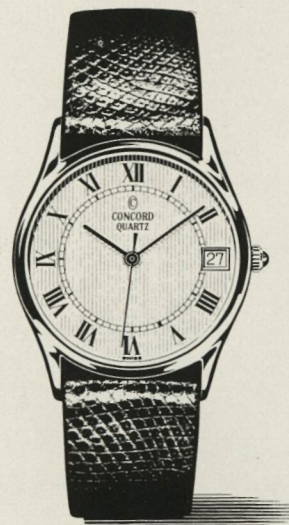

HOME GAMES IN CAPITAL LETTERS
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University President Dr. Stephen Horn

For his nine years as the president of the largest university in California, and the largest six-year regional state university in the United States, Dr. Stephen Horn receives top marks for his leadership.

Mary Barber, writing in the Los Angeles Times, described the president as, "...self assured, daring, provocative, a natural leader...Educating internationally is his passion. He invites the world to his campus. He travels, lectures and writes incessantly on the subject of elevating all mankind through education."

Judith Olson, writing in the Orange Coast Daily Pilot, says that, "Stephen Horn, despite his dreaming and despite the heavy demands of his job, is a people person. His antennae is fine-tuned into the needs of all the people he leads—from the young freshmen on through the faculty, staff and administrators to the community in which his school is located."

"Dr. Stephen Horn," she writes, "is President of California State University, Long Beach, a school whose academic reputation has spread so that it is now considered among major universities of the Western United States, if not the nation."

These comments fairly summarize the president's reputation for encouraging academic excellence, his interest in international education, his concern for minorities and women, and his commitment to community service.

When he became president in 1970, at the age of 38, the university was known by a large part of the community as "that mausoleum on the hill." As the youngest president of the 19 institutions of the California State University and Colleges, Dr. Horn immediately set about to encourage by example community-university interchange.

In his first year, he became the most community-active president in the history of the institution. In that year he attended and spoke at more than 153 community meetings and social affairs.

During the president's tenure the university has achieved distinction in a number of areas:

- The establishment of the schools of Social and Behavioral Sciences, Humanities, Natural Sciences and the Graduate Center for Public Policy and Administration.



- The chartering of a chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, the nation's oldest and most respected undergraduate honor society.
- The construction of major buildings including the Student Services/Administration Building, the Microbiology Building, the Social Science/Public Affairs Building, the Industrial Technology Building, the Isabel Patterson Child Development Center as well as additions to Nursing and Health Services.
- The organization of community leadership support groups: the University Affiliates, the University Fellows and the President's Associates, as well as the involvement of 300 citizens who are members of various school, library and departmental visiting committees.
- Gifts from private donors include, among others, the construction of the Lough Fountain, the Isabel Patterson Child Development Center and the Japanese Garden, a gift of the Earl Burns and Loraine H. Miller Foundation.

Dr. Horn is a native son of California. He spent his youth in San Juan Bautista and San Benito County.

In 1953, he received the bachelor of arts degree (political science) with great distinction from Stanford University. As a student he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. He received the degree of Master of Public Administration from Harvard University in 1955 and Doctor

of Philosophy (political science) from Stanford in 1958.

Dr. Horn has enjoyed an extensive career in public affairs beginning with the receipt of a Congressional Fellowship from the American Political Science Association which permitted him to work with Congress during 1958-59. For almost a year and a half at the conclusion of the Eisenhower administration, he served as the administrative assistant to Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell.

Then for five and a half years, he was the legislative assistant to Senator Thomas H. Kuchel of California, taking an active role in legislation concerning foreign affairs, civil rights, conservation, education and health care for senior citizens in particular.

From 1966 to 1969, Dr. Horn was a Senior Fellow of The Brookings Institution, devoting his attention to an analysis of the Congressional appropriations process and the problems of legislative ethics and campaign finance.

In February, 1969, he became Dean of Graduate Studies and Research at The American University in Washington, D.C. A year later he was named as the president of California State University, Long Beach.

Dr. Horn serves as Vice Chairman of the United States Commission on Civil Rights.

In May, 1973, he was elected to the Executive Board of the Stanford Alumni Association and served as president in 1976-77.

Director of Sports, Athletics & Recreation: PERRY C. MOORE



One of the most diversified, yet successful athletic programs of its kind in the nation is under the direction of Perry C. Moore, the director of sports, athletics and recreation at California State University, Long Beach.

Although it is located in one of the most competitive athletic markets in the country—Southern California—and one of the world's true sporting centers, Long Beach has made its mark both locally, nationally and internationally with its strong teams and outstanding athletes.

Now in his sixth year directing the program, Moore has continued to build a solid foundation for the future of Long Beach athletics while maintaining a successful, yet diversified department.

The 47-year old Moore directs a department that encompasses 12 men's and 12 women's and coed sports, 800 athletes, plus one of the largest recreational and club sports programs in the nation. He has been able to do this successfully despite fighting the hazards of soaring inflation, increasing competition for the sports entertainment dollar while at

the same time building the women's program to a national level.

Moore has been able to do this by carefully using the resources already available and building on these through promotion of athletic events and an increased emphasis on fund raising in the community.

Scheduling has also taken an overall improvement since Moore's arrival. Almost all of the men's and women's teams are playing the top Division I schools throughout the country, including teams like Michigan State, Illinois, Marquette, Kansas State and Oklahoma State in basketball. In football, the 49ers will take on their first Pacific-10 foe ever in 1980 with the addition of Oregon State to the schedule.

Moore's success in athletics goes back to his competitive days as a standout high school student in Belpre, Ohio. He was a three-sport star in football, basketball and track. He played freshman football at Ohio State in 1950 before leaving school to join the Navy. During his four-year tenure in the Navy, Moore competed for several

service all-star basketball teams and competed in AAU track and field.

In 1954 Moore entered the University of Maryland and was a star there during his four years in both track and basketball. During his senior year the Terrapins competed in the NCAA playoffs and in 1956 Moore went to the Olympic Decathlon trials.

At Maryland, Moore was the recipient of many awards for both academic and athletic excellence. He won the highly coveted Atlantic Coast Conference Award of Excellence for scholarship and athletics for three straight years, in addition to the Bill Guckeyson Trophy for outstanding character and leadership qualities in athletics and academics. He also earned the Herbert K. Evans Memorial Award as the outstanding track athlete at Maryland.

During the summer months Moore worked in the athletic department at Maryland, and was involved in the business side of sports early in his career.

After his graduation in 1958, Moore stayed at his alma mater as the assistant basketball coach and also doubled as the executive director of the Terrapin Booster Club. He also helped promote and produce Maryland's television highlight show for football.

In 1961 Moore moved to the University of Florida where he became an administrative assistant in the athletic department and assisted Norm Sloan in coaching the basketball team. In 1963 he was named as Assistant to the Athletic Director and was a driving force in helping the Gators build a national reputation.

Moore became the Athletic Director at Colorado State University in 1968, and quickly took a program that had a budget deficit and built a sizeable reserve fund. He overhauled the accounting procedures, improved facilities and gained admittance into the Western Athletic Conference for the growing program.

Moore was also the National Chairman of the Wichita State University Disaster Fund in 1970 that helped that school's program after the tragic air crash involving its football team.

Moore and his wife, the former Peggy Jo Stone, live in Long Beach and are active in many service and community organizations. They have a daughter, Pamela Jo, 23, a graduate of Southern Methodist University, and a son, Perry, Jr., 19, who is a student at the University of Florida.

A GROWING UNIVERSITY

The University's eight schools—Applied Arts and Sciences, Social and Behavioral Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Fine Arts, Humanities and Natural Sciences—and the Graduate Center for Public Policy and Administration—provide a learning environment for not only high school and community graduates, but for thousands of men and women, young and old alike, who are already mid-career in various occupations and professions.

California State University, Long Beach offers 72 majors leading to the bachelor's degree and 51 fields of study leading to various masters and two-year post graduate degrees.

The University is committed to the concept that physical education is part of the educational process. The University fields teams in all of the major and most of the minor sports, both at the varsity and intramural levels. An indication of the scale of this commitment is the fact that the University sent ten student athletes to compete in the 1976 Olympic Games in Montreal.

The campus provides a cultural mix which encourages a meshing of ideas and philosophies. Over 578 foreign students are enrolled, and 1,078 are immigrant students born abroad. The average age of undergraduates is 23, and 26 for graduates. Nearly one-third of the students are married and one-third work full-time. Most of the students commute to campus. Some 868 students live on campus.

The center of social activity at California State University, Long Beach is the \$5.4 million Student Union. Faculty, staff and students use the Union for formal gatherings as well as a place to meet with friends. There are also many lounges and private areas to study, listen to music or carry on a meeting and fine recreational facilities.

In addition to the Union, there are 55 permanent buildings at the University. Recently completed major construction projects are the Student Services/Administration Building, the Social Science/Public Affairs Building, the Industrial Technology Building and the Microbiology Building. The Student Services/Administration Building, which is in close proximity to the Student Union, provides a centralized location for practically all student needs and services. For the first time, admissions, financial aid, career planning and

placement, academic planning, international student affairs center, payroll and other areas are all located under one roof. In addition to the Center for Public Policy and Administration, the Social Science/Public Affairs Building houses the journalism, criminal justice, economics, political science and sociology departments.

