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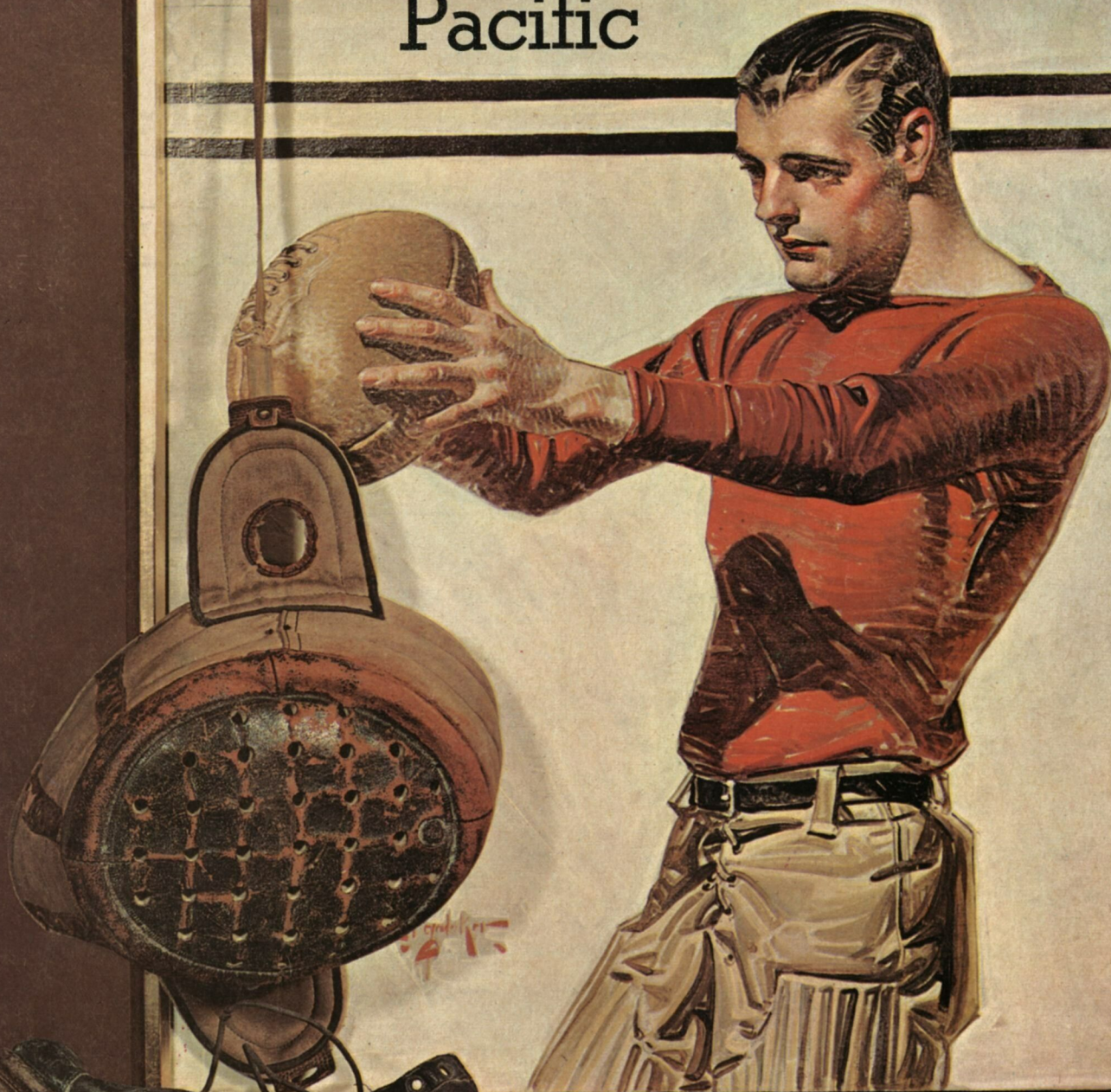

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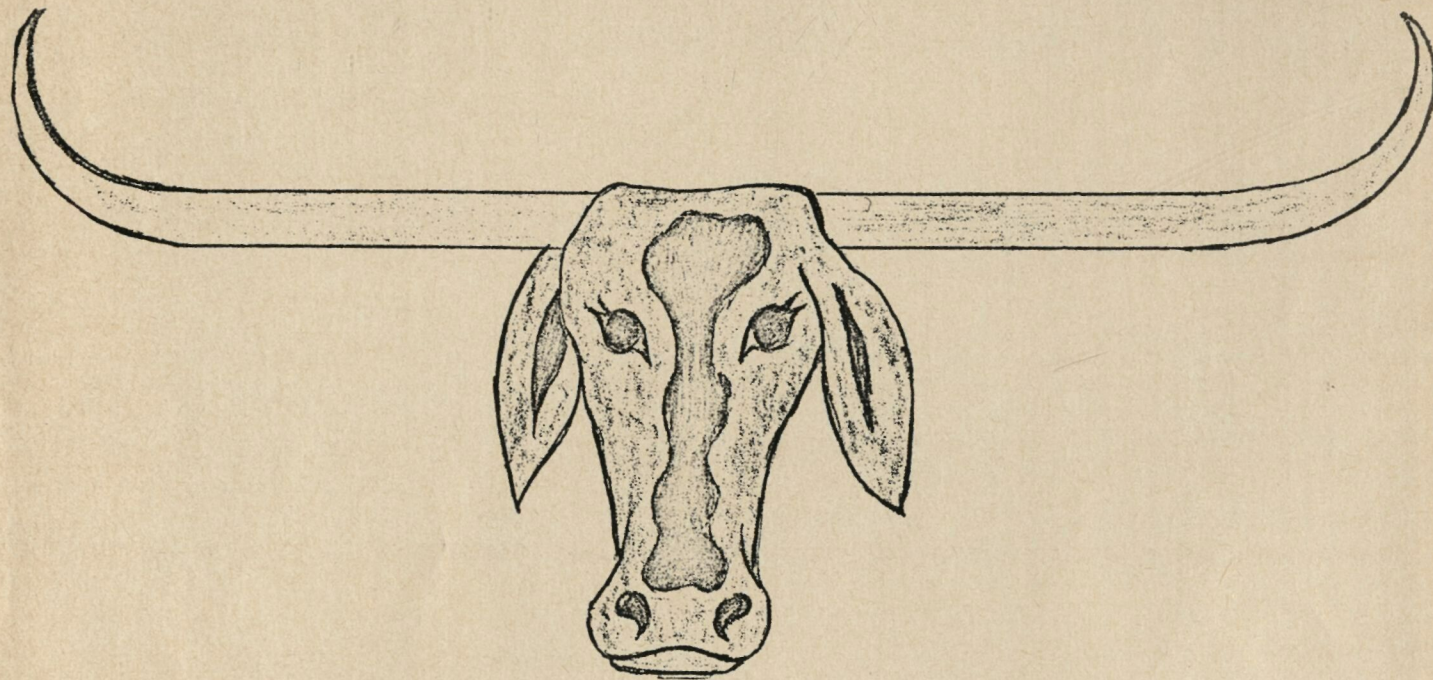

