## NEVADA-RENO GORDON; NAU JACKMON NAMED NATIONAL CAR RENTAL/BIG SKY CONFERENCE "PLAYERS OF THE WEEK"

University of Nevada-Reno runningback Johnny Gordon and Northern Arizona University linebacker Marvin Jackmon have been named the National Car Rental/Big Sky Conference "players of the week" for their performances according to league Commissioner Ron Stephenson.

Gordon, a 6-3, 218-pound Junior from Miami, Florida, rushed for five touchdowns, tying a Big Sky Conference record in the Wolf Pack's 61-35 win over Texa A&I last Saturday. Gordon rushed for 167 yards on 10 carries, an 8.8-yards per carry average and scored on runs of one, two, four, four, and 62-yards. He also had one reception for nine yards as the Wolf Pack won its first game of the 1984 season and evened its record of 1-1.

Jackmon, a 6-2, 215-pound Senior from Fresno, CA, helped lead the Northern Arizona Lumberjacks to a 42-21 win over Weber State. It was the Big Sky opener for both teams. Jackmon was credited with a total of 13 tackles including 10 unassisted and three assisted tackles.

Others nominated for the weekly award on offense included Idaho wide receiver Eric Yarber. Idaho State fullback Merrill Hoge, Montana wide receiver Bob McCauley, Montana State quarterback Kelly Bradley, and Northern Arizona wide receiver Jerry Davis.

Others for the weekly award on defense included Idaho Safety Mark Tidd, Idaho State cornerback Walter Johnson, Montana defensive back Rich Slater, Montana State nose guard Lonnie Burt, and Nevada-Reno linebacker Kyle Denny.

### BIG SKY FOOTBALL ROUND-UP

Five (5) non-conference games last week involving Big Sky teams the league posted a 3-2 record, in 18 non-league affairs thus far this season the Big Sky is 9-7-0 overall 1.5631. Against Division I-AA teams the Big Sky is 0-1-0, 1.000. Against NCAA Division II and NAIA squads Big Sky is 5-0-0, 1.000.

## THIS WEEK IN

**NEVADA-RENO (1-1-0, 0-0-0BSC), at BOISE STATE (0-2-0, 0-0-0BSC):** 7:00 p.m. MST at Bronco Stadium (11,000), Boise, ID. **THIS WEEK:** Nevada-Reno upended Texas A&I 61-35. Boise State was idle; **THE GAME:** The Big Sky opener for both teams. Boise State is looking for the first win of the 1984 season after suffering two non-league games to Cal-State, Fullerton and Fresno State. The quarterback situation will be decided early this week between three Bronco signal callers, after Hazsen Choates, Gerald DesPres or Todd Anderson. The Nevada-Reno offense came to play against Texas A&I with 573 yards total offense and 61-points after struggling in UNR's season opener at Pacific in which it scored only seven points. **THE COACHES:** UNR's Chris Ault is 64-30-1 in his eighth season as the head coach of the Wolf Pack and as collegiate coach. His 2-6-0 lifetime against Boise State since the 1977 season. Bronco Lyle Setencich is 6-7-0 in his second season with BSU and as a head coach. He is 0-1-0 against Nevada. **SERIES RECORD:** Heading into this 13th meeting Boise State holds a 5-3-0 advantage, including a 4-1-0 advantage in Big Sky games. **LAST MEETING:** 1983 in Reno, NV., had the Wolf Pack winning 38-20 before a 13,110 at Mackey Stadium ending a four-game winning streak in the series. **NEXT WEEK:** Nevada-Reno hosts Northern Arizona while Boise State entertains Eastern Washington.

**MONTANA STATE (1-1-0, 0-0-0BSC) at IDAHO (1-1-0, 0-0-0BSC):** 7:00 p.m. MST at the ASUI Kibbie Dome (16,000), Moscow, ID. **THIS WEEK:** Both teams lost on the road. Montana State to Eastern Washington, 21-16, and Idaho to Cal-Fullerton, 28-7. **THE GAME:** The Big Sky opener for both teams. Montana State hit the airways in a big way last week racking up 339-yards in the air but came away without any points. Idaho had several turnovers in the Cal-Fullerton game and also lost the services of starting quarterback Scott Linehan for up to two weeks with a sterno-clavicular sprain. **THE COACHES:** Montana State's Dave Arnold 2-11-0 in his second season with the bobcats and as a collegiate head coach, he is 0-1-0 lifetime against Idaho. Idaho's Dennis Erickson is 18-8-0 in his third year with vandals and as a collegiate mentor. He is 2-0-0 against Montana State, his alma mater.

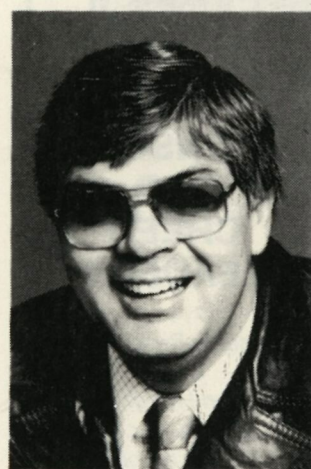
**SERIES RECORD:** Heading into this 30th meeting, Idaho leads the series with a record of 15-13-1. In 20 Big Sky meetings since the 1963 season Montana State holds a 109-0 edge. **LAST MEETING:** 1983 in Bozeman, MT., had Dennis Erickson's team striking a 23-0 defeat on MSU. **NEXT WEEK:** Idaho hosts Oregon State while Montana State entertains Idaho State at Bozeman, MT.

**MONTANA (2-0-0, 0-0-0BSC) at IDAHO STATE (1-1-0, 0-0-0BSC):** 7:30 MST at the ISU Minidome (12,000) in Pocatello, ID. **LAST WEEK:** Both teams won, Montana beating Portland State 17-16, Idaho State beat Chico State 43-23 at home. **THE GAME:** The Big Sky opener for both teams. Montana dodged a bullet last week, stopping a two-point conversion attempt with just seconds to preserve the win. The victory may have been costly to Montana in that starting quarterback Marty Mornhinweg could miss this contest with a knee injury suffered on the last two offensive plays of the game. Idaho State got it's offense rolling last week but found the end zone less often than it did in it's season opening loss at UTEP. Quarterback Vern Harris led the way with 238 yards. **THE COACHES:** Grizzly head mentor Larry Donovan is 22-21-0 in his fifth season as head coach of the Grizzlies and as a collegiate coach. Donovan is 1-3-0 lifetime against Idaho State. Idaho State Jim Koetter is 9-5-0 in his second season with the Bengals and as a head college coach. Koetter is 1-0-0 lifetime against Montana. **SERIES RECORD:** Heading into this the 26th meeting between the two schools Montana holds a 15-10-0 advantage. In Big Sky games since 1963 Montana holds a 11-10-0 edge heading into this 22nd meeting. **LAST MEETING:** 1983, at Missoula, MT., had Idaho State winning 31-17 in front of 5,755 at Dornblaser Stadium **NEXT WEEK:** Montana travels to Weber State while Idaho State journeys to Montana State.

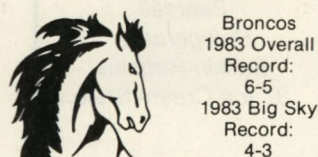
**PACIFIC (1-1-0, 0-0-0PCAA) at NORTHERN ARIZONA (3-0-0, 1-0-0BSC):** 6:30 p.m. MST at the Walkup Skydome (15,300), Flagstaff, AZ. **LAST WEEK:** Pacific lost at Cal-Berkeley, 28-12, while Northern Arizona won its Big Sky opener with a 42-21, win over Weber State. **THE GAME:** Pacific, a member of the PCAA, has already beaten a Big

Sky team this season, a season opening 12-7 victory over Nevada-Reno. The Tigers were 3-9-0 last season. Northern Arizona is off to its best start since the 1979 season when they won five straight to open the season. The Lumberjacks jumped out to a 28-0 lead over Weber State last week and again rode the passing of quarterback Mike Mendoza who threw for over 290 yards. **THE COACHES:** Pacific's Bob Cope is 4-10-0 in his second season with the Tigers and as a head coach. NAU's Joe Harper is 107-58-3 in his fifteenth season as a head coach and 11-14-0 in his third season with the Axers. **SERIES RECORD:** Heading into this second meeting, Pacific holds a 1-0-0 advantage. **LAST MEETING:** 1983 in Stockton, CA had Pacific winning 20-14, before 7,000 at Pacific Memorial Stadium. **NEXT WEEK:** Pacific is at Oregon while Northern Arizona is at Nevada-Reno.

