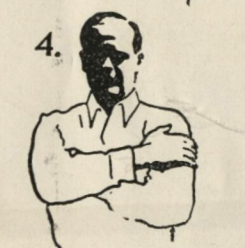
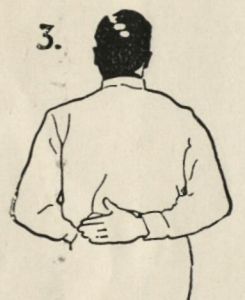

PENALTIES

LOSS OF FIVE YARDS

- 1 Holding by defensive side
- 2 Crawling
- 3 Attempt to draw opponents offside
- 4 Delaying game
- 5 Taking more than two steps after fair catch
- 6 Illegal tackling or blocking
- 7 Offside
- 8 Encroachments on neutral zone
- 9 Feint to snap ball
- 10 Illegal possession
- 11 Interference with opponents before ball is put in play
- 12 Substitute failing to report
- 13 Backfield in motion
- 14 Taking time out more than three times during half
- 15 Player out of bounds
- 16 Running into kicker

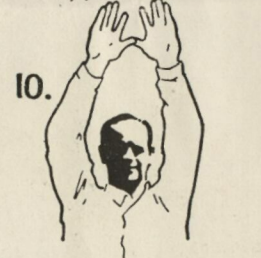
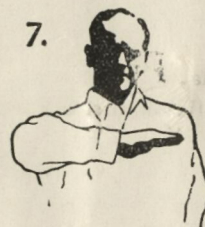
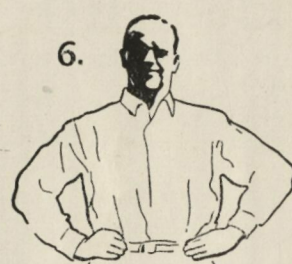
- 17 Holding by side in possession of ball
- 18 Hurdling
- 19 Coaching from sidelines
- 20 Intentional grounding of forward pass

- 25 Leaving field during one-minute intermission
- 26 Unsportsmanlike conduct

OTHER PENALTIES

- 36 Illegal return to game: loss of twenty-five yards
- 37 Team not ready to play at scheduled time: loss of twenty-five yards
- 38 Foul within one-yard line: half distance to goal line
- 39 Interference with forward pass by defense: loss of the ball
- 40 Slugging: half distance to goal and disqualification
- 41 Flagrant roughing of kicker: 15 yards and disqualification
- 42 Any act committed by an outsider but affecting the game: the referee is empowered to impose such penalty as justice may require

- 1 Pushing movement of hands to front with arms in a vertical position: CRAWLING, PUSHING, OR HELPING BALL-CARRIER. (Penalty, helping ball-carrier, 15 yards; otherwise, 5 yards.)
- 2 Pushing hands forward from shoulders: INTERFERENCE WITH FORWARD PASS, OR PASS TOUCHING INELIGIBLE PLAYER. (Penalty, if interference by offense, 15 yards; otherwise, ball to opponents at point of foul.)

- 3 Waving hand behind back: ILLEGAL FORWARD PASS.
- 4 Arms folded: FLYING BLOCK OR TACKLE. (Penalty, 5 yards.)
- 5 Swinging arms horizontally: USED TO INDICATE INCOMPLETE PASS, MISSED FIELD GOAL OR CONVERT, ETC.
- 6 Hands on hips: OFFSIDE. (Penalty, 5 yards.)
- 7 Horizontal arc of either hand: PLAYER ILLEGALLY IN MOTION. (Penalty, 5 yards. If from shift or huddle, 15 yards.)



- 8 Military salute: UNNECESSARY ROUGHNESS, ILLEGAL DEFENSIVE USE OF HANDS. (Penalty, 15 yards.) ALSO USED FOR FLAGRANT ROUGHING. (Penalty, half distance to goal line and disqualification.)
- 9 Holding one wrist: HOLDING: (Penalty—by offense, 15 yards; by defense, 5 yards.)
- 10 Hands above head: SCORE. (Used after touchdown, field goal, or convert. Palms of hands together indicates a safety.)

