Dear Bro John

You see we are still
here. Juliette arrived seven
hours after you left & was
disappointed at not finding you
here. She brought your laundry
with her. Dan is trying so hard
to get us to remain here, it
makes it hard for us to
decide what to do. According
to his talk it looks as if
we could make a living
here & perhaps more even the
first year. If you needed
me as much as ^{seem to} you Juliette
it would not be so difficult
for us to decide. I'm afraid
I could not stand working in

the sun & you I would not
 be of much use to you.
 I wish I knew more about
 that village of yours. If
 I could find something ~~to~~
 do in addition to selling
 real estate &c &c
 I am feeling a little better, but
 haven't much ~~hand~~? It seems
 hard to get my spirits & hopes
 revived. We intend to go to
 Ocala in a few days to see Mrs
 Waterman. Juliette says you
 make sure & write to mother as
 she feels lonesome. I wrote
 her yesterday. We thank you
 for all of your kind acts &
 intentions & send love
 you &
 & kindest regards to your
