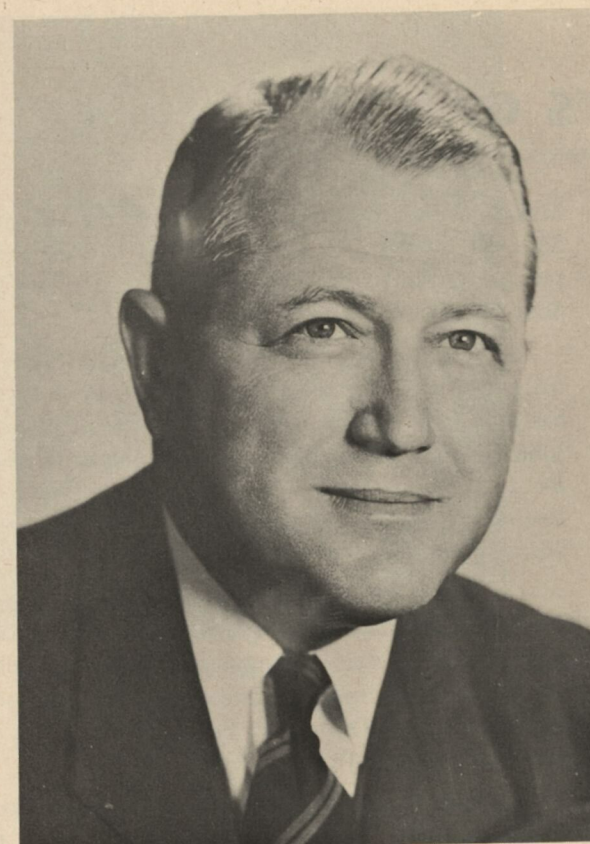

TONIGHT'S GAME

This is the opener. The waiting is over after many months of preparation.

Coach John Rohde and his staff have been preparing for this game since the final gun of last year's San Jose State game here in this stadium.

Last year Rohde and Tiny Campora took over the coaching reins and presented a new offensive system to basically a group of young and inexperienced ball-players.

After the first season the players, many of whom are back tonight, know the system well (Tight T) and have one full year of varsity experience under their belts.

This is basically the same team that took the field one year ago at this time against Long Beach State. The Tigers tonight come into the stadium with 23 returning lettermen from the 1961 club that had five wins and four losses.

There are also two lettermen back from the 1960 team, right end Buck Del Nero from Tracy and left guard Dan Silva from Los Banos.

Add to this three squadmen from last year plus some outstanding junior college transfers and you have the 1962 University of the Pacific varsity football team.

Tonight you will see a team with experience, speed and size. The line averages 227 pounds. Right tackle Roy Williams scales 225 pounds, right guard John Gamble and left tackle Don Shackelford 240.

Backs Aaron Youngblood, Greg Stikes, Duane Isetti and Chris Machado are capable of turning the corner and going all the way. Stikes and Youngblood proved that last season.

But the Tigers have a tougher schedule this season. Starting tonight with Brigham Young, a team that also has more than twenty returning lettermen plus the graduates from one of the schools best freshmen teams, UOP meets Oregon State, Washington State, New

Mexico State (remember 70-19 last year?) San Jose State, Fresno State (a last second loss in the wind a year ago), Santa Clara, San Diego State, Los Angeles State and the San Diego Marines.

Leading the way will be some outstanding individual performers. For the first time since 1958 Pacific has a bona-fide All-America nominee in right guard John Gamble. Watch number 66 tonight as he roams the field on defense and opens holes in the BYU line on offense. Left tackle Don Shackelford also rates special praise for his fine play.

Quarterbacks Johnny Alsup and Jack Sparrow give the Tigers a solid one-two punch. Both can pass and run. Halfbacks Aaron Youngblood and Greg Stikes were UOP's top two ballcarriers in 1961. Fullbacks Bill Kutzer, Jay Olson and Pancho Sequeira are all monogram winners from last year.

Tonight is also the premiere of the new Pacific Tiger Girl. For the first time in the history of the school a drum majorette will lead the band. She is Vicki Ortgren, a freshman from Pleasant Hill. Welcome her.

BYU tonight is playing as a member of the new Great Western Conference, composed of former Sky-line Conference and Border Conference teams.

The Cougars are the first single wing eleven to play here since the 1960 season. The Tigers and Cougars have met only once before and that was in 1958 with Pacific winning 28-6.

