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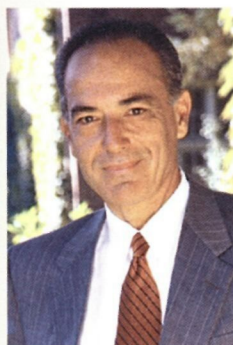


# PRESERVING TRADITIONS

#### A FOND FAREWELL

Before he died September 28, 2002, Earl McDonald '29 wrote a letter to the University, which his wife later sent to us. Following is an excerpt of McDonald's

*moving farewell.*  
To my beloved Alma Mater:  
To leave you without writing to say how I treasure the University of the Pacific would be sad. Pacific gave me my education, and a degree in Mechanical Engineering in 1929. I entered College of the Pacific as part of the first class to begin in the new Stockton Campus after the college moved from San Jose in 1924. At the time, Pacific was under the guidance of the matchless president Dr. Tully Knoles.

Dr. Knoles gave me my first college degree, he officiated at my wedding to Dora Mitchell McDonald '31, he baptized our two sons in Morris Chapel, and he officially installed me as President of the Stockton Rotary Club. I owe Dr. Knoles!  
While I was at Pacific, I received the finest education that a man could have.

Although I was in the School of Engineering, I was also permitted to take classes in the liberal arts. I performed leading roles in several theatre productions and became Debate Manager of the debate team.

When Dr. Ravi Jain became Dean of Pacific's School of Engineering, he came to our home in Stockton. Over tea and scones, Dr. Jain asked me how I thought engineering should be taught in the 21st century. I told him: be demanding, and make them rise to the finest level of performance in engineering. But also encourage them to take as many courses outside of engineering as they can, so that each becomes the finest person he can be, because he has developed in himself an awareness of the liberal arts.

As long as you do this, the University of the Pacific will continue to develop successful men and women, because it allows the development of the total person – professionally, mentally, and spiritually.

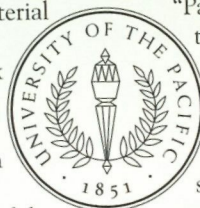

## University Adopts New Visual Identity

University of the Pacific has adopted a new visual identity to be used on all printed material that is produced by the University. This new look is the result of a comprehensive research study in which more than 1,000 Pacific alumni participated. The results of the study were then analyzed and interpreted by our San Francisco-based graphic design partner, Pentagram Design. Pentagram presented more than 30 designs to a representative committee and the President and his Cabinet. This group selected three final designs, which were then submitted to the University community for comment.

What has resulted from this comprehensive process is a design



that is simple, traditional, and flexible. It emphasizes the word "Pacific," in keeping with the University's goal for greater exposure for the University. It remains true to the University's traditional school colors, but at the same time retains a professional look and feel. It also provides a strong base from which the various units of the University can build.

At the same time, the University has adopted a revised seal. This seal takes its look from an older seal, one that was in use when the University moved from San Jose to Stockton in 1924. It is cleaner and simpler than the seal that was previously in use since the mid-1960s.

### THEME OF CIVIC RESPONSIBILITY IN HIGHER EDUCATION DOMINATES CONVOCATION ADDRESSES

The 2002-03 National Teacher of the Year Chauncey Veatch, '70, (see article, *Pacific Review*, Winter 2003) and Thomas Erlich, a senior scholar at the Carnegie Foundation and

former president of Indiana University, spoke at Pacific's convocation ceremony.

"We were pleased to have two outstanding leaders in the education field join us as we celebrated the accomplishments of this year's graduating class," said Pacific President Donald V. DeRosa. "Chauncey's dedication

to the civic mission of education and Tom's work focusing on the moral and civic development of undergraduates underscore the important roles our graduates will play in their communities."

Veatch earned National Teacher of the Year honors through his work at Coachella High School in Thermal, California. Veatch, who is fluent in Spanish, incorporates students' cultures into classroom lessons to give meaning to their education. He enjoys teaching students who have not had academic success in the past.

A 22-year veteran of the U.S. Army, Veatch graduated from College of the Pacific in 1970. He served as student body president his senior year and was also active in the Stockton community assisting United Farm Workers. In 1975, he graduated with a doctorate in jurisprudence from the University of Notre Dame.

Ehrlich is a Senior Scholar at the Carnegie Foundation, a policy and research center focusing on the support of higher education, where he is involved with the Preparation for the Professions Program and co-directs the Political Engagement Project. He also provided the vision leading to the 1985 creation of Campus Compact, a group of 660 colleges and universities, including Pacific, which promotes the civic mission of higher education.

Ehrlich was also president of Indiana University, provost at the University of Pennsylvania, dean of Stanford Law School, as well as the first director of the International Development Cooperation Agency and the first president of the Legal Services Corporation from 1975 to 1979.

The author or editor of eight books, Ehrlich most recently co-authored *Educating Citizens: Preparing America's Undergraduates for Lives of Moral and Civic Responsibility* (2003), a report on how some American colleges and universities are preparing thoughtful, committed, and socially responsible graduates. He is a graduate of Harvard College and Harvard Law School.

## FEDERAL GRANT AWARDED TO ESTABLISH BUSINESS FORECASTING CENTER AT PACIFIC

With the assistance of Congressman Richard Pombo, Eberhardt School of Business has been awarded a \$400,000 grant from the United States Department of Education to provide start-up funding to establish the Business Forecasting Center. Pombo joined officials from the City of Stockton and Pacific to announce the grant on the Stockton Campus.

The grant funds will be used to recruit a director and support staff who will work with Pacific faculty and students to develop and implement business forecasting models and perform business and economic research and consulting activities to serve the needs of regional businesses and public sector entities.

The Business Forecasting Center will be a collaborative effort involving the cooperation of various regional, public and private agencies engaged in economic development activities, including the City of Stockton and other cities in the San Joaquin County, the San Joaquin council of Governments, the San Joaquin Partnership and Business council, and the Port of Stockton among others.

## "SACRAMENTO EXPERIENCE" INTERNSHIP PROGRAM KICKS OFF

Robert Benedetti, Executive Director of the Jacoby Center, helped design a new internship program called the Sacramento Experience, which began in the spring term for students interested in becoming actively involved in the community.

The Sacramento Experience provides students internship opportunities working in a not-for-profit or government agency in the

state capital from 16 to 24 hours per week. Students interned this spring with organizations or government offices including the League of Women Voters, the Department of Justice, and Senator John Burton. Students were able to gain job skills, observe role models in action, and broaden their view of the political and non-profit world.

"We want to develop citizen leaders by helping students find the balance between pursuing personal goals and serving the common good," said Benedetti. "Students learn better and faculty teach more effectively when they are engaged with current community concerns."

Students attended a weekly California Public Affairs Seminar that focused this past semester on California's budget crisis.

Dr. Benedetti was particularly appreciative of alumni involvement. Jonathan Brown '68, President of the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (AICCU), participated in the seminars, and provided facilities for the Sacramento seminar sessions. Other alumni provided opportunities for internships, spoke at the seminars and interacted with the students individually.

"Students felt so strongly about the experience they had this past semester that they have asked to help recruit students for next year," said Benedetti.

