
We will see joy, fun, hard work, familiar faces, old haunts, and many friends.












## Dean's Message

Today's students may well remember the cry that was heard at the beginning of World War II regarding the number of recruits rejected because of poor oral health. In order to obtain enough recruits for the armed services the standards of dental health had to be lowered. There was a great deal of agitation at that time about improving the oral health of the youth of our country. Many educational programs were developed at the dental school's, dental society's and the layman's level to prevent this from happening again and an effort was made to raise our dental health standards. Children's dental health week has been set aside to make people more conscious of the needs of oral health, scientific conventions have been dedicated to this end, and much educational material has been published and distributed to the profession and to the public, television programs have emphasized the importance of dental care and dental health.

What is the picture today? Has the situation improved in these eighteen years? Has dental health education had its effect on the general population of the country? Do we find our youth today in a better dental health condition? Perhaps there has been some improvement and this, undoubtedly, will be found in certain isolated communities. However, in reading an article published in a 1959 issue of the Journal of the American Dental Association reporting on the study of over two thousand Naval recruits to determine their dental condition, and the factors that may have influenced this condition prior to their entrance into the Navy, one wonders if our efforts have accomplished much good, it was found that the average recruit had

13.9 diseased, missing, or filled teeth. Only 20.8% of the recruits were free from gingivitis, meaning that 79.2% had various stages of gingivitis.

In reading this article one wonders whether our efforts of the last eighteen years have not been in vain when we note that the young men reporting today for military duty have such a deplorable dental health condition. Dental caries and the consequence of the neglect of caries is still the most common health problem of our young adults. Undoubtedly, the dental health week programs, dental health education, efforts of dental educators, dentists, school nurses and dental hygienists have had their effect to a degree, but still the dental health of our young adults today is a long way from what we think it should be.

The American Dental Association advises us that there will be a forty million cavity increase per year if we continue employing the present methods of care.

Yes, the dental profession and lay educators have worked hard to solve this problem and must continue to assume this leadership. Graduates of this class must assume their place in this role and assume the responsibility of furthering the cause of improving the dental health of today's and tomorrow's youth. Without the support of the young graduates the battle to improve the dental health of our youth will be lost. We feel certain that the recent graduate will assume his place in society to help in this program and we feel confident that as the years pass the status of dental health will improve immeasurably.


#### WILLIAM N. ANDREW




#### SETH C. BAKER






CHARLES H. BONA, JR.




## O. L. FOSTER, JR.

And though our poem's sadly filled With disillusioned fear, We're ready now to forge ahead To a third successful year.



# Training for Dental Assistants

At the College of San Mateo, students in dental assisting receive instruction in all phases of the occupation. In the first semester the necessary academic courses and related subjects in this field are taken. The technical courses are given in the 3rd and 4th Semesters.

Clinical Practice at the College of Physicians and Surgeons in San Francisco is an important part of the training of the dental assistant. This practical experience is taken under the direct supervision of the dental professors and instructors in dental assisting.

Upon successful completion of the training, the graduate is awarded the Associate of Arts degree and a Certificate in Dental Assisting. A Dental Advisory Committee and members of the Dental Society assist in the operation and instruction of the course.

The College of San Mateo Dental Assisting program is fully approved by the San Mateo County Dental Society, the American Dental Assn. and the American Dental Assistants Assn.

### City College of San Francisco

The City College of San Francisco plays an important role in the training of members of the dental service team. In addition to its well-established Dental Assisting program the college now offers training in Dental Laboratory Technology. A visitor to the campus can now see students in these programs working together developing an appreciation for each other's specialties. Thanks to the cooperation of the dental schools our Dental Assistants are sharing a similar experience with dental students. These cooperative efforts will make it possible for the dental team of tomorrow to cope more effectively with all of its problems.

The graduates of the Dental Assisting program at CCSF possess an Associate of Arts degree and a Certificate of Completion. They have received training in dental procedures and chairside assisting from a faculty of specialists. Instructors in this phase of the program are Dr. Robert Scoren, Dr. John Sapone, Dr. Leroy Cagnone and Mr. Albert Bradison. In addition they have taken related training under a thoroughly competent faculty in other departments of the college. They have received a strong liberal and an occupational training.
