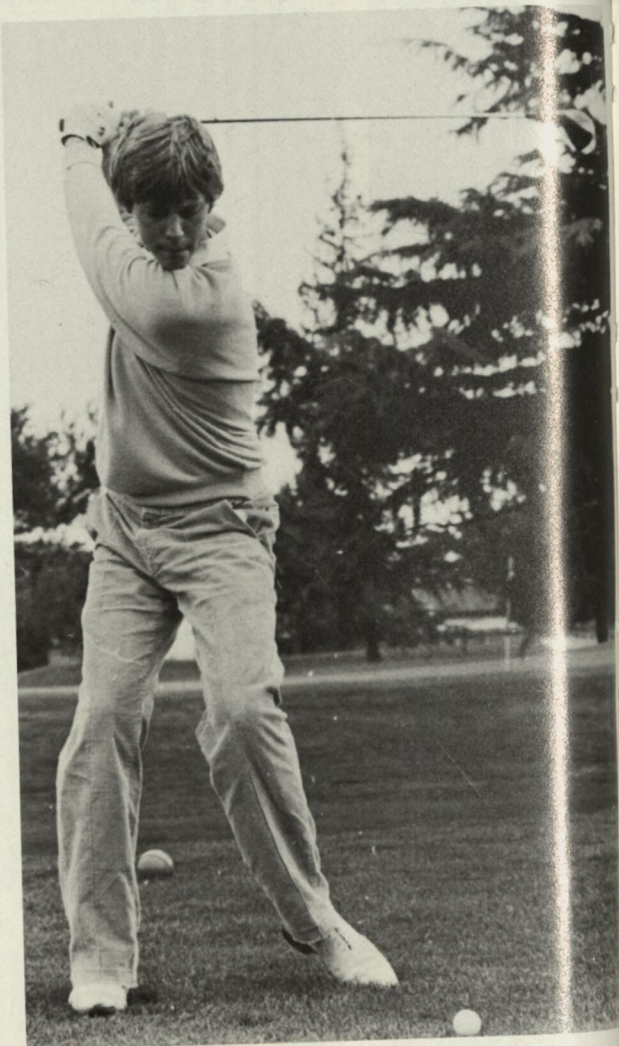
Glen Albaugh, who has been

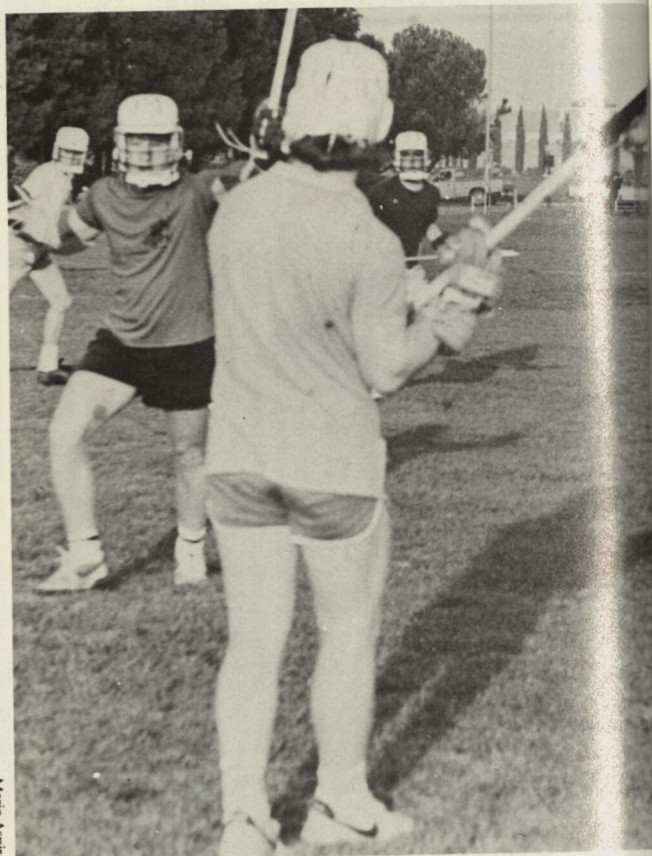

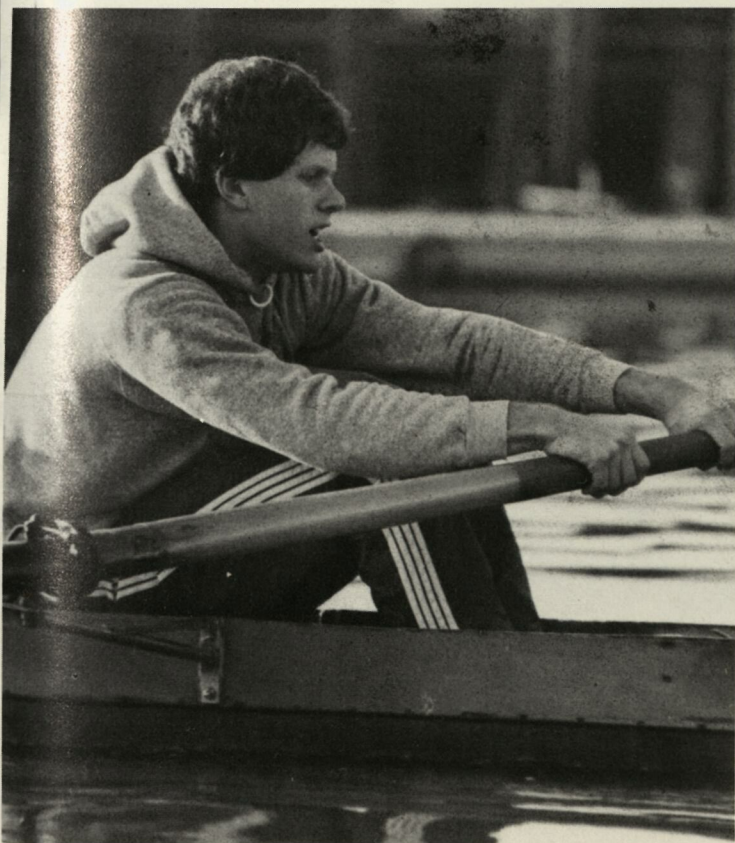
The hope that the success will continue is inevitable since only a few 1984 members graduated.

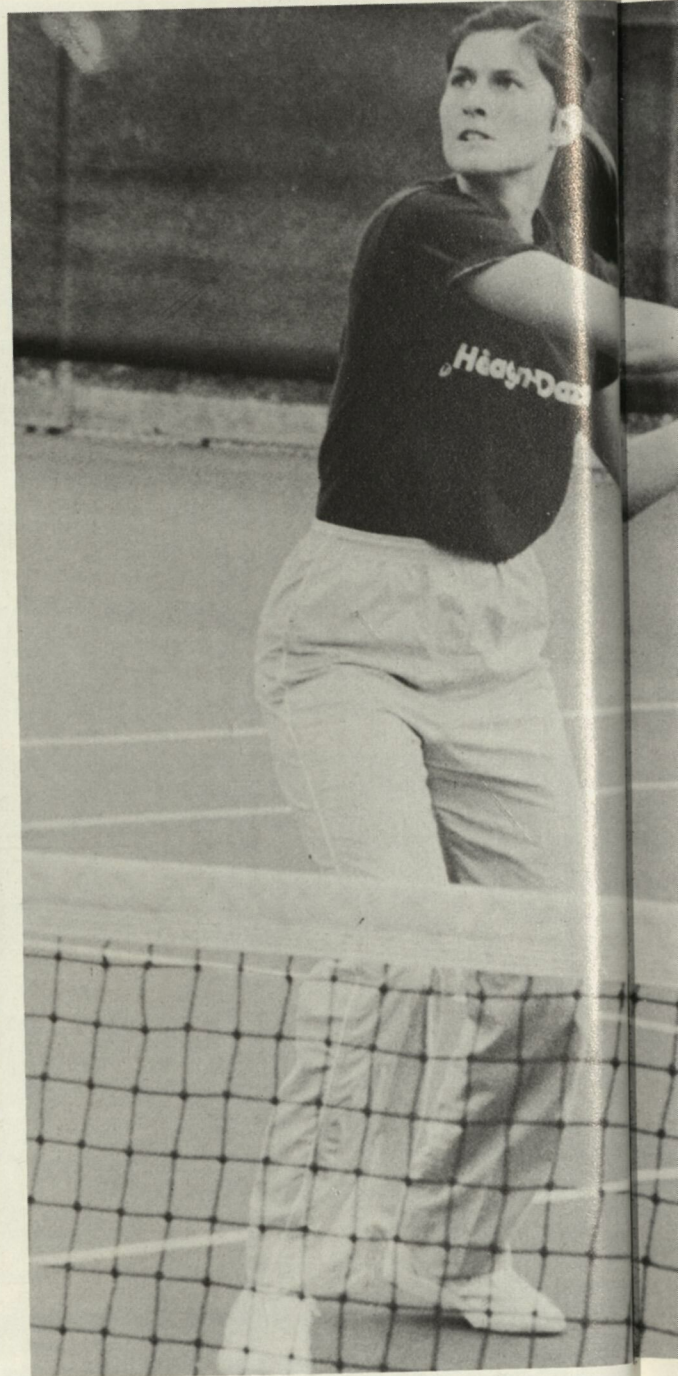
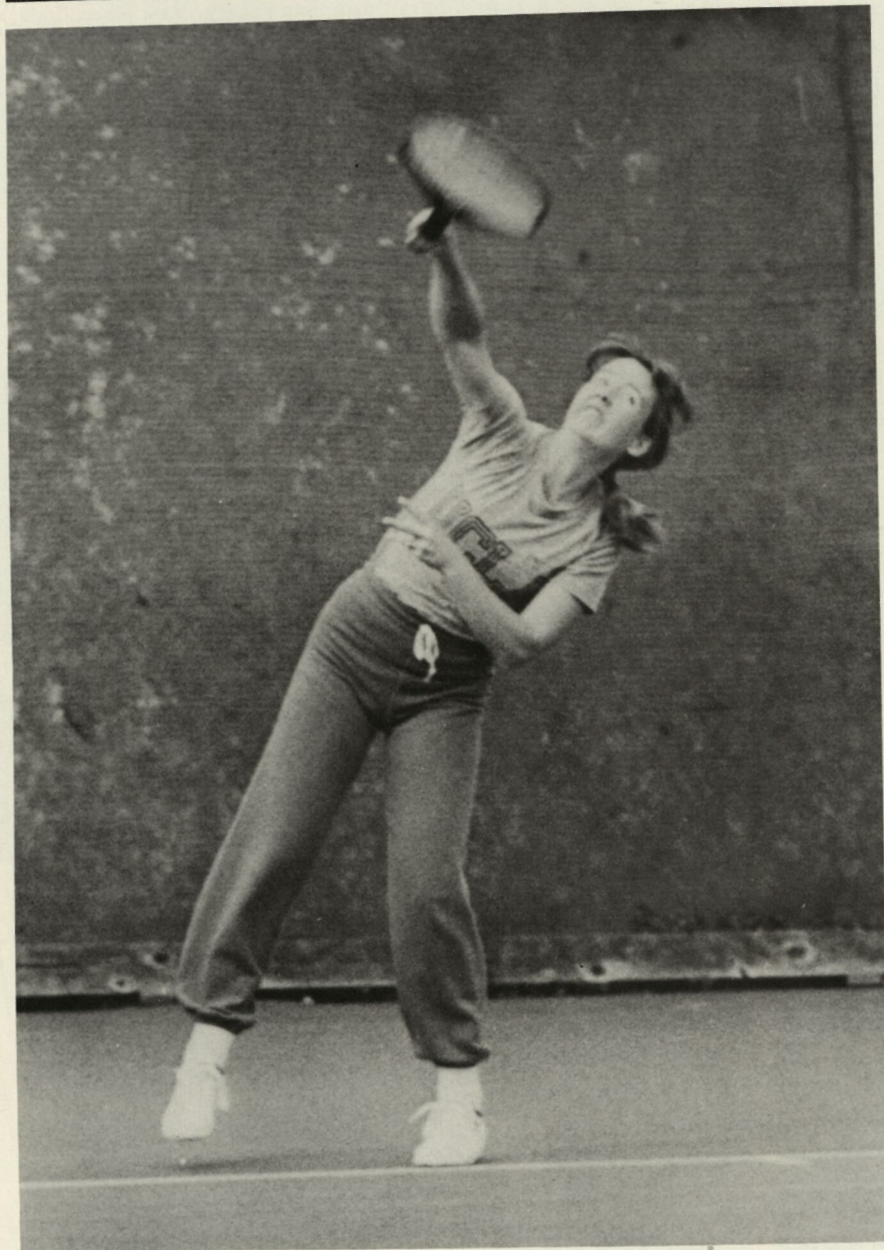


Tennis

Although their tournaments didn't go as planned, the women won more individual matches than in the past.



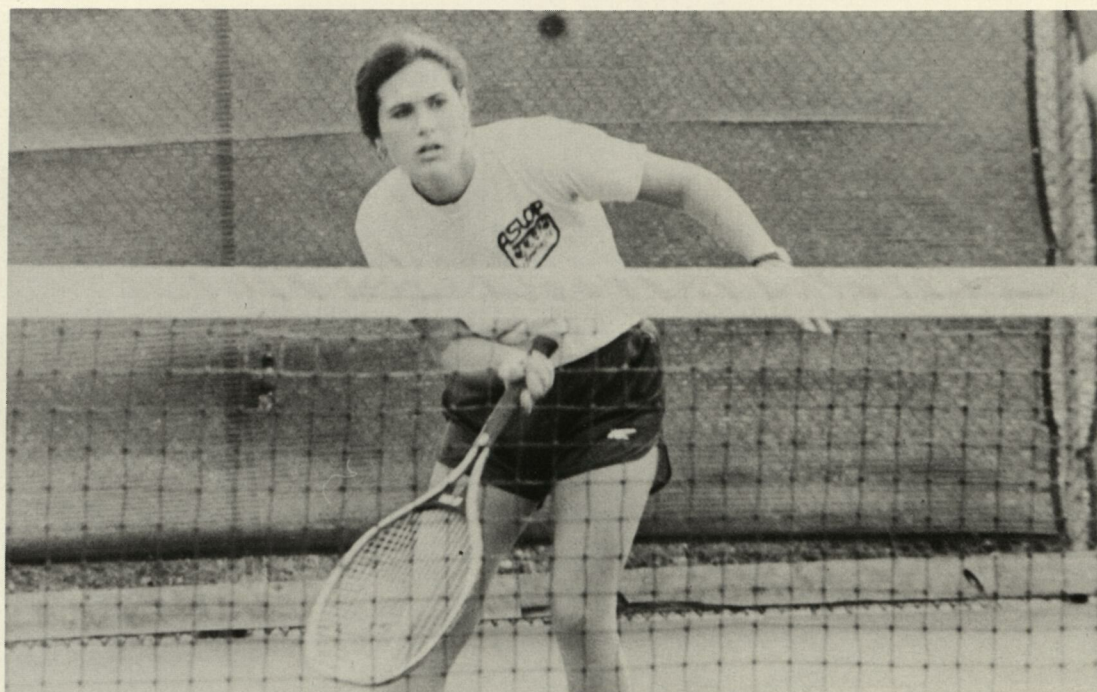
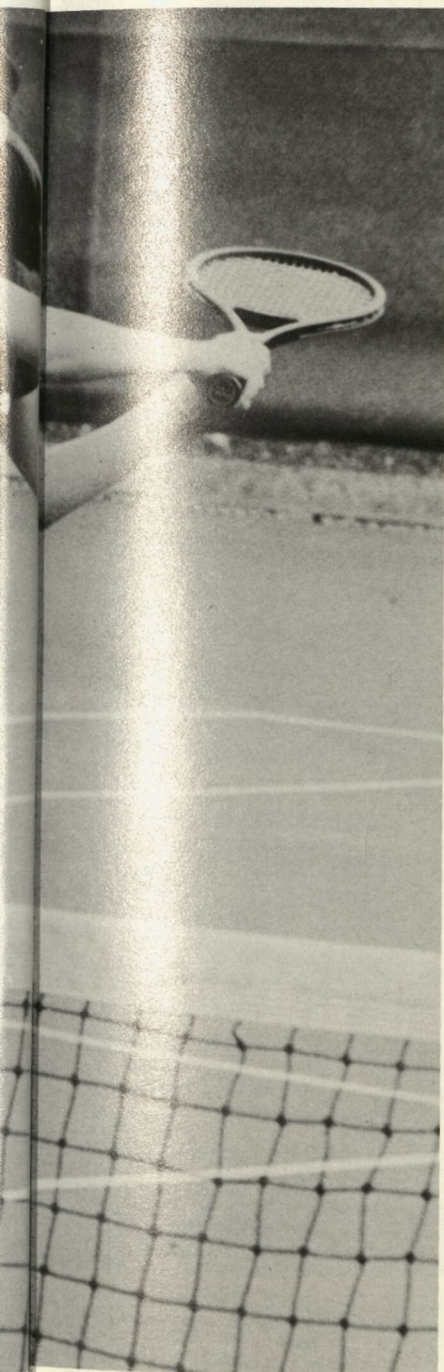

