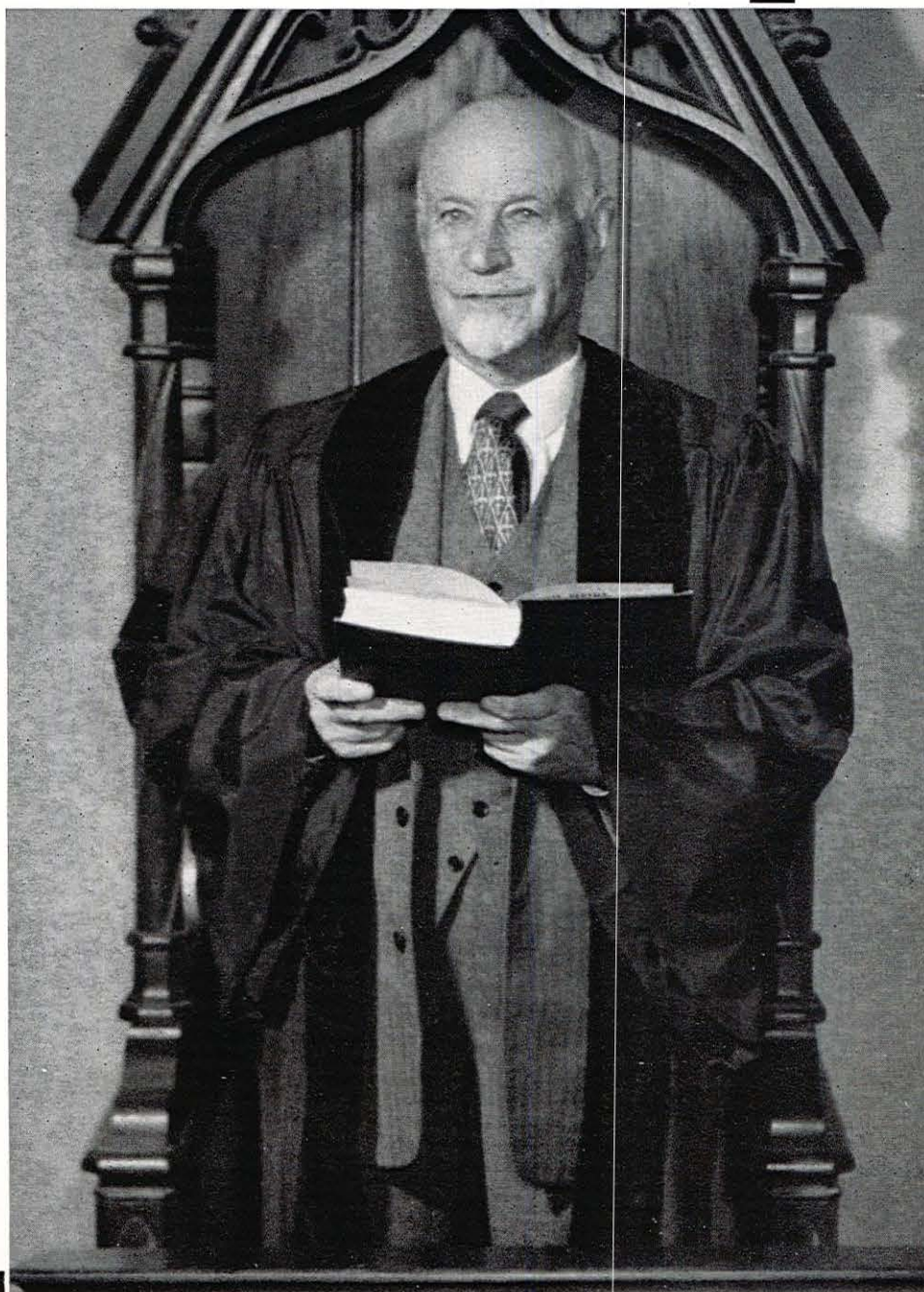
through the year

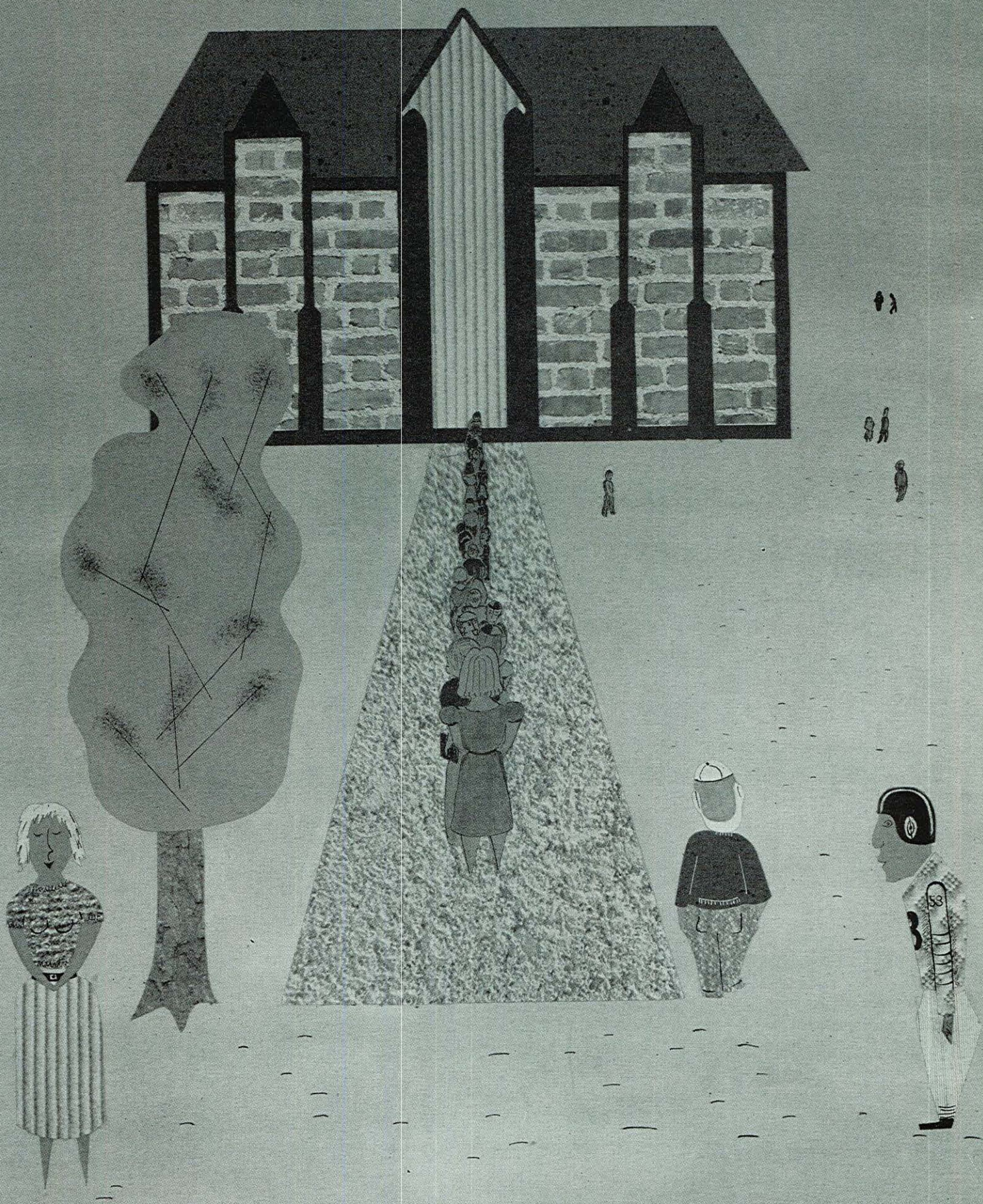


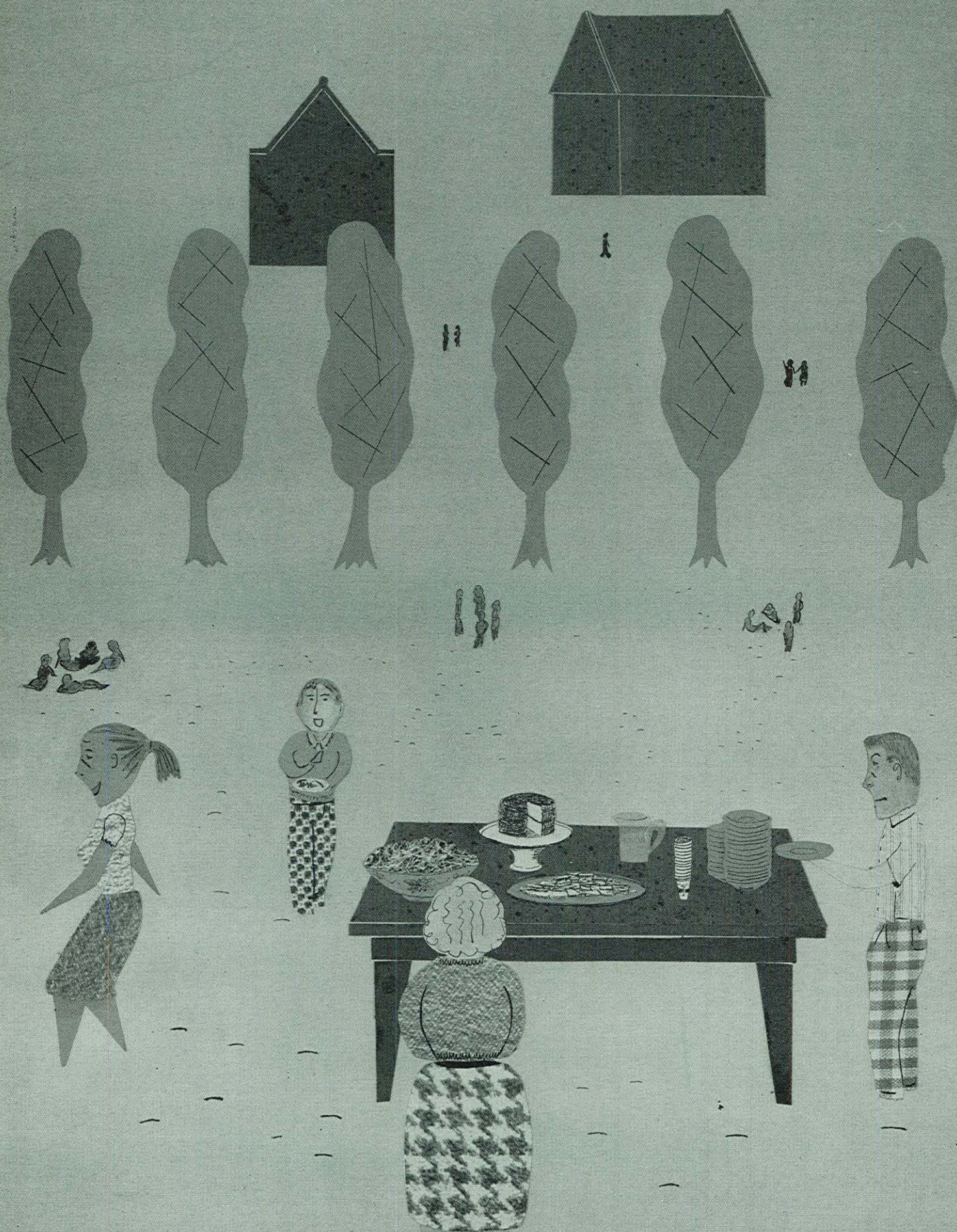

president robert edward burns

when in nineteen hundred forty-seven robert e. burns became president, pacific was preparing to celebrate its centennial just three years hence • with the crowning of one hundred years as a college and into the second century, pacific continues to grow with the progressive leadership of a businessman, and public relations expert who can emphasize the meaning behind pacific with a glance to the wandering student • and this is robert e. burns

with the coming of the frosh class of 'fifty-six, came the traditional freshman orientation period • it was during this period that the college's "new babies" became aware of what it is that makes pacific the proud little college that it is • during the four days of orientation, along with the indoctrination of why the pacific family is a proud family, were the rigors of tests, examinations, and more tests that



make up the grueling procedure of matriculation • but certainly those first few days will be remembered for this was the beginning of a new experience • there were the welcome speeches, the rallies, the dances, the picnics, the dinners, the socials, the tests, then came the long seemingly endless lines of registration • but soon the lines of freshmen disappeared and were replaced by lines of returning sophomores, juniors, and dashing seniors • on hand to help out the new "babies" were members of the senate of the pacific student association • the commissioners and the chairmen and the self-appointed politicians of the association had come