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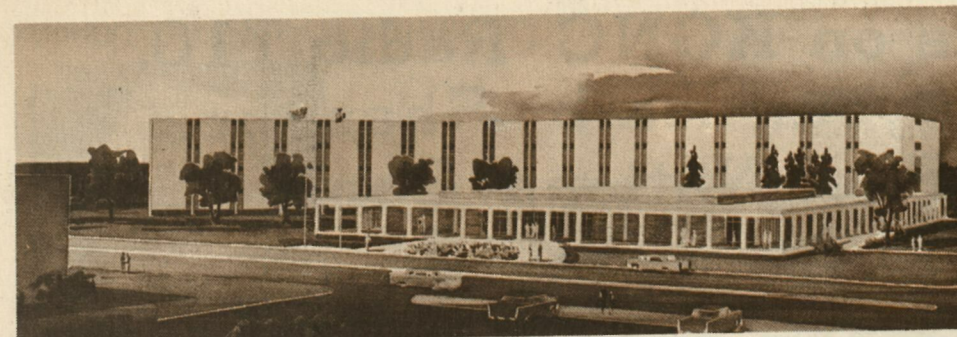
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New Focal Point — Phase one of a new 20-million dollar building complex is this one story Administration Building and a four story Classroom Unit. The new Administration Building, located in the center of the WTSU campus, was completed this Fall. The classroom section will be completed in the Fall of 1968. Overall cost of the Administration-Classroom complex is 3 million.

## WEST TEXAS STATE UNIVERSITY

Greatest period of expansion and enrollment growth has been experienced in the last decade by West Texas State University when the physical plant evaluation grew from approximately \$5 million to more than \$17 million, and enrollment jumped from just over 1,000 to more than 7,000. Enrollment is expected to continue climbing, and a new administration-classroom building complex, all to be completed by 1968, will boost value of the physical plant to more than \$20

million.

West Texas State was founded in 1910 as "West Texas Normal College" and became a degree-granting institution in 1917. The institution's name became "West Texas State Teachers College" in 1923, a name which it maintained until 1949, when the Texas Legislature, recognizing the added scope of the college renamed it "West Texas State College." In 1963, the legislature again changed the name to "West Texas State University," a name and de-

signation which more accurately described the role and scope of the institution.

R. B. Cousins, a former state superintendent of schools, was the first president of West Texas State, serving from 1910 until 1918, when J. A. Hill succeeded him in the presidency. Dr. Hill served for 30 years until 1948, when the third, and present, president, Dr. James P. Cornette assumed the post. All but two of the major buildings on campus have been constructed or greatly expanded and modified under Dr. Cornette's administration.

The university is now administratively-organized in the College of Arts and Sciences, with the Divisions of Humanities, Sciences, and Social Studies within the college; School of Business, School of Teacher Education, and the Graduate School.

Varied activities are also conducted through the University, such as the Killgore Research Center and Panhandle Educational Services Organization, through which a large number of educational programs are administered.

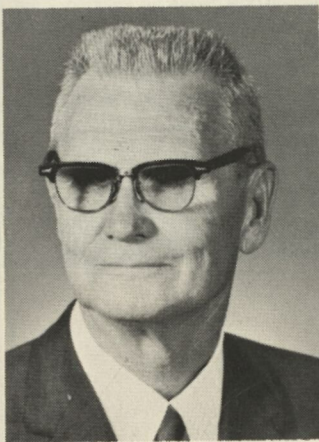


Dr. James P. Cornette

**The President . . .**

Dr. Cornette, the school's third president, has been at West Texas State since 1948 and was the man most responsible for the school becoming a university in the fall of 1963. He came to West Texas State from Baylor University where he had been Dean of the University for three years. Prior to that, Dr. Cornette was a professor of English at Western Kentucky from 1930-1945. Although he was born in Mississippi, he spent most of his youth in Kentucky. Dr. Cornette received degrees from Kentucky Wesleyan (A.B.), the University of Virginia (A.M.) and George Peabody (Ph.D.)

A past president of the Panhandle Plains Historical Society, Dr. Cornette was named "Man of the Year" by the Amarillo Globe-News, in 1962 for his outstanding work in the community.