The mission of the Jacoby Center is civic engagement between students, faculty and the communities which surround them. The Center is funded by a growing endowment and program grants.

## BRUBECK FESTIVAL BRIDGES BORDERS OF CONTEMPORARY MUSIC

A truly historic event, Brubeck Festival 2003, held in April, presented the diverse work of legendary pianist, composer, and Pacific alumnus Dave Brubeck, from symphonic and choral pieces to chamber music, small-group, and big-band jazz. With an array of world-class artists in six different Stockton area venues, the five-day Brubeck Festival celebrated crossing musical boundaries, reflecting Brubeck's deeply held values. "I have

been fortunate to receive many honors in my lifetime, but I cannot think of any tribute more close to my heart than this festival," stated Brubeck.

The stellar line-up in addition to Brubeck included his two sons Chris (a trombonist and bassist) and Dan (a drummer), Christian McBride (celebrated bassist and artistic director of the Brubeck Institute) and clarinetist Bill Smith. Featured ensembles included the new Brubeck Octet, the Stockton Symphony, the Turtle Island String Quartet, the Capital Jazz Project, the Stockton Chorale, the Pacific Jazz Ensemble, the SFJAZZ All-Star High School Ensemble, and the Brubeck Institute Jazz Quintet.

The Brubeck Festival represents a watershed cultural event for Stockton and the Central Valley, with the opportunity to attract visitors from throughout the region, state, nation and the world. President DeRosa said, "The Brubeck Festival is the most recent example of the wonderful partnership that Pacific and this community share in presenting the finest in the performing arts. I am particularly proud that in this festival we celebrate the work of two great Pacific graduates, Dave and Iola Brubeck, and showcase

their intellectual and creative accomplishments."

#### **GRAND OPENING OF NEW \$18 MILLION HEALTH SCIENCES LEARNING CENTER AND CLINICS**

More than 600 community leaders and healthcare professionals gathered in June to get a first look at the new Health Sciences Learning Center and Clinics. After the ribbon cutting ceremony, guests were given a tour and demonstrations of the 52,000 square-foot facility. The center was constructed in 15 months, financed largely by private donations. Academic and student life space occupy the first floor, and the second floor houses five clinics that will provide free and reduced cost care to area residents.

Professional program students from the Thomas J. Long School of Pharmacy and Health Sciences and the School of Dentistry will provide services under the supervision of faculty as part of their clinical education. The dental hygiene program is the first in San Joaquin County and one of only two programs in Northern California to offer a Bachelor of Science in the field.

A new program to encourage health professionals to locate in the Central Valley will offer beginning professionals an opportunity to

open private practices housed at the Health Sciences Learning Center and Clinics, greatly reducing start-up costs by utilizing existing clinic equipment and space. Participants in the program stay a minimum of one year, but no more than three, when they must open their own practice in the community.

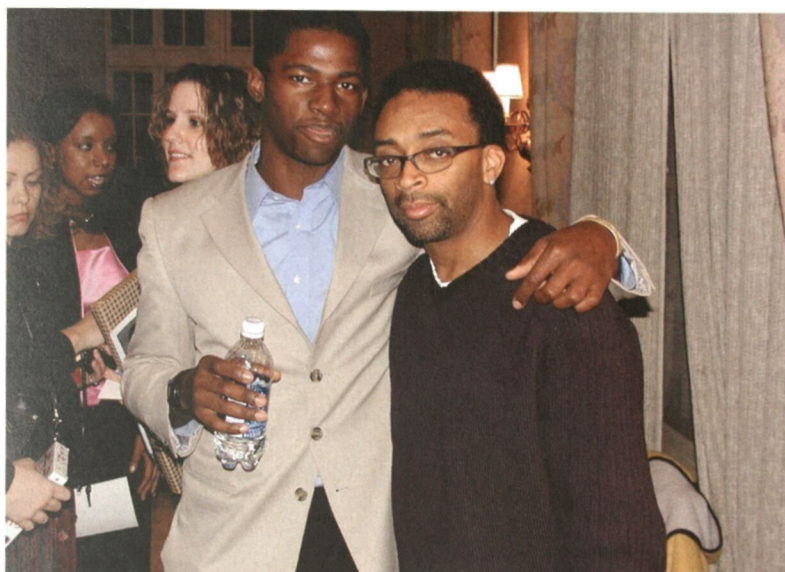
Facilities include a 225-seat auditorium equipped with the latest in presentation technology, and conference rooms with video conferencing capability. The dental labs house 25 workstations for either hygiene or advanced dental patients. Technologically sophisticated observation rooms for pharmacy and speech-language clinics include the ability to record sessions on DVD for educational purposes. Advanced General Dentistry, Speech-Language Pathology and Physical Therapy clinics are open now, and a Dental Hygiene Clinic opens in January 2004, when the program's first class will reach the clinical portion of their training.

"Pacific's supporters have made a strong commitment not only to our students, but to the residents of the Central Valley," said President DeRosa. "We are delighted to collaborate with the Thomas J. Long Foundation and other

supporters to create what is possibly the premier clinical learning environment at any university on the West Coast."

#### **FILMMAKER SPIKE LEE COMES TO TOWN**

Spike Lee, one of the film industry's most respected and charismatic talents presented "America Through My Lens" in February to an enthusiastic audience of Pacific students, faculty and staff, as well as members of the Stockton community that nearly filled Faye Spanos Concert Hall to capacity.

As a producer, director, writer and actor, Lee has established himself as one of Hollywood's most important and influential filmmakers. His stories are original, politically inspired and often highly controversial. Since his film debut in 1986 with "She's Gotta Have It," Lee has directed and produced many critically acclaimed films including: "Jungle Fever," "The Original Kings of Comedy," "Malcom X," "Clockers," "Summer of Sam," and "He Got Game," as well as "Do The Right Thing," for which he received three Golden Globe nominations and an Oscar nomination.

Lee also directed and produced the full-length documentary, "4 Little Girls," for HBO which earned him his second Oscar nomination. His most recent film, "25th Hour,"

starring Edward Norton, has already been mentioned as another possible Oscar nominee.

#### **49ERS END STOCKTON SUMMER CAMP**

The San Francisco 49ers' team officials announced this spring they will move summer training camp from Stockton to their own facilities in Santa Clara. The action is a business decision on the part of the 49ers, allowing them to use their own facilities, establish greater control, limit public access, and create greater revenue potential.

"Each year, the 49ers management team has given the University positive reviews in its post camp evaluations," said Lynn King, Director of Athletics. "The University has made extraordinary efforts to retain the 49er summer camp in Stockton, and is extremely disappointed that the current 49er management has made the decision to move the camp in the middle of the contract's ten-year term."

#### **NARANJADO WINS HIGH HONORS IN NATIONAL COLLEGIATE MEDIA AWARDS**

The *Naranjado*, Pacific's first yearbook in 10 years, won four awards including one first place finish, in the College Media Advisers' (CMA) "Best of Collegiate Design" 2002 Competition. The *Naranjado's* work

was featured with other award winners in a 92-page full-color publication that was distributed to all CMA advisors at colleges and universities across the country.

