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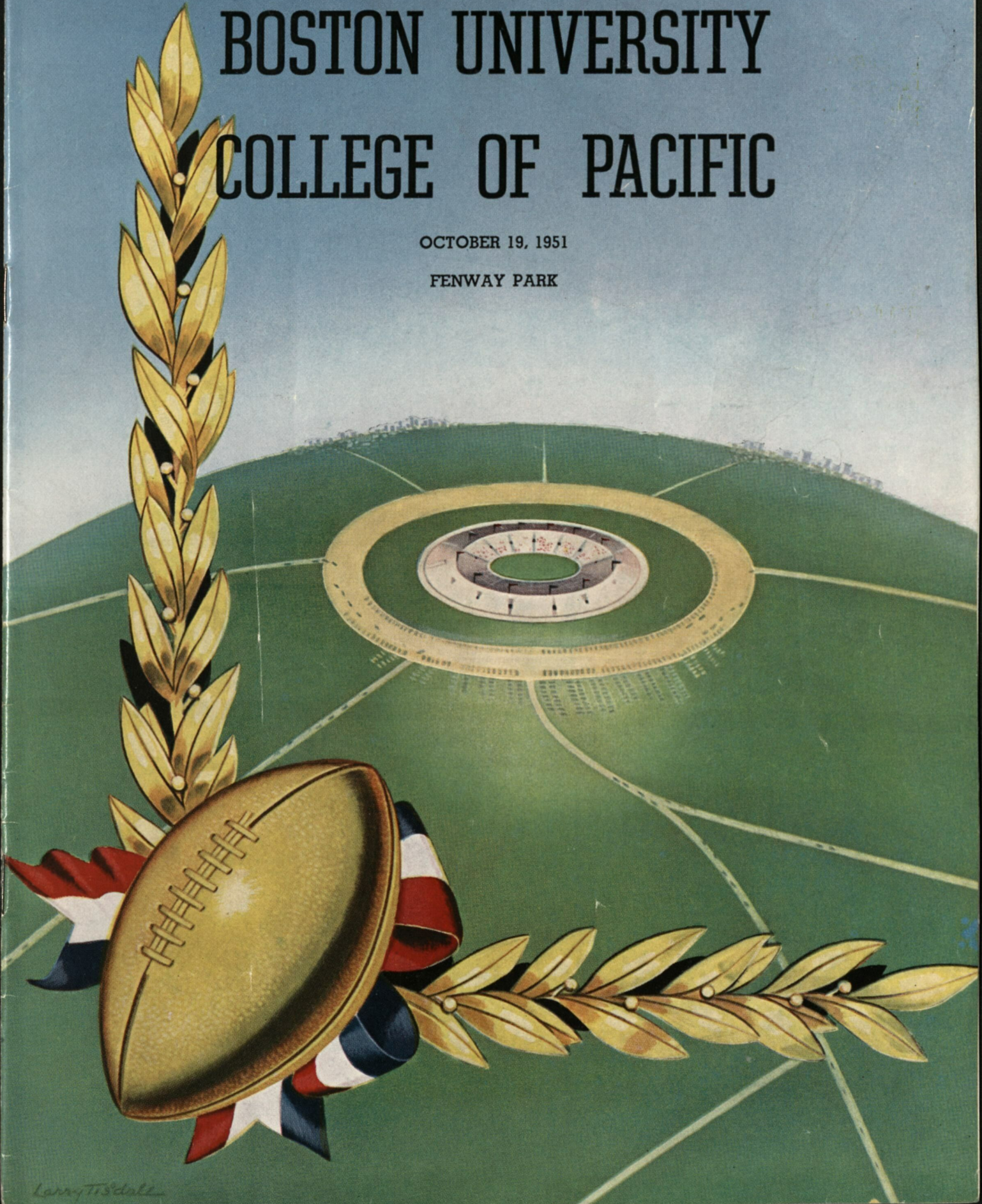

