Schoenberg chosen as new dean of admissions

Edward L. Schoenberg, dean of admissions at Gonzaga University in Spokane, Wash., has been named dean of admissions at UOP.

"Ed Schoenberg brings extensive experience to this position and has developed programs at other institutions which will be helpful in informing students of the opportunities available at the University of the Pacific," said President Bill Atchley.

Schoenberg replaces Patricia Peters-Spead, who served as dean of admissions at UOP for three years before resigning last fall to return to the East Coast. Associate Dean Janet Dial has been serving as interim dean.

GRADS CHALLENGED TO LEAD AT '92 COMMENCEMENT

During Commencement Weekend in May, Senior Fellow at the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching in Princeton, N. J., Warren Bryan Martin challenged some 800 graduates to be leaders: "We must have leaders who will grapple with the moral dilemmas that are at the center of our raging culture clashes, proceeding with confidence that growth and good can come through the tension of differences. . . . You have the resources

sufficient for the job," Martin said, adding his "daring claim—[that] California's oldest university will be the West's new leader."

Martin's keynote address at the All-University Convocation began the weekend's festivities on Friday, May 22. Martin, who was presented an honorary Doctor of Laws degree, was instrumental in the development of Raymond College at UOP in the 1960s, helping the University become known as an institution dedicated to innovation in teaching.

Two faculty members received the Distinguished Faculty Award during Convocation: J. Curtis Kramer, professor of geology and geography and chairman of the Academic Council; and J. Ronald Pecchenino, art professor and former chairman of the art department.

Also at Convocation, Audree S. O'Connell, assistant professor of music therapy, won the United Methodist Scholar/Teacher Award, presented to a "highly capable and effective teacher, scholarly researcher and active University and community citizen" by the United Methodist Board of Higher Education and Ministry.

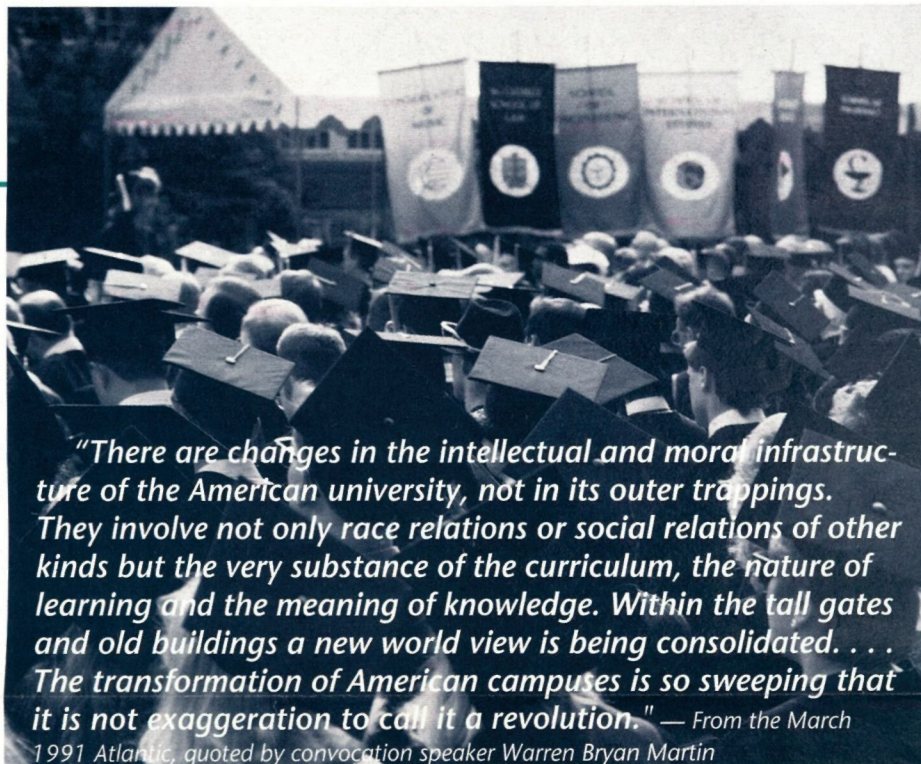
Recognized at Convocation were five winners of the Eberhardt Teacher/Scholar Awards, given annually to those individuals who have exhibited innovation and initiative as teachers and scholars: David K. Banner, professor of organization and management; Robert Cox, professor of English; Lois N. Harrison, music education chairman; Paul Karpuk, assistant professor of modern language and literature; and Michael J. Minch, chairman of the chemistry department. Each is undertaking a special project which will advance teaching and scholarship at the University.

Several students were honored at Convocation. Danielle Rose, a sports medicine major within the College of the Pacific, was the first recipient of the Robert R. Winterberg Outstanding Graduating Senior Award. The award was established in October 1989 in recognition of Dr. Winterberg's nearly 40 years of service to UOP, primarily as the University's chief business and financial officer. The award is given to

Schoenberg has been dean of admissions at Gonzaga University for nearly two years; before that he had been director of student recruitment and associate director of admissions at the University of Nevada-Reno since 1984. He held student recruiting positions at the University of La Verne in Southern

California from 1981 to 1984 and at Holy Names College in Oakland in 1980-81.