**The Faculty  
Athletic Chairman . . .**

Mitch Jones had served his alma mater under innumerable titles since joining the faculty in 1926, one year after graduation. Only three faculty members have been at West Texas State longer than he.

His most recent and possibly most rewarding, capacity was that of Dean of Men, a position he had held for 18 years before relinquishing it in 1964. He has been a member of the faculty athletic committee since 1926 and chairman of that committee since 1948.

Known as "Bulldog" in his undergraduate days because of his determination and tenacity on the football field, Mr. Jones was an assistant coach in both football and basketball during his early years here and was head football coach in 1928.

**The Athletic Director . . .**

Frank Kimbrough came to West Texas State in 1947 as head football coach and three years later guided the Buffaloes to their greatest season in history, nine wins and one loss, plus taking them to a bowl for the first time.

In 1957, Kimbrough was named Director of Athletics and retired from coaching following that season. He then put his time and energy into raising funds for the construction of the present Buffalo Bowl, one of the most modern stadiums in college football, which was opened in 1959.

In nearly 40 years of coaching, he has molded teams at five schools in a half dozen sports. His senior college football coaching record, compiled at Hardin-Simmons, Baylor and WTSU, is an impressive 112 wins, 78 losses and eight ties, a winning percentage of .586.

An achievement of which he is justifiably proud is that in four appearances, his teams have never lost a bowl game.

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## THE BUFFALOES' HEAD COACH.....JOE KERBEL

When Joe Kerbel took over the head football coaching duties at West Texas State University in 1960, he set out to build one of the finest football programs in the country.

A man of boundless energy, Kerbel went to work and formed Booster Clubs and other organizations designed to raise funds for the University's athletic recruiting program. These organizations are the lifeline of all successful major programs.

Through his organizational efforts, new life was injected into the program and it wasn't long before names like Pedro, Richardson, and Logan began sharing headlines with the great stars of the Big 10 and Southwest Conference and the Canyon based University became one of the major college powers of the United States.

But for Joe Kerbel, this was only a good beginning. This year he enters his seventh season with the Buffaloes and his pace hasn't tapered an inch.

In the past months, Joe's worked to help organize a new major college NCAA conference to include WTSU. . . he's been a driving force behind the 1967 season ticket drive. . . he's helped to make the Buffalo Follies' a smash hit. . . and he's directed perhaps the greatest recruiting year in the University's history.

All this and he's still found time to put the Buffs through spring and fall drills.

How does Kerbel feel about the 1967 prospects?

"I'm looking at 1967 with guarded



optimism," he replies. "We lost 13 senior starters, 10 of whom have signed pro football contracts. Any time you lose that kind of proven talent you've got a rebuilding job ahead. I feel that the young men we recruited to fill these gaps are all potentially fine football players, but as yet they're still untested on the battlefield."

Last year's Buffs set 27 new individual, season and career records enroute to their 7-3 campaign. During his six-year tenure at WTSU, Kerbel's teams have set 61 new standards.

Key to Kerbel's record shattering teams lies in his offense, a pro split-T attack designed to probe the weakest part of the opponent's defense. Last season the Buff striking force ranked fourth nationally in total offense and eighth in forward passing.

"Our primary purpose in choosing this type of attack is, of course, to produce a winning team," says Kerbel. "We do think, however, that our athletes enjoy playing the more wide open type game and we also feel the fans appreciate it more."

Since Kerbel arrived to take over a team which had won but two of its previous 21 games, attendance has more than tripled. The Buffs have averaged over 12,500 fans a game and recorded an all-time high in 1962 by drawing in excess of 16,000 per game.

Kerbel dropped the first four games in his initial year, but he then proceeded to win 21 of the next 30 including the school's third bowl victory, a 15-14 decision over Ohio University in the 1962 Sun Bowl.

Of his many coaching thrills at WTSU, perhaps none moved him so deeply as when the seniors of 1966 surprised him with a four-foot trophy at the annual Spring Sports Banquet. The trophy, presented by Hank Washington and Ted Wheeler, bore the inscription "To Our Coach of the Year, our Coach of the Century, and our Coach for Eternity."

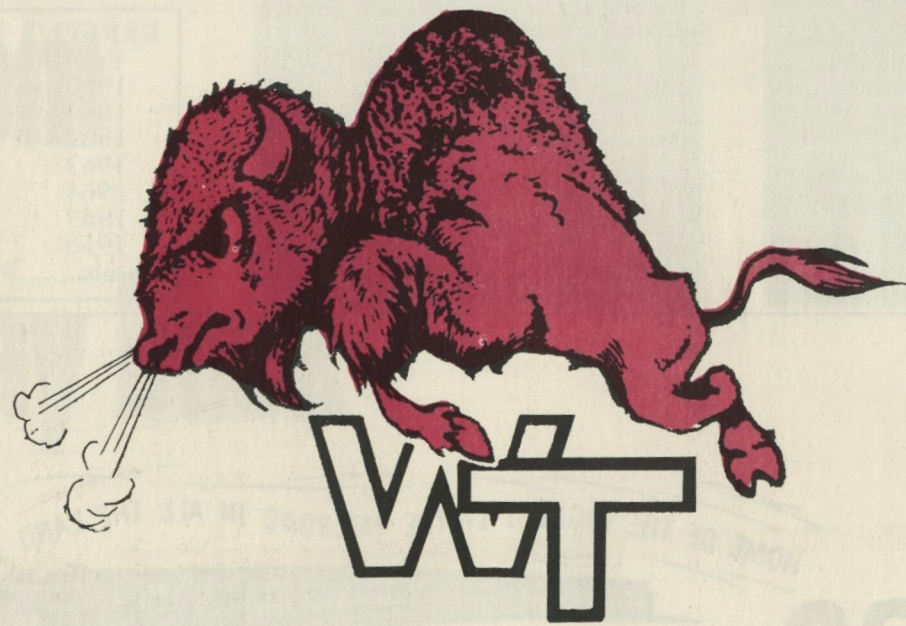
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### ASSISTANT COACHES