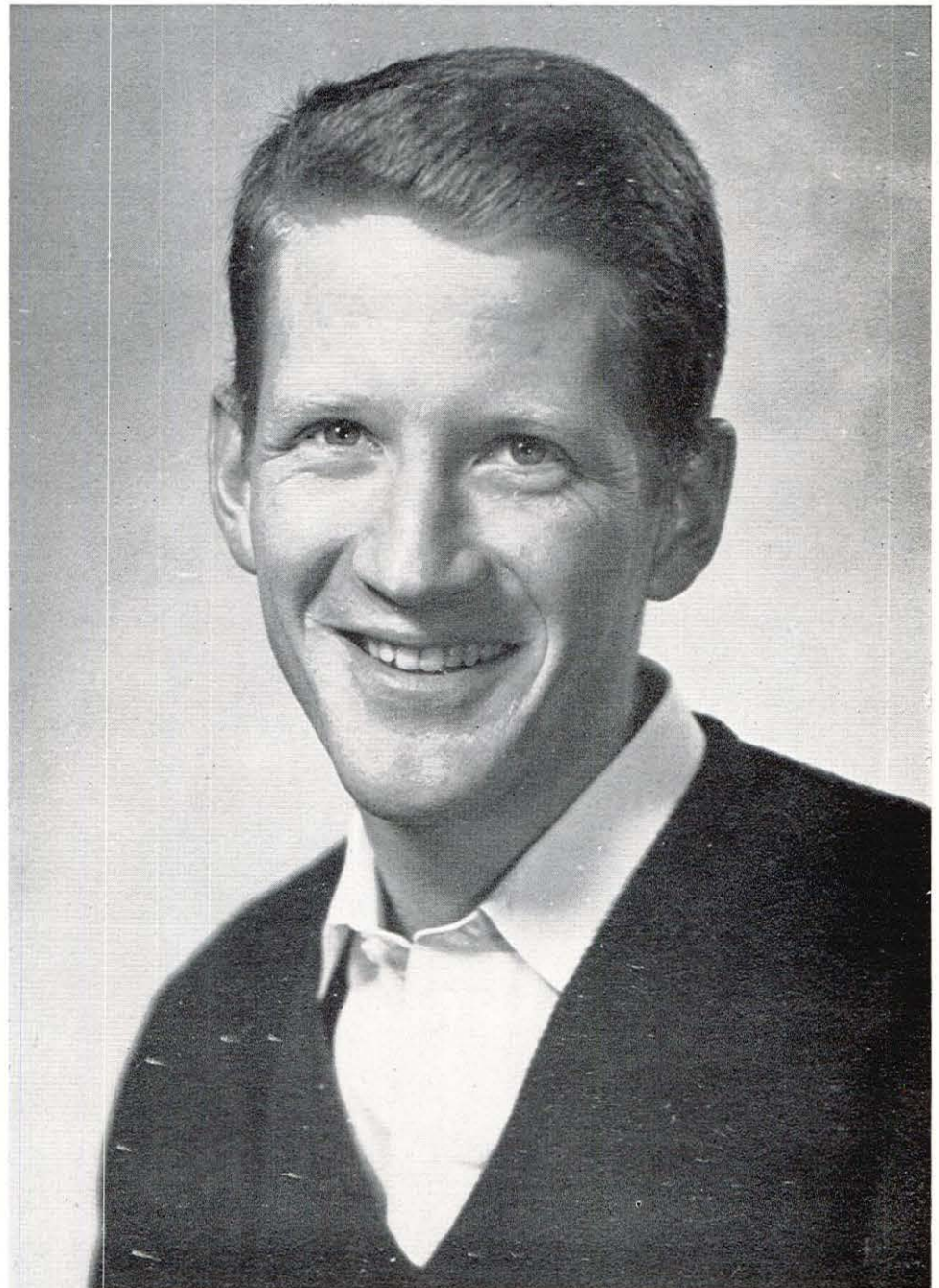


back to college a week early to help out the frosh, and to acquaint them with the time honored tradition of frosh hazing • all freshmen were required to wear "tiger tags"; the men wore dinks and the women wore orange hair bows • a respectful attitude toward upper classmen was required and violators were tried and punished by a "kangaroo court" •
at the head of the officers stood



psa president geoff thomas

as number one officer of the association, geoff had the task of coordinating a thousand individuals into almost as many activities • there were the usual presidential duties of meetings, people to see, policies to work out, and the oft-appearing problem of how to schedule two meetings in one senate office at the same time • presiding at senate meetings offered more than one problem as it was often difficult to convince pacific's senators that it would not be proper to declare war against the stockton police department or blow up the infirmary or paint west hall bright green • but even with the full schedule of a president and the matter of a few classes, there was still time to maintain membership in omega phi alpha fraternity, be



elected to who's who and blue key, and be with his wife lorna at manor hall • when it came to enter into debate on the senate floor, all that needed be done was to hand the gavel to

psa vice-president **bob steres** • it was **steres**, who acting as official host of the association in the capacity of vice-president, still found time to act as chief announcer of **kcvn**, president

money than last year, that budgets had to be cut! responsibility for the myriad of accounts, bills, and the general behind the scenes business of the association were a full time job, but **williams** found time to be active at **alpha kappa phi** fraternity, and be elected