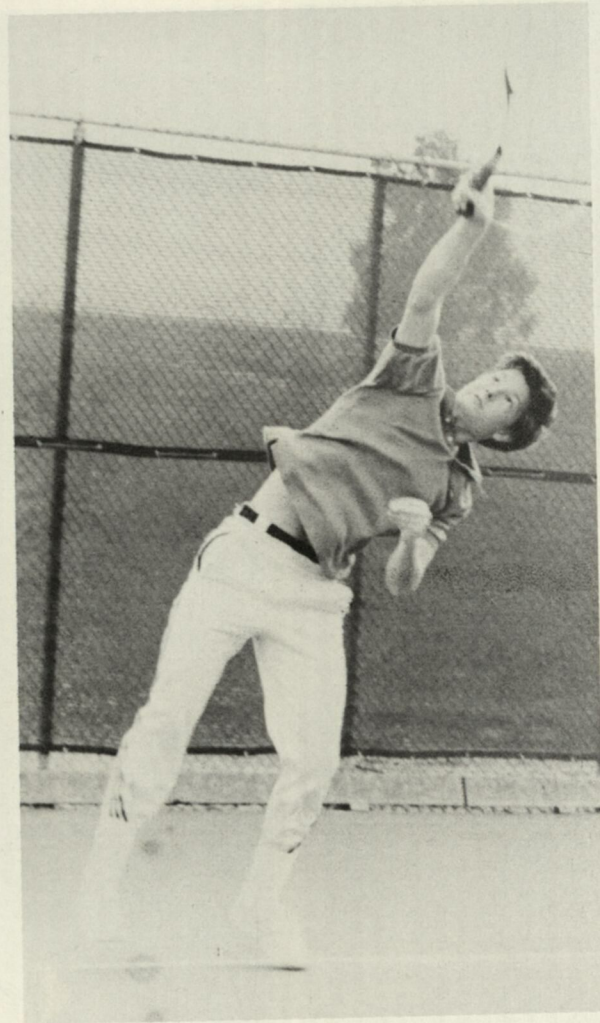
Tennis

The team had a strong year and with the coach/player combinations here at UOP they are assured many more to come.



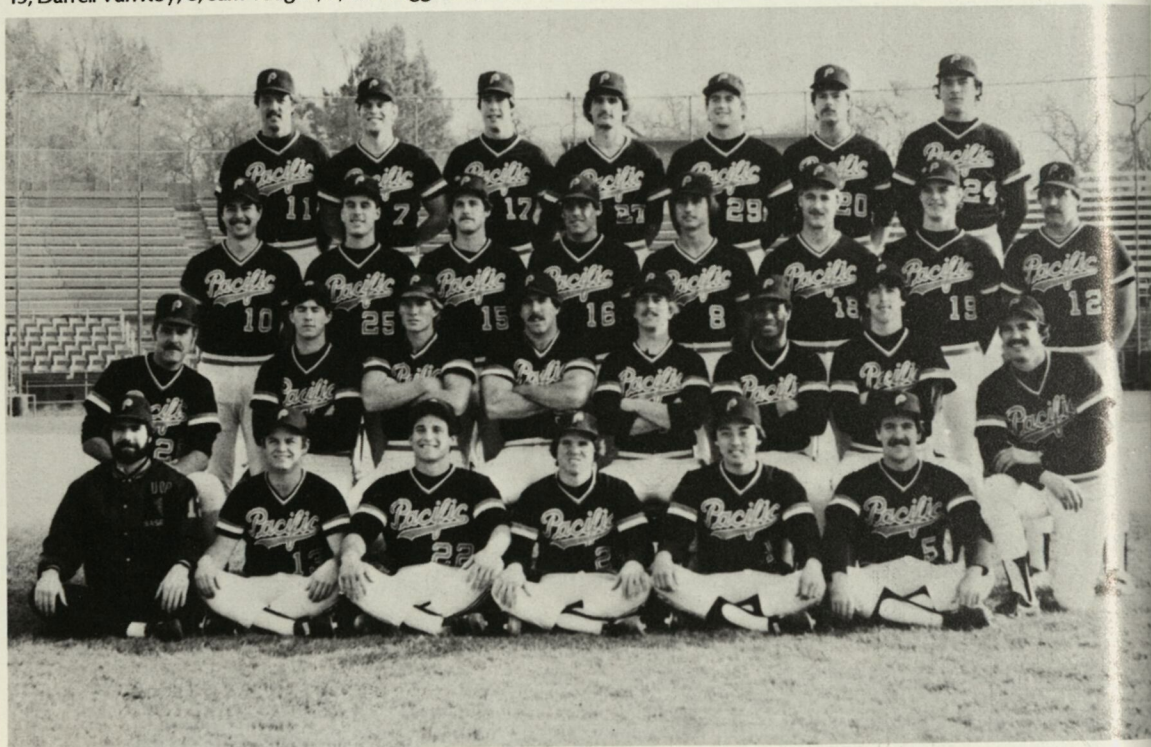
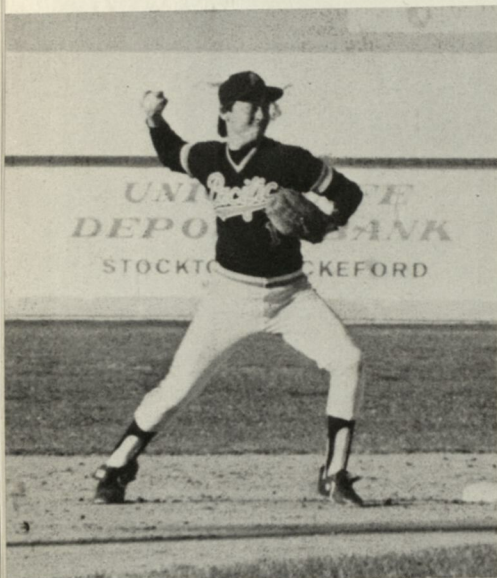
Baseball

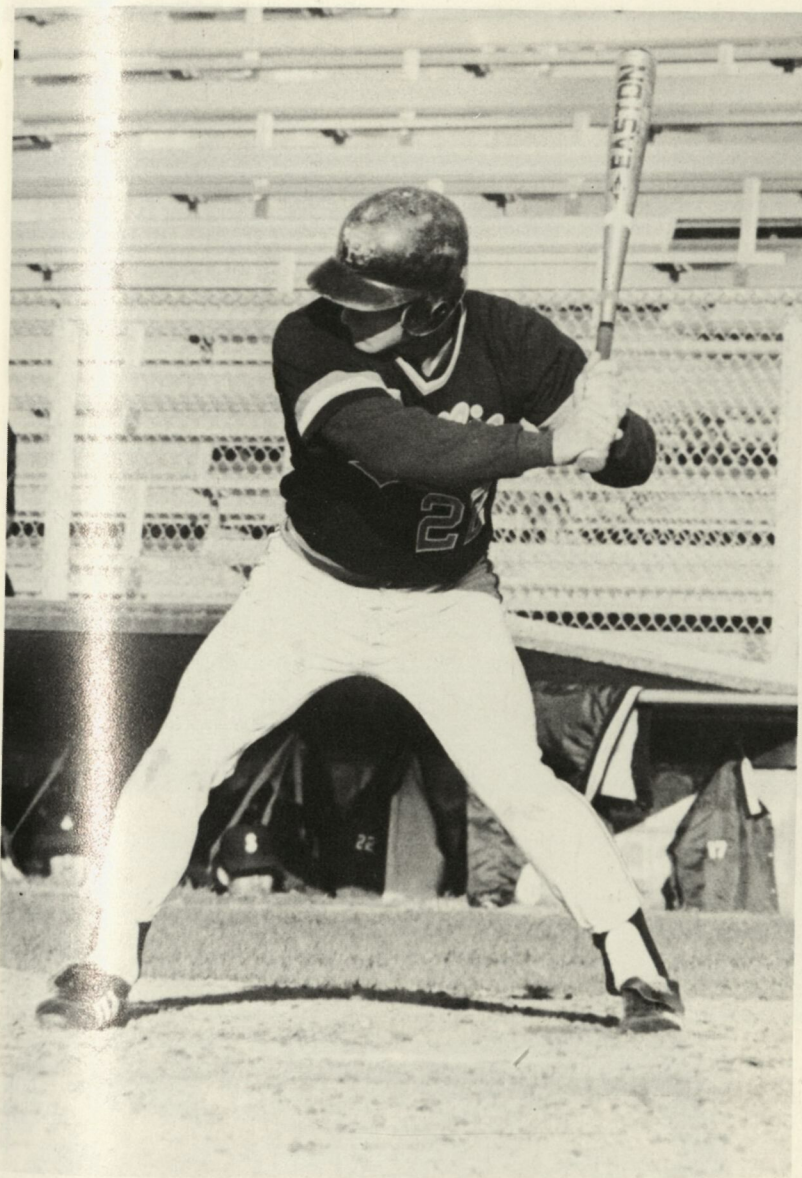

With these, the Tigers gained the potential to win many games and reach for a league championship.



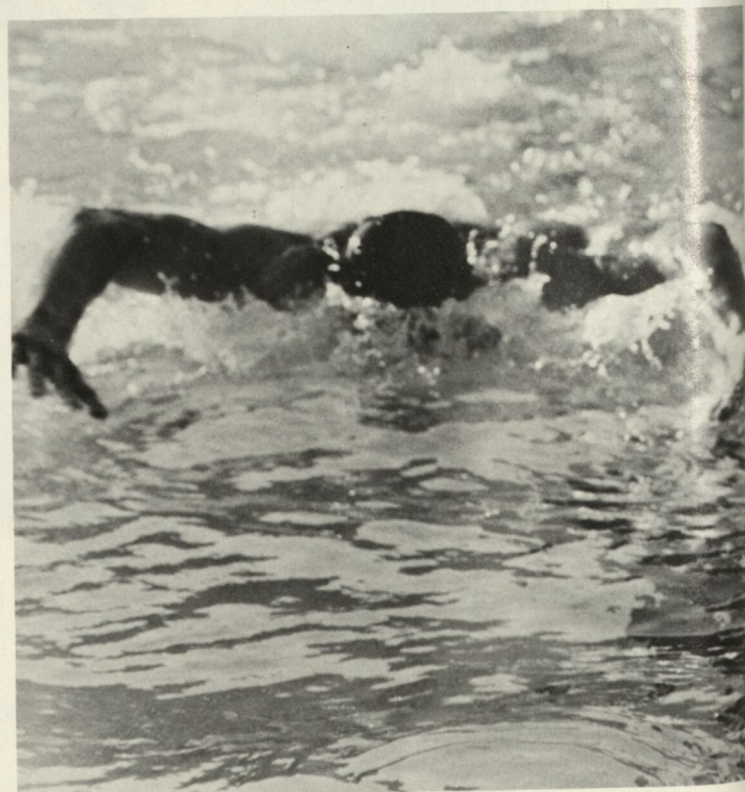
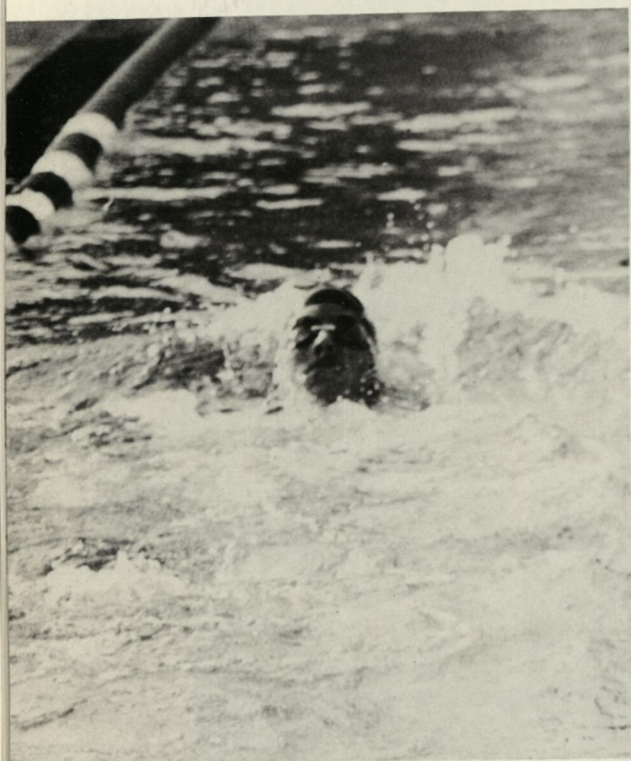
Swimming

tions also proved to be much more favorable last year than in previous years.

