BATTLE OF THE BELL

Another colorful page in the San Jose State-College of the Pacific football book will be turned tonight in the annual Battle of the Bell.

When traditional rivals like these collide, it behooves the fan to discard the past performance chart. Odds are of little significance in an SJS-COP tilt, and this has been true since their first "official" imbroglio in 1921.

So penetrating is the rivalry between the two institutions that there is even disagreement as to when the initial Spartan-Tiger game was played.

COP adamantly insists it did not compete in inter-collegiate athletics prior to 1921; SJS begs to differ. Thus, a feud is prolonged.

Two letters written to Sportscenter Mel Venter, appear to verify the Spartans' claim. James R. Zuck wrote in 1953:

"... The first opponent of San Jose State, then called State Normal was College of Pacific, at that time called University of Pacific, then located in San Jose, and we played them in, I think, 1896.

"I played with Pacific in the years 1893-94-95-96, and my recollection of the men is very vivid as certain things happened in that game that I can hardly forget even if I cannot remember the score".

Another letter to Venter, penned by Hugh C. McCurrie, states:

"... S. J. Normal played its first game against the University of the Pacific, now College of the Pacific, in 1895 and the score was 0-0. They played again in 1896, the score being 6-6. I was there, at right tackle".

Hence, the SJS record book shows the Spartans with a 17-10-5 lifetime edge, while the COP ledger reads 15-10-3. And the dissent continues.

The "modern" series between the two schools began in 1921, with the Stockton Tigers capturing the first three encounters. In 1921, COP won 34-0, following up with a 23-0 victory in 1922 and a 46-0 triumph in 1923.

COP and SJS did not tangle again until 1929, but they have knocked helmets yearly since then, with the exception of 1943-44-45 when the Spartans discontinued football for the duration of World War II.

Excitement and hostility of almost epic proportions have occurred in past COP-SJS clashes. Among the most memorable games are the following:

1930—COP rolled to a 27-0 victory as Tiger end Ralph Francis scored a touchdown and turned in one of the day's top defensive jobs, even though he performed with a broken hand.

1932—SJS bounced back to cop a 7-0 decision. Charlie Barrachi, now deceased, and Bud Hubbard, now a Santa Clara County Supervisor, sparked the Spartan attack. Barrachi blocked a Pacific punt and Hubbard recovered it to set up the winners' tally.

1933—The Spartan's Dee Shehtanian swiped a Tiger lateral and scampered 85 yards with the winning touchdown as SJS scored a 12-6 win.

1934—COP outgained the Spartans, 112 to 52 yards, but the San Joseans walked off with the game, 13-0. Time after time Spartan Jimmy Stockdale punted from the shadows of his goal post, three times sailing 60 yards or more. Stockdale and Rinaldo Wren tallied for SJS.

1936—Gene Rocchi squirmed loose and went 50 yards for a TD to pace SJS to an 8-0 win.

1937—Destined to become one of Sparta's best footballers, sophomore LeRoy Zimmerman scored once and set up another tally as SJS took a 12-7 victory. Halfback Morris Manoogian scored the other Spartan TD.

1938—Before 10,000 hometowners, the Spartans grabbed a 19-6 win for their third success in succession against COP. Zimmerman again was the big noise, along with Gene Rocchi, who scored twice.

1939—Amos Alonzo Stagg celebrated his 50th coaching year this year, but the Spartans were not in a

sentimental mood. SJS won, 13-3, as Zimmerman and Bob Zetterquist sparked the Spartans before 15,000 Baxter Stadium faithfuls.

1940—SJS won the traditional battle for the sixth straight year, 28-7. Fullback Ed Tornell scored three touchdowns for the Spartans.

1941—A controversial scoring play by SJS fullback Allen Hardesty, was the only tally in the Spartans' 7-0 win.

1942—SJS whitewashed the Tigers, 29-0, and made it eight straight over the Bengals. Hero of the contest was Bill Perry, Spartan line coach until this season, who tallied 23 points on three touchdowns and a field goal.

1946—In Stagg's final season, the Spartans again displayed no "heart". SJS quarterback Pete Denevi's passing spearheaded a 32-0 win.

1947—COP turned the tables to score a 14-7 victory. Bob Heck and Bruce Orvis each unwound 50-yard touchdown runs for the Tigers.

1948—An underdog SJS team scored one of its tastiest triumphs with a 14-7 upset, holding magician Eddie LeBaron to one pass completion for minus one yard. Referee Frank Powers was fooled by LeBaron's famous faking and whistled down Tiger fullback John Poulos as excellent Eddie was passing downfield.

