Penalties

1. OFFSIDE by either team; Violation of scrimmage or free kick formation; Encroachment on neutral zone—Loss of Five Yards.
2. ILLEGAL PROCEDURE, POSITION OR SUBSTITUTION—Putting ball in play before Referee signals "Ready-for-Play"; Failure to complete substitution before play starts; Player out-of-bounds when scrimmage begins, or on free kick formation; Failure to maintain proper alignment of offensive team when ball is snapped; False start or simulating start of a play; Taking more than two steps after Fair Catch is made; Player on line receiving snap; Free kick out-of-bounds—Loss of Five Yards.
3. ILLEGAL MOTION—Offensive player illegally in motion when ball is snapped—Loss of Five Yards.
4. ILLEGAL SHIFT—Failure to pause one full second in shift play—Loss of Five Yards.
5. ILLEGAL RETURN—Infraction of substitution rule—Loss of Five Yards.
6. DELAY OF GAME —Consuming more than 25 seconds in putting the ball in play after it is declared ready-for-play; Failure to remove injured player for whom excess timeout was granted; Crawling—Loss of Five Yards. Team not ready to

- play at start of either half—Loss of 15 Yards.
7. PERSONAL FOUL—Tackling or blocking defensive player who has made fair catch; Piling on; Hurdling; Tripping; Grasping face mask of opponent; Tackling player out-of-bounds, or running into player obviously out of play; Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)
 8. CLIPPING—Loss of 15 Yards.
 9. ROUGHING THE KICKER or holder—Loss of 15 Yards.
 10. UNSPORTSMANLIKE CONDUCT—Striking an opponent with fist, forearm, elbow or locked hands; Kicking or kneeling—Loss of 15 Yards (offenders will be disqualified); Violation of rules during intermission; Illegal return of disqualified player; Coaching from side lines; Invalid signal for Fair Catch; Persons illegally on field—Loss of 15 Yards. (Flagrant offenders will be disqualified.)
 11. ILLEGAL USE OF HANDS AND ARMS by offensive or defensive player—Loss of 15 Yards.
 12. INTENTIONAL GROUNDING of forward pass—Loss of Five Yards from spot of pass Plus Loss of Down.

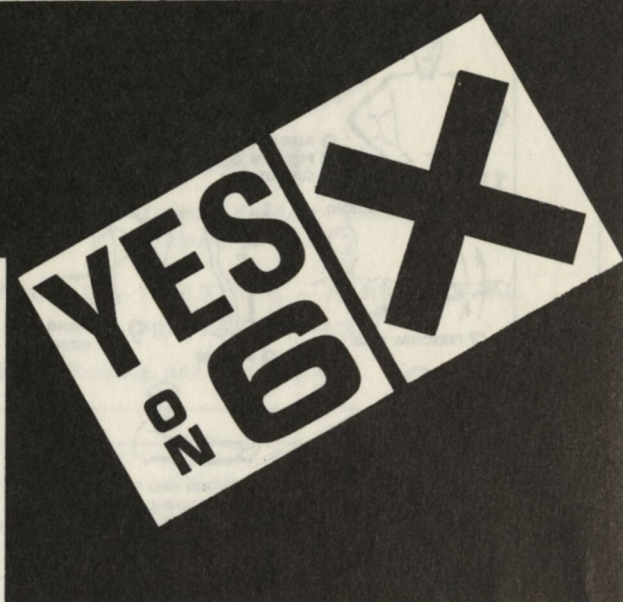
13. ILLEGAL FORWARD PASS OR ILLEGAL HANDING BALL FORWARD—Loss of Five Yards from spot of foul Plus Loss of Down.
14. FORWARD PASS OR KICK CATCHING INTERFERENCE—Interference with opportunity of player of receiving team to catch a kick—Loss of 15 Yards, Interference by member of offensive team on forward pass—Loss of 15 Yards Plus Loss of Down. Interference by defensive team on forward pass—Passing Team's Ball at Spot of Foul and First Down.
15. INELIGIBLE RECEIVER DOWNFIELD ON PASS—Loss of 15 yards.
16. BALL ILLEGALLY TOUCHED, KICKED OR BATTED — Forward pass being touched by ineligible receiver beyond the line of scrimmage—Loss of 15 Yards from Spot of Preceding Down and Loss of a Down. Eligible pass receiver going out-of-bounds and later touching a forward pass—Loss of Down; Illegally kicking the ball—Loss of 15 Yards; Illegally kicking or batting a free ball—Offended team's ball at Spot of Foul.
17. INCOMPLETE FORWARD PASS—Penalty declined; No play or no score.
18. HELPING THE RUNNER, or interlocked interference—Loss of 15 Yards.

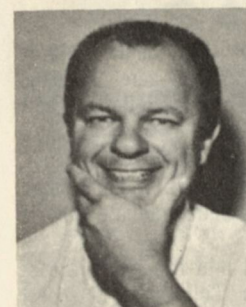

TONIGHT'S GAME

You'd think in the length of time Pacific and Santa Clara have been playing football that tonight's game would be more than just the 10th meeting between the nearby universities.