Looking Ahead

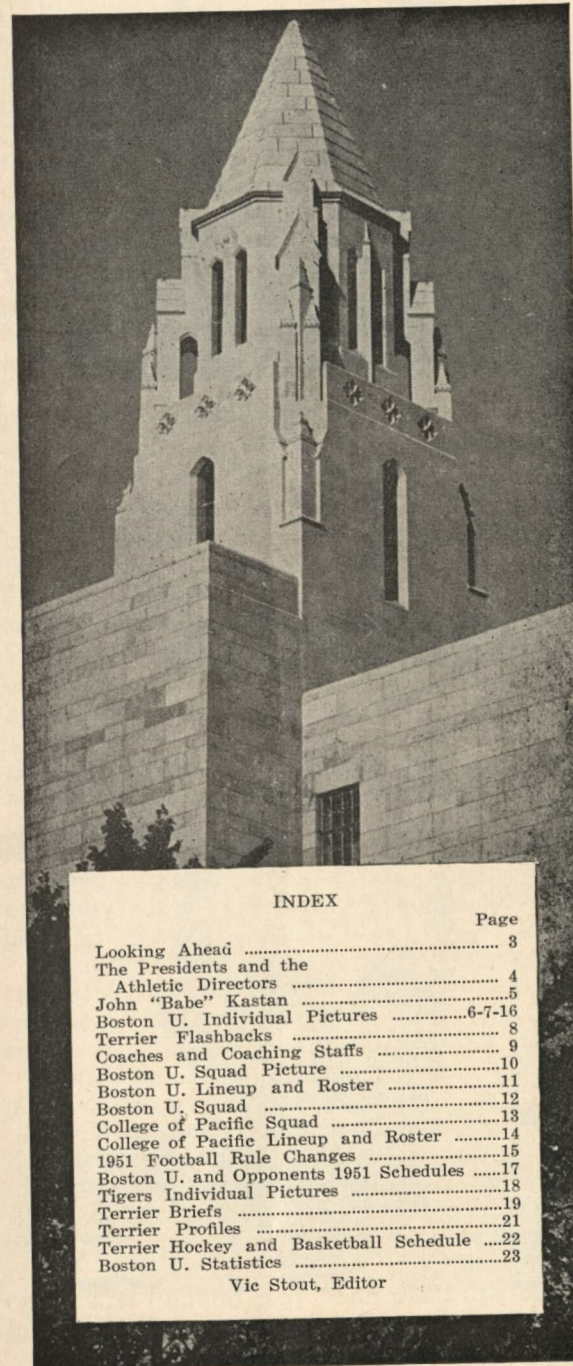
Following a year lapse the Terriers renew their football series with Temple University next Friday evening when they oppose the Owls at Temple Stadium. The contest marks the third between the two teams, Boston University having won the two prior engagements by scores of 13 to 7 in 1948 and 28 to 7 in 1949.

Going into tomorrow's game with Delaware Temple boasted of a record of three wins and one defeat. The victories were scored over Brown, Rutgers and Albright while the sole defeat was suffered at the hands of Syracuse in Temple's opening game. While the opposition has not been exceptionally strong, barring possibly Rutgers, Temple has appeared considerably stronger than in recent years and the contest next Friday looms as a fairly even ball game.

Al Kawal, former line coach during the Pat Hanley regime, is currently in his third year at the Temple helm and his rebuilding job is about to pay dividends. He is working this year with 24 lettermen and has one of the top backs in the East in junior Duke Wuzzardo and a slick quarterback in Gavin White.

The Friday game marks the Terriers last road game. The following Saturday they return to Fenway Park for successive engagements with N. Y. U., Oregon, Wichita and Syracuse.

Meanwhile the strong Terrier freshman team which played the Army Plebes to a 22 to 33 ball game last week plays the Holy Cross first-year team in its home opener at Nickerson Field, Nov. 2. This game is being sponsored by the Boston University Alumni Association with the receipts being turned over to the Alumni Fund. Tickets are pegged at \$1.20 for the public and 60 cents for students.

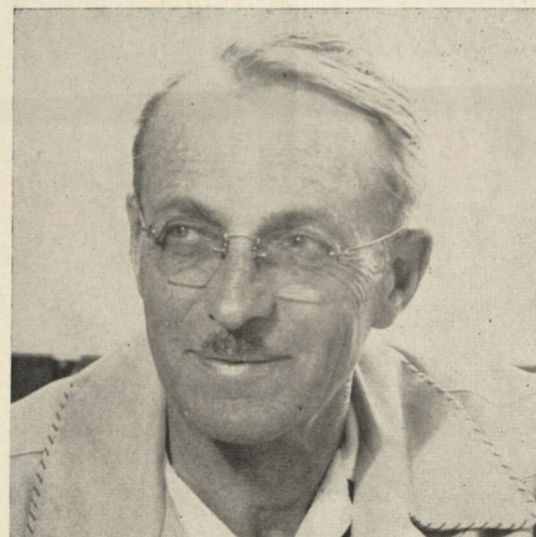

John "Babe" Kastan

If you were a football coach, how would you like to have a fullback who averages two touchdowns per game and 6.8 yards a carry, is an excellent pass receiver, a sure-fisted ballhandler, backs up the line on defense, and who can step into the quarterback or halfback spots at a moment's notice?