of **alpha epsilon rho**, and be elected to **who's who** and **blue key** as well as being a member of **alpha kappa phi** fraternity • along with the presiding officers, there was a matter of the association treasury, and here is where **psa** treasurer **jim williams** entered the picture • here was the person who had the task of organizing budgets, and telling a dozen organizations, each one pleading stark tragedy unless supplied with more

to **blue key** • in the mad hubub of the functioning of the association, was the saviour of the lot, **psa** secretary **joy laten**, who handling the correspondence and details, knocking problems over in nothing flat, was also vice-president of the **international relations club**, active in the **anderson 'y'**, and was elected to **who's who** • along with **geoff**, **bob**, **jim**, and **joy** were the other **members of the**



psa senate composed of the top elected officers of the association the senate, throughout the school year, acted as a policy making and interpreting body • allotting funds and special appropriations, this was the group that, as leaders of the association, set the pace for

student activities • from its ranks came the various committees appointed to act on the numerous problems which confronted the association • also, from this group came resolutions of high importance — "four a. m. hours for all women students", and "get the tricycle police department off the campus" • every so often a problem in the nature of a gripe arose, **and to the**

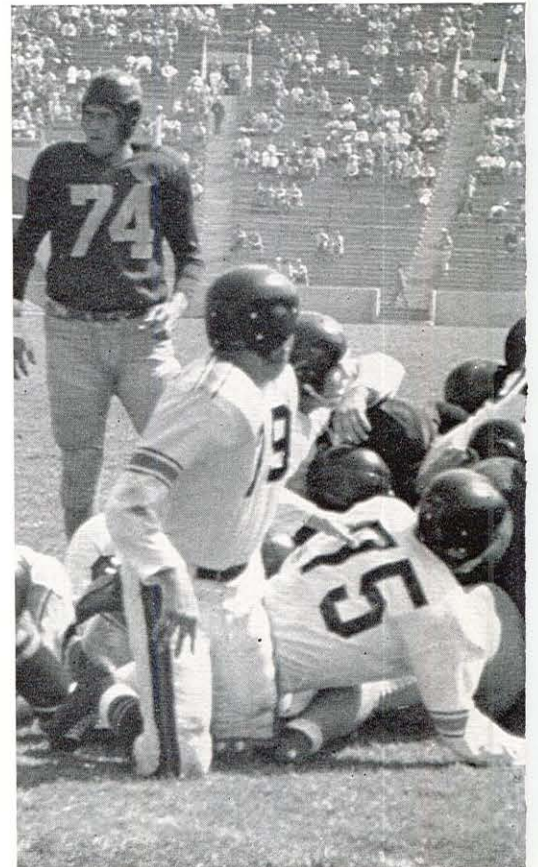




pacific tiger versus the california bear

there was the annual **berkeley football festival** • here, contestants from universities and colleges throughout the nation vied for the title of **nineteen hundred fifty-two football queen** • while **miss pacific** didn't become **football queen**, she nevertheless brought pride to **cop** as upon her appearance at the game, the "herd" let loose with a chant of "we want **margie**" • the queen was crowned at the coronation

