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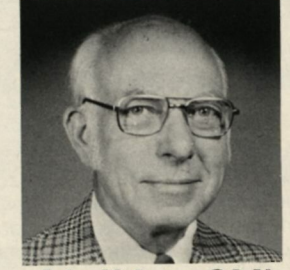
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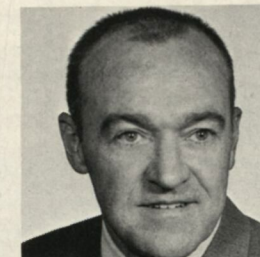
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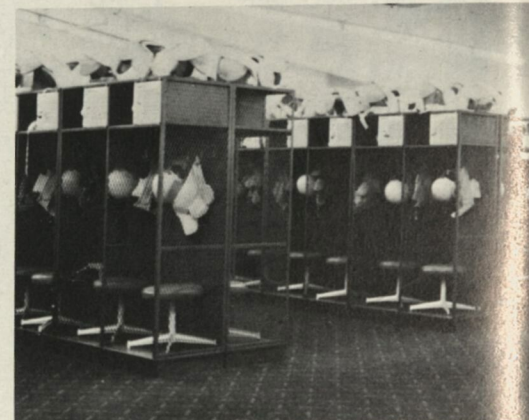
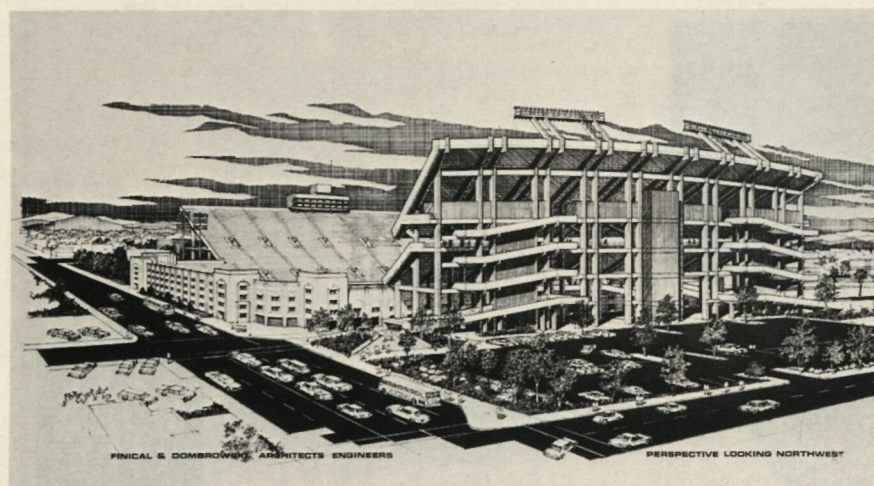
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Arizona's Athletic Complex

Dr. John P. Schaefer President



Dr. John P. Schaefer certainly doesn't fit the stereotype of university presidents. Dr. Schaefer, 41, the University of Arizona's 17th president, is characterized by his youth and involvement with the University, not the least of which is his interest in intercollegiate sports.

Dr. Schaefer often travels with Arizona's athletic teams to out-of-town games. He appointed Dave Strack athletic director in 1972—and it has proved to be a good move, as Wildcat athletic programs have steadily improved and gained national recognition under Strack's leadership.

Dr. Schaefer lettered in track and cross-country and took part in basketball and baseball at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn. He earned a B.S. in chemistry with a minor in mathematics at Brooklyn in 1955 before moving on to Illinois, where he earned his Ph.D. in chemistry in 1958.

He was awarded a National Science Foundation fellowship for post-doctoral study to the California Institute of Technology in 1958-59.

After doing research at CIT, Dr. Schaefer received an assistant professorship to the University of California in Berkeley in 1959-60.

A year later he came to the University of Arizona as an assistant professor in chemistry and in 1968 became head of the chemistry department. He was promoted to dean of the College of Liberal Arts in 1970, a position he held until he was appointed president of the University July 1, 1971.

While head of the chemistry department, Dr. Schaefer traveled to England, Ireland, Venezuela and the West Indies.

Dr. Schaefer's academic interests are primarily in chemistry and the humanities; he is an organic chemistry specialist.

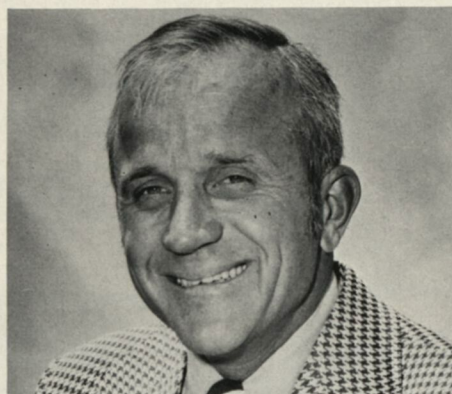
His research extends into the application of x-ray crystallography, techniques in determining the structure of compounds, synthesis of anti-malarial drugs, and explaining molecular rearrangements.

He co-authored a book, *Research Techniques in Organic Chemistry*, published in 1971.

