The Mustangs

A strong band of Mustang gridders, coached for the first time by Earl Klapstein, will hoof their way into the Rose Bowl tonight seeking to overcome the Pasadena City College eleven.

The San Joaquin aggregation got off to a rather poor start, losing their first three tussles to Sacramento, San Mateo and Santa Rosa, but came back in an impressive fashion to down favored Hartnell College, 13-6, and Modesto, 28-6.

In the first encounter of the two schools last season, the Mustangs, then known as the Cubs, trimmed the Bulldogs, 21-13.

Most Pasadena fans will probably remember the running of Eddie Macon, who was the whole show for the hometowners. This year, to take the place of Macon, John Cobb, a 9.8 swifty from Kentucky, will take over the toting chores. In previous contests left halfback Cobb has chalked up sizeable gains in rambling all over the field for yardage.

When this speedster lets up, his mate, pile-driving Ted Case, Lodi's All-Conference selection, takes over the offensive duties. Both Case and Cobb also play extensively on defense.

Field general Harlan Berndt, in the quarterback position, will provide the passing when the Mustangs take to the air. He's another Lodi product, standing six foot one and weighing 180 pounds.

The white-shirted Northerners will field a somewhat light forward wall, averaging only 180 pounds.

Little Joe Roberts, Stockton High School's All-Conference guard and former captain on the All-North-

ern California prep team, proves to be the number one spark plug for the club. At the right tackle spot Roberts has shown to be a hard charging and dependable blocker, opening up holes for the scatbacks to scamper through.

Along with Roberts will be two other capable returning lettermen from last year, reliables Jim Brown, center, and guard Darryl Wilkenson, both ex-Stockton High gridmen.

Another bright spot in the Mustang lineup is in Jim Watson, right halfback from Manteca. He has been a steady performer. This is one of many prospects that Coach Klapstein brought with him from Manteca where he coached the Manteca High School Buffalos to a Valley Oak championship last season.

Gone are most of the regulars from last year's team and in their place are green prepsters who will be carrying the load for Stockton College.

Klapstein and his assistants, Gene Stagnaro and Collie Kidwell, have stressed hard blocking and tackling from the "T" formation.

Since the start of the season the Port City lads have been plagued with plenty of injuries. For instance, after the Santa Rosa game the disabled list read: a shoulder separation, a twisted knee, a twisted ankle, and a hip pointer.

Barring further mishaps, the black and white chargers will be at full strength for the fray in the Rose Bowl.

The Mustangs are a scrappy little ball club and should be able to hold their own against the southlanders.

So, beware, Pasadena, Stockton's thundering herd has arrived!

The Bulldogs

Returning from Sterling, Colorado and a 76-0 victory over Sterling Junior College, the Pasadena City College Bulldogs encounter the Stockton Junior College Mustangs in a non-conference game tonight. Stockton won the opening game of the series last year by the margin of 21-13.

In an attempt to win tonight's game, Coach Bob Blackman will have the services of several men who have been out recently with injuries. Walt Anderson will receive the starting assignment at left half after three weeks layoff due to an injury of his left arm; end John Diskin has overcome a pulled muscle in his right leg; fullback Norm Schade's sprained foot has healed.

Coach Blackman is sending Ted Todd into tonight's game as the starting signal-caller. Last week at Sterling, Todd threw four touchdown passes for the Bulldogs. At left end will be Carl Kafkaloff, who scored two touchdowns and was named player of the week last week. Kafkaloff is also one of the best Bulldogs on defense, as many would-be passers will testify.

At right half, Bob Ashworth, the leading ground gainer, will start. Rapid Robert has gained 227 yards for the Bulldogs this year.

Center Hal Sachs, who was injured in the LACC game, did not play at Sterling, but will be ready to assume the starting assignment at center tonight. Bobby

Cox, who has played a steady and good game all year long, will be joined by Bob Flaherty to start at the guard spots. The tackle positions will be amply filled by lettermen Chuck Miller and Eugene Jacobs.