And lastly, this weekend not kicks off the 1962 season but kicks off the 1962 United Crusade Campaign for the Stockton area. The official drive, the most urgent in the history of the organization, starts next Monday. This year's theme is "One Gift Works Many Wonders."

This is it. It's kickoff time for the 1962 intercollegiate football season. We hope you enjoy tonight's game and the entire season.

Wally Busch—A transfer from Diablo Valley J.C. . . . left tackle lives in Walnut Creek.

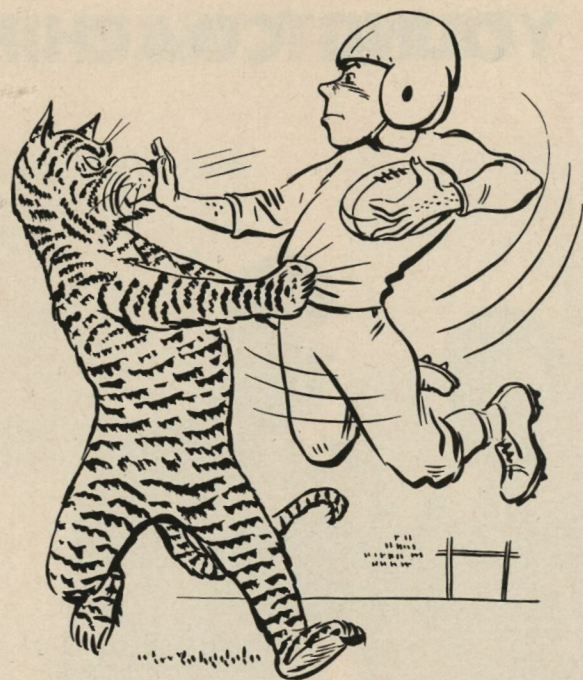


Buck Del Nero—Returns after one year in service . . . lettered in 1960 . . . left end from Tracy.

RAYMOND COLLEGE OPENS SEPTEMBER 17

A new departure in American education will begin Monday, September 17, with the opening of Raymond College, the first of a cluster of liberal arts colleges within the University of the Pacific structure.

This unique approach to higher education, following the time-tested Oxford and Cambridge concept of a near-tutorial system with a 20-1 student-faculty ratio, will maintain its own individuality, its own provost and faculty, its own housing common room and dining hall.

The quadrangle system, designed for a maximum of 250 students, has recently been completed on the site of the old Baxter Stadium where two additional cluster colleges, including the Spanish-language Elbert Covell College, will be added. The student of Raymond College, will graduate in three years, and enter into graduate or professional study in his fourth year of college.

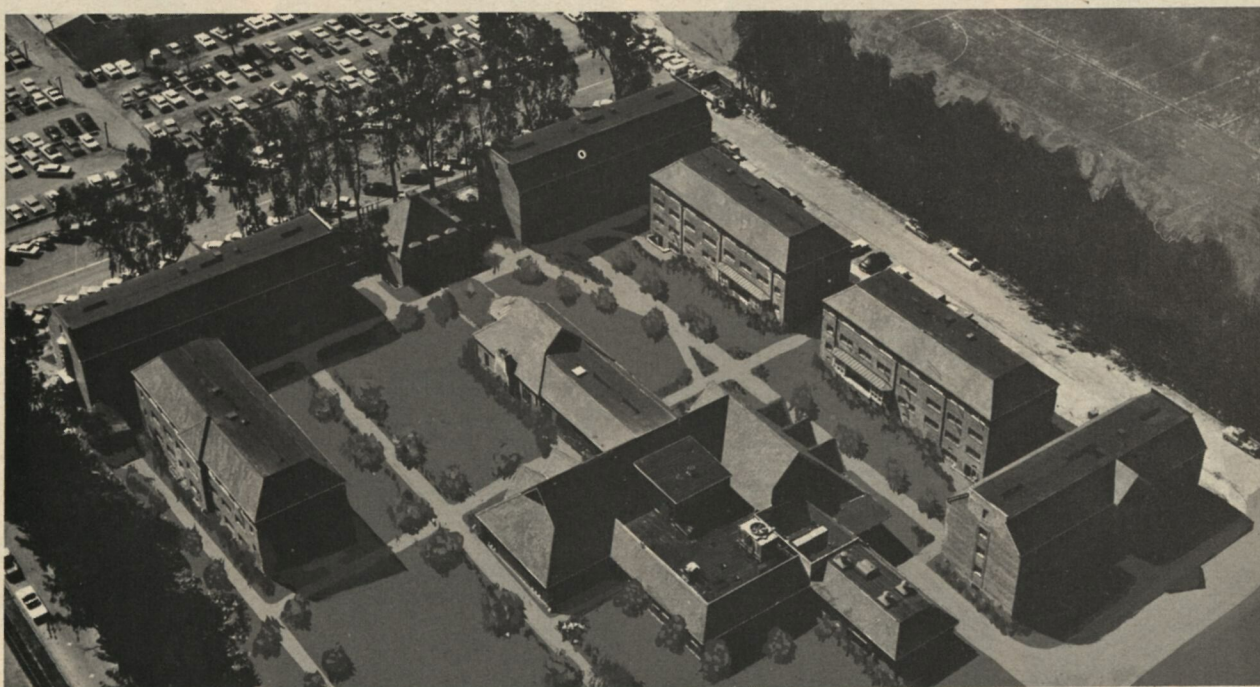
Seventy carefully-screened young people will make

