Portage July 31st

Dear Aunt

Your very kind letter of July 10 & 15 was rec^d - but I delayed writing you expecting every day to hear from Mary! It is over a month since she left home - and at that time she expected her affair to come off in Sept. and I expected you all to be here at that time - we will surely hear of her soon -

Joanna is much pleased with the Miller prescription you sent her - but her health dont seem to improve at present and she is very nervous -

Your letter to her we received last night - with the medicine - for which we are thankful - she says she will be pleased to come to Prairie and see you all as soon as she feels able and one of us will come with her - she was unable to sleep last night and today has had one of those nervous prostrations which leaves her so weak and faint, and alarms me so much,

My a letter I had from your father this week the weather has been as hot where he is as here - but he is very well and very comfortable -

David's health is much better, but still he thinks he will try the nitric medicine, and Mary will also try it, we all seem to like it.

Now Dad about my visit to Prairie I don't know what to think I told David the other day that I thought the attempt would be something like trying to move the house, although I would be much pleased to see you all again but we must wait until Joanna feels better -
