Proposed Amendment to Alumni Association Constitution

The nominating committee for new officers of the Pacific Alumni Association appointed by President Charles Segerstrom Jr. desires to present the following amendment to the Constitution of the Association:

To amend Article VI, Section 2, to read:

"There shall be an Alumni Council to consist of the officers of the Association and twelve members to be known as Councillors. Said Alumni Council shall manage and carry on the affairs of the Association and perform such other duties as may be assigned to it by the Association. All members of the Council shall be holders of degrees granted by the College of the Pacific."

If the above amendment is adopted by the Association at its meeting on June 15 there will be three additional members of the Alumni Council.

Alumni of Napa College Recall Past at Reunion