#### Jack Harris

#### Offensive Line

The offensive line coach at WTSU is Jack (Sleepy) Harris, a veteran of seven seasons with the Buffs. Harris came to West Texas in 1960 when Joe Kerbel arrived here to take over the head coaching duties. He had previously worked with Coach Kerbel at Breckenridge High School in 1952 and 1953. That Harris turns out top linemen was illustrated in the 1966 pro football talent search. Four of six offensive line starters from last year's team were signed to pro football contracts. The youngest of 10 children, Sleepy was born April 21, 1922 in Hill County, Texas. He was an all-state schoolboy end at Breckenridge and later went on to star at Hardin-Simmons University. Aside from his experience at Breckenridge and WTSU, Harris has held high school coaching positions at Itasca, Ozona, Nocona, Hereford and Pharr-San Juan-Alamo. He also coached at Southwestern University for two years. He received both his B. S. and Master's degrees in education from Hardin-Simmons. Sleepy and his wife Cupie have one married daughter, Priscilla Harris Cook.

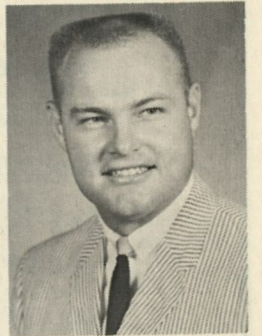

#### Lee Harrington

#### Defensive Line

Former Baylor center and line-backer Lee Harrington does the job of coaching Buff defensive linemen, the front line of WT's famed "Unfriendly Society." The coming season is the second for Harrington, who was appointed here after serving as first assistant and line coach at South Houston High, 1964-65. Lee was born Oct. 16, 1936 in Waco. He played in just four losing games as a Waco High School gridder, before going to Baylor to star on Sam Boyd's team that defeated Tennessee in the 1957 Sugar Bowl. Lee was graduated from Baylor University with a B. S. degree in physical education in 1958 and has done graduate work at the University of Houston. First coaching job was offensive line coach at Pasadena High School. He served in this capacity from 1958-1963. Lee and wife Elaine have one daughter, Leah (7) and a son, Ty (3).

#### C. E. Dierking

#### Linebackers

A former All-Southwest Conference linebacker at Baylor University, C. E. (Dirk) Dierking, has the responsibility of coaching the Buff linebacking corps. Dirk was appointed to the WT staff in 1964. Last season he coached perhaps the greatest linebacking unit in the University's history-Dave Gasser and the Wood twins, Burl and Earl. All three signed professional contracts with Canadian Football League clubs. Dierking came to WTSU from Tarleton State where he was line coach and assistant track coach. His first coaching job was at University High in Waco (1955-60) where he coached the line and headed the track program. Born March 31, 1933, in Brenham, Dirk helped lead Brenham High to three district championships. He was graduated from Baylor with a B. S. degree in physical education in 1955 and has done graduate work at North Texas State. Dirk and his wife Debbie have one son, Shane (2).

#### Frank Bettencourt

#### Assistant Backfield

Newest member of the WTSU coaching staff is Frank Bettencourt, one-time New Mexico State University standout end performer. He was appointed as defensive backfield coach August 1, 1966 after coaching South Portland, Maine High School to a 13-12-2 record in three seasons. Prior to his arrival there, South Portland hadn't posted a winning season in 10 years. His quarterback was his son, Frank Jr., who is ticketed for action on the Buff varsity this fall. Frank received his B. S. degree in physical education from New Mexico State in 1950. As a marine during World War II, he participated in the invasions of Saipan, Marshalla and the Marianas. Frank coached in six different high schools before coming to WTSU. At Grady, N. M. High School, he served a dual role as athletic director and principal. He and his wife Marjorie have three sons, Frank Jr. (19), Bobby (15), Biff (13), and one daughter, Diane (9).

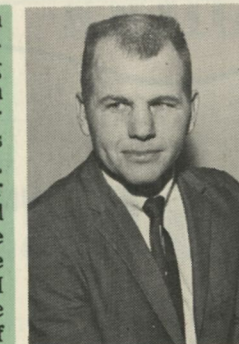

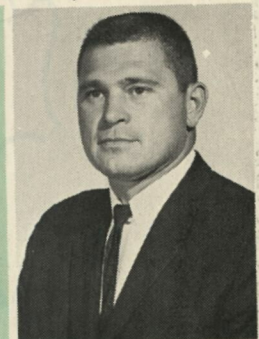

#### Ken McCullough

#### Ends, Kickers

Starting his third year as offensive end and punter coach is Ken McCullough. He was appointed in 1965, coming to WTSU from a head coaching assignment at Breckenridge High School. His coaching career also includes stints at Hereford (1957-58) and Pharr-San Juan-Alamo, (1958-60). Ken hails from Bartlesville, Okla. where he played his high school football under Joe Kerbel. He lettered four years as end and punter at Oklahoma State and played one year for the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian League as defensive half-back and offensive end. Two of his present Buff pupils, split-end Dave Szymakowski and kicking specialist Tommy Fambrough, are solid candidates for national honors this season. Ken was graduated from Oklahoma State in 1955 with a B. S. in agriculture. He holds the rank of captain in the U. S. Army Reserve. Ken and his wife Joanne have three daughters, Cynthia (11), Kathy (9) and Lori (8) and one son, Kenneth Jr. (2 months).

## AWARDS

Seniors captured all the honors at the 1967 West Texas State University Spring All-Sports Banquet.