Versatile John "Babe" Kastan, the 6', 190-lb. Boston University senior, is a fellow who does all that and plenty more. Is it any wonder that Coach Buff Donelli of the Terriers thinks he has the top fullback in the East.

In the Scarlet and White's first four games, Kastan has scored eight touchdowns for 48 points — only 12 points short of Bobby Whelan's 1949 Terrier record of 60. In 49 tries from scrimmage John has gained 334 yards. He has also been one of Harry Agganis' favorite passing targets with ten receptions for 189 yards.

"John is big, fast and durable," says Coach Donelli. "He's a slashing runner who can dig through the line and once in the secondary turns it on like a halfback."

One of Kastan's biggest assets is his clever ball-handling. He seldom fumbles. For this reason, the Terriers use him in double safety position with Capt. Lindy Hanson to return kicks. He also holds for placement kicks.

Defensively John is a very effective linebacker who smacks down enemy backs. Always alert, he recovers more than his share of fumbles.

"Babe" has come a long way as a football player since as a 14-year-old he forged his mother's signature to permit him to play for Glassport (Pa.) High. Now seven seasons later Mrs. Kastan is John's No. 1 fan. Three weeks ago at Penn State his mother and father watched excitedly while John nearly wrecked the Nittany Lions with four dazzling TD runs.

His high school coach was Vin McKeeta, who played for Donelli's Orange Bowl team at Duquesne. Vin first suggested that John attend Boston U. John has never regretted that advice.

"Buff Donelli is tops," says John. "I've never met a coach who knew more about football."

In his freshman year with the Terrier Pups, Kastan starred at fullback in a backfield which also included Hanson, Agganis, and Don Wallace. As a sophomore in 1949 he fulfilled all expectations as he scored four touchdowns. In the opener at Syracuse he bucked through center for a TD on his first running play. John piled up 198 yards in 44 tries that year for a 4.5 average.

Pre-season prophets picked him as All-New England fullback in 1950. However, when Agganis was called by the Marines and Bill Pavlikowski's arm was broken, Coach Donelli asked John to step out of his natural position to handle the all-

important quarterback job in the Terriers' tricky T-offense. John accepted.

John had never thrown a pass in collegiate competition. He had done some passing in high school from the double-wing. His poise and football knowledge made the move logical.

As could be expected, John and the crippled Terriers had their troubles during the rest of last season. Playing two-way football through most of the games, he tied for Scarlet and White scoring honors with five TD's. He threw 95 passes and completed 39 for 411 yards and three touchdowns.

This season Kastan earned the title of "Man about the Backfield" by starting at right half. The Terriers hoped to capitalize on his speed and broken-field running ability.

A change in player personnel forced Donelli to shift the "Babe" back to fullback in the wild Penn State contest. John has been celebrating his return "home" position ever since. In that game, while playing before many of his home-town friends, Kastan played his greatest collegiate game.

John carried 17 times against Penn State for 99 yards, grabbed six passes for 135 yards, scored four TD's, and was the Terrier defensive standout. In the next two games against Louisville and Camp Lejeune, John scored two touchdowns in each.

Kastan is majoring in public relations at Boston U. Since he is 21-years-old and 1A, Uncle Sam may be his next employer. He hopes eventually to break into pro football. John admits that he prefers to play fullback, but as he says, "As long as I can help the team, I don't care where I play."

His pass-catching record has John a little puzzled. "At Nickerson Field," he says, "I can't seem to handle any of Harry's passes." In game competition he has grabbed all ten passes thrown to him.

Here at Boston U. Kastan has confined his athletics to football. In high school, he captained both the football and basketball teams, and played first base on the baseball nine.

John expects a very tough battle with College of the Pacific tonight. "COP has the best all-around backfield I've ever played against," he says. "Macon and McCormick are fine backs."

He rates the '49 Terrier backfield of Agganis, Whelan, George Luker, and Charlie Kent as the best collegiate group he has ever seen.

A few years hence there may be another member of the Kastan family in the Boston U. backfield. John has a 13-year-old brother, Carl, who is keeping up the family tradition by starring as a 115-lb. fullback in the Glassport midget league.

Terrier fans wish that Carl were about five years older. Imagine two Kastans in the same backfield!