He is a member of such honorary societies as Sigma Xi, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the American Chemistry Association.

Dr. Schaefer is married to the former Helen Schwarz, a native of Highland Park, Ill. She holds degrees in chemistry from Michigan (B.S.) and Illinois (M.S.). They have two children: Ann, 14, and Susan, 11.

Dr. Schaefer is a native of New York City (born September 17, 1934).



Dave Strack Director of Athletics

Arizona's athletic program can compete with any in the country today largely because of the brilliance of athletic director David H. Strack.

Three years ago Strack came to Arizona at a time when both major sports, basketball and football, were notorious losers. Attendance and interest in athletics were sagging but Strack quickly remedied the problem. He hired Fred Snowden as basketball coach and Jim Young as football coach. Since that time Snowden's cagers have twice tied for second in the Western Athletic Conference, finished third once, and appeared on national television in the 1975 National Commissioners Invitational Tournament.

Young has been just as successful. His teams have finished second and tied for first in the WAC in two years, and last season ended a long jinx by

shutting out Arizona State, 10-0. Attendance soared at Wildcat football games, forcing an addition to the stadium which will bring capacity to 58,000 when finished in 1976.

Under Strack's leadership Arizona's athletic facilities have become first class. Besides McKale Center and the football stadium addition, Arizona has a beautiful new 7,000-seat baseball stadium with Class A lighting, a new 50-meter by 25-yard swimming pool with diving tank and new lighted championship quality tennis courts.

Arizona has played host to the 1974 NCAA West Regional basketball tournament, the 1975 WAC swimming and diving championships and will host the 1976 NCAA wrestling championships.

Strack's background in athletics is extensive. He was a star basketball player at Shortridge High School in Indianapolis, Indiana.

After serving in the Marine Corps in World War II, he earned both his Bachelor's (1945) and Master's (1946) degrees in business administration at the University of Michigan.

He was a territory manager for Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. for two years before returning to Michigan for an 11-year stint as assistant basketball coach. In 1959 he became head basketball coach at Idaho and in 1960 returned to Michigan as head coach. His Wolverine teams, featuring such stars as Cazzie Russell, won three straight Big 10 crowns. The 1964-65 team was rated No. 1 in the country all season but lost to UCLA in the NCAA finals in Portland, Oregon. Strack was named UPI basketball coach of the year in 1965.

He was named associate athletic director at Michigan in 1968, holding that position until being named athletic director at Arizona in 1972.

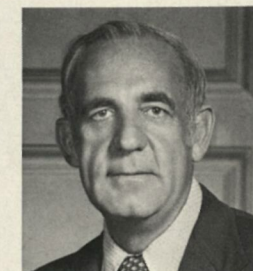
He has published two books, *Fundamentals of Basketball* (1963) and *Basketball* (1967).

Strack is married (wife Ruth Ann) and has five children: Mrs. Sarah E. McElroy of Alexandria, Va.; Mrs. Julie Ann DeWitt of Ann Arbor, Mich.; David S., 23, basketball coach at Cochrise College; Lucy W., 21, of Eloy; and Amy J., 16. (Born March 2, 1923, Indianapolis, Indiana.)

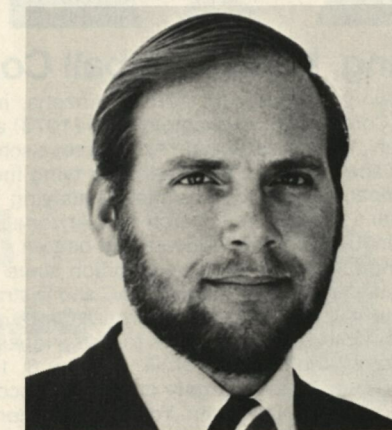

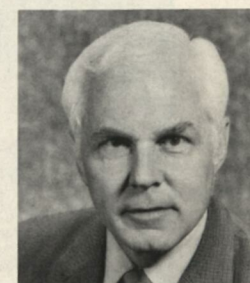

Jim Young, Head Football Coach

Young has a two-year record of 17-5 at Arizona, including a Western Athletic Conference co-championship (1973) and a WAC second place finish (1974). Last season Arizona set a school record for most wins in a season with a 9-2 mark after tying the old mark in 1973's 8-3 campaign. Probably the most satisfying victory for Young was last year's 10-0 shutout of arch-rival Arizona State, making the first time in 10 years the Wildcats had beaten ASU.

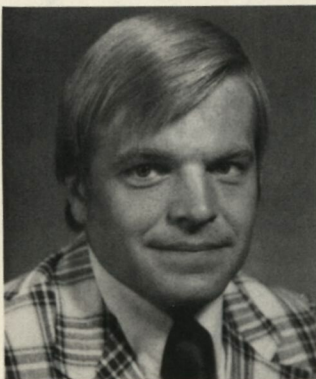
Young has gained much personal recognition since coming to Arizona. In his rookie year he was named WAC and District 7 coach of the year after turning Arizona's losing program around. In June of this year he was named assistant coach for the 51st annual East-West Shrine game at Stanford, California, January 3, 1976.