Quarterback Hank Washington was named honorary captain of the 1966 squad that posted a 7-3 record. Washington, who shattered all WTSU passing marks in only two seasons with the Buffaloes, also won the Kleinschmidt Award, presented by J. Wesley Kleinschmidt, Canyon businessman, to the most valuable football and basketball players. Cornerback Tom Krempasky, the Buffs' defensive signal caller last season, was selected as honorary co-captain of the 1966 team.

Phil Hampton, starting center on the 1966 team, received the President's Award presented by Dr. James P. Cornette, university president. Criteria of this award is "citizenship, leadership, loyalty and cooperation, improvement in ability and general attitude."

Aside from his role on the gridiron, Hampton was a member of Alpha Chi, national university honor society and was selected to Who's Who In American Colleges and Universities.

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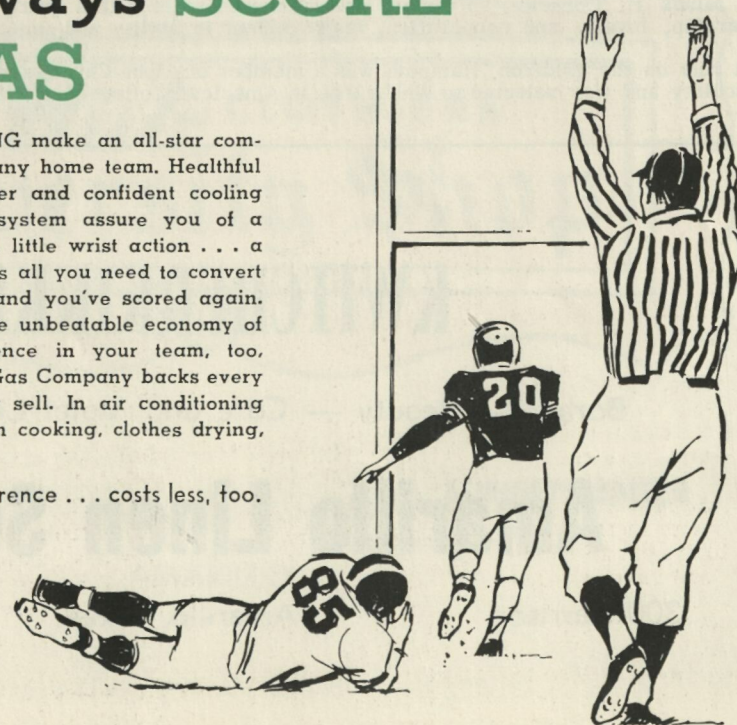
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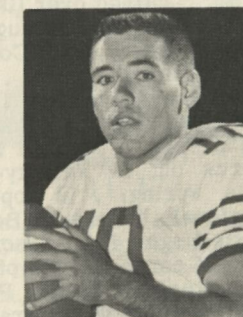

### Roy Winters, Jr., 1L, Rankin

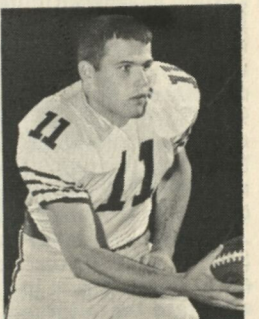

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# The WTSU Mathematics Department

About 40 years ago H. G. Wells observed that "Mathematical thinking will one day be as necessary for efficient citizenship as the ability to read and write." That day has long since come! The growth of the Department of Mathematics, paralleling that of West Texas State University itself, reflects the increasing public awareness of the need for an understanding of basic mathematical ideas in our increasingly complex technological society.

At WTSU a student may select mathematics courses from an offering of 90 semester hours at the undergraduate level and 48 semester hours at the graduate level. Programs are offered for the Bachelor of Science degree with a mathematics major or with a secondary teaching field in mathematics. The graduate student may pursue the Master of Science degree in mathematics or graduate student may pursue the Master of Science degree in mathematics or may obtain a mathematics concentration toward a Master of Education degree.

As is the case at any large college or university, the majority of the students taught by the Mathematics Department are not primarily mathematics majors. Basic mathematical concepts are utilized by an increasingly wide variety of academic disciplines such as Business, Economics, Education, Biology, and Agriculture, as well as being fundamental to the physical sciences.

Thus the teaching functions of the Department of Mathematics are two-fold: (1) The training of future mathematicians and mathematics teachers, and (2) Operating in a service capacity to other departments throughout the University; teaching courses in mathematics necessary for competence in other academic disciplines. In addition to their teaching duties, individual members of the department engage in consulting within as well as outside of the University and are continually involved in mathematical research.

The regular full-time staff of the Department of Mathematics numbers 13. They are: William Ambrose, Cecil Briggs, Jack Bullock, Hollis L. Cook, William P. Cooke, Philip Gensler, Ronald Huffstutler, Keith Lane, David E. Lasher, F. A. Moseley, David Patterson, Doug Proffer, and Miguel Tarrab. Additionally the department employs nine graduate teaching assistants and two graduate research assistants.

The Mathematics Department of WTSU is particularly proud of the record of graduated mathematics majors it has trained and of the large percentage of its graduates who have continued their studies at the graduate level, pursuing the Master's or Doctor's degree in mathematics. It feels that its philosophy that the graduate with a degree in mathematics should be well grounded in the various specific areas of study within the description "mathematics" accounts for the demand for its graduates as mathematicians and as teachers.

To illustrate a situation in which the modern-day graduate with a major in mathematics might find himself, consider the planning, building, and launching of a missile by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. In any one or a combination of these stages of the launch the mathematician will be found.