Lee Phillips starts tonight at the fullback spot.

Ample help for these men will be supplied by Bill Davis, Dave Wilkins, Mike DelConte, Ed Pucci, Lynn Aplanalp, Al Tanner, Don Burroughs, Grant Gaunce, Dave Gorrie, Angelo Bosco, Ed Foltzer, Bob Bracken, Bill Bell, Bob Meyers, Con Schweitzer, Bob Hirohata, Bob Lasken, Lee Buffington and Dick Snyder.

The kickoff department is well held down by Bob Meyers, who averages about 55 yards per kick. Meyers shares the punting duties with Dave Wilkins, and the converting chores with center Hal Sachs.

The passing is well in hand with quarterback Don Burroughs, Lynn Aplanalp and Ted Todd. Bill Davis does the passing from the halfback slot.

However good the passing may be, the attack is not complete without good receivers. Ends Kafkaloff, Diskin, Tanner and Bell join with backs Wilkins, Anderson, Schade, Gorrie, Phillips, Ashworth, Buffington, Lasken and Meyers to complete the catching half of the passing.

The Bulldogs hope to keep their undefeated record intact with a victory tonight, thus keeping them in the running for the possible bid to the Little Rose Bowl game.

Half-time Entertainment

Stars of tomorrow may be among the two hundred boys who will appear on the Rose Bowl turf tonight at half-time as the Pasadena Department of Recreation presents the third annual demonstration of elementary touch football.

The twenty teams of fourth, fifth and sixth grade boys are now playing games every Saturday at Pasadena's community recreation centers. Tonight, with the cooperation of the Pasadena Junior Chamber of Commerce; William K. Dunn, director of PCC athletics; and Earl Holder, the boys will demonstrate four typical plays, responding to signals given over the public-address system. The second part of their contribution to your enjoyment will be two games between four representative teams.

Touch football is one of the five sports in the calendar of the year for Pasadena and Altadena boys. In December and January they will learn and play basketball; soccer football follows in February; in March the annual elementary track and field meet holds the spotlight; then playground baseball closes the year.

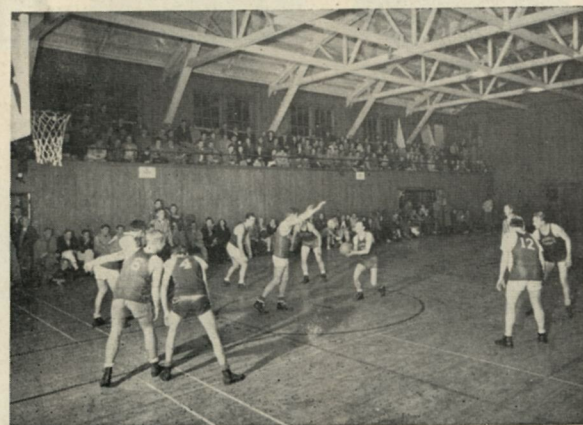


HOMERUN KINGS and pitching heroes of the future, at the Summer Baseball School, conducted annually at Brookside Park by the Department of Recreation.

Sports and games participation for everyone is the goal of the recreation program. Junior high school boys enjoy the same activities in season as the elementary boys. Junior high school boys and girls have special opportunity to learn good badminton in Friday night classes at two recreation centers every week.

Regular tournaments and leagues dot the whole year. One of the most important is the Annual Pasadena Junior Tennis Championships, which reaches the finals tomorrow at Altadena Town and Country Club. Next June marks the twenty-eighth renewal of the Pasadena Tennis Tournament, for both adult and junior players. The Southern California Junior Badminton Tournament will be held in Pasadena again next May.

For young men and women, there's a chance to play in three Municipal Leagues: "flag" football now playing Tuesday and Thursday nights at Jefferson Park; the basketball leagues opening in mid-November; and the owl softball leagues playing every year from May through August.