**WEBER STATE (1-2-0, 0-1BSC) at PORTLAND STATE (1-2-0, 0-0-0WFC):** 7:00 p.m. PDT at Civic Memorial Stadium (25,762) Portland, OR. **LAST WEEK:** Both teams lost, Weber State 42-21 at Northern Arizona, and Portland State at home to Montana, 17-16. **THE GAME:** Weber State is hoping to rebound off a tough road Big Sky Conference loss at Flagstaff, AZ last week. The Wildcats trailed 28-0 at the end of the first half but scored 21 points in the second half. The loss may have cost the Wildcats the use of runningback Kelvin Hodrick who suffered a knee injury in the contact and may be lost for the season. Portland State, A Division II member of the Western Football Conference failed to convert a two-point conversion with just seconds remaining in their loss to Montana last week. It was the second straight loss to a Big Sky squad for the Vikings this year. The Vikings will also play at Montana State later this season. **THE COACHES:** Weber State's Mike Price is 18-18-0 in his fourth season with the Wildcats and as a head coach. Portland State's Don Read is 28-45-0 in his eighth season with PSU and 58-89-0 in his 15th season as a collegiate head coach. **SERIES RECORD:** Heading into this 14th meeting Weber State holds a 9-4-0 series edge. **LAST MEETING:** 1983 in Ogden, UT had Weber State winning, 37-15 before 7,643 at Wildcat Stadium. **NEXT WEEK:** Weber State hosts Montana while Portland State plays at Humboldt State.

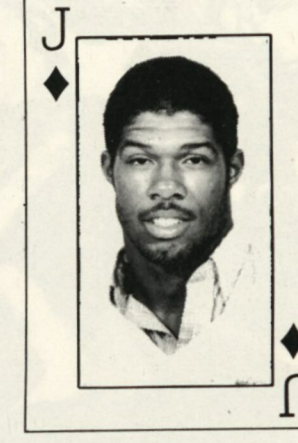

## NAU'S DEFENSIVE UNIT SCORES TOO!

Through the first three football games this fall, Northern Arizona University's defensive unit has been directly responsible for 39 points and the Lumberjack defense has set up 28 more NAU points.

The big play defensively has been vital for the Lumberjacks whose 3-0 start is the best since the 1979 team opened with a 5-0 record and was ranked No. 3 nationally in the NCAA 1-AA poll.

The defensive team's feats thus far this season: Against New Mexico Highlands strong safety Tony Cullen intercepted a Cowboy pass and returned it 46 yards for a TD, cornerback Chris Scott intercepted a pass and ran it back 28 yards for a TD and defensive lineman Doug Allred picked up a safety.

Linebacker Jeff Randle El intercepted an early-game pass on the NAU five-yard line and NAU then marched 95 yards to score, taking a 7-0 lead over highlands. Cullen's interception for the TD came just 1:03 later as the game went from a scoreless tie to a 14-0 NAU lead.

Later in the first half Darin Fila kicked a 44 yard field goal giving NAU a 24-0 lead and just 1:08 later Scott's interception for a TD made it 31-0. In the second half Kris Yonker scored on a two-yard run after NAU marched 71 yards with the second half kickoff. Randle El blocked a punt and that led to a 7-yard TD run by Chris Tsosie just 1:01 later—big defensive plays can turn the tide quickly.

NAU scored a safety against Cal-Northridge to take a 12-0 lead and that was when Randle El caught the Matador punter in the end zone following a high snap on an attempted punt. In the third quarter

Randle El blocked his second punt of the season and he recovered it for a TD in the end zone.

On the opening kickoff against Weber, freshman Herb Duncan delivered a jarring tackle to Wildcat Kelvin Hodrick who fumbled on the Weber 30.

Five plays later NAU had a 7-0 lead as Mike Mendoza passes six yards to Jerry Davis. NAU upped it's lead to 14-0 over Weber on a 1-yard plunge by Mendoza and just 1:03 later Cullen blocked a Weber punt which defensive end David Smith recovered for a TD and all of a sudden it was 21-0!

Terry Gatewood's interception set another NAU scoring drive in motion as NAU led 28-0 following a 55-yard drive with 12:25 remaining in the first half. Randle El intercepted a late-game pass and returned it 66 yards for a TD.

NAU's defensive unit has accounted for 39 points and set up 28 more so far in three games while the opposition has managed to score 31 points.

The Lumberjack defensive unit is allowing 151.3 yards a game total offense which ranks first in the Big Sky and first nationally among NCAA 1-AA schools. In rushing defense, the 35.6 yards a game NAU is allowing is first in the Big Sky and third nationally.

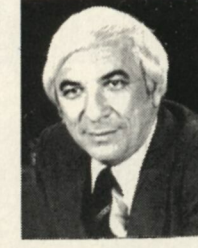

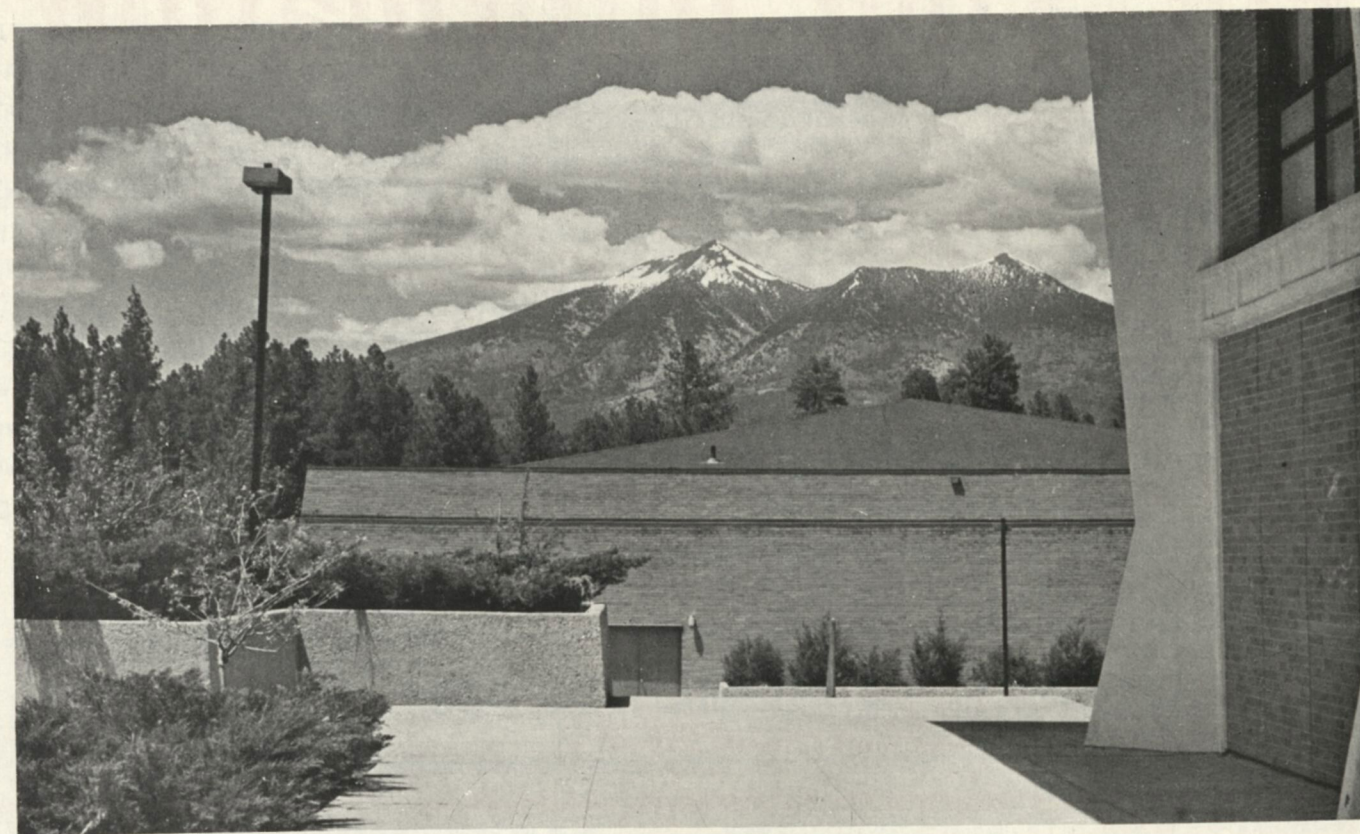

He received the M.S. degree from Kansas State University and the Ph.D. in mathematics from George Peabody College of Vanderbilt University in 1968. She received the M.A. degree in education from Northern Arizona University in 1979 and is presently an elementary teacher at Sechrist School in Flagstaff. The Hughes have three children, Debbie (Mrs. Gary Cruze), Greg, and Lisa and three grandchildren, Melissa Ann and Aaron Griffith Cruze and Stephanie Hope Hughes.

## NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY

A close personal interest in the development in each student as an individual has long been the trademark of Northern Arizona University.

This fall more than 11,600 students will enroll at NAU and each will receive guidance in developing a solid foundation early in their collegiate careers so they can work toward reaching optimum levels in today's complex world as responsible, contributing adults. NAU's reputation for excellence has become known locally, regionally and nationally as the nation's map is dotted with those holding degrees from NAU.

Despite its steady yearly growth, NAU has not lost sight of helping each student work steadily toward their goals. From the administration, faculty and staff has come a positive learning atmosphere, conducive to students having the opportunity of reaching their goals with pride and dignity.

Undergraduate students at NAU this fall will be working on degrees in some 200 areas while more than 50 areas await those in pursuit of advanced degrees ranging from the master's degree program through the doctorate.

NAU's academic programs are housed in ten colleges and professional schools—including the Colleges of Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Creative Arts and Communication, Center for Excellence in Education, Engineering and Technology, Social and Behavioral Sciences and the Graduate College plus Schools of Applied Science, Forestry and Health Professions.

Since opening its doors in 1889, some 13 years before Arizona became the nation's 48th state on Valentine's Day, 1912, NAU has progressed through five name changes—starting with "Northern Arizona Normal School" back in the Arizona Territory days.

The second name was Northern Arizona State Teacher's College and that change came in 1925. In 1929, it was changed to Arizona State Teacher's College in Flagstaff and in 1945, Arizona State College at Flagstaff. University status was gained May 1, 1966, as Northern Arizona University.

NAU is located in the heartland of some of the world's most spectacular scenery as the famed Grand Canyon lies just 75 miles to the north while the world's largest stand of Ponderosa Pine circles the Flagstaff area. The area is steeped with western folklore as well as American Indian history and culture.

Flagstaff is a highly developed scientific community with the presence of world renowned Lowell Observatory where Pluto, the ninth planet in our Galaxy was discovered in 1930. Pluto's single moon was discovered in 1978 at the US Naval Observatory in Flagstaff. The US Geological Survey in Flagstaff mapped the back side of the moon following early Apollo flights. All US astronauts who visited the moon received part of their training in the Flagstaff area.

As legend has it, Flagstaff received its name when Westward bound pioneers skinned a tall Ponderosa Pine to use it as a "flaff staff" to celebrate the nation's 100th birthday on July 4, 1876.

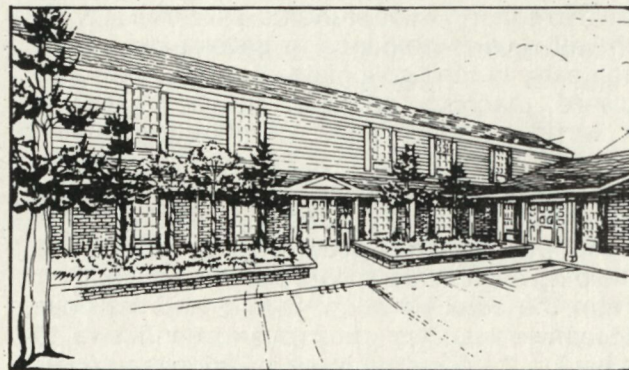

Discipline, hard work, conditioning and a team style of play have been Harper trademarks. Harper and his staff had a major rebuilding job when they came to NAU in January of 1982 and their work is showing strong promises of starting to bear out positive results.

Lack of depth and youth have hampered NAU the past two seasons, however, the Lumberjacks have proven they are capable of taking on high powered teams and posting positive results. Last fall NAU handed Big Sky champ Nevada-Reno its lone Big Sky setback of the season—41-38—and two years ago NAU thumped Big Sky pre-season pick Boise, 30-14. The Lumberjacks also gave strong accountings of themselves to Division I teams on the road—Fresno State, New Mexico State and Cal State-Fullerton, before losing.

NAU returns 37 lettermen and among that list are 17 starters. The Lumberjack program also has 25 redshirts, most of whom are freshmen, so depth and familiarity with Harper's style of football is starting to materialize. Harper's 1980 Cal Poly-San Luis Obispo team won the NCAA Division II title. In 13 years as head coach at Cal Poly-SLO, Harper's teams compiled a 86-43-3 record. Harper and his wife, Jean, are the parents of two sons, Brad, 25 and Dan 24, and a 16-year-old daughter, Kerri Jean.

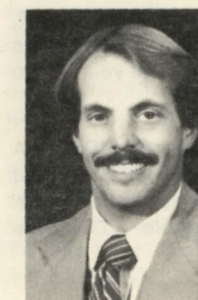
HAROLD MORGAN

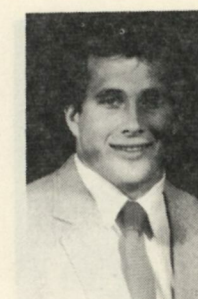
BOBBIE LANE

## NEXT OPPONENT

A year ago the University of Nevada-Reno won the Big Sky Conference football title and the Wolf Pack were pre-season picks to claim the championship again this season in polls by both the coaches and media members who attended the Big Sky Conference pre-season meeting at Sun Valley, Idaho.

Next Saturday NAU travels to Reno to battle the Wolf Pack and there's a sure bet that UN-Reno head coach Chris Ault will have his team eager to battle NAU. Last season UNR posted a 6-1 league mark and the lone setback was a 41-38 defeat dealt out by NAU in the Skydome. In that game NAU took an early 24-7 lead then fought off UN-Reno's late surge.

The Wolf Pack finished 9-5 last season and that included a 2-1 record in post-season NCAA 1-AA play. The Wolf Pack beat Big Sky rival Idaho State 27-20 in the opening round of the 1-AA playoffs in Pocatello, Idaho then came back the second week to beat Southland Conference champ North Texas State 20-17 on a frozen field in Reno. In the semi-final round eventual national champ Southern Illinois University 23-7. Southern Illinois then belted Western Carolina 43-7 for the national crown.

Nevada-Reno took a 1-1 overall record to Boise, Idaho to open Big Sky play tonight against Boise State University. UN-Reno lost its season-opener 12-7 at the University of Pacific, tonight's NAU foe in the Skydome.

Last Saturday the Wolf Pack outscored Texas A&I University 61-35 in a game played in Reno. In that game the Wolf Pack led 41-35 with 13:11 left in the game and 20 unanswered points blew the game open for the Wolf Pack who had 633 yards total offense—316 rushing and 317 passing. Johnny Gordon, a newcomer from the junior college ranks this year, rushed 19 times for 167 yards and scored five TD's for UNR against the Texas A&I team.

Freshman kicker Marty Zendejas kicked four field goals for UNR—47, 37, 34 and 32 yards plus adding seven for seven on conversions to score 19 kicking points to tie the NCAA 1-AA national record his brother Tony set in 1982 against Weber and matched in 1983 against Idaho.

**THE NAU-UN RENO SERIES:** The Wolf Pack holds a 6-3-1 series edge and in Big Sky play the Wolf Pack leads 4-1. The teams first met in Big Sky play in 1979 in the Skydome with UNR winning 31-7 before a regional ABC-TV audience. The winner of that game was to represent the Big Sky in the NCAA 1-AA playoffs and the Wolf Pack lost 33-30 in overtime to Eastern Kentucky who went on to win the national title.

