THE HEAD MAN

John Rohde, one of Pacific's all-time football heroes, takes up the head coaching reins for the first time in his career, as he steps in to guide the destinies of the Tiger gridders this fall.

The new head man has been on the Pacific coaching staff since 1953 and was the number one assistant to the departing Jack "Moose" Myers for eight years.

Rohde started his athletic career at Lincoln High School in San Jose. He matriculated to University of the Pacific in 1946 and teamed up with Eddie LeBaron for the most exciting era in Tiger football. Rohde, from his end post, was the target for 81 LeBaron aeriels.

The Rohde-LeBaron combination was the guiding factor in Pacific's only undefeated football season — 1949.

At the close of his playing days, Rohde was chosen as a member of the West team in the annual East-West Shrine All Star classic in San Francisco. Pacific's new head mentor then took a fling at professional football with the Washington Redskins but a recurring shoulder injury knocked him out of the play-for-pay ranks.

His first coaching experience came as an assistant at Pacific in 1950 under the then head coach Larry Siemering.

Rohde gave up his coaching career temporarily after one season and went into business in Arizona. After two years away from the game Rohde could resist the excitement of coaching no longer and when Myers took over the head spot in 1953, Rohde returned also.

PACIFIC'S SCHOOL OF EDUCATION

One of the Pacific schools most vividly demonstrating how a private university can serve the public interest is the School of Education.

Dedicated to the purpose of producing top quality teachers, the School has graduates teaching throughout the state and, increasingly, in widely scattered parts of the nation, helping to meet the growing public need for well-trained educators.

In addition to its regular classroom work on the Stockton campus, the School of Education has extended its outreach to Napa and to Mexico in an effort to provide the finest in teacher education and a widening perspective in teaching experience for its students.

The sending of students to Mexico for their practice teaching experience, a new program started this fall, is a "first" in California teacher education. Four students are now teaching at the Colegio Americano in Torreon, a town about the size of Stockton in the State of Coahuila in north central Mexico. Offering classes from kindergarten to 12th grade, the 460-student school last fall moved into a new plant consisting of 18 classrooms, a gymnasium, and a library.

The School also will continue for the second year its advanced teacher education pilot study for the instruction of emotionally disturbed students. Sponsored by the School in cooperation with the State Departments of Mental Hygiene and Education, the study follows a recent three-year survey by the latter two organizations which showed that there are about 300,000 emotionally disturbed students in the state, or an average of two three in a typical 30-student classroom.

Selected students spend a month each semester at Napa State Hospital as student professional assistants to aid in developing more appropriate means of teaching disturbed students. They are encouraged to build a workable learning theory, to explore greater individualization of instruction, and to adapt group teaching methods appropriate to regular classroom programs. The emphasis is not on personal adjustment or therapy for the child, which is the responsibility of specialists, but on competence in teaching every child who is to be found in a regular class.

The school also has participated in a number of research projects aimed at increasing its service to the community and at helping to find more effective ways of teaching or of training teachers.

Three major research projects in the past 10 years have been financed substantially by over \$200,000 in grants received from the Rosenberg Foundation.

The first of these was the development on campus of a clinical services program, which is now a well-established function in which the School of Education plays a part along with the speech department and the Conservatory of Music. The program includes services in reading, testing, play therapy, music therapy, and speech and hearing.

A second study dealt with a plan to tap a new source of teacher supply in the junior colleges.

Rosenberg Foundation funds also are now financing a research project which has as its main purpose the development and implementation of an effective program of supervised internship for beginning teachers. Results of a previous School of Education project showed that many beginning teachers and their principals felt that the teachers were not receiving the kind and amount of supervisory assistance that they desired or needed. It is hoped that results of the project will define the typical problems of the beginning teachers and the most effective ways of assisting the neophytes, will evaluate the efficacy of an on-the-job training program for principals to aid them in assisting new teachers, and will determine whether principals who have been trained in handling new teachers will assume the responsibility of supervising them as a primary function.

The School now has programs approved by the California State Board of Education which prepare students for 13 different credentials. In the last five years, between 160 and 220 credentials have been awarded annually, 50-60 per cent of which were general elementary. This year, for instance, 114 general elementary credentials and 105 secondary and special administrative and counseling credentials were granted at commencement rites.

The task of "educating educators" is carried on by the four departments, each of which is headed by a chairman, that make up the School of Education: the department of elementary education; the department of secondary education; the department of educational administration; and the department of educational and counseling psychology.

Home for the School is two-story Owen Hall in the west section of the campus. Containing classrooms and staff offices, the building also houses the curriculum library, play therapy and reading clinics, individual testing rooms, and a comptometer for graduate student use. The School maintains an audio-visual laboratory in neighboring Bannister Hall.
