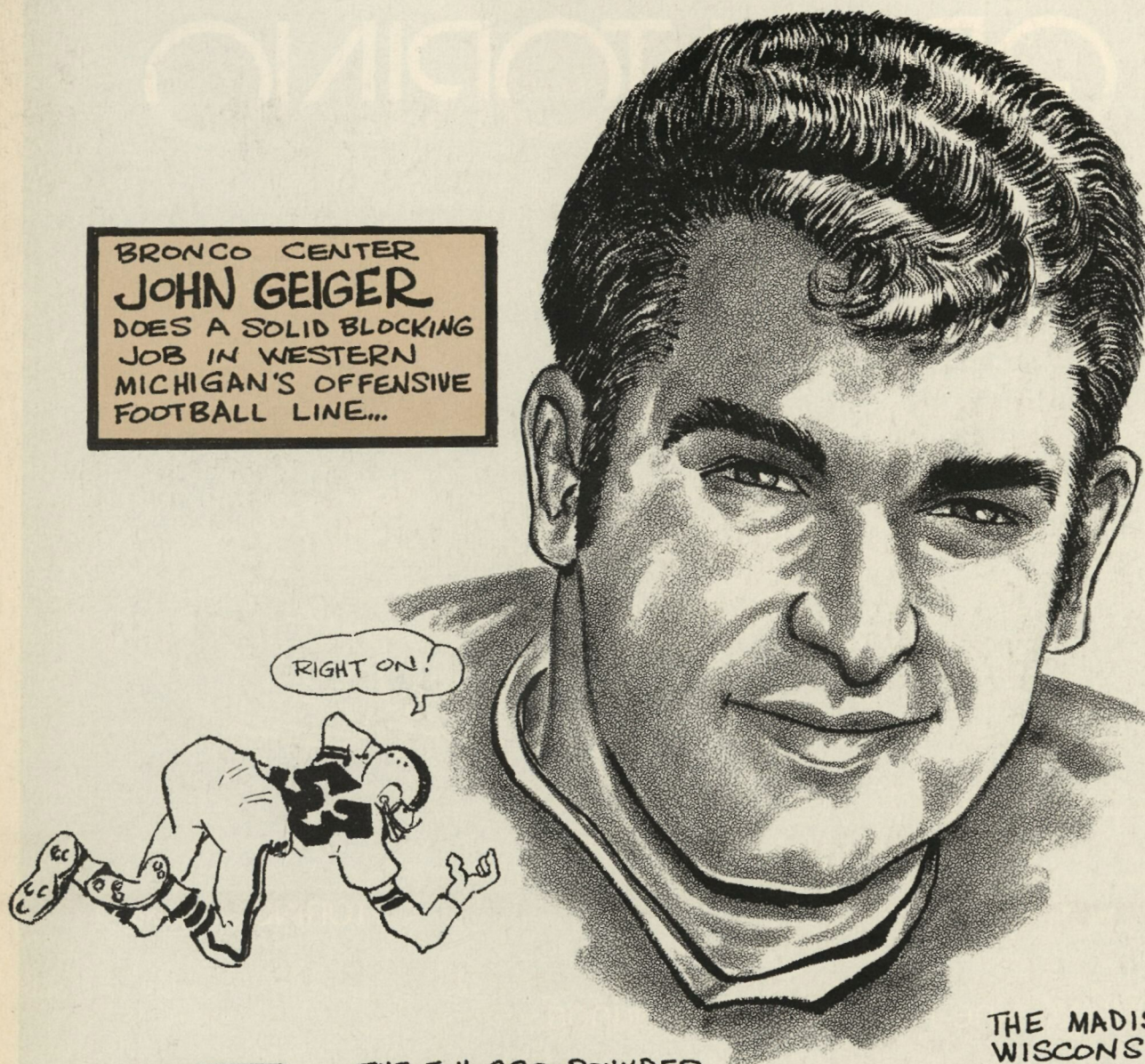

# THE WESTERN ATHLETIC SCENE

Western's football forces will be out to close with a 7-3 record for the third time in the last six seasons.

