## Roy Harris



### Ninth Symphony Featured in Lincoln Center for Performing Arts

The internationally famous American composer, Roy Harris, who will join the University of the Pacific faculty this fall as Composer in Residence, has added the notable distinction of becoming the first American composer to write a Ninth Symphony.

Commissioned by Dr. Eugene Ormandy of the Philadelphia Orchestra to write his Ninth Symphony for the orchestra's 1962-63 season, Harris's new work was premiered January 18 at the Philadelphia Academy of Music. On January 29 the historic symphony will be featured in the \$15 million hall of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts in New York City, again by the Philadelphia Orchestra under the baton of Dr. Ormandy.

In his move to Pacific, the famous classicist will join his wife, Johana Harris, world-renowned concert artist who came to the University as Pianist-in-Residence last September. The famous concert pianist and her composer husband make up one of America's most remarkable artist teams.

Roy Harris, described by critics as the "Dean of American Music," was first educated in California. He got his first real acquaintance with symphonic music while working as an usher for the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra.

Harris's Eighth Symphony, "San Francisco Symphony," was premiered a year ago by the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra in celebrating its 50th season. The 25-minute composition, completed in one month, featured the amplified piano, played by Johana Harris.

The 63-year-old Harris is presently a guest lecturer at the University of California at Los Angeles. He was director of the International Institute of Music at the Inter American University in Puerto Rico before becoming associated with UCLA.

## 34 COUNTRIES REPRESENTED IN PACIFIC'S STUDENT BODY

University of the Pacific campus has an expanding international atmosphere.

Thirty-four countries are represented by the 62 international students registered on the campus this year. These ambassadors of good will from the foreign countries of the world range in age from 17 to 28 years and are enrolled in courses from beginning freshman to those working for doctorates.

Canada sends the largest number, five, to the international set. But there are four from Iran and an equal number from Hong Kong. Three each come from Peru and Germany and two are from Kuwait and Japan. Single representatives journeyed to Pacific from such far-away places as Pakistan, Kenya, Turkey, Arabia, Jordan, Rhodesia, Korea, Burma, Afghanistan, Indonesia, Cyprus and Thailand, to list a few.

Many are including political science in their studies and will eventually return home to work in their governments.

But while they are here they strive to learn all about Americans and in the process Americans get to know them and their native ways.

Ibrahim Salih, a senior in political science from Cyprus and president of the International Club, believes there should be a mutual exchange of ideals, thoughts and actions.

The International Club has spearheaded this concept in University life. Here the international students can participate as a group in campus activities. Membership

is not limited to foreign students and part of the 62 belonging to this organization are Americans.

Special features of the individual countries will be spotlighted at the International Show on the campus in April. A special event at the University's Mardi Gras festivities will be wedding ceremonies with native costumes and languages.

In addition to campus association with Americans, these foreign students eagerly seek every opportunity to participate in community life. They accept speaking engagements when invited, either individually or in groups. They plan a group trip to Yosemite National Park in February, to be financed by a car wash.

Salih says the international students are grateful for opportunities to visit in Stockton and nearby homes and for the hospitality always shown them. They welcome opportunities to visit the churches and to participate in the American community life whenever possible. Some Lodi area residents contributed to provide glasses for several of the students.

Salih contends that U. S. foreign aid is in vain if one foreign student is allowed to return home with misconceptions of America. None of the students are from "Iron Curtain" countries.

Other club officers are Rosa Fernandez, Panama, senior, international relations, secretary-treasurer; Katrin Hartmann, Germany, freshman, English, publicity; and Dena Ann Chapa, social chairman.

# Faculty Contributions to the Community . . . . .

Pacific's Inter-American Studies program and the new Elbert Covell cluster college were described for Spanish-speaking Rotarians the world over in an article by Dr. Arthur Beckwith, published in the January, 1963, issue of *Revista Rotaria*.

Dr. Beckwith, chairman of the Department of Business Administration, is a native of Argentina, and has done extensive research and travel in Central and South America.

The experienced businessman and educator recently served as a consultant in a study of the sources of capital investment funds for Argentine industrial development, published by the Stanford Research Institute.

The study forms a part of the research program of CAFADE, an agency of the Office of the President of the Republic of Argentina. CAFADE coordinates, plans, and undertakes research for the purpose of promoting the nation's economic development.

## **\$150,000 RECEIVED TOWARD NEW PHARMACY BUILDING**

An initial gift of \$150,000 has been received by the University of the Pacific from the Gustavus and Louise Pfeiffer Research Foundation in New York to be used toward a future School of Pharmacy building.