ball held at the **claremont hotel** and with her attendants she led the pre-game "parade of lights" • it was at the "parade of lights" that the **cop-sc marching band** brought home another of its numerous first place competition trophies • at **pacific**, football fever was reaching a boiling point as classes almost became secondary to pre-game rallies and festivities • **friday** afternoon the migration to the state college in **berkeley** began, and by **friday** night the campus was lacking of any human element • as **pacific** became deserted, the **bay area** knew that the **valley brew crew** had arrived • while **tiger** rooters were slightly outnumbered, approximately fifteen thousand to eight hundred, the eight hundred held their own and then some, as was to be proved the following day at the game • then came the meeting of

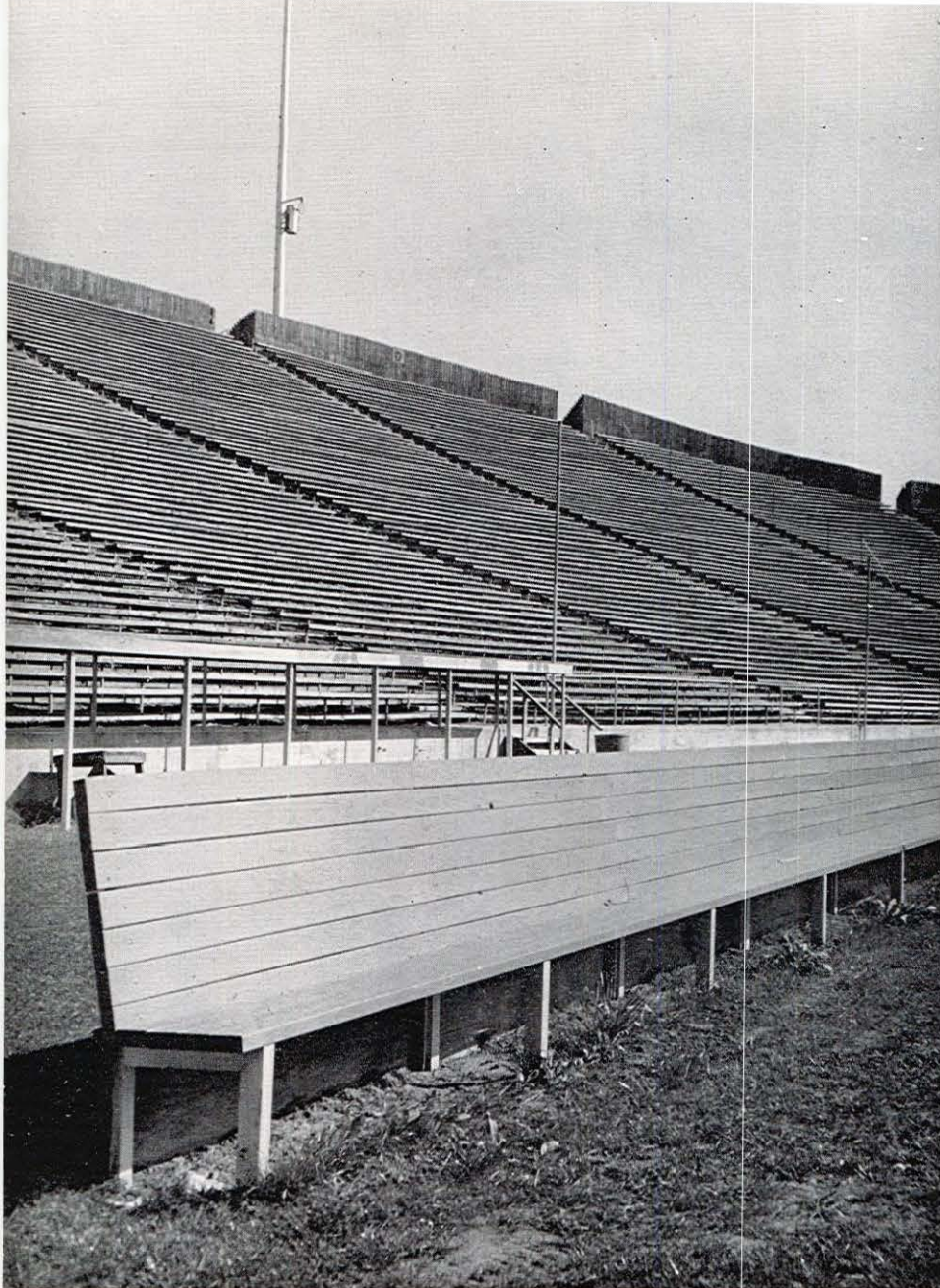




david and goliath fifty-five thousand football enthusiasts spent the afternoon at **berkeley memorial stadium** to see what they believed would be the consumption of an undernourished **tiger** by a gourmet of a **bear** • the **tigers** were the first to draw blood and swing the pompous **bear** by his tail as **tom mccormick** smashed into the end zone for the score • the **bear** and **johnny olszewski** retaliated twice to take a fourteen to six half-time lead • in the second half, **mccormick** decided to show off a little himself, as he rolled off fifty-seven yards on the kickoff return and set up **pacific's** second score • with **pacific** on **cal's** thirty-seven yard line, **roy ottoson** flipped to pint sized

