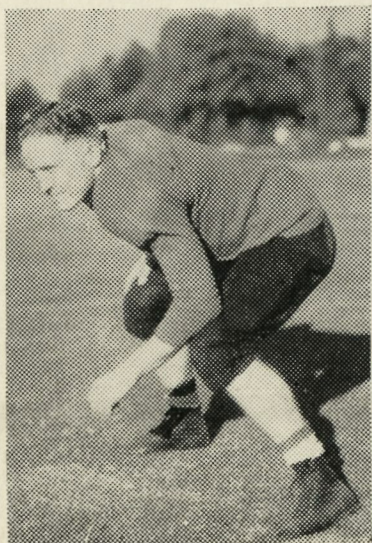

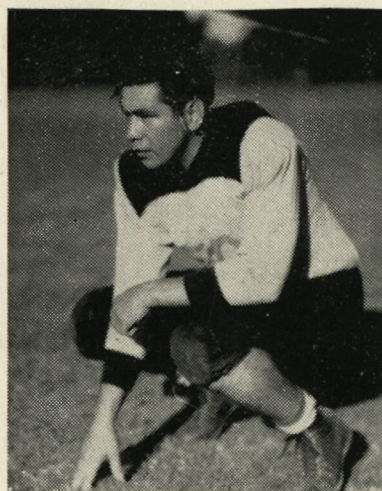

Chico State Wildcats

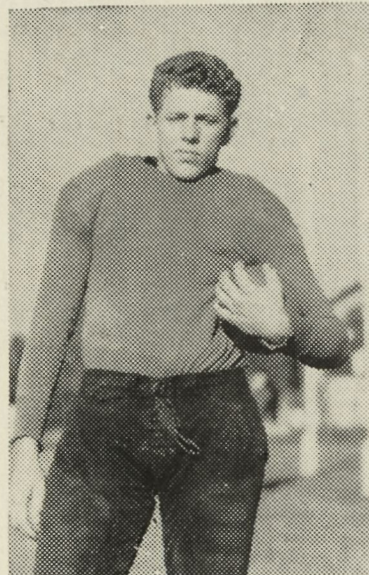
After losing all but one game last year, the Chico State Wildcats under the guiding hand of Coach Art Acker are this year labeled for a higher place in the Far Western Conference. Though the Sacramento Junior College was able to beat the 'Cats because of superior speed, the driving power of the Ackerites will be out in full force today to give Coach Alonzo Stagg's Bengals a real run for their money. Last year in a Home-Coming clash, the College of the Pacific warriors downed the Wildcats by the score of 20 to 0.

Each year when the Bengals were headed for an undefeated season, and had walloped all of the teams which had administered a beating to the Wildcats, it seemed that the Cardinals would pop up as the last obstacle and defeat them in their only setback of the season. The C. O. P. squad has many times been a fly in the Chico State ointment, marring a chance for the Wildcats to finish in a tie for first or second place. The 'Cats have been on the bottom of the heap for the past few years, however.

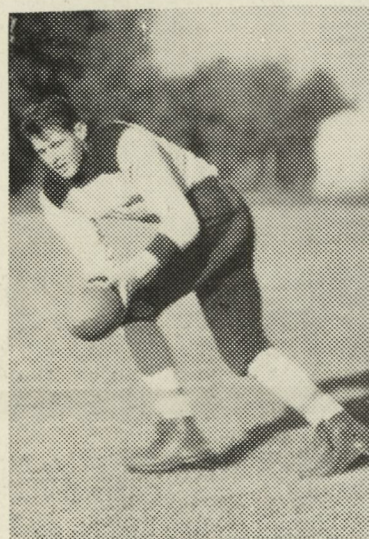
The 8-0 defeat which the San Jose Spartans handed the Bengals last week was heartening to the 'Cats, but this may mean little or much in today's clash as the Peninsulites have held a several years' spell over the Bengals and the Tigers will be fired up to avenge that defeat with a win over Chico.

As the starter's whistle sounds today three of Acker's backfield quartet are veterans who met the C. O. P. Bengals last year and remember many of the faces that appear on the Stagg lineup today. Wally Campbell, Lennie Roberts, and Carl Delgado all have tussled with Pacific in the past, and Allan Cottar, sophomore half, was on the bench for the clash last season. Bob Coe, Corky Cortez, Bill Ijams, John Cechini, and a few of the other Bengals are well remembered by Chico State's warriors.

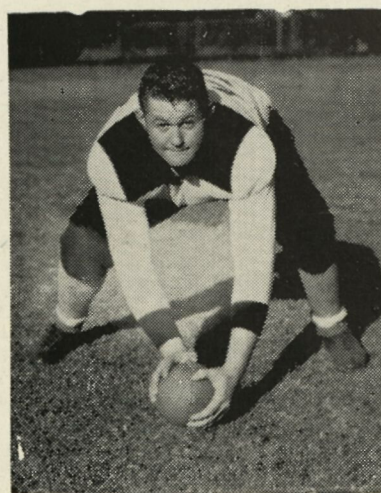
The injury this week to Carl Gein, former C. O. P. student who transferred to Chico State several years ago, in which he broke his right leg in two places while working out with the team, is a serious blow to the Chico squad. Gein, though small, is a fighter and will be missed as a substitute guard for the State forward wall.



