Note from the Editor-in-Chief

Welcome to the first issue of Volume 50 of *The University of the Pacific Law Review*! This spring the *Law Review* celebrates its 50th volume. Publishing 50 volumes is an incredible milestone which can be credited to the work of both the past and present editorial staffs.

Volume 1 of the *Law Review* was published in 1970 under the name the *Pacific Law Journal*. The first issue of Volume 1 included an Introduction authored by Chief Justice Earl Warren and articles entitled “The California Grand Jury: Vestige of Aristocracy” and “The Case against Wiretapping.” In the second issue, Editor-in-Chief, Peter M. Newton, along with the entire Volume 1 Board of Editors published student Comments on the legal and social ramifications of commercial airplane noise and California’s newly-enacted long-arm statute. Since then, the *Law Review* has been renamed twice, becoming the *McGeorge Law Review* in 1997, and eventually being named *The University of the Pacific Law Review* in 2014.

Nearly 50 years later, in Volume 50, the *Law Review* will publish four issues: The Human Right to Water: Turning Principles Into Action symposium, the California Legislative Review (Greensheets), the Judge Posner and Contract Law Barry University symposium, and the Blocking the Courthouse Door: Federal Civil Procedure Obstacles to Entry symposium. Each issue will also feature student Comments or scholarly articles.

Nothing would be possible at the *Law Review* without the support of countless individuals. I would like to thank the faculty and staff at McGeorge School of Law for their assistance and dedication to the *Law Review*. In particular, thank you to Professor Michael Vitiello, Professor Omar Dajani, Dean Mary-Beth Moylan, and Dean Michael Colatrella for their constant willingness to drop what they are doing and help. I would also like to thank the Board of Editors of Volume 50. Megan, Emily, Michael, Katie, and Kim work tirelessly to present to you outstanding academic works.