Santa Clara dropped football for six years before resuming in 1959 and since coming back under coach Pat Malley, the Broncos have posted a 50-24 record including their 2-2 won-lost standing this season. Santa Clara, slowly and carefully, is rebuilding its football program on a reasonable financial basis.

Misfortune struck the Broncos early this year when they lost two quarterbacks in a 23-16 loss to Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo. San Francisco State then dumped the Broncos, 19-7, but Santa Clara bounced back to win its next two, 3-0, over UC Davis and 34-13 over Cal Poly of Pomona last weekend.

Quarterback Dan Pastorini has returned to action and had an outstanding game in Santa Clara's win over Cal Poly.

Pastorini, who like Rand Bergstrom of UOP is a Sonora product, threw two touchdown passes, both to Bart Jenks for 15 and 17 yards. Jenks set a Bronco record of 171 yards on 10 receptions against Cal Poly.

Two players in tonight's game were honored at this week's Northern California Sportswriters meeting. Pacific's Jack Morrison was named the outstanding university back of the week for his two touchdown catches against Idaho, while Jenks was picked the top college back of the week.

Pacific isn't taking the Santa Clara game lightly by any means, though the Tigers are happy to be home again after dropping two on the road to West Texas State, 23-7, and to surprising Idaho, 31-14. The Bengals lone victory was a come-from-behind, 21-20, win over Miami of Ohio in the opener at home.

"Santa Clara will be tough," said UOP Coach Doug Scovil. "They have good personnel; we know, because they got several players we wanted."

Now, we said this was only the 10th meeting between Santa Clara and Pacific in football. Well, that's Pacific's figures. The Broncos claim this is the 16th confrontation.

According to Pacific history the series began in 1925 with the Tigers winning, 13-7, and the series now stands, 5-4 in Santa Clara's favor. However, Bronco historians say it all started in 1908 with Santa Clara winning the opener, 5-0. The Broncos claim an 11-4 edge in the series.

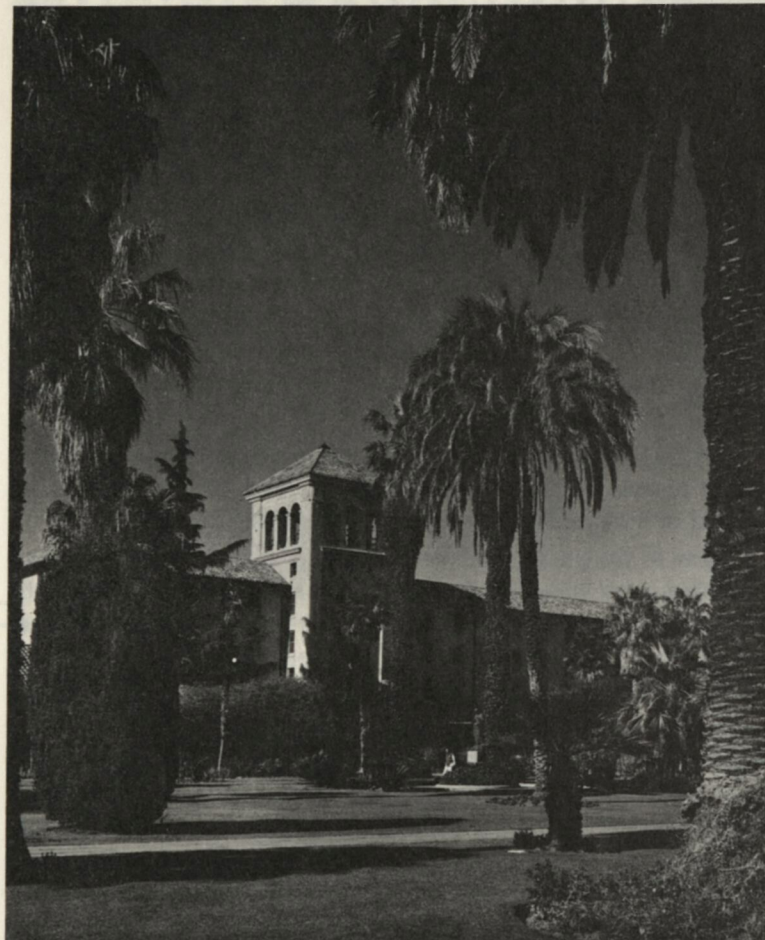
Regardless, it is a fact Santa Clara upset the Tigers, 14-6, in their last meeting which ruined Pacific's 1964 homecoming. The last Pacific win over Santa Clara was 28-6 by then coach John Rohde's 1962 Tigers.

Pacific has been having defensive problems in its first three games, though the Tigers have played tough opposition. And UOP will be gunning to get back on the winning trail tonight against the Broncos.

Anyway, three opponents have pushed across 74 points for an average of 24.6 points per game. That puts pressure on the rebuilding offense which is averaging 14 points per.

After facing Santa Clara tonight, Pacific will host the tough Utah State Aggies next Saturday night (Oct. 19).