The campus is beautifully landscaped. A central feature of the landscape design is more than 3,200 flowering peach trees donated by the citizens of Long Beach. In 1965, the International Sculpture Symposium contributed ten monumental pieces of sculpture to California State University, Long Beach. These works have been described in 21 national and international publications.

California State University, Long Beach has been created to serve people. Founded in 1949 as Los Angeles-Orange County State College, the institution now known as California

State University, Long Beach, has grown from a student body of 160 and 13 faculty members to a 320 acre institution with 32,000 students and 1,800 full and part-time faculty. It is now the largest university in the 19-campus California State University and Colleges System and the largest six-year post-secondary institution in the nation.

Students from every state and 93 foreign countries study disciplines as divergent as chemical engineering, journalism, marketing, economics, accounting, Asian languages, mathematics, philosophy, theatre arts, physical therapy and criminal justice. A number of widely respected departments—microbiology, nursing, psychology, public policy and administration, social welfare, accounting, finance and art—are quickly oversubscribed at the time of registration.

Thirty years after its founding, California State University, Long Beach is coming to maturity.



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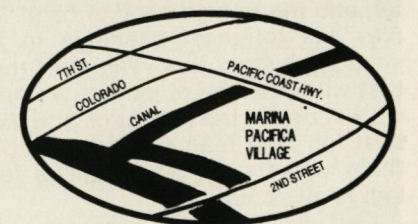
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Head Coach Dave Currey

As he begins his third season as Head Football Coach at California State University, Long Beach, Dave Currey has several pretty impressive streaks he is looking to keep alive.

First of all, in nine seasons as a collegiate coach, both at Stanford University and Long Beach, he has never coached a starting quarterback that has not gone into professional football. Secondly, in his two seasons as a head coach at Long Beach, every one of his starting quarterbacks and wide receivers have been signed to professional football contracts.

Another statistic that Currey takes even more pride in is his successful commitment to the total student-athlete. Since taking over as the coach for 49er football in December of 1976, Currey has been devoted to bringing in not only top-quality athletes but outstanding people as well, and he takes pride in the fact that 11 of last year's 14 senior football players are graduating with degrees.

It is this success on the field and off with the individual athlete that has characterized Currey's football program. He is also committed to having his players face the best opposition possible, and in 1979 the 49ers will line up against the best teams that a Long Beach football squad has ever faced, with the likes of Utah and Brigham Young on the schedule.

"I believe we have made great strides in the caliber of people we are playing," notes the 35-year old Currey. "I also feel that the caliber of student-athlete we are bringing to Long Beach to compete is much better, and the two go hand in hand. We play the toughest schedule in the school's history this year, but I think that with the kind of players we have, we will rise to the occasion. You can't beat the best teams unless you play them, and that is what college football is all about."

Last year, on the way to a 5-6 season, the 49ers knocked off Pacific Coast Athletic Association champion Utah State, 33-17, at a time when the Aggies were nationally-ranked and undefeated. Utah State's only loss in conference action was to Long Beach.

The 49ers also upset perennial rival San Diego State, 27-25, at Anaheim Stadium with a come-from-behind drive at the end of the game.

One of the ingredients that made these two upsets possible is a staple of Currey's philosophy to emphasize



a wide-open professional-style passing attack like the one he was associated with as an assistant for seven seasons at Stanford.

It is because of this proficiency in the passing game that all of the quarterbacks he has been around—like Heisman Trophy winner Jim Plunket, Guy Benjamin, Don Bunce and Jim Freitas at Long Beach—have gone into professional football.

In both seasons at Long Beach the 49ers have finished in the nation's Top 10 among passing teams, and only four schools playing major college football can make that claim over the same period. Under Currey, the 49ers have broken or equaled 11 school passing records in two years.

He has also had his quarterbacks finish among the Top 10 ranked-passers in the nation. In 1977 Jim Freitas, who signed with the Los Angeles Rams out of Long Beach—was seventh and last season Paul McGaffigan was ninth and earned honorable mention All-American status. He will return in 1979 as one of the nation's top throwers.

Six members off of last year's team were offered and signed professional contracts, and in only two seasons nine players have joined the pro ranks. Tops among those is middle linebacker Dan Bunz, who was a first round draft choice by the San Francisco 49ers in 1978 and was one of the top rookies in the National Football League last fall.

With two seasons of building behind him, Currey looks to 1979 to be his best year at Long Beach. He is coming off his best recruiting effort yet and has some new coaches who he feels will bring some fresh enthusiasm to the program.

Currey's reliance on the forward pass is still as strong as ever, but he hopes that 1979 will be the season that his belief that defense wins championships proves right.

Currey's ideas have been shaped during a career of working with the forward passes and some of the top coaching names in the profession.

While at Stanford, he toiled for two seasons under John Ralston, former Denver Broncos Coach and now Vice President of the San Francisco 49ers. During those two seasons the Cardinals won two Pacific-8 championships and two Rose Bowl games, beating Ohio State and Michigan in 1971 and '72.

As an assistant at Stanford, Currey served in a number of roles, including director of recruiting, backfield coach and offensive coordinator, before taking over at Long Beach.

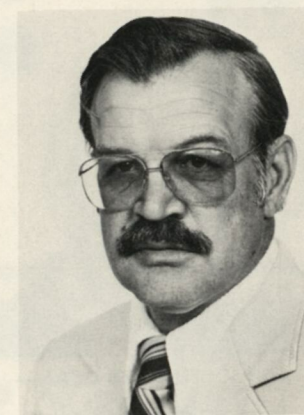
In 1968 Currey got his first head coaching job at St. Bonaventure High in Ventura and took the team to the CIF title and a 10-1 record in his first season. In 1970 Currey left to take a position at Stanford, and earned a masters degree there while coaching.

Currey and his wife, Kathy, live in Long Beach and are the parents of a son, John-David, age four; and a daughter, Tracy, who is a year old.

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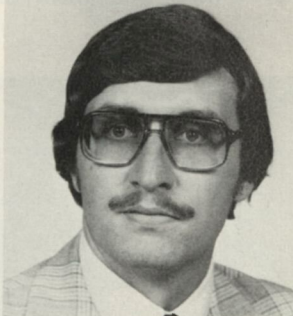
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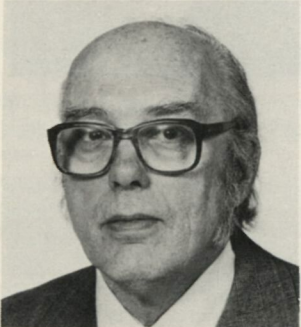
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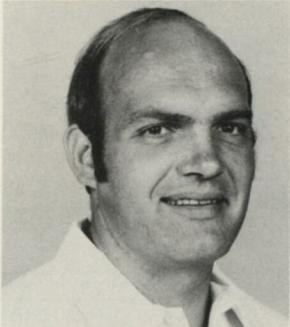
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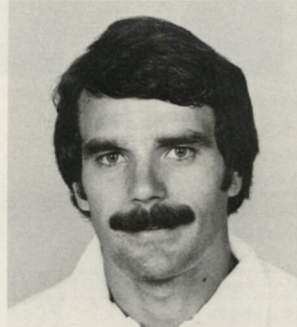
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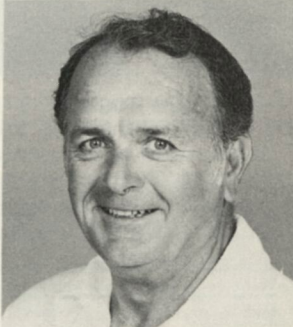
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The Pacific Coast Athletic Association

After completing its first decade in intercollegiate sports, the Pacific Coast Athletic Association is still expanding in leaps and bounds, establishing itself as one of the top conferences on the West Coast, if not the nation.

Under the dynamic leadership of second-year Commissioner Lew Cryer, the PCAA has built on its tradition of being one of the most competitive and innovative conferences in the nation.

Continually striving to move forward with its football program, the PCAA recently announced the formation of a new post-season bowl game that will feature the conference champion against the number one team of the Mid-American Conference. That game will be played in the new stadium being constructed in Fresno and is slated for a 1980 debut.

The PCAA is designated Division 1 in all sports, and currently consists of CSULB, San Jose State, Utah State,

Fresno State, Cal State Fullerton and the University of the Pacific in football. UC Santa Barbara and UC Irvine are members in other sports and Pepperdine is an associate member. A charter member of the PCAA (1969), CSULB has maintained a dominant position, and the University's 35 conference titles is the highest among member institutions.