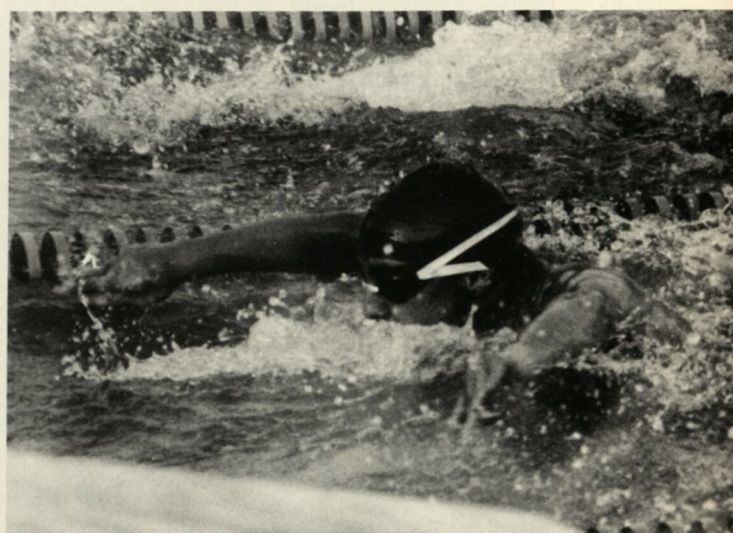
The 25-member team won five of

Coach Nugent expected a good turn around from the previous year and looks ahead to an equally rewarding 1985.



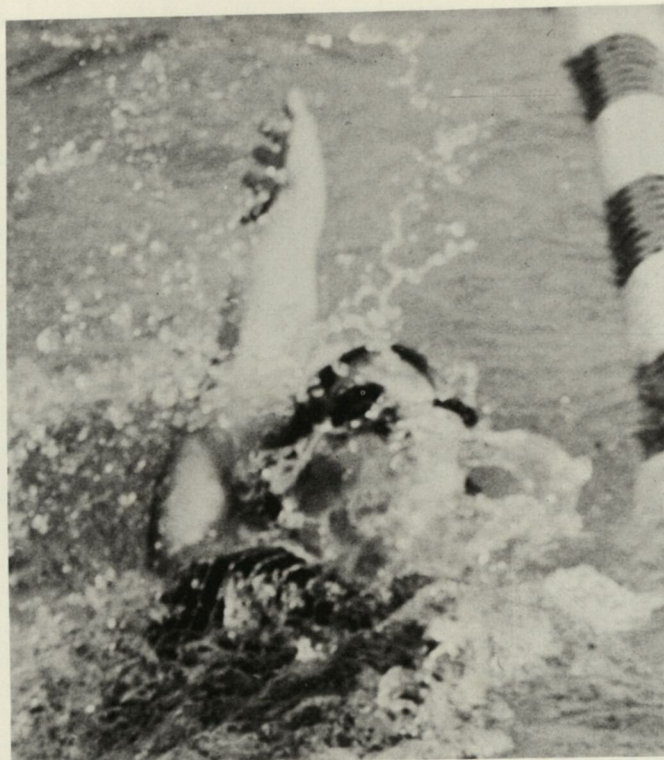
Swimming

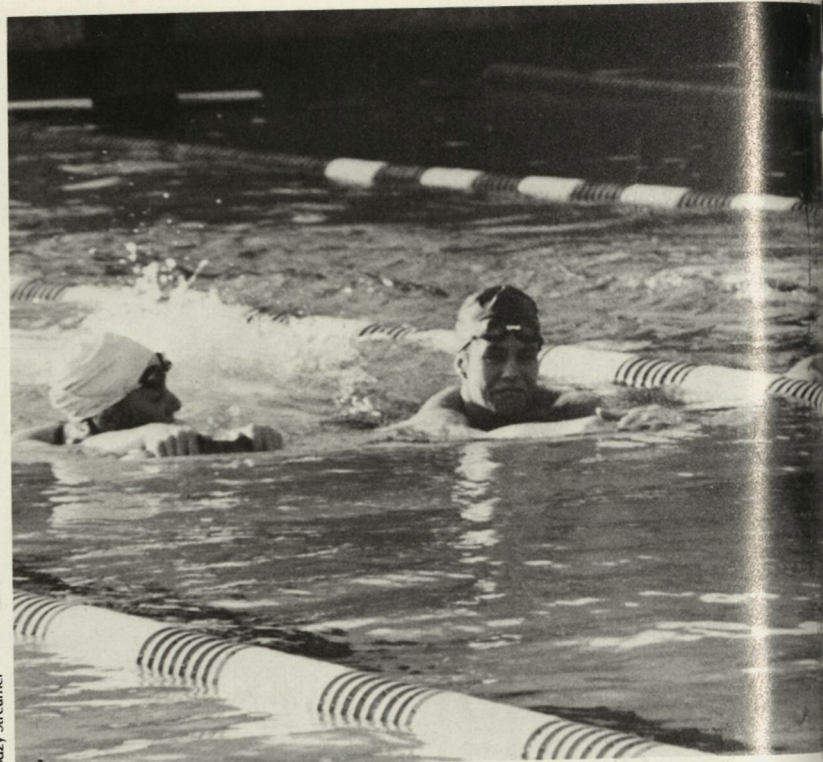
nine sisters and their big brother rather than a swim team. Actually these women are some of the fastest swimmers in California and Gary Dozier is one of the best coaches.

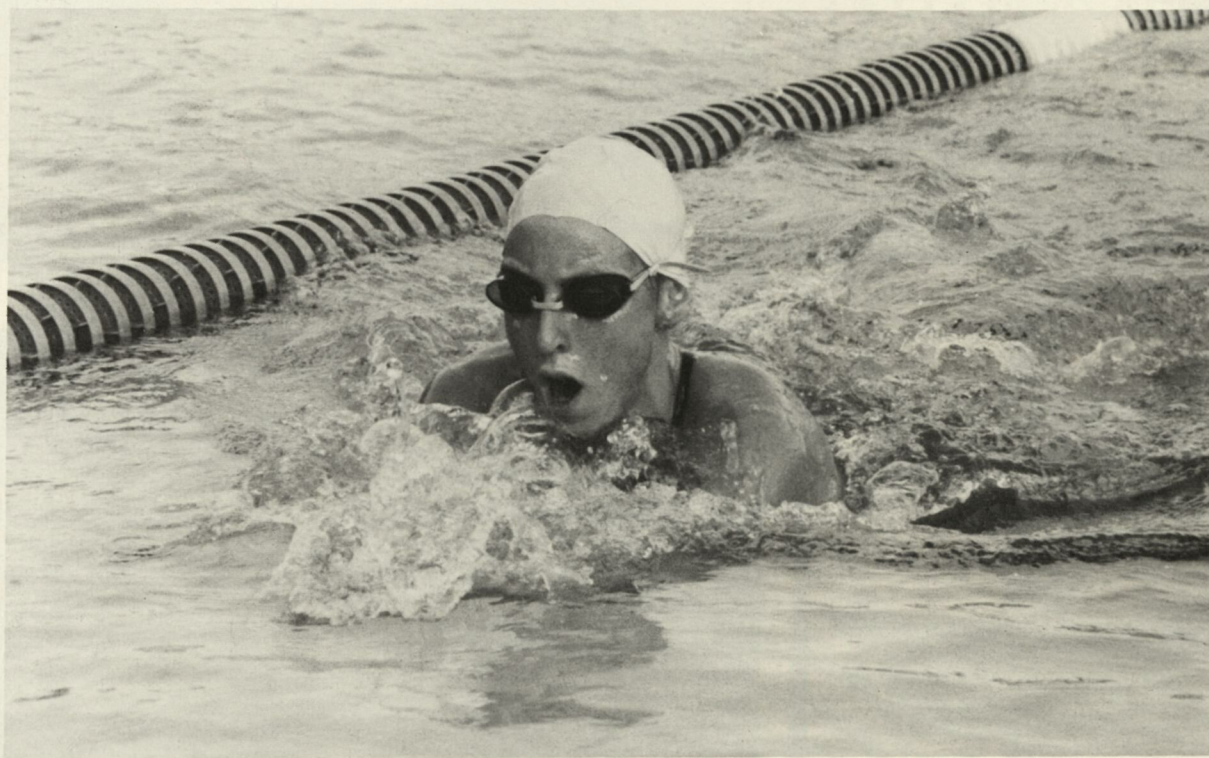
Burton was probably the strongest swimmer stated Coach Gary Dozier. She was State Junior College Champion last year and was the tops in last year's NORPAC tournament.

Board of Regents

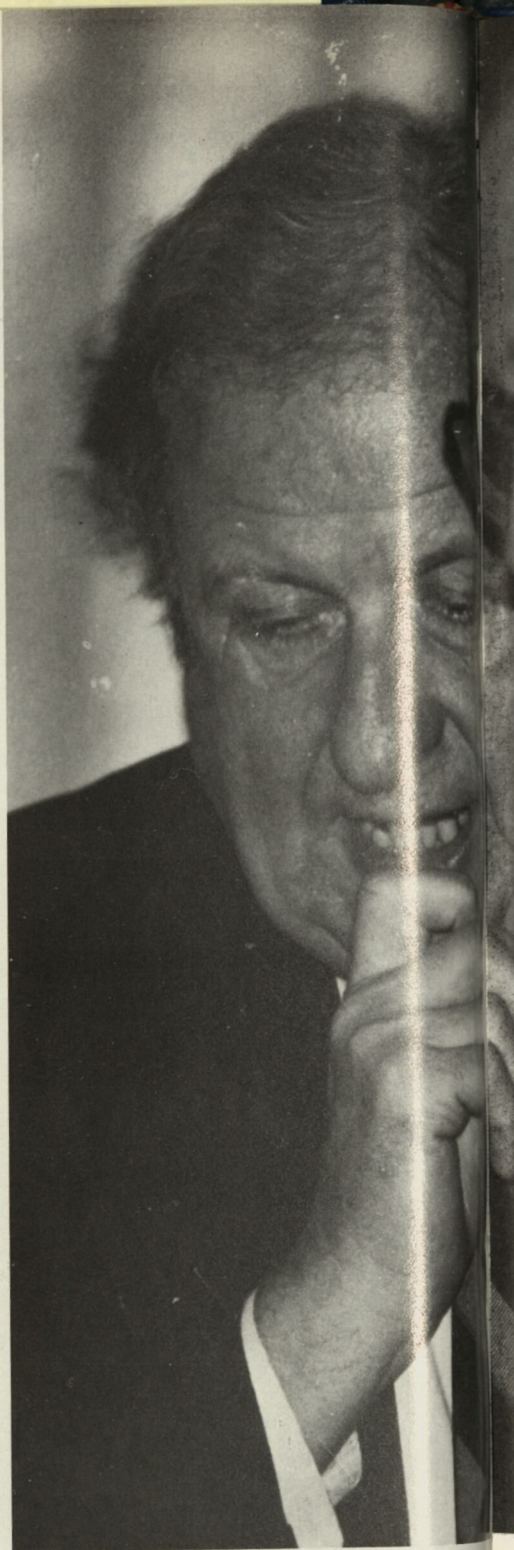
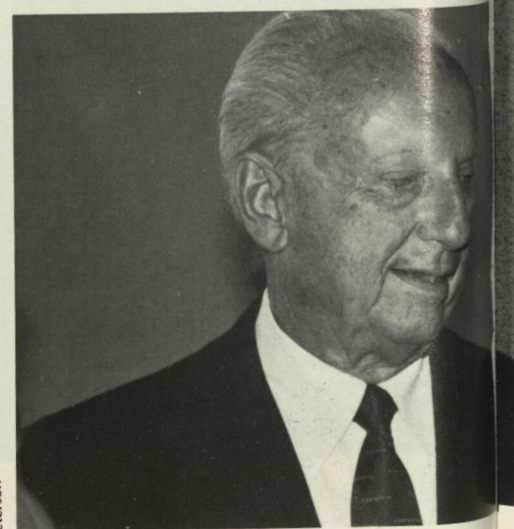
Degree, Nominating and other special committees.

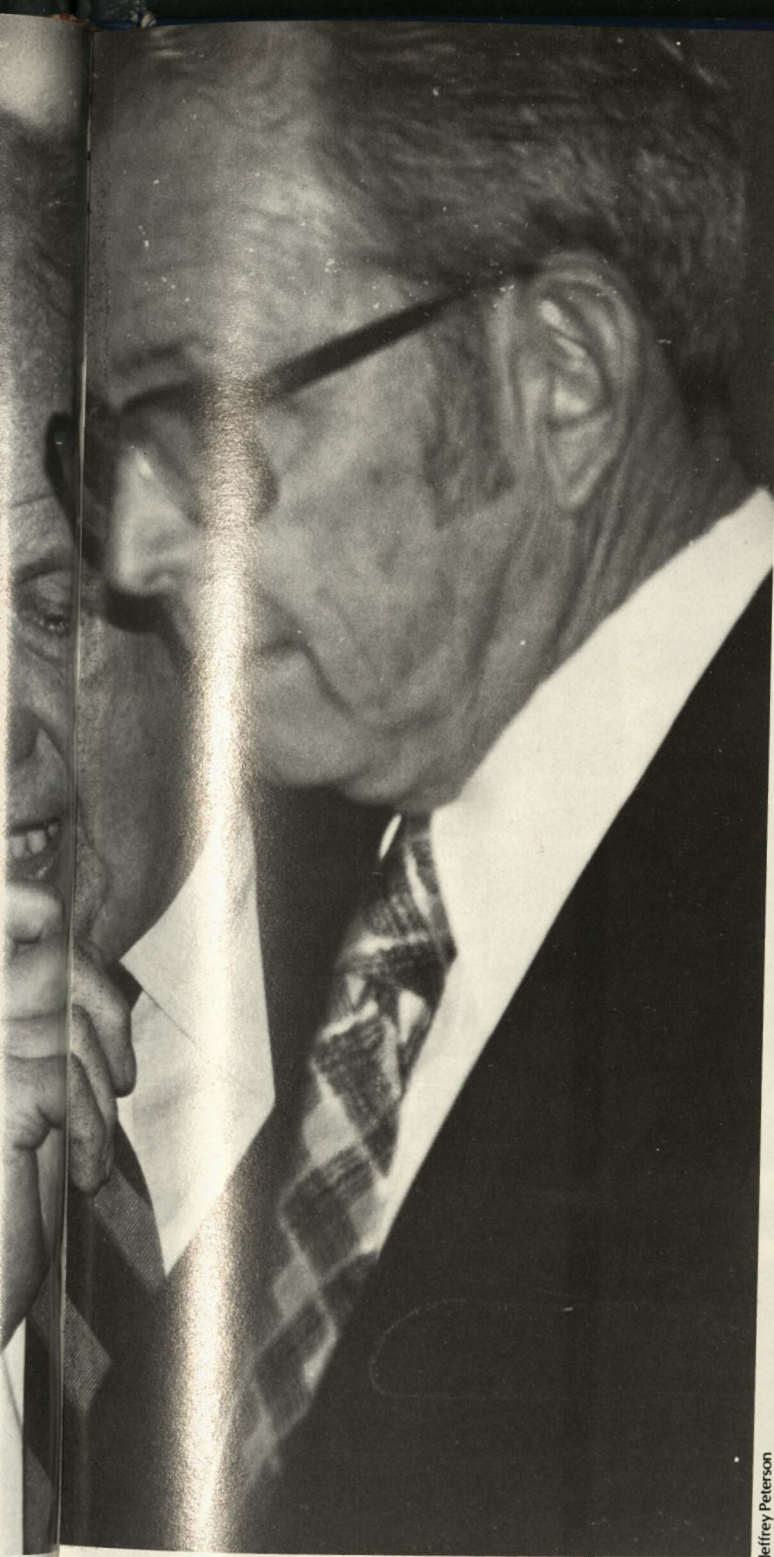
As a self-perpetuating board, the new members are elected by current members after a committee nomination of fellow Regents. Each Regent is elected to a six-year term.

