


▲ N the pages of this booklet is presented a pictorial story of the oldest incorporated educational institution of higher learning on the Pacific Coast which was granted a charter on July 10, 1851. Since that time it has grown with the West and now exemplifies a modern and progressive institution at its best.

The College was founded upon co-educational principles, and women are admitted on precisely the same footing as men. Its object is to maintain a co-educational College of Liberal Arts under modern living conditions, stressing the highest scholarship and the broadest cultural advantages. The College is non-sectarian, but interest in the spiritual life is stimulated.


In equipment and teaching force the College of the Pacific is prepared to give thorough instruction of collegiate grade, to maintain high standards of scholarship, and in every way to carry out its aim to be a college of first rank. The College is on the approved list of the Association of American Universities and of the American Association of UNIVERSITY WOMEN.

The College has made ample provision for living facilities on the campus and seriously recommends that all students as far as possible spend some part of their undergraduate years living on the campus. The close fellowship of students and faculty living together in the college community is an important factor in college education and should not be overlooked by those who are planning their college career.


This vine-clad Conservatory building houses the auditorium, the studios for the Conservatory of Music and the workshop and stage of the Pacific Little Theatre.

The President's home is the center of much social life on the campus. To this delightful home all students are welcome at all times during the year.




