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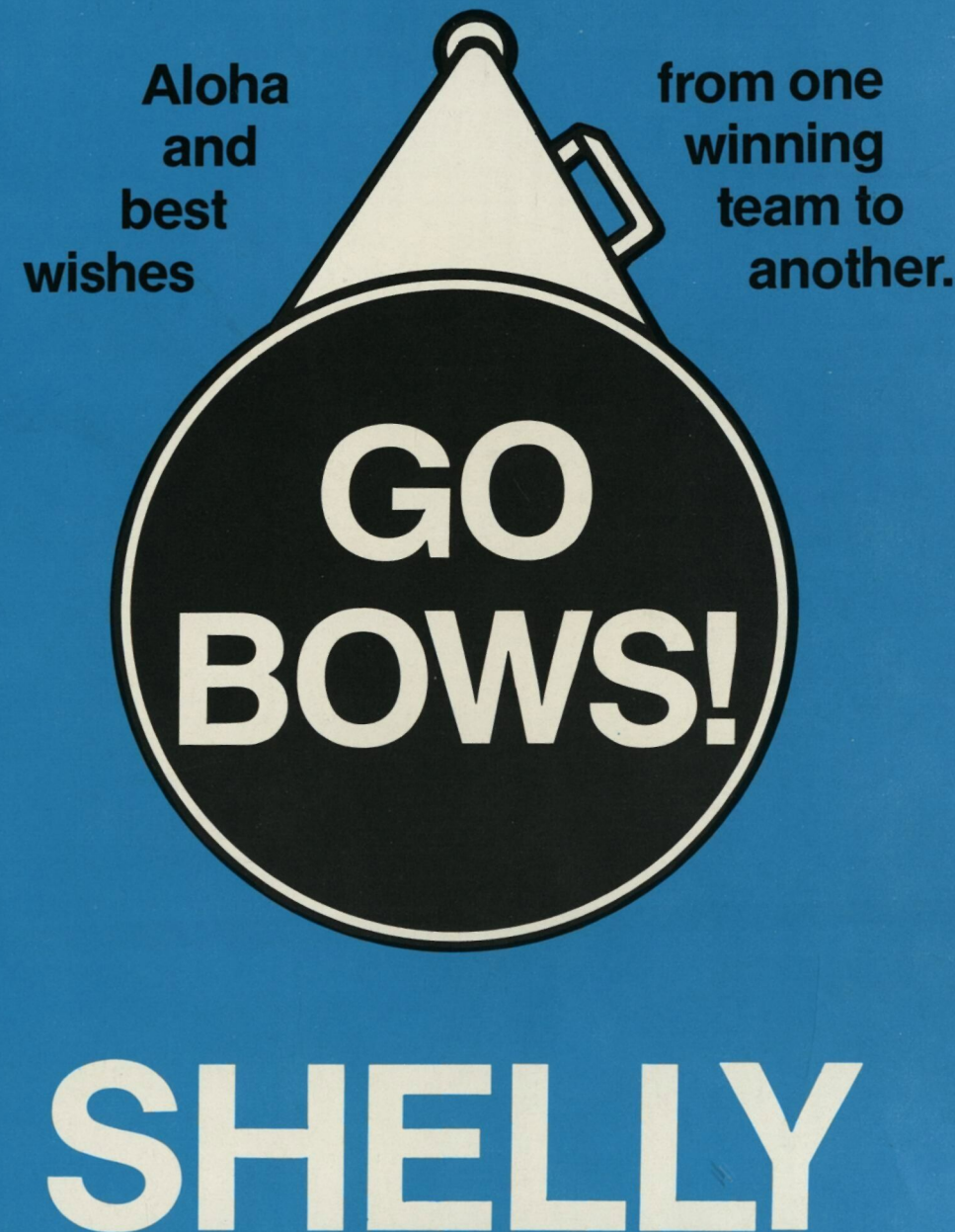

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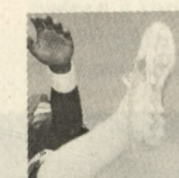

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Tonight's Game

The University of Hawaii's pass defense will be put to a stiff test tonight when the Rainbow Warriors host University of the Pacific in a non-conference game.

UOP's quarterback, Grayson Rogers, last week hit on 22 of 35 tosses for 236 yards and two touchdowns as the Tigers defeated Idaho, 24-13.

Pacific is coached by Bob Toledo, a star quarterback at San Francisco State in 1966 and 1967, who set eight NCAA college division records, six of which still stand, in his final year. That season was one of his finest, completing 211 of 396 passes for 3,513 yards and 45 touchdowns.

Rogers, who stands 6-4 and weighs 213, redshirted last season after transferring from Stanford. In two junior varsity games at Stanford,

he completed 53 of 95 passes for 555 yards and four touchdowns.

Rogers will have several fine receivers in Rainey Meszaros, Rob Wilson and Paul Schreiner. Meszaros, a 6-0, 175-pound sophomore, has caught 11 for 189 yards and one touchdown. Wilson, a 5-10, 180-pound senior, has caught seven for 99 yards. The tight end, 6-2, 225 junior Schreiner, has caught six for 61 yards.

The Tigers have a big offensive interior line, headed by left tackle Rick Penn, a 6-6, 261-pounder, and right tackle Rick Howard, 6-7, 240, senior.

On defense, left tackle Jeff Bednarek, a 6-4, 260-pound senior, anchors a relatively young 5-2 defense. Only three seniors start on defense while only one start on

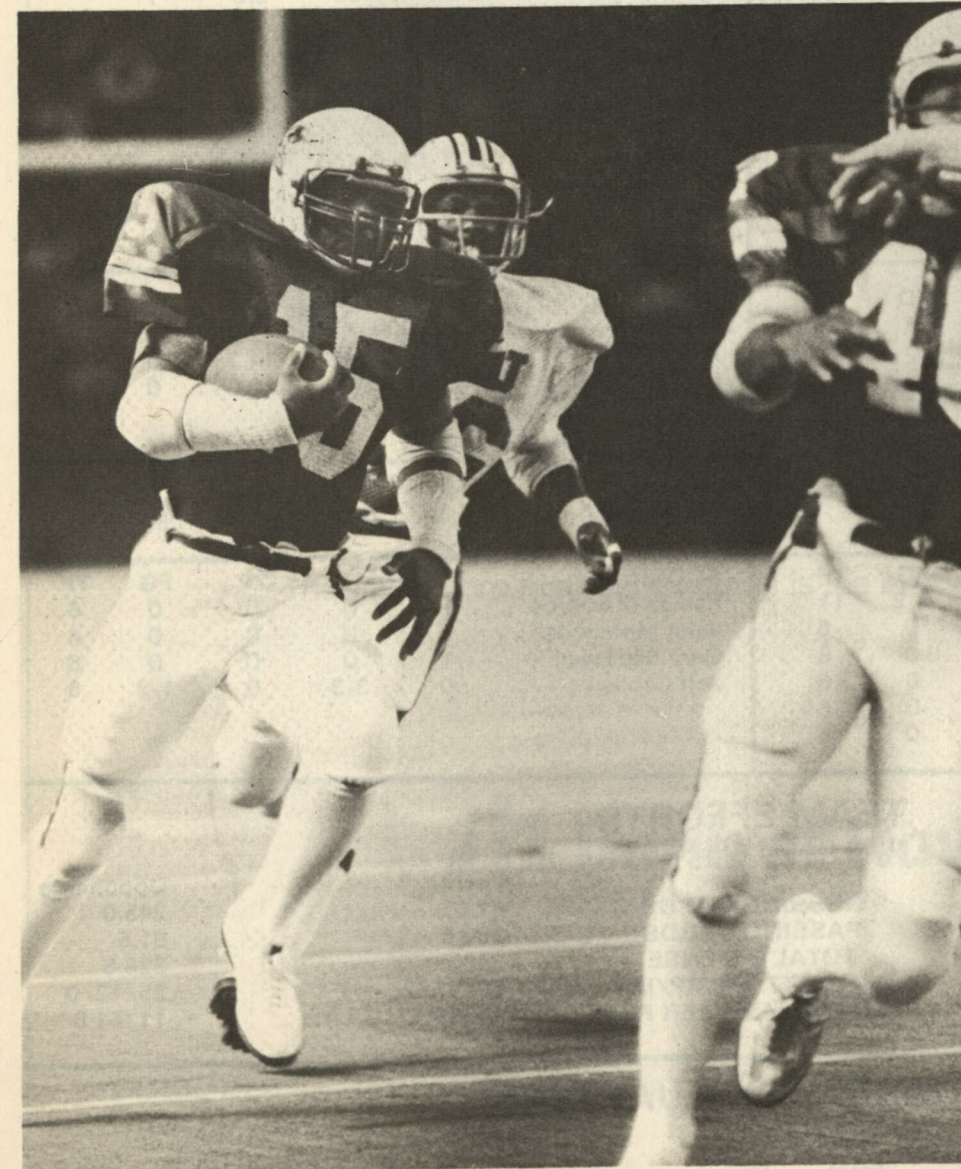
offense.