That the calculus is required in all stages is evident. However, other distinct branches of mathematics come into play at every level. For example, in the planning, budgeting, and accounting aspects of the launch the areas of mathematical programming, modern algebra (matrices), and computer programming are used, as well as ordinary algebra and arithmetic. Estimates of the reliability (that is: the probability of functioning satisfactorily) of the whole missile may be assessed by applying probabilistic and statistical arguments based on information available only on sub-systems of the missile. The planning of fuel requirements and the trajectory of the missile calls for the use of differential equations and their solution by methods from the field of numerical analysis; calling in turn for the use of the computer and indeed some elementary plane or coordinate geometry. This listing could be continued almost indefinitely, but the point is that the present day mathematics graduate of WTSU is expected to fit in to such a situation and to contribute to the solution of such problems.

Thus the Department of Mathematics endeavors to give its graduates the background necessary for competence in a variety of important mathematical areas. Further, and perhaps most importantly, it attempts to instill in its graduates the necessary confidence and imagination required to recognize and solve mathematical problems as yet unknown but which will most certainly arise.

# The WTSU Physics Department

The Physics Department at West Texas State University offers work toward both the requirements for pre-medicine, pre-dentistry; engineering and other related fields can be satisfied.

At the undergraduate level a student can enroll in Atomic Physics, Electricity, Electronics, Precision of Measurements, Vector Analysis, Optics, Boundary Value Problems, Classical Mechanics, Thermodynamics, Nuclear Physics and Research. Laboratory work is available in may fields.

At the graduate level courses are available in Theoretical Physics, Advanced Problems and Thesis. One may obtain the Master of Science degree, either with thesis or without thesis (36-hour plan).

The potential teacher can satisfy the Teacher Education requirements for either the Provisional Certificate (18 or 24 hours) or the Professional Certificate (36 hours). The student who so desires can complete work toward a degree and the appropriate teaching certificate at the same time.

The facilities of the Killgore Research Center are available to the Physics Department. Research in the Physics Department is now going on in the areas of low temperature physics using helium and gravitational theory. In low temperature research there are projects in adiabatic demagnetization and superconducting alloys.

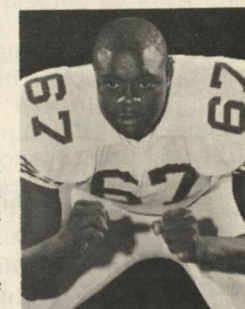

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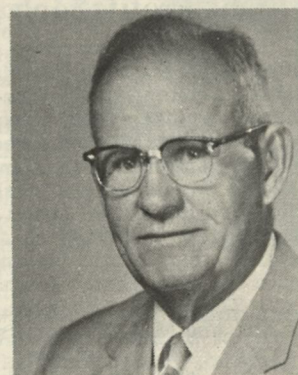

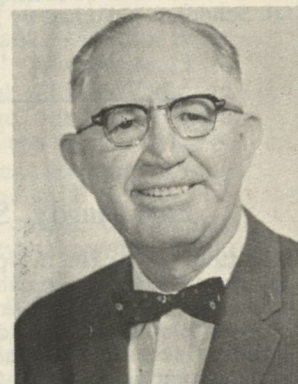

# WORD FROM THE HERD

The University of Pacific Tigers brings a 1-1 record into tonight's game and a strong memory of a 49-7 shellacking they were handed by the Buffs in Stockton, California last season.

The Tigers, led by last season's Northern California Coach of the Year, Doug Scovil, will have the majority of last season's key personnel returning and that for the Buffs could spell trouble.

In the past two weeks the West Texas defense has faced two of the nation's finest running backs — Montana State's Little All-America Don Hass, and Utah State's great All-America fullback candidate MacArthur (Truck) Lane. Tonight the Buffs must figure out how to stop another great back in Pacific's 210 pound fullback Jack Layland. Last year Layland boomed for 830 yards to rank 15th nationally in rushing. This year he's topping his

1966 pace by averaging 127.5 yards a game.

Both teams will be anxious to get back into the winning column after Saturday night reversals. After blasting Idaho 42-6 in their season opener, the Tigers fell to an aroused University of California at Santa Barbara 24-20 last week. The Buffs bounced Montana State 35-26 in their initial game before falling to Utah State 44-27 here Saturday night.

"Pacific has a veteran team with good size and some outstanding personnel," says Buff Head Coach Joe Kerbel. "I'm sure they'll be anxious to avenge last year's defeat tonight."

Aside from Layland, the Tigers return 24 lettermen from last year's 4-6 team. Figuring prominently in Pacific's game plan will be the passing of quarterbacks Bob Lee and

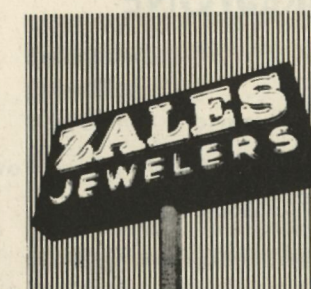
and Rand Bergstrom and a fine receiving corps headed by split end Bob Ricoli and tight end Bruce Coslet. Lee, who completed 12 of 22 passes for 166 yards against the Buffs last year, has hit on eight of 14 pass attempts this season. Bergstrom, a precocious sophomore, has connected on 14 of 25 aeriels for 146 yards. Last week he entered the Santa Barbara game with the Tigers down 24-7 early in the fourth period and directed them on two scoring drives. During this period he completed eight of 14 passes for 78 yards.

## ABOUT THE TIGERS

The University of the Pacific football fortunes for the 1967 season appear to be quite good. The Tigers, who are led by last seasons Northern California Coach of the Year, Doug Scovil, have the majority of last seasons key personnel returning. Last season, the Tigers, on the first step of a rebuilding program, had a respectable 4-7 record.

