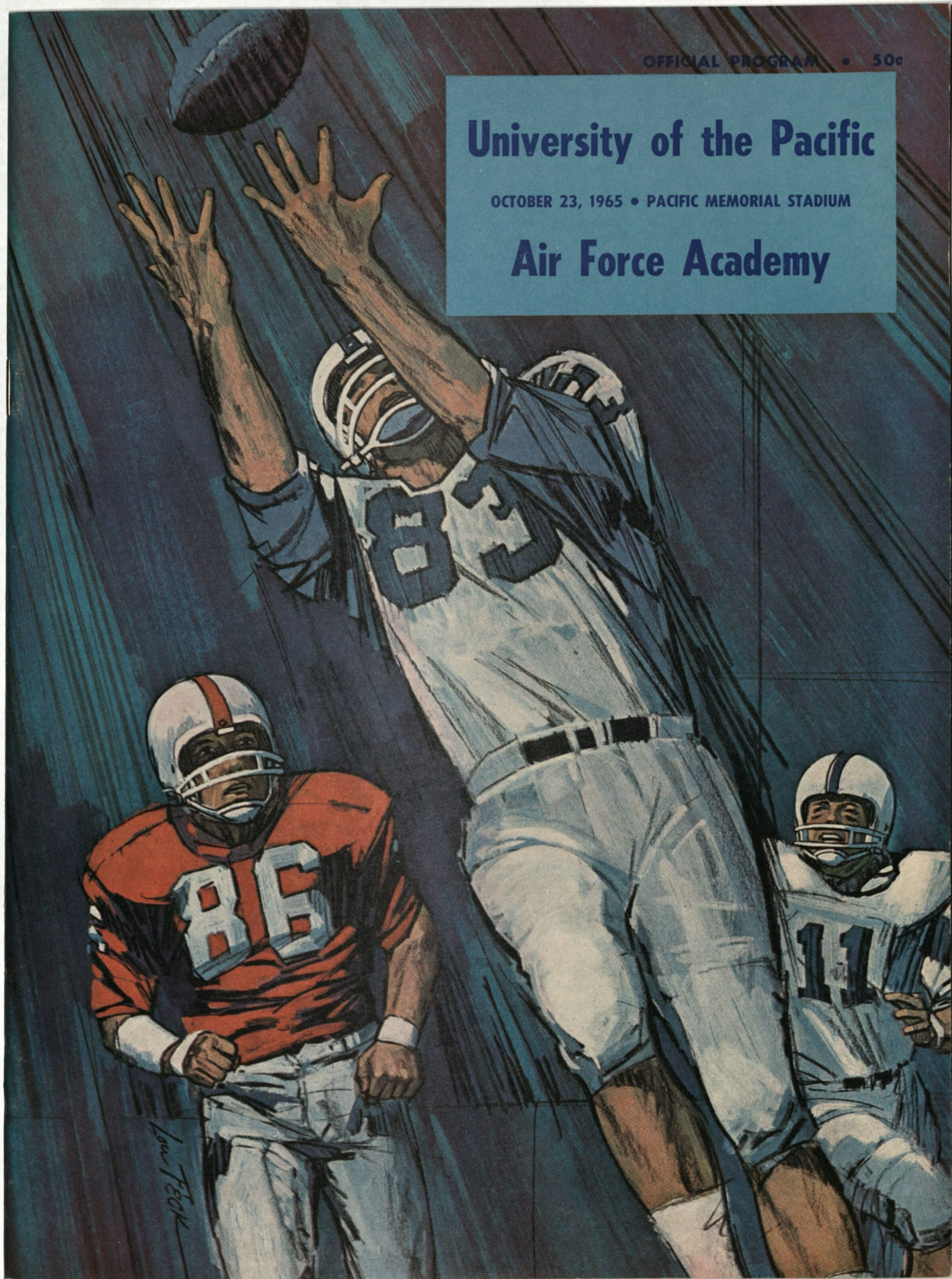

This afternoon sets the stage for the first meeting between the University of the Pacific and the Falcons of the United States Air Force Academy. Another first is the fact that this is the only afternoon game of the 1965 Tiger football season.

The records of these two teams is quite similar to date. The Tigers are courting a 1-3 record while the Falcons are 0-4-1. The Tigers last meeting, October 9th with New Mexico State, turned out to be one of the most exciting games local fans have witnessed in a good number of years. The Tigers won the game statistically, however, lost on the scoreboard 14-6. Last weekend, while the Tigers had a bye, the Air Force was engaged in a very tactical tie with the University of Oregon, the score 18-18.