For the season, Rogers has hit on 37 of 67 with two interceptions for 475 yards. His backup, Harley Miller, has completed eight of 13 for 92 yards.

Hawaii did not come out of the Abilene Christian game sound. Head Coach Dick Tomey said there were more people injured in that one game than at any time in the last two years.

Tomey will need everyone healthy for this encounter as Pacific has won the last three games in the series dating back to 1939. The Tigers hold a whopping advantage in the series, 14-5.

Although the Rainbows won handily, 41-0 over Abilene Christian before a record home opening crowd of 46,649, Tomey wasn't satisfied 100 per cent.

"Basically, to tell you the truth," he said after the game, "in the first half, I wasn't pleased at all at the way we played. The intensity with which we played in the first half will not win."

However, Tomey was happy with his wide receivers, an area where there were a lot of questions with the loss of three starters through graduation. "I thought those were the best catches I've seen since I've been at the University of Hawaii," Tomey said.

New wide receivers Merv Lopes, Ron Pennick, Joe Nobles and Shephard Killen all looked good in catching passes.

Toledo is no stranger to UH football, having served as the secondary coach at USC when the Trojans came into town in 1978. USC won, 21-5, after holding a 7-5 lead midway through the fourth quarter. The Trojans were national champions that year.

"Hawaii is a much more experienced team and its staff has been together longer than ours. Offensively, they do a lot of different things, like we do, so we'll be able to practice against the type of offense. They have an outstanding offensive line. Gary Allen is an excellent tailback and their kicking game is outstanding," said Toledo earlier this week.

Tomey, who hasn't beaten UOP, praised Toledo in "improving their program by leaps and bounds." And Tomey acknowledged their passing. "They will present us with a tremendous problem with their great ability to throw the ball," he said.

Tonight we'll find out what Hawaii's defense can do against one of the better passers in the nation.

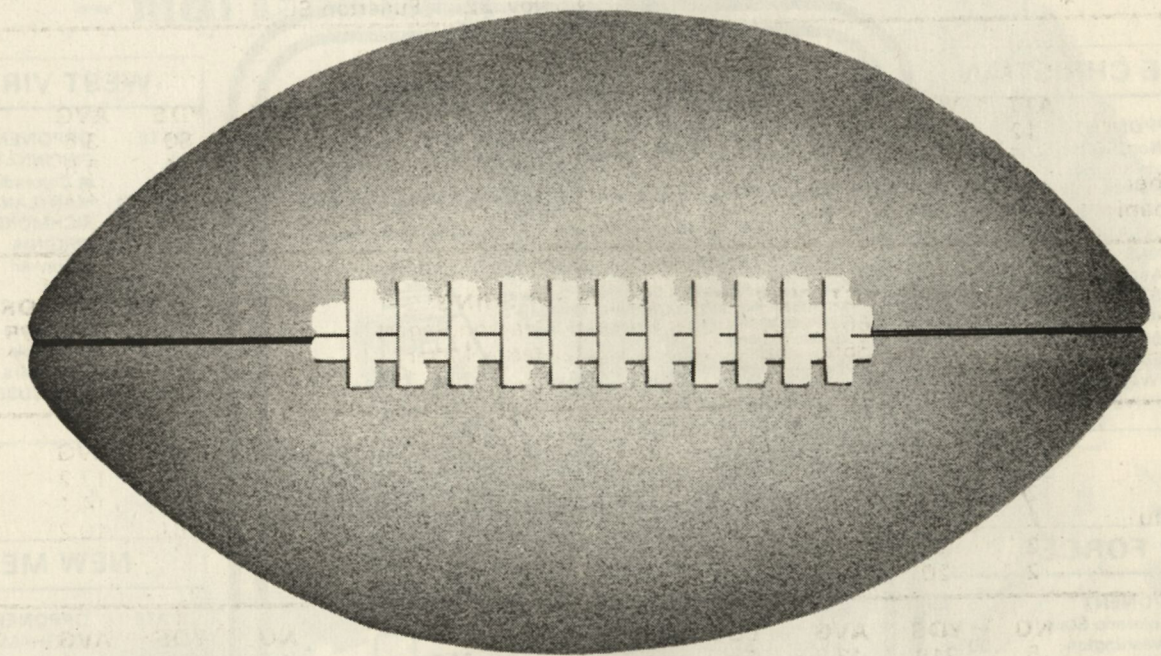

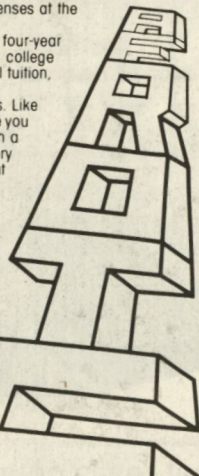

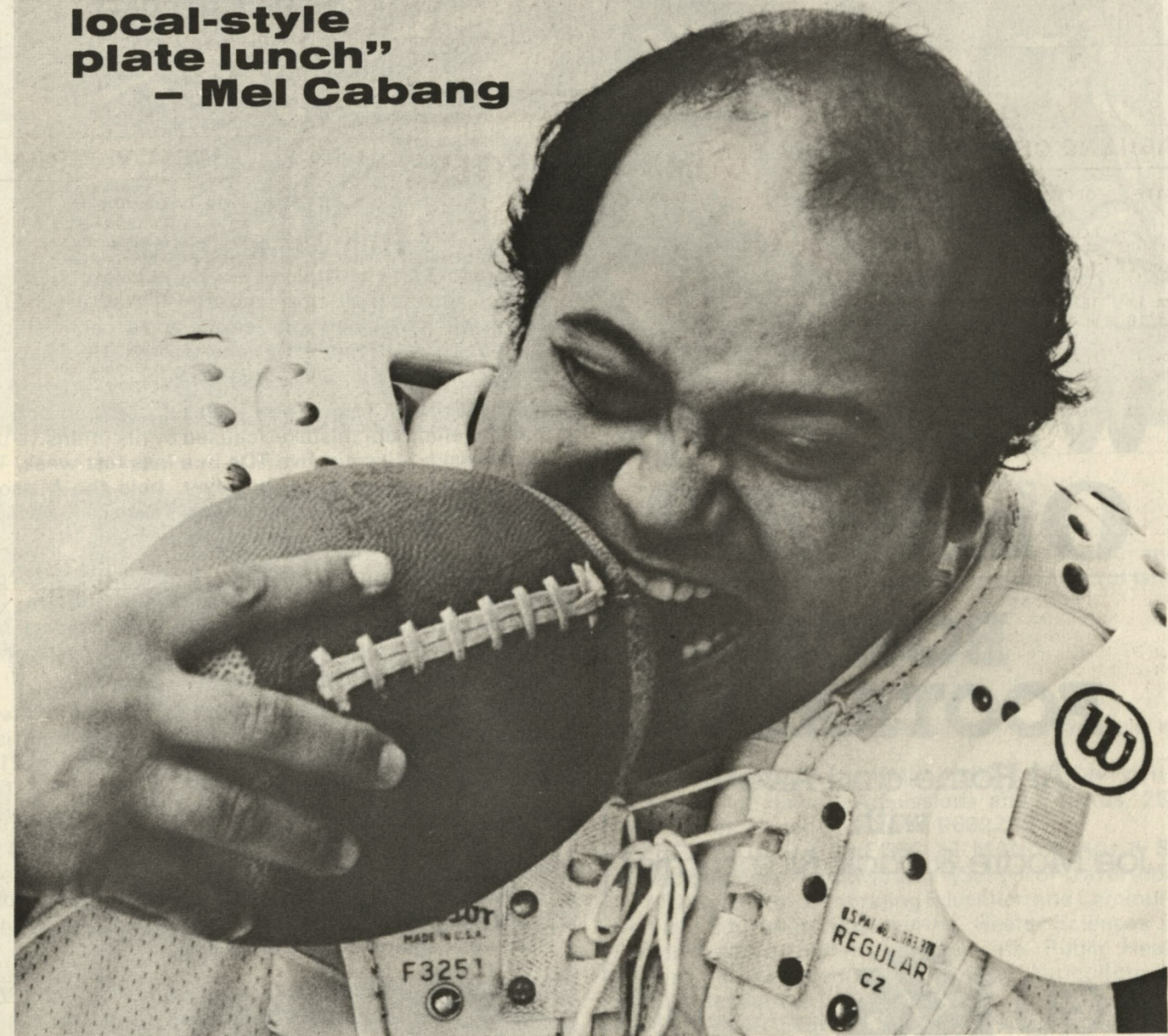

THIS WEEK'S GAMES

Colorado State at Arizona — The Wildcats open their season against the Rams, who are 1-1. New coach Larry Smith will have a new quarterback and a tough defense. CSU has Steve Fairchild at quarterback. He's had two games in excess of 300 yards passing.