The Tigers, in '67, will be led by senior quarterback Bob Lee, who last season, after transferring from San Francisco City College, completed 102 of 222 passes for a total of 1299 yards and 12 touchdowns. Lee, along with Juan Flores, a soccer player from Honduras, will carry the load of the Tigers kicking game. Another likely candidate for a starting call at the quarterback spot is sophomore Rand

The flanker spot looks good for the Tigers with veteran Bob Ricioli returning along with top soph prospect Jack Morrison, who is a 9.6 sprinter. Ricioli is the third all-time receiver in

Pacific record books, and is only 23 receptions short of an all-time record. Bruce Coslet, a senior letterman, and Bob Adams, a J.C. transfer will fight it out for the starting tight end position, while the interior line will be led by senior tackles Ken Erickson and Mark Nordquist.

Defensively, the Tigers front four should be as tough as any in the nation, with seniors Jeff Banks, Bob Locatelli, Larry Anderson, and Bob Heinz leading the way. Defensive halfbacks Charles Alexander and Rudy Redmond, a J.C. transfer, should have numerous "bingos" to their credit by the close of the season. All in all things look very good for the University of the Pacific Tigers. And a winning season looks eminent.

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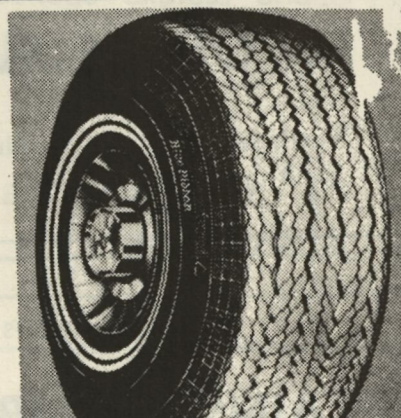
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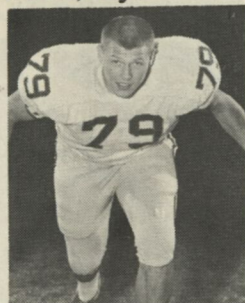

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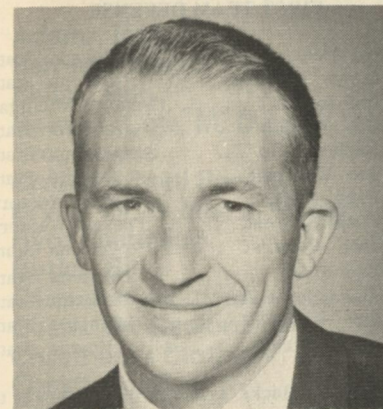
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## The UOP Athletic Director

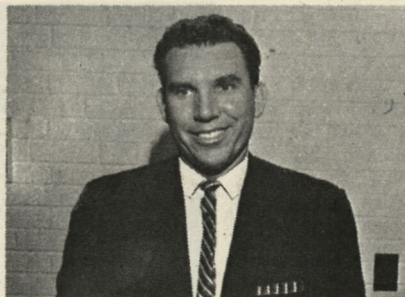
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## BUFF BASKETBALL STOCK RISES



Dennis Walling

When Dennis Walling accepted the challenge of rebuilding West Texas State University's basketball fortunes, he realized that immediate help must be found to compete against the major college basketball powers that dot the 1967 schedule.

Last year the Buffs slumped to their worst season in history, a flaccid 1-18 showing. This year, with two new coaches and a host of new talent the Buffs could become the cinderella team of the Southwest.

In the past few months Walling and his new assistant coach, Les Pollock, have signed some of the top junior college and schoolboy players in the United States. Knowledge of these signings has started Panhandle fans buzzing with the prospects of a winning season.

One of the first players Walling signed when he accepted the West Texas coaching position was Simmy Hill, a 6-7 junior college all-American from Cameron College of Lawton, Oklahoma.

"I see Hill as the key man in our 1967 plans," says Walling. "He's the best big man I've seen, and that includes UCLA's Lew Alcindor and Houston's Elvin Hayes."

Endowed with cat-quick reflexes and an excellent scoring touch, Hill tallied 799 points (25.8 scoring average) in boosting Cameron to third place in the final national junior college poll last season.

"Simmy reminds me of Elgin Baylor," beams Walling. "He's a demon driving to the bucket with the ball because he has Baylor's great moves and body control and Oscar Robertson's talent for feeding the open man."

Another big man in Walling's 1967 plans is Maurice Savage, an imposing 6-10 transfer from Cameron College. Savage is regarded as a top pivot candidate because of his rebounding prowess and amazing big man speed.

Adding additional board strength to next year's Buffs will be Gale Rhine, a 6-4 transfer from Dallas Baptist, and two returnees from last season's West Texas squad, 6-5 forwards David Nowlin and Der-rith Welch. Both Nowlin and Welch are regarded as possible starters. Another forward candidate is 6-5 transfer Jeffrey Rowles from Santa Barbara J. C. of California. Rowles is a two year all-conference performer.

In seeking to bolster the front-line, Walling hasn't failed to recruit backcourt firepower. A first step in that direction was taken when he signed Wendel Hart, and all-American J. C. guard from Dallas Baptist.

"After coaching Hart the past two years, I'd have to say he's one of the best outside shooters I've ever seen," confesses Walling. "Hart has what it takes to become an outstanding performer."

Aside from Hart's addition, Wal-

ling's also signed Lonnie Speck, a talented floor general from Dallas Baptist. Speck red-shirted last season after transferring from Sam Houston College. He's regarded as an outstanding ball-handler and a tenacious defensive player.

Returning to vie for a starting guard position from last year's West Texas quintet is Mike Mitchell, the Buffs' leading scorer in 1966 with an 18.9 scoring mien. The 6-3 Roswell, New Mexico junior has all the tools to become one of West Texas' finest guards.

