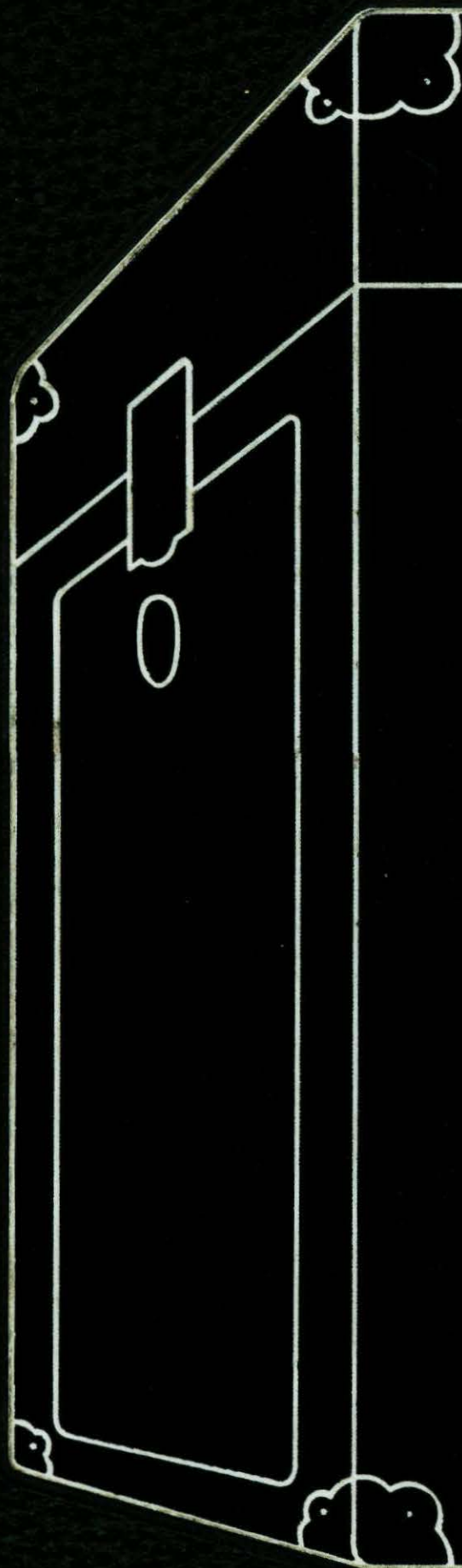

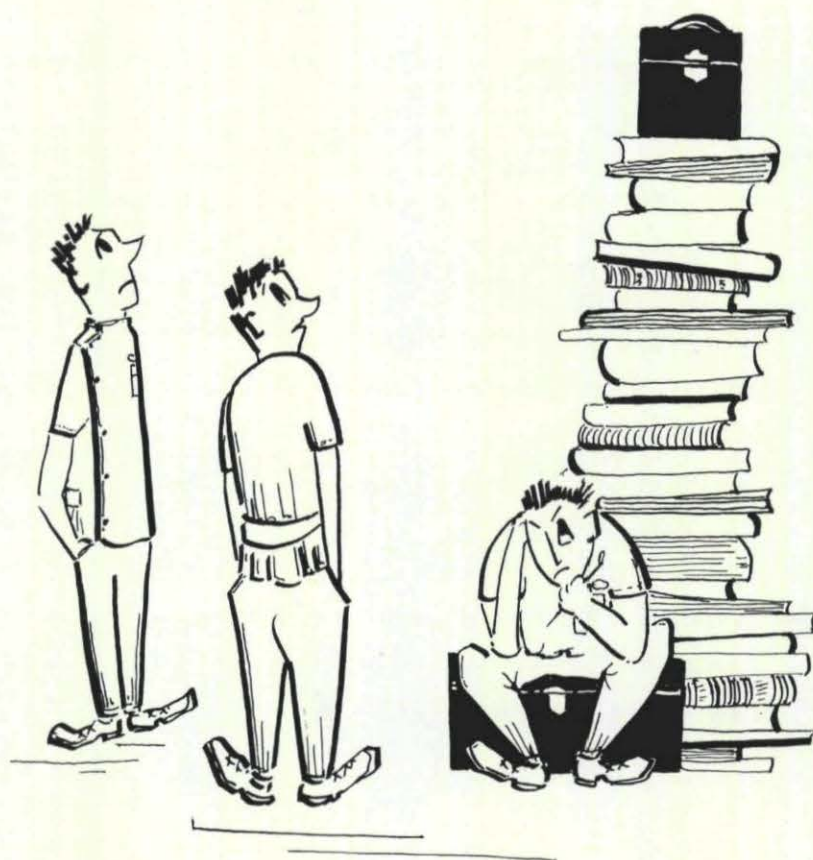

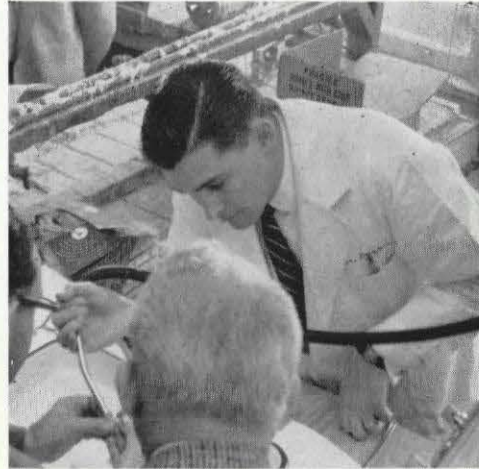
Arthur A. Dugoni, D.D.S.

It is only natural that Dr. Arthur A. Dugoni be selected for this dedication, as he is an outstanding educator and friend in the opinion of both students and professional peers.