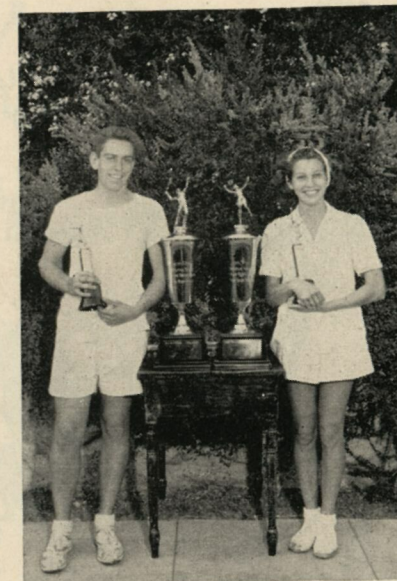

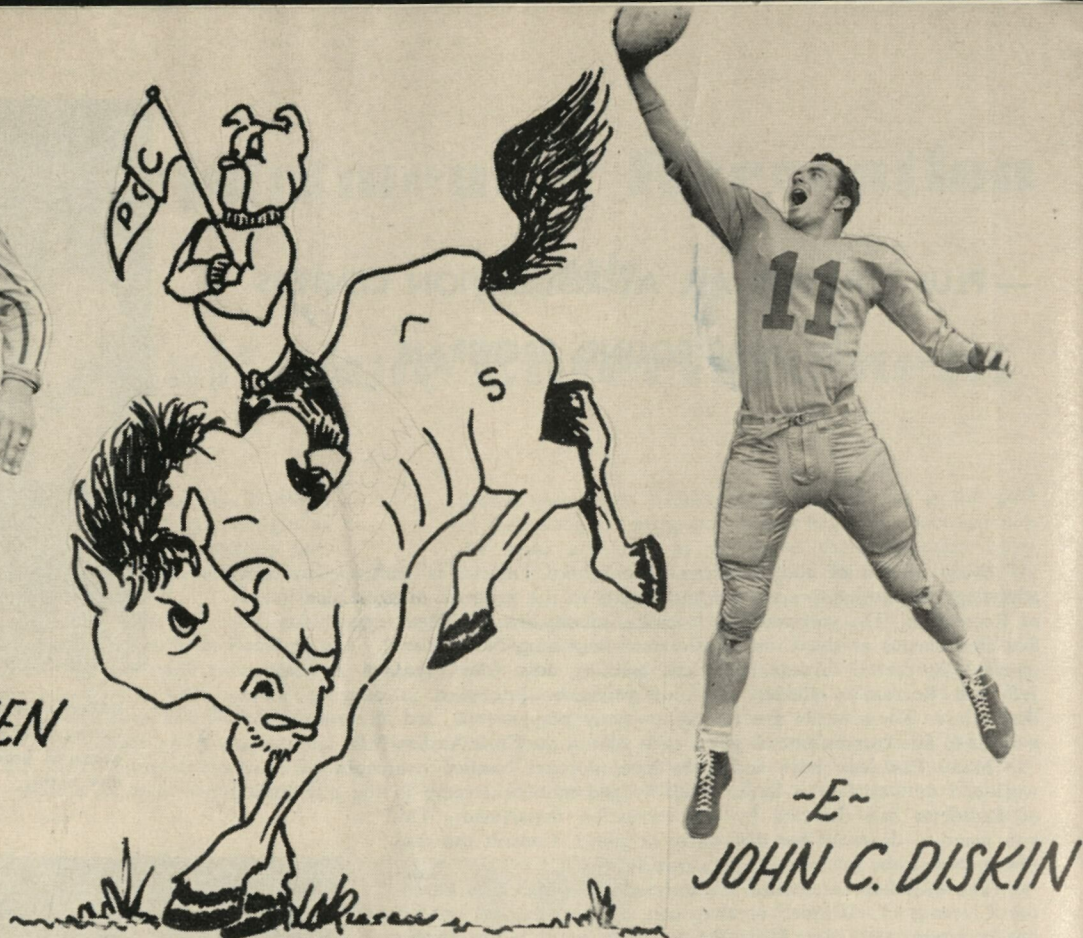

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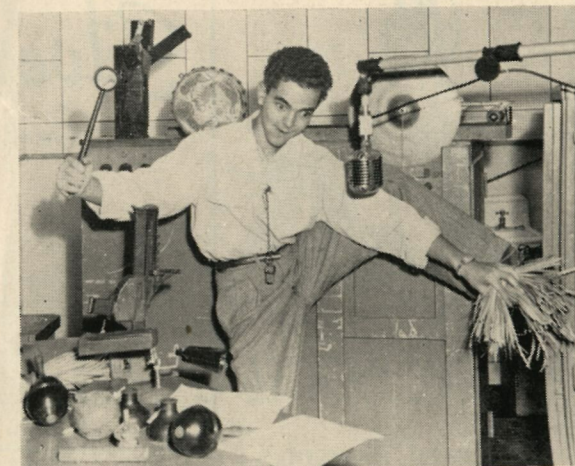
Radio Open House

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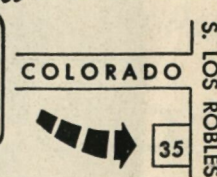

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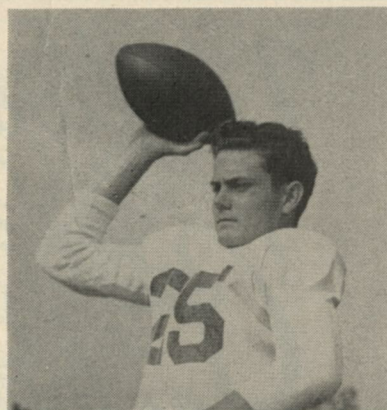
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Player of the Week

Don Burroughs, 165 pound, 6 foot 3 inch quarterback for the Pasadena City College Bulldogs received the "Player of the Week" award for his outstanding play against Los Angeles City College. With this gesture, Don snares the coveted traveling jacket from the Pasadena men's store, Voget and Cathey.

This year represents Don's first attempt at Junior College football, and already he has fought his way into a first string berth and into the limelight with his tremendous passing. In the LACC game he completed 8 out of 11 for a .727 record. His season record is 18 completions out of 37 passes for a .489. In the LACC Cub fray, Don had a 4.7 carrying average.

An all-conference selection from Fillmore High School in Ventura County, Don also excels in basketball, baseball and track. He expects to go to Santa Clara after he leaves PCC, and may look forward to a pro career. He is only 18 years old now.

Coach Bob Blackman looks for him to perform even better as the season progresses and as he gets more college football experience.

