Crandall has been very active on the Alumni Council for a number of years and is expected to direct several beneficial activities. Bernita Salmon Hobin '30 will act as Vice-President and F. Melvyn Lawson '28, Dale Hamilton '31, and Melburn C. Matheny '34 are the new members of the Council elected for a term of three years. A meeting of the Council is scheduled for September 12 to make plans for many activities under consideration.

"Second Generation Theme" for Commencement Luncheon

One of the largest groups in recent years was present at the annual Commencement luncheon to help carry out the "second generation theme" on Saturday noon, June 5, in Anderson Hall. Sixteen "second generation" families were represented with a total of fifty-two parents and children who had taken work at Pacific.

President F. Melvyn Lawson '28, directed a number of interesting events. Virginia Gardner '34, now studying voice in San Francisco, was well received as she sang several vocal numbers. Other events on the program were the election of new officers, the presentation of the F. Melvyn Lawson Award, the induction of Seniors into the Alumni Association, the announcing of the Charles F. Neumiller Book Fund, the presentation of the new Five-year Program of Advance, and the recognition of the golden anniversary of the class of 1887.

Faculty Additions

Increased enrollment has made necessary several additions to the faculty of the College of the Pacific, for the semester beginning in September.

The retirement of Dean C. Marian Barr, dean of women, is responsible for the appointment of Miss Opal Berg, M. S., and formerly assistant dean of women in charge of social activities at Syracuse University in New York state.

George S. Eby, M. S., has been appointed associate professor of chemistry; Robert Fenix, M. B. A., will instruct in business administration; Irving Goleman, M. A., will serve as an assistant professor of English; Eleanor McCann, M. A., will instruct as associate professor of speech and English; Josephine Smith, Ph. D., has been appointed associate professor of Psychology; Allen Waldo, Ph. D., has been appointed assistant professor of Geology and Geography; and Herbert Welch, B. S., will instruct as associate professor of Engineering and Technology.

Lawson Announces Dramatics Award

At the Commencement dinner which marked the close of his presidency of the Pacific Alumni Association, F. Melvyn Lawson '28, Vice-Principal of Sacramento High School announced the establishment of a dramatics award to be made annually to the student who makes the greatest contribution to the theatre season. A permanent committee from the staff of the theatre makes the selection at the conclusion of each season. Robert Eley '39 was announced as the winner for 1936-37 and his name was engraved on the plaque which will be placed in the lobby of the auditorium permanently. Lawson excelled in dramatics while a student at Pacific.

Neumiller Book Fund Established

As a fitting memorial to her brother, the late Chas. L. Neumiller of Stockton, who distinguished himself in public service in California, Miss Emma Neumiller has established a book fund for the College of the Pacific Library, the income to be used in the purchase of books in the field of Criminology. For a considerable period of time Mr. Neumiller was Chairman of the State Prison Board of California and was beloved for his championing of prison reform. A long-time friend, Warden Johnston of Alcatraz Prison, will act in an advisory capacity in the selection of books. Each book added by the Fund will bear a specially designed book-plate designed by Miss Artelle Baxter '39.