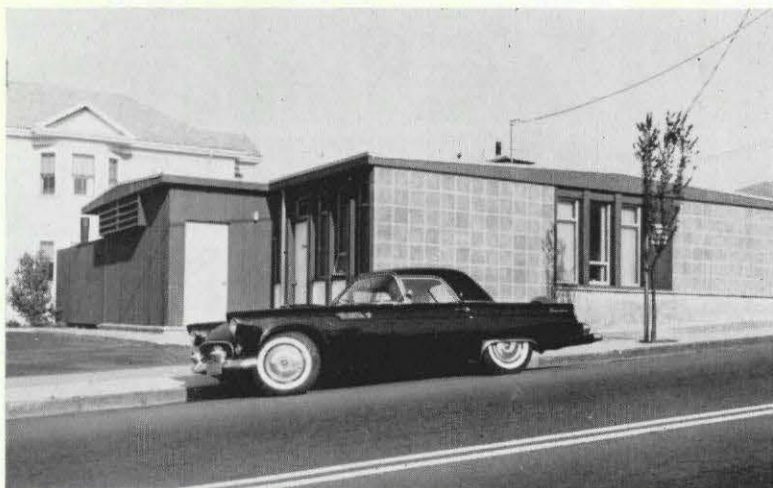

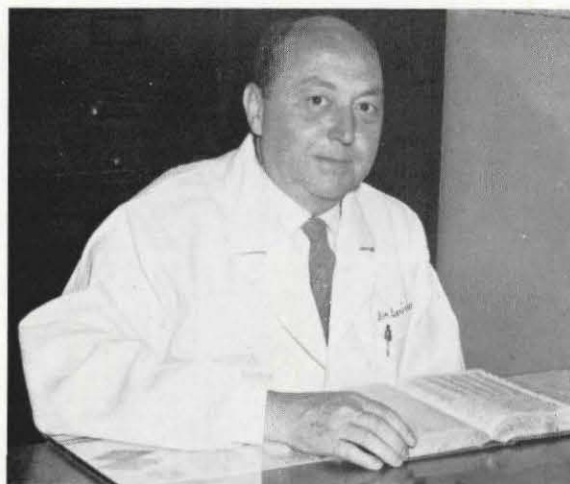
Even though during this last decade the small school has become economically weak, the student of the small school has a greater feeling of devotion for the school because the college is small.