While seeking immediate varsity help in junior college transfers, the Buff coaching staff hasn't overlooked any promising freshman candidates.

The Buffs open their 22-game schedule Dec. 1 when they host powerful Phillips 66 in an exhibition contest. Among Buff home-and-home opponents for 1967-68 will be Texas Western (UTEP), University of Houston, Colorado State, New Mexico State, Oklahoma City University, Hardin-Simmons, Centenary, Arlington State and Abilene Christian. The Buffs will face Texas A&M, University of New Mexico and University of Albuquerque in single games.

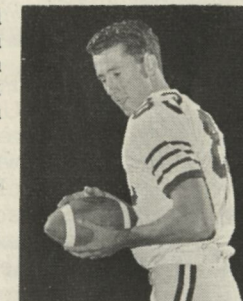

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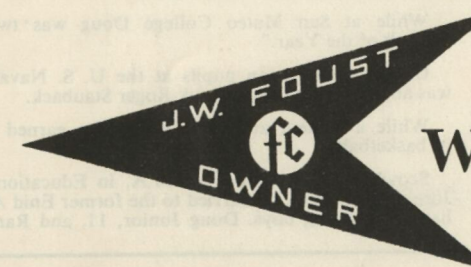
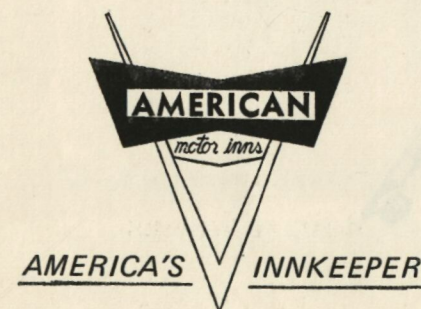
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## UNIVERSITY OF PACIFIC

Founded in the first year of California Statehood, 1851, the University of the Pacific is California's first chartered institution of higher education. The University is a residence campus, with an enrollment of 2500, large enough to create a campus community of varied activities and opportunities, yet not so large as to impair the values of individualized attention. The academic structure of the University is presently comprised of four

liberal arts colleges (College of the Pacific, Raymond College, Elbert Covell College, and Callison College) and six professional schools (Conservatory of Music, School of Education, School of Pharmacy, School of Engineering, School of Dentistry - San Francisco, McGeorge School of Law - Sacramento, and the Graduate School).

The College of the Pacific is a school of arts and sciences which carries and preserves the name

utilized by the University from 1911 until 1961. It is composed of 19 departments offering more than 25 departmental and interdepartmental degree programs and provides preparation for entrance to various graduate programs.

Under the leadership of President Robert E. Burns, the University established the "cluster" college concept in 1962 as a way of growing larger without losing close student-faculty relationship so vital to the maximum learning experience. Each "cluster" college is able to introduce teaching innovations within the framework of the total university structure while operating under one administration and making use of central facilities such as the library, health service, and athletic facilities.

Raymond College, the first of the "cluster" colleges, offers a three year accelerated program leading to the Bachelor of Arts degree, emphasizing seminars, tutorials and independent study.

Elbert Covell College, the second "cluster" college, opened in 1963 as the first Spanish-speaking liberal arts college in North America.

The third "cluster" college, Callison College, opened for students this fall. The unique feature of this college is that the entire sophomore class will spend one year abroad in an emerging nation.

### THE HEAD MAN



Doug Scovil, a graduate of the University of the Pacific will be entering his second season as the Tigers head football coach. Last season, in his first campaign, the Tigers had their best record in the past four years, 4-7, and completed the first step of a major rebuilding program. Coach Scovil was named "Coach of the Year" for his achievements by the Northern California Football Writers Association.

Scovil, a native of San Francisco, was a quarterback at Pacific from 1949-1951, and in that time became the school's number five all-time passer.

Prior to coming to Pacific Scovil served for three years as assistant head football coach at the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland. Prior to that Doug was the head football coach at San Mateo Junior College. At San Mateo, Scovil's teams compiled a 35-7-6 record and won

three Big Eight titles.

Scovil's first coaching position, which came in 1954, was at Sacred Heart High School in San Francisco, and in 1957 he took that team to its first city title.

While at San Mateo College Doug was twice chosen "Coach of the Year."

One of Scovil's top pupils at the U. S. Naval Academy was all-American Quarterback Roger Stauback.

While a student at Pacific Doug also earned two letters in basketball.

Scovil, who also holds an M.A. in Education from San Jose State College, is married to the former Enid Arata. They have two young boys. Doug Junior, 11, and Randy, 6.

Leading the 1967 band will be drum major Gary Laramore. Gary is a senior from Pampa. Assistant drum major is Pampa junior David Robertson.

This year the band will play host to area high school bands during "Band Day" on the WT campus. Band Day is scheduled Oct. 28 when West Texas hosts Arlington State at Buffalo Bowl.

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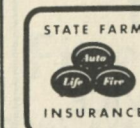
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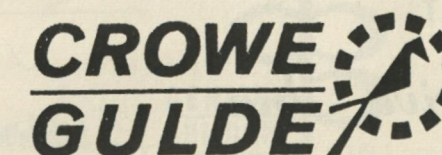

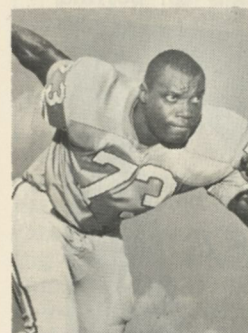
the old Administration building stands, so he thought the Buffalo would be an appropriate mascot. The students rose enmasse to approve the suggestion and Buffalo it has been ever since.