The annual contest showcases the best design in college media, including newspapers, magazines, yearbooks and websites from throughout the nation. Judges for this year's competition included staff from the *Chicago Tribune*, *National Geographic Magazine*, *Esquire Magazine*, *New Orleans Net LLC* and *Wired Magazine*.

#### **BISHOP SPONG HONORED WITH PACIFIC MEDALLION**

The most published member of the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church in the United States came to Pacific this past February. John Shelby Spong, was presented with the Pacific Medallion by College of the Pacific Dean Gary Miller. The Medallion is the highest honor awarded by the College and honors a person who has had a distinguished career in scholarship and demonstrated great leadership in the causes of tolerance, justice and understanding.

Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark, Spong gave a presentation titled, "My Struggle for a Christianity of Equality, Love and Integrity" in Morris Chapel during the annual Colliver lecture.

He also taught a one-unit class open to Pacific students and the community called, "Christianity in the 21st Century." Spong co-taught another class with visiting lecturer Larry Thiel titled, "The Life and Teachings of Jesus."

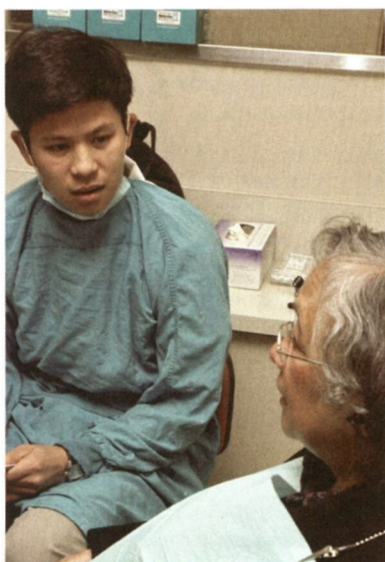

**DENTAL STUDENTS BRING SMILES TO BAY AREA SENIORS**

In celebration of Older Americans Month, volunteers from Student Community Outreach for Public Education (SCOPE) at the School of Dentistry hosted the ninth annual Senior Smiles Health Fair in May at the dental school's main clinic. More than 70 seniors attended the community outreach event that provided free dental and health screenings.

Students and faculty members conducted oral health evaluations, oral cancer exams and denture fit evaluations. Blood pressure screenings, optometry screenings, chiropractic evaluations, nutrition counseling and massage therapy were also available to participants at no charge. This year, through a partnership with California Pacific Medical Center's Community Health Resource Center, SCOPE was able to expand Senior Smiles to include free bone density, glucose, cholesterol, and hearing check screenings.

"The event was a huge success thanks to the dedicated student, faculty, and CPMC," stated Julianne Digiorno '04, SCOPE President. "I hope this program will continue to grow and help more seniors in need of healthcare."

**DENTAL STUDENT HONORED WITH VOLUNTEER SERVICE AWARD**

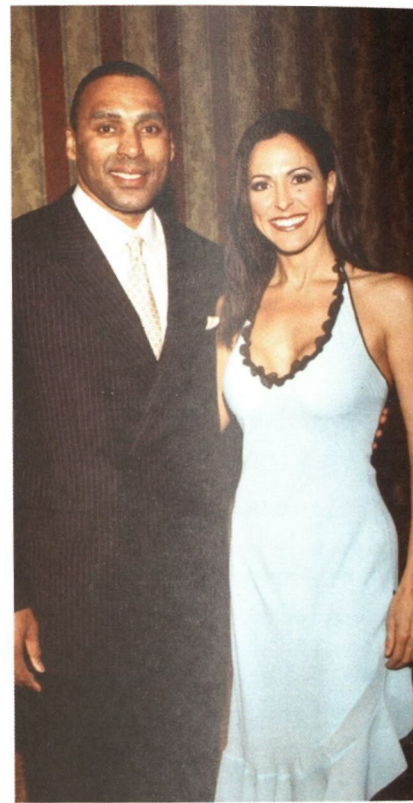

Her legal career began with the City of Stockton where she worked as a deputy city attorney from 1975 to 1976.

"Bioterrorism is what caused us to see the importance of putting this into the law school curriculum right now. It is a real threat and a major legal issue post-9/11," said Jacobs, who sits on a biosecurity advisory board at Johns Hopkins Center for Civilian Bio-Defense.

In March, Jacobs helped to organize a two-day workshop entitled, "Bioterrorism and Beyond: Claiming a Place for Public Health Law in the Law School Curriculum." The school and Sacramento-based Sierra Health Foundation hosted the event, and more than two dozen public health and legal experts, ranging from university and law-school professors to officials from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, attended. ■

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# STEPPING OUT: PACIFIC STUDENTS TAKE ON Real Life

**I**n biology professor Desmond Maxwell's world, dinosaurs still roam the earth.

Although the huge ungainly creatures vanished from the planet thousands of years ago, they live on for Maxwell, who uses what he has learned about the gargantuan beasts to teach University of the Pacific students human anatomy, human histology and neuroscience.

Maxwell, who earned his doctorate degree in Permian reptiles in the United Kingdom, teaches a course on dinosaurs about once every two years. And every summer, he tries to take a group of students to an excavation site in Montana, looking for remnants of the ancient behemoths.

"Frequently when they're uncovering bones, they see one bone connected to another and they get excited. They want to know what's coming next," Maxwell said.

The trip to the dinosaur digs is just one example of how students and professors at Pacific are forging new trails in experiential learning. Simply put, experiential learning is an opportunity to train in the "trenches," whether the actual workplace is a dinosaur excavation site in the Rockies or a seat at the boardroom table.

Universities traditionally have used experiential learning programs to assist students in integrating academic training with the

practical side of the work world, allowing students to gain hands-on experience while working with a faculty member or professional. Pacific has expanded its experiential program, and made it a guaranteed part of the undergraduate experience, and a prominent part of its graduate and professional programs.

### THREE TYPES OF EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Pacific students may choose to participate in any or all of three different types of experiential learning that the University offers:

- Research
- Service Learning or Volunteer Service
- Internships or on-the-job experience, either paid or unpaid

*Research*, such as the work being done by Desmond Maxwell, is done under the auspices of the Office of Undergraduate Research or through the professors themselves. *Service learning*, or student development through active volunteer service, helps students contribute to the community, learn new skills, apply classroom knowledge and realize a commitment to civic responsibility. *Internships* are short-term assignments, that are paid and unpaid, fulltime and part-time, these assignments usually earn students academic credits.

#### JIM MARTIN '04

Jim Martin '04, who is entering his fifth year as an engineering student at Pacific, gained practical experience through the Cooperative Education Program of the School of Engineering and Computer Science, a shining example of the internship opportunities offered

by the University. Under the program, all students are guaranteed 12 months of paid practical experience under the direct supervision of a professional engineer. There are more than 100 local, regional, national and international firms now participating in Pacific's engineering co-op program.

Martin's cooperative education experience was at the General Mills plant in Lodi. His assignment was to improve the spice delivery system of a surprisingly complex breakfast cereal, called Cinnamon Toast Crunch, to insure consistency of flavor.

Cereal, explained Martin, goes through numerous steps from creation to actual packaging. "One of the steps – spice delivery – wasn't working properly. In some boxes, there wouldn't be any spice at all," he explained. "And there would be boxes that were just chock-full of spice."