Watch for him tonight—he's number 13.

Sterling Junior College

Winner of the Voget and Cathey jacket for the game against Sterling Junior College of Colorado last week was Carl Kafkaloff, letterman end. Carl scored two touchdowns in the 76-0 rout of the Plainsmen and had two others called back by penalties.

Although hampered by injuries early this season, Carl has played a consistently good game and was selected as the outstanding member of a team that was playing outstanding ball against the Rocky Mountain team.

A three year letterman at Akron, Ohio High School, Carl moved to California last year and lettered with the 1948 Bulldog team. He is small for an end at 5'9" and 170 pounds, but makes up for it in aggressiveness. Watch for him tonight; he's number 28.

Next Week In The Bowl . . .

It will be the "Battle of the Musicks" next Friday night in the Rose Bowl as Bob Musick's Ventura Pirates come to the Bowl to meet the Pasadena CC Bulldogs, whose line is coached by Jack Musick. These brothers were great competitors at USC, playing on the same team for one year. Next Friday night they will be on opposite sides of the playing field.

The Rose Bowl will also be the site of the Pageant-Parade Silver Jubilee. For the 7:30 Friday evening Pageant-Parade preceding the varsity-Ventura game, there are over thirty float entries. The students have selected what to them are highlight events of the past twenty-five years.