Young got the job at Arizona largely due to his success under his longtime friend Bo Schembechler. Young was Schembechler's chief assistant and defensive coordinator at the University of Michigan for four years, and was one of his top aides at Miami (Ohio) University for five years before that. At Miami, the Schembechler-Young teams piled up a 35-14-1 mark, and at Michigan they posted a 38-5 mark. In addition, Young's defensive units were second overall nationally at Michigan in 1971, and first in the nation against the score (5.2 ppg), fifth nationally in pass defense, and second nationally overall in 1972.

When Schembechler was hospitalized with a mild heart attack in Pasadena, California, Young assumed head coaching responsibilities for the Wolverines in the 1970 Rose Bowl game.

Young was a success even in his early days of coaching. He guided the Findlay (Ohio) College wrestling team to an 11-0 season in 1958-59 and the 1959 track team to the Mid-Ohio League championship with an 8-2 mark. He also served as line coach for the football team.

Young put himself on the map at Lima (Ohio) Shawnee High School where his team posted a 28-10-2 mark and won two Western Buckeye League championships in four years. At one point Young's Shawnee teams won 23 straight games. The 1963 team scored a total of 448 points in 10 games.

Wildcat Band

Twenty-four additional members have swelled Arizona's Symphonic Marching Band to 210 members, making this year's organization the largest in the school's history. Eighteen alternates also are included in the figure.

Band director Jack Lee points out that one-third of last year's 186 members had to be replaced because they graduated or their classes conflicted with band practice.

"We have accepted more members because more good player tried out for the band this year than last year," Lee explains. "More members give the band better sounds and drills. More than 250 persons tried out for the band as compared to 200 last year. The increased interest may be a result of the football team's improved record."

Pre-Game Band Show

Entering from the north end zone, the band plays a spirited fanfare thus officially opening the 1975 football season. The band is directed by Jack Lee, who has been its mentor for 24 years. Gary Cook, a graduate of the University of Michigan and for the past three years percussion instructor at Louisiana Tech, is the new Assistant Band Director.

Playing "Bear Down Arizona" the band does a series of precision drill movements ending in a gigantic and reversible "UA" formation. Our colors are presented as the band strikes up the familiar tune "America" and this is followed by "The Star Spangled Banner."

In today's pre-game show, the University is pleased to recognize the 1975 United Way Campaign. Don Diamond, the campaign chairman, will kick off the drive symbolically with a football. Holding the ball will be Al Mueller, vice-chairman of the annual affair.

The Band is proud to have the opportunity to premier a new song by Steve Cook, written for this year's Tucson campaign and appropriately titled, "United Way."

Next Home Game

The Wildcats will be home again on October 4 to meet the Wildcats of Northwestern coached by John Pont. Arizona and Northwestern have never met in football. Pont's team whipped Purdue in a Big Ten clash last Saturday and the Purple Cats were favored to beat Northern Illinois today. On September 27 Northwestern plays at Notre Dame while Arizona is at Wyoming. Pont is familiar to Arizona fans as his Indiana teams beat the Wildcats (42-7) here in 1967 and nipped UA (16-13) at Bloomington in 1968.

Tonight's Game

Tonight Arizona opens its 72nd year of football. In the past 71 seasons, Arizona teams had 337 wins, 225 losses and 25 ties.

1975 looms as a year of great expectations for the Wildcats. Pre-season prognosticators have picked Arizona as a consensus top-20 team with the highest rank being 9th by *Sports Illustrated*.

Here's the way some of the rest of the pre-season national polls had Arizona listed: 13th, Street & Smith's Football Forecast; 16th, Football Roundup; 16th, Associated Press; 17th, GamePlan; 17th, Football News; and 18th, Playboy.

Regionally, the Western Athletic Conference Skywriters (29 writers and broadcasters) voted the Wildcats as the favorite in the WAC.

So the chips are down. The season is about to begin and Arizona Football is seeking its place in the sun.

The big reason for the pre-season optimism is the returning starters from last year's "winningest team in Arizona football history."

Heading the returnees is the passing combination of quarterback Bruce Hill to flanker "T" Bell and split end Scott Piper. Hill has been described by Head Coach Jim Young as "the best balanced quarterback in the United States." And Bell and Piper are the best returning pass

receiving tandem in the nation, according to last year's statistics.

For Coach Young, 1975 marks the "third year of the Young Generation" at Arizona. In his first year (1973) he led the team to an 8-3 record and a co-championship in the WAC. With last year's "winningest" record season of 9-2, his two-year mark is 17-5, a mark topped by only nine other collegiate teams.

Regarding the Pacific game, the Tigers have already played two games this season — a 3-3 with Northeast Louisiana and a 31-13 win over University of California at Davis.

Tonight will be the fourth meeting between the Wildcats and the Tigers with Arizona winning all three previous games. The first two games of the series were played at Stockton (1934, 31-7 and 1939, 12-7). In the lone Tucson appearance (1946), Arizona won 47-13.