Martin took on the project, investigated the problem and set out to solve it. As a student, he was in charge of the entire project, overseeing contractors, electricians and programmers, managing it from start to finish.

"It was a \$50,000 project," Martin said. "I had never managed anything that cost that much in my life. For the Lodi plant, though, my project was a pretty small – they have projects with budgets of \$1 to \$2 million."

#### MINDY COSTA '04

Mindy Costa is a speech language pathology student who interned at an early-intervention preschool for children who are at risk for language disorders.

She was one of five Pacific students who worked with about 20 children a week on their language skills through speech therapy.

Costa said she very much enjoyed working with the children and seeing the progress they made. "I started out thinking that there was nothing I could do to help. But I took a baseline reading at the beginning of the work, when the child was at zero percent towards their goal. And then two or three weeks later, they moved up to 40 percent."

Costa said the best part is that the work she did "really did make a difference."

#### CAROL BRODIE, SPONSORED PROGRAMS ADMINISTRATOR

For Carol Brodie, making a difference means helping those students interested in the research component of experiential learning. As sponsored programs administrator for Pacific, Brodie is in charge of administering internal and external grants to undergraduate and graduate students. She receives applications from students, assists the deans with choosing recipients, administers funding for research projects and answers questions.

"I think we're way ahead of the curve in experiential learning," Brodie said. "We do a really good job for our size."

Brodie works with an accountant to distribute money for graduate and undergraduate research, but she says, graduate students usually are working directly with their advisers.

#### GEORGE YAGI '03

History professor Ken Albala helped graduate student George Yagi Jr. pursue experiential learning through historical research as part of an independent study program. A specialist in 18th century history, Yagi researched 18th century British military medicine and wrote a paper on public health and preventive medicine in the British army during the age of enlightenment.

"I was trying to see what medicine was like during the 18th century," Yagi said. "You have an image immediately going through your head of a doctor with a saw and a patient screaming and of course, that wasn't all that happened. It was mainly preventive medicine that they used most of the time."

Yagi, whose ambition is to become a history professor, said he would like to get his paper published in a scholarly journal. His first article was accepted last year and will be in an upcoming issue of *Military History*.

He said professors Gesine Gerhard and Ken Albala have had a "tremendous impact" on his

academic career. "Professor Gerhard taught me how to write," he said. "And Professor Albala gave me training as a professional historian through experiential learning, because I learned how to do research, pose a historical question, look at it from various angles, and try to answer it using only primary documents."

Yagi met with Albala once a week after reading several books on a topic. Then he would present what he learned to Albala in the form of a lecture.

"He gave me feedback," Yagi said. "He wanted to know if I had grasped all the main points, and he wanted me to learn how to lecture as well. It's a good thing, too, because when I go to England this year, that's what I'll be doing."

Yagi will embark upon yet another experiential learning experience this fall when he begins a PhD program at the University of Exeter in England. He'll be a teaching assistant for Professor Jeremy Black, presenting research seminars and historical conferences to students there.

#### JEFF JOLLIFF '04

Jeff Jolliff, a 22-year-old second-year pharmacy student from Bakersfield, is doing his experiential learning a little closer to home. Jolliff became interested in his prospective profession back in high school. Some of his friends had parents who were pharmacists and Jolliff talked to them about their jobs. He liked the idea so much that he got a job at a Wal-Mart pharmacy as soon as he started his undergraduate work at California State University, Bakersfield. As a pharmacy student at Pacific, Jolliff is Pacific's representative to the California Pharmacists Association (CPHA), an organization involved in lobbying for the profession.

"We come up with policies within the organization that mold where the pharmacy profession is



going," Jolliff explained. "For instance, it used to be that pharmacists couldn't give immunizations. Well, our state association said we wanted to do that. So we lobbied a legislator. We passed policies within our organization, and then took our policies to lobby legislators, and now we can give immunizations."

Jolliff said students in Pacific's pharmacy and pre-pharmacy program constitute a 700-member voice in the CPHA. "Pacific actually has a lot to say about what happens in our state organizations, so that's really cool," he noted.

In addition to his activities with the statewide organization, Jolliff is doing an internship at Walgreen's. All students in the pharmacy program are required to develop competency in dispensing prescriptions, blood pressure measurement, immunizations and cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

"As an intern, you can do just about anything," Jolliff said. "You can do everything but pretty much run the pharmacy. If a prescription comes in for a patient, you can type it, and fill it.

#### MARION HAKIAM '04

Counseling patients is one of the main activities that students undertake when they participate in service learning as volunteers in community clinics. Marion Hakiam, a second-year pharmacy student and co-chairperson for the American Diabetes Association at Pacific's pharmacy school, participated in a project called Operation Diabetes. Clinics were set up at pharmacies in Stockton, Manteca and Modesto, where students gave free diabetes screenings to members of the community.

"We can't diagnose as pharmacists, so we just tried to give people an idea," Hakiam said. "A lot of the patients who came in were diabetic, so we would monitor them and ask them what drugs they were taking, how they were doing, and show them how to use a monitor."

The clinics were so successful that the University won the Operation Diabetes national award from the American Pharmacists Association. Students also were involved in a series of immunization clinics in the community. During each clinic, interns were supervised by a volunteer pharmacist. "It's more work than I thought it would be, but it's a lot of fun," Hakiam said. "I just really enjoy working with the patients."

#### PACIFIC'S PERMANENT COMMUNITY CLINICS

The Thomas J. Long School of Pharmacy and Health Sciences has several clinics that provide hands-on opportunities for students, as well as low-cost health care for the local Stockton community, including Speech Language Pathology and Physical Therapy clinics.

Pharmacy students aren't the only ones involved in community clinics. Budding lawyers at McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento can explore a range of clinical opportunities that lead down different career paths. Clinics are offered in administrative adjudication, business and community development, community legal services, immigration, legislative process and parole representation.

"McGeorge's clinics are terrific examples of experiential learning, and of the way the law school is weaving itself into the surrounding community in meaningful ways," said McGeorge director of development John McIntyre.

The Business and Development Clinic, for instance, assists people in the local historically disadvantaged community with developing and building their businesses, including assistance with formation documents, contracts and leases, compliance with laws, and ordinances. Students



assist real clients and the local business community is enhanced, building the local economic infrastructure.

Recent McGeorge Graduate, Ian Rambarran '03 feels his best experience at the law school was time spent at the Business and Development clinic. "The Supervising Attorney did not spoon feed us, but gave us direction on how to get the job done," he said. "I finally saw how it came together and was able to apply what I learned in class to the realities of legal counseling."

#### SERVICE LEARNING STARS

**P**acific students historically have gravitated to service learning, and it has become integrated into student life. Here are some examples:

- The Anderson Y, right on the Stockton campus, was declared by President George Bush as one of his thousands Points of Light.
- Service learning is a component of the freshman mentor seminar series.
- Farley House is dedicated to community service.
- The Community Involvement Program awards scholarships to students who have demonstrated civic responsibility in high school, and mandates a minimum number of hours be devoted to community service while in college to retain the scholarship.
- The Greek system continues to include more volunteer service into their charters.