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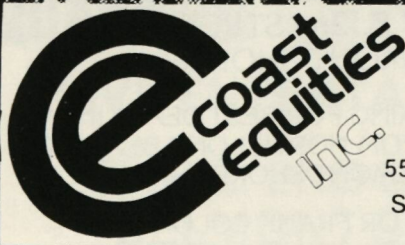
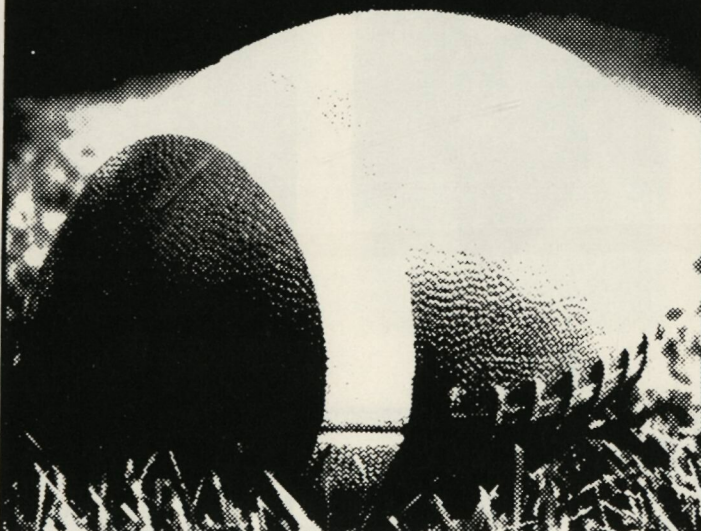
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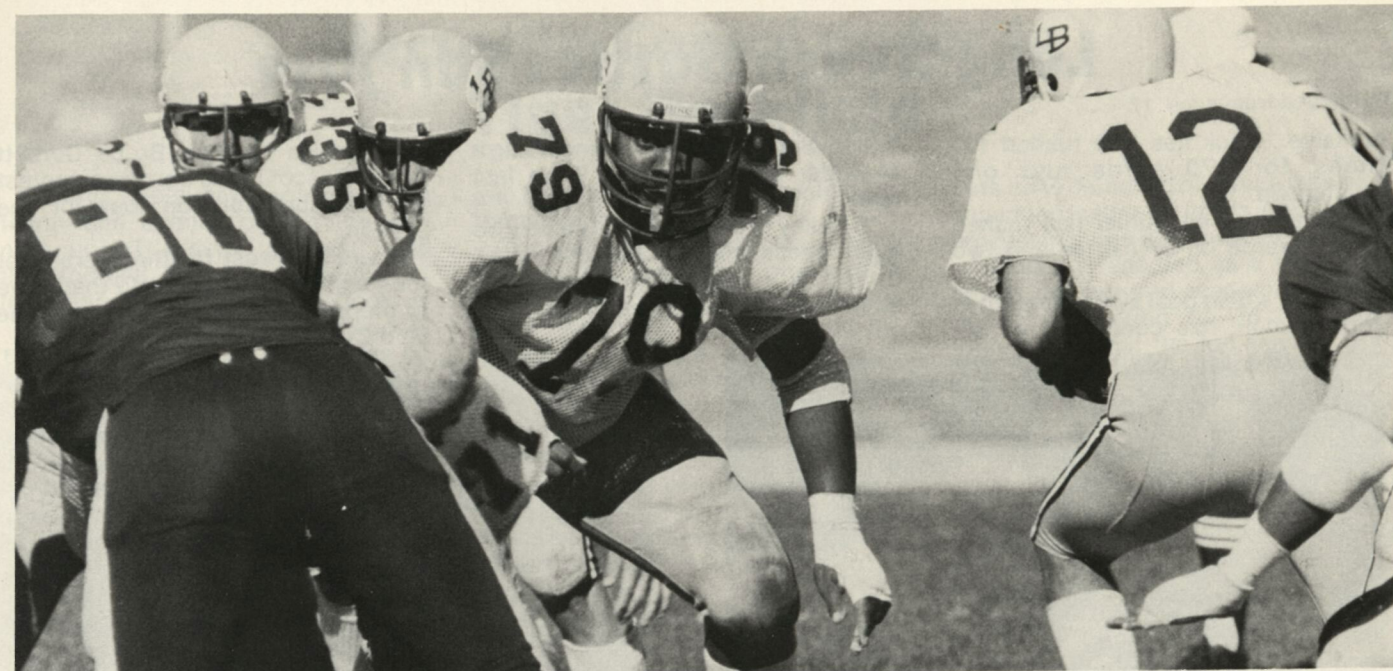
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Offensive guard Herman Parker (Number 79) had one of his best games of the year last week, providing protection for quarterback Paul McGaffigan.

Another Aerial Show Expected Tonight Between Tigers, 49ers

Another aerial battle looms tonight as University of Pacific and California State University, Long Beach meet in a Pacific Coast Athletic Association game at Anaheim Stadium.

The Tigers, who dropped a 33-10 decision to Fresno State last week, are 3-5 overall and winless in three league contests. The 49ers, after dropping a 53-42 game to San Jose State, are 4-3 overall and 1-2 in the league.

Both teams are hoping to bounce back from last week's defeats and finish the season with a winning record.

Pacific and Long Beach have both experienced ups and downs this season.

The Tigers, under first-year coach Bob Toledo, formerly an assistant at USC, shocked Iowa State, 24-7 and narrowly missed beating Utah State—losing in the final minutes, 15-14.

Pacific's other wins came against Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and Southwest Louisiana. The Tigers also dropped decisions to the University of Texas, El Paso, Cal State Fullerton and last week, Fresno State.

The 49ers are hoping to combine a more effective defensive plan with a powerful offensive attack for this week's game with the Tigers.

The 49er defense was victimized by San Jose quarterback Ed Luther, who

completed 29 of 37 attempts for 467 yards including his first 10 passes, negating the effort by Long Beach quarterback Paul McGaffigan, who moved into number one on the CSULB career passing mark, and total offense list completing 21 of 36 passes for 296 yards.

That moved McGaffigan ahead of Jack Reilly with 4,327 yards.

Junior runningback Ron Settles also starred for the 49ers, rushing for a career-high 129 yards on 18 carries.

Long Beach receivers Henry Phillips (seven catches, 132 yards, one touch-down) and Ron Johnson (six catches, 101 yards, two touchdowns) also contributed to the 49er offensive attack.

CSULB Coach Dave Currey said his team was more ready to play the San Jose contest than any other this season.

"Both teams played well offensively," Currey said. "San Jose's bombs hurt us. They have some great receivers. Our receivers also did a good job."

"Our biggest job (for this week's Pacific game) is to regain our confidence on defense and we've got to start preparing for teams that will throw 35 to 50 times a game (the 49ers meet Brigham Young University, the nation's top offensive team, next week)."

Currey said that McGaffigan had "another strong game, and did a good job directing the offense."

The 49er coach also said that

Johnson, Phillips and offensive guard Herman Parker were impressive.

Runningback Ron Settles "ran very well. It was the best I've seen him run," Currey said.

The 49ers figure to see another strong passing attack this week, from the Tigers, although the strongpoint for Pacific this year has been its defense.

"They beat Iowa State and have been up and down at times, but at times they can be tough to beat," he said.

Linebackers Brad Vassar (111 tackles) and Dallas Nelson (97 tackles) are two of the best the 49ers will see this year, Currey said.

The Tigers are led on offense by quarterback Sander Markel, who has completed 147 of 296 passes for 1,510 yards and nine touchdowns. Markel, who is fifth on UOP's single season completion list, is the only freshman in the nation ranked in the top 50 in total offense.

Although he's had success in the air, Markel has been intercepted 16 times.

Among his favorite targets are Mike House, who has caught 45 passes for 487 yards and one touchdown and who was third in the nation in receiving, having caught more scores than any tight end in the country.

Rob Wilson (30 catches, 415 yards, four touchdowns) and Mel Cook (21 receptions, 173 yards, two touchdowns) have also been im-

pressive. Cook has also rushed 100 times for 470 yards and one touchdown.

Tailback Levell Quiller has rushed for 415 yards on 97 carries and two scores.

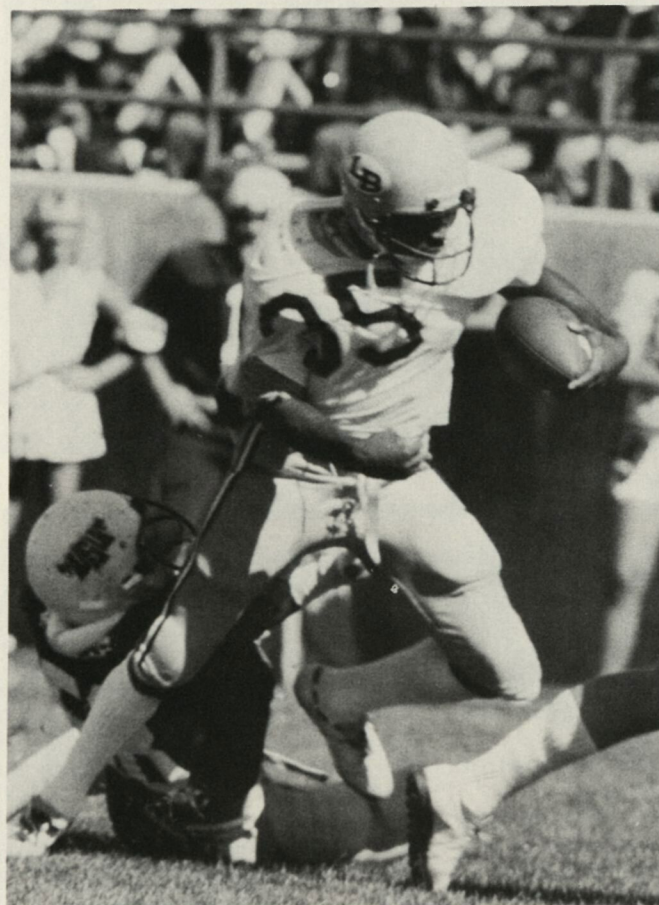
Pacific's field goal kicker, freshman Jeff Council, has connected on six

three-pointers this season, including a 44-yarder against Fresno State last week.