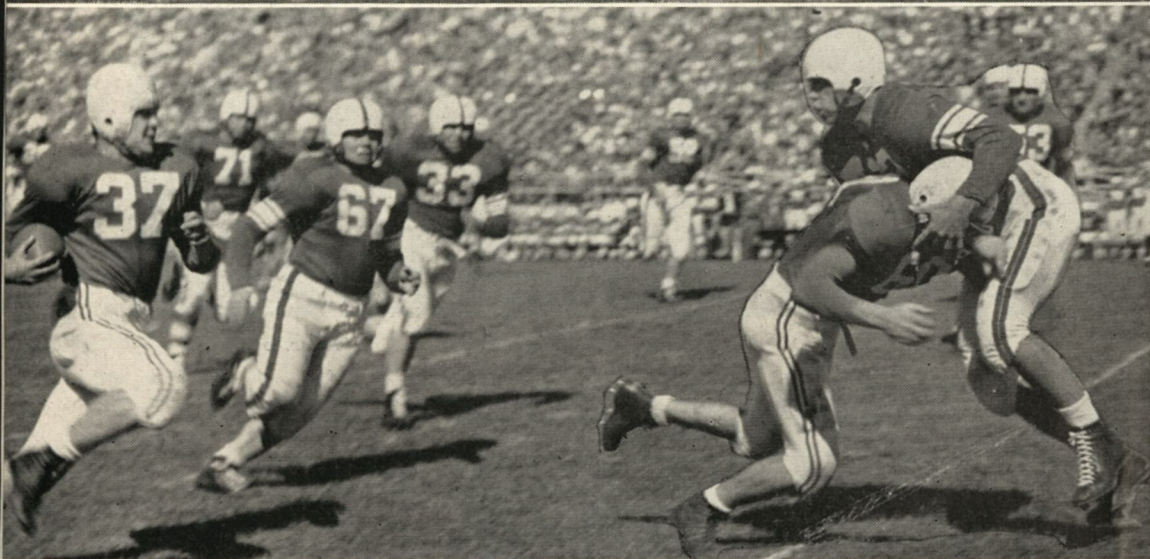

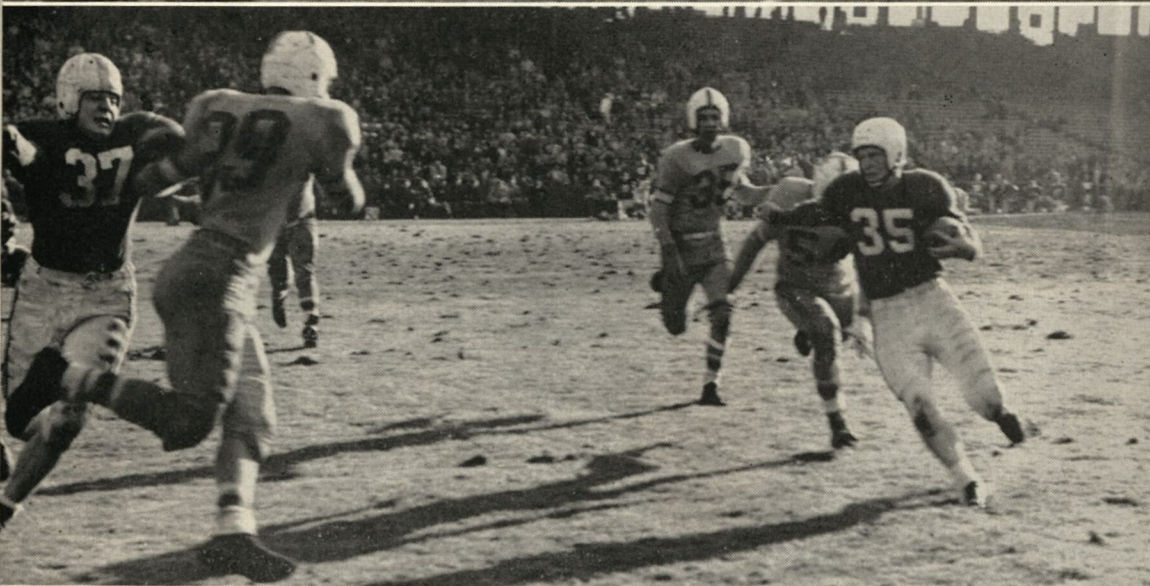

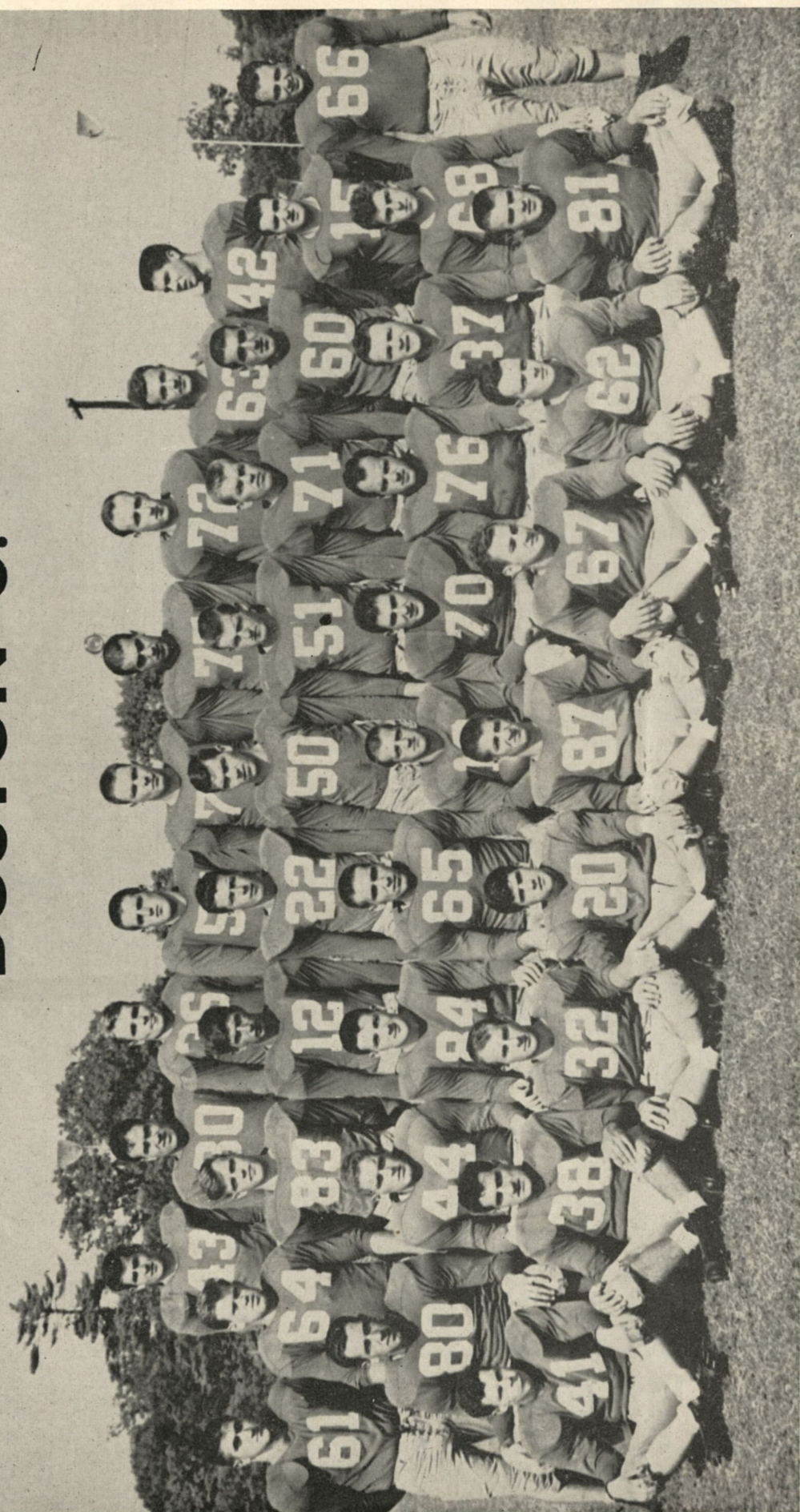

1951 FOOTBALL RULE CHANGES

FOOTBALL'S development, from its early beginnings to the fast-moving, colorful spectacle it is today, has necessitated annual rules changes to meet the various situations which occur.

This year there are no new basic rules. There are merely alterations to improve the present

ones. One rule which was dropped last year has now been put back in the book.

The five changes listed below will bring you up to date on the 1951 Rules Book. Read them over and enjoy the game!

- 1. THE FAIR CATCH WILL BE USED BY COLLEGES AGAIN THIS YEAR.** After a year's absence from the Rules Book, the Committee has found it advisable to reinstate the fair catch, in the best interest of protecting the receiving back from vicious down field tackles. This rule has been rewritten and simplified to facilitate its administration by Officials. There is no longer the requirement that the player stop within two steps after the catch. The rule is now simple and clear. It merely states, "When a player makes a fair catch, the ball becomes dead where caught and shall belong to the receiving team at the spot where that player first touched it." The signal for a fair catch, remains the same; the player making the catch shall raise one hand clearly above his head and wave it from side to side. Under the old rule, the team making the fair catch had the option of putting the ball in play by a free kick or scrimmage. This option is now deleted and the ball must be put in play from scrimmage.
- 2. PENALTY FOR ILLEGAL SHIFT NOW REDUCED TO FIVE YARDS.** For several years there has been a very fine distinction between a man illegally in motion and an illegal shift. The penalty for the former being five yards and the latter fifteen yards. Because of the fact that these two violations of the rules were so closely related, and many times confused, the Committee decided to make the penalty for each the same, which is a great step toward consistency and conformity in the rules.
- 3. VIOLATION OF SUBSTITUTION RULE NO LONGER PENALIZED AS DELAY-OF-GAME.** One of the most confusing things in football from a spectator's point of view has been eliminated. How often have you seen the defensive team run in a substitute when the ball was ready-for-play, but before the offensive team had even lined up over the ball. The Referee would blow his whistle and step off five yards