Half-Time Show

Tonight's half-time show offers a variety of special features. Following the band's traditional "Bear Down" entrance and drill, the mood changes from school spirit to modern jazz. The Pom Pon team, coached by Betty Palmer and led by Sue Pettit, perform a fast rock dance entitled "Sagittarius" by Bill Svarda. Next the drum section takes the spotlight to honor the late great jazz drummer Gene Krupa. Featured is "Drum Boogie," a tune that Krupa made famous. The Twirling Circus coached by Shirlee Bertolini steps to the front for one of their unique routines. A

new number — "Dynamite Strut" — shows the girls' twirling technique quite well. Everyone gets into the act as the band plays "Don't Rain on My Parade." Watch closely as the poms dance, the majorettes twirl, and the band opens up two of the largest umbrellas you have ever seen. As a climax, the band plays Doug Holsclaw's "Fight Wildcats Fight" and forms an "ARIZONA" formation extending the length of the field. "That's Entertainment" appropriately exits the band in long company front lines.

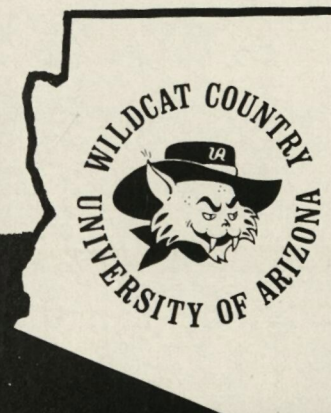
1915 IT WAS A VERY GOOD YEAR

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Scouting Report

Wildcats

Arizona's defense is becoming tougher each year. In last year's final game, the Cats blanked ASU, 10-0. Four of the 1974 starters in the front five are back along with both linebackers and two of four secondary men. UA uses a 5-2 front which is exceptionally strong against running games and doesn't give up many long gainers. The Cats' front five averages 230 pounds per man.

Players to watch:

Mike Dawson. Entering his senior season. Being boomed for all-America and could become UA's greatest tackle. Punishing, strong and agile for a 260-pounder. Has lettered since a freshman. Tackled enemy ball carriers for losses 11 times in 1974. Pros regard him as a *great prospect!* All-WAC in '74.

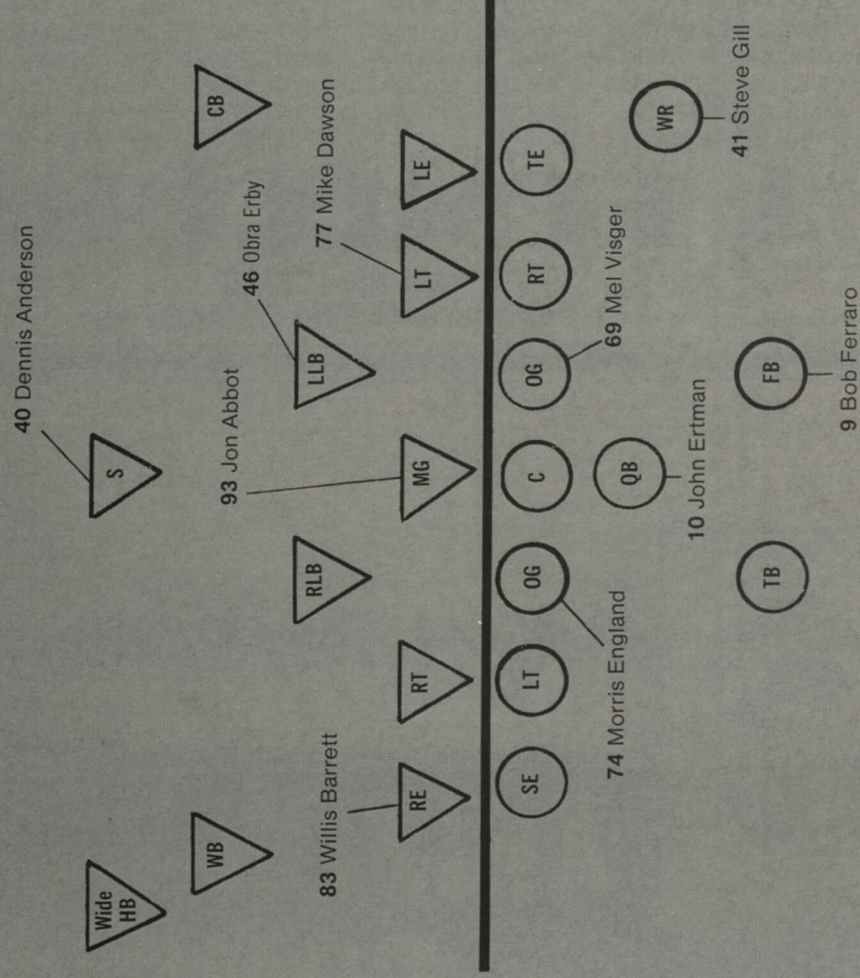
Willis Barrett. Defensive end who is extremely mobile and this makes up for a lack in weight. Fourth on team in defensive points in 1974. Started last year and converted to line after playing fullback on freshman team.