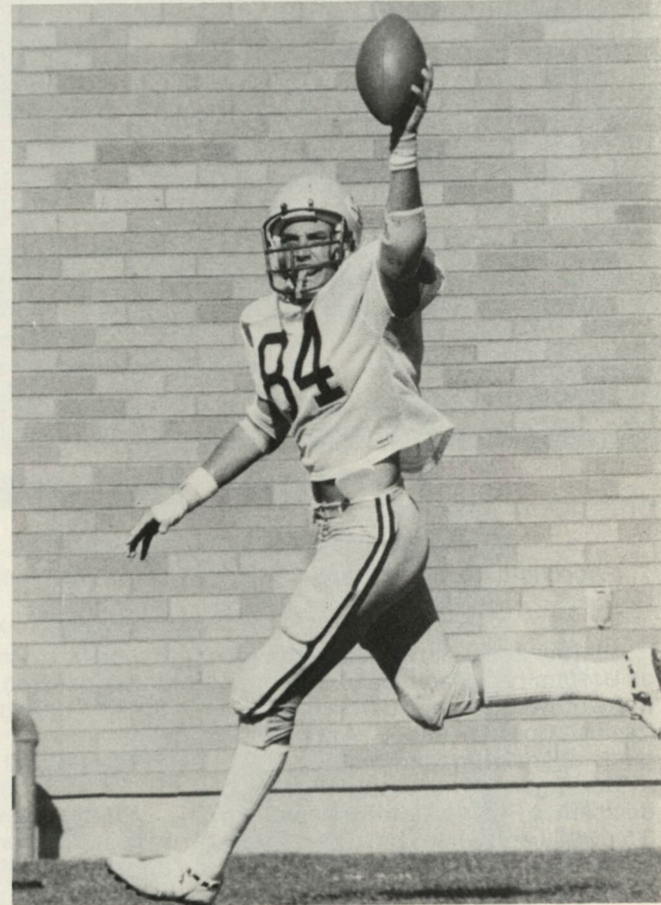
"The key to this game will be how we bounce back (from the San Jose loss)," Currey said. "It tears your heart out to see us play that way and not come out with a victory."

Versatile Cook Leader in Tiger Backfield

Having a big day—against a big team—and coming out on the winning side. That's the greatest thing that football offers to University of the Pacific runningback Mel Cook.

And that's just what the 5-foot-9, 195 pound senior had done when he left the field recently in Ames, Iowa. A big day (19 carries-81 yds.), against a big team (Iowa State of the Big-8)—and most importantly, coming out a winner in perhaps the biggest victory in UOP football history, 24-7 over the Cyclones.

Coming into the Iowa State contest, the Tigers were a disappointing 1-3 and had lost their PCAA opener at home the week before, but Cook saw some good times ahead.

"Our team has so much talent, but we just haven't been able to put it all together yet," said Cook as the UOP squad prepared to depart for Ames. "But I think the last game might have done it for us, we're more determined and we might surprise some people in Iowa."

Surprise might be something of an understatement to describe what the Tigers did to the Cyclones, but it is an

apt term in reference to Cook's performance this season.

The Malvern, Pa. native is neither a bruiser or a breakaway threat. UOP runningback coach Jim Skipper calls him a "grinder."

"Mel is the type of runningback that is really a pleasure to coach," says Skipper of the former prep All-America. "He can get yards inside or outside effectively, blocks well and is a real leader for our offense."

"Mel gets a lot of his yards on second and third efforts and is one runner who gets maximum results out of his talent."

Nineteen seventy-nine has been the first year at UOP that Cook has been able to put his talent to work and earn the desired results.

Recruited after being a two-time All-Western States pick at College of the Canyons (the same school that sent UOP cornerback Jeff Tracy), Cook transferred to Pacific in 1977. In the first quarter of his first major college game against Colorado State, his season came to an abrupt end when the Rams' giant defensive duo of Al Baker and Mike Bell (both NFL stand-

outs now) crunched him for a loss and separated cartilage in his ribs in the process. Things got worse from there.

Generally regarded as a solid student, Cook got into academic trouble during the spring of '78 and was forced to sit out the fall season. But despite sitting out for nearly all of the past two years, Cook has bounced back for his senior campaign, both athletically and academically.

On the field, he has emerged as UOP's most versatile and dependable runner. In the classroom, Cook's work will gain him a communications degree this spring.

Through five games in '79, Cook leads the Tigers in rushing and all-purpose running and was 5th in both categories in the most recent PCAA rankings. He has also caught 12 passes, third highest on the club and tops among the backs.

In spite of the setbacks and pitfalls, the 23-year-old Cook never gave thought to quitting the game.

"I really love playing football and will always be looking for the chance to play more football," says Cook. "I set small goals for myself which will hopefully be stepping stones toward higher goals."

Coming back after sitting out the '78 season and adapting to a new coaching staff, Cook set three simple goals.

"First I just wanted an equal chance to prove myself," Cook says, "and after I passed that level, I wanted to become a starter and then contribute to the team in the best way possible."

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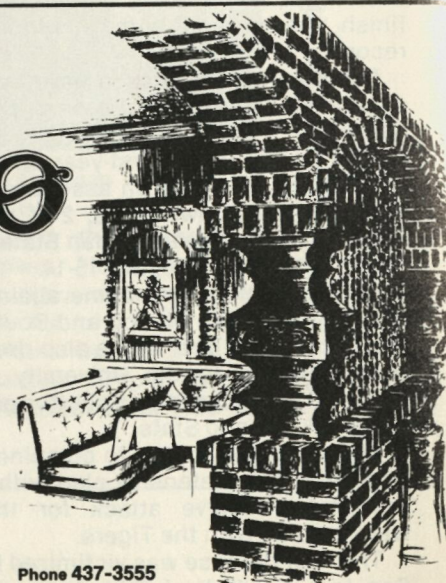
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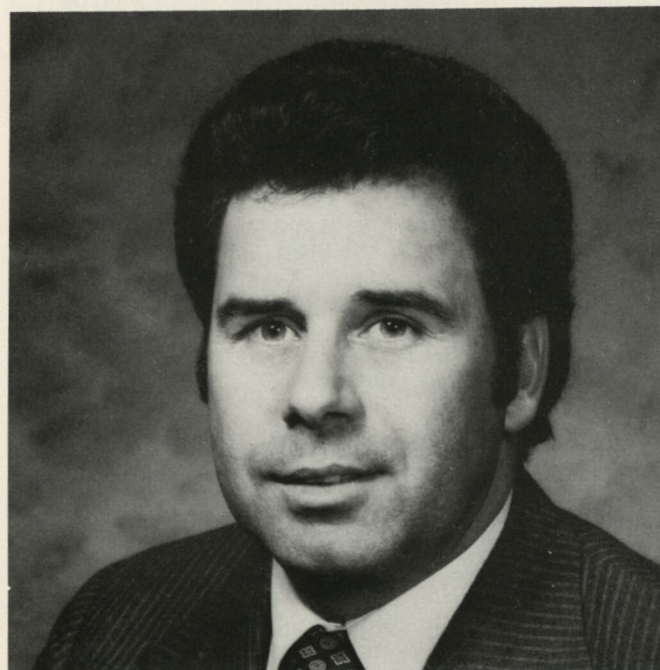
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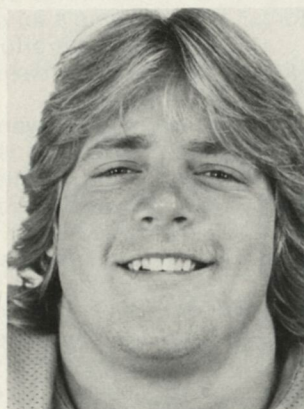
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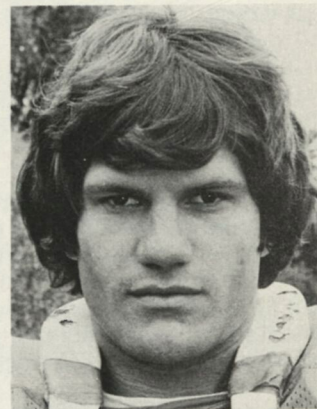

Helping American Indians in Higher Education

Wanda Doty, a member of the Choctaw Tribe, has been a pioneer in the effort to make public education available to American Indians.

