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




After only two years of excellent academic achievement in college, he was accepted at P&S. Before entering P&S in September, he was married to Janet Jean Hensley.

The Dean's Message

The Last Class

The College of Physicians and Surgeons was established in 1896 as a school of medicine, dentistry and pharmacy and continued as such until 1918 at which time the schools of medicine and pharmacy were discontinued. Dean Charles Boxton continued the teaching program of the dental school until 1923. In this year a Board of Trustees was formed and took over the assets and continued the School of Dentistry as a nonprofit public trust with three objectives in mind.

The first was to make it the equal of any dental school in the country. The first step in accomplishing this took place in 1926 when the school was given full approval. Since that time the degree of excellence has increased. Undoubtedly this is the main reason why you and other students who have since graduated applied and matriculated at the College of Physicians and Surgeons.

The second was to move into a new, modern and up-to-date building. Unfortunately, the class of 1962 will not have the privilege of finishing their education in the new building. The administration of the school is hoping that the 1964 senior class will be able to spend their last few months in the new building and that the 1964 freshman class will be the first new class in the new structure.

It is our hope that by the time this issue of Chips comes off the press that the architects' plans and specifications will have been completed and that the ground-breaking ceremonies will be a short time off.

The third was to effect a university affiliation. This is now history, with our joining the University of the Pacific in the early months of 1962. The class of 1962 will be the last class to receive the "old" diploma or the last diploma issued by the College of Physicians and Surgeons, A School of Dentistry. The class of 1963 will be the first to receive the diploma from the University of the Pacific.

Thirty-nine years ago the five members of the Board of Trustees set out to accomplish the three objectives and the senior class of 1962 is privileged to share the accomplishment of these objectives with the Board of Trustees. As with the 1962 class, the Board of Trustees will function for the last time as a group.


It does not mean that this class is no longer a part of the school. It is definitely a vital part of the change.


ARTHUR GAGNIER President




Interfraternity Council





Training for Dental Assistants




Theodore E. Thom Student Body President







Oh gold foil, spiritual uplift that you be, Someday you'll be the downfall of me.



And why not??? For he knows he's helped a student out. Clear out of school no doubt. No doubt!