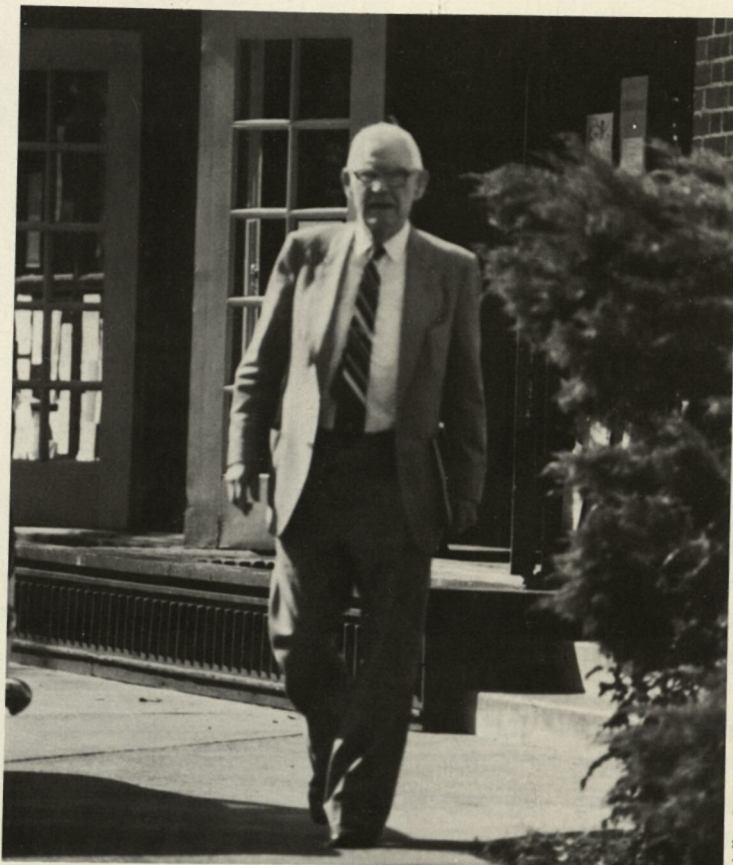

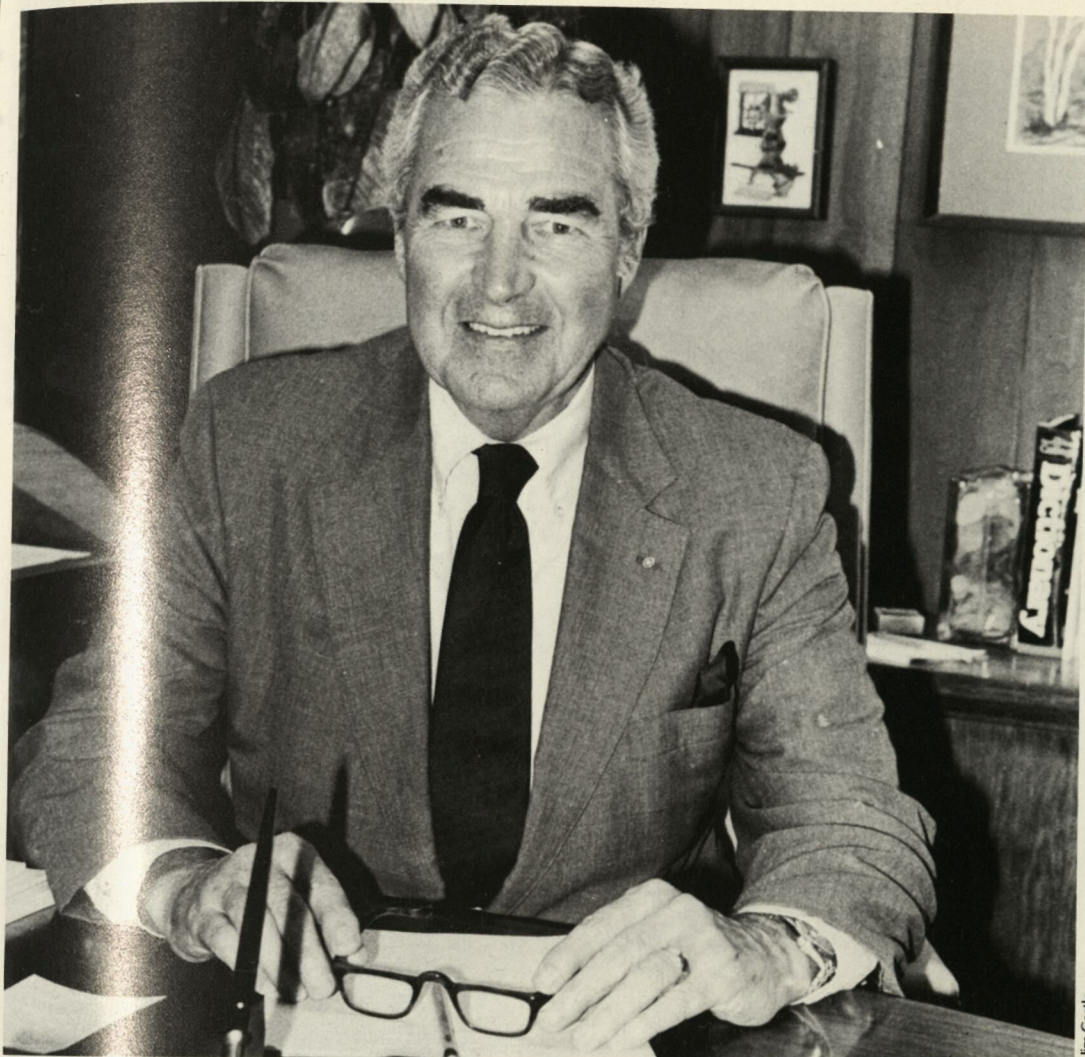
McCaffery stresses the prepara-

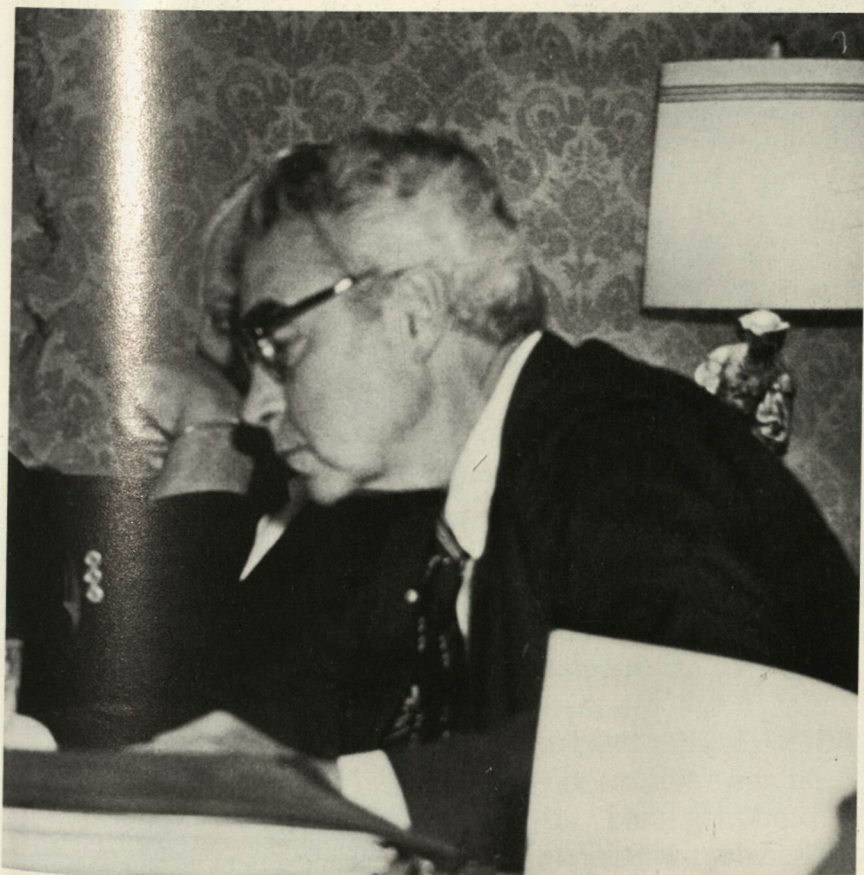

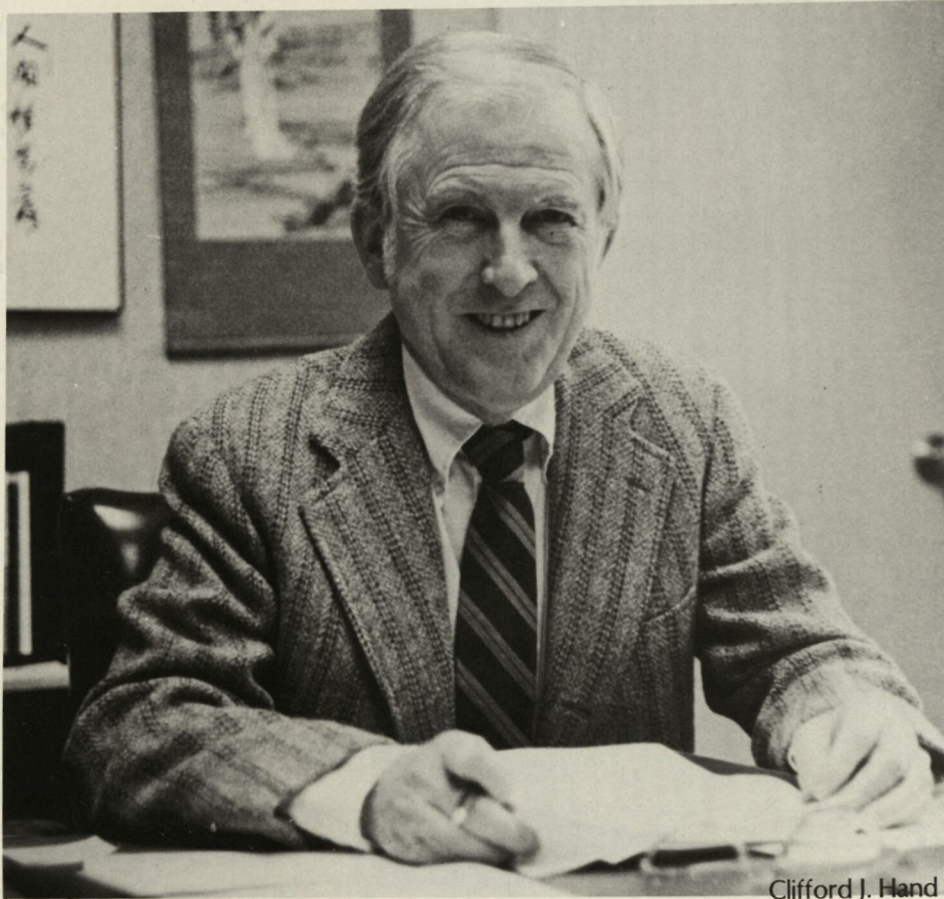

Vice President-Executive Assistant, Clifford L. Dochterman, deals mainly with external relations of UOP. The office produces financial development programs using communication as a main source of production.

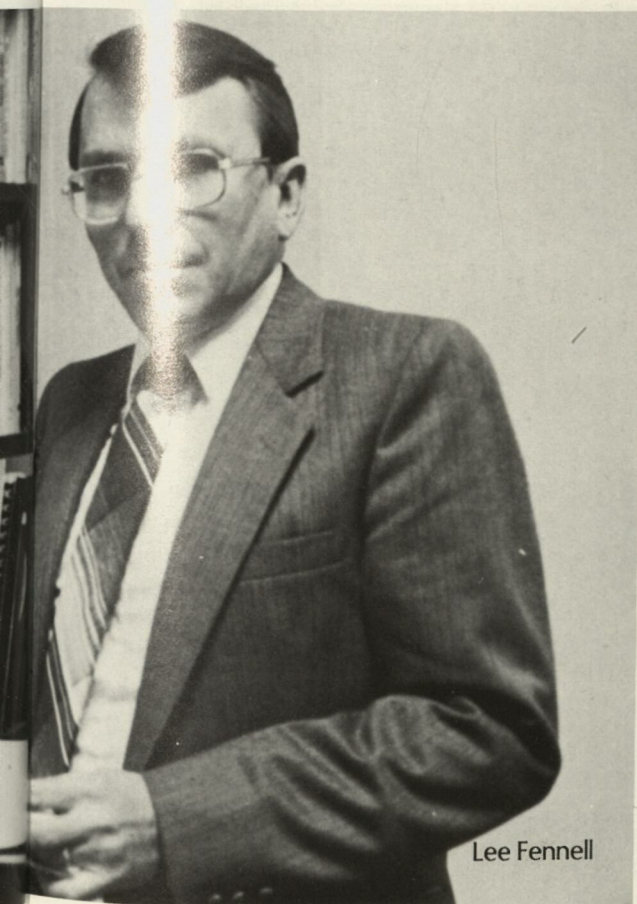

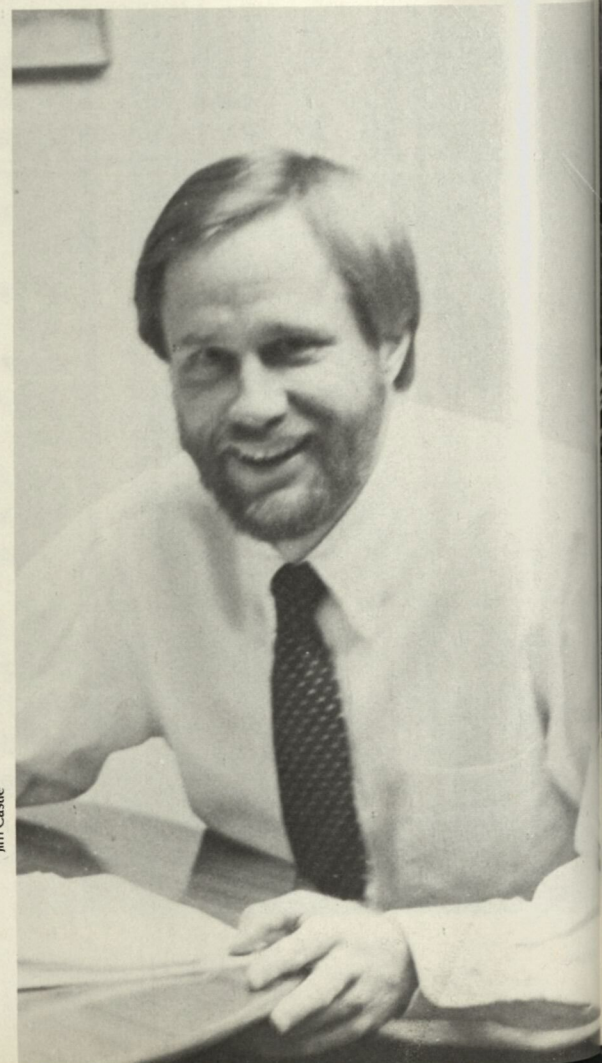

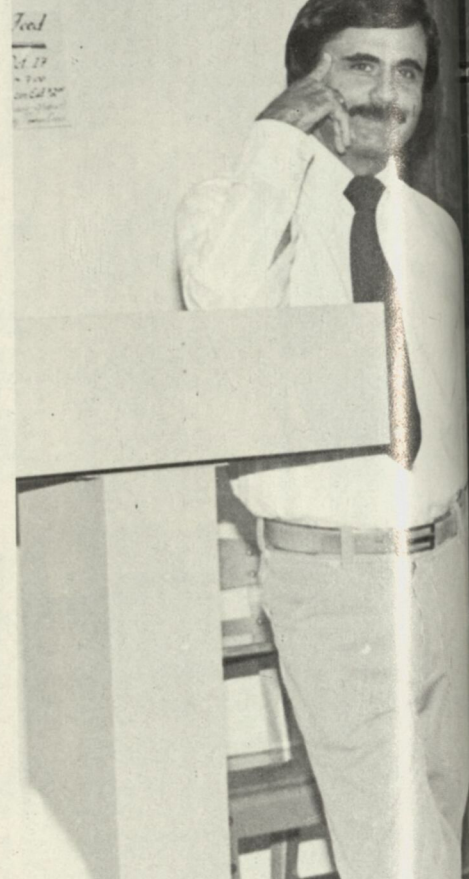
The College of the Pacific, established in 1851, remains as one of the outstanding liberal arts colleges in the nation.

