
Dedication

Thus we dedicate this, the 1948 issue of CHIPS, to Dr. John Tocchini, in true appreciation of his loyal and valued services.


In Memoriam

Dean's Message

A farmer whose per acre crop yield record had dropped well below the average of his neighbors was urged by his local Agricultural Agent to take one or two governmental extension courses in modern methods of crop production. "What fur," said he. "I ain't farming half as well now as I know how."

The only considerable consequential effect of his choice to be lazy is to reduce his annual income.

Let us now carry this all too common attitude over to the healing profession. While the people should likely have no big quarrel with Mr. Farmer we do have abundant reason to claim cheat and fraud in the instance of similar attitudes of dentists and physicians.


The most consequential effect of laziness on the farmer's part is in a smaller crop. But similar laziness on the doctor's part must result in a relatively poorer quality of service.

The public has a large investment in each man who graduates in medicine and dentistry today. The fact is that each graduate pays on the average much less than half of the direct costs of his professional education.

For a physician or a dentist to be satisfied with doing half as well as he knows how, for him to pass up opportunities to improve his techniques and his knowledge is for him to be a cheat.

Dentists and physicians can be lazy and truthful but they cannot be lazy and be honest.


April 9—Back to the old grind: "Freshman, hand in your teeth!!!" "Pass the bone, son". "What's your name?" That's all we hear all day long.





June 19—Just handed in my ceramics practical examination. I would have to make the thing backwards.


June 28—We had our last final of the year. They say that next year is easier but I've heard that before. I'm getting skeptical about taking advice from seniors.

A great deal of credit goes to our 6-foot ?-inch grand master, Bill Allen, for his fine work in conducting the fraternity during the past year.


Joe Sweet, one of our brothers, won a swell trip to Chicago to attend the National Convention.

This past year has certainly been a banner year for the Xi Psi Phi. Under the able guidance of President Jim Bennett we have become even closer friends and had even better times.