Three Foundation board members met with President Robert E. Burns and Dr. Ivan W. Rowland, dean of the School of Pharmacy, on the Pacific campus last August to discuss new modern structural designing of laboratory facilities and subsequent improved teaching techniques.

A \$44,000 grant for graduate fellowships was awarded last year by the Pfeiffer Foundation, assisting the activation of research programs in the areas of Pharmacy, Pharmaceutical Chemistry and Physiology-Pharmacology.

On-the-scenes laboratory and classroom science instruction will be presented for observation by the public during the annual Pharmacy School Open House to be held February 17.

## **WILL DISCUSS TEACHING STYLE**

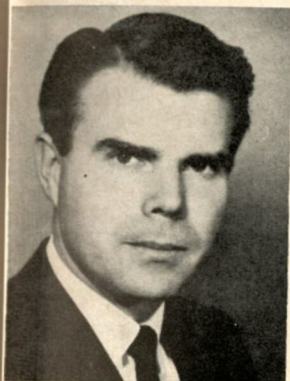
Dr. Helton, representing Pacific as an "outstanding teacher," was selected to receive an invitation to the seminar by the Association's subcommittee on improvement of instruction, located in Washington, D. C. The seminar was designed primarily to give the participants the opportunity to identify and discuss their own effective teaching practices and, through discussions, to assist the sub-committee in its development of guidelines and plans for stimulating the improvement of instruction in the association's member institutions. Dr. Helton will prepare and deliver before the group a paper describing aspects of his own teaching style.

Dr. Helton is a native of Iowa. He joined the Pacific faculty in 1959, coming from Central College in Missouri where he had been chairman of the Department of Mathematics since 1944. He received his bachelor's degree at Westminster College, Mo., his master's degree from the University of Missouri, and continued his education at the University of Illinois where he earned his Ph.D.

The outstanding educator is the author of *Introducing Mathematics*, a textbook which has been adopted for use by institutions across the United States and the Philippine Islands.

Two University of the Pacific graduates are among the 50 persons from throughout the United States who will receive the Distinguished Alumni Award from Pi Kappa Delta at the 1963 National Convention in March.

Receiving the awards for "distinguished contributions in their professional careers for a more worthwhile way of life" will be Dr. Robert E. Burns, president of University of the Pacific, and Dr. Richard Pedersen, a high-ranking member of the U. S. delegation to the United Nations.

#### AWARDS MARK 50TH ANNIVERSARY

A special committee of Pi Delta Delta, a 35,000-member national forensic honorary, and the National Council selected the fifty alumni to be honored. The awards will be presented during the celebration of the fraternity's 50th anniversary at the national convention on the Southern Illinois University campus, March 19-23.

Dr. Burns received a bachelor of arts degree from Pacific in 1931 and moved steadily upward to become president in 1947, the first alumnus to hold the position.

Dr. Pedersen, a Stockton youth, graduated from Pacific in 1946 and continued his education by acquiring a master's degree at Stanford and a Ph.D. in political science at Harvard in 1950. He joined the State Department and, after three years as a foreign affairs officer, was appointed to the U. S. delegation to the United Nations. In 1959, he was promoted to his present position, chief of the political section of the delegation.

In this capacity, Dr. Pedersen is chief assistant to Adlai Stevenson.

#### DR. PEDERSEN RETURNS AS SPEAKER

Dr. Pedersen, who is lay chairman of the program committee of the National YMCA Council, will be a speaker at the 108th annual dinner meeting of the Stockton YMCA in Stockton February 3.

The two University of the Pacific graduates are included in a most distinguished group of Pi Kappa Delta alumni.

Others among the 50 who will receive a Distinguished Alumni Award include Gordon E. Deans, chairman, Atomic Energy Commission; William Shirer, author, radio and television commentator; Chester Huntley, television commentator; Clinton B. Anderson, former U. S. Secretary of Agriculture; Robert E. Smylie, governor of Idaho; Leon Hickman, vice-president, Aluminum Company of America; Fred D. Fagg, Jr., past chancellor, University of Southern California; George H. Mahon, U. S. representative; H. C. Case, president of Boston University; William J. Quinn, president, Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroad, and Spencer Tracy, movie and television star.

The University of the Pacific chapter of Pi Kappa Delta was established in 1922 and has contributed greatly to the University's strong forensics program. It was the group's fourth California chapter.

The membership includes students who represent the university in intercollegiate forensics, and selected faculty members.