The Broncos are also unbeaten this fall in four non-league games and have not lost to an outside foe in ten starts since bowing, 28-20, to a Duane Thomas-led West Texas State team here in 1969.

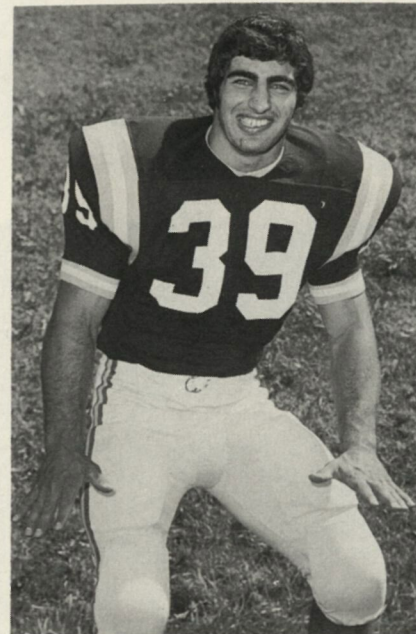
The Mid-American Conference has had a banner year against outsiders this fall, winning 20 games against only five losses.

Today's opponent, the University of Pacific, has a 2-7 record but revamped its offensive backfield last Saturday to swamp Hawaii, 40-17.

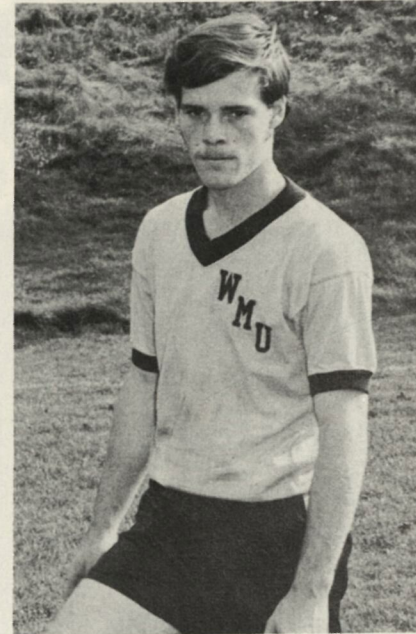
Among the Tiger losses were a 14-7 decision to always-tough San Diego State, and one-pointers to Long Beach State, 15-14, and Idaho, 13-12.



For the second straight year, Kalamazoo's Gary Harris was runner-up for Mid-American Conference cross country honors.



Middle linebacker Tom Elias paces the Bronco defense with 89 tackles, one ahead of fellow senior Greg Igaz.



Junior Bob See of Livonia led WMU's soccer team in scoring with four goals and five assists.

Incidentally, both Long Beach and Idaho will pay visits to Waldo Stadium in 1972.

Western's only previous meeting with Pacific was a 20-0 win

for the Tigers two years ago in Stockton.

This is the first appearance for a California-based team to Waldo Stadium.

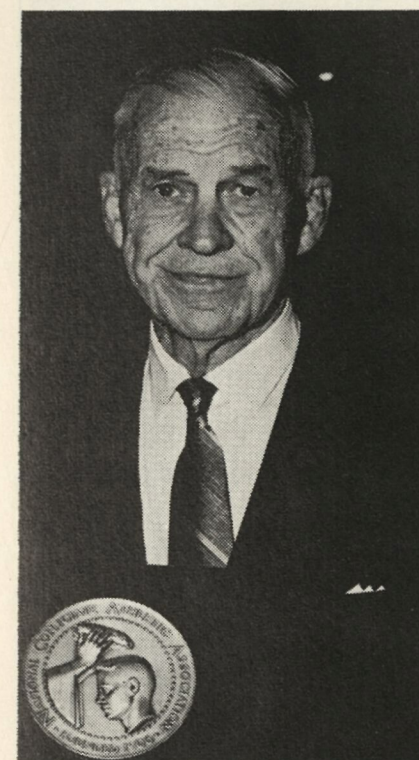

# A MAN NAMED SHAUGHNESSY

Clark Shaughnessy

Call the roll of coaches whose names are etched in bold type on the pages of college football history . . . Knute Rockne, Pop Warner, Walter Camp, A. A. Stagg, Bill Roper, "Hurry-Up" Yost, Percy Haughton, John Heisman, Bob Zuppke, Andy Smith, Gil Dobie, Tad and Howard Jones, Wallace Wade and so many more.