Gene Menges, now Spartan backfield coach, started his initial game for SJS and passed for 116 yards, including a 70-yard shot to Billy Parton which set up SJS's initial tally.

1949—LeBaron completed 12 of 19 pitches for 195 yards as COP stomped the Spartans, 45-7. Don Hardy reeled off 103 rushing yards for the Tigers. Crowd of 18,857, largest in Spartan Stadium history.

1950—Favored COP was held to a 7-7 stalemate in a sloppy duel in the mud. SJS fullback, Harry Beck, gained 121 yards, including a 61-yard TD run, but Bengal Tommy McCormick was the game's top runner with 175 yards. Gene Menges flipped a TD pass to Billy Wilson, last year's top receiver in the N.F.L., but it was called back due to a penalty.

1951—The Spartans pulled one of the biggest upsets of the series

when they outfought COP, 7-0. SJS's mighty line halted the Tigers seven unbelievable times within the SJS 10-yard line. A 63-yard scoring pass from Lynn Aplanalp to Al Matthews was all the scoring SJS required.

1952—McCormick turned in one of his best-ever performances. But Spartan Ray Hiram broke loose with 24 seconds to play and scooted 38 yards on a reverse for a TD to give the Spartans a thrilling 26-21 victory in one of the most spectacular games of the series. McCormick ran for 145 yards and tallied three times. Throng of 29,159, largest in series history.

1953—SJS scored a 7-6 win. Spartan end Merv Lopes, sidelined with an injured leg, was sent in for one play and took a long pass from Benny Pierce to score on a 66-yard play. Larry Rice kicked the vital extra point. Then COP's Roy Ottoson whipped a 40-yard scoring aerial to Art Liebscher to knot the count, but SJS guard Tom Louderback hustled through to block the PAT attempt and insure the victory.

1954—COP held SJS to 71 yards rushing and 73 passing to record a 13-7 triumph. Sophomore tackle John Nisby, turned in an outstanding defensive game for COP.

1955—COP won again, 14-7. The stop-and-go running of Dewey Tompkins, combined with Junior Reynosa's passing, were big factors in the Tiger success. Tony Teresa was excellent in a losing cause for SJS.

1956—Quarterback Tom Flores completed 12 of 14 passes for 195 yards and Reynosa 7 of 9 while the big Tiger line held the Spartans to 17 yards on the ground in a 34-7 rout for Pacific.

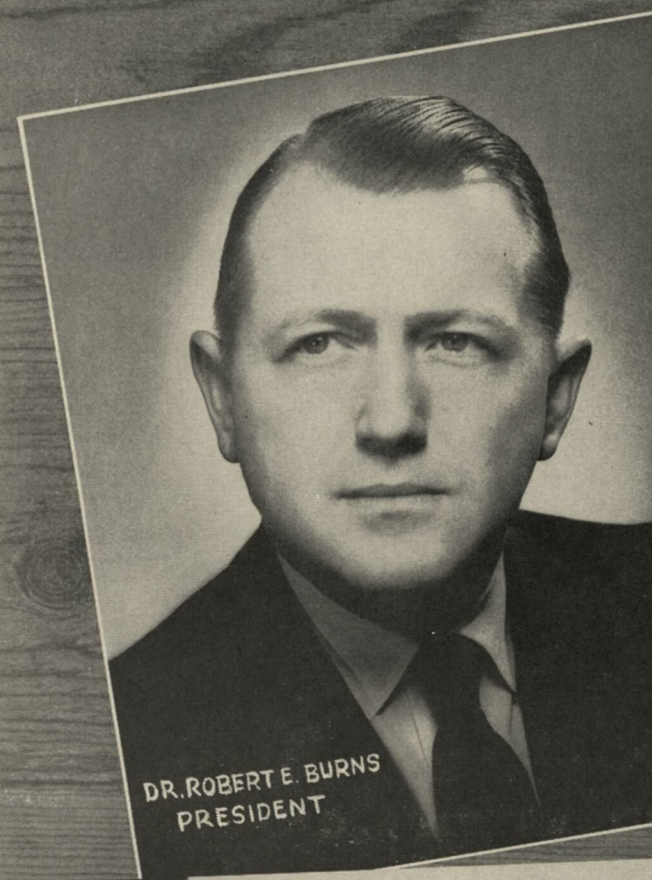