In 1980 the Wolf Pack won 21-0 in Reno then in 1981 UNR rallied in the second half to win 34-17 in the Skydome. NAU led 12-0 at halftime in 1982 in Reno only to have the Wolf Pack come back to win 24-12. In non-conference play the teams were 2-2-1 with the first game of the series ending up a 12-12 tie in 1983.

After NAU travels to Reno, the Lumberjacks will be in Missoula, Montana on October 6 to meet the University of Montana. The Grizzlies won the 1982 Big Sky title and are rated among the favorites this fall.

**ON THE RADIO:** Radio station KCLS (600 on the dial) will air the games back from Reno and Missoula, live, with Rick Turner doing the play-by-play. The game in Reno will have a 1:00 p.m. kickoff Arizona time while the game in Missoula will have a 12:30 p.m. start, Arizona time.

**NEXT HOME GAME:** NAU returns home October 13th to host perennial Big Sky champ Boise State in a 6:30 p.m. league game which will be played before the annual Mom and Dad's Day crowd.

## TONIGHT'S GAME

Before Northern Arizona's game with Cal State-Northridge two weeks ago, recruiter-coach Larry Kentera said the Lumberjacks would be 2-0. "And next week," he said, "we'll be 3-0."

Inside the trainers' room minutes after the Weber State victory, Kentera wouldn't guarantee a win over University of Pacific. But, he said, NAU could win. "Intensity is the key. They'll be a little bit tougher. But, I think we can take them. We're 3-0 now and that's the important thing."

Despite Northern Arizona's unbeaten record before the Weber State game, there were skeptics outside the Skydome. NAU's first two victories, they said, were against Division II schools. The Lumberjacks answered those critics last Saturday with a convincing 42-21 Big Sky Conference win over Weber State. Over before it started, the Lumberjacks dominated the game, leading 28-0 at the half.

"It's still a week by week thing," said NAU coach Joe Harper. "You play them one at a time and right now we're 1-0 in the Big Sky race. There's no need to make any other judgements." Weber State coach Mike Price was one of the last to leave the Skydome last Saturday night. "Before the season started I picked them to win the Big Sky." That hasn't changed, said the WSC coach. "Their quarterback is improving with every game. They're big, physical and hard hitting. And they're well coached."

Last week in Berkeley, the PAC-10's University of California needed a 21-point fourth quarter to beat Pacific Univ. 28-12. Pacific led 12-7 going into the final quarter. Two weeks ago, Pacific (1-1) stopped Nevada-Reno 12-7 at Stockton. Nevada-Reno is the defending Big Sky champion and NAU's opponent next week.

Last year in the first meeting of the two schools, Pacific defeated the Lumberjacks 28-14 in Stockton. Pacific could be looking past Northern Arizona tonight in the Skydome. Next week the Tigers play the University of Oregon.

Sideline chain-gang member Sam Boroza has been impressed with the Skydome's enthusiasm, excitement in the first two games. "It's good," he told Larry Kentera. "You know," Boroza said,

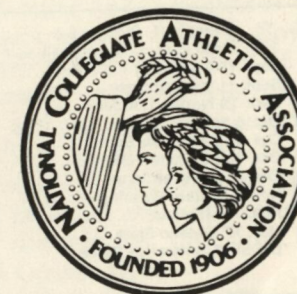

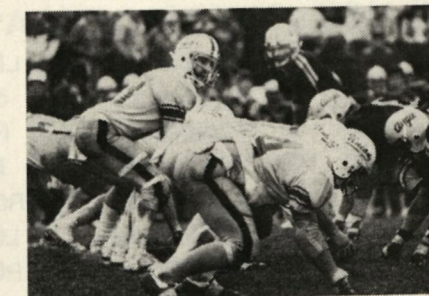

Its personalized approach and action-oriented attractions have intrigued all who have visited. As "Sleepy" Jim Crowley, one of the Notre Dame Four Horsemen, simply said, "This Hall of Fame is not in the telling or talking about, it's in the seeing."

### Galbreath Field

The National Collegiate Division III Football Championship (Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl) moved to the College Football Hall of Fame's Galbreath Field in 1983. Augustana College (Illinois) came from behind for an exciting 21-17 victory over Union College (New York).

This year's championship again will be played at Galbreath Field on Saturday, December 8. The Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl will mark the culmination of a three-week, 16-team national play-off among the nation's most outstanding small college football teams. Every aspect of the play-off is under the administration of the NCAA Division III Football Committee.

Galbreath Field is a 10,000-seat stadium located immediately adjacent to the College Football Hall of Fame at Kings Island, Ohio. The first intercollegiate game was played at Galbreath Field on September 12, 1981, between Ashland College and the University of Dayton.

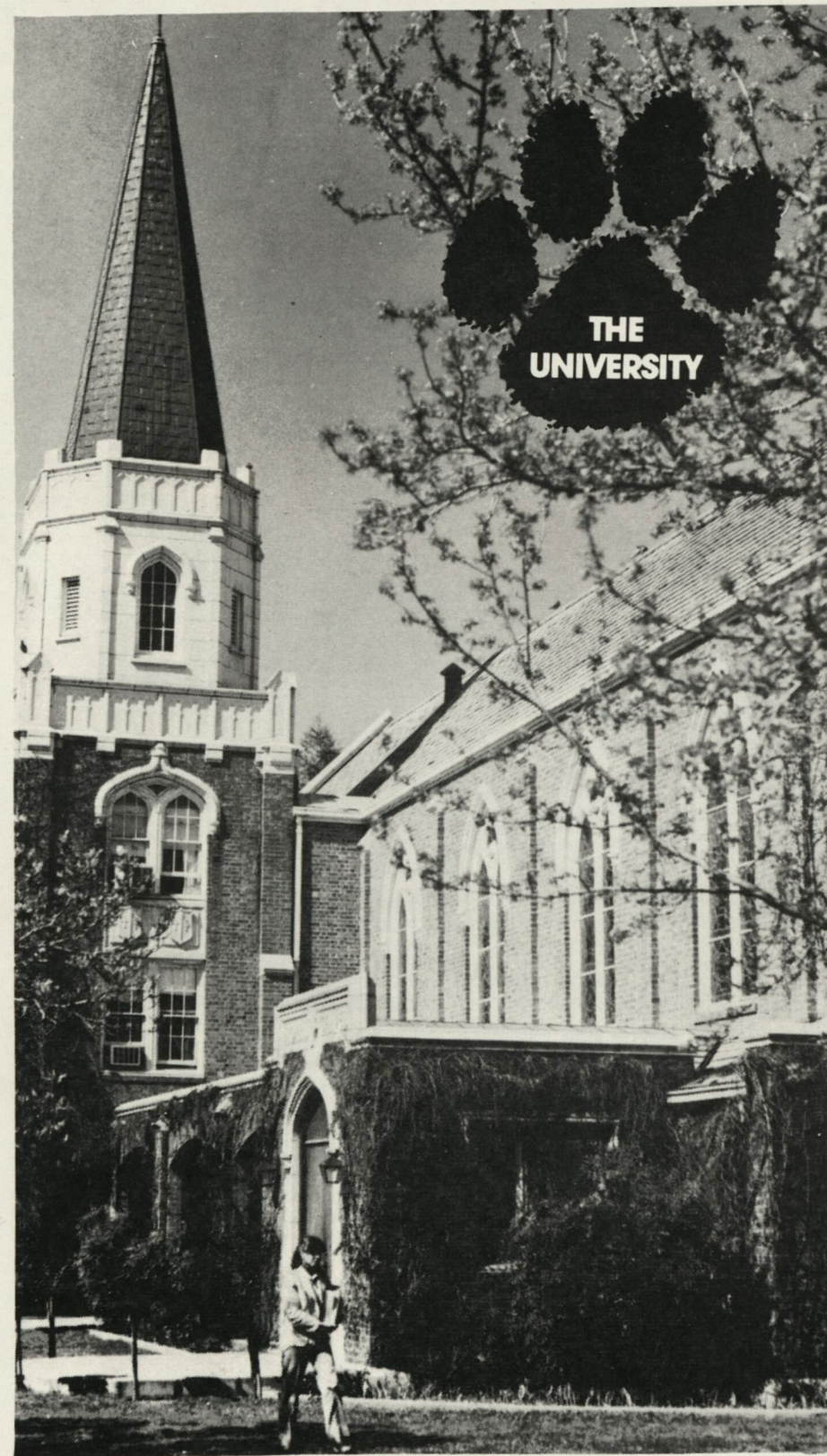

# UNIVERSITY OF THE PACIFIC

Founded in 1851 as California's first chartered university, University of the Pacific has developed a reputation as one of the finest academic institutions in the West.