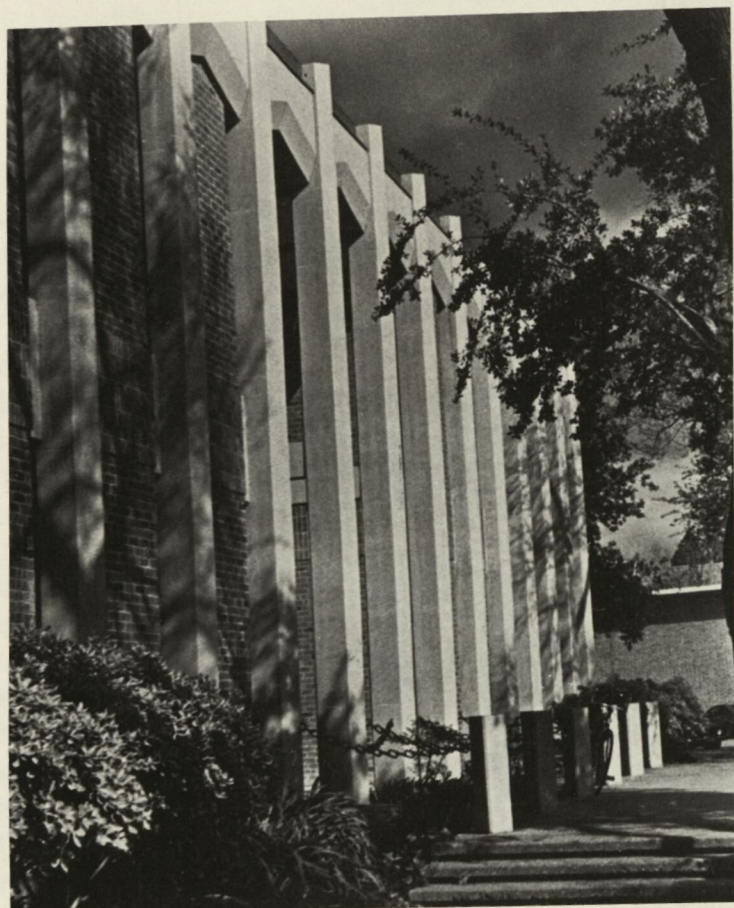

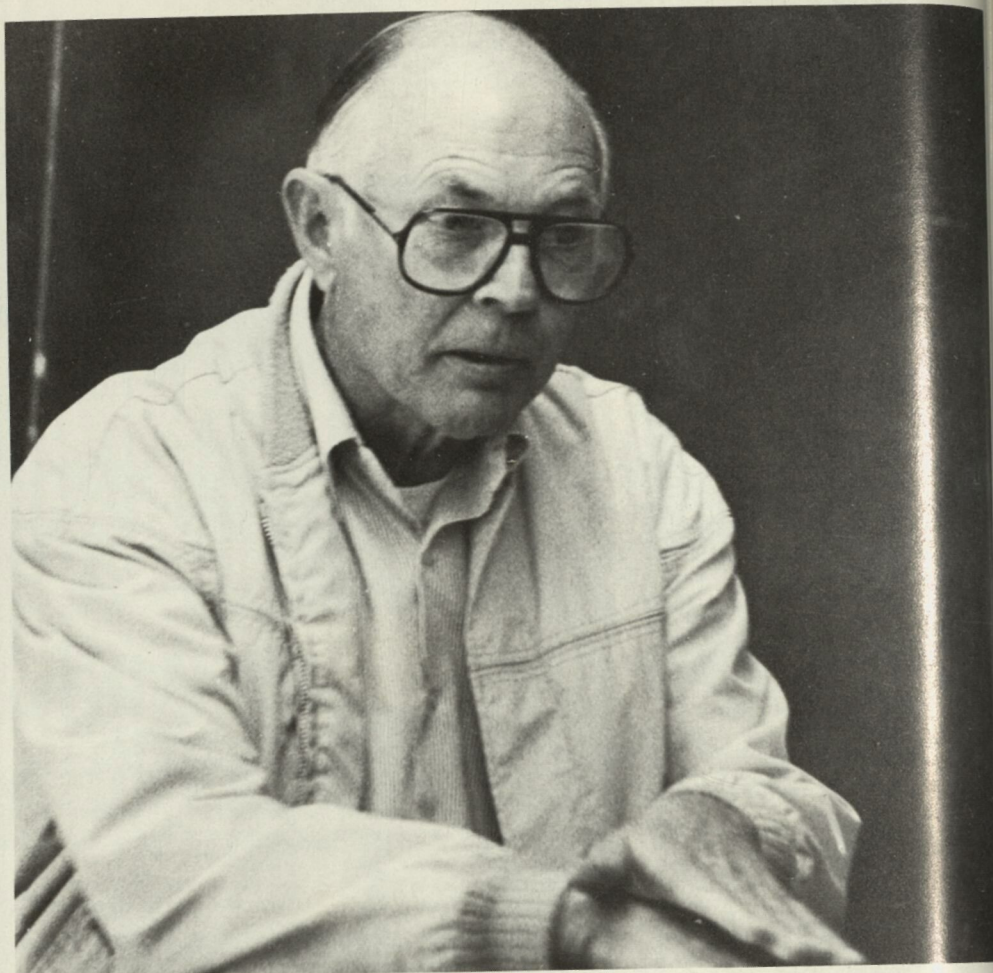

In 1878, the University of the Pacific Conservatory of Music was founded to establish a training program to help prepare talented students to enter the music profession.

Today, over 156 students are enrolled in the Conservatory of Music. These students include undergraduates, graduates and interns working towards careers in music and business. The Conservatory offers the Bachelor of Music degree with majors in performance, theory and composition, music history, music education, music therapy and music management/business.

The UOP Conservatory of Music is a contemporary, growing and vital part of the Pacific campus, continually striving to better educate and prepare its students to enter the many aspects of the musical profession.

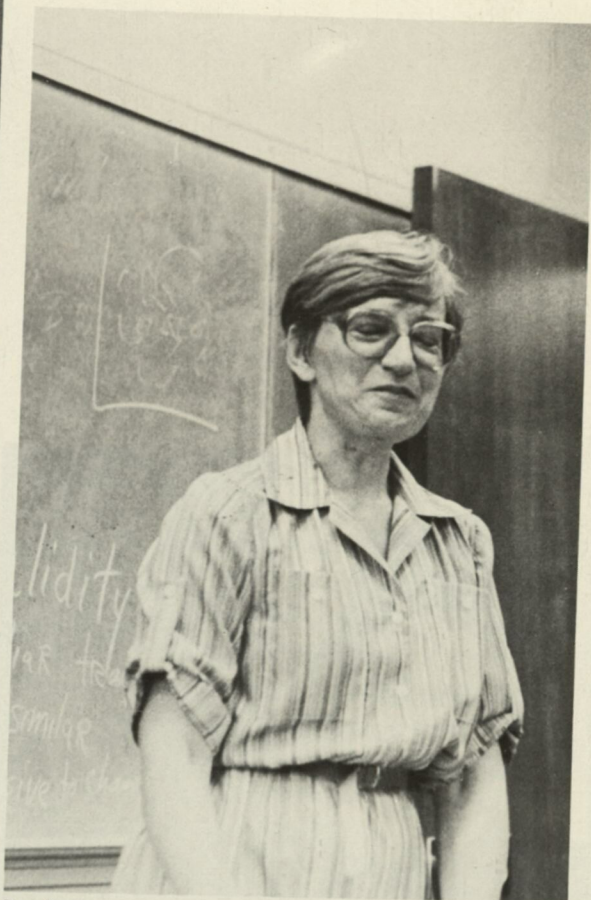
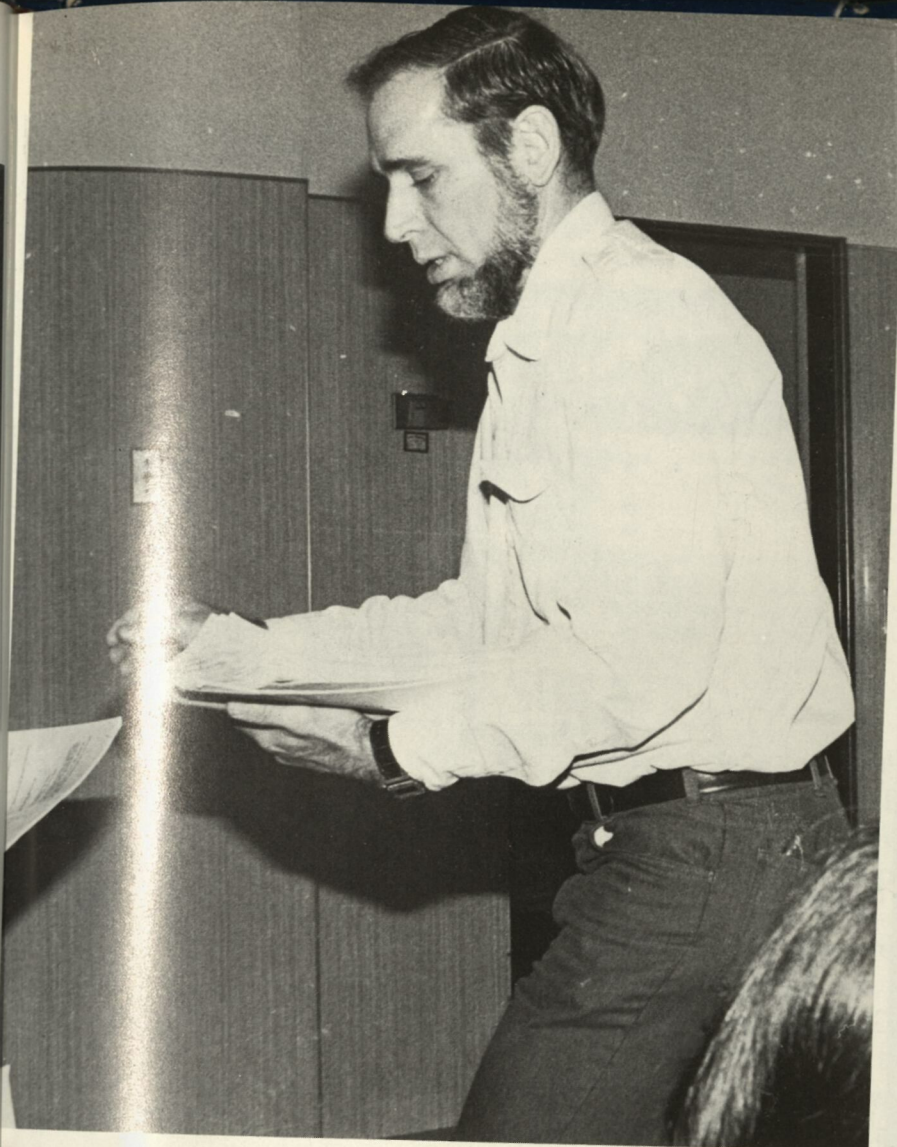

The School of Engineering at the University of the Pacific offers a distinctive engineering program. UOP was the first school in the West to require completion of a co-op program for engineering students. To graduate, a student must spend one year of five work-

ing in the industry. During the two semesters of co-op, the students earn the average of fourteen thousand dollars. More importantly, co-ops give the student valuable on-the-job training and insight into their future profession.

Besides the required work off campus, many closely-knit student groups have formed on-campus within the Engineering School. The Associated Engineering Students offers a variety of social and academic functions to which all engineering students are invited. Student sectors

tors of professional, civil, women, mechanical, and electrical engineers provide professionally-oriented programs throughout the year.