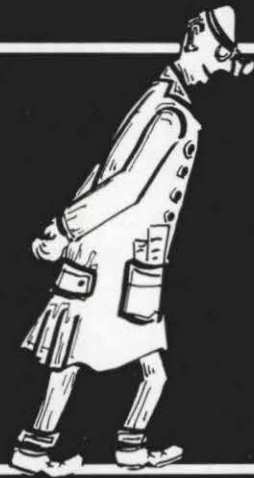

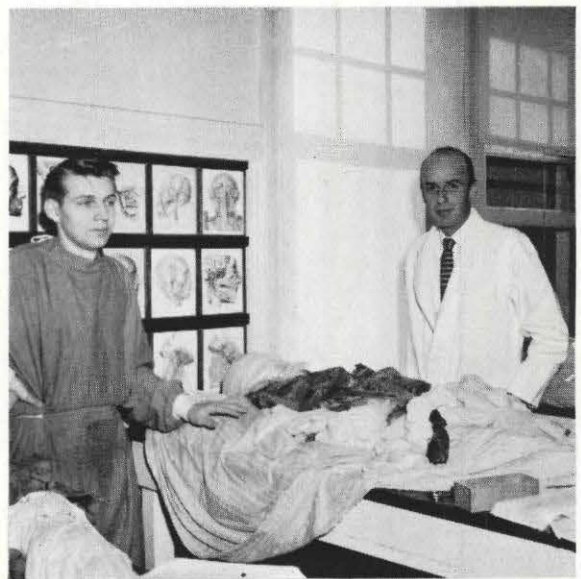

LIBRARY

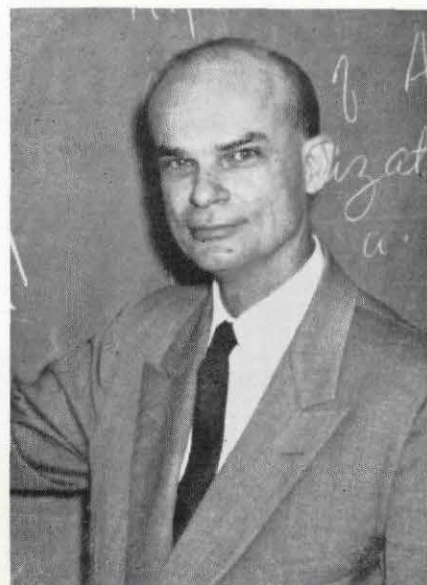

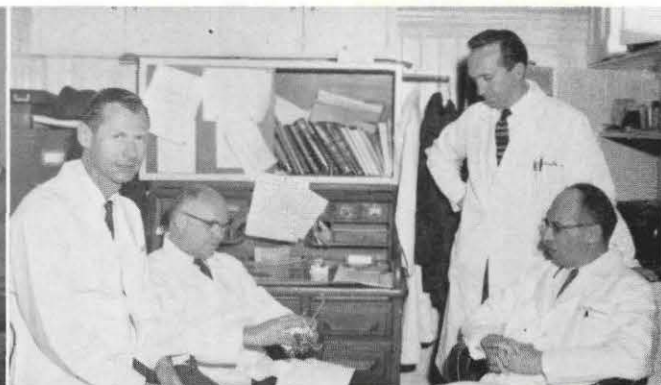
PARTIAL DENTURES

SENIORS

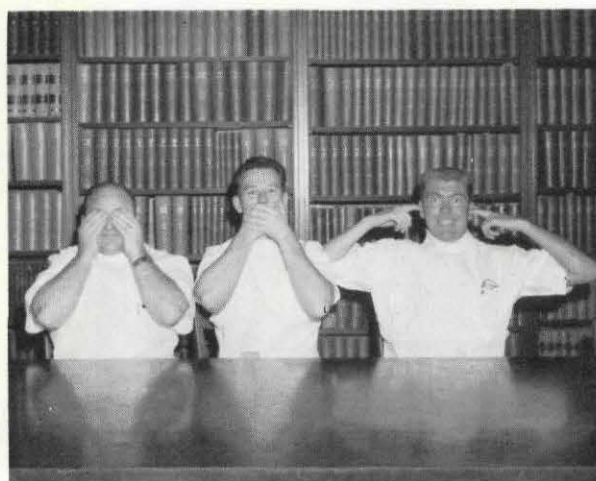
We feel that we have been well coached and are ready for the varsity. We are ready to turn in our numbers and get our letters. D. D. S.

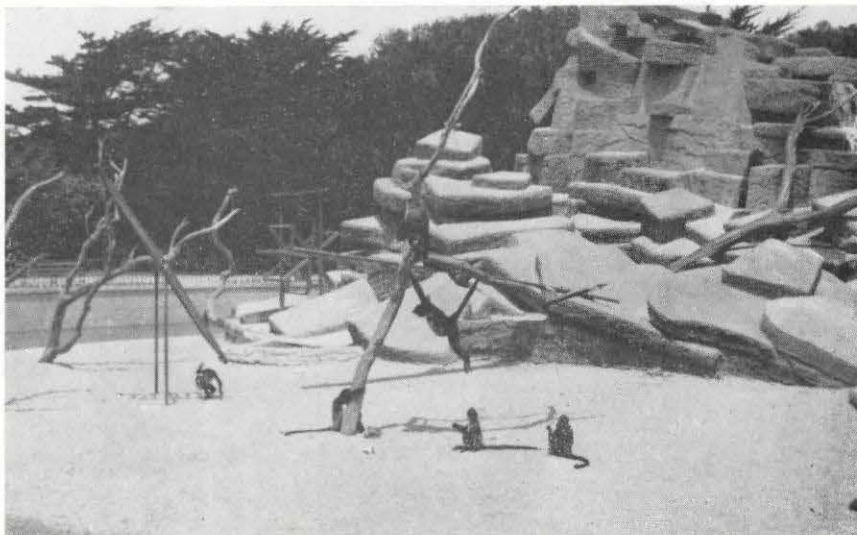
Chips and P & S go together.