New Mexico at Texas Tech — Coach Joe Morrison will have to eliminate mistakes caused by his offensive unit which gave Missouri five TDs in a loss last week. The gambling Lobo defense, however, held the Missouri offense to two first half first downs. Texas Tech has won the last five meetings between these two.

Brigham Young at Wisconsin — This is BYU's second game ever against a Big Ten team and its first appearance ever in Big Ten territory. The Cougars lost to Indiana last year in the Holiday Bowl. Wisconsin dropped its season opener, 12-6, to Purdue.

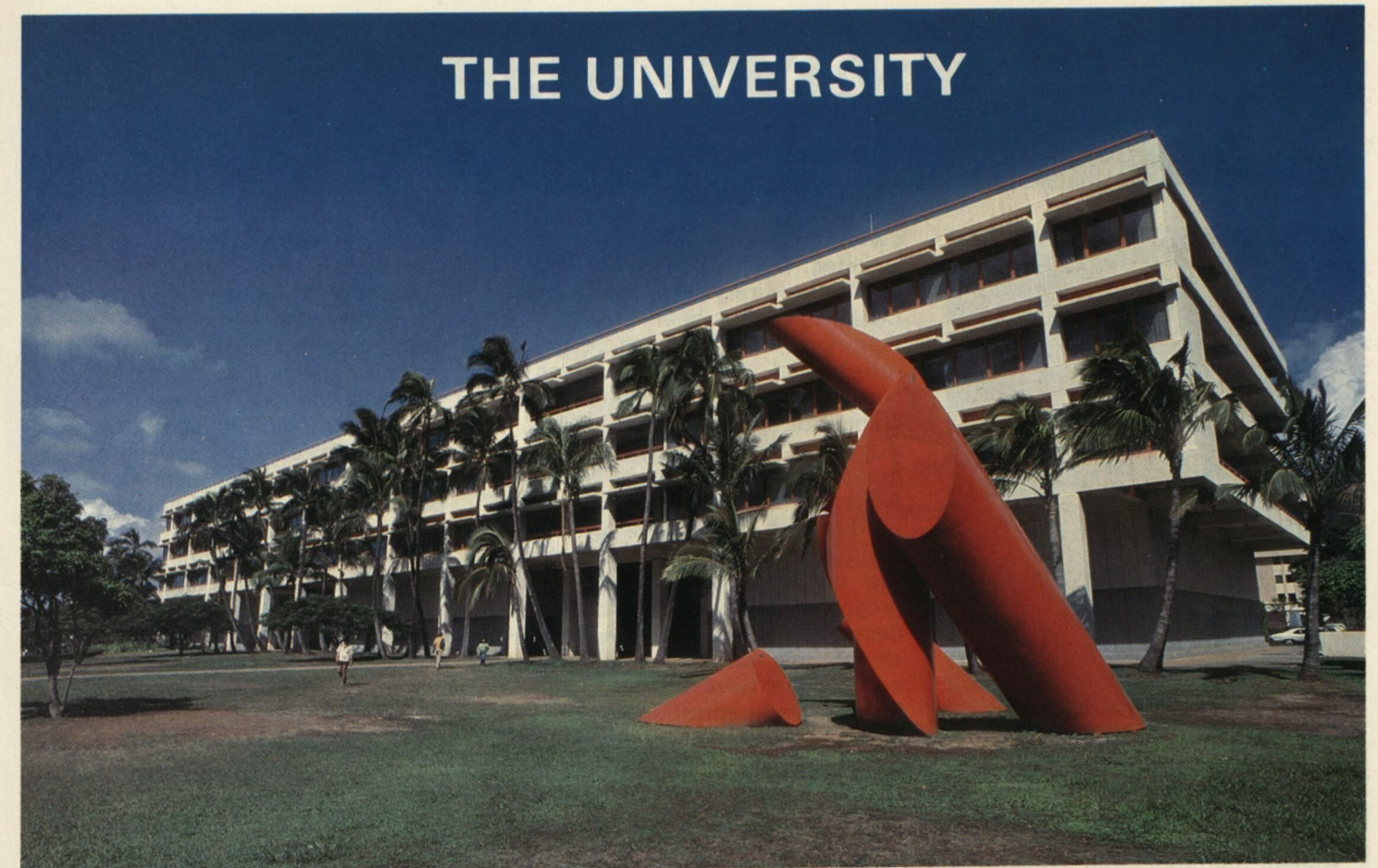
Richmond at Wyoming — Two programs with "new" stamped all over them collide in Laramie. Richmond is 2-0 under new coach Dal Shealy and last week won, 21-7, at Villanova for the first road victory in 19 tries. Wyoming has a hard-hitting club reminding the fans of the "old days" in a dominating win over Oregon State.

North Texas State at Texas-El Paso — Texas-El Paso is hoping the home field will be kind after two weekends of travels and losses. The Miners managed only a field goal last week against New Mexico State.

#UNLV at Utah — This one counts in the WAC standings for Utah. UNLV likes to get up for WAC teams, as the Rebels are still trying to secure league membership. Utah, figured to be a WAC contender, hasn't got untracked this year, especially on defense and the Rebels boast a potent offense as usual.

***San Diego State at Air Force** — Two teams trying to get out of the WAC cellar collide at Air Force. San Diego State, a pre-season pick to be a WAC contender, can ill afford another conference loss after BYU dumped the Aztecs last week. Air Force already is two down and is after its first WAC win ever.

Hawaii has long been considered fertile ground for an outstanding, Division I athletic program. The proper elements have long existed, but it has taken someone with Nagel's rare combination of talents to finally pull things together.

His four-year tenure as athletic director has been one of the most exciting periods in UH history. Under his direction, the athletic program has made considerable strides in terms of facilities, scheduling, organization, fund-raising and personnel.

Athletic facilities have improved rapidly since Nagel arrived at the Manoa Campus in July, 1976. The HPE&R Athletic Facility is nearing completion. An Olympic-size

There have been major improvements in other areas as well. Koa Anuenue, the Rainbow scholarship fund-raising organization, has been revitalized to more effectively serve the needs of a dynamic athletic program. The athletic staff has developed into a dedicated, professional unit whose confidence and enthusiasm have been contagious. Nagel's reorganization has added several new staff positions including an academic counselor, strength coach, associate athletic director, assistant trainer, basketball secretary and assistant directors for the Ticket and Sports Information offices. The women's athletic program has been upgraded and expanded and its staff has also grown.

Although Nagel would be quick to downplay his role in building the UH program, his influence has been considerable. His personal qualities and professionalism have helped achieve a strong working relationship with the UH administration, the Hawaii state government, support groups and other elements in the community.

He first achieved prominence as


Nagel returned to college coaching in 1954 as an aide to legendary Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma. He then served three seasons under Red Sanders at UCLA while completing requirements for his degree in law.

He followed that experience with a five-year term as head coach at Iowa, and then accepted the position of athletic director at Washington State. He served in that capacity from 1971 until 1976, when he accepted the top job at the University of Hawaii.

Nagel, who was born May 18, 1927, married his high school-college sweetheart. He and Shirley have five children.