against the defensive team. The public address system would announce to the stands that the defensive team was being penalized for delay of game. Now you know and I know, that the game was not delayed by that substitution. Actually, it was a violation of the substitution rule as substitutions cannot be made once the ball is ready-for-play. However, last year any violation of the substitution rule was called illegal delay. This year it will be properly penalized as a violation of the substitution rule.

- 4. BALL SHALL NOT BE PUT IN PLAY UNTIL REFEREE SIGNALS READY-FOR-PLAY.** No more will the offensive team be able to pull that old surprise play of lining up on the ball and, without signals or huddle, snap it while the defensive team is still picking itself up off the field. This year the ball must be declared ready-for-play by the Referee before it can be put in play. The Referee will signal ready-for-play by extending his right arm aloft and bringing it down to his side.
- 5. STARTING THE CLOCK.** There is one change in the timing of a game this year that will be significant. Last year after any time out, free time out or excess time out, the clock was started, as soon as the ball was ready-for-play. Quite often toward the end of a period with only a few seconds left to play, the team in possession of the ball, trailing by a slight margin, would ask for one of its free times out, just to kill the clock and assure itself of one more play. The Referee would grant the time out, but as soon as the time was up and the Referee had declared the ball ready-for-play, the clock would start and usually run out before the team could put the ball in play. This seemed to work an injustice upon a team which had conserved its times out all during the game for just such an occasion. This year, the Rules Committee has decided that after a free time out has been granted, the clock shall not start until the ball is actually put in play.

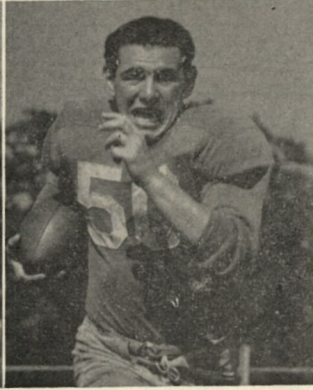

Terrier Briefs

This College of Pacific team, rated by some western observers as second only to Pappy Waldorf's California team on the Pacific Coast, tops the nation in rushing offense. The Tigers have averaged 379.3 yards per game with halfbacks Tommy McCormick and Eddie Macon accounting for most of the ground yardage.

McCormick, a junior from Texas, ranks fifth in the nation in rushing with 489 yards in 85 carries while the fleet Macon has chalked up 322 yards in 57 sallies through or around the opposing teams. The latter athlete runs the 100-yard dash in 9.7 seconds and is well remembered by the Terrier football players. A year ago in that fog-bound game at Stockton, Cal. Macon ran wild in the gathering gloom and, in addition to several long runs from scrimmage, ran a Terrier kickoff back 101 yards for a touchdown.

This is Ernie Jorge's first year as C. O. P. coach. The 37-year-old Californian served for four years as line coach at the Stockton college and was elevated to the head post when Larry Siemmering resigned last spring. In the middle '30's he played for Slip Madigan's St. Mary's team and in 1937 played 522 minutes of a possible 540.

Harry Agganis continues to rank second in the nation in the punting department. The Greek's 10 boots have averaged 43.8 yards. His passing record took a bit of a dive last week but his 37 completions in 68 attempts is good enough to rank him 14th nationally.

Johnny Kastan continues to play an inspired fullback. Gaining 105 yards a week ago against the stubborn Camp Lejeune line, Johnny brought his season's total rushing yardage to 334 which places him 13th in the nation. The Glassport, Pa. senior has tallied eight touch-

downs in the four games to date which places him among the Eastern leaders in that department. As a matter of fact he appears to be a cinch to top Bobby Whelan's all-time Boston U. scoring record of 60 points in a season and may close in on Bobby's all-time rushing yardage of 720.

Steve Sinko, the capable Terrier line coach, isn't one for handing out many words of praise during the season. But he has had plenty to say this year about the fine defensive play of senior Ed Czerapowicz. Sophomores who have rated highly in Steve's book are sophomores Ray Cataloni, Don Fraser, Jim Merideth, and Gerry Pedneault.

