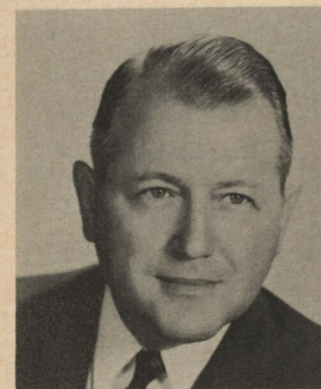

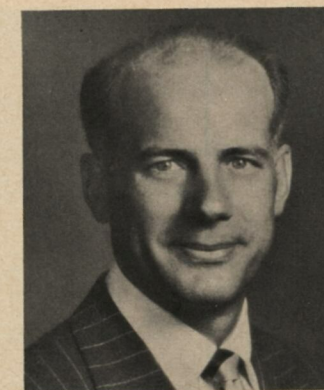

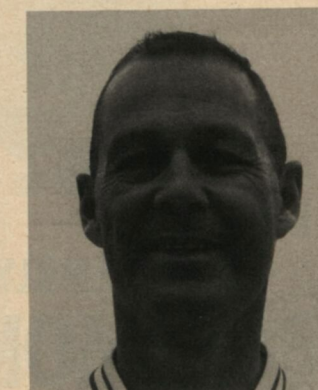

Tonight Don Campora's Pacific gridders face an explosive team that is also experienced, rugged and well coached. The Los Angeles State College Diablos come into Pacific Memorial Stadium with a one-sided victory over the University of Hawaii under their belts.

The Diablos of Homer Beatty blasted the Rainbows 43-0 last Saturday while the Tigers were losing to Colorado State 7-0, evening their record at one win and one loss.

Pacific will have to stop the speed and hard running game of the Staters while countering with the excellent passing of quarterback Tom Strain.

Strain last week hit on 15 of 22 passes for 246 yards, marking him as one of the best throwers on the west coast. He has completed more than fifty percent of his passes on the season.

Allen Melikian developed into an outstanding receiver grabbing six passes last Saturday while the defensive line was again practically unpenetrable.

Up front, Paul Latzke, Dick Kirby, Bill Sandeman and Vern Garrion have been doing an excellent job as have linebackers Johnny Rodgers, Bob Irwin and Raydell Barkley.

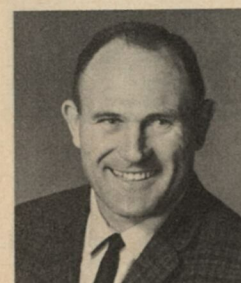
Tonight's game shapes up as one of lightening fast offense with quick striking force (L.A. State) against a potent passing offense (U.O.P.)

THE 1965 MODEL AUTOMOBILES have just been announced and in the true spirit of American free enterprise, each manufacturer is sparring for sales position. This measurement of our direction in higher education is often overlooked since many privately-supported institutions have not survived. However you choose to examine your loyalties and interests toward particular colleges and universities throughout the State of California, it is both proper and appropriate to point with pride to California's first chartered (privately-supported, church-related) institution of higher education (founded in 1851). It is also assumed that its symbols—students, faculty, friends, alumni as well as those symbols printed and poured in concrete—take up the spirit of the truest, most aggressive form of private enterprise in developing the full resources of the individual. University of the Pacific, after 114 years of academic initiative, can't help but think "first" wherever academic goals and needs are being developed. In the same manner, we depend upon those who support higher education through voluntary gifts to think "first" of the University of the Pacific. It's a matter of survival.

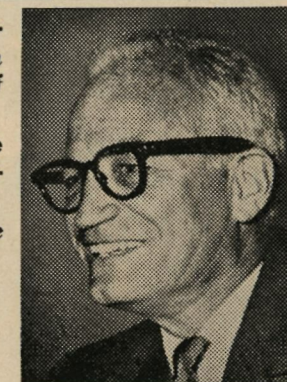