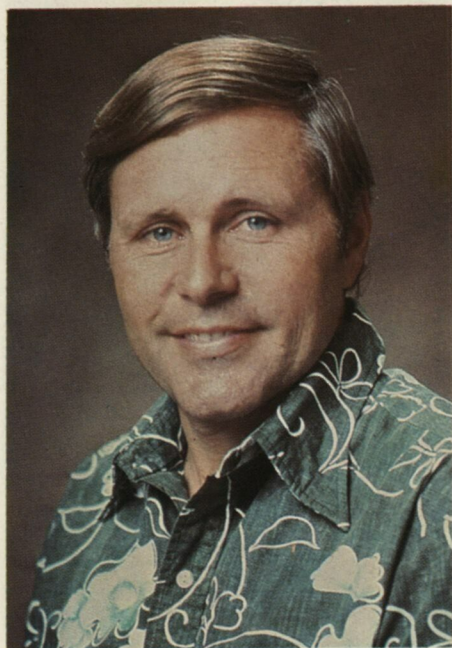

DICK TOMEY

HEAD COACH



He was an assistant coach for 15 years before accepting the University of Hawaii position in June, 1977. He served as an assistant to such notables as John Pont, Pepper Rodgers, Dick Vermeil, Homer Smith, Terry Donahue and Bo Schembechler. The fact that these respected professionals employed Dick Tomey, attests to his abilities.

An even greater testimony is the refreshing change he has managed to stimulate in the UH football program. He has collected an outstanding coaching staff, which has been able to recruit more quality athletes than ever before. His players have been inspired and inspiring. In three seasons his teams have never quit, never conceded a yard, never abandoned a hope of coming back. That, and an extremely imaginative offense, are Tomey's professional trademarks.

Without benefit of a spring practice, Tomey went through his first season, winning five and losing six. That rebuilding team was expected to win just two games.

In 1978, the Rainbow Warriors improved to 6-5. Their schedule featured five conference champions,

including Southern Cal. Hawaii lost to the Trojans 21-5, but the score was 7-5 midway through the fourth quarter.

Any doubt as to Hawaii's Division I respectability should have been erased last season. The Rainbow Warriors placed fourth in the WAC in their first year of membership, enroute to another 6-5 mark. The 'Bows lost to nationally-ranked Temple in the last 23 seconds, and thrilled an ABC-TV audience in the process. A few weeks later, they upset perennial power Arizona State, 29-17.

Although the success is shared among coaches and athletes, it owes a great debt to the man who is rebuilding the UH football program.

Tomey, a 42-year-old native of Bloomington, Indiana, sees football as a means rather than an end.

"My family and enjoying life are more important to me than football. A lot of things are more important than the game itself," he says. "But football is a great game and has given me a great deal. Football provides an opportunity to teach young people something about living. I really appreciate the relationships I've made through the game. I feel fortunate that I've been able to do something for a living that I really enjoy."

Were it not for those personal rewards, Tomey would be in another profession — perhaps as a sports reporter or broadcaster.

"I enjoy being associated with athletics," he says. "I spent some time during college and after college as a sports broadcaster. If I wasn't coaching football, I'd be doing something like that."

Thus far, coaching football has held his interest for 19 years. He entered the coaching ranks in 1961, after receiving a bachelor's degree in economics from DePauw University. He served under John Pont and Bo Schembechler at Miami (Ohio) from 1961-64, while earning his master's in education. He coached at Northern Illinois in 1964, and at Davidson, under Homer Smith, 1965-66.

In 1967, he moved to Kansas,

serving as an assistant to Pepper Rodgers. He moved with Rodgers to UCLA, where he also worked with Bruin head coaches Dick Vermeil and Terry Donahue. He left the Westwood institution in 1977, to become the 17th head football coach at the University of Hawaii. It has been a mutual admiration arrangement since then.

"My family and I have enjoyed Hawaii more than any place we've ever lived," he says. "I've really enjoyed the people here."

"From a coaching standpoint, it has been a very good situation in terms of relationships between coaches, players, staff and the community. The response of the fans has really been phenomenal. Our following here has continued to grow," he adds.

Attendance at UH home games has grown considerably since Tomey arrived. He took over a program which had drawn an average of 20,236 fans in 1976. Last season, the 'Bows hosted an average home crowd of 37,152.

"I'd say the response of the fans is really a tribute to the players," says Tomey. "We've had as good a total effort from all our athletes as anywhere I've ever been. I'm proud of the way our players have performed during our three seasons."

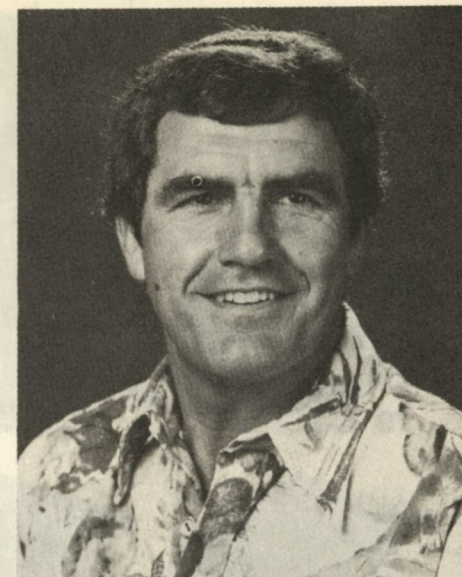
The increasing interest in UH football may be a tribute to the athletes. However, their performance is, in no small way, a tribute to a fine man and an outstanding coach.

Tomey is married (Mary) and has a son (Richie, 10) and a daughter (Angela, 6).

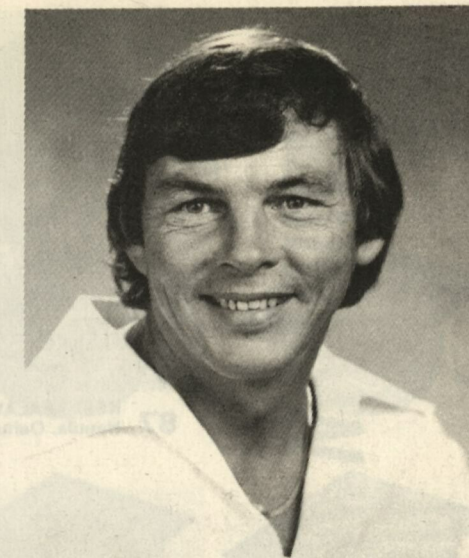

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University Theatre

The John F. Kennedy Theatre is one of the best-known landmarks on the Manoa campus. Located on East-West Road, across from Jefferson Hall, it has been internationally acclaimed for its architectural features and for possessing one of the most unusual stages in the world.

The spacious 636-seat auditorium is the home of the University Theatre which presents six major productions a year that delight both the university community and townspeople alike.

This year the theatre will open its 46th season on October 10 with Moliere's "The Imaginary Invalid," a comedy that pokes a derisive finger at the medical profession. James Brandon plays the title role and Glenn Cannon will direct the production. Both are members of the drama department faculty.

Robert Patrick's contemporary drama, "Kennedy's Children," will open on November 7. The play evolves around six young people who tell of their lives, hopes and dreams in the world that was almost Camelot. Terence Knapp is the director.

Six performances of Henrik Ibsen's "A Doll House" will start on December 5 under the direction of Bernard Dukore. This drama, first presented on stage more than 100 years ago, has been both praised and condemned for espousing feminist ideas.

Richard Brinesley Sheridan's Restoration comedy, "The Rivals," opens on February 27 with Edward Langhans directing.

Phyllis Haskell, Yasuki Sasa and Carl Wolz will present original works in the annual concert of ballet and modern



dance which begins a six-day run on April 3.

Every year, the University theatre presents one Asian play. This year's offering is the Kabuki dance-drama, The Subscription List, which will open on April 24. James Brandon will direct with choreography by Onoe Kikunobu.

The Kennedy Theatre, completed in 1963, was designed by the famous New York architect I.M. Pei in association with the Honolulu firm of Young and Henderson. The stage is wider than the San Francisco Opera House and is well equipped. Perhaps the most interesting feature is the removable "hanamichi," a ramp used in most Kabuki theatres for actors to make their entrances and exits. Other features, such as the elevator-like machinery which permits the forestage to be raised or lowered, combine to make it possible to stage plays from any culture in the world.

In addition to the main auditorium, the stage-left bay of the theatre houses a flexible 160-seat auditorium where experimental and student-directed productions are staged.

Lab Theatre productions scheduled in the coming year include Kathakali dance demonstration on October 29; children's participation play on November 22 and 23; master of fine arts (MFA) thesis play, "Bandit Princess," opening on January 22; young choreographers program opening January 29; MFA children's play opening on February 12, and MFA productions in March and April to be announced later.