Paul Salisbury is a gent whom Terrier football fans should be hearing plenty about in the next few years. The red-headed freshman fullback from Arlington scored two touchdowns against the Army Plebes last week. One of his TD's was on a 95-yard punt return.

Titus Plomaritus' field goal against Lejeune last week was his second as a Terrier. A year ago his three-pointer edged William and Mary, 16-14.

That Holy Cross-Boston University freshman game at Nickerson Field Nov. 2 should be one of the top attractions of the local season. Both Buff Donelli and Eddie Anderson plan to use most of their first-year stars and a repetition of that 1948 game at Worcester may be in the offing. The game is being sponsored by the Boston University alumni association with the receipts reverting to the Alumni Fund. General admission is \$1.20 for the public, 60 cents for students.

Bill King of the Associated Press said earlier in the week that west coast press coverage demands for this game was the heaviest of the past 25 years. The Tigers apparently are well thought of back in their home state.

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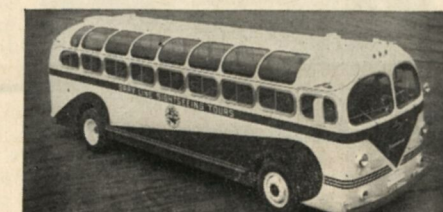

ENDS

Rugged BOB CAPUANO, the 6'1" junior from Cranston, R. I., is rated one of the best all around ends in Boston U. football history. A year ago he caught five touchdown passes, and this season with Harry Agganis tossing to him, Bob may threaten several national pass-catching marks. He could be All-American this year. Bob, who wears size 14 shoes and has huge hands, is equally effective on defense . . . Senior TOM OATES of Watertown is an excellent pass receiver and a good defensive end. As a soph Tom grabbed five Agganis touchdown passes. Blond NILS STROM, a junior and one of Agganis' teammates at Lynn Classical, is an exceptionally fine defensive and even though he weighs only 170 . . . MARCO LANDON, Leominster soph, is one of the finest defensive end prospects ever to enter Boston U. The 170-lb. mighty mite reminds fans of Walt Anderson, an all-time Terrier defensive master . . . JIM MEREDITH, a rugged soph from Fitchburg, is another soph who will see plenty of service. ED MILKEY, a 6'2" soph from Turner's Falls, is a highly-rated offensive end . . . The necessary depth is added to the end roster by four promising freshmen—DON GALVIN of Lynn, JIM ZEGOUROS of Waltham, TOM MICHAEL of Southbridge, and BOB SERDAM of Reading.

TACKLES

An All-New England candidate is JOE BARBAGALLO, a 215-lb. senior from Arlington. This is Joe's third season as a starter, and it figures to be his best . . . ED CZERAPOWICZ, a senior majoring in public relations, has been one of Donelli's most reliable linemen for the past two seasons. The 190-lb. athlete from Florence, Mass. is one of the lightest tackles in the East . . . DON FRASER, 215-lb. soph from Somerville, is one of the prize linemen from last Fall's Pup eleven . . . MIKE VENDETTI of Leominster and GERRY PEDNEAULT of Dracut, both 6'2", 205-lb. tackles, are the other sophs who have gained varsity status. The 6'5" RUSS SHEPHERD of Westboro, BOB PENTA of Providence, TONY ASSAD of Worcester, and SEYMOUR POLLACK of Buffalo are the four freshmen who will keep their experienced teammates hustling for positions. BOB DOBIAS, the hard-luck junior from Greenfield, is making another comeback bid after undergoing a cartilage operation as a freshman.

GUARDS

Pound for pound the popular PAT DONAHUE of Fairfield, Me., rates with the best line-backers in the country. He tips the scales at only 175, but that doesn't stop Pat from tipping enemy backs for sizeable losses . . . LEN D'ERRICO, a sturdy junior, teamed with Capuano at Cranston high school. Len will be a consistent starter this season . . . KARL MILLER, a senior from Assonet majoring in public relations, was an outstanding end as a freshman, a good tackle as a soph, and an outstanding guard as a junior. This should be Karl's best season . . . RAY (CAT) CATALONI, Foxboro soph, is regarded by line coach Steve Sinko as one of the finest guard prospects he has ever seen. Despite his varsity inexperience, he opened the season at a starting spot . . . BERNIE MAIURI, soph from Malden, was a freshman fullback last Fall. Now he ranks as one of the team's top line-backers . . . MIKE MAVROPOULOS of Somerville was a freshman standout last year. He may crack the starting lineup before this season ends . . . ARNIE BERG of Caldwell, N. J. and GERRY KEANE of Brookline are capable junior guards. GORDIE WESTWATER of Lynn, TONY RANDO of Waltham, MYLES KIBERD of Chelmsford, DICK KELLY of Arlington, JOE GALOTTA of Newport, N. H., DAN BOYLEN of Wilmington, and ERNIE ZAMBON of Rutland are the freshman tackles who may nudge their way past their more experienced teammates.