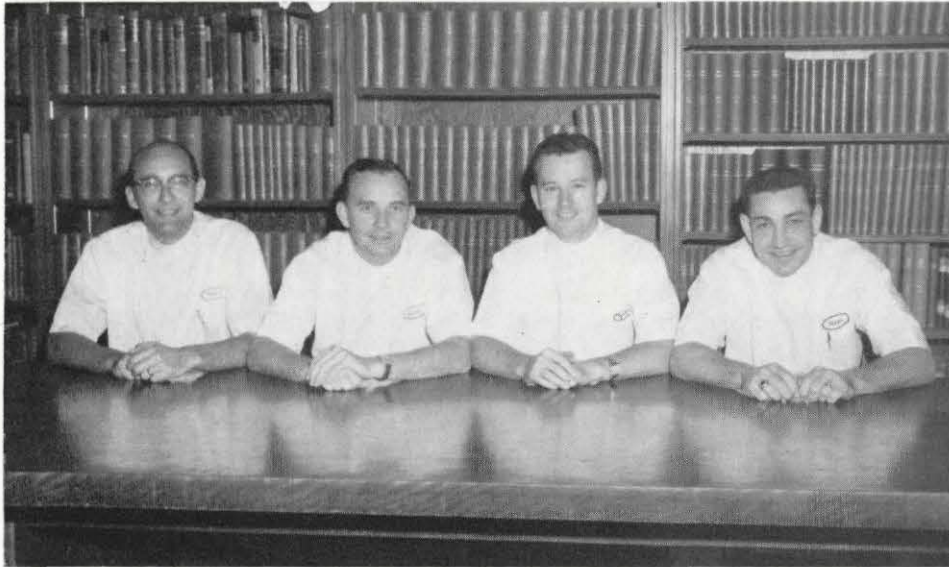

60TH ALUMNI



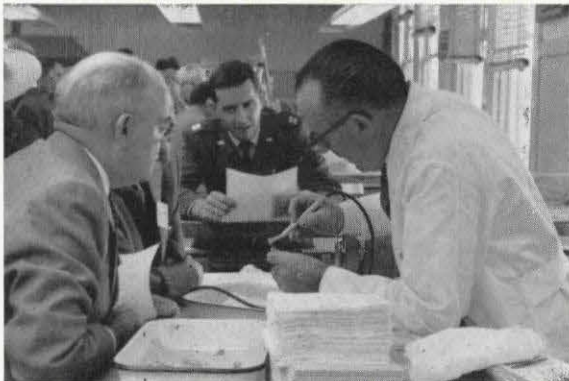
DR. ARTHUR DUGONI

Over 580 alumni gathered at the College of Physicians and Surgeons on November 20-21 for the scientific sessions of the Diamond Jubilee meeting. Following the invocation by Doctor Harry A. True, the meeting was filled with lectures, slides, demonstrations, and good fellowship.



DR. WILLIAM TRUE

Professor Ralph Phillips, Chairman of the Department of Dental Materials, Indiana University, described the results of his investigations using radioactive elements in testing the sealing ability of the commonly used restorative materials. Mr. Phillips also discussed the proper methods of casting and pickling gold inlays.



DR. JAMES TACKNEY

Major Jack Hartley, '45, described the investigations that he is carrying on in the field of high speed at the School of Aviation Medicine at Randolph Field, Texas. The standards of the air turbines and super-speed handpieces were reviewed as well as the scientific tests to establish the pain threshold, sound threshold, and efficiency of cutting.

MEETING

The demonstrations showed all of the high-speed equipment available. This equipment was shown through the courtesy of the manufacturers who had been contacted by the committee headed by Doctor Arthur A. Dugoni. It was the first time that all of the high-speed equipment presently available had been shown to a west coast audience.

At the table clinics, Doctor George Hollenback demonstrated impression trays, methods of manipulation, and making of dies. Doctor Hollenback also lectured on his research on the physical properties of the elastic impression materials.