University of the Pacific offers a diversity of academic programs that would normally be associated with a much larger university than the 6,200 students attending classes in Stockton, Sacramento and San Francisco.

Pacific was founded in 1851 as California's first chartered University. The independent institution now is comprised of 10 schools and colleges.

Located on the Stockton campus are two liberal arts colleges and schools of music, engineering, education, pharmacy, business and public administration, and a graduate school. The university's dental school is in San Francisco and Pacific's McGeorge School of Law is in Sacramento.

The liberal arts colleges include College of the Pacific, the largest arts and sciences college with more than 50 major programs and Elbert Covell College, the only Spanish-speaking college in the United States.

Throughout Pacific the emphasis is on teaching, although research is recognized as having a need in the various disciplines.

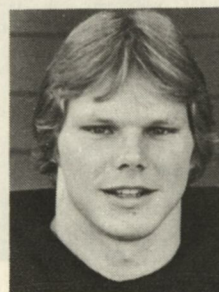
The students at the university are represented on nearly all the policy-making committees, and the Associated Students play an active role in campus life through social and cultural programs for the community.

Stockton is located in the Central Valley of California, 75 miles east of San Francisco and 50 miles south of Sacramento.

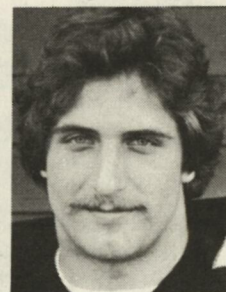


Burns Tower on the UOP Stockton campus, which acts as the administration building.

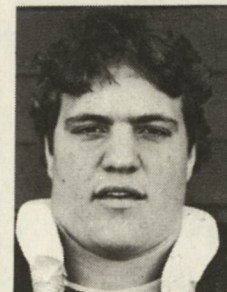

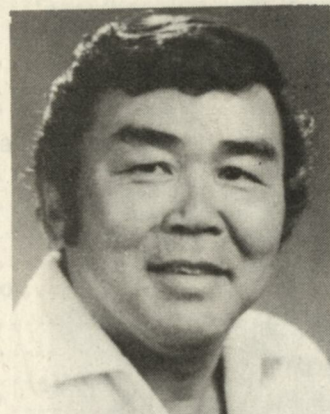
MASAJI SAITO

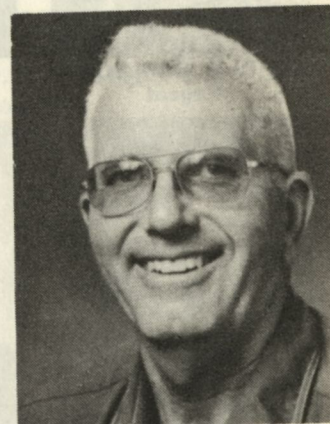
She graduated from George Williams College and earned a doctorate in physical education administration from Northern Colorado. Thompson joined the UH faculty in 1961.

HPE/ATHLETIC FACILITY



Recent visitors to the Makai Campus of UH-Manoa have noticed that the construction of the Health and Physical Education facilities is well underway. The facilities, which will house the offices of the HPE Department, Intramurals and Athletics are nearing completion.

The University received approval from the Hawaii Legislature in 1978 for the building of Phase I, which includes two gyms, studio space for wrestling and dance and a training room. Three phases are planned, with the final two pending approval by the Legislature. Total cost of the facility is estimated at \$12 million.

The initial phase of the facility will be three stories with a ramp connected to the already existing parking structure leading to the upper campus.

The ground floor will house the offices of the athletic department, meeting rooms, lockers, showers and training rooms as well as one of the gyms. The second floor will be the offices of the Health and Physical Education department.

The third floor will hold offices for the coaches of the men's and women's sports.

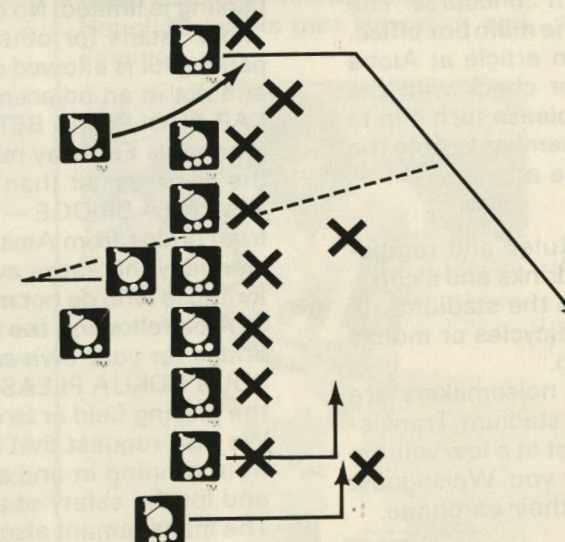
The new facility will also increase student use tremendously for intramurals and general recreation. With three gyms available at the completion of the facilities, time usage will increase from 37½ hours to 182½ hours per week.

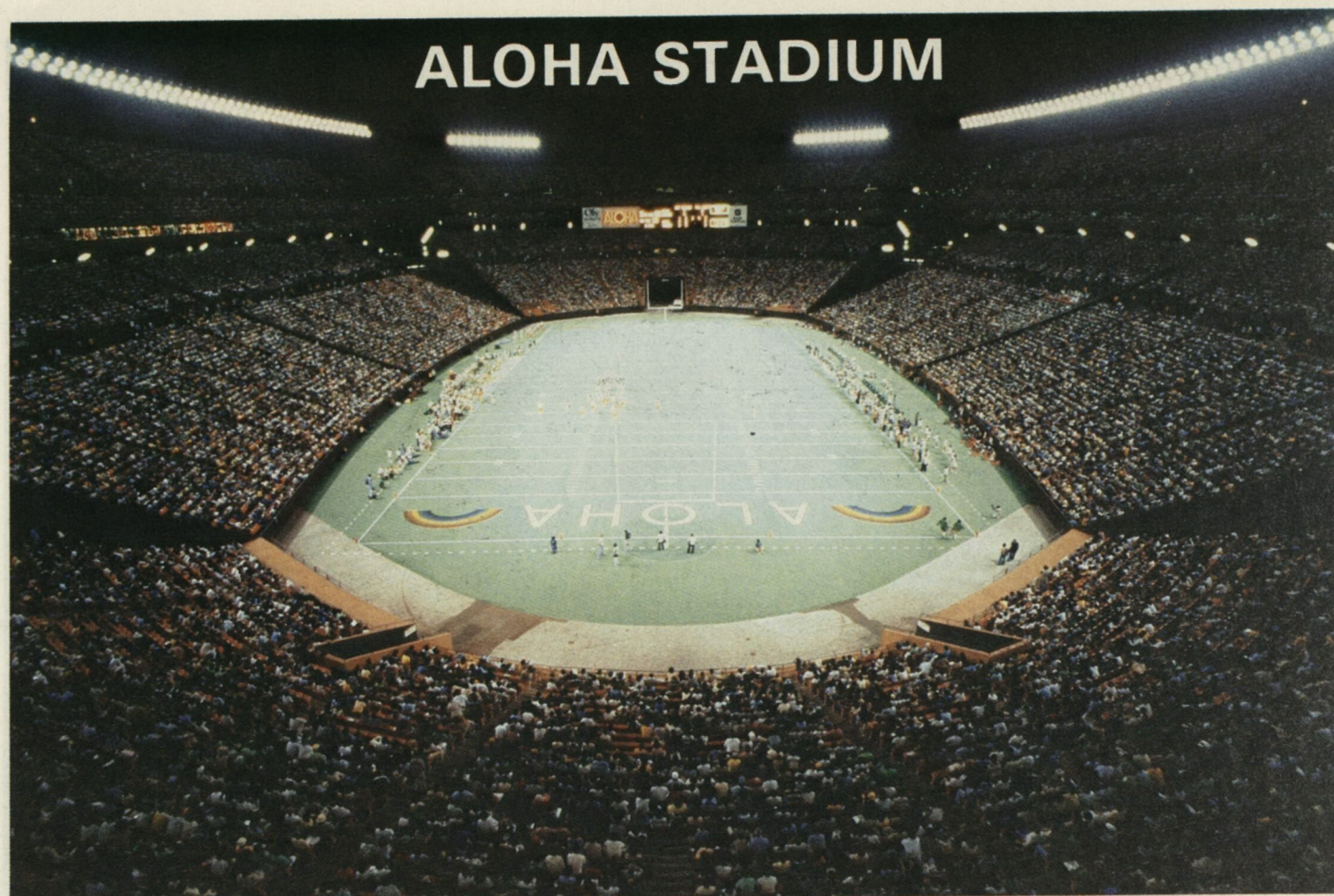
Phase II is still in the planning stages, but the general plan is to improve on existing facilities including the expansion of the seating area for the baseball field and office and locker facilities for the swimming pool.