Doty, the assistant director for the department of counseling and human development at Cal State University, Long Beach, has overcome considerable obstacles to attract and work to retain as students, more than 300 American Indians, representing scores of tribes and nations.

More American Indian students are enrolled at CSULB than in any of the other 18 institutions of the California State University and Colleges.

"In the spring of 1969, 15 American Indians became students at the University," Doty said in a recent interview. "As a result of pressure by those students, an Indian instructor by the name of Hotona Roebuck (Choctaw) was hired.

"This was the beginning of the first American Indian Studies Department in the state. The first and only class taught was called 'Introduction to American Indian studies.' More than 300 American Indian students are currently enrolled.

"There is now a nucleus of American Indians on the campus in various capacities, such as: staff, faculty, counselors, recruiters and students."

The group consists of Richard Band (Squamish), director of American In-

dian Studies; Carol Miller (Wintun), instructor; Jessie James (Cherokee), instructor; Doty, counselor; Paul Peshlakai (Navajo), E. O. P. recruiter; Ron Kennedy (Apache), talent search recruiter; Tim Purcella (Navajo), American Indian Studies Community Projects Coordinator (student CETA employee).

Other members include Dee Ann Savilla, secretary, graduate student; Native American Student Council, and Jimmy BlueEyes, president; Mary Cleghorn, vice president; Tricia Grace, secretary; Connie Leonard, treasurer; Calvin Codynah; Denise Greenhalgh, Victor Porter, Carl Bryant, Dwight Manuel, April Skinas.

"These people form one of the best support systems for American Indian students that can be found in the State of California. This support begins when the student first shows an interest in attending the University.

"Recruiters assist him or her in filling out application blanks. Financial aid counseling is provided by Tom Alex in the Financial Aid Office, as special attention is needed in applying for the Bureau of Indian Affairs Grant," Doty said.

The bureau offers a grant to those full-time students who are at least one-fourth American Indian, Inuit (Eskimo) or Aleut, as recognition by a tribal group served by the Bureau, she said.

The amount of the award is based on financial need and availability of funds.

Other programs include academic counseling, an art exhibit, a college motivation day for high school seniors and community college students, the annual "Pow-Wow," and a half-hour radio program broadcast over campus radio station KSUL by Indian students at 5 p.m. Tuesday and Friday.

The program features contemporary and traditional music and announcements of community services and events.

49er Harriers Gear for PCAA Cross Country Crown

The coveted title of PCAA Champion and a possible NCAA berth awaits the California State University, Long Beach Cross Country team as it prepares this week for the PCAA Conference Championships on Saturday Nov. 10, at 11 a.m. The meet is hosted by Stanford University, in conjunction with the Pacific-10 Conference Championships and the NCAA District 8 Regionals.

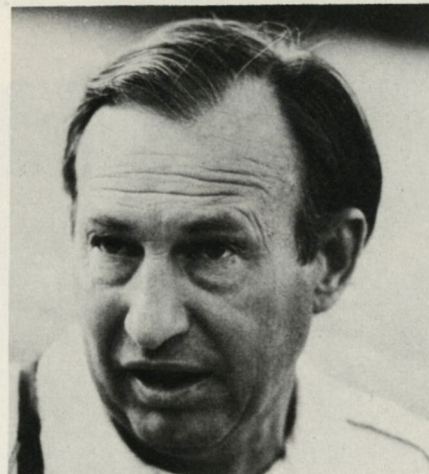
The top three teams from the regional meet will qualify for the NCAA Division I Championship, Nov. 19 at Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pennsylvania.

Head Coach Cliff Abel, now in his second year as cross country and track coach at CSLUB, is both excited and confident about his squad's chances for capturing the PCAA Championship, in which CSLUB has won more cross country titles (six) than any other member school.

Abel knows his runners have been looking forward to the championships all season; and one of the team's goals this year is to bring the PCAA title back to Long Beach. Coach Abel's optimism also stems from the performances his squad has turned in this season and barring any serious injuries, he expects to field a full and healthy contingent of his top seven runners.

"I've been very pleased with how our kids have fared so far this season, especially with the kind of schedule we've faced," says Abel, who has over 25 years of coaching experience. "We've run against some of the finest teams of the West Coast, including the University of Texas—El Paso, the defending national champion. Some of these teams we've faced more than once, and our boys have all had good performances. In most of the races we've been able to get a good grouping near the finish, which is pretty essential in scoring and possibly winning the meet."

In CSLUB's five invitational meets this season, Richard Diaz, a freshman

from Redondo Beach, has emerged as the 49ers' number one runner. Diaz placed ninth, 14th, and 47th in the Long Beach, UCLA, and Stanford Invitationals respectively. He was Long Beach's first finisher each time; and all three meets had a field of at least 80 finishers.

Other team members include team captain Jim McManus, a sophomore from Palos Verdes. McManus was the 49ers' top finisher in the 10 kilometer Aztec Invitational in San Diego. Steve

Loken, a two-year letterman from Westminster, has been one of the 49ers' most consistent runners this year. Mike Davis, a senior from Lakewood and Dave Cangelosi, a freshman from Villa Park, have proven to be among Abel's nucleus of top finishers for 1979.

CSULB's most recent intercollegiate meet was the five-mile Biola Invitational in La Mirada. Putting together their best team effort of the season, the 49ers placed five men in the top twenty finishers, and finished in second place behind traditional rival and Western Athletic Conference favorite San Diego State. Long Beach easily out-distanced Arizona State, 1977 PCAA Champion and rival UC Irvine; and Loyola Marymount University.

In the Biola meet, Cangelosi placed third for the 49ers, clocking in at 25:25.

The spectre of injuries usually depletes a team's talents and strengths during the course of the season, but the 49ers have been fortunate in this regard. Cangelosi is recovering from an off-season groin injury, but judging from his latest performance, Abel expects Cangelosi to be in top form for the PCAA meet. The rest of the team is expected to be healthy and in top condition.

Highly Ranked BYU Next

One of the top teams ever to visit Orange County, national powerhouse Brigham Young University, will be the 49ers opponent next Friday night at Anaheim Stadium.

The Cougars, now 7-0 on the year after a 59-7 demolition of New Mexico, is the leading passing team in the country, led by their outstanding signal-caller Marc Wilson.

Wilson passed for four touchdowns and ran for another score to lead the Cougars to last week's win. BYU was

rated 11th in the national polls last week.

BYU, which has scored 50 or more points in a game twice this year, has outscored its opponents 296 to 87 in its first seven games.

The Cougars, who have won the two previous meetings between the two teams, won the last contest, 30-27 in 1977.

The largest crowd of the season is anticipated for the 7:30 p.m. game but plenty of good seats remain. For more information, call the 49er ticket office at (213) 498-5276.

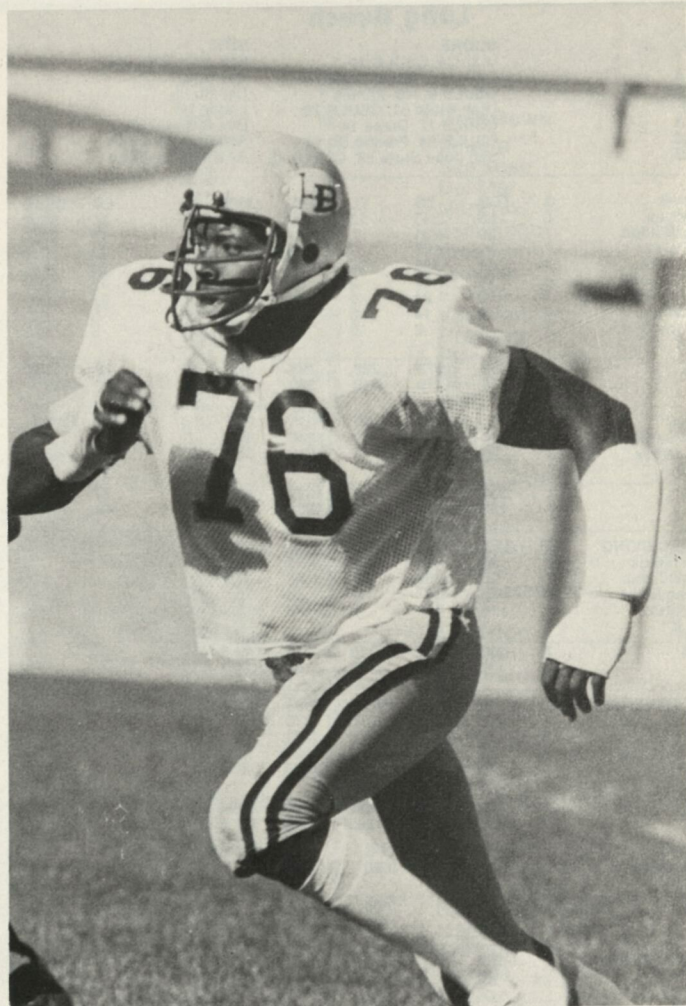

Rudolph Anchors 49er Defensive Line

When the California State University, Long Beach 49ers were turning out last spring, Head Coach Dave Currey said Junior College transfer Ben Rudolph had All American size and ability. "He needs confidence and has really shown improvement this spring after making the switch to defense," said the third year coach. "He is a definite pro prospect to watch."

