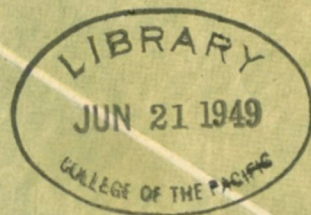

THE GAME . . .

Tonight is Larry Siemering's night at Baxter Stadium.

Tonight is also the night Pacific students, alumni, and Stocktonians in general have waited for, for a long time. It is the unveiling of the brand new Pacific Tiger, resplendent in new, colorful uniforms, coached by a young, aggressive head man, and playing a formation designed especially to give the fan a run for his money.

The college also welcomes Willamette University of Salem, Oregon, and its new coach, Jack Lillie, in this game which matches the Pacific Coast's two oldest colleges.

Tonight's game and four more in Baxter Stadium, plus one in Lodi, will give Pacific fans a well rounded schedule of games at home this year. Following Willamette this evening, the Tigers battle San Diego State on October 11 in a CCAA thriller, Santa Clara on October 18 (already sold to capacity), University of South Dakota on November 14, to add an intersectional flavor, and the annual fierce rivalry with Fresno State on November 21. Then on December 13, the Tigers tangle with Utah State in the first annual Lodi Grape Bowl which is almost sold out already.

In welcoming Larry Siemering to the head coach's job at Pacific, and also welcoming Ernie Jorge, his assistant, Tommy Tiger hopes to be embarking upon an era of football success. Already plans are nearly completed for an even more ambitious 1948 Pacific football schedule, with emphasis on better home games to give the Stockton fan a break.

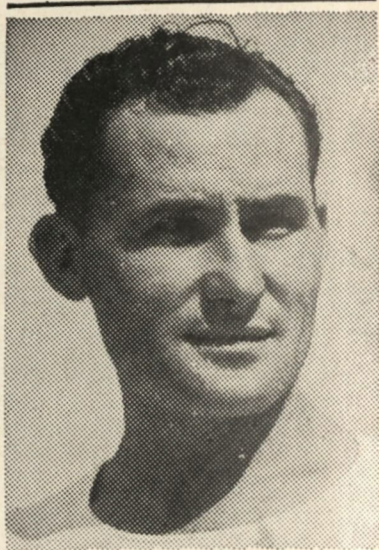
Using the vaunted T formation, with Eddie LeBaron, backed up by Lou Bronzan and Don McCormick, under the center, the Tigers have many of the requirements for putting on a good T party. Fast halfbacks such as Orvis, Bob Heck, Don Greer, Brown and Wayne Hardin, and hard running fullbacks like Poulos, Harry Kane and Ernie Bobson, makes the backfield picture look bright.

Tall, rangy ends in Rohde, Ridley, Ortez and Kirsten and big, fast linemen are other requisites of the T. The Tigers can field six tackles at over 200 pounds and four centers at the same weight. Three guards at 195 bring the first string line average to well over 205 pounds.

The Tigers under Larry Siemering and Ernie Jorge welcome you to Baxter Stadium for the opening of this, the greatest football season in Pacific's history. We hope you enjoy the game and return again.

When the defending Northwest Conference Champion Willamette Bearcats answered the opening practice call of new grid coach, Jerry Lillie at Sweetland Field on September 1, 47 aspirants for berths on the 1947 machine were issued suits and went through light, preliminary drills and wind sprints.

It's yet too early for Lillie to make any predictions as to how his Bearcat outfit will eventually fare over its nine-game season because most of the lads he welcomed at the initial turn-out are unfamiliar to both him and assistant coach John Lewis.

Among the first-day candidates were ten let-termen from the club which last year swept unbeaten through conference ranks. They included Bob Douglas, the Hawaiian scooter and passing ace; Howie Lorenz, the 145-pound scatback; John Burleigh, quarter; and Dick Fletchall, fullback. Forward wall monogramers back are Bob Hill, 6 feet six inch regular from '46 and Herb Johnsrud; centers; George Nuss and Hank Ercolini, tackles; Bill Patterson, guard; and Gene Allison, end.

One sour note for Lillie as he scanned his material was the absence of John Slanchik, who carried the main punting duties for the 1946 crew. However there are hopes the West Virginian may yet show up. Fullback Al Wickert ex-Salem High star, also is uncertain whether or not he'll pull on the moleskins this season.

Pleasant surprise was the appearance of Bob Warren, former Salem High ace, who made a last-minute transfer from Oregon. Warren, a hard runner, is expected to add material strength to the backfield. Another welcome prospect was Earl Hampton who played fullback for Spec Keene several years ago.