Add the names, and quickly, of Dana X. Bible, Fritz Crisler, Frank Leahy, Bud Wilkinson, Bill Alexander, Bob Neyland, Don Faurot, Andy Kerr, Pappy Waldorf, Frank Cavanaugh, Jess Neely, Ossie Solem, Slip Madigan, Red Sanders, Bernie Bierman, Lou Little and Buck Shaw.

The list goes on. Nor are the giants of today, their careers now in full flower, to be overlooked. On them the record book is not closed but their deeds are certain to live in golden memory.

Most of the pace-setters gained added lustre because they were identified with one university. One man,

however, was not so catalogued. His name is Clark Shaughnessy.

Shaughnessy coached at Loyola (New Orleans), Tulane, Chicago, Stanford, West Virginia and Pittsburgh, not to mention with three more teams in pro ball. Indicative of his restless, challenging spirit, he moved around just like the teams he coached. Perhaps that dimmed the overall recognition he was accorded. Nonetheless and conceivably, Shaughnessy contributed more to football strategy, offense and defense alike, than any man who ever lived. Off the field as well, he was indeed quite a man.

## Changed Football's Face

Shaughnessy, who died last year, changed the tempo and face of football so that it is almost unrecognizable from that of 50, even 25 years ago. He didn't invent the T-Formation, but he took it out of its swaddling clothes, constantly streamlined it and wrote the doctoral thesis. Literally, and figuratively as well, he put wings on the football.

This dedicated man, who weight hardly varied an ounce from the 198 pounds of his Minnesota playing days some 60 years ago, took virtually the same Stanford team, which had won but one game in 1939, and coached it to an unbeaten 1940 season. As the "T", with its ball-handling wizardry, deception, brush blocking and so much more, provided the key, a 21-13 win over Nebraska in the Rose Bowl followed. That turned on, electrically, the entire college football world — turned it on receptively, so that the T-Formation almost became standard procedure.

Before he died, Gus Welch, who starred at Carlisle with Jim Thorpe, and whose life spanned Shaughnessy's, turned to George Reiffenach at a football gathering, pointed toward the noted innovator, and said:

"There's the man who has filled every stadium in the country."

Tom Fears, who played under Shaughnessy, pin-points it well with:

"Shaughnessy's dedication and his tremendous new concepts changed football immeasurably. Never has he received his just due, while others used his ideas and theories to their profit, and often took the bows. But more than anyone else, Clark Shaughnessy remains in the hearts of those who played for him."

## Impressive Integrity

His influence and character also were acknowledged outside of the football sphere. To illustrate, back in the 30's, he was summoned to New York by George Whitney, head of the J. P. Morgan Company, in the hope of securing Shaughnessy's assent to coach Harvard, his alma mater. Clark declined, but the impression of his integrity upon Whitney was deep. A few weeks later the financier called the coach who was then at the University of Chicago.

"Can you recommend some young man in the midwest who would fit well into the J. P. Morgan Company program?" he asked.

Clark recommended Elmore Patterson, who played with Jay Berwanger, at the Maroon school. Patterson rose to the company's presidency.

The trail-blazing mentor was also the man most sought, largely by Jake Gaither, Florida A&M's coach, to help in opening pro football's gates wider for Negro players.

In the 30's as well, Shaughnessy was approached by representatives of the Temple Shalom, in Chicago. They asked his advice concerning Rabbi Louis Binstock of New Orleans, who Clark knew well. Later Rabbi Binstock became head of the Temple Shalom.