Dennis Anderson. Led team in interceptions last year with seven from his safety position. Was first team all-WAC in '74. Also handles punting this year. Saved a victory over New Mexico last year with last-second interception deep in UA territory. Outstanding season is predicted for him this year.

Jon Abbott. Only a sophomore — but what a sophomore! Played a lot in '74 as a defensive tackle but now has been moved to middle guard. Steps into shoes vacated by Glenn Gresham. At 238 lbs. has good size, extremely intelligent in classroom and carries this over to football field. A great year is ahead for him.

Obra Erby. Powerful linebacker who has great range. Moved into starting role last year when John Arce was injured and performed spectacularly. Second on the team in defensive points. Had 97 unsisted tackles in 11 games, almost nine a game. Few times is Erby moved out of position because of his strength.

With Bruce Hill at quarterback and excellent receivers "T" Bell and Scott Piper, the Cats are expected to score plenty.

Players to watch:

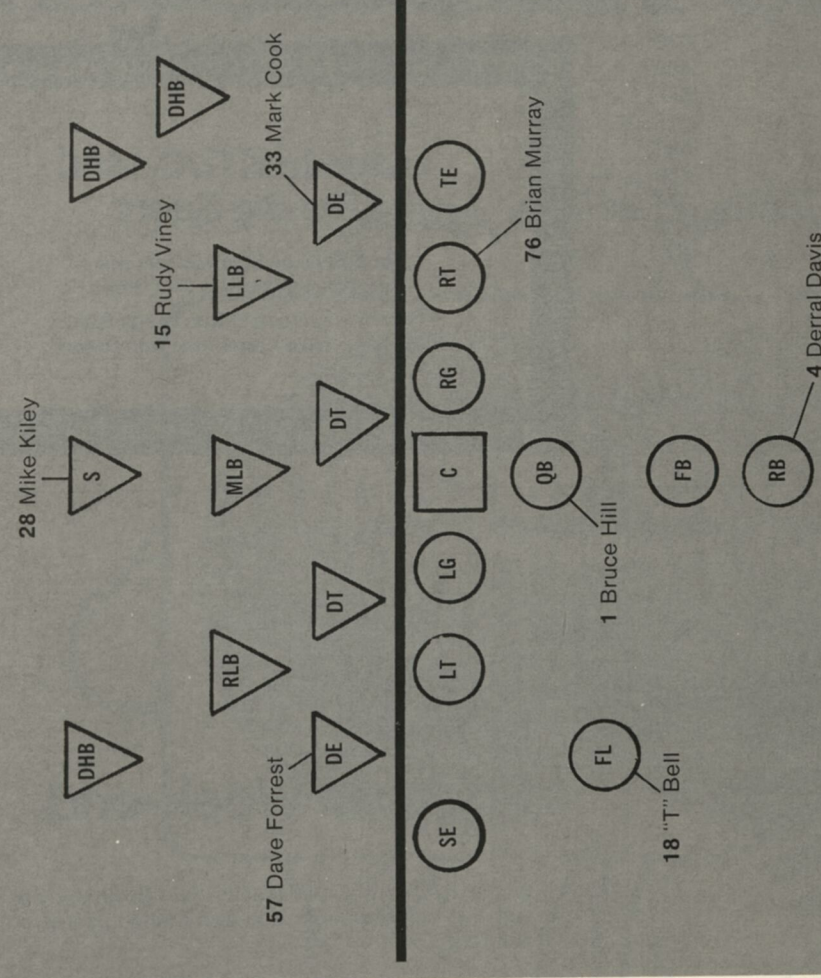
Bruce Hill. Coach Young feels that there isn't a better all-around quarterback in college football. He does it all. Strong runner, sound passer and with two years' experience, he should have a bountiful senior year. With Hill at QB, Arizona has won 16 of its last 22 games. He missed one game because of injuries. Very tough.

"T" Bell. Also lettering for fourth year. Setting record after record as a pass catcher. All-WAC last year. He also returns punts. Bell catches them from all angles. Averages nearly four catches a game and has caught 22 touchdown passes over the past three seasons.

Brian Murray. Really anchors offensive line from his right tackle spot. A 253-pounder who is earning his third letter. All-WAC last year. Cats like to go Murray's way when they need crucial yardage. Led team in big plays in '74.

Derral Davis. Returning to running back where he played in 1973. Was a split receiver last year but saw little playing time because of injuries. Can be sensational. Since high school days, has averaged over seven yards a carry every time he gets his hands on the ball. One of fastest men on team. A big year expected from this former Tucson High star who is in his final season.

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Tigers

Pacific operates from the Veer Option, same attack Arizona used in 1974. UOP's offense faces a major rebuilding job this year, created by the loss of tailback Willard Harrell. Two all-American candidates, offensive guards Morrison England, 265 pounds, and Mel Visger, 240 pounds, lead the way. John Ertman, senior quarterback, could be the best UOP has had since switching to the veer.

Players to watch:

John Ertman. Passed for two touchdowns in UOP's 31-13 victory over UC-Davis last week. A senior, who was backup man last year but still completed 58 percent of his passes. Good at running option with his 4.6 speed. Transferred to UOP from Ventura JC. Passed for 107 yards last week.