up the first freshman class, to take part in the three classic liberal arts divisions, the natural sciences, social sciences and humanities.

Raymond College welcomes young men and women who show evidence of intellectual curiosity, self discipline and determination, academic growth, and respect for learning. In a program emphasizing independent study and personal responsibility, motivation and energy are as important as the student's earlier academic successes and his personal background.

The first cluster college, where personal competence is the goal, is named of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Raymond of Knight's Landing, who have given Pacific 3,500 acres of Sutter Country land, valued at \$1,500,000. Raymond intends to give each student a feeling of belonging, a sense of pride, a feeling American education is losing because of large enrollments.

The appointment of Dr. Warren B. Martin as provost ended a search of over a year "for a man of outstanding scholarship, administrative experience, imagination and enthusiasm." The Provost holds the Doctor of Philosophy degree from Boston University. Dr. Martin came to Raymond College from the faculty of Cornell College, Mount Vernon, Iowa. His views on national events have been reported and evaluated by *Time* and *Newsweek* and the major press services.

MADERA NIGHT — HALFTIME SHOW

Tonight we are happy to honor the City of Madera, its band and Kent Nance, its native son. This is Madera Night here at Pacific Memorial Stadium and in the same way people of this area are welcomed to Madera, we welcome the citizens of Madera to our area.

Some salient facts on Madera:

POPULATION— A special census made in 1957 registers 13,872 residents in the corporate limits of the City of Madera. More recent estimate shows 14,000 as the population.

LOCATION—At the intersection of State Highway 99 and 145. 150 miles southeast of San Francisco and 240 miles northwest of Los Angeles on the Boulevard of the Central Valley (State Route 99). Fifty-six miles southwest of the southern entrance to Yosemite National Park. Approximately 120 miles from the central coast area of San Luis Obispo County.

CLIMATE—Average annual temperature is 63 degrees. Minimum, 50 degrees; mean of 63 degrees and a maximum of 75 degrees based on annual averages. Annual rainfall averages 9.99 and occurs only during the months of December, January, February and March. Humidity ranges from 78 at 5:00 a.m. through 48 at noon to 39 at 5:00 p.m. Elevation, 282 feet.

TRANSPORTATION—The main lines of Southern Pacific and Santa Fe Railroads serve the City of Madera. Greyhound and Trailway bus lines have regular stop stations in the city. More than a dozen motor truck lines make regular stops in Madera. The municipal airport with facilities for private planes is considered one of the finest in the State.

HOSPITALS—Madera has three general hospitals with a total bed capacity of 188. Modern equipment and registered professional men and women staff the hospitals.

INCOME—Madera is supported primarily by agriculture and related industries. Major cash crops produced on fertile land irrigated by wells and through the facilities of the Madera Irrigation District include grapes, cotton, alfalfa, and small grains. Dairy and meat animals constitute a major portion of the income supporting the city.

RECREATION—Realizing the importance of recreation to the health and proper development of children, the City of Madera provides a well organized and scientifically planned recreational program. Beautiful tree-shaded playgrounds are available to children in each residential area. The Madera Municipal Plunge is a very popular spot from early spring to late autumn. The main pool, completely surrounded by a ten foot sundeck, is one hundred feet long, fifty feet wide. A wading pool for small children is under constant supervision. Qualified life guards are on duty at all times and locker rooms with showers and a snack bar are attended by paid personnel and volunteer assistants. Service clubs take an active part in providing recreation for Madera children. The Rotary Club constructed Youth Center is becoming one of the top spots for the youth of Madera. Little League baseball clubs, Boys Scout activities, and numerous other adult-

led programs have been responsible for the decline in juvenile delinquency over the last decade.