The only private school in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association, Pacific offers a diversity of programs that would normally be associated with a much larger university than the 6,000 students currently attending classes at the main campus in Stockton, Sacramento and San Francisco.



Pacific is now comprised of 10 schools and colleges, including a dental school in San Francisco and McGeorge School of Law in Sacramento. On the main campus in Stockton are two liberal arts colleges and schools of music, engineering, education, pharmacy, business and public administration and a graduate school.

The liberal arts colleges include College of the Pacific, the largest arts and sciences college with more than 50 major programs and Elbert Covell College, the only Spanish-speaking college in the United States.

Throughout Pacific, the emphasis is on teaching, although research is recognized as having a need in the various disciplines.

The university athletic program has excelled in conjunction its proud academic heritage. Such names as Amos Alonzo Stagg, Eddie LeBaron, Dick Bass, Tom Flores, John Gianelli and Ron Cornelius have graced the UOP athletic fields and courts.

In 1981, Pacific dedicated the 6,000-seat Alex G. Spanos Center. This on-campus facility, named for UOP regent and benefactor Alex G. Spanos, serves as home for several Tiger athletic teams as well as other university and community functions.

The University has been directed by President Stanley E. McCaffrey since October of 1971. McCaffrey recently returned from a one-year leave of absence as President of Rotary International, a duty which saw him travel to all corners of the world.

Stockton, renowned for its inland, deep water port, is located in the Central Valley of California, 75 miles east of San Francisco and 50 miles south of Sacramento. It is within easy driving distance of Lake Tahoe, the scenic national parks of the Sierra Nevada, the picturesque wine county of Napa and Sonoma Valleys and the Bay Area.

## QUOTES FROM BIG SKY FOOTBALL PLAYERS

Are you in favor of Eliminating spring football practice in 1-AA football?  
**MIKE MENDOZA**, Quarterback, NAU: "No way. I was a junior college transfer at NAU last season and it was vital for me to learn a new system, get used to my receivers."

**JOE BIGNELL**, Tight End, Montana State: "I think we need spring practice, but less hitting—about 10 days in shorts and 10 days in pads would be ok. That would cut down on injuries and allow coaches time to do more teaching."

What is your opinion of the current playoff system in your division 1-AA?

**JAMES GEE**, Defensive Tackle, NAU: "I think it's great. The Big Sky Conference has done very well. It's also interesting to note that the majority of the championships were actually won by teams who were not No. 1 at the end of the final seasonal rankings."

**CARL KEEVER**, Linebacker, Boise State: "I think the current 1-AA playoff system is adequate and well balanced. It is very competitive and challenging to get into."

**BRENT KOETTER**, Safety, Idaho State: "Our playoff plan is very good. The selection committee did an outstanding job of getting the 12 best teams into the playoff picture. We can crown a legitimate national champion—one that is won on the field."

**MARTY MORNHINWEG**, Quarterback, Montana: "I think the NCAA 1-AA playoff system is the best in the nation. It enables the best team to win the national championship by actually beating other teams instead of the polls ranking teams which causes controversy."

### "A TOPIC RELATED TO INTERCOLLEGIATE FOOTBALL—PLAYERS CHOICE"

**DANIEL WIEDENHOFF**, Guard, Weber State: "My scholarship checks aren't nearly enough to live on adequately without a part-time job. It's forced poverty; people on welfare receive more than \$227 a month."

**JEFFREY KAISER**, Punter, Idaho State: "It upsets me that a majority of college players don't care enough about their own

education. They let a golden opportunity like a free education slip through their fingers."

**MARTY MORNHINWEG**, Quarterback, Montana: "The old saying that 'defense wins games and offense brings in the fans' is I think just a bunch of hot air! I think in most instances offense wins games and defense prevents losing. If you have a high powered offense and a poor defense, you always have a chance to outscore the opposition."

**DAVID THORSEN**, Tackle, Idaho: "I would like to see a higher percentage of football players obtaining a degree. Too many athletes do not see the importance a college degree has. I believe the NCAA should continue to increase the requirements for eligibility so that athletes who graduate will be better prepared for life."

**DIRK NELSON**, Punter, Montana State: "I feel (and I'm sure I'm in the minority) that a student-athlete should prove himself both on the field and in the classroom prior to getting financial aid. I think it is superfluous for a person to receive a scholarship when he may never play a down and/or his academic performance may be sub-par."

### MOST THRILLING MOMENT IN FOOTBALL

**JAMES GEE**, Defensive Tackle, NAU: "Last season I managed to block a field goal attempt by Nevada-Reno's Tony Zendejas which we ran back 86 yards (Bobby Jenkins) for a touchdown. It was at a critical stage of the game and gave us momentum to go on and win 41-38."

### WHY DO YOU PLAY FOOTBALL

**FRANK MORENO**, Defensive End, Idaho: "I love the competition. To me there's nothing more exciting than lining up defensively, looking across the line, and seeing a 260-pound lineman who wants to put you in the nickel seats."

## LUMBERJACK LEGENDS

### LUMBERJACKS

Harold P. Blome writes: "I first attended NANS in 1909 at which time we had three saw mills. On the Fourth of July we had celebrations on the grounds which are now on or about your football field. The events included bronco riding by local cowboys and sawing logs against time by men who worked in the several logging camps. The saws were six- or seven-foot cross saws with one man working each end. These men were called Lumber Jacks. It was phenomenal how fast the two Lumber Jacks cut a big log in two . . . (from this) the athletic teams adopted the name of Lumberjacks . . . Mr. Blome is the younger son of R.H.H. Blome, second president of Northern Arizona Normal School (NAU). His letter has written July, 1977."

### WHEELS

The Lumberjack Wheels first became a part of Lumberjack Homecoming and NAU tradition in 1932 when they were first used to carry the king and queen, Chester Fuller and Helen Gibbons, for the first time. This tradition of carrying the king and queen in the annual Homecoming parade has been broken only a few times, never in recent years.

### COPPER AXE

It was but nine months after NAU students received their pure Arizona copper axe in February 1933, that it was stolen.

The axe had been constructed to the specifications set by the students, and the handle carried the school nickname, "Lumberjack" in raised letters.

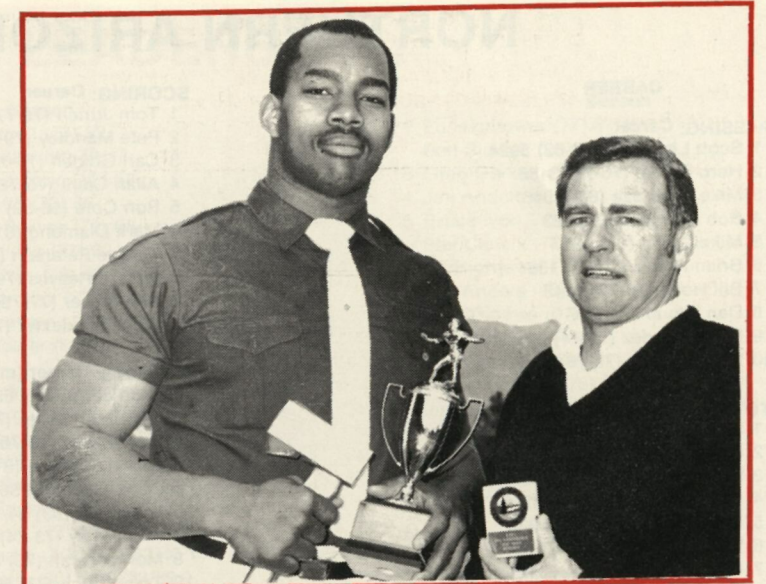
Deputy sheriff Jim Gregg and NAU night watchman J.E. Donnell captured the thieves after a 30-mile chase and returned them and the axe to Flagstaff.