Bob Ferraro. Senior fullback who blasted for 108 yards on 14 carries last week. Versatile player, fine blocker and is a skilled receiver. Extremely tough on third down plays. Better runner inside. Scored five touchdowns last year. Light as fullbacks to at 190 pounds but really tough.

Steve Gill. Exceptionally skilled in getting open on deep patterns. From his wide receiver spot he averaged 25.4 yards per catch in '74. Scored against two WAC foes last year with a 76-yard play against Wyoming and 40 yards versus UTEP. Started out in secondary as a freshman.

Morris England. An explosive one-to-one blocker who was all-PCAA first team in 1974. At 265 pounds, still has 4.9 speed. Can also be used on defense as he helped save win over San Jose last year by playing defensive tackle in final quarter.

Mel Visger. Other half of UOP's terrific offensive guard tandem. A 240-pounder who made all-PCAA honors last year. He is bouncing back from knee surgery in late spring. Excellent strength and quickness. A wrestling star in junior college at Delta College where he also was all-conference in football.

Tigers

Switching back to 4-3 setup after using Oklahoma-style 5-2 for a season-and-a-half. In this alignment, the tackles and guards roughly correspond to pro-style ends and tackles. The ends are more like outside linebackers and three-deep secondary uses mostly zone coverage.

Players to watch:

Dave Forrest. A great pursuit man. Was UOP's steadiest defensive player in '74 until knee injury sidelined him after the seventh game. The end tackled opposing ball-carriers for losses seven times last year. Senior player who looked strong in spring drills after his knee surgery.

Rudy Viney. A 212-pound linebacker who many feel could develop into UOP's greatest LB. Started first half of 1974 but missed last half because of disciplinary reasons. Attended ASU as a freshman in 1971. Made 50 tackles and nine tackles for losses in first five games in '74. Great speed and strength.

Mark Cook. Teaming with Forrest to give UOP some of finest defensive end play ever. Started every game in '74. Was a standout in spring ball this year. Light at 183 pounds but a persistent player who makes many big plays.

Mike Kiley. Full-time starter in '74 who is a great hitter. Led secondary in tackles. Came to UOP from Long Beach CC. A 180-pound senior. Stole a pass in end zone and recovered a fumble against Kansas State last year.

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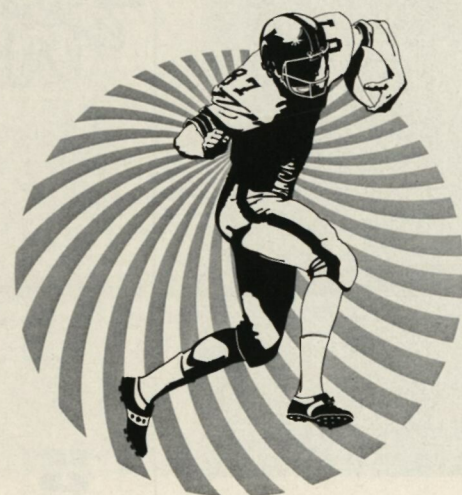

About the University

The University of the Pacific, as California's pioneer institution of higher learning, has been in the forefront of academic innovation since its beginning in 1851.

As a relatively small, privately-funded institution, Pacific has developed an academic program geared to the constantly changing needs of a 5,000-member student body.

The College of the Pacific is the main liberal arts college of UOP which includes three "cluster" colleges—Raymond College, which features a three-year degree program and no "required" classes; Elbert Covell College, for Spanish-speaking students interested in inter-American studies; and Callison College, featuring Asian studies and overseas programs in Japan and India.

WELL-ROUNDED INSTITUTION

The McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento; the School of Dentistry and Graduate School of Medicine in San Francisco and the Stockton-based Conservatory of Music, Graduate School and schools of pharmacy, engineering and education make Pacific a well-rounded institution.

In all branches of the University there are opportunities for interdisciplinary study, independent work and individual research.

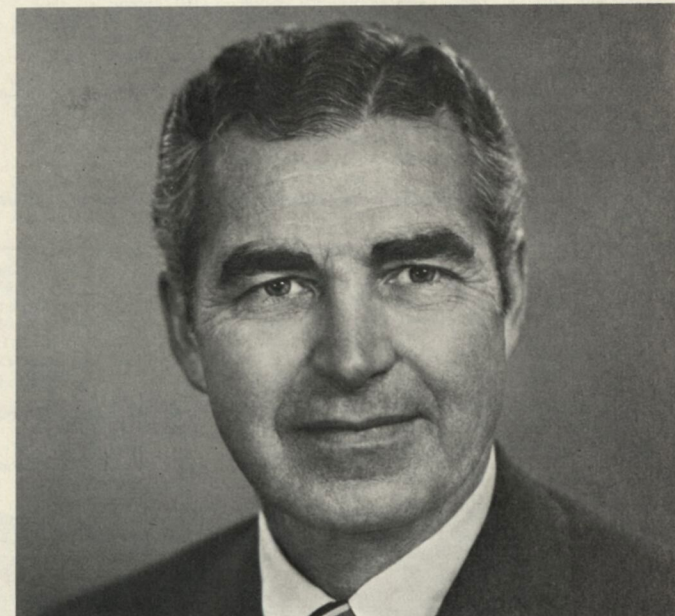
Students on the campus are represented on nearly all the policy-making committees. The faculty members, although engaged in some research, are primarily teachers.