He began his career as an admissions officer at Whittier College where he received his bachelor's degree and graduated with high honors in 1974. He earned an M.A. in counseling from the University of Nevada-Reno in 1989.

a student who best exemplifies the following traits: high ethical standards, dedicated service to the University; and unselfish service to the Stockton community through service and church organizations.

The Lawrence A. DeRicco Award is given annually to the graduating senior at UOP who has also graduated from San Joaquin Delta College and has gained the highest academic record on both campuses throughout his or her academic career. The award, presented this year to University College student Lori D. Haas, is named for Lawrence A. DeRicco who is an alumnus of both institutions and who served as superintendent of Delta College for several years.

The Elizabeth "Libby" Matson Award, presented annually to the Outstanding Woman Athlete who has the highest grade-point average among senior women athletes, was awarded to Charlene M. Hommerding, a School of Education student and a member of the women's softball team.

On Saturday, May 23, the College of the Pacific held its graduation ceremonies, followed by the School of International Studies commencement. At the School of Education commencement, Marion Ochsner Pease, who pioneered the elementary teaching program at Pacific, was given an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree. Commencements were also held by the School of Engineering and the Conservatory of Music.

On Sunday, May 24, the School of Business and Public Administration, the School of Pharmacy and University College also held graduation ceremonies.

At Commencement ceremonies for McGeorge School of Law on May 16, legal scholar B.E. Witkin received an honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

On June 15, at Commencement ceremonies for the School of Dentistry, Dr. Judson Klooster, dean of Loma Linda School of Dentistry, received an honorary Doctor of Public Service.

Caplan to head Law School

Gerald M. Caplan has been named Dean of McGeorge School of Law.

Caplan, 54, is a tenured faculty member at George Washington University's Law Center and has held numerous other leadership positions in the federal government, including his current appointment as Deputy Director of the Bureau of Consumer Protection at the Federal Trade Commission. He also served as the Director of the National Institute of Justice and as Acting President of the Legal Services Corporation. Caplan has been a member of several major metropolitan policy-study commissions and a consultant, lecturer and author.

Caplan succeeds Gordon D. Schaber, who stepped down after a 24-year tenure because of health reasons. John E. Ryan has been acting dean at McGeorge during the past year.

Program will benefit middle-income families

Students from middle-income families who otherwise may not be eligible for some financial aid may qualify for a loan-forgiveness program that has been established at UOP through a \$200,000 challenge grant from Sacramento developer and Regent Robert C. Powell.

Under the agreement, up to \$5,000 per year for tuition and fees would be waived for students of middle-income families based on the student's final grade-point average at graduation. For graduates with a 3.0 GPA or higher, 25 percent of the loan would be forgiven; for a 3.5 GPA or above 50 percent would be forgiven and for a 3.8 GPA or above all of the borrowed funds would be forgiven.

Powell's gift establishes a new concept of "merit-based" loans to reward students for their accomplishments while in college.

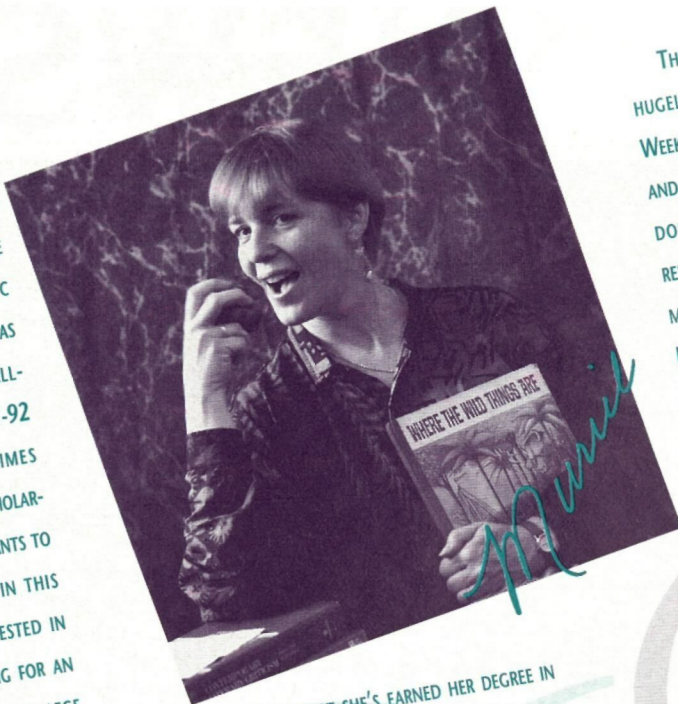
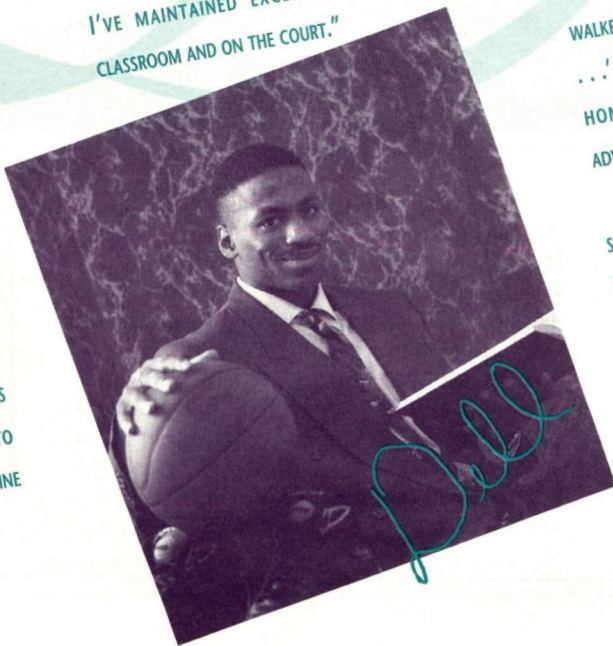

