- October 31 Movie -- Cabinet of Dr. Caligari, Great Hall 9:00.
- November 5 Movie -- 8½
- November 12 Robert Mezey is 34, and his first book of poems, *The Lovemaker*, was published in 1961 and won for him (in manuscript) the Academy of American Poets' "Lamont Poetry Selection" for 1960. Mr. Mezey has published two further books of poetry, *White Blossoms* and *Favors*. Copies of his poems are available in Provost Lodge.
- November 16 Film -- *The Mercy Killers*, A BBC documentary on euthanasia, "mercy killing" for the elderly and terminally ill.
- November 19 Paul Arnoldi, guitarist and composer will sing in the common room at 8:30 - Informal.
- November 21 Biafra Benefit, Dance Concert, Raymond Great Hall at 9:00
- November 23 Movie -- *To Die in Madrid*.
- December 1 Robert Mullen, Artist in Residence, will present a talk on neon design followed by the opening of a two week art show in the common room of Mr. Mullens latest work. High table dinner and reception.
- December 5 Huck Hamann, silver craftsman and jeweler, will have a display and presentation. A reception will be held at 8:30 in the common room. Dinner at 6:00.
- December 10 Steven Bartlett, an alumnus of Raymond College, and a member of the staff at the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions in Santa Barbara. Will be held during High Table dinner.
- December 14 Film -- *Consenting Adults*, A BBC documentary on the aspects of homosexuality.

- January 14 Bill Knott, the youngest of the three poets, at 29, has published one book of poetry, *The Naomi Poems: Corple and Beans*. Richard Brautigan 34, has lived for many years in and around San Francisco and has firm roots in the renaissance of poetry that took place there during the reign of the 'beat' writers.