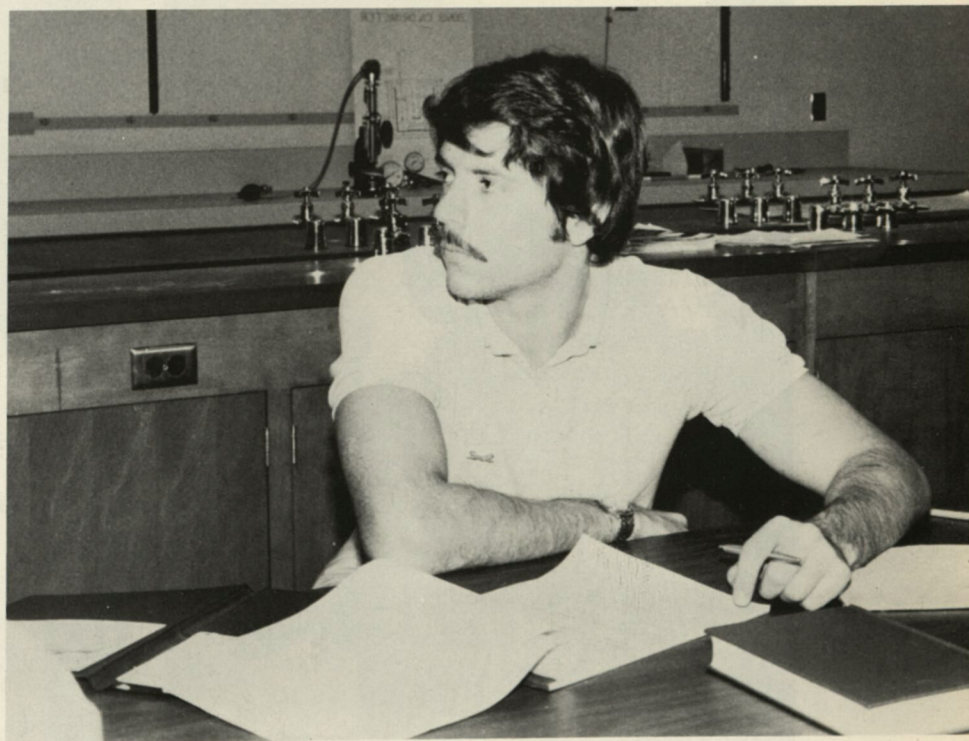
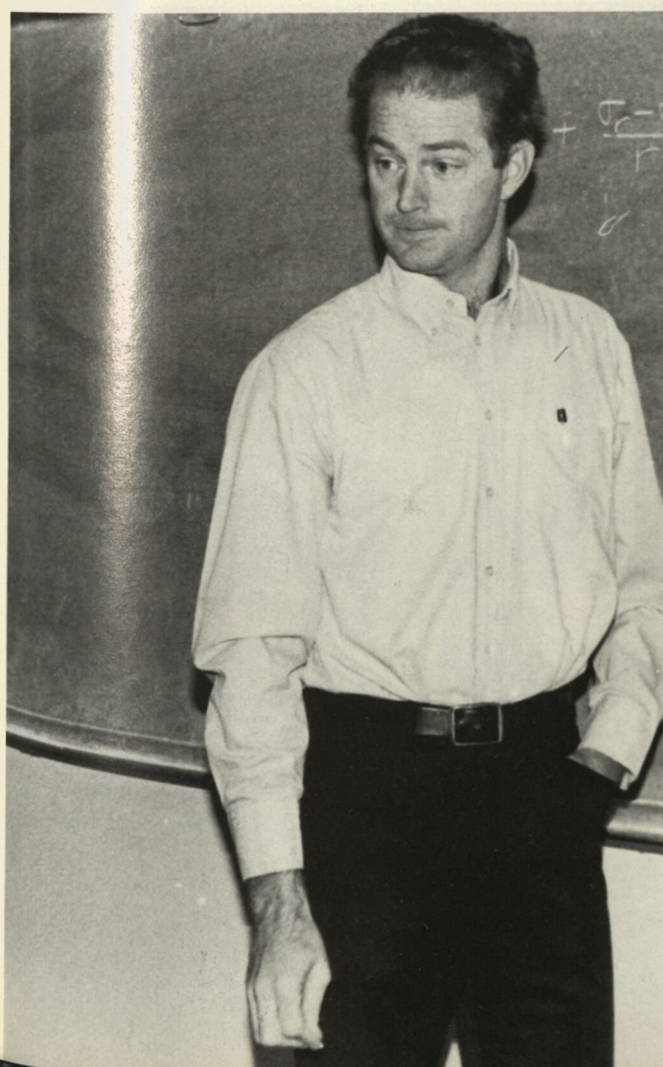

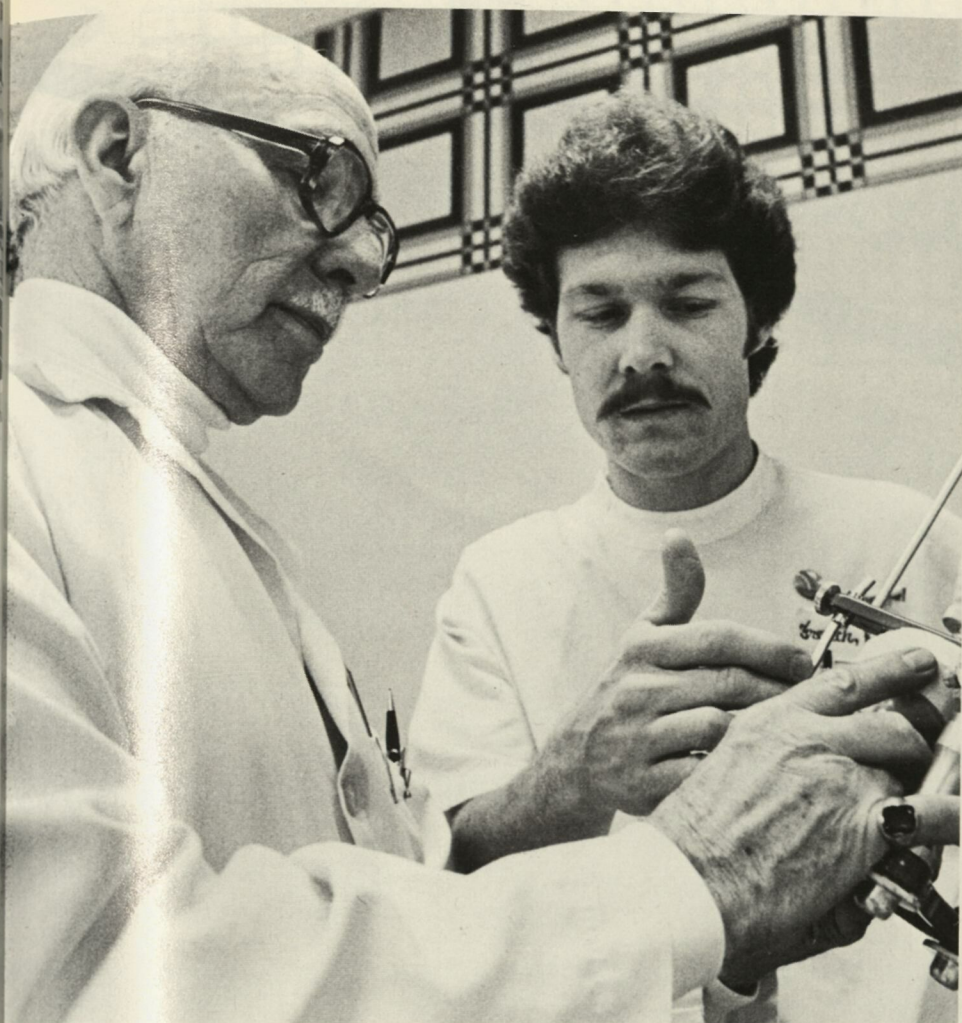
McGeorge

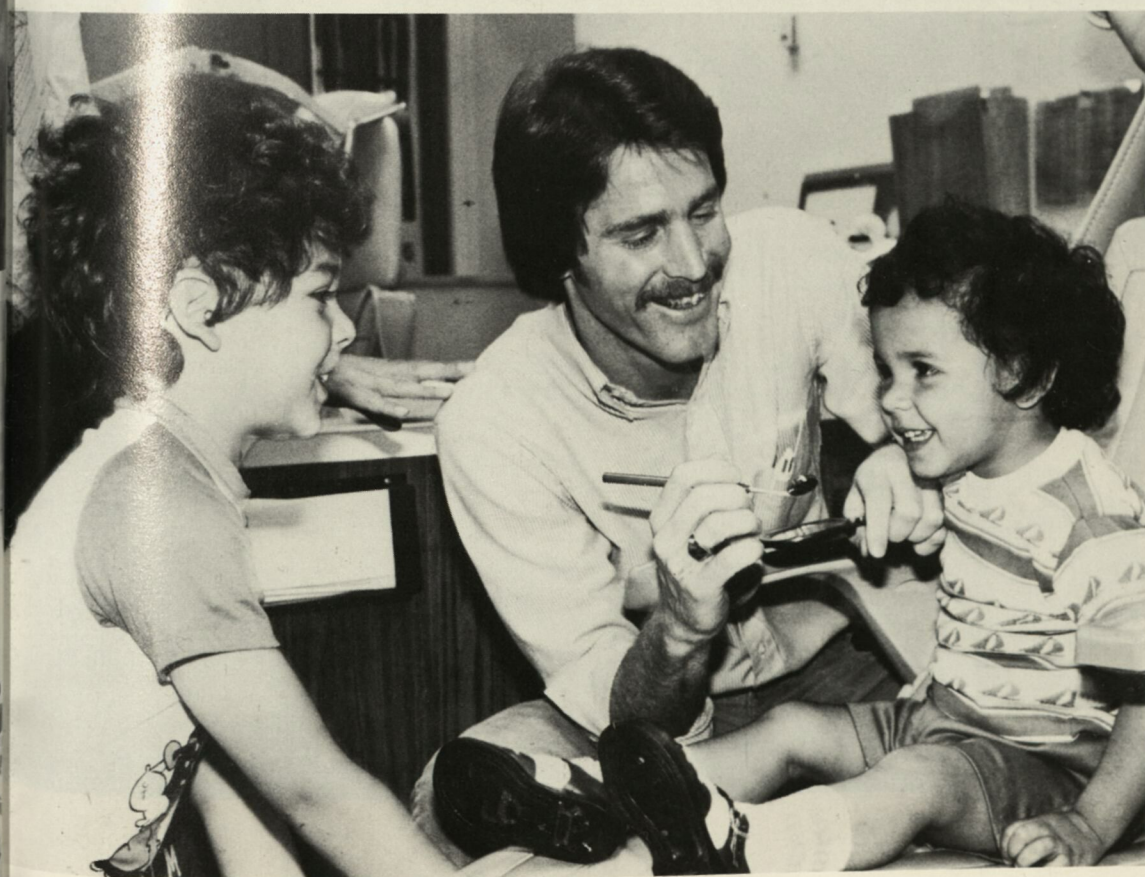




Dental

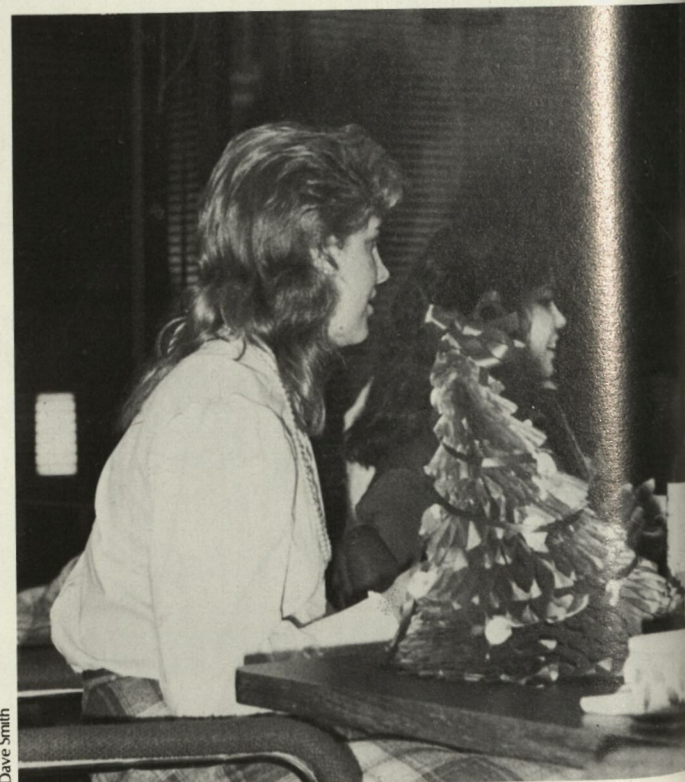


RHA

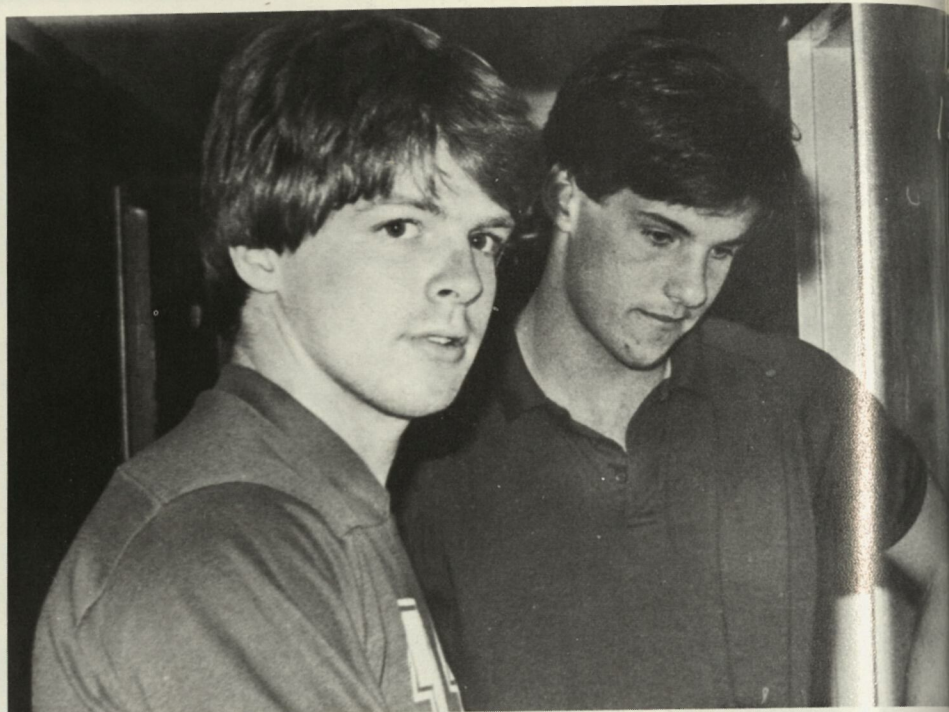
At "the Zoo"

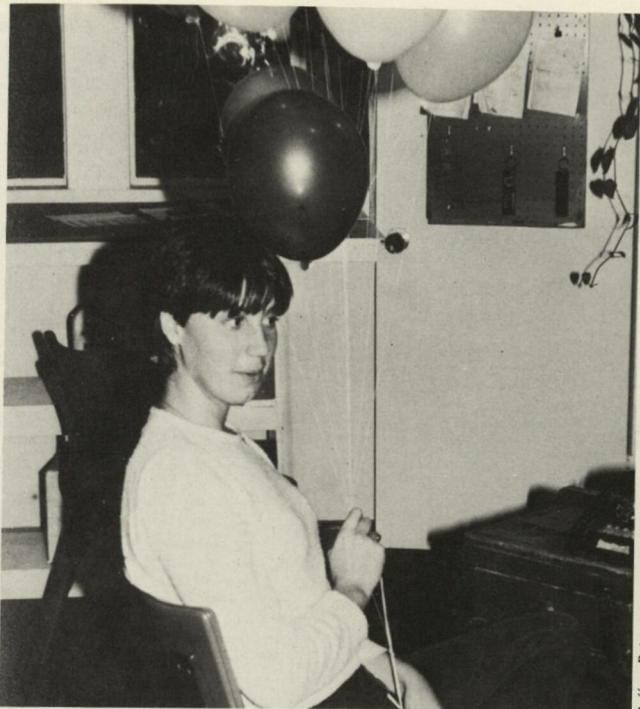
Built in 1958, Grace Covell Hall began as an all-girl dormitory. In the 60's it changed to co-ed and soon after acquired the nickname "the Zoo."

The highlights of Grace Covell last year were winning the Anchor Splash competition and having Saverio DeLuca as their representative win the Homecoming King Competition.

