Pacific's Latest Endowment

Pacific received \$76,643, June 26 from the John D. Rockefeller General Education Board. It was payment in full of the pro rata amount due under the Board's pledge for endowment of \$64,643. The \$12,000 is a special award, representing interest on the \$64,643 over a period of four years in which the main award was delayed.

Soon after the College moved to Stockton, the Rockefeller Foundation agreed to give Pacific fifty cents on each dollar of increased endowment if the College raised \$500,000 for endowment and cleared itself from debt by July 1, 1929. The debt was paid by that date and \$129,286 was raised in endowment.

The \$64,643 will be added to the College endowment and the \$12,000 used for current expenses.

The Board decided to make this award after a visit by Mr. A. W. Armour, representative of the General Education Board, who spent several days on the Campus in a survey of plant and equipment and an investigation of the academic work of the College. It was the favorable impression made upon Mr. Armour by the institution that was responsible for his recommendation that the award be made.

The College is hopeful that this endowment is a forerunner of others to follow.

On and Off the Campus

Pacific Open Air Theatre

An outdoor theatre with a seating capacity of approximately 1250 is being constructed on Pacific's Campus. DeMarcus Brown '23, director of the Little Theatre, expects to present Shakespeare's *Midsummer Night's Dream* at the dedication of the theatre soon after the opening of the Fall semester.

The theatre, a semi-circular bowl, is being built directly behind the College auditorium, which will form the back wall of the outdoor stage. The stage will be a concrete platform twenty-four by ninety feet.

The bowl will be formed by an earthen embankment descending from a level of nine feet above the stage, to the orchestra circle five feet below the stage level. Concrete walls, grass, and shrubbery will preserve and enhance the contour of the bowl and stage. The seats will be wooden of stadium type construction.

The \$1500, which is the cost of the project, has been raised through subscription. Subscriptions at \$15 each have been sold to alumni and friends of the College, and in return each subscriber will receive a three-season pass for all Pacific Little Theatre productions. Additional subscriptions will be received during the summer.

Commencement 1933

Pacific celebrated its seventy-sixth commencement at an outdoor service, June 12. Candidates for degrees and credentials and members of the faculty in academic dress entered Baxter Stadium just as the sun was setting behind picturesque Mt. Diablo. The processional march was played by the college band.

Degrees conferred were eighty-nine Bachelor of Arts, thirteen Bachelor of Music, and fifteen Master of Arts. Twenty-five seniors qualified for the general elementary credential and thirty-three graduate students received the general secondary, entitling them to teach in California high schools. Other credentials awarded were: Piano secondary, theory secondary, public school music, art secondary, physical education secondary, supervision and administration.

Honorary Degrees

The honorary degree Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon Rev. Bailey C. Lipsky '07. He received his S. T. B. degree from Boston University and since then has been with the Vermont Conference, of which he is district superintendent.

Dr. Louis Childs Sanford, bishop of the San Joaquin Protestant Episcopal Church since 1911, was awarded the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

Dr. Doremus A. Hayes, former professor at Pacific, received his fifth doctorate when Pacific awarded him the honorary degree Doctor of Literature. Other

degrees which he holds are Ph. D., LL. D., S. T. D., and D. D. He has retired after thirty years' service as professor of New Testament History and Interpretation at Garrett Biblical Institute.

Changes On the Faculty

President Knoles announced the retirement of Professor Robert C. Root of the department of sociology, and Dr. Samuel Cook, head of the physics department. He commended the work of Coach C. Erwin Righter, who has resigned after serving twelve years as head football and basketball coach at Pacific.

Harold Jacoby '28 will replace Professor Root. Mr. Jacoby received his master's degree at Northwestern University two years ago, and his Ph. D. degree at the University of Pennsylvania last month.

Mr. Horace I. Brown will teach violin and other subjects in the Conservatory.

Professors who will return this fall after leaves of absence are Dr. Abel Alarcon, who has been studying and traveling in Europe, particularly in Spain; Dr. Walter Gieseke, who has been completing work for his Ph. D. degree in Germany; and Professor George Harness, who received his Ph. D. degree from the California Institute of Technology last month.