At 7:30 p.m. within the Rose Bowl only, motorized floats presenting a chronological history of Pasadena City College will roll around the track. One of the floats will be a huge seven-foot birthday cake on a jeep. There will also be cars filled with the dignitaries of the city and of the school. The Bulldog Band will also be there as the official tournament of Roses Band of the Golden Jubilee Parade of 1936. 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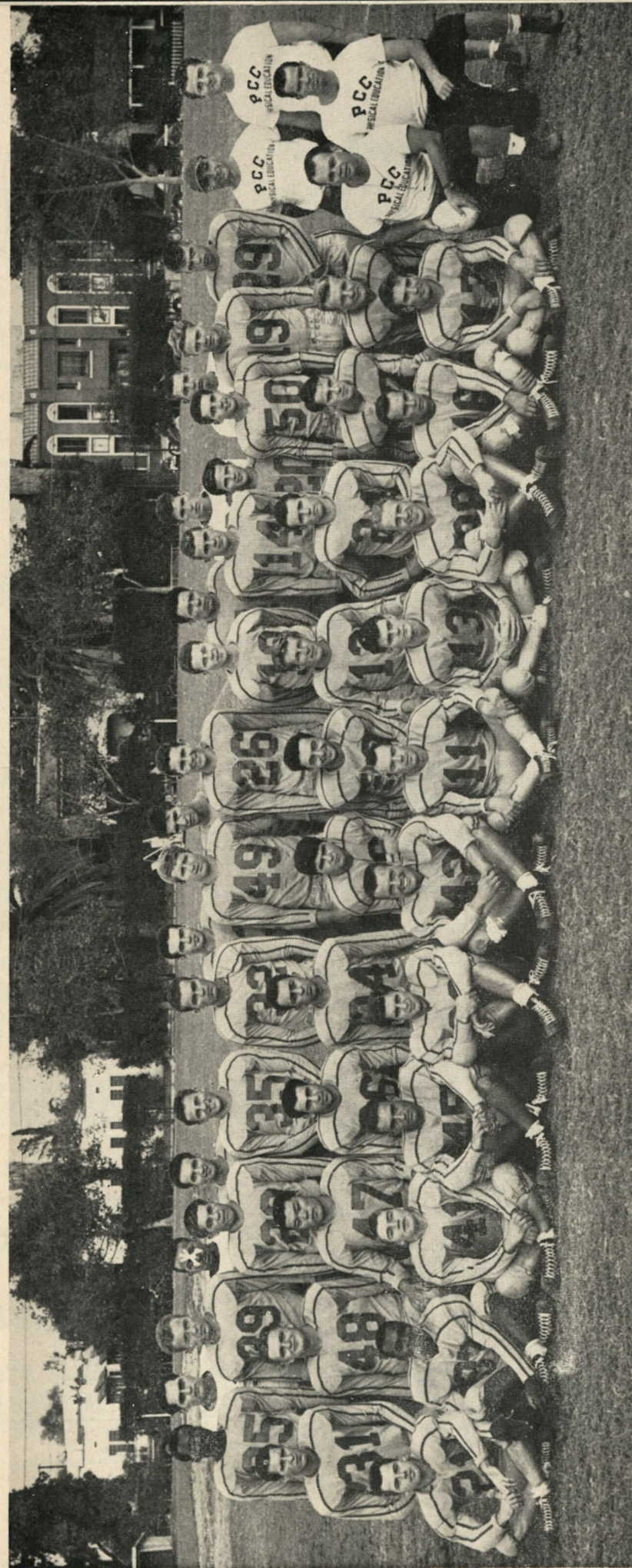
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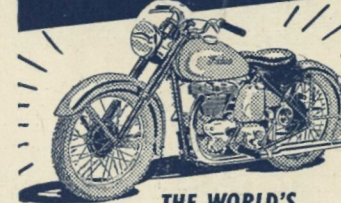