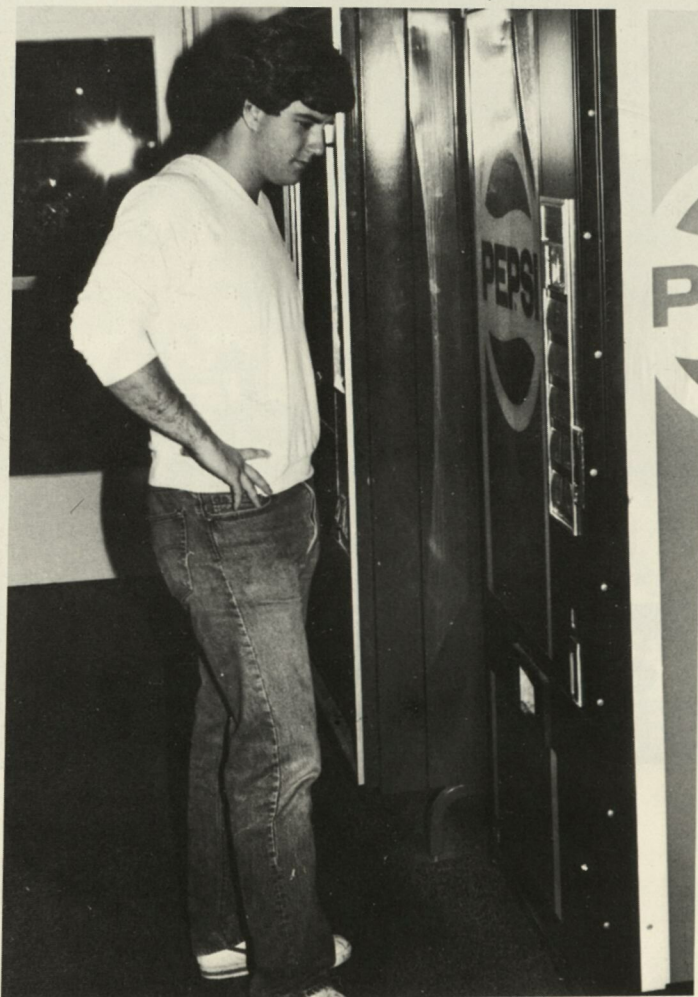

There's no doubt that with a little effort, living in the quads can provide memorable experiences and long lasting friendships.

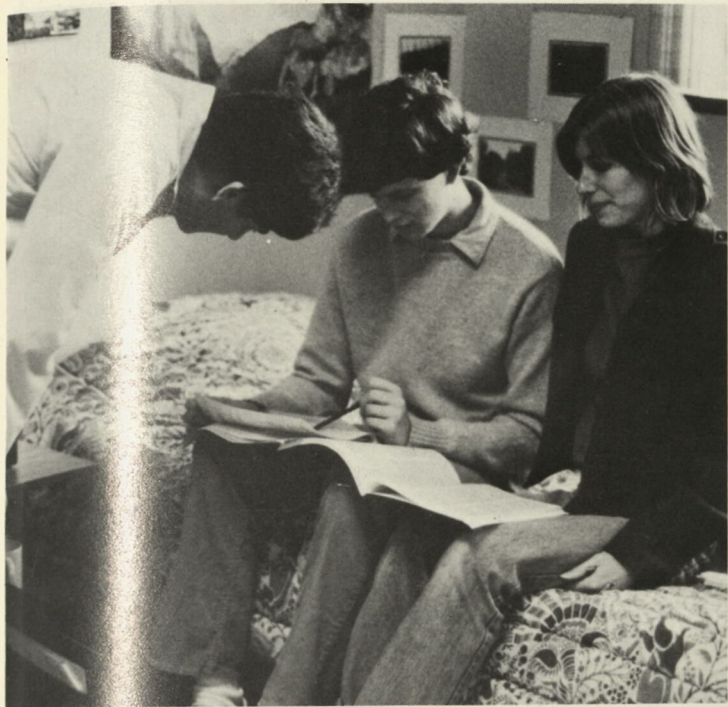

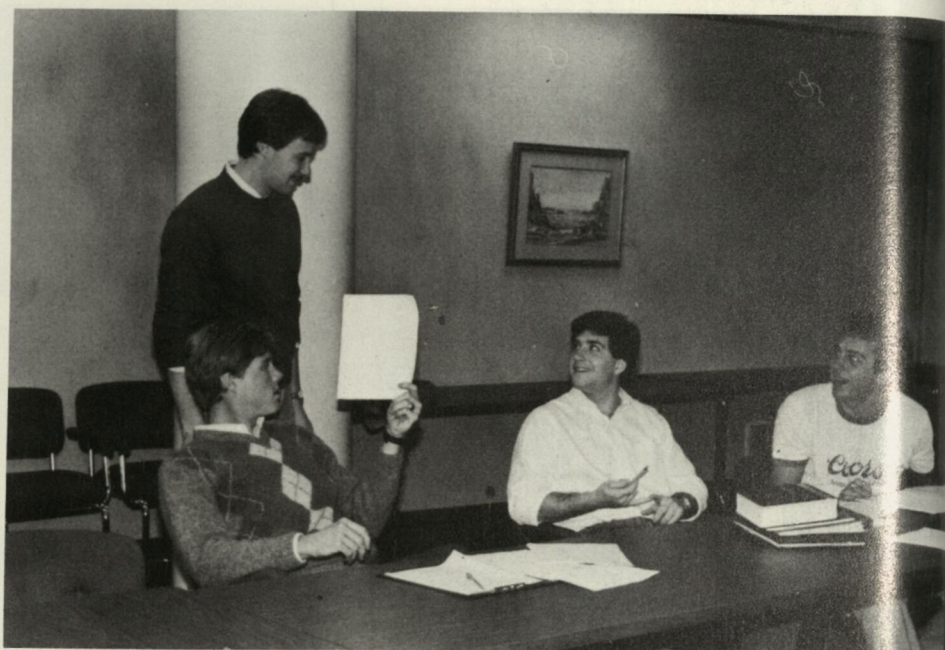


IFC

The Panhellenic Council expanded last year to include Delta Sigma Theta and Alpha Kappa Alpha under their constitution and with representation.

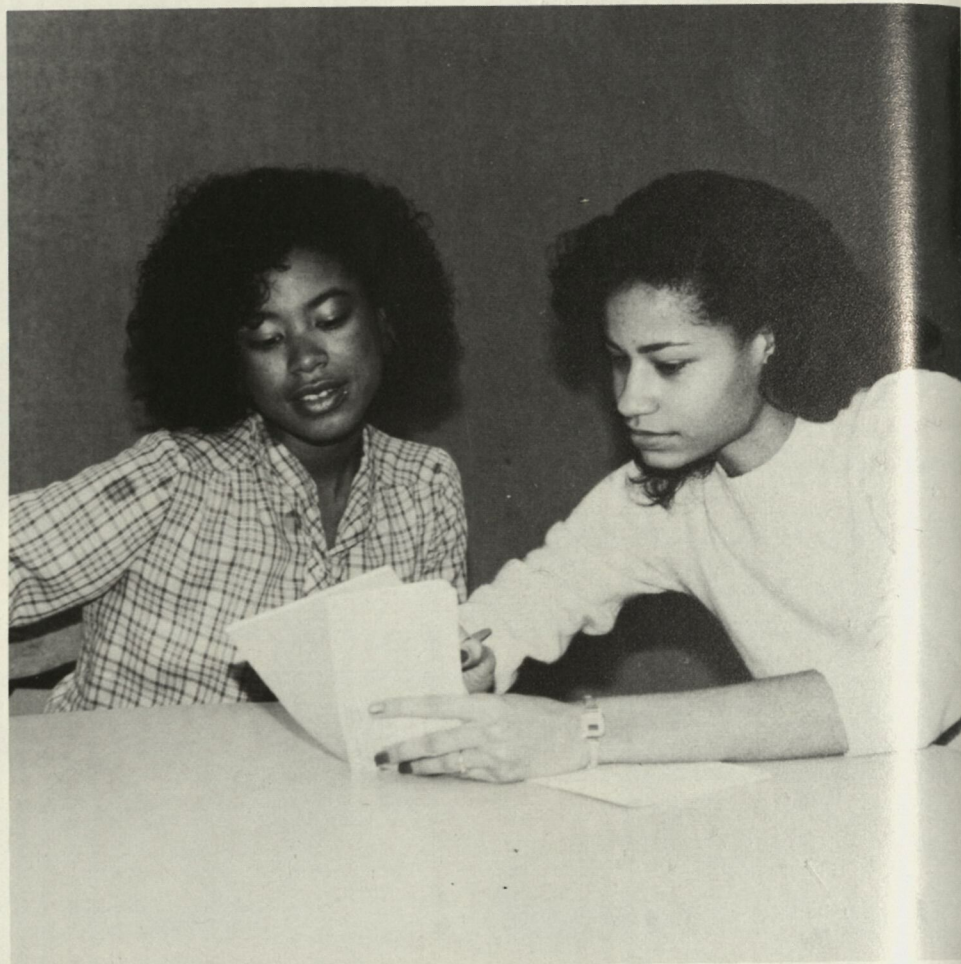
Alpha Kappa Alpha

Founded in 1908 in Washington DC, Alpha Kappa Alpha has been a recognized sorority at UOP since 1978.

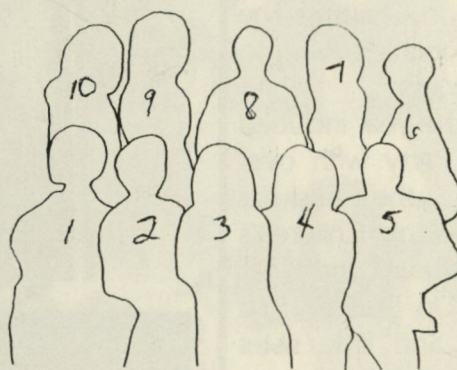
Last year, this national sorority sponsored a convalescent Home Program and a clothes drive for the needy.

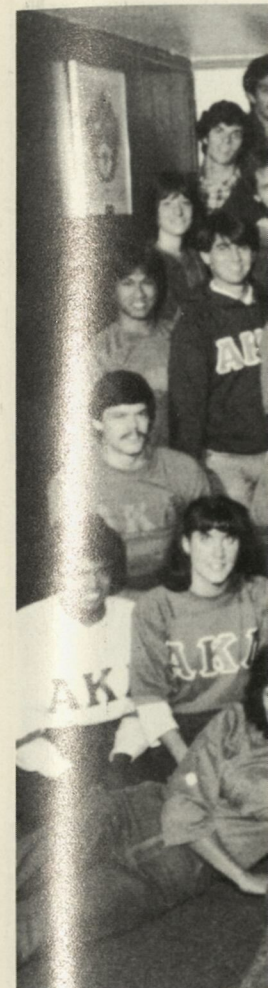

The house remained an important part of the growth, unity and diversity of Archania's ever-strengthening brotherhood.

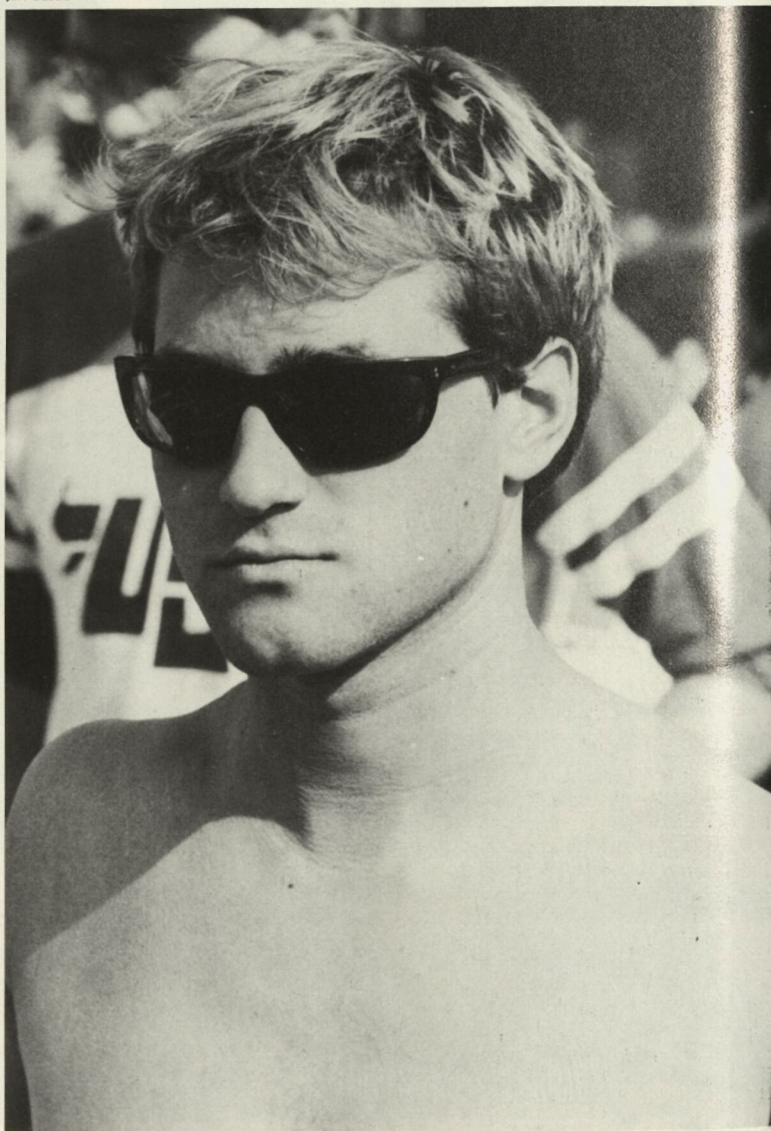

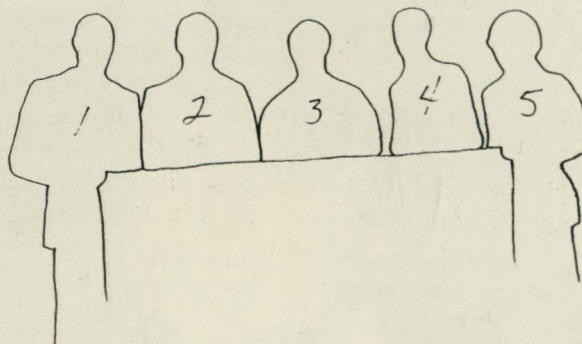

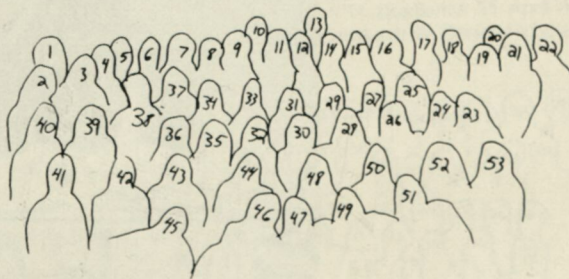

On campus, Thetas were out and about in Student Advising, Resident Assistants, Mortar Board, the Tennis Team, the Pacifican and much more.