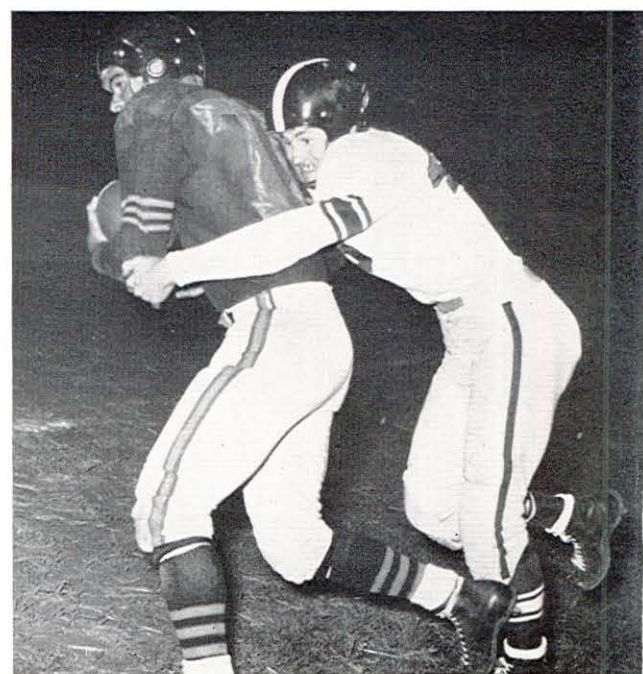


phil flock for twenty-five yards • **art liebscher** hit for five and hit again for seven yards and six points • **rod de cristafaro** converted and the score read **university of california** fourteen, **college of the pacific** thirteen • while **cal** went on to win a bruising game thirty-four to thirteen, the **tiger** was not to be denied as **the following week**



featuring **roy ottoson** placed **pacific** on the **state** eight yard line from where **tom mccormick** drove into the end zone • defense took over and played tug-of-war until the fourth quarter when **ed griffith** blocked a **utah** punt and **pacific** recovered on the six yard line • this time it was **gil ellison** scoring from two yards

pacific blasted utah state thirty-four to seven • while the score indicated an offensive avalanche, it was actually a strong **bengal** defense that highlighted the game • the **tiger machine** scored on the second offensive play of the game as **henry welch** raced seventy-seven yards for a touchdown • a passing attack



out • the final **pacific** touchdown came as **utah** kicked off after making their only touchdown of the night, and **jim conover** taking the ball, reversed it to **al dattola** who went eighty-six yards to paydirt • while the team was out of town, the never ending work of the

continued to insure a proper atmosphere for home games • though the end results of the committee's work often was noticeable only at games and game rallies, it took more than a few hours of preparations to ensure success of these rallies, as well as the halftime card stunts • while the rally committee, under the chairmanship of **horton allan peckenpaugh III**, was working as