ALOHA STADIUM INFORMATION

SERVICES

FIRST AID/SECURITY — Trained medical personnel and facilities are available at Aloha Stadium. First Aid stations are located on the makai side of the stadium behind section M and at the south end of the building across from the elevator on the main concourse. The stadium security office is adjacent to the main box office.

LOST AND FOUND — If you lose an article at Aloha Stadium, contact stadium security or check with the security office. If you find an article, please turn it in to any usher or security personnel. Remember to note the name of the person who accepted the article.

REGULATIONS

FOOD/ALCHOLIC BEVERAGES — Rules and regulations of Aloha Stadium prohibit food, drinks and alcoholic beverages from being brought into the stadium.

ANIMALS/BICYLES — No animals, bicycles or motor-scooters are permitted in the stadium.

NOISEMAKERS — Horns and other noisemakers are prohibited from being brought into the stadium. Transistor radios are allowed, but must be kept at a low volume so as not to bother those sitting near you. We suggest that those with transistor radios use their earphone.

FACILITIES

RESTROOMS — There are a total of 32 restrooms in the

stadium, 16 for men and 16 for women. They are located on both upper and lower concourses.

PUBLIC TELEPHONES — Public telephones are located throughout the stadium on both upper and lower concourses.

EMERGENCIES — if any emergency arises, please contact any usher or security officer.

NOTES

PARKING REMINDER — It is always better to arrive early at University of Hawaii games since Aloha Stadium parking is limited. No one will be permitted to reserve or "hold" stalls for others. Tailgating or picnicing in the parking lot is allowed only in or behind your own vehicle and not in an adjacent stall.

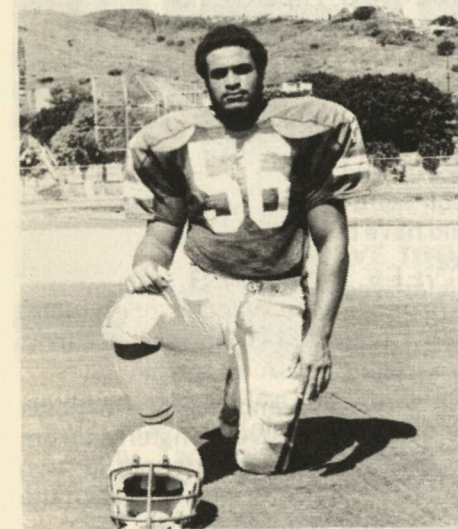
CAR POOLING IS BETTER — The new car pool lane on Moanalua Freeway makes Honolulu-bound traffic after the game easier than ever.

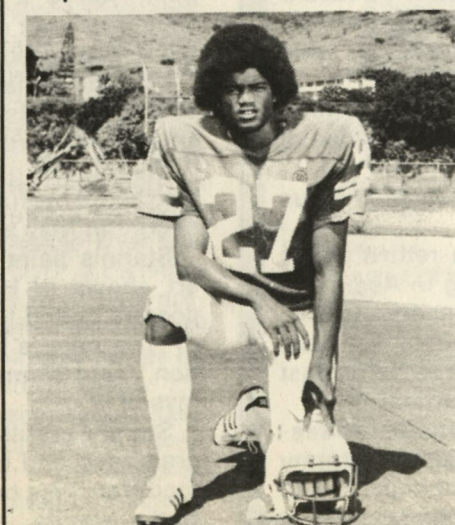

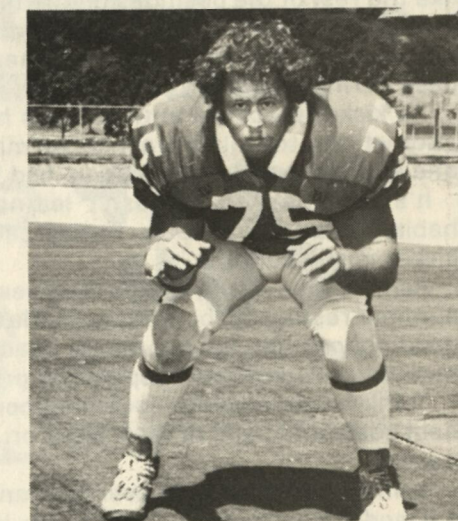

A Look At

Jim Asmus

"My ambition is to die and be reincarnated as a place kicker. There can't be anything easier. After calisthenics, the majority of their hard work is over." — a prominent Southern college coach.

"I'd shoot that coach (chuckle). A lot of people don't realize the practice and effort it takes." — Jim Asmus, UH kicker/punter.



Jim Asmus spends 45 minutes on the field each day practicing his place-kicking. And his training doesn't end there. Since Asmus also handles the punting chores, he has to spend even more time on that.

In addition, Asmus not only does calisthenics, but also a lot of stretching and weight-training to keep his legs in shape.

"A lot of people think we (the kickers) have to practice like the rest of the positions on the team," said Asmus. "But like in everything, you want to do what it takes and not overdo it. You don't see a lineman trying to catch a pass during practice."

"A kicker practices until he feels his limit," he said. "Sometimes too much practice can make your leg weary and sometimes you can pick-up bad habits."

It's obvious Asmus hasn't learned too many bad habits. Head Coach Dick Tomey calls him "the best kicker in the country."

Asmus, who is playing his final year at Hawaii, spent summer resting up for the season. He said the rest was a good opportunity for him to get ready for the grueling months of August and September prior to the season.

"I think at this point, I feel more comfortable with my field goals and need to work more on my punting," said Asmus.

Asmus' punts have an average hangtime of between 4.4 and 4.5 seconds. A good kicker has a hangtime of between 4.0 and 4.1.

Despite setting numerous records last season, Asmus feels more confident about 1980.

Asmus is especially pleased with the return of his long-snapper E.E. Price. Price, according to Asmus, is one of the keys to the success of the UH special teams.

"I have trust and confidence in Double E," said Asmus. "If he didn't snap the ball as well as he did last season, I wouldn't have been nearly as effective."

Another improvement in the special teams this season, according to Asmus, is that he's had an opportunity to practice more variations in punting and hopes it will help him kick better in different situations.

Mike Stennis' four-year stint at the University of Hawaii hasn't always been pleasant. He certainly had more than his share of tough breaks. Stennis, playing in his final year with the Rainbows, looks back on the experience as "being down and looking up and probably learning more than I would have if things were different."

Ever since Stennis arrived in 1976, he's had an uphill battle to be Hawaii's number one quarterback. In 1976, it was the experienced Alex Kaloi and Joe McReynolds calling the shots. In 1977, Jeff Duva transferred from Brigham Young and held the quarterback spot for two years. Meanwhile, in 1978, Stennis was injured in the first game of the season and was redshirted.

Stennis finally won the starting job in 1979 and led the Rainbows to victories over Texas-El Paso, Prairie View and Santa Clara.

However, Stennis' best performance was in the Temple game last season. He completed 15 passes for 200 yards and a touchdown. Last season, he also set a school record by completing 111 passes without an interception.

Stennis played injured most of the season, forcing him to miss several games, but courageously kept coming back.

Stennis' career of tough breaks hasn't put a damper on his winning attitude.

"You gotta think first string—think you're a strater—think you're a winner," said Stennis. "Somewhere down the line I'm going to get my chance, whether it be the entire season, or two or three games."

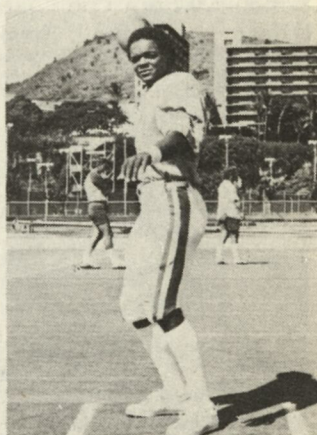
"My career has had as many ups and downs as a roller coaster. Although I've been subjected to many adversities in my career, it's made me stronger as a person."

Stennis not only feels positive about this season, but also about his future. He will receive his Bachelor of Arts degree in May and will possibly try for a masters in art.