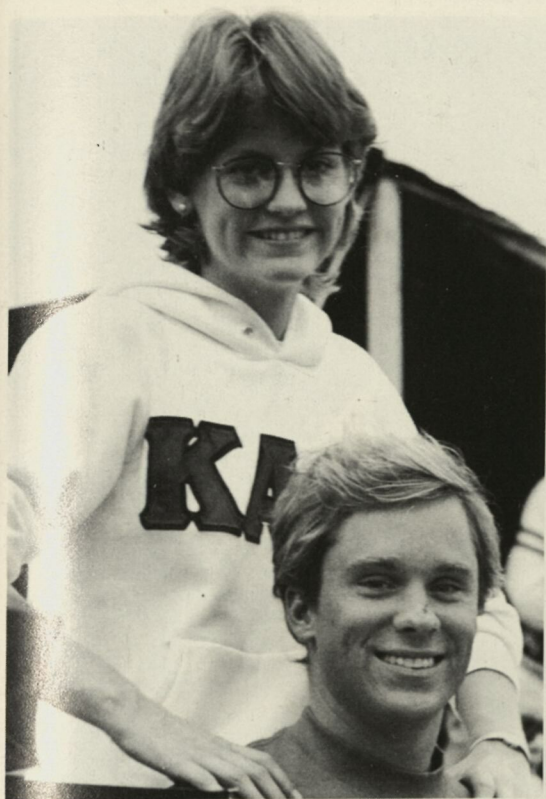

Kappa Psi takes pride in being the first Professional Pharmacy fraternity. It started in 1879 at Russell Military College in Connecticut.

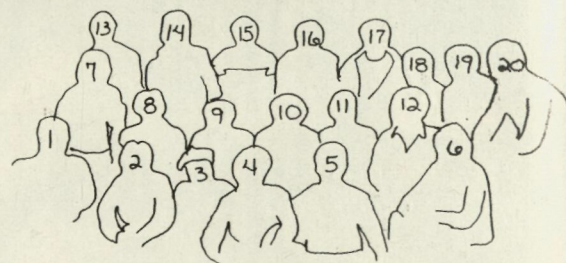

The house looks forward to the future as they continue to combine good times with dedication to the promotion of pharmacy.

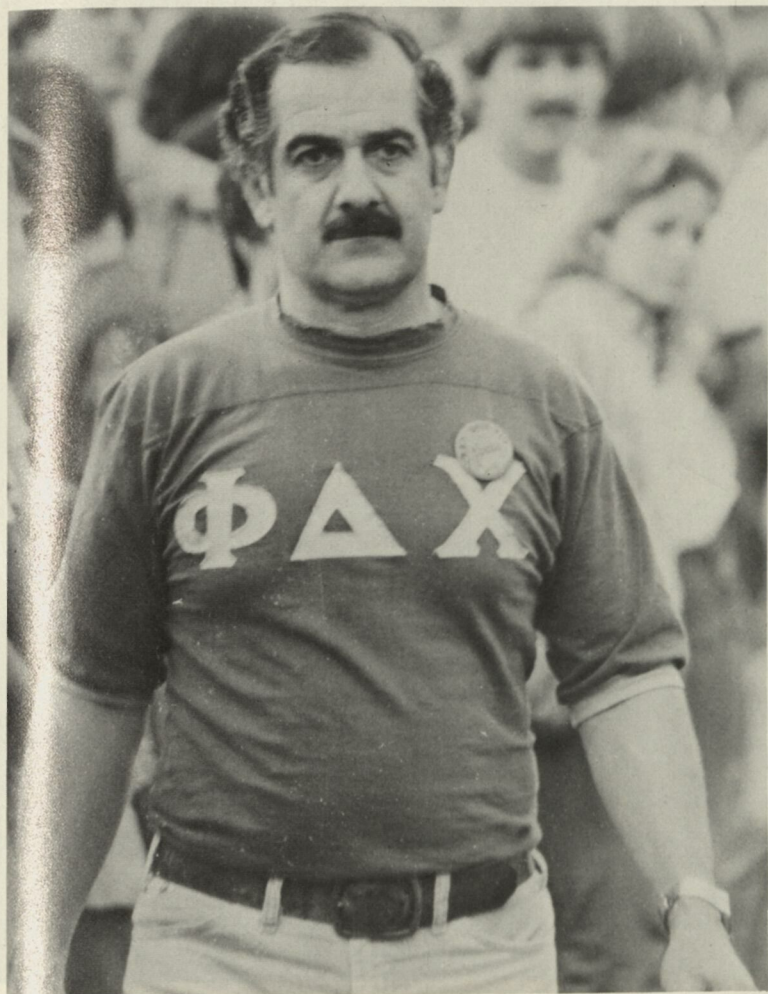

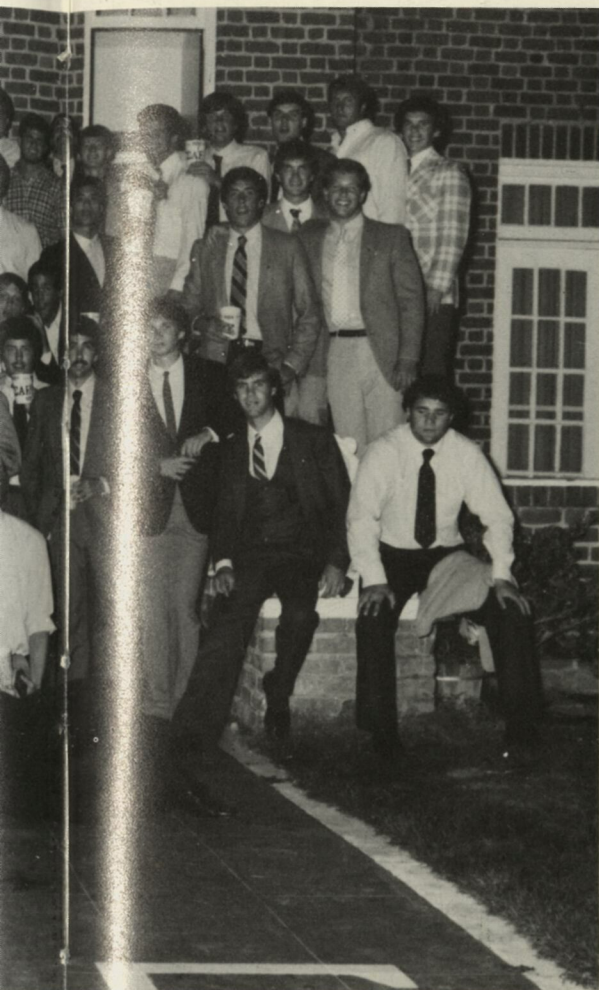

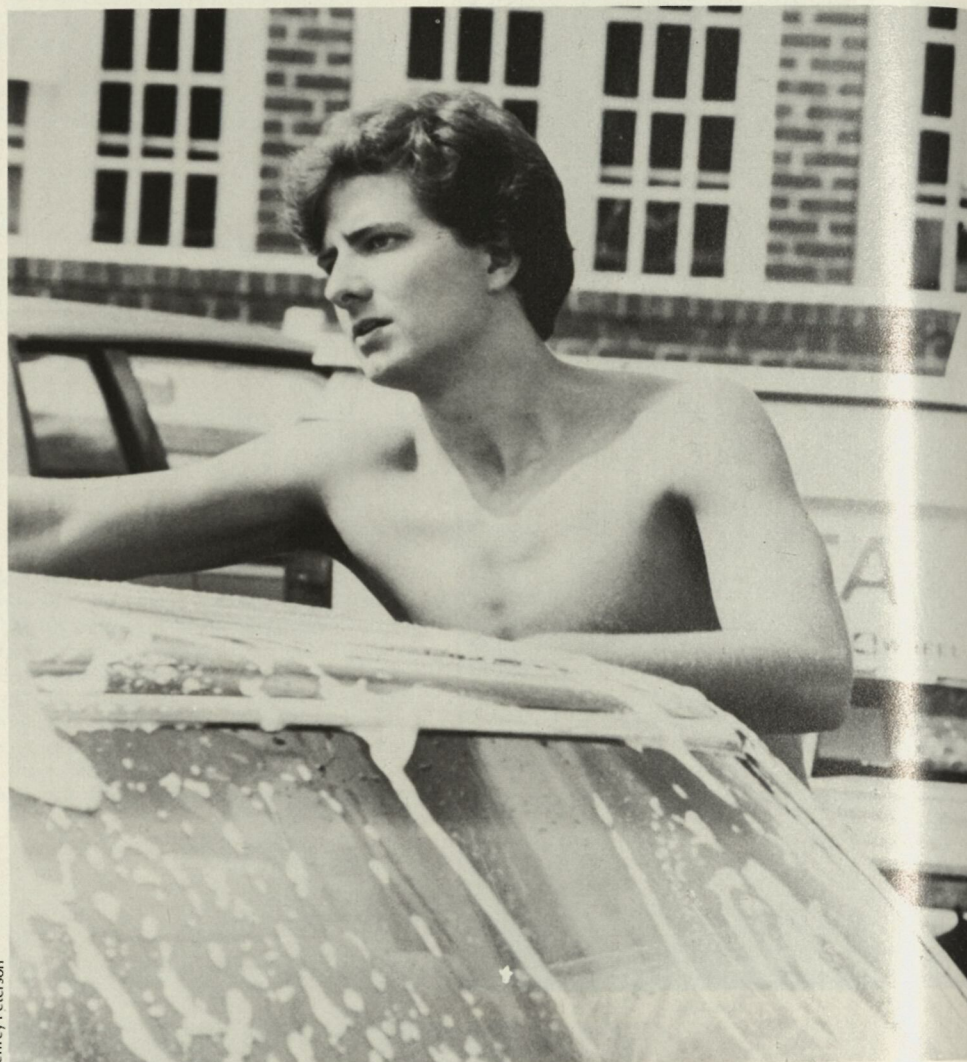


Omega Phi Alpha

All these elements made up a house that's a special and integral part of our college life, a unique home away from home, that's Omega Phi!



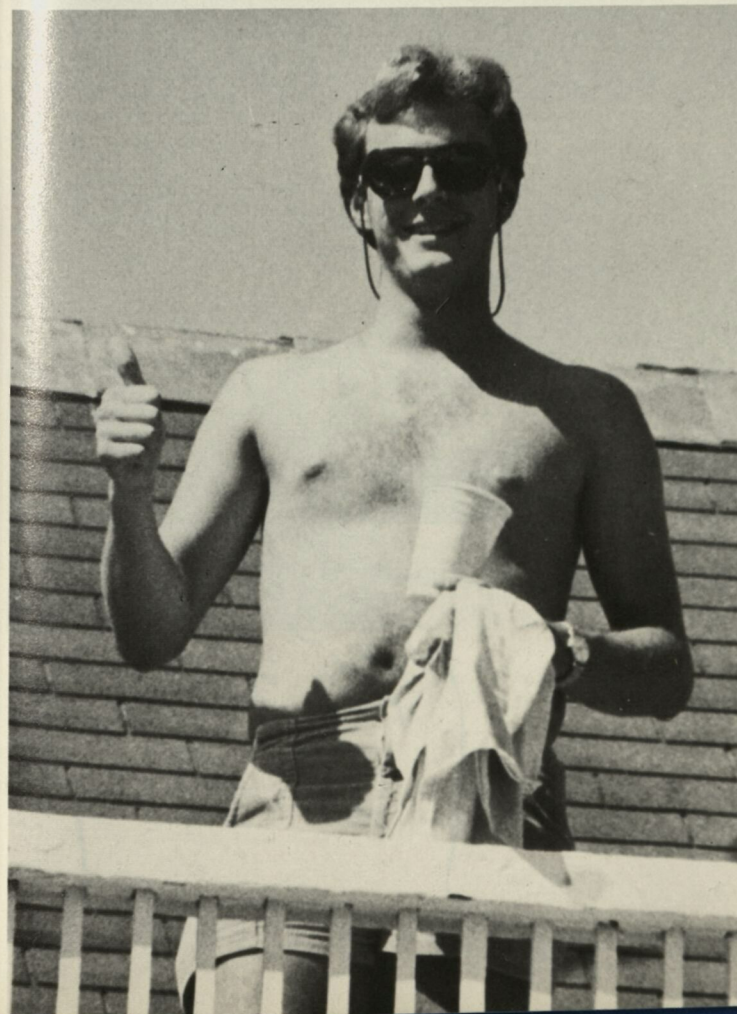

Omega Psi Phi, founded on November 11, 1911 at Howard University in Washington, DC, is one of the black fraternities at UOP.

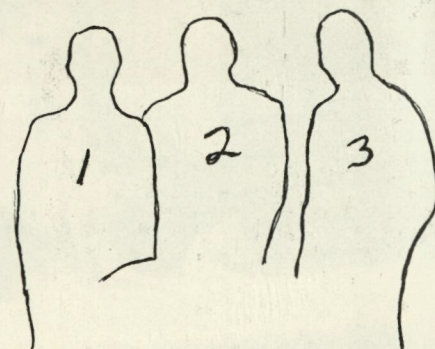

Typography: All typography was set with the Cybercomp Typography Program. Optima was used in 6, 8, 10, 12, and 14 point throughout the book.

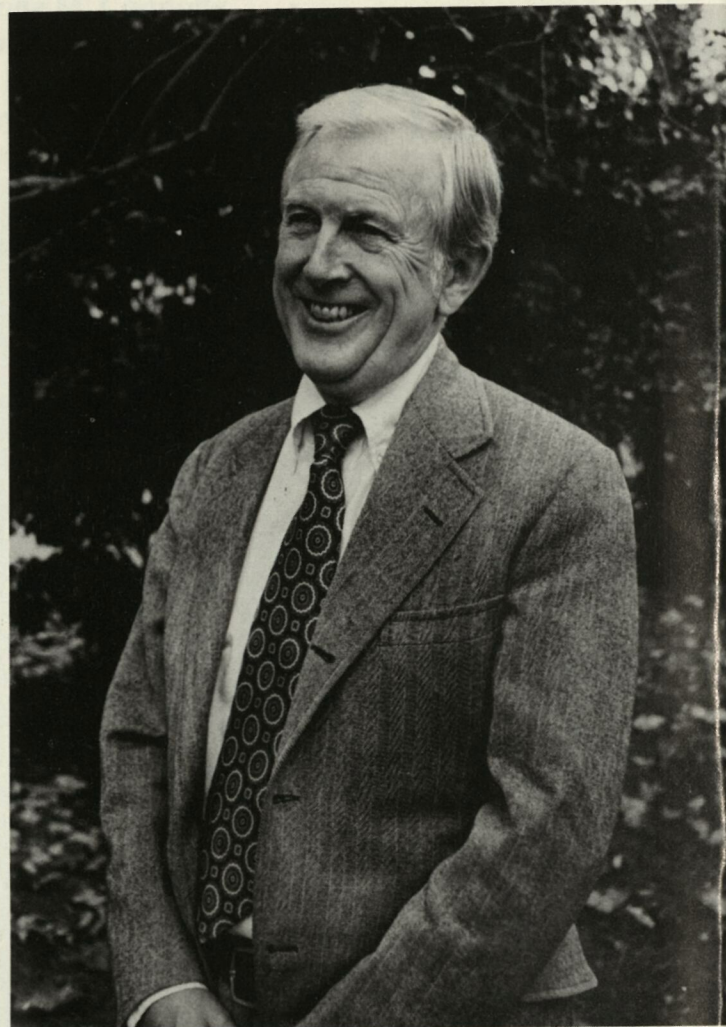
It is with deepest regrets that we acknowledge the passing of Academic Vice President of the University of the Pacific, Clifford J. Hand.