The thieves, who turned out to be six Arizona State University freshmen football players, told officials they had stolen the axe to boost ASU's athletic spirit. The students were Rhodes Neece, Paul Guthrie, James Jiacoletti, Howard Hooten, Howard Wynn and Albert Dalmolin.

School and police officials termed the incident "a prank," and no charges were filed. Coach Mark McIntosh's Lumberjack football team had defeated ASU earlier in the season 13-0 and another contest was scheduled.

NAU students clipped the hair of the ASU students, painted them blue and gold and paraded them through the streets of Flagstaff. NAU defeated ASU in the second contest, 6-0.

Today, the axe is presented, cradled in a log, to NAU's athletic fans as the NAU band plays "Timber."

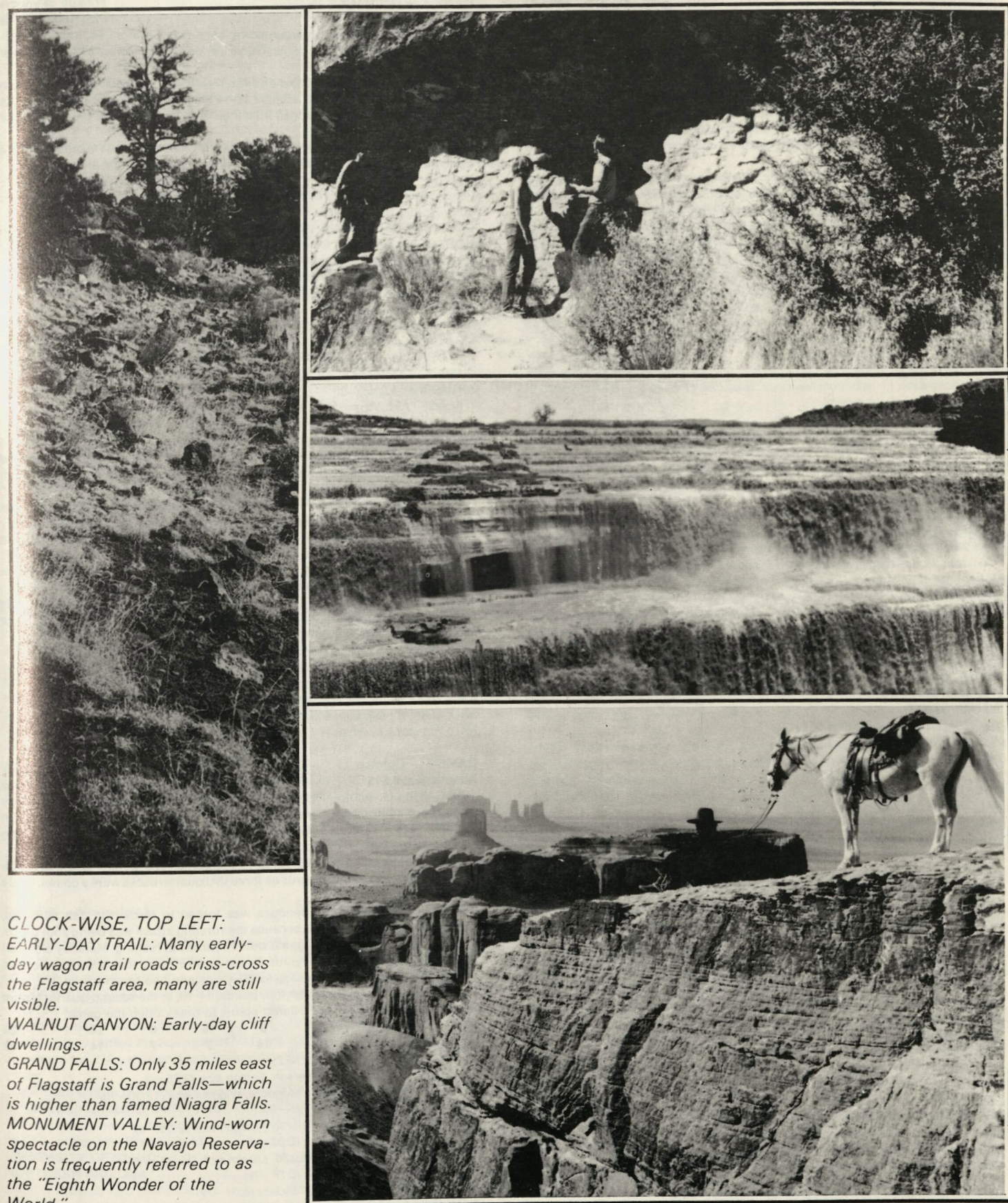

# 1983 LUMBERJACK FOOTBALL RECAP

## GAME 1 — September 10

Attendance: 10,334

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz.—The Lumberjacks came up with the big play on nearly every series and rolled to an easy 53-3 thrashing of Southern Utah in NAU's season opener.

The Lumberjack defense was rarely on the field as they intercepted three passes and recovered three fumbles in the first half. The offense capitalized on their good fortune and piled up 32 points before the intermission. Tommie Wright returned one interception 50 yards for a touchdown. DeJuan Robinson intercepted another and ran it back 99 yards only to have it called back on a clipping penalty.

The Lumberjack defense intercepted three more passes in the second half to stifle the Thunderbirds' offense. NAU tallied 21 more points in the second and yielded only a 46-yard field goal by Southern Utah kicker Rick Harrison.

NAU piled up 400 yards on offense. Quarterback Mike Mendoza completed 11 of 17 passes for 119 yards in his first game at the helm of the Lumberjack offense. Runningback Jerry Holder rushed 18 times for 117 yards. Ben Richardson led the receiving corp with four catches for 47 yards. NAU racked up 122 yards in interception returns and 107 in punt returns by Pete Mandley.

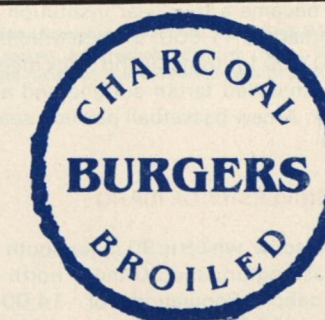

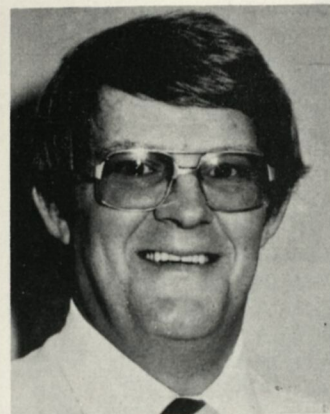


## BIG SKY COUNTRY

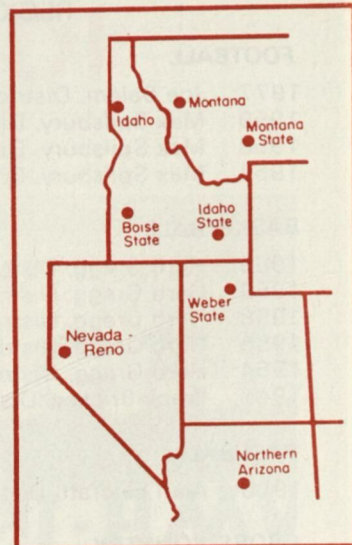
The Big Sky Conference begins its 22nd season of operation in 1984-85 with championships being decided in eight sports, including cross country, football, wrestling, basketball, golf, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field. Eight schools comprise the league.

Charter members of the BSC, which is one of two major conferences located in the Rocky Mountain region are: Gonzaga University, Spokane, Washington; the University of Idaho, Moscow; Idaho State University, Pocatello; the University of Montana, Missoula; Montana State University, Bozeman; and Weber State College, Ogden, Utah. Boise State University, Boise, Idaho; and Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff joined the league on July 1, 1970. The University of Nevada at Reno joined for the 1979-80 season, replacing Gonzaga who joined the West Coast Athletic Association.