Aiding Lillie and Lewis in their inaugural practice were Backfield Mentor Ted Ogdahl, late of the San Diego pro Bombers and Marv Goodmanfi freshman coach. Ogdahl played with the 1943 V-12 Pacific Tigers.

The California Collegiate Athletic Association

Coming out of the West with a bang is the best way to describe the Pacific Coast's newest big-time athletic conference, the California Collegiate Athletic Association.

A post-war dream of six of California's "smaller" colleges to put themselves in the position of being the Golden State's top home conference was realized at the end of the 1946-47 season. Only the powerful Pacific Coast Conference, one of the nation's two strongest leagues, ranks above the CCAA in the Far West, and the PCC embraces schools from five Western states.

Running from San Diego State in the south to Stockton's College of the Pacific in the north, the CCAA also contains California Poly, University of California at Santa Barbara College, Fresno State and San Jose State.

In 1946 the CCAA football conference was confined to five teams, Cal Poly not entering competition. This season, however, all six CCAA teams will be in the running and will play each other. The 1946 conference race ended up with San Jose unbeaten and on top, Pacific, Fresno and San Diego in a three way tie for second, with 2-2 records and U. C. at Santa Barbara College bringing up the cellar with a 0-4 record.

New faces on the CCAA football coaching scene will be Kenny Gleason, taking over Fresno's coaching duties from "Rabbit" Bradshaw; Larry Siemerling at COP, replacing A. A. Staggs; and Bill Schutte taking Bill Terry's place at San Diego. Bill Hubbard at San Jose; Stan Williamson at Santa Barbara; and Howie O'Daniels at Cal Poly round out the CCAA coaching scene.

1947 should even more firmly entrench the CCAA as California's top, entirely home conference.

Willamette University

Willamette University is the oldest institution of higher learning west of the Missouri river, now entering its 104th year. Abe Lincoln was just beginning his practice of law, and the Pacific Northwest was a little-explored wilderness populated by a handful of French-Canadians, a few hardy pioneers, trappers and traders for the Hudson Bay Company when Jason Lee and his group of Methodist Missionaries pushed into the Oregon country in 1834 to lay the groundwork for the tiny one-story Oregon Institute school with a student body of five, which sprung up eight years later in the territory now encompassed by Salem, and became known as Willamette University.

Today Willamette University and its ten buildings normally accommodating 850 students, is located upon an 18-acre campus in the heart of Salem, capital of Oregon. Across the street from the Willamette campus lies the state capital grounds, containing the State Capitol, Supreme Court, State Office, Library and other government buildings.

The University recently acquired ten acres adjacent to the campus upon which development has already begun of a football stadium, baseball field and multiple tennis courts. When completed the new athletic field will make available the area now occupied by Sweetland field for additional University structures.

Willamette University has been an active member of the Pacific Northwest conference since its inception, but long before that date Bearcat football teams were roaming the gridiron. Three years before the Spanish-American war Willamette fielded its first football teams in intercollegiate competition. Athletic activities were first suspended temporarily by the Spanish-American war. Again in 1918 the demands of World War I halted intercollegiate athletics at Willamette. In 1943 the Northwest conference suspended operations for the duration of World War II, but thanks to the presence of a large naval V-12 unit on the campus the university continued to be represented by a football team with the exception of the fall of 1945.

Due to the late arrival of Pacific's uniforms, numbers were not included on the squad roster or center spread lineup. Following are the Tiger's numbers:

DON HALL, center, 202 pound Captain on last season's Tiger varsity. Don is one of four Pacific centers who tips the scales at over 200 pounds. Will probably split up playing time with Collie Kidwell and Lydon Mothorn. An excellent offensive center, Hall has been sparkling on defense in early season practice, especially on pass defense. Don was recently married to former Helen Graham, COP's ace mermaid.

BRUCE ORVIS, 172 pound right halfback. Orvis was one of the sparkplugs of last season's team and should be watched for All-Conference honors in 1947. A 9.9 dash man on the track team, Bruce is one of the coolest players on the squad when the going gets rough. His running in pre-season practice has been outstanding. Both Orvis and LeBaron come from Oakdale high school.

JEAN RIDLEY, 6 ft. 2 in., 196 pound right end. Jean is in his third year as a Pacific end and as in the past, should catch many passes for plenty of yardage. Ridley is a veteran, as Pacific players go, most of them being sophomores. Teaming with John Rohde and "Corky" Orteiz, Jean gives Pacific three outstanding pass receivers for Eddie LeBaron's tosses. Jean is another one of COP's married players.


