They have taken on the job of seeing to it that Pacific has a place in the sun. Some Associates are alumni of Pacific, although the majority are not. All realize what Pacific is and — more important — what Pacific can become in the California picture.

Today, Pacific Associates met on the campus for their fourth annual meeting, with President Alex J. McRae, Stockton auto dealer, presiding. He was preceded by business executive Simpson Hornage, and banker Al Anderson. They are winding up the program at tonight's game.

The total associates membership is subdivided into subject groups. Every C.O.P. department and special project has its own group of Associates to help in the development of its program and public relations. Associates played a large part in organizing Pacific's new School of Pharmacy; they helped acquire materials for remodeling the engineering, home economics, and

art department buildings; they have steered many outstanding students to Pacific. They put College development officers in touch with capable donors, uncover business opportunities, find prospects for the purchase of College of the Pacific annuity contracts, aid scholarship funds, and serve as Pacific information representatives.

Regional Pacific Associates groups are organized in Stockton and San Joaquin County, and in a dozen other valley and coast cities. Their membership is a cross-section of the business, professional, and civic leadership of these communities, from Chico to Bakersfield, and from Santa Rosa to San Jose. They are looking for new members — who really want to do a job.

This year Pacific Associates are pushing a big job — underwriting the complete furnishing and equipping of Pacific's big, 400-capacity dormitory and dining hall now under construction. It's a \$329,000 job. More than \$130,000 has been obtained already in cash and pledges. The Associates know this is good business for Stockton. The 400 more new students that can be brought to C.O.P. because of this campus expansion will spend more than the \$329,000 in Stockton even before the three-year term pledges are paid out.

The development and financing of a private college in a period of inflation is a difficult job. A small college is a pretty big business — a \$2,350,000 business at Pacific this year. The know-how of Pacific Associates is helping to keep Pacific in business; to build a Pacific that will be the pride of the valley.

KANSAS' FIRST EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION

Kansas State was founded in February, 1863—just two years after Kansas reached statehood—as Kansas State Agricultural College. The present name was adopted in 1931.

One of the nation's first land grant colleges to be founded under the Morrill Act, Kansas State is the second largest school in Kansas today.

CAMPUS PROPER — Encompassing 120 acres, the campus is surrounded by a limestone fence. All buildings are designed from the same native limestone.

K-STATE'S SIX SCHOOLS — Agriculture has 9 departments. Arts and Sciences has 22 departments. Engineering and Architecture has 10 departments. Home Economics has 7 departments. Veterinary Medicine has 4 departments and the graduate school gives work in all departments.

K-STATE EXPANDS THROUGHOUT STATE — The College has five branch experiment stations, 11 experimental fields, and some 50 individual test plots over the state—all used for agricultural research. Kansas State College extension agents are in all 105 Kansas counties. The College owns 2,784 acres of land


for experimental work and instruction and also maintains laboratories for soil and crop work.

TOP K-STATE ENROLLMENT — The peak enrollment was reached during the school years of 1948 and 1949 when more than 7,500 students attended K-State. When the College first opened its doors the enrollment was less than 100.


LARGEST IN KANSAS — K-State was the first college to have organized classes in home economics. Instruction in sewing, dressmaking, and millinery was offered in 1873. The School of Home Economics is now the largest in the state.

ONLY COLLEGE IN THE WORLD — K-State offers the only four-year curriculum in feed technology in the world. It is also the only school in the Western Hemisphere to offer work (four-year curriculum) leading to a degree in milling.

ANOTHER K-STATE FIRST — K-State, in 1931, was the first college in the nation to invest its own money in television research, and later, in 1952, was the first in Kansas to offer student training in TV. Its 5,000-watt KSAC is one of the nation's pioneer educational radio stations.