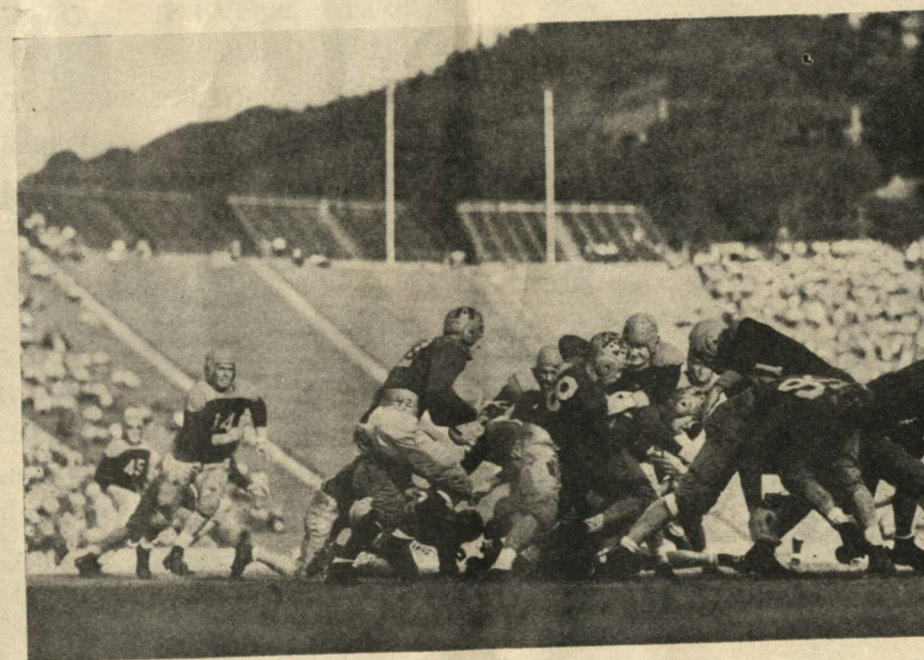
When the Wolf Pack knocks at the Tiger door tonight at 8:15 a rather bewildered Tiger will answer the call. The C. O. P. squad enters its first conference test with a team, the calibre of which is still an unknown quantity. Three losses to strong opponents in Loyola, University of California and San Jose State College, and one easy victory over the California Ramblers is the record of the Stagmen. The Tigers of Pacific, led by the inimitable character of football, Amos Alonzo Stagg, will need the cheers and support added to the regular student body and rooting section by the grads, old and new.

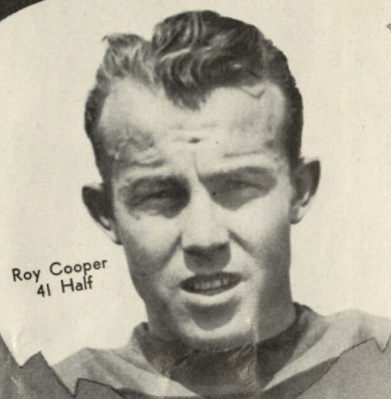

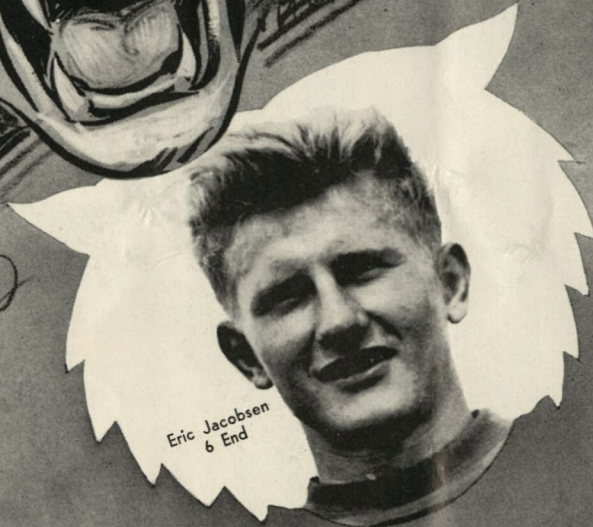

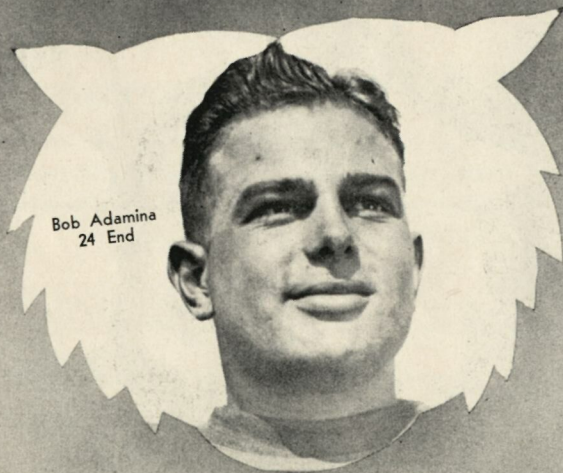