Today's game should be a very hard fought game with a good deal of action, seeing how both teams play a predominantly offensive game. The Falcons will be led by quarterback Paul Stein, who is both a most impressive runner and passer. Stein ranks among the nations top in the category of total offense.

The Tigers will no doubt rely heavily on the passing arm of senior quarterback Tom Strain, who is now number three in the list of Pacific's All-Time Passers. Tom is now only 44 completions away from taking over the number one spot now held by all-time great Eddie LeBaron.

Another Tiger to watch will be senior flanker Gary Woznick, who is now eighth in the nation (small college) in the receiving category.

Don't forget the Tigers next home game, November 13th, against Fresno State College. That day will mark homecoming, we hope to see you all there, game time is 8:00 P.M.

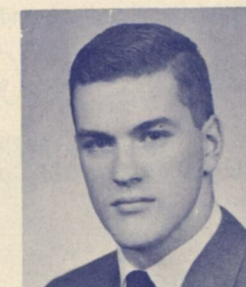

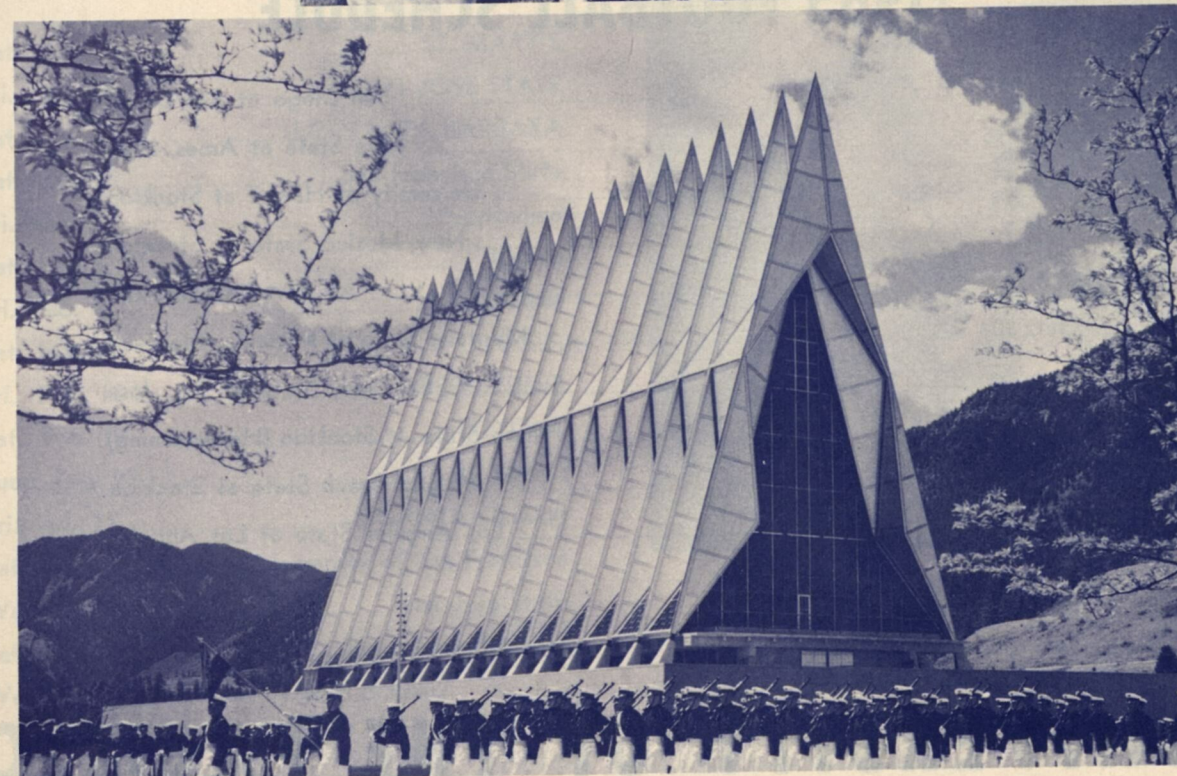
THE AIR FORCE ACADEMY

The "Dean" of service academy football coaches, Ben Martin is now in his eighth season holding the reins of the Falcon Football team. The popular Air Force head mentor came to the Academy from the University of Virginia in the spring of 1958, where he had been head coach for two years. A graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy in 1945, Ben was a standout football player for the Middies during the 1942-43-44 seasons as an end and half back. The Great Provider

Bud Wilkinson coached Oklahoma to three national football championships in his 17 years at the University. His teams of 1954-55-56-57 won 47 consecutive games. He served as special Consultant on Youth Fitness to the late President Kennedy. His background as Kennedy's aide and as the nation's winningest football coach well qualifies him for his position as president of Lifetime Sports Foundation.