STUDENT INVOLVEMENT

In the area of community involvement, there are many programs that reach both the cluster colleges and professional schools. Students work in migrant worker camps, detention facilities, mental hospitals and public schools. Many of these projects carry course credit.

New facilities on the Pacific campus include the \$3 million University Center, the \$1 million Covell Student Health Center and \$4.4 million School of Pharmacy. The \$120,000 Donald B. Wood Bridge spans the Calaveras River to link the other two new developments with the main campus.

UOP is located in Stockton (pop. 117,000), 70 miles east of San Francisco and the Bay Area and 45 miles south of Sacramento.

Caddas — Transforming the Tigers!

In the short span of three years, Chester Caddas has completely transformed UOP's football fortunes.

Inheriting a run-down program in 1972, he quickly notched an 8-3 record to earn Northern California Coach-of-the-Year honors. In 1973 he guided UOP to a 7-2-1 record and added a 6-5 mark last year to give UOP three consecutive winning seasons for the first time since the late '50s.

In all, the 40-year-old graduate of Murray State (Ky.) has registered a 21-10-1 record for a winning percentage of .677 that has been surpassed by only one other coach in school history (Larry Siemerling, 35-5-3, .875).

Since Caddas' take-over of the head coaching reins, UOP has ranked in the nation's Top 15 in rushing offense and rushing defense twice. The Tigers ranked fifth in rushing defense in 1972 and ended up ninth in 1973. The 1973 squad also finished seventh in scoring defense. UOP was the nation's No. 12 team in rushing offense during 1972 and wound up ranked 13th in that category in 1973.

While serving as a defensive assistant for four years at UOP, Caddas had developed his own concepts of what it would take to win at UOP. When he took over the head-coaching chores in the winter of 1972, he promptly put those concepts into effect.

"The most important thing we've tried to do," explains Caddas, "is build a winning attitude here. A losing attitude can be just like cancer. We experienced some success and gained some valuable pride during the 1972 season and that has carried over into our other teams. Since we have begun to win our feelings of pride and confidence have become stronger. We've tasted success and we've enjoyed it."

"But," Caddas adds with typical sensitivity and caution, "we're constantly telling the team that winning is a precious, but fragile, thing. It's precious because you work so hard to achieve it. And, it's fragile because it can slip from your grasp and be gone in an instant."

"We demand a lot from our players," says Caddas. "And that's not going to change now. Winning is tough, but staying a winner can be even tougher."

Caddas has developed solid rapport with his players and coaches. Frankness and honesty have been the tools he's used.

"I try to treat the players as men," Caddas says. "We present them with a challenge and then try to help them rise to meet it."

Young people today are just as capable as any generation has been. They are more informed and aware than any group their age has ever been.

"Trying to fool today's young people would be a tremendous mistake," Caddas continues. "I try to be honest—bluntly honest—that we always know just where we stand with one another."

The UOP challenge is the biggest one Caddas has faced. But, he's no stranger to head coaching. He started his career as an assistant football and basketball coach at Harrisburg (Ill.) High School in 1957. After two years there, he moved on to Waggener High School in Louisville, Ky., as an assistant football coach.

In 1961, he got his first head coaching assignment. It was a dual role and Caddas responded to that challenge by compiling a 16-10-1 record in football and a 68-24 record in basketball during his three years at Fulton (Ky.) High.

From there, Caddas moved on to Danville (Ky.) High in 1964, notching a 15-14 record as head football coach during his three-year stint.

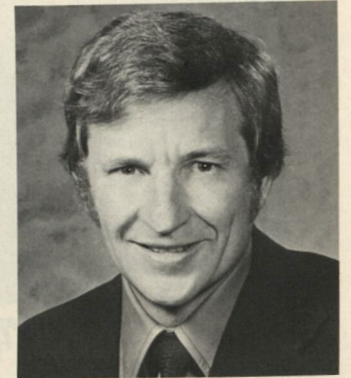
He made the jump to collegiate coaching as freshman and "B" team tutor at Vanderbilt for two years. From there, he moved on to Pacific, beginning his career on the staff of Doug Scovil (now a San Francisco 49er assistant).

Caddas, who earned his Bachelor's Degree from Murray State in 1957 and received his Masters from Illinois in 1960, was named Western Kentucky Coach-of-the-Year at Fulton in 1963 and served as Vice-President of the Kentucky Football Coaches Association.

The 40-year-old native of Memphis, Tenn., is married (wife Bette) and has three children (Lynn, 18; Chris, 15; and Rachel, 12).