For adults there are numerous fields of recreation.

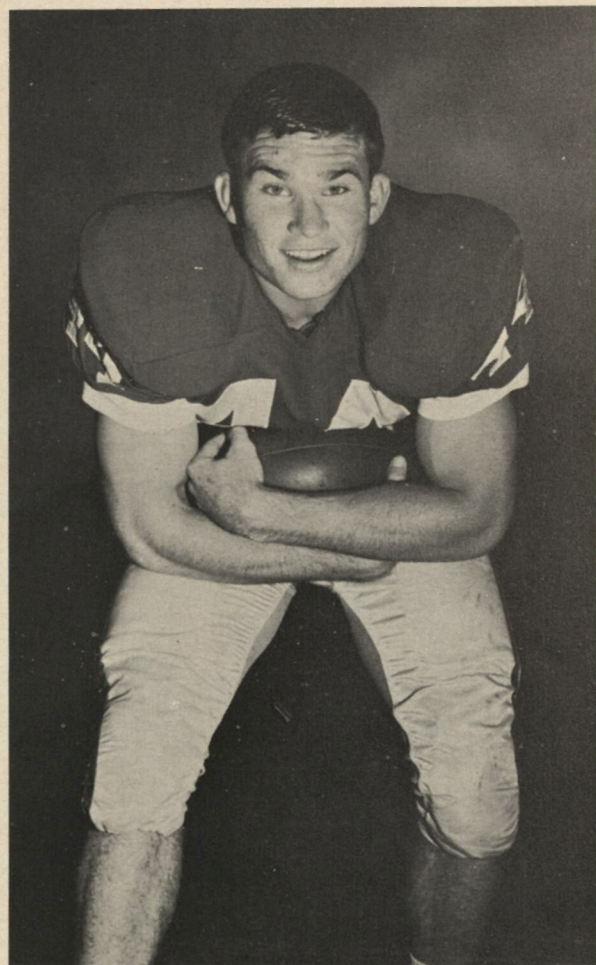

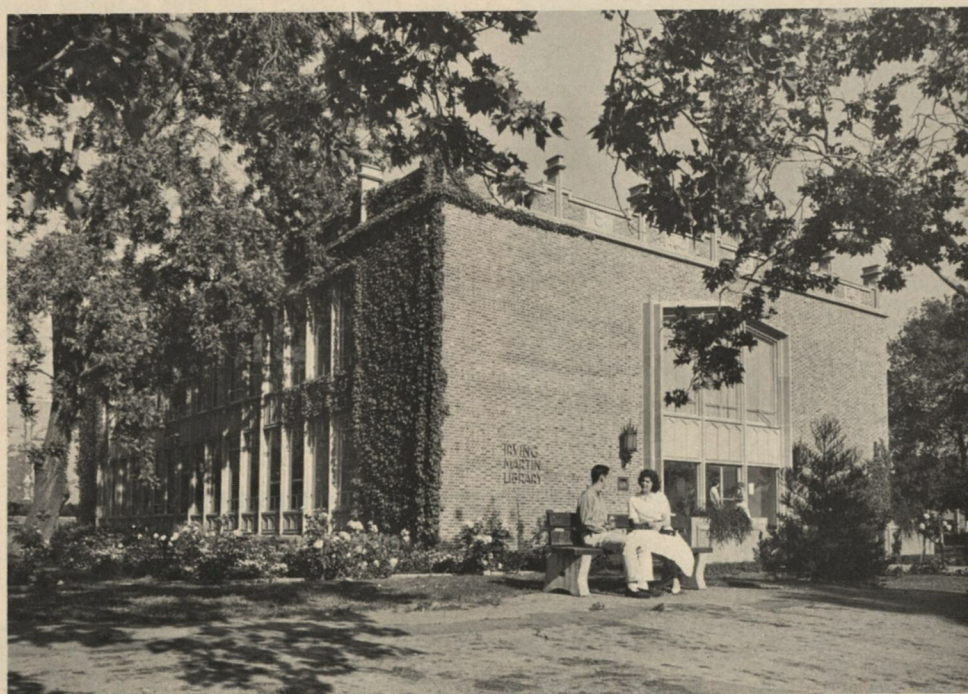