FOOTBALL is a demanding game.

It demands that each player give the absolute maximum of his talent and resources of his mind and heart. The game is the supreme physical test of a man's strength, speed, reactions and endurance. It relentlessly measures his qualities of character, self-discipline, courage and will to win.

Football is a game of emotion for fans as well as players. Every spectator is caught in the excitement and tension. As a rallying point for fans and as a taskmaster that ingrains lasting lessons in those who play, football has proved worthy of the attention it receives. It has earned its place in the hearts of all Americans who value rugged competition.

But in the world of intercollegiate athletics, football, thanks to people like yourself, plays another important role. It is the Great Provider.

Football can, and often does, create the surplus money that provides athletic facilities for the entire student body. Golf courses, swimming pools, bowling lanes, tennis courts, and innumerable other facilities have been built with football funds. Football receipts enable schools to compete in other collegiate sports and provide physical education and intramural programs.

Speaking strictly from the standpoint of its physical benefits, the game of football, (or any other varsity sport) affects only the gifted athletes who play the game. But indirectly, football gives to every student the opportunity to develop physical fitness and participate in sports competition.

Every student should develop the physical, mental and moral resources essential to a full, vigorous



life. Every student should learn the skills of sports he can play and enjoy throughout life. To make this opportunity a concrete realization should be the basic aim of the physical education, intramural and varsity program of each school, college and university.

Such a program is the responsibility of every school. What about the school your children attend? Does it include programs that will give them the opportunity to learn what the players on this field are learning? Do they too have the chance to develop the self-discipline and physical coordination necessary to remain healthy and active all their lives? I recommend that you look into their school situation and give the same attention to this problem that you give to your favorite football team. Your concern will be the determining factor in the physical well-being of your children, and will influence the vigor and quality of their intellectual and emotional lives.

The Lifetime Sports Foundation, with which I am associated, is one of the organizations dedicated to the achievement of this educational goal. We seek to help each child attain an adequate level of fitness, and to learn sports skills that can be enjoyed throughout life. If this cooperative goal can be realized it will give all of us who love football added reason to cherish those who play.

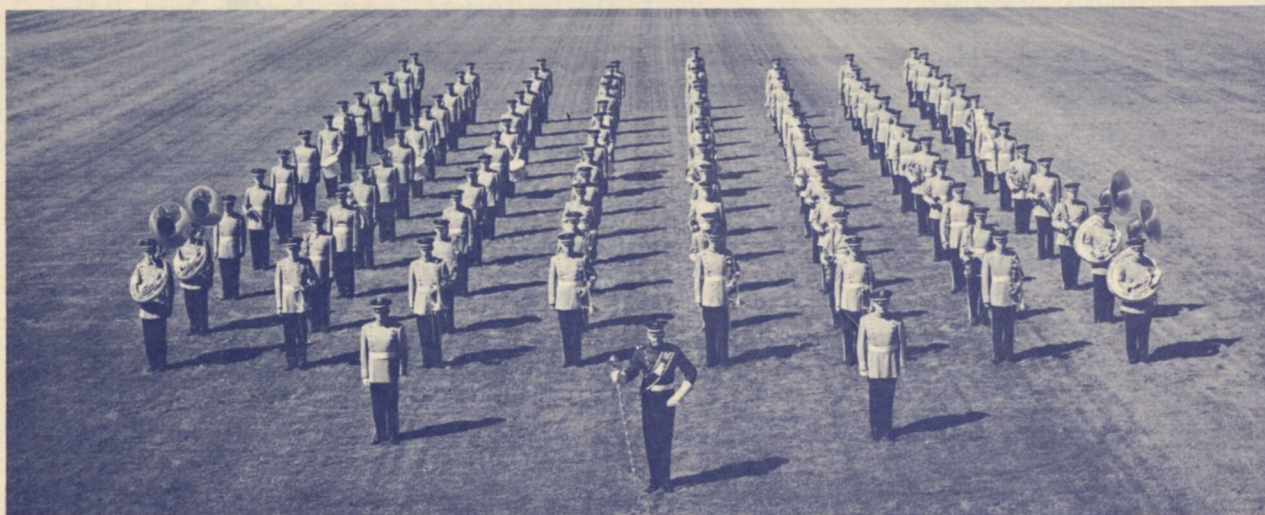