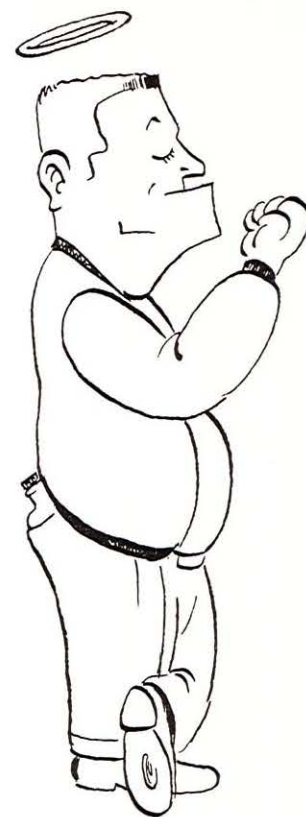

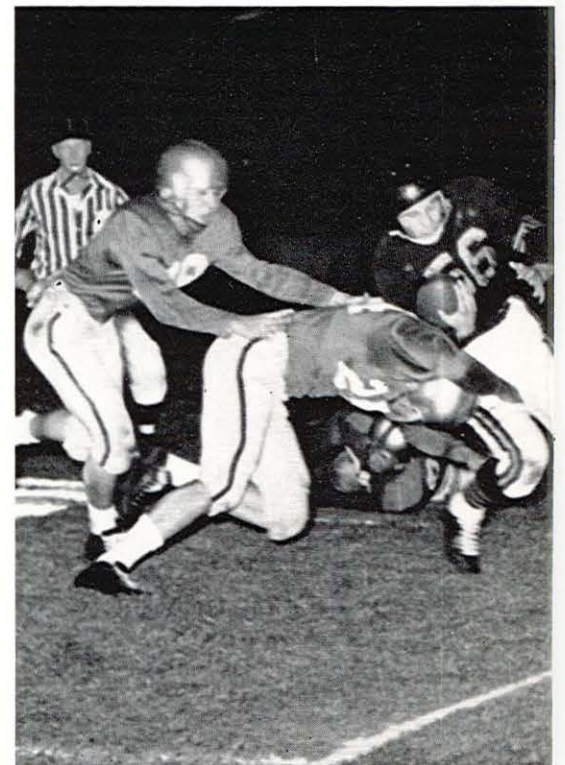


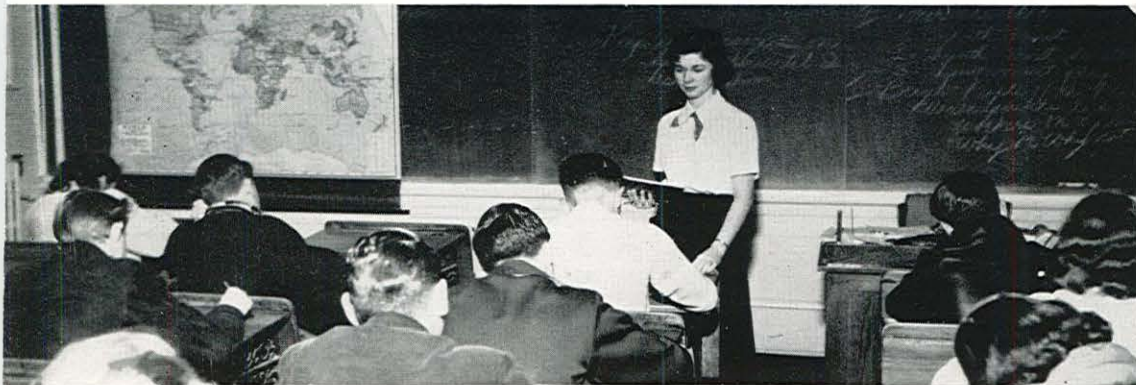


pacific's second victory

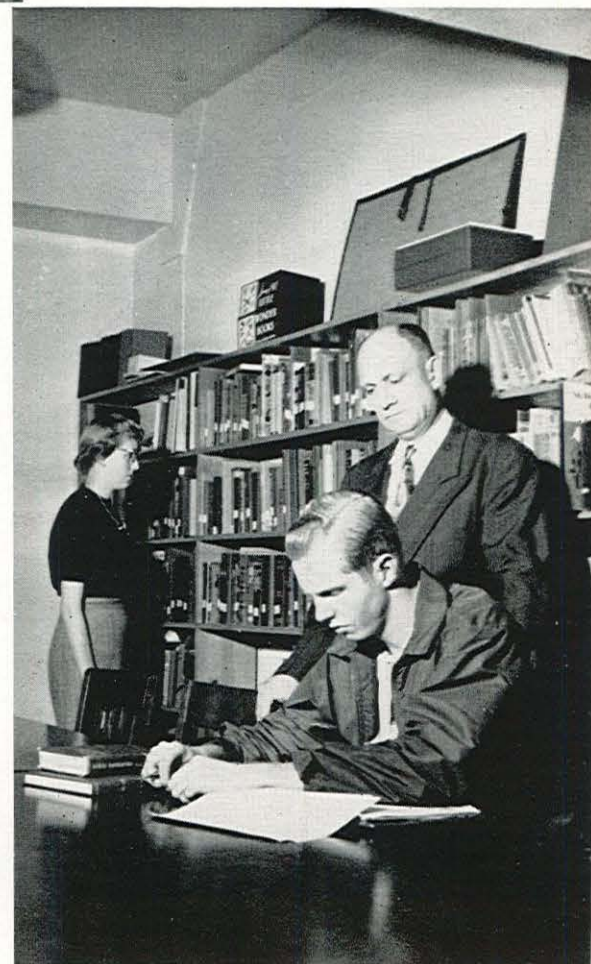
of the football season came as the tigers blasted the texas tech sun bowl champs forty-two to twenty-one • it was roy ottoson and tom mccormick night at memorial stadium as the string bean quarterback completed twelve of eighteen passes for one hundred twenty-eight yards and three touchdowns • in the ground department it was mccormick running for one hundred twenty-six yards and catching four passes for sixty-seven more for a total of one hundred

ninety-three yards • while the final score indicated a slaughter, the texans held a one touchdown lead during the early part of the third quarter • a determined tiger, with claws named dattola, meyers, mitchell, streeter and batten, who filled in for injured all-coast candidate burt delevan, was not to be denied of sun bowl revenge • prior to the game, there was the annual fox-cal theatre rally where tiger faithfuls psyched themselves into a frenzy for the first home game of the season • after the game came dancing at the pacific gym to celebrate the sweet meat of victory • as the fever of victory somewhat subsided by monday, it was again time to return to the purpose of this place named pacific, and outstanding here was the