That was Clark Shaughnessy, who was 99 per cent Irish. To repeat, he was quite a man . . . and on all counts. Perhaps it figures. Daniel was his middle name.

# PAPER TECHNOLOGY FOUNDATION

The Paper Technology Foundation is a non-profit corporation established by the pulp, paper, paperboard, and allied industries to interest students in preparing for careers in the paper industry and to provide financial assistance to them in the form of scholarships, loans and grants.

Additional purposes of the Foundation are to aid and promote by financial assistance and guidance all types of education and research in paper science and engineering at Western Michigan University and to assist in developing programs and curricula of advanced study in the field of paper technology.

The Foundation has a triple basic purpose—aiding students in the Department of Paper Science and Engineering and serving Western Michigan University and the paper industry.

Since its beginning in 1958, Paper Technology Foundation scholarships to students in the Department of Paper Science and Engineering have amounted to approximately \$225,000. Some three hundred students have benefitted from these scholarship awards, which currently range from \$150 to \$600 per semester.

These scholarships, in many

cases, have been the only means by which students could complete their educations at Western Michigan University.

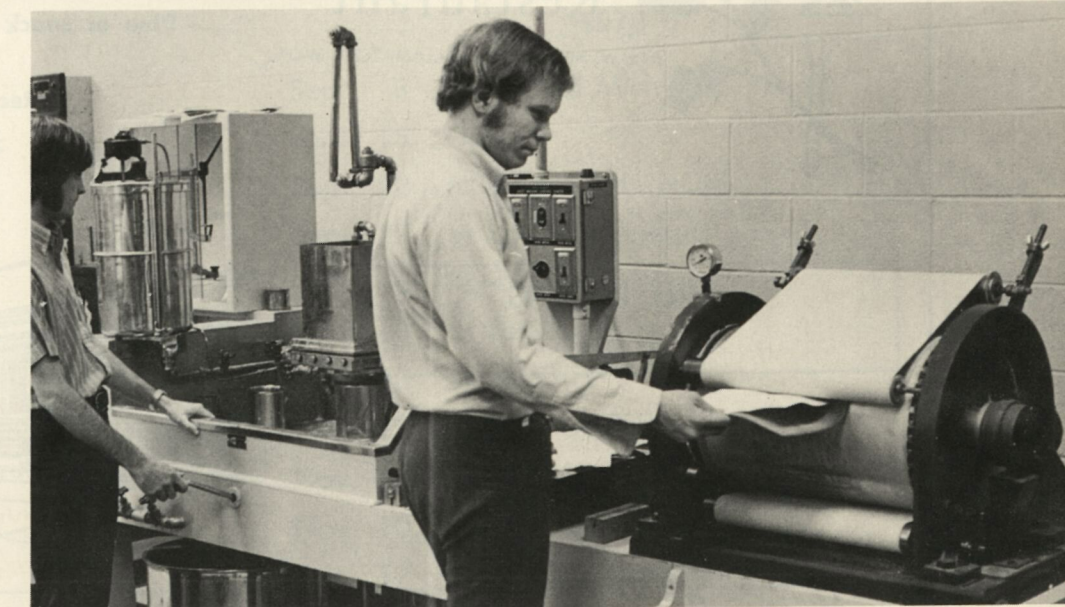
Total membership in the Foundation is almost 300, comprising corporations and companies throughout the nation, alumni and individuals.

The funds for providing scholarship grants, for recruitment of students, and making possible the many services to Western Michigan University and the paper industry are derived essentially from that industry. In addition to the contributions and

grants from corporations in the paper industry, many gifts and contributions are received from foundations, individuals and memorial funds.

The Foundation is administered by a President, an Executive Committee, a group of Officers, a Board of Trustees, an Executive Secretary and eleven Committees.

While most of the Officers and Committee Members are from and staff of the University are industry, a number of faculty chairmen and committee members.







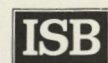