CENTERS

One of the Terriers' pre-season problems was center, but four men seemed to have ended that worry. JOHN

PAPPAS, 220-lb. soph from Worcester, grabbed the starting offensive spot in the opener. John is also a standout shotputter . . . FRANK GUILIANO of Everett was the only freshman to earn a starting berth in the opener as he capably backed up the line on defense. Academically Frank is one of the top Terriers . . . BOB GRACIE, junior from Billerica, is the most experienced center. Bob saw considerable service a year ago . . . MIKE TARANTINO of Somerville is another fine freshman prospect.

QUARTERBACKS

Considered by many grid experts as the most talented footballer in the collegiate ranks this season, HARRY AGGANIS of Lynn may be Boston U's first All-American. Two years ago as a soph Harry threw 15 TD passes. Last season as a U. S. Marine, he starred for the Camp Lejeune eleven. With such receivers as Capuano and Oates to handle his left-handed passes, Harry may threaten several aerial records. He also punts, kicks extra points, and handles the safety duties on defense . . . Freshman PHIL O'CONNELL of Brockton has made the big jump from high school competition with ease. A year ago Phil threw 18 TD passes for Brockton . . . Tall TOM GASTALL of Fall River has played football for less than two seasons, but he will be used plenty on both offense and defense this year . . . Tiny JOHN NUNZIATO of Somerville is probably one of the smallest T-formation quarterbacks in the country at 5'5". Despite his size, the scrappy soph is a fine clutch performer . . . Junior JOHN CAHILL of Medford is a capable passer and defensive back.

HALFBACKS

One of the East's top all around left halfbacks, CAPT. LINDY HANSON of Abington scored five touchdowns in '50. His speed and hard running combine for plenty of yardage. He is also an outstanding defensive back and a fine punter . . . GEORGE SCHULTZ, junior from Worcester, was a defensive standout last year, and may see offensive duty this season . . . ARCHIE CATALDI, speedy Clinton junior, is also playing his second season as a defensive back . . . Senior DON WALLACE of New Britain, Conn. is a steady, capable performer. Don is a hard-running back and a good punter . . . TITUS PLOMARITUS, the 5'5" Lowell mite, is a place-kicking specialist who last season booted 16 extra points and a field goal . . . DON DEFEUDIS, soph from Worcester is regarded as one of the top backs to come out of that area in recent years . . . FRANK (LUCKY) LUCIANO, a fast and shifty soph from Billerica, will be used both offensively and defensively . . . CLYDE HADEN, sophomore from Junction City, Kansas, is a capable defensive back . . . Freshman JOE TERRASI of Waltham is the most highly touted footballer to enter Boston U. since Agganis. A unanimous all-scholastic choice last year as he scored 108 points, Joe proved in early-season games that he will be out-standing both offensively and defensively . . . PAUL (RED) SALISBURY of Arlington is another freshman who has earned varsity status. Rugged Red is a consistent yardage-gainer. Freshman CARL INTERBARTOLO is Revere has been switched from fullback to halfback to utilize his excellent broken-field running. A year ago Carl led North Shore scorers with 84 points.

FULLBACKS

Possibly the best running back in the East is senior JOHN KASTAN of Glassport, Pa. A versatile athlete, John has played every backfield position for the Terriers. He scored four touchdowns against Penn State. John is also the team's top line-backer . . . CHARLIE MAHONEY, Newton senior, is one of the deadliest tacklers on the squad . . . Soph LOU PETROKA of New Britain, Conn. is fast for his size and a powerful runner. He will see plenty of action on both offense and defense . . . Another soph, MARIO MORIELLO of Boston, is a capable two-way performer, as is soph TED DUMAS of Worcester . . . The freshman fullback prospects include JOE STOICO of Milford, NICK POLYMEROS of Clinton, and FRANK ALMEIDA of Taunton.

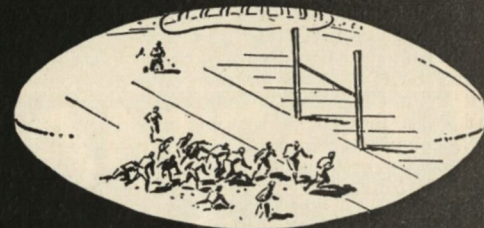