Now, six months later, Rudolph said he has gained confidence. "I was worried when I first came because it was a four year school and I was worried about playing a new position (he moved from offensive tackle to defensive tackle). I also wasn't sure how fast I could pick things up, but the season is going pretty good and I'm gaining confidence all the time," he said.

His statistics through the 49ers first six games indicate why Rudolph's confidence is budding. He ranked fourth on the squad in defense, following the Fresno game, with 41 total tackles, one pass deflection and four tackles for loss of yardage, throwing opponents for a total loss of 52 yards.

Currey said he thinks the highly touted recruit has gained a lot of confidence thus far. "He is learning the position and getting better in each game," commented the coach.

Rudolph came to Long Beach from College of the Sequoias in Visalia, California where he played offensive tackle. He was a Junior College All American last fall and was first team All-State and All Conference as well. His junior college feats impressed many scouts and Rudolph was recruited by USC, UCLA, Alabama,

Colorado, Tennessee, Nebraska and Oregon State, among others.

"I came to Long Beach because I thought I'd have a better chance of playing than if I went somewhere else," he said. "Also, my teammate, Terry Bolar went to high school with me at Fairhope in Alabama, and he talked me into coming to College of the Sequoias, and then he came here so I did too."

The adjustment from a junior college to a four year school, he said, was not that difficult. "Junior College football prepares you for four year college ball. The coaches are pretty similar and run the same type of game," he added.

Rudolph's goals for the 1979 season were to make the second team All PCAA and to get 12 quarterback sacks. He believes he is "right on time,"

Four Returning Starters, Top JC Recruits Spur 49er Hopes

With four starters returning and an impressive corps of junior college recruits, there is great optimism among the members of the California State University, Long Beach men's basketball squad as they prepare for the 1979-80 campaign.

That campaign is less than a month away as the 49ers aim for the prestigious Great Alaskan Shootout featuring Kentucky, Bradley, Iona, Texas A & M and University of Alaska.

Home games at the Long Beach Arena will feature such powerhouses as Marquette, Brigham Young University, Wichita State and traditional PCAA rivals Utah State, Cal State Fullerton and University of Pacific.

Long Beach was among the nation's top 20 ranked clubs for almost a month last year, going as high as No. 11 before a rash of mid-season injuries resulted in a slump. The 49ers, however, won five of their last six games, finishing 16-12 and have added a lot of fire power for the coming season.

"I think we can be one of the top teams in the West," predicts Tex Winter, who is the ninth winningest active coach and a veteran of over 30 years in the collegiate game. "An awful lot depends on the kind of start we get. It will be tough to duplicate last year's start (nine straight wins) because we play on the road early instead of playing our first five games at home. But we should have more depth."

Winter will have two of the nation's finest forwards in seniors Michael Wiley (6-9) and Francois Wise (6-6), who both gained All-Pacific Coast Athletic Association mention last year and are All-America candidates.

Wiley, notes Winter, is one of the quickest big men he has ever coached and is an excellent shooter, averaging 17 points as a junior. Wise is a powerful inside player who was among the nation's top rebounders a year ago before injuring an ankle against Marquette. He averaged 12 points and 10.3 rebounds on the season to lead the PCAA for the second year in a row in that department.

"Wiley has tremendous speed up and down the floor, is an excellent jumper with a great shooting touch" explains Winter. "Wise is a top defensive player and very strong inside. Both of these players have been standouts for the past three years and are as good as any two forwards in the nation."

Two other starters are back in sophomores Craig Hodges (6-3) at guard and Kevin Tye (6-10) at center. Hodges averaged 10 points a game as a rookie and was honorable mention Freshman All-American. He was also a member of the West team for the Olympic Development Festival in Colorado Springs during the summer. Tye gave the 49ers a physical post man and came on late last season.

Two key reserves are also back in sophomore forward Phil Gary (6-5) and senior swingman Steve Hair (6-3), who played prominent roles coming in off the bench last season. Both are explosive leapers, and Hair started one game last year and scored 16 points and had 10 rebounds.

Most of the improvement, however, will come from five JC transfers and one high school recruit that Winter feels will blend well with the returning talent.

Two All-State junior college players—forward Kelly Johnson (6-6) and swingman Craig Dykema (6-7)—are both excellent shooters and were the Most Valuable Players in their respective conferences last season.

Johnson, who played at Citrus College, led the state in scoring with an average of 28.5 points per game and in field goal accuracy, hitting 65% of his shots. He is also a seven-foot high jumper.

Dykema averaged 18 points at Long Beach City College, but Winter was just as impressed with his playmaking abilities.

In addition, 6-11 Jeff Fagan from Cypress JC will add more size to the center position and six-foot guard Dave Shutts, also from Cypress, is the team quarterback that Winter was looking for during the recruiting season.

Another top JC player, Ray Reeves (6-1) from Los Angeles City College, will also be available after making all-conference and averaging 16.3 points and shooting 62% from the field. He may be as good a shooter as the 49ers will have.

At forward, 6-6 Craig Lack was also recruited after averaging 20 points per-game as a senior at Bishop Montgomery High in Torrance.

"Our recruiting, especially in the JC ranks, was a big plus for us," says Winter. "I feel we've recruited to our needs, and in that respect, this may be as good a group of recruits as I've ever had."

Although Winter does lose guard Rickey Williams, who was the PCAA's leading scorer a year ago, he feels his second Long Beach team will be better in other ways.

Tight End House Makes Presence Known

Year-in and year-out, the top pass receivers in college football are the fleet wide receivers—the sticky-fingered men who leap, dive and do all sorts of gyrations in the air while making 50 to 100 catches a season.

But in 1979, University of the Pacific's Mike House is out to change all of that. House, a senior tight end, describes his running style as "a fast plod," and he usually doesn't get his 6-foot-3, 240 pound frame too far off the ground. At best, he rates himself "seven on a scale of 10 at catching the ball."

Nonetheless, House has terrorized opposing defenses this year, to the tune of 42 catches and 460 yards in seven games. His average of six receptions per game ranks him among the Top Five nationally and second in the PCAA.

The dominance of wide receivers in most pass catching categories is documented by the fact that only three are currently rated among the NCAA's

Top 20 and in the last decade (and probably more), no tight end has led the country in receiving.

Even House is surprised by the numbers he has amassed thus far.

"I never expected to get as high as No. 2 in the country," said House, "but I've been open a lot and Sander (Sander Markel, UOP's freshman QB) throws well."

"If I wanted to, I could probably find a place in pro football," said House, "but there are a lot of pros and cons."

"Foremost among the pros are the obvious financial advantages and the fact that I would never second myself about going pro. But I'm not sure how dedicated I could be or if I'd have enough self-motivation."

The Houses have an infant daughter, Jennifer, and if the decision comes about to forego a shot at the pros, he would like to get into some type of ranching or farming.

But before he does any of that, Mike House will likely make sure that UOP's

remaining three opponents become well-acquainted with the fact that tight ends do indeed catch the football.

Long Beach On Telecasts

Cal State University, Long Beach will be featured on two of the remaining four Pacific Coast Athletic Association Game of the Week Telecasts on KWHY, Channel 22 in Los Angeles.

The next game, featuring Cal State Fullerton and Utah State will be telecast on a delayed basis tomorrow (Sunday) at noon. Pacific and San Jose State will be featured on Nov. 18.

The 49ers games with Wichita State on Nov. 17 and Cal State Fullerton, Nov. 24 will be shown on a delayed basis the following day at noon.

noting, "I'm doing all right but I should have done a lot better. This is the first year I've played defense since high school and I'm still making mistakes. I'm also slow to react to the ball sometimes, but I think my season is coming along pretty good."

Currey agrees. "PCAA selections are made at the end of the year and are determined by the visiting coaches, but I certainly think Ben is playing well enough to make the conference team as a defensive tackle."

Rudolph thinks his experience as an offensive tackle, while it may have stifled his defensive play at first, will help him more in the long run because it helps him to better read opposing offenses.

The quiet young man from Alabama, despite setting individual goals for himself, believes in the team concept and said his philosophy is, "We have to win together and we have to lose together. Everyone on the team takes it that way too." To this point, he said, "the team is good." No, he changed his mind, "they're great."

There are several team leaders, according to Rudolph, but, "I look to Herman Parker, Jay Caffey and of course Mark Fata as leaders. Fata already has over 100 tackles and he has a chance to make 200 this season. He might even break a few records," he added.

The 49ers 17-14 win over Drake was what Rudolph considers his best game. "I had 12 tackles and an interception. My best play of the season was in that game when I close-lined their quarterback from the blind side," he said.

Rudolph anticipates a tough game against Pacific tonight, but said he just plans to go out and give it his best shot like he does at every game.

"That's the only way you can become a better player," he said.

"I believe we have a better team. Our defense leads the conference against the rush, so we should do pretty good," he said, refraining from making any kind of brash prediction.