The conference has member schools in five states and covers more than 180,000 square miles (or almost 1/12th of the total square miles in the continental United States). The name Big Sky originated in a novel authored by A.B. (Bud) Guthrie of Great Falls, Montana in 1947 entitled "The Big Sky." Jack Hollowell, former Montana Advertising Director, promoted the Big Sky theme for the Treasure State. Harry Missildine of the

Spokane "Spokesman-Review" called for the conference to be named the "Big Sky Conference" in his column of February 20, 1963. On February 25, 1963, the conference's name was adopted by the presidents of the newly-founded league during a meeting in Spokane.



### BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY

Located in Boise, the capitol city of Idaho. Situated on Interstate 80N, the city had a population of 115,000 and 145,000 in the surrounding area. Founded in 1932 as a junior college and became a four-year institution in 1968. Enrollment is 11,600. Bronco Stadium seats over 20,000 for football and track meets with a newly-installed tartan surface and all-weather track. A new basketball pavilion seats over 12,000.

### UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO

Located in Moscow, which is 90 miles south of Spokane, Washington, and 30 miles north of Lewiston, Idaho. Population of 14,000. Enrollment of 12,620. Founded in 1889. Kibbie-ASU Dome, which was dedicated in 1975 with a cost of \$7.8 million, seats more than 18,000 for football and basketball. The second of three domed stadiums built in the Big Sky Conference. Tartan surface for both football and basketball.

### IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY

Located in Pocatello, the major city in Eastern Idaho. Population of 50,000. Located 170 miles north of Salt Lake City, Utah, on Interstate 15. Enrollment of more than 12,120. Founded in 1901. The ISU Minidome was the first college-owned indoor football arena in the United States. Seats more than 12,000 for football, basketball and indoor track meets. Polyturf surface for football, wood floor for basketball, and banked wood running track. The Minidome was completed in 1970 at a cost of \$2.8 million.

### UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA

Located in Missoula, which is 210 miles east of Spokane, Washington, on Interstate 90. Population of 35,000 with 70,000 in the surrounding area. Founded in 1893. Enrollment of more than 9,000. Dornblaser Stadium seats 12,000 with natural turf. Adams Field House seats over 9,300 for basketball with a tartan surface.

### MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY

Located in Bozeman, which is 140 miles west of Billings on Interstate 90. Population of 25,000. Founded in 1893. Enrollment of 11,200. Reno H. Stadium was completed in 1973 and seats over 15,000 for football played on natural turf. MSU Field House was opened in 1957 and seats more than 10,000 for basketball.

### UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA-RENO

The Big Sky Conference's newest member. Joined the league July 1, 1979. Located in Reno on Interstate 80. Population of 172,000 with more than 250,000 in the surrounding region. Enrollment of 10,000. Founded in 1874. Mackay Stadium has been expanded to seat 13,500 for football with natural turf. New Basketball arena will seat 12,500.

### NORTHERN ARIZONA UNIVERSITY

Located in Flagstaff, 140 miles north of Phoenix on Interstate 17. Population 42,000. Founded in 1899. Enrollment of 11,600. NAU Dome completed in 1977 at cost of \$8.1 million. Seats more than 15,300 for football (Astroturf) and basketball (hardwood floor). Has 352-yard tartan track. Other NAU facilities: 220-yard indoor track and 440-yard all-weather outdoor track. A full size 85 by 200 ice rink, and an Olympic-sized swimming pool.

### WEBER STATE COLLEGE

Located in Ogden, Utah which is 35 miles north of Salt Lake City on Interstate 15. Population of 90,000 with more than 150,000 located in the immediate area. Founded in 1889 and became a four-year institution in 1962. Enrollment of 11,300. Wildcat Stadium seats more than 17,000 with a natural turf for football and an all-weather track. The \$11.3 million Dee Events Center opened its doors for the first time in the fall of 1977 and seats more than 11,500 for basketball.

Some of the newcomers that Shonka will be counting on are Bruce Hadley, 5-9, 185, junior, defensive back; Neal Windham, 6-3, 235, junior, linebacker; and Eddie Grimes, 6-1, 240, freshman, noseguard.

Dave Lucero will return for his final year as the Cowboy's kicker and that gives Shonka some sort of relief.

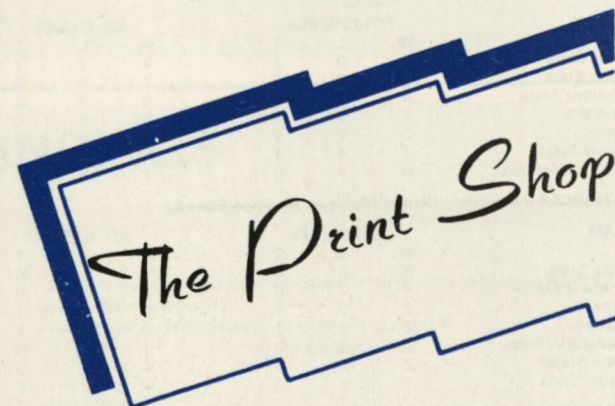

## CALIFORNIA STATE NORTHBRIDGE OUTLOOK

With 16 starters back from last season's Western Football Conference co-champs, head coach Tom Keele can look forward to another successful season as he enters his sixth season at the helm of the Matadors.

Finishing conference play with a mark of 2-1, the Matadors tied the University of Santa Clara for first place. When those teams met the Matadors came out on the winning end, 24-22.

Keele has 16 starters returning, seven on offense and nine on defense. To go along with the 16 returning starters Keele and his assistants have a total of 39 lettermen returning as they lost only eight lettermen from last year's team.

Heading the list of returners is WFC Player of the Year and All American punter/kicker Bryan Wagner. Wagner led the nation with a 43.7 punting average and also was good on 10 of 14 field goals and 23 of 24 extra points.

Returning starters on the offense include tailback Mike Kane, All WFC and school record holder for rushing yards in a season with 851. As a freshman, last season, Kane also caught 20 passes for 274 yards. The coaching staff is very excited about the future of this 5-10, 178-pound sophomore. To go along with Kane is senior wide receiver Rick Carbonneau, All WFC in 1983 and junior wide receiver/kick returner Ron Colarossi, who holds the school record for career kickoff returns (66) and yardage (1427). Quarterback Dave Johnson, a senior, will head up the offense. After taking over in the third game last season he was good on 96 of 197 attempts for 1372 yards and eight TD's.

Defensively, the only new starters will be at the left tackle with Doug Minor and strong safety with Pat Cerutti. All three linebackers return with Pete Teutonico in the middle for the third consecutive year. He was in on 87 tackles last season to place second on the team. Teutonico and free safety Ron Foster were Honorable Mention All WFC in 1983. All WFC pick Joe Barbosa returns. Barbosa, 6-4, 240, moved from linebacker to tackle last season and came up with 56 tackles, seven of those were sacks.

## WEBER STATE COLLEGE OUTLOOK

This season will be a rebuilding one for fourth-year head coach Mike Price as he has only 11 seniors returning. Last season the Wildcats had a 6-5 overall record which included a 3-4 Big Sky mark, good for a fifth place tie.

In his first three seasons at the helm, Price has put together a 17-16-0 record. His team's have not fared as well against Big Sky opponents as they have a 9-12-0 record.

This is the second consecutive year these two teams have met in their Big Sky opener. Last season the Wildcats built up an early 19-3 halftime lead and held on for a 26-13 victory when NAU traveled to Ogden. Although Weber State holds a 12-8 series lead, NAU has won six of last 10 meetings.

Price knows he has a young team but he is quite optimistic. His staff has some proven players to work with and will be counted on some of last seasons reserves to pull them through. The Wildcats have 26 lettermen returning and included in that number are eight returning starters.

The Wildcat's offense will include four honorable mention All Big Sky picks from 1983. Leading the way is Freddie Cook, a 5-11, 185 junior running back. Last season he was the second leading rusher for the Wildcats with 423 yards and seven touchdowns on 86 carries. He was also used as a receiver coming out of the back field often and finished fourth on the team with 30 catches for 326 yards and three touchdowns. Providing blocking for Cook will be a necessity if the Wildcats are to be successful on the ground. Leading the offensive line are senior guard Dan Wiedenhoff, 6-3, 255, and junior center Craig Dumity, 6-2, 245. Craig Slama, a 6-1, 195 junior tight end, had ten catches for 100 yards and one touchdown as a reserve last year.