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Referee J. Patrick: He has general charge of the game. Before the game starts he must see that the field is properly marked and before each kick-off or scrimmage make sure that the other officials and the players of both teams are prepared before permitting the ball to be put into play.

His decisions on scores, forfeitures and upon all matters not supervised by other officials shall be final.

Umpire Dan McMillan: He handles supervision of equipment, positions of the players, and legality of substitutions. He assists the Referee in decisions involving possession of the ball and in other matters pertaining to interference, etc., after the ball has passed the line of scrimmage.

Head Linesman J. Abbott: Marks the progress of the ball; when it goes out of bounds he marks the spot where the ball crosses the line, if it occurs on the side of the field that he occupies. He notifies the Referee of any fouls coming to his attention.

Field Judge James Cave: Supervises the timing of the game. He starts the stop watch when the ball is actually put into play and stops it if the ball is declared dead, goes out of bounds, a score is made, a pass incompleting, or if the play is suspended by the Referee.

DID YOU KNOW THAT: If a game is forfeited the score becomes 1-0 in favor of the offended team . . . If a ball is not kicked beyond the line of scrimmage and is recovered by the defensive team it may be advanced. but if recovered by the kicking team, the ball is dead.

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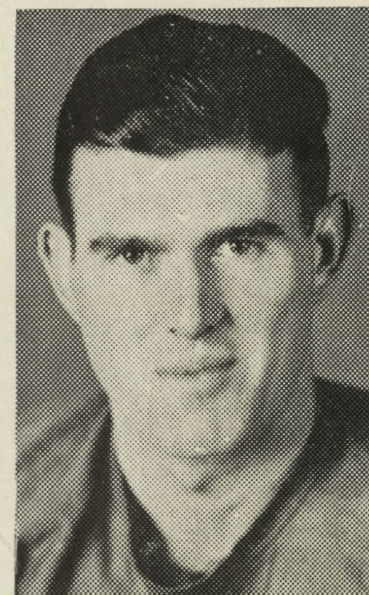

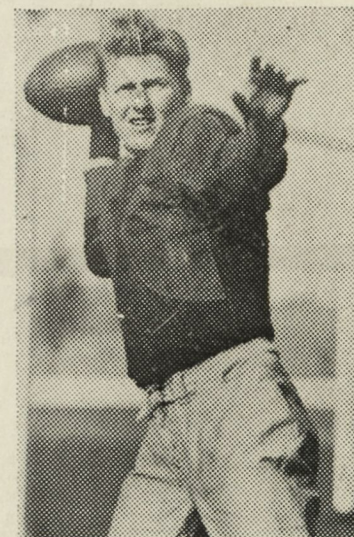

For the fourth time straight running, Coach Amos Alonzo Stagg, famous the country over as "The Grand Old Man of Football," leads his College of the Pacific Bengals into the camp of the Chico State Wildcats and is driving his boys toward a fourth straight win. In 1933 Stagg brought his first Pacific team to Chico and whipped the Wildcats 14 to 0, and he returned in 1934 with another winner, but this time the score was not so one-sided, and his disciples won only by a conversion, 7 to 6.

Last year the Bengals took the 'Cats into camp with a 20-0 victory and are looking toward the Chico horizon for a fourth scalp to carry home. Chico has very different ideas this year, however, and are prepared to give the Bengals as good as they take.

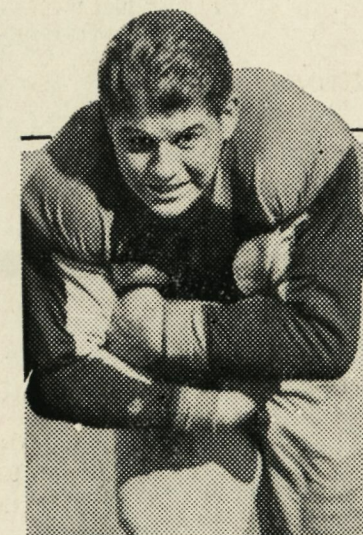
Stagg is entering his 74th year and his 47th year as a football coach. He started when the game was in its infancy and the Far Western Conference is proud to have such an authority within its circuit.

Stagg has brought to the Far Western Conference some of the cleverest deception seen in many years in the local circuit and he is hardly ever caught without a trick up his sleeve to pull on his opponents. Neat, smooth working plays have marked the "Grand Old Man's" sojourn at the College of the Pacific and those who now play the Bengals must watch for plays borne of all the wisdom of 47 years at the game of football.