While he wouldn't prophesize on tonight's match, Rudolph did say he thought the 49ers could finish the season without losing any more games. "It depends on if we get some breaks. We got some bad calls against the University of Utah and probably should have won that game. We got bad breaks and lost, but hopefully, we'll win all of the rest."

Only a junior, Rudolph still has another year of eligibility. His goal is to make All American and said it's within his reach, provided he has a good season.

Currey believes Rudolph has a good chance too. "I tell my players to take

one game at a time and one play at a time and that's what Ben does.

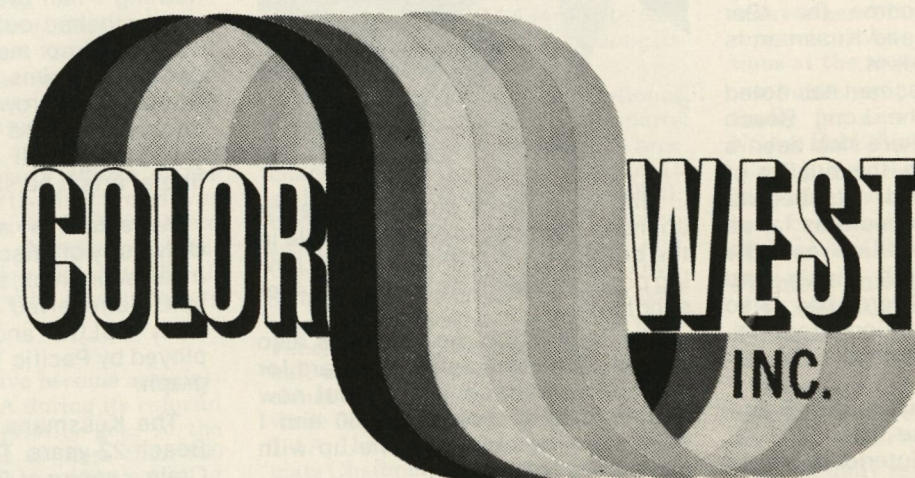
"The key to Ben Rudolph," continued the coach, "is he's beginning to mature as a college football player and that's very important. He plays each play as if it could be the last one."

Barring unforeseen circumstances, Rudolph has many plays and many games ahead of him. His long range goal is to play in the pros, and Currey feels he is a likely prospect.

"Right now, I'd say my chances are 50-50. I need to gain about 30 pounds (he's 6-6 and weighs 260 now) and keep my speed. Rudolph is very fast for his size, running the 40 yard dash in 4.9 seconds."

A versatile athlete, Rudolph played both football and basketball in high school. He decided to pursue his football career, thinking it was more promising. "I miss basketball, but only sometimes, because I like playing football. It's the sport I want to play."

Rudolph is glad he came to Cal State Long Beach, noting it will help him reach his future goals. "The coaches here are helping to prepare me for a chance with the pros. They know that's what I want to do, and they're doing what they can to help me. Coach Currey is really a great coach to be around," he said. And to hear Coach Currey talk, the feeling is mutual.

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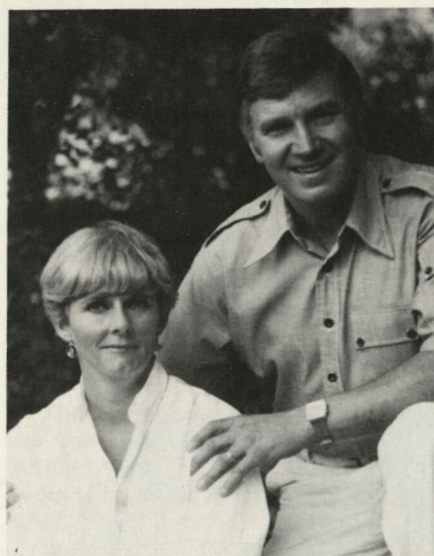
BOOSTER of the WEEK

PCAA Wrap-Up

Pacific Coast Athletic Association teams were 1-1 last week in inter-sectional action, with Cal State Fullerton posting a 49-3 decision victory over Cal State Northridge and Utah State falling to Arizona State, 28-14.

Fresno State, which two weeks ago dropped a 24-14 decision to Cal State University, Long Beach, bounced back to defeat Pacific, 33-10, in a PCAA contest.

The Titans, now 2-5 overall, rolled up 29 points in the first half to record their ninth win in 10 meetings against the Matadors.

It was the last meeting in the near future for the two teams. Fullerton officials are trying to replace Northridge

with University of Arizona on the Titan schedule next year.

Fullerton got off to its lead on the longest pass in the school history when quarterback Terry Hanslik connected with wide receiver Jan Deloch on an 89-yard touchdown play.

Arizona State used three touchdowns by quarterback Mark Malone, including a 98-yard run, to post the win over Utah State, which is a half game behind San Jose State with a 2-0-1 PCAA record. (San Jose is 3-0-1, but has a bye this week, whereas Utah State plays a conference game against Fullerton.)

The victory, before 67,219 fans and a regional television audience, was the fifth straight for the Sun Devils as they

raised their season record to 5-2. Utah State dropped to 4-3-1 overall.

Quarterback Malone connected on 16 of 22 passes for 163 yards while gaining another 133 yards on the ground.

Fresno State, now 3-5 overall and 1-2 in the league, used an effective defense to drop the Tigers of Pacific, this week's 49er opponent.

Pacific dropped to 3-5 overall and 0-3 in the conference.

Besides tonight's 49er-Tiger game, Nevada Las Vegas plays at Fresno State and Cal State Fullerton plays at Utah State in the PCAA Television Game of the Week. That contest will be replayed tomorrow at noon on station KWHY (CHannel 22) in Los Angeles.

Collegiate athletic voice

NCAA serves nation's schools

Progress and growth have become familiar companions for the National Collegiate Athletic Association during its first 73 years as the major governing organization for intercollegiate athletics in the United States.

A call for stricter control of college football by President Theodore Roosevelt because of the violence in the game brought together 13 institutions in 1905, formulating the original communications base for college athletics.

This initial body called itself the Intercollegiate Athletic Association and was officially constituted March 31, 1906. In 1910, the name was changed to the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

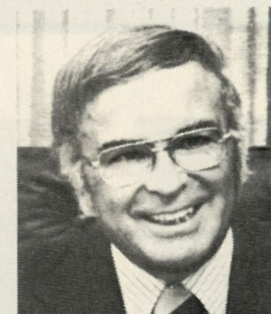
Seven progressive decades have molded this original 13-member body into a membership today of more than 860 colleges, universities, conferences and affiliated organizations.

Administration and rules interpretation occupied early efforts of the organization. Shortly after World War II, the NCAA adopted legislative and executive powers, changing its function into one dealing with virtually all issues concerned with intercollegiate athletics.

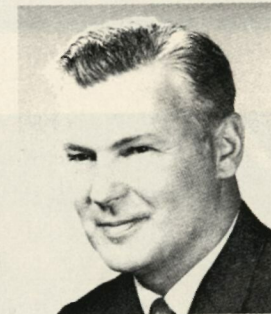
Service first

Many things have become associated with the NCAA during its colorful history. Highest priority goes to the service it provides to more than 860 members, acting as the true "voice" of college athletics today.

Each January the NCAA membership comes together at the annual Convention to review, propose and amend legislation. The Convention presents the opportunity for the nation's institutions of higher learning to speak and act on athletic matters at the national level.

Acting in the best interests of its membership, the NCAA strives to perform these specific functions among its many other responsibilities:

- Conducts 43 annual National Collegiate Championships in 19 sports for three separate divisions. Three championships (Division I, Division II and Division III) are held in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, swimming, tennis, outdoor track and wrestling. Two championships (Division I and Divisions II-III) are staged in gymnastics, ice hockey and lacrosse. Fencing, skiing, indoor track, volleyball and water polo hold single National Collegiate Championships, while football is contested in Divisions I-AA, II and III. The National Collegiate Championship dates back to 1883 in tennis; and during this 76-year history, more than 85,000 student-athletes have competed in these events, with more than 10,000 earning the coveted title of "National Collegiate Champion."

- Maintains 13 rules committees to formulate, copyright and publish rules of play for the government of colle-

giate sports. Members of these and many other committees are elected by representatives of member institutions at the annual Convention.

- Publishes "Official Guides" annually for nine sports through the NCAA Publishing Service.

- Collects, compiles and distributes the official statistics of college football, basketball and baseball through its NCAA Statistics Service.

Problem solver

- Conducts studies as a means of developing solutions to athletic programs.

- Represents the membership in legislative and regulatory matters on the state and Federal levels.

- Annually selects the College Athletics Top Ten and the Theodore Roosevelt ("Teddy") Award—the Association's highest honor.

- Administers an honors program which annually awards 80 postgraduate scholarships to recognize outstanding senior student-athletes who have excelled in the classroom as well as athletics. This scholarship was increased from \$1,000 to \$1,500 in 1975-76. The program has provided \$1,144,000 to 1,024 recipients since its inception in the 1964-65 academic year.