Vanessa Gomez '03, an education graduate who will pursue her multi-subject credential next year, has been a resident assistant, mentor and tutor, helping her fellow students whenever they need her. She also has been an active Head Start volunteer and participated in a panel discussion that inspired one freshman student to pursue education and come to Pacific.

Mary Gutierrez '03, who earned her degree in international relations, served as cultural and community affairs commissioner for ASUOP. She established a mentor program between student leadership and senior administrators, helping to strengthen the university-student bond. She spearheaded a bone marrow drive and helped raise funds for the Women's Center of San Joaquin by organizing a theatrical production of "The Vagina Monologues" on campus.

Alex Nizet '97, decided to attend McGeorge after pursuing a career as a professional tennis player. As it happened, Nizet had attended as an undergraduate UC Berkeley with basketball star Kevin Johnson. The two later teamed up to help rehabilitate and economically develop Sacramento's Oak Park neighborhood. Nizet is currently the director of business development for Johnson's St. Hope Academy and has recruited several McGeorge graduates to help him in serving the community.

At the School of Dentistry orthodontics professor Marie Tolarova works with cleft palates and is doing research on folic acid. "She's involved with organizations that do research and surgeries on their children and make their faces look more normal," Brodie said.

Jonathan Wong '03, last year's student body president of the Dental School, set out to create an extramural site at the CommuniCare Community Dental Clinics in Davis and Woodland, California, where students could provide much needed dental care to the underserved populations of the Central Valley. Wong spent two years coordinating this program, with the help of Dr. Richard Fredekind, associate dean for clinical services and Dr. Steve Cavagnolo, volunteer director of CommuniCare Clinics.

Wong was able to realize his goal. Fifteen Pacific students and four faculty members selflessly took a week of their summer break last July to go to Davis to provide dental care to a backlog of patients in Yolo County. During the week, the group of volunteers provided exams, cleanings, and restorative work to more than 100 patients.

"We were able to make a significant difference in the pediatric as well as the adult patients we treated," stated Wong. "It was a win-win situation for the patients and for us."

#### EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING: TAKING ON REAL LIFE

**H**elping children and adults toward happier and healthier lives is the goal of many students who participate in service learning projects throughout the community. They are rewarded by both the knowledge they gain and the progress that they see in the people whose lives they touch.

Graduate and undergraduate researchers like Yagi learn that the projects they undertake not only enrich their own academic lives but have the potential for enriching others through the publication of their work or the teaching experiences that will follow.

And many interns have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to take those first steps into the working world. Martin said General Mills had never taken on an undergraduate student when he went to work for them. As a result of his successful internship, Martin was offered a full-time job there. Surprisingly enough, he is passing it up. He hopes someday to be a consultant and eventually to own his own business. But for now, the road he began at Pacific is leading him on to graduate school.

In the words of Carol Brodie, "There are just all kinds of things going on. It's amazing." ■

# INVESTING IN EXCELLENCE

On April 4, 2003, University of the Pacific publicly announced the largest comprehensive campaign in its 152-year history, Investing in Excellence: The Campaign for Pacific. The seven-year, \$200-million campaign seeks funding through endowment for scholarships, faculty positions, and program support, all of which were guided by the recommendations of the National Commission. Through this Campaign, the University's endowment will grow by more than 50%. In addition, the University is seeking funding for enhancing current facilities and for building new ones.

College of the Pacific and all of the Schools of the University are involved, as well as Student Life, the Library, and the Office of Alumni Relations. Regent Patricia Bilbrey Kennedy '66 is serving as the Managing Chairperson of the Campaign, and Mimi Eberhardt is the Honorary Chair.

Before the announcement, the University had raised more than \$100 million toward the \$200 million goal. These "quiet phase" gifts, including commitments from every Regent, are the cornerstone of the campaign.

## STUDENT SCHOLARSHIPS

Since its founding in 1851, Pacific has been dedicated to making education affordable for academically talented students with financial need. The Campaign seeks \$20 million in

## FACULTY

## FACILITIES

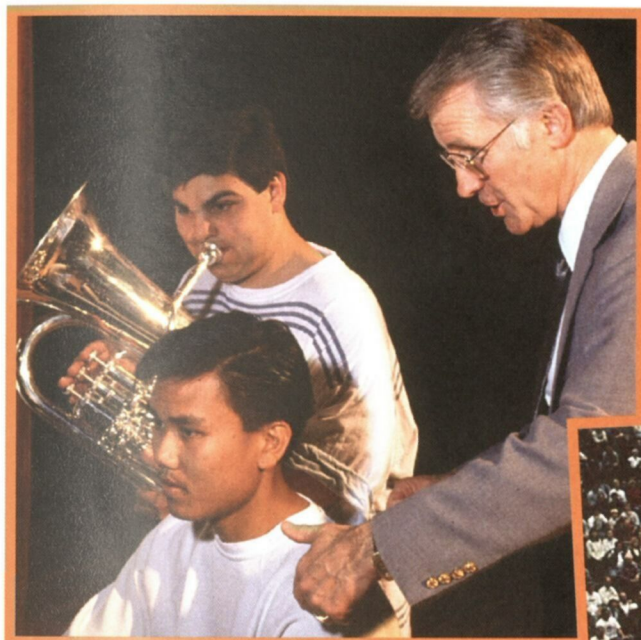

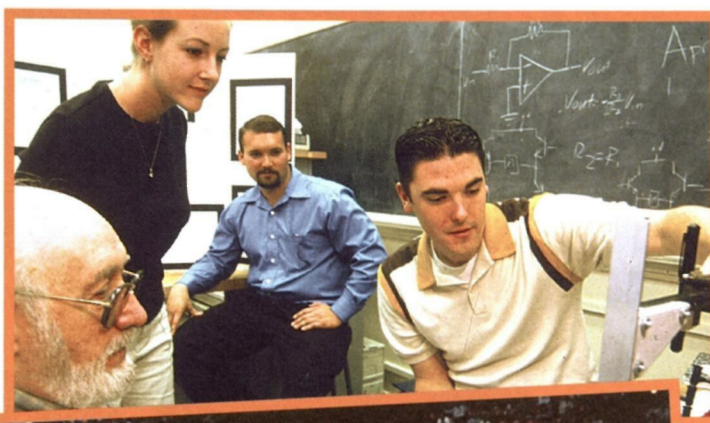

the first phase of a Natural Sciences Complex, a new Alumni Center, an Engineering Technology Center, and a new multi-purpose gymnasium, among others. The single largest Campaign project at \$25 million is a new University Center, which will be built by the Calaveras River on the former site of the Quonset Huts. It will serve as the central meeting place for the entire University community. Just completed as part of this comprehensive campaign are the Pharmacy and

Health Sciences Learning Center and Clinics. Recommendations for current facilities include expansion of Wendell Phillips Center, upgraded dental clinics, substantial renovation to Alex G. Spanos Athletics Center, expanding the aquatics facilities and Kjeldsen Pool, addition of a recording studio to the Conservatory of Music, and numerous classrooms and laboratories in most of the academic buildings on campus.