Stennis' paintings have already had some exposure in art shows in Hawaii and on the mainland. But, he doesn't intend to make it a career.

"You need a lot of time to paint and a lot of inspiration," said Stennis. "It does help me to relax and express myself."

Stennis is still looking for a Hawaii connection after he graduates and hopes that he can get into his father's food franchise business and possibly bring a subsidiary to the islands.



It Happened...

FIVE YEARS AGO — Sept. 13, 1975: In the first game ever played at Aloha Stadium, Texas A&I downed Hawaii, 45-9. The 'Bows managed only a two-yard TD run by Alex Kaloi, a PAT kick by Curtis Goodman and a safety. Tailback Mike Vierra became the first UH player to rush for over 100 yards in the first game of a career. John Woodcock and Pat Richardson led the defense with 12 and 11 tackles respectively. Fullback George Franklin paced the Javelinas with three TDs, including one on a record 88-yard kickoff return.

TEN YEARS AGO — Sept. 19, 1970: Big plays by George Lumpkin, Rocky Pamplin and Roger Weatherby lifted the Rainbows to a 14-13 win over U.S. International in a damp season opener. Pamplin scored both UH touchdowns on short plunges, but it was the defense that engineered the victory. Lumpkin intercepted two passes and recovered a fumble. Weatherby set up the winning score by returning an interception 52 yards to the USIU 1 yardline. Co-captain Randy Ingraham (15 tackles) and Levi Stanley (13 tackles, three sacks) were other defensive stars.

25 YEARS GO — Sept. 17, 1955: It must be considered the greatest victory in the history of UH football. A Rainbow contingent of 27 players, under the direction of head coach Hank Vasconcellos, upset Nebraska, 6-0, before a stunned crowd at Lincoln. The only score of the game came midway through the final quarter. 'Bow fullback Bill Taylor ran 37 yards to the Nebraska 6. Ed "Soupy" Kawawaki advanced the ball to the one footline, where Hartwell Freitas bulled into the endzone. Halfback James "Skippy" Dyer was an important key to the Hawaii win. Dyer, a constant breakaway threat, had runs of 40 and 30 yards to preserve good field position. He also made a sensational defensive play with less than two minutes left as he batted down a pass which could've given the 'Huskers a victory. Coach Vasconcellos said, "There's no question Nebraska is superior. We won through courage and sheer guts." The editor of the *Lincoln Star* said, "It was a fantastic, unbelievable spectacle. . . . The Cornhuskers had

trounced Hawaii, 50-0, the year before in Honolulu, enroute to the Orange Bowl.

50 YEARS AGO — Sept. 13, 1930: Otto "Proc" Klum's Fighting Deans were preparing for their Sept. 27 opener against the Alumni. In the meantime, the UH freshmen and subs were gearing up for a Sept. 20 match against McKinley High. The Tigers were coached by Neal "Rusty" Blaisdell, a former UH star who was destined to become mayor of Honolulu.

"The UH Rainbows are muy bueno!"



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NCAA Honor Roll

Program recognizes past, present student-athletes

Renowned heart surgeon Dr. Denton A. Cooley, football quarterback Paul McDonald and former Heisman Trophy winner Alan Ameche were among the past and present collegiate athletes honored in 1980 by the NCAA.

All three received awards at the Association's honors luncheon during the 74th annual NCAA Convention in New Orleans in January.

Dr. Cooley received the NCAA's highest honor, the Theodore Roosevelt Award, before more than 1,000 guests at New Orleans' Fairmont Hotel. The award is named for the 26th President of the United States, who was the individual most responsible for implementing the organization of the NCAA.

A three-year basketball letterman at the University of Texas, Austin, during the late 1930s and early 1940s, Cooley currently is surgeon-in-chief at the Texas Heart Institute and chief of cardiovascular surgery at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston. Known for helping to pioneer blue baby operations and open-heart surgery, Cooley is renowned both as an educator and as one of the world's top surgeons.

The "Teddy" Award is presented annually to a prominent American "for whom competitive athletics in college and attention to physical well-being thereafter have been important factors in a distinguished career of national significance and prominence."

Previous winners include former President Dwight D. Eisenhower; Senator Leverett Saltonstall; Supreme Court Justice Byron R. White; Purdue University President Frederick L. Hovde; National Aeronautics and Space Administration official Christopher C. Kraft Jr.; Jerome H. Holland, ambassador to Sweden, and General of the Army Omar N. Bradley.

Other winners have been track and field immortal Jesse Owens; former President Gerald R. Ford; retired Rear Adm. Thomas J. Hamilton; Los Angeles Mayor Tom Bradley; former Eastman Kodak board chairman Gerald R. Zornow, and Los Angeles Times publisher Otis Chandler.

Master of ceremonies at the 1980 honors luncheon was Jim Simpson, sportscaster with the Entertainment and Sports Programming Network (ESPN).

Also honored at the luncheon were five current and five past student-athletes, comprising the "College Athletics Top Ten."

The Today's Top Five awards recognized five outstanding student-athletes who completed their college eligibility in 1979. McDonald, who led Southern California to the 1980 Rose Bowl, was one of three football quarterbacks selected. One basketball player and a track and field standout completed the honorees.

The other quarterbacks honored were Steadman Shealy, who guided Alabama to a No. 1 ranking in the 1979 season and a Sugar Bowl win, and Marc Wilson of Brigham Young,

who set several NCAA passing records while maintaining a 3.55 grade-point average.

Greg Kelsner, a key figure in Michigan State's 1979 basketball championship, also was selected, along with Scott Neilson of Washington. Neilson won four consecutive NCAA championships in the hammer throw and carried a 3.69 grade-point average in chemistry and premed.

Silver Anniversary awards were presented to five former student-athletes who have accomplished distinguished careers. They are honored on their 25th anniversary after college graduation.

In addition to Ameche, two basketball standouts and a pair of two-sport athletes were honored. Ameche, who set several football rushing records at Wisconsin en route to the 1954 Heisman award, now is secretary of Gino's Incorporated.

Richard Boushka, president of the Vickers Energy Corporation, earned all-America honors for St. Louis University in basketball and competed on the 1956 United States Olympic basketball team. Boushka also earned a baseball letter.

Tom Gola, who now heads the Tom Gola Insurance Agency in Philadelphia, was a three-time consensus all-America basketball player at La Salle. Gola also coached La Salle in 1969 and 1970, leading the Explorers to a 37-13 record.

Atlanta land developer Larry Morris was a consensus all-America football selection at center for the 1953 Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets. In addition, Morris lettered three years in baseball and was team captain in each sport.

Jack Twyman, chairman of the board of Super Food Services, Incorporated, was the leading scorer for Cincinnati's basketball team for three consecutive seasons.

Honoring Hawaii's Brightest Athletes...

It is important for any college or university to maintain a balance between athletics and academics. Maintaining this balance demands that the student-athlete strive for winning performances on the playing field and in the classroom.

Of course, greater attention is focused on a player's athletic achievements — a 60-yard touchdown run may make a more interesting headline than an "A" in world history — at least for the present. In the long run, however, the college education and degree become more essential parts of the arsenal carried past graduation.

Here at the UHM Athletic Department, academic advisors Cindy Boerner and Leon Schumaker are stressing the importance of scholastic achievement, providing support and encouragement for those who need it and are making more of an effort to give student-athletes the recognition they deserve.

To Schumaker, the "dumb jock" stereotype simply ignores the facts. To participate in intercollegiate athletics, an athlete must take the same courses and meet the same standards as other UHM students. There are minimum eligibility requirements for men set forth by the National Collegiate Athletic Association and by the Western Athletic Conference. However, these requirements have been lower than those set forth by the University itself. Similar rules apply for the Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women.

Since becoming the men's academic advisor in the summer of 1979, Schumaker has instituted a number of academic awards.

For starters, he has created the Team Academic Achievement Award, given annually to the men's varsity team maintaining the highest combined cumulative grade point average. The first recipient of this award was the tennis team, with a GPA of 3.1 in 1979-80.

Another award is given for Individual Academic Achievement, presented annually to the men's varsity team member with the highest cumulative GPA. Scott Nagel, a freshman on the tennis team last season and son of UH Athletic Director Ray Nagel, won the first award with his 3.8 GPA.

Schumaker has also initiated the Imua Award, given annually to the men's varsity team member who has demonstrated exceptional achievement during the preceeding semester. This award is not based on any single criterion, but instead is based on the performance of the individual in and out of the classroom. The most recent recipients are fullback Willie Ahart (fall, 1979) and offensive tackle John Taylor (spring, 1980).