UNIVERSITY OF



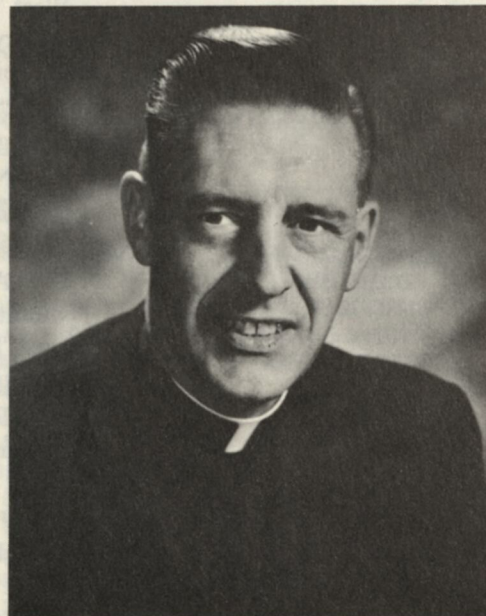
Founded in the Spring of 1851, Santa Clara is California's oldest university. The 67-acre campus is located in the City of Santa Clara, 45 miles south of San Francisco.

In 1961, after 110 years as an all-male school, Santa Clara became coeducational. Today women compose about a third of the undergraduate student body of 2900.

The University is divided into five major areas: the College of Humanities, College of Sciences, School of Business, School of Engineering and School of Law. Graduate work leading to master's and doctoral degrees is available in both the Schools of Engineering and Business. Master's programs also are offered in the graduate division of the College of Humanities.

In the last 10 years Santa Clara added 13 new facilities costing more than \$13 million: McLaughlin Hall for Men, Sullivan Engineering Center, Heafey Law Library, Dunne Residence Hall for Men, Graham Residence Center for Women, Benson Memorial Student Center, Orradre Library, Campisi Residence Hall for Women, Sanfilippo Residence Hall for Women, Daly Science Center, Swig Residence Hall for Men and Kenna Hall School of Business.

During the same period, the undergraduate enrollment rose from 988 in 1957 to 2850 in 1967-68.

UNIVERSITY OF THE PACIFIC SCHOOL OF PHARMACY

THE SCHOOL OF PHARMACY, the newest of three such schools in California, was organized in 1955, with the encouragement of the California Pharmaceutical Association. It is accredited by the American Council on Pharmaceutical Education, and is a member of the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy.

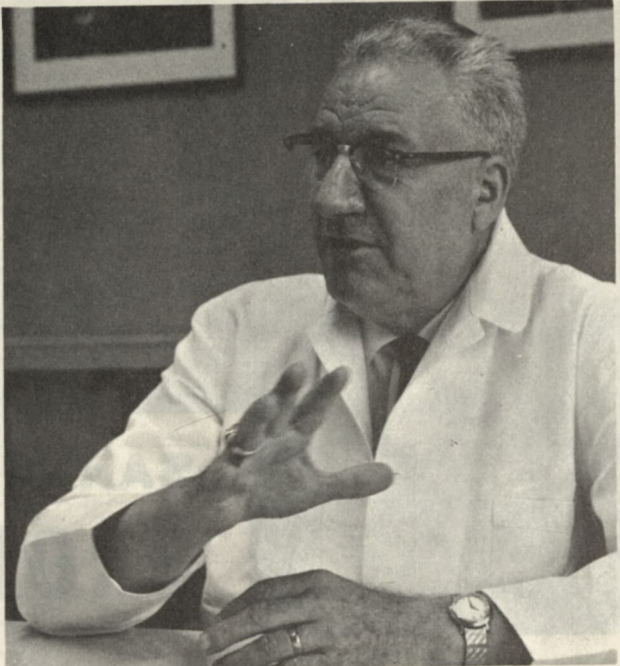
There are two principal undergraduate programs. The first, for the student who enters Pacific as a freshman, includes one year of pre-pharmacy and four years in the professional school. This leads to the Bachelor of Science degree which fulfills the needs of most students. The Doctor of Pharmacy degree is available on an optional basis and requires one additional year. This program is also for transfer students who complete the pre-pharmacy year at another college.

The second program is designed primarily for the transfer student who completes a prescribed two-year pre-pharmacy program elsewhere. It leads directly to the Doctor of Pharmacy degree, conferred after four years in the professional School of Pharmacy.

To prepare the graduating pharmacist for the highest standard of practice, and to insure his readiness to take his place among an informed citizenry, the curriculum of the School of Pharmacy requires each student to fulfill certain requirements in humanities and social sciences through the College of the Pacific. This feature, together with the residential nature of the total campus and the relationship which the School of Pharmacy has with the other schools and colleges within the University, represents one of the distinctive strengths of Pacific's School of Pharmacy.



A new \$4.3 million pharmacy complex is now under construction which will provide 100,000 square feet of space and the most modern equipment and facilities available. The rotunda will contain lecture halls and the 500-seat DeMarcus Brown Theatre. Completion is scheduled in September, 1969.