**T**he success of Investing in Excellence is dependent on the support of all members of the Pacific family through financial contributions and volunteer support. Already almost 200 volunteers, mostly alumni, are lending their time and talent to the Campaign effort. ■

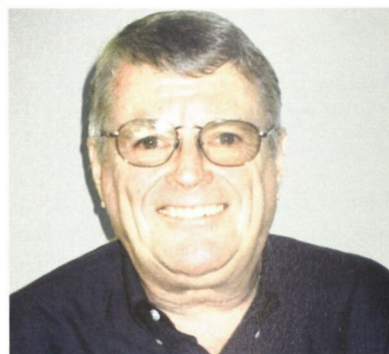
Fordham University. She lives in New York with her husband, advertising executive Ronald H. Cohen, and their child.

In 1996, President Clinton named Dr. Bender the academic director for the DOD High Performance Computing Modernization Program at Wright-Patterson AFB.

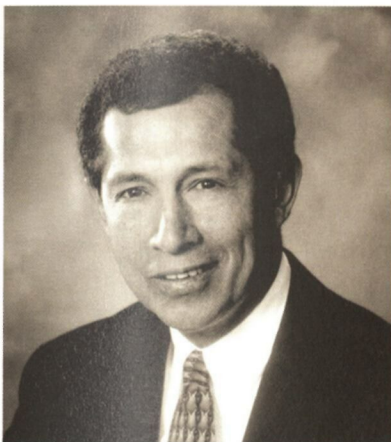

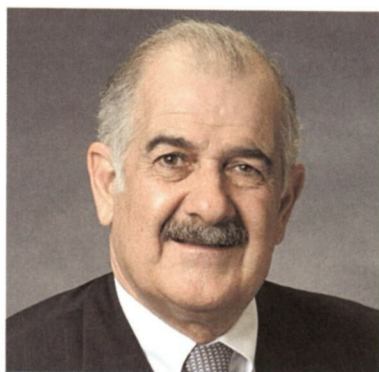

For more than three decades, Ralph Saroyan served the University at the School of Pharmacy. Saroyan was dedicated to seeing his students

become active in their profession through involvement in professional organizations and issues facing the pharmaceutical industry. "When I think of a professor who impacted me the most, it is Ralph Saroyan," an alumna recently wrote.

Saroyan was named Pharmacy Alumnus of the Year in 1970. He served as the first Director of Student Affairs for the School of Pharmacy, coordinating academic and peer advising, and new student orientation. In his first year at Pacific, he established the school's externship program.

In 1993, Saroyan became Director of Pre-Pharmacy Student Affairs and Assistant to the Dean. While at Pacific, he served on the Student Life Academic Support Committee, the Greek Life Advisory Committee, the Admissions Review Committee, and the Associate Deans Council.

Saroyan retired in May 2002. He continues to serve his profession and represent Pacific as the President of the California Pharmacists Association.

**The Spanos Family**

The leadership and support of the Spanos family have influenced nearly every program on campus. Campus facilities sponsored include the Alex G. Spanos Center, the Faye Spanos Concert Hall, renovation of athletic facilities, enhancement of Stag Stadium, and the University library. In 1987, the Spanos children honored their mother at the dedication of the Faye Spanos Concert Hall by establishing the Faye Spanos Endowed Scholarship for Conservatory Students.

Dean Spanos received his bachelor of arts in Business Administration in 1972 from Pacific. He served on the Board of Regents from 1982-1990.

Michael Spanos received his bachelor of science in Business Administration in 1981 and served on the Board of Regents from 1990-1994.

Dea Spanos Berberian has served on the Board of Regents since 1995, serving on the Committee on Regents, and as Chair of the Advancement Committee.

Alexis Spanos Ruhl, together with the other Spanos children, established the Alex and Faye Spanos Teaching Award in honor of their parents.

Other Pacific family members are sons-in-law Ron Berberian '65 BUS, Barry Ruhl '77 DEN and nephew E. Thomas Graham '79 COP, '81 DEN. ■

## BASEBALL

The Pacific baseball team opened its 2003 season with a promising 16-6 record through its first 22 games. The team completed its season finishing 6-15 in the Big West Conference and 27-27 overall.

Two Tigers, senior catcher/infielder **Octavio Amezcuita** and junior outfielder **Nicholas Sekiya**, were named to the Verizon Academic All-District VIII First Team for the 2003 season. Following the 2003 campaign, the Pittsburgh Pirates selected pitcher Sergio Silva in the eighth round of the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft with the 225th overall pick on June 3. This season Silva finished with a 5-7 record and a 5.06 ERA in 83.2 innings.

Head Coach **Quincey Noble** resigned from Pacific after 14 years to pursue other career options. Noble had a career record of 353-390. He is replaced by former Major League Baseball player and two-time World Series Champion **Ed Sprague Jr.**, who started his career as the third baseman on the 1987 and 1988 NCAA Championship teams at Stanford, where he was an All-American in 1988 and a 2002 inductee into the Stanford Athletic Hall of Fame.

Sprague won a gold medal with the 1988 U.S. Baseball Team. He is the third Olympian among current Tiger coaches, joining Women's Volleyball Head Coach **Jayne McHugh** (1988 Olympics) and Men's Water Polo Assistant Coach **Brad Schumacher** (1996 and 2000 Olympics).

Following his amateur career, Sprague was selected in the first

round of the 1988 draft by the Toronto Blue Jays. He made it to the Major Leagues in 1991 with the Blue Jays and enjoyed an 11-year career as a big leaguer.

## MEN'S BASKETBALL

Pacific finished the season with a final record of 12-16 and 7-11 in the Big West Conference. Pacific posted wins over three teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament. Senior **Demetrius Jackson** and sophomore **Christian Maraker** both received All Big West Conference recognition. Maraker spent the summer playing with the Swedish National Team.

With the loss of only two graduating seniors, Jackson and center **Tim Johnson**, the Tigers should be poised to make a run at the 2004 Big West championship.

This coming fall, **Adam Jacobsen** returns to Pacific as an assistant basketball coach.

"I'm looking forward to returning to Pacific and the Stockton area," said Jacobsen. "It's a great opportunity to work with an outstanding athletic department and men's basketball staff again. I'm confident with the talented players in the program and a strong work ethic, we can return to prominence in the Big West."

## WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

For the second consecutive season, the Pacific women's basketball team advanced to the championship game of the Big West Conference Tournament. The Tigers set a single season home attendance

record during the 2002-03 campaign as the squad posted an undefeated home record in Big West Conference action for the first time in program history. Pacific also defeated a nationally ranked team for the first time in program history, knocking off No. 19 UC Santa Barbara, 74-65. The Tigers concluded the season with a final record of 16-14 and 11-5 in the Big West Conference.

Pacific juniors center **Gillian d'Hondt** and guard **Nancy Dinges** were both honored by the Big West Conference. d'Hondt was selected to the All-Big West Conference First Team for the second consecutive season, while Dinges received honorable mention recognition for the second year in a row. Junior point guard **Corinne Wong** was selected as a member of the 2003 Verizon Academic All-District VIII Women's Basketball First Team.

Pacific has a total of 27 games scheduled for the 2003-04 campaign, including 12 home contests. The Tigers will meet four opponents that advanced to the 2003 NCAA Tournament.

## WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY

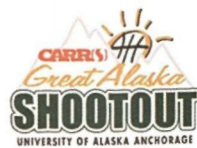

Teeter has 15 years of running experience and has participated in several marathons and triathlons. He will continue to serve as an assistant coach for the Pacific men's and women's swimming teams.

## TIGERS TO FACE DUKE AT GREAT ALASKA SHOOTOUT

The Pacific men's basketball team will face perennial national power Duke in the opening round of the 2003 Carrs/Safeway Great Alaska Shootout on Thursday, November 27. The game will be broadcast at 9 p.m. PST by ESPN2.

The winner of the Pacific/Duke game will face the Liberty/Houston winner on Friday, November 28, at 9:30 p.m., also on ESPN2. The network will also televise the first round match-up between host Alaska-Anchorage and Seton Hall and the championship game.

This will be the first time since the second tournament in 1979 that Pacific has attended the shootout. Other squads competing at this year's event include Purdue and Southwest Texas.





## FIELD HOCKEY

Linda MacDonald enters her sixth season as head coach of the Pacific field hockey program. She has led the team to the semi-finals of the NorPac Conference Tournament each of the last two seasons. The Tigers return eight starters from last season's team, including three student-athletes who were honored by the NorPac Conference last year. Seniors **Cameron Kato** and **Alexandra Fiorina** were each named to the All-NorPac Conference First Team last season, while sophomore **Dana Walsh** was honored as the NorPac West Division Rookie of the Year.

## MEN'S GOLF

**Matt Hansen** earned All-Big West Conference First Team honors following the 2003 spring season and was selected to participate individually at the NCAA West Regional, the 22nd time since 1979 that the Tigers have been represented as a team or by an individual in post-season play.

Pacific won the Stevinson Ranch Invitational in March, the first team title for the Tigers since 1997. Hansen won the individual title at that competition.

## WOMEN'S SOCCER

**Keith Coleman** enters his 10th season as head coach of the Pacific women's soccer team. The Tigers got off to their best start in school history last season, winning their first seven games of the season before finishing the year 10-8-2 overall and 2-5-2 in the Big West Conference. The Tigers return eight starters from last season's team, including seniors **Gabby Olivares** and **Kristina Fetter** and junior **Regina McGee**, all of whom were selected to the All-Big West Conference Second Team in 2002.

## WOMEN'S SOFTBALL

Pacific advanced to NCAA Regional competition for the fifth time in six seasons, after clinching the program's eighth consecutive winning campaign in 2003. Overall, the team ended the season 34-24 and 10-10 in the Big West Conference, receiving votes in the season-ending

Five Tigers received All-Big West Conference honors for the 2003 season. Senior outfielder **Barbara Moody** was selected to the All-Big West Conference First Team for the third consecutive season, while senior outfielder **Estee Okumura**, senior infielder **Brandy Thurman**, sophomore pitcher **Natalie King**, and freshman infielder **Kristen Allen** received honorable mention bids.

Moody and Okumura also garnered NFCA All-West Region honors.

## WOMEN'S SWIMMING

Pacific women's swimming claimed its second consecutive Big West Conference Championship and placed 27th at the 2003 NCAA Championships. The team also set

several new school records: The women's relay team of **Robin Errecart**, **Kris Willey**, **Shannon Catalano**, and **Lyndsay McNamee** set school records in the 400 freestyle relay (3:20.94) and the 200 freestyle relay (1:31.73). McNamee also set a school record in the 50 freestyle with a time of :23.18. Sophomore **Heidi Schmidt** set a new school mark in the 200 breaststroke with a time of 2:15.30. Freshman **Laura McDonald** set two school records – 10:03.23 in the 1000 freestyle and 16:37.68 in the 1650 freestyle.

The Pacific women were also honored by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) as an Academic All-American Team, ranking among the top 20 schools nationally in team grade point average.

A total of six swimmers earned All-American honors at the NCAA Championships. Catalano was named the Big West Conference Women's Swimmer of the Year, while head coach **Danny May** was recognized as Big West Conference Co-Coach of the Year for women's swimming.

## MEN'S SWIMMING

The Pacific men set three school records in earning their second consecutive Big West Conference Championship. The men's 200 medley relay team of **Jarrold Cruzat**, **Filip Wronski**, **Will McLaughlin**, and **Vince Martinez** broke the school record with a time of 1:30.93. Sophomore **Edmund Herlihy** set the school record in the 1000 freestyle with a time of 9:22.19. Junior **Matt Mills** set a new school mark in the 200 butterfly with a time of 1:49.39.

**Matt Smart**, the 2002-03 Big West Conference Men's Swimmer of the Year, represented Pacific individually at the NCAA Championships in the 100 and 200 freestyle.

The team was also recognized by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) as an Academic All-American Team. Out of nearly 180 qualifying Division I schools, the men's team ranked sixth overall in team grade point average.



## MEN'S TENNIS

Pacific advanced to the championship match of the Big West Conference Tournament for the second consecutive season, before falling to No. 62 UC Santa Barbara, 4-3, in the championship match. The Tigers posted a 17-7 overall record in dual matches and a 5-0 mark in regular season Big West Conference matches. Pacific concluded the 2002-03 season ranked No. 70 in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association poll.

A total of six Pacific men's tennis players were honored by the Big West Conference this year. Freshmen **Lennart Maack** and **Arnar Sigurdsson** were selected to the All-Big West Conference First Team in singles. Junior **Michael Duong** earned All-Big West Conference Second Team honors in singles, while sophomore **Niclas Otte** received an honorable mention.



In addition to the four singles honors, each of Pacific's three primary doubles tandems received All-Big West Conference recognition. Maack and Sigurdsson earned first team honors after teaming up for a 16-6 doubles record in the spring. Duong and senior **Vincent Kubler** were selected to the second team with a 7-3 mark in spring doubles action. Otte and freshman **Tyler Black** received honorable mention honors.

## WOMEN'S TENNIS

The Pacific women's tennis team completed the season with a final record of 6-15 overall and 4-5 in the Big West Conference. **Katharina Heil** earned All-Big West Conference Second Team honors as a singles player and All-Big West

Second Team honors with sophomore **Viktoria Hizo** in doubles.

The team also earned an ITA All-Academic Team award, as announced by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association. The award recognizes teams with a cumulative team grade point average of 3.20 or above. Pacific is one of only eight teams in the nation to earn the award in each of the last five years.

## MEN'S VOLLEYBALL

Pacific's 18 victories (18-14 overall, 12-10 Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF)) accounted for the highest win total in program history, and the Tigers advanced to the MPSF Tournament for the first time since 1999. Pacific defeated the No. 1 team in the nation for the third consecutive season, knocking off top-ranked Pepperdine in three games. The Tigers finished the 2003 campaign ranked No. 8 in the nation by the American Volleyball Coaches Association.

**Joe Wortmann** was honored as the MPSF Co-Coach of the Year. Senior **Chris Tamas** became the program's first ever AVCA All-America First Team selection.

Five Tigers were honored as All-

MPSF Scholar Athletes: **Martin Berntsen**, **Mauricio Brizuela**, **Mike Gawlik**, **Tim Jenson**, and **Tamas**.

## WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL

The Pacific women's volleyball team looks to return to the top of the Big West Conference in 2003, after placing fourth in the conference at 19-13 overall (12-6 Big West) last season. The Tigers advanced to the second round of the 2002 NCAA Tournament, remaining one of just four programs to have qualified for each and every NCAA Tournament.

Senior **Jennifer Joines** is looking to become Pacific's first four-time AVCA All-American. She entered the 2003 campaign just 282 kills shy of becoming the new program career record-holder in the category. Joines is the first Pacific player to compete for the U.S. Women's Volleyball Team at the Pan American Games.

## MEN'S WATER POLO

The Pacific men's water polo program will enter the 2003 season with a new head coach, **Mike Maroney**. A 1993 Pacific graduate, Maroney started the Pacific women's water polo club team in 1993. Maroney will inherit a men's program that finished 10-15 in 2002, but lost senior All-Americans **Nic Heper** and **Sasha Maese** who both graduated in May. Leading the charge for Pacific in 2003 will be 2000 All-American **Eddie Wisniewski**, who led the Tigers with 39 goals last season.

## WOMEN'S WATER POLO

The Pacific women's water polo program finished its second season under Head Coach **Ryan Brown** with a 7-23 record.

Highlighting the year for the Tigers was the play of junior **Jessica Schroeder**, who scored 84 goals to lead Pacific and the MPSF. Schroeder's 84 goals placed her second in school history for most goals in a season, one behind record-holder **Molly Smith**. Senior goalkeeper **Julie Ross** also had a standout season in 2003 as she set the Tiger record for most saves in a season with 254. With her 2003 season, Ross also set the record for most saves in a career with 596. ■

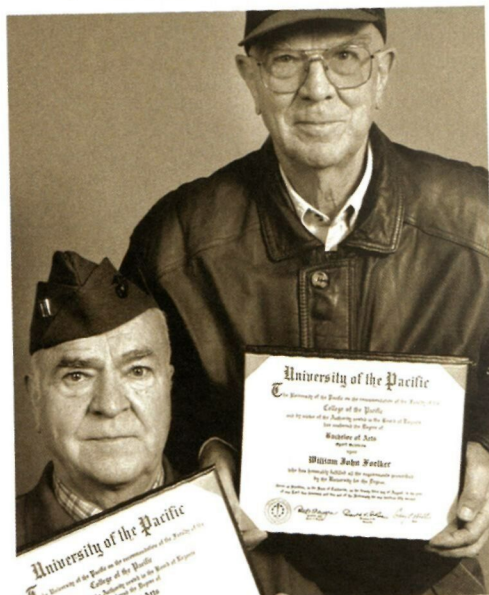

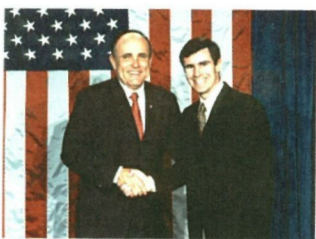

#### Faculty

Arthur H. Maynard, professor emeritus of Bible and World Religions, died March 5, 2003. His career at Pacific spanned 27 years. Dr. Maynard was an ordained United Methodist minister and early in his career had served as a pastor. He was the author of four books and many articles. He was an authority on the New Testament Book of John.

Kathleen Shannon, professor emerita, Department of Religious Studies, died February 16, 2002. She joined the faculty of Pacific in 1955, and at the time of her retirement in 1979, she was the only ordained clergy woman to have served as a member of the Pacific faculty, the only fully tenured non-Methodist to have served in the department, and the only woman to have taught in the field of the New Testament. 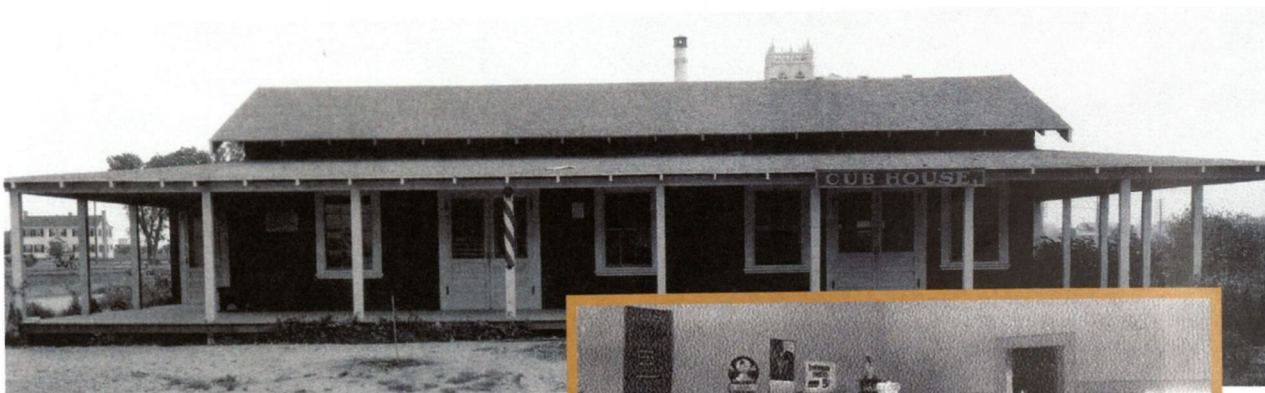

# A GATHERING PLACE



## BACK IN TIME :

n essential ingredient of student life on a college or university campus is a student center, or at least a room where students can congregate socially and escape the rigors of academic life. However, in 1924 when Pacific opened its Stockton Campus, there was no such facility.

Thanks to the initiative of Hazel Glaister '24 and Grace Connor '25, two ambitious members of the Associated Women Students (AWS), the AWS Tea Room, dubbed the "Cub House," was born. The University constructed a small building on the corner where the library now stands that housed the student book store and a barber shop. With no start-up capital, many predicted failure. Undaunted, Glaister and Connor planned the room and purchased the supplies on their own credit. The Cub House opened a week before the fall semester began. AWS volunteers staffed the Cub House throughout the school year.

Contrary to predictions, by the end of the year all the

bills were paid and AWS was able to hire staff to take the place of volunteers. Glaister and Connor were validated in their cause and, thanks to their initiative, there has always been a student center on the Stockton campus.

The Cub House continued to serve as a hub for student gathering until it was replaced with the "End Zone" that opened in fall of 1948. Additional space was provided for the offices of student government and student publications. The current University Center (later named in honor of President McCaffrey) opened in fall of 1975 replacing the End Zone with expanded features that further developed the scope of the "gathering place" for students.

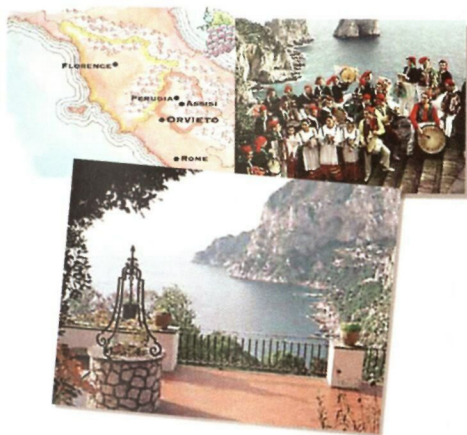