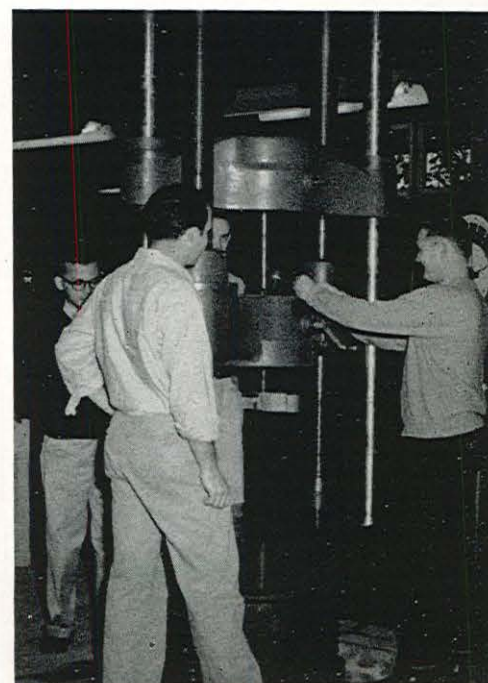


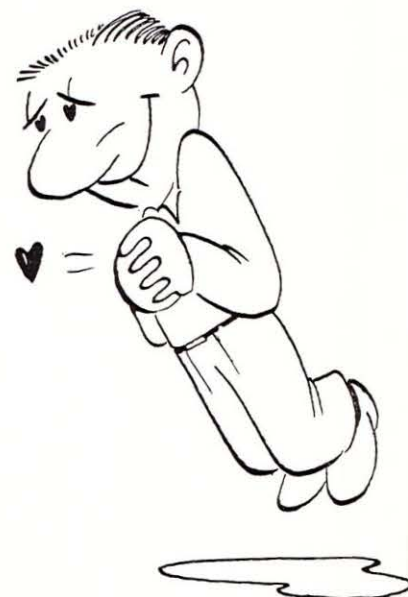
members of the omicron chapter of the fraternity are dean of the college lloyd m. bertholf, national president of the fraternity • using the engineering quonsets as home base is the

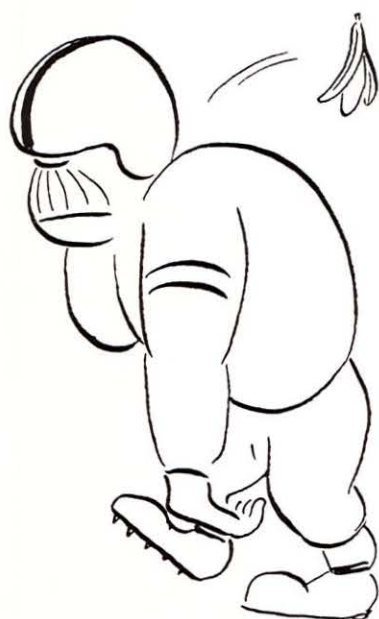


cop roasted a duck fourteen to six

water polo team were in the midst of their most successful season • a record of ten wins and four losses led the "wetbacks" of coach **bill anttila** to the pacific

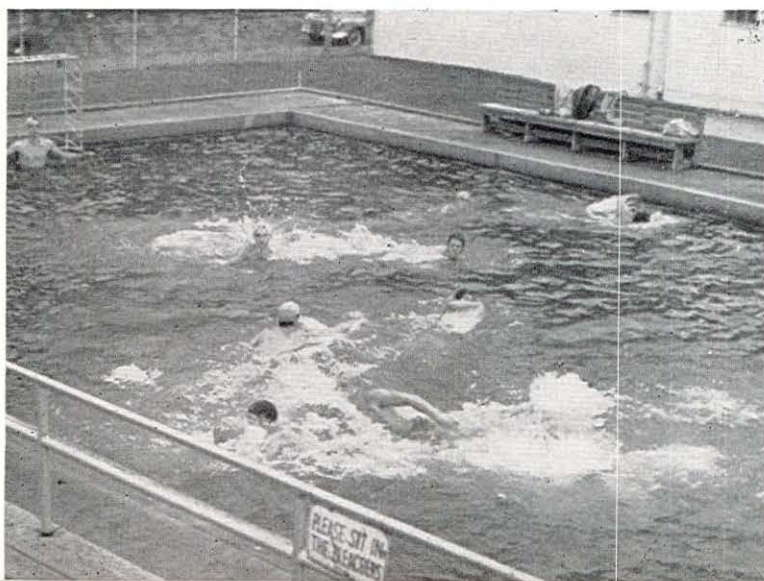

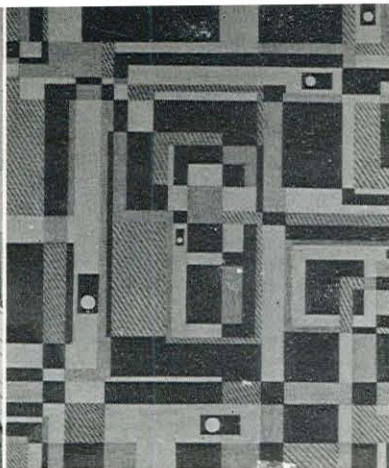
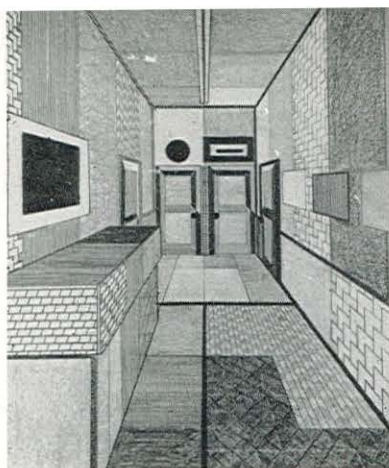
art center