Methodist Conference at Pacific

More than a thousand people attended the California Methodist Conference held on the Pacific Campus June 13-20. Members of the Conference and laymen became familiar with the splendid equipment of the College plant. The delegates were so pleased with accommodations on the Campus, that it was unanimously chosen as the place for next year's conference.

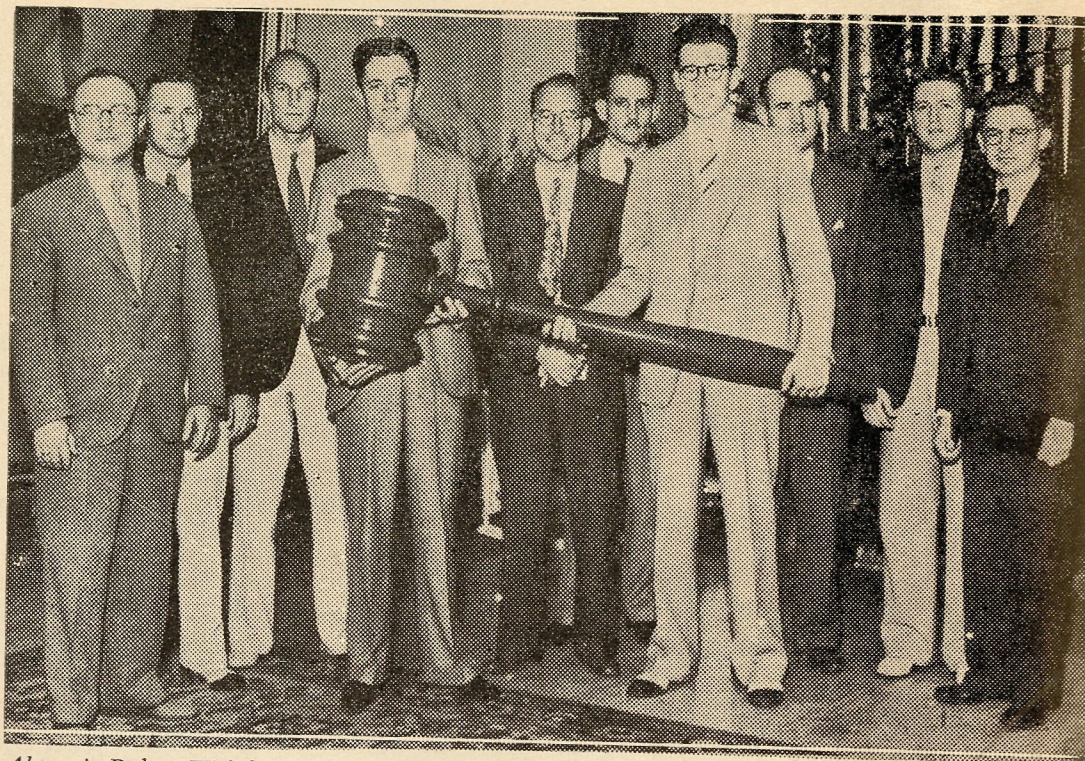

Portland Will Honor Stagg

Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg completed his work at the University of Chicago June 30 and is eagerly looking forward to beginning anew at Pacific. Accompanied by his wife and son, Paul, he will drive to California, arriving in Stockton early in September.

En route he will stop at Portland to view the situation for his opening game with Monmouth Normal at the Multnomah Stadium, September 22. He will be honored at a banquet sponsored by the Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Portland Athletic Association some time during the first week in September. Enthusiasm is high in Portland, and it is expected that the Pacific Tigers will play there before one of their largest audiences of the season.

Baxter Stadium Is Improved

Thirty-five hundred new seats have increased the seating capacity of Baxter Stadium to approximately 9500. There are gravel paths edged with concrete curbs along the rim of the stadium, and grass will be planted on the outside banks and on the inside where there are no seats. Orange and black paint has been spread liberally over the seats, the press box, and the club house. A three-foot board fence has been constructed around the track. The general appearance is more finished and attractive.