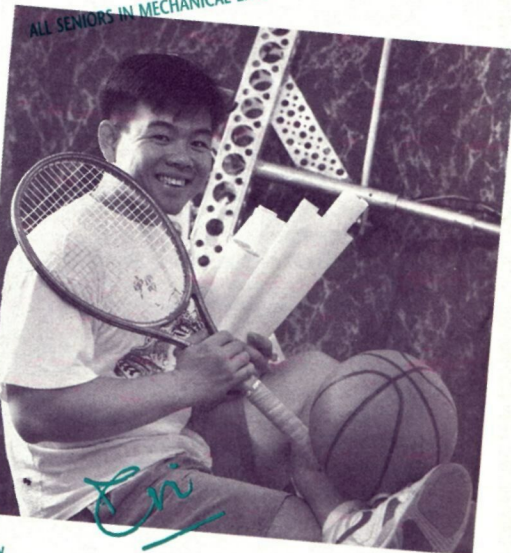

BAVA BROUGHT BEAUTY TO CAMPUS

BENNY BAVA, A GREAT FRIEND OF PACIFIC, DIED OF DIABETES ON MARCH 14, 1992. THOSE WHO ATTENDED PACIFIC IN THE '30s, '40s, '50s AND '60s WILL HAVE MANY FOND RECOLLECTIONS OF BENNY, WHO DEVOTED MOST OF HIS TIME, ENERGY AND THOUGHTS TO THE CAMPUS HE SERVED FROM SEPTEMBER 1931 UNTIL MARCH 1970. UPON BENNY'S RETIREMENT PRESIDENT ROBERT BURNS PRESENTED HIM WITH THE ORDER OF THE PACIFIC.

FROM PACIFIC'S EARLIEST DAYS IN STOCKTON, BENNY'S FATHER, "PAPA" BAVA, HAD CHARGE OF MANICURING THE LAWNS, MOWING ALFALFA FIELDS, CARING FOR THE FOOTBALL FIELDS AND KEEPING THE BUILDINGS CLEAN. IN 1931 HE CALLED UPON BENNY FOR HELP. MANY OF THE STUDENTS MADE UP THE WORK CREWS AND NEEDED GUIDANCE FROM BOTH BAVAS. MANY A YOUNG GRAD FROM PACIFIC BENEFITTED FROM BENNY'S KNOWLEDGE OF GARDENING.

BENNY PROBABLY KNEW MORE STUDENTS ON THE CAMPUS THAN ANY OTHER PERSON DURING HIS YEARS AT PACIFIC. HE WAS INVITED TO SEVERAL CLASS REUNIONS, AND HIS TALKS WERE HIGHLIGHTS OF THE BANQUETS. ONE LITTLE STORY: DURING THE DEPRESSION, WHEN THE STAFF WERE WORKING AT HALF-SALARY, MR. RITTER, THE COMPTROLLER, SAW FIT TO BUY CAMELLIAS FOR BEAUTIFICATION OF THE CAMPUS, WHICH BENNY PLANTED WITH GREAT CARE. IN THOSE LONG AGO DAYS, BENNY HAD TO DIG WAY DOWN IN ORDER TO PUT GRAVEL IN FOR DRAINAGE. SO? FOR ANY STUDENT TO BE CAUGHT PICKING ONE TINY BLOSSOM PRACTICALLY MEANT A MANDATORY APPEARANCE IN FRONT OF THE DEAN! HOWEVER, IF ONE ASKED BENNY NICELY FOR A FLOWER, HE WOULD CUT ONE CAREFULLY—WHERE IT WOULD NOT SPOIL NEXT YEAR'S GROWTH.

THOSE WHO KNEW BENNY WILL ALWAYS REMEMBER THIS FINE PERSON. HE IS SURVIVED BY HIS LOVELY WIFE OF 66 YEARS, ANN, AND HIS SON, ROBERT. BENNY WAS A REAL TIGER!