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DO-IT-YOURSELF STATISTICS

Every football fan knows that the score doesn't always give a good picture of a game. A few statistics, like those that can be kept on this page, can make the picture clearer, show what the individual stars contribute and help to win post-game "debates." Besides, it can be fun to second-guess the official scorers whose statistics will appear in tomorrow's papers. But before you start, here are some pointers on being a statistician

1. Keep cumulative totals to be informed "up to the minute" and to simplify your figuring of team totals. Example: Jones gains 3, 6, 9, 2 yards and you write 3 9 18 20 on his line.

2. Be satisfied if you come within 10-15 yards of the official team totals. Individual judgments as to the line of scrimmage can make quite a difference in the totals.

3. Remember that it takes 10 yards to make a first down — that last inch can be as important as a yard and must be scored as one. Wait until the official places the ball and then go by the official down-yard marker on the sidelines.

4. Be sure to credit first downs on scoring plays originating from lines of scrimmage beyond the 10-yard line.

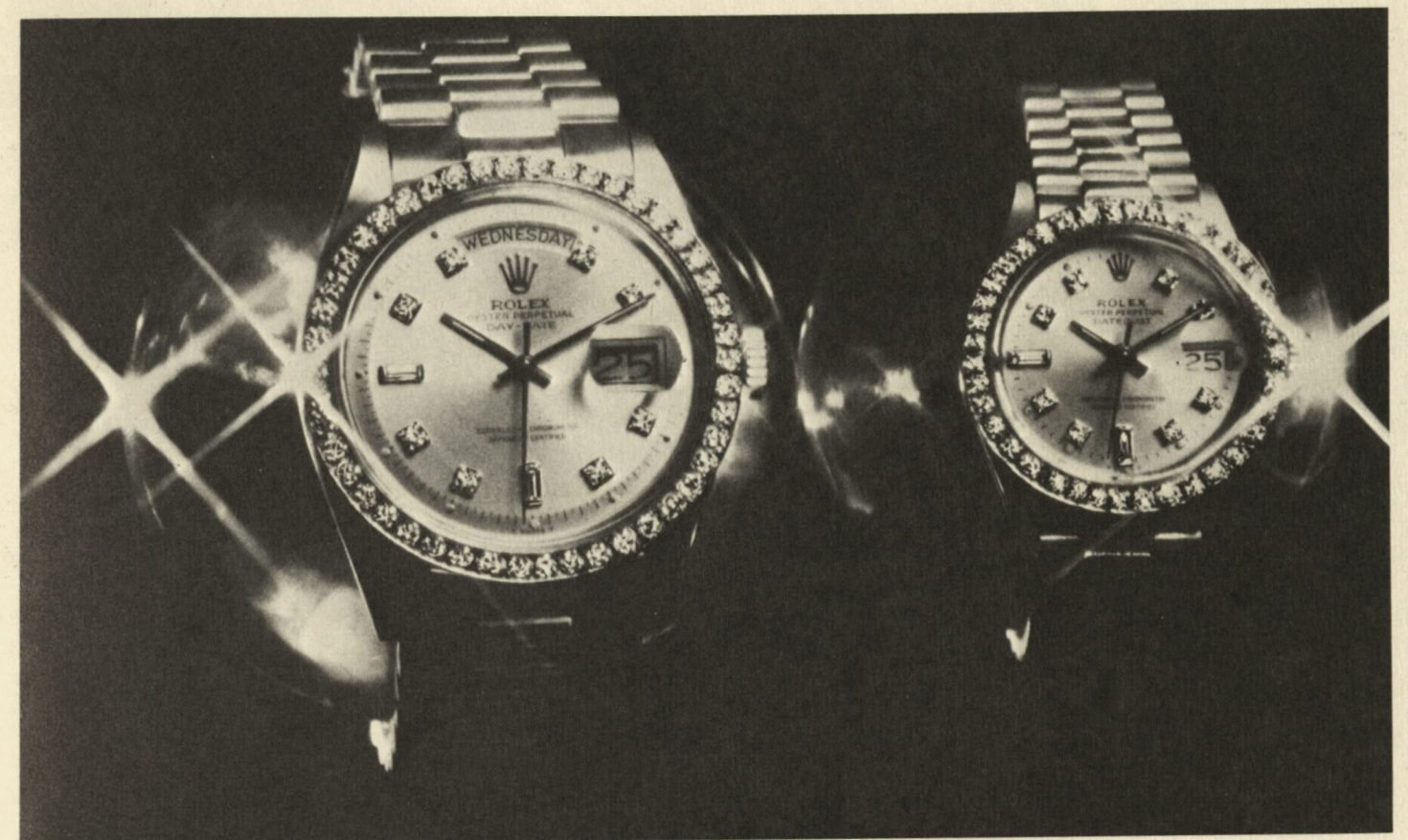
5. On plays involving penalties measured from the point of the foul, credit the rusher or pass receiver with yardage only to the point of the infraction.

6. Charge gains and losses on fumbles to the player who, in your judgment, contributed most to the error.

7. Don't score two-point conversion attempts after touchdowns as rushing or passing plays.