- Promotes and participates in international sports planning and competition through membership in the United States Olympic Committee, Amateur Basketball Association of the USA, Track and Field Association of the USA, and the United States Baseball, Gymnastics and Wrestling Federations, as well as through NCAA-sponsored competition with Japan.

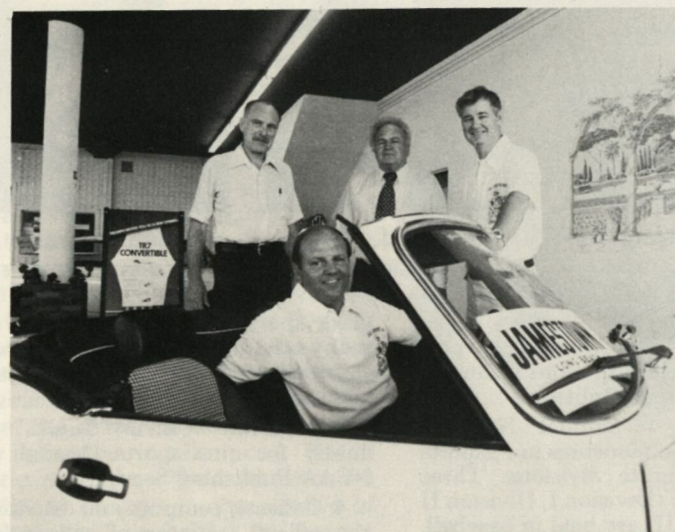
- Maintains more than 60 full-time staff members at its national headquarters in Mission, Kansas, under the supervision of Executive Director Walter Byers.

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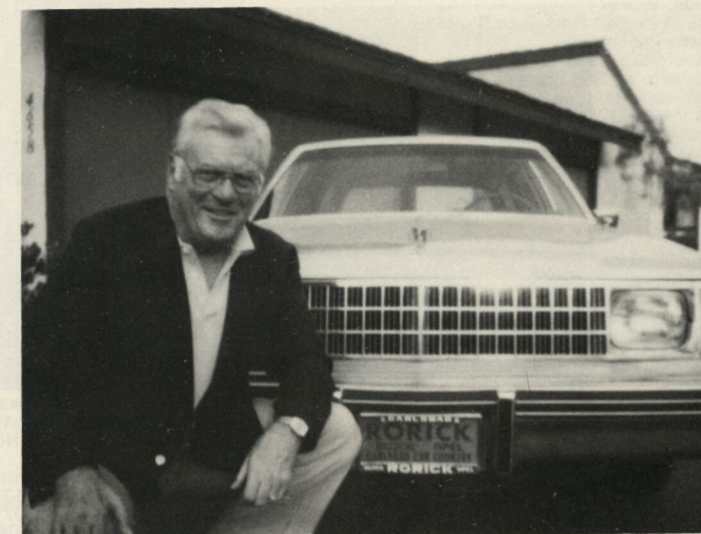

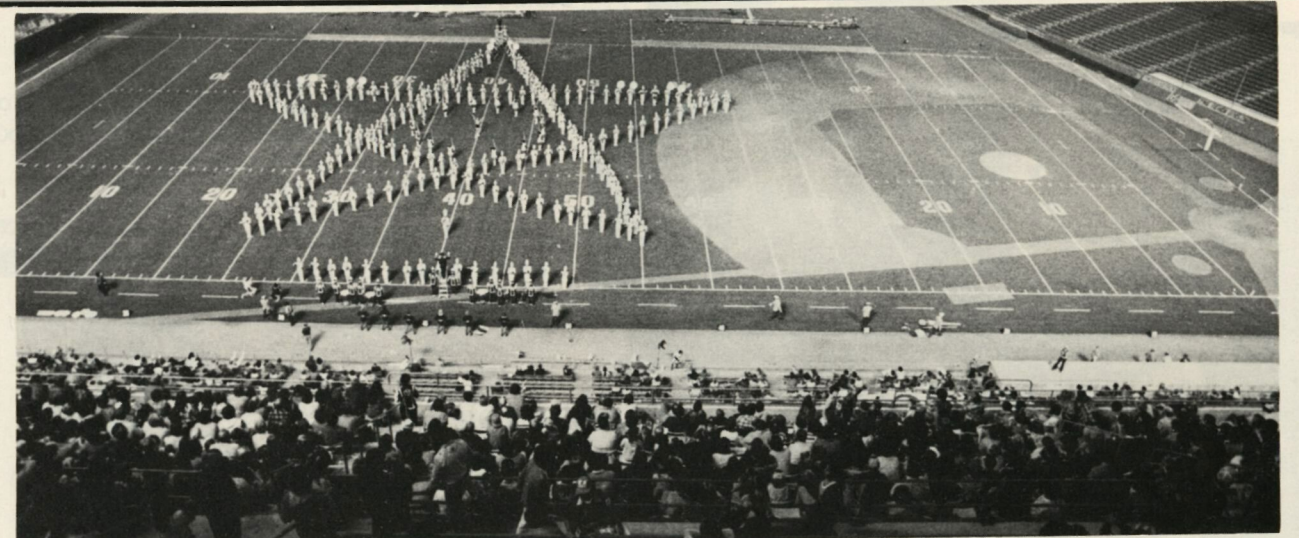

nationally-recognized performer; and drum major Max Nardoni, who has served as an instructor for aspiring drum majors throughout California.

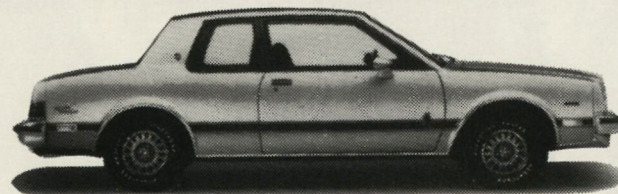
During pre-game and halftime performances, the band is complemented by the Goldusters, a precision unit that adds to the excitement of 49er football games.

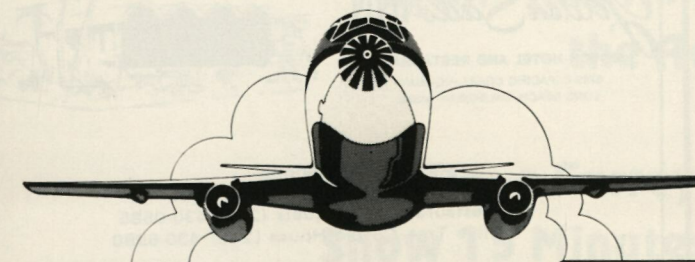
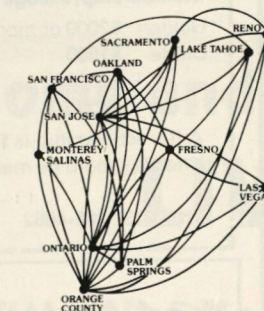
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THE 49er ATHLETIC FOUNDATION

Now in its eighth year, the 49er Athletic Foundation annually provides the financial backing necessary for grant-in-aid scholarships for deserving student athletes at California State University, Long Beach.

Through the generosity of alumni and friends, the 49er Foundation has made it possible for Long Beach to continue its tradition of excellence in Division 1 intercollegiate athletics in both men's and women's sports.

A major six week fund drive is held each spring as the focal point of the Foundation's efforts to raise scholarship monies, and every year the drive has been more successful than before. This past year almost \$250,000 was raised under the direction of Drive Chairman Mike Colonna, making it the most successful one in the University's history. Not only was more total cash and gifts in kind pledged, but the largest single donation—\$30,000—was made to the scholarship fund by alumna Isabel Patterson.



Jerry Edgmon, a local attorney, is now in his second one-year term as the President of the 49er Foundation, and he is just one of many supporters throughout the community. Current Foundation memberships number 1,100, and this includes those that no longer reside in California yet still feel a strong desire to see Long Beach athletes meet the rising costs of

higher education.

Golden Circle memberships in the Foundation begin at \$500 and a minimum membership is \$25, although contributions of any size are appreciated. All memberships and donations are tax deductible.

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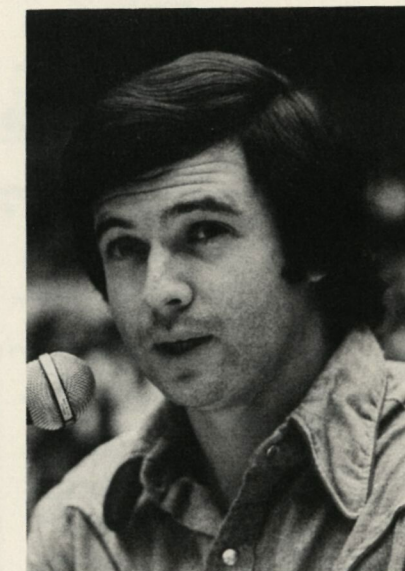
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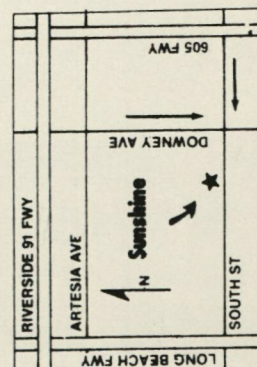