# BASKETBALL TEAM OPTIMISTIC AS SEASON ENTERS FINAL HALF

Coach Van Sweet's Tiger basketball team heads into the final half of the 1962-63 season with guarded optimism.

The Bengals started four sophomores last season and are made up mostly of juniors this season. The year of experience gives an indication of a good ballclub.

But at the same time the rest of the West Coast Athletic Conference teams, except Loyola, have improved also. Pacific had a five wins-seven losses record last year.

So far the road has been tough. The Tigers lost a heartbreaker to San Jose State in the opening WCAC game 42-41 in overtime. Then St. Mary's downed UOP 87-73. The team went into the semester break after playing USF with USF winning, bringing the Tiger record to 0-3.

In non-league games the squad entered three tournaments. Opening the season in the Sacramento Tournament Pacific took second place behind Cal Poly of Pomona. In the Knights of Columbus Tournament in Portland, Oregon, the cage team finished fourth, losing to Tennessee State and Loyola. The annual WCAC Tournament during the holidays saw Pacific play their poorest basketball of the season, losing all three games, in order, to Santa Clara, Pepperdine and Portland University.

Leading the team in scoring at the break for finals is 6-7 Bill Wilson from Yreka. Bill originally attended

the University of California, then transferred to Pacific this year. He has a good hook shot and jumper and has been alternating at forward and center.

Big Leo Middleton, 6-7 junior from Houston, Texas, has been the club's leading rebounder. Lee's scoring has been inconsistent but he is expected to come around during the last half of the season.

6-4 Charles Strambler from Houston, Texas, 6-4 Jim Scheel from Billings, Montana, and 6-5 Tom McKey from Whittier give the Tigers height and shooting in the front line. All are juniors.

The guards have been manned by 5-10 Jack Schalow from Grand Forks, North Dakota; 6-3 Dick Davey from Ceres and 6-1 Dave Balsley from San Mateo. All are juniors also.

Coach Sweet figures the toughest competition in the league will come from defending champion Pepperdine, St. Mary's and Santa Clara. But San Jose State won the league tournament and has to be counted in with the other three. All of these teams are big, experienced and agile.

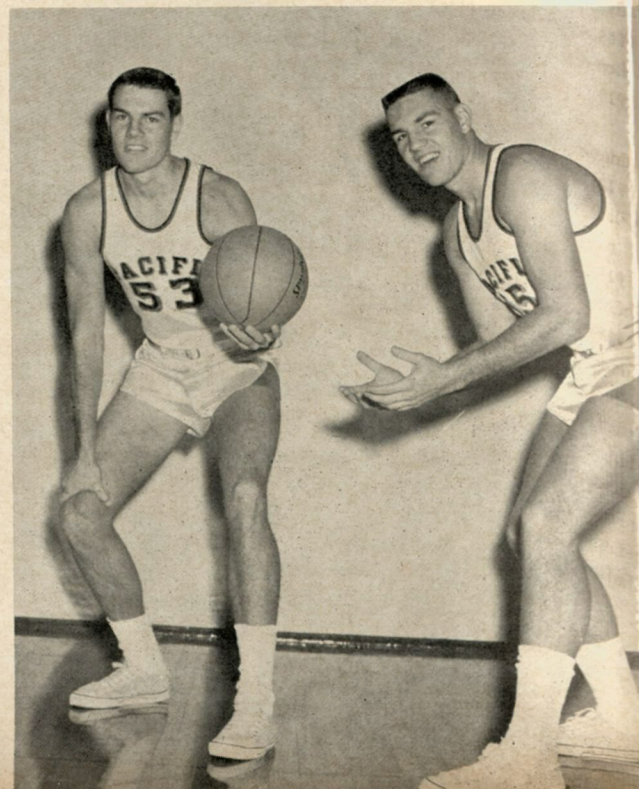
But coaches around the WCAC feel Pacific can knock anybody off on a given night.

# Alumni Fund Box Score '61-'62

University of the Pacific's alumni met the challenge of progress with a responsive chord last year.

Contributions to the alumni fund in 1962 doubled, reaching a whopping \$41,603.58. The total for the year before was \$20,214.50.

A significant factor in the 1962 drive was an increase in the average gift from \$16.80 to \$33.63—a reflection of the awareness of the givers to their essential role in the life of their alma mater.

The number of contributors increased only slightly from 1,203 to 1,237. The percentage of alumni contributing now stands at 16.1 percent.

The great strides in the average gift indicates a glowing acceptance of the Pacific product. The goal for 1963—the annual drive gets underway now with the shift to the calendar year—is for a higher percentage of participation by the Pacific alumni.