Perhaps not as exclusive as any individual award but just as meaningful is the 3.0 Club, another Schumaker creation. Members of this club must maintain a "B" average or better during the semester. In the spring of 1980, 36 men's varsity athletes were members of the 3.0 Club — doubling the membership from the fall semester.

Similar awards are given for the women's program. One such award is for Women's Team Academic Excel-

lence. This award instituted during the 1976-77 academic year, recognizes the team with the highest combined GPA. The tennis team has taken it every year thus far, earning the award with a 2.86 GPA in 1979-80.

Women's Athletics also presents the Individual Academic Excellence Award, given to the student-athlete who maintains the highest GPA during the year. Three straight-A students shared the 1979-80 award: Cindy Haney, a senior cross-country team member last season and a world-class marathon runner; Sue Menz, a middle-distance track team member; and Mary Kay Simpson, a senior guard this past season on the Wahine basketball squad.

To keep things in proper perspective, however, it must be noted that every university has its share of problems. According to Schumaker, 18 athletes in the men's program were below the 2.0 GPA or "C" average required by the UHM in the summer of 1979. At this writing, there are only six, and Schumaker's goal is to reduce that number to zero.

Coaches know from experience that the classroom performance of the student-athlete is a good indicator of character. To excel academically while playing a varsity sport is a sure sign of that little "extra" that coaches seek in a player. It is certainly no easy task to simultaneously handle the demands of athletic participation and the pressures of the classroom. However, to do so successfully benefits the team and individual alike.

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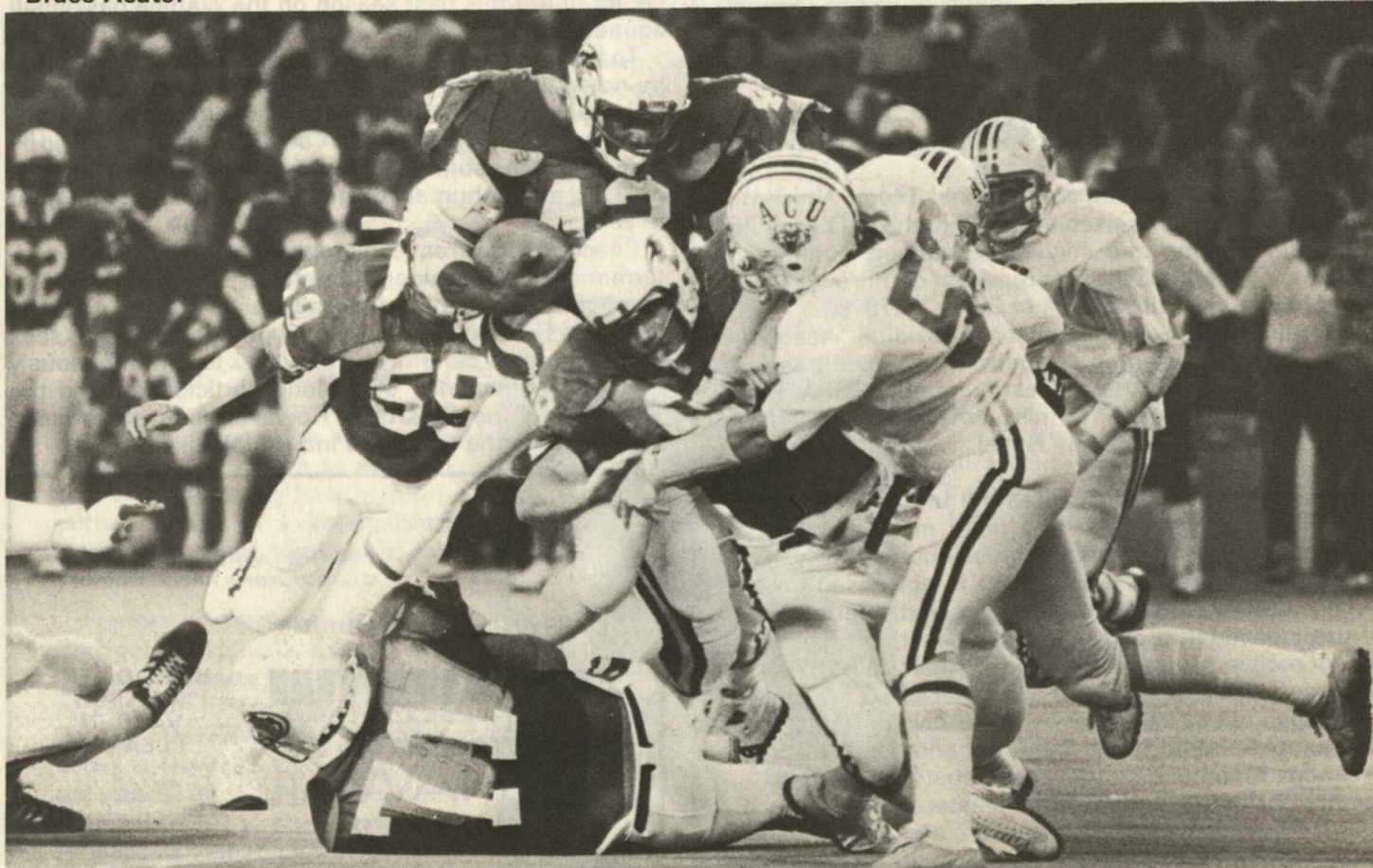

The main position of interest for the Miners this season is that of quarterback, a very uncertain spot for them in 1979. With a host of candidates in the spring and a couple of talented freshmen prospects joining in the fall, head coach Bill Michael hopes to find an answer. Back are two youngsters who split the duties last fall in Keith Castle and Gerry Dickens. Transfer Paul Sieczkowski is also a strong contender, making the battle for the quarterback spot very competitive. Two starters and some others who have logged a lot of playing time return to the offensive line. For the most part it will be young but will be led by mainstays Marshall Gordon and Roy Garlisch, a junior college transfer who moved into a starting spot last year. Finding a replacement for All-WAC wide receiver Bubba Garcia is on the agenda with returnees Frank Jarzombek and David Logston, and newcomer Leon McClelland. Defensively the Miners should be in fair shape but will be looking to rebuild the secondary where three starters graduated including All-WAC, Academic All-WAC and NCAA Post Graduate Scholarship winner Eddie Forkerway. Depth is fair in most areas and the line appears to be in good shape with both starting ends back in Terrence Prevost and Melvin Besses, an All-WAC choice last year as a sophomore. The tackles, Don Rawls and Odell Pippins are back with only the nose guard position open.

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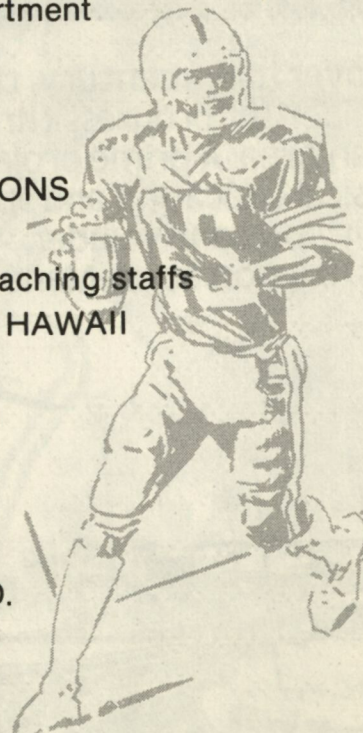
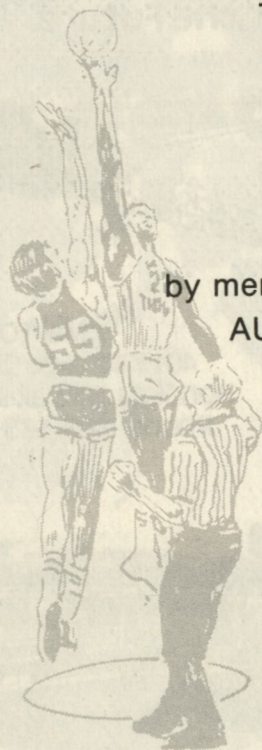
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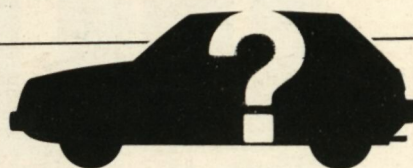
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