Leading the defense are two honorable mention All Big Sky defensive backs in Junior Crockett and Rick Ryan. Crockett, a 5-10, 170 cornerback/return specialist, led Weber defensive backs with an average of 5.9 tackles a game and had one interception. As a return specialist he had eight kickoff returns for 241 yards, including an 89-yard touchdown return against Montana State and recovered a blocked punt in the endzone in the first game of the season against Southwest State.

In Bob Cope's first year as head coach at UOP the Tigers suffered through a tough 3-9 season. The ywere in many of the games that they would eventually lose and came up with upset victories over Oregon and San Jose State. Cope and the rest of his staff are looking to 10 returning starters as the foundation for improvemetn this year. To go along with these 10 players the Tigers have 19 JUCO transfers and a group of redshirts including several starters from the 1982 squad to help this team improve.

Last season was the first time NAU and UOP met on the gridiron and the Lumberjacks will be trying to avenge the loss handed to them in Stockton. The Tigers built a 21-0 halftime lead and used a ball control offense to keep the NAU offense off the field. The final in the game was 28-14.

The Tigers also played two other Big Sky schools last season, Idaho and Nevada-Reno. Idaho handed the Tigers a 31-19 loss and Nevada-Reno defeated UOP 34-24.

The Tigers will be looking to Paul Berner, 6-3, 200 senior quarterback, to lead the offensive attack. Berner missed almost all of last year and the usually wide-open attack faltered. In 1982 Berner threw for almost 2,600 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Berner has a fine set of targets for the 1985 campaign. Included on the list of receivers are tightend Tony Camp, 6-5, 230 senior, halfback Bill Wolsky, 6-2, 210 senior, and wide receiver Ron Woods, 5-11, 170 senior. Camp is considered by many as an All American candidate even after missing all of last year with a knee injury. Woods is the wide out with much experience as he caught 21 passes for 283 yards last season and has now recorded 71 catches in his UOP career.

The defensive line is an area of major concern as it was hit hard by graduation. The defense will be counting on a strong year from its linebacking corps. Nick Holt, 6-1, 210 junior, led the team in tackles with 137 stops in 1984. Joining Holt are juniors Sheldon McKenzie, 6-1, 205, and Richard Lee, 6-3, 225. Both contributed last season and with the addition of JUCO transfers and redshirts this is the definite stronghold of the Tiger defense.

# UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA-RENO OUTLOOK

Defending Big Sky Conference Champions, Nevada-Reno will attempt to repeat. It will not be easy, however. Beginning his eighth season at the helm of the Wolfpack, head coach Chris Ault is faced with the possibly the toughest task since he has been on the campus.

Ault has only four offensive and seven defensive regulars returning. One problem facing Ault is a pleasant one, who will be starting quarterback. Junior Joe Pizzo held the job for the first six weeks before a broken ankle left him sidelined for the remainder of the regular season and all of the playoffs. Freshman Eric Beavers came on to take over the signal calling and had an impressive showing through the latter part of the regular season and playoffs, leading the Wolfpack to the semi-finals of the NCAA 1-AA national championships.

NAU surprised the Wolfpack when they came to Flagstaff last season by upending them 41-38.

Besides Pizzo and Beavers returning, the offense will feature offensive linemen Greg Rea and Rick Harris again this year. Stan Cagel, a wide-out, with 19 receptions for 236 yards in 1983 will be looked on to take the place of 1983 leading receiver Alphonso Williams who was lost to graduation.

Ault has a little more to look forward to on the defensive side of things as they are a little more experienced. The secondary and linebacking corps return a majority of front liners while the line will be suspect. Tackle Larry Pierce, who redshirted in 1982 and started last season, will be a key on the line. Three linebackers from 1983's Championship team return. Pacing this group is inside linebacker Kyle Denny and outside men Mark McVeigh and Jeff Peterson.

In the defensive backfield, free safety Patrick Hunter posted a team-high six interceptions while both cornerbacks will join him this season again. Joe Peterson had five interceptions while Darryl McCoy, who previously transferred from NAU, picked off three passes in 1983. With these three returning with another year of experience, opponents may find it difficult to go to the air when playing the Wolfpack.

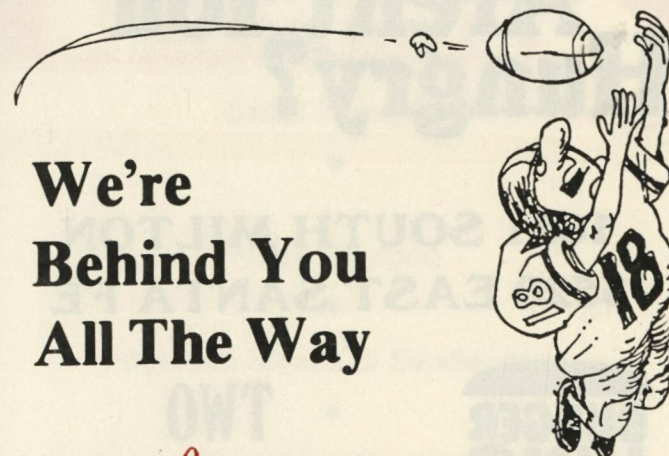

**UNIVERSITY OF MONTANA OUTLOOK**

Head coach Larry Donovan will be looking for the type of performances that brought his 1982 team the Big Sky championship. 1983 proved to be very difficult on the defending champs as they won their first four games before dropping their final six and finishing in a tie for fifth with Weber State.

Donovan has an experienced group to work with this fall as he has 40 lettermen returning, including in that group are 10 starters. The Grizzlies will need to be ready early as three of their first four games are on the road, those could really make a difference in the remainder of the season.

Montana holds a 10-7 series edge over NAU and after spoiling NAU's homecoming the Grizzlies won only one more game. Trailing 17-14 with 3:15 left to play, the Grizzlies scored on a one-yard run by Bob Connors to upend the Lumberjacks 21-17.

The Grizzlies have three possibilities of starting quarterbacks. Marty Mornhiweg, redshirted last season, Kelly Richardson and Johnny Coppedge will be battling for the starting job. Mornhiweg a 5-10, 190 senior holds almost every Montana passing records. The others are both juniors and saw action last fall. Richardson, 6-0, 182, also holds the punting chores for the Grizzlies.

The Grizzlies will have to fill some voids in the offense that were created by graduation. Fullback Joe Kluczewich, the team's second leading rusher last season, returns to spearhead the rushing game but lost are All American tightend Brian Salonen and All Big Sky tailback Joey Charles. The offensive line has three starters returning and four people who were redshirted last season.

The defense has four starters returning and a total of 16 lettermen returning. Inside linebacker Jake Trammell, 6-2, 220, and outside linebacker Bill Tarrow, 6-5, 210, are the key performers on defense. Trammell, a senior, broke into the starting lineup in 1983 recorded a team high 104 tackles and three fumble recoveries, good for a tie for the top spot. Tarrow recorded 68 stops and six of those were for losses. The line could be suspect, however if a couple of giants come through the Grizzlies could be very domineering. The giants are Scot Poole, a 6-7, 270-pound tackle, and Larry Oliver, 6-6, 250.

**BOISE STATE UNIVERSITY OUTLOOK**

Last season the Broncos had to adjust to a new coach and got off to a rocky 2-4 start before winning four of their final five games to finish in a tie for third in the Big Sky Conference with Idaho. Second-year coach Lyle Setencich is hoping that the transition period is over and the team can get into the Big Sky race.

Setencich has an experienced bunch this fall as he has the luxury of seven starters on each side of the ball returning as well as a total of 34 lettermen returning.

Last season when the Lumberjacks traveled to Boise they were ambushed by the Broncos. Boise thrashed NAU 28-3. The Broncos amassed 378 yards on the ground and never let NAU rest or get in the game.

Quarterback Hazzen Choates, who took over for Gerald DesPres in the fourth game of 1983, returns and is expected to be the offensive leader for the Broncos. Both of last season's runningbacks are gone and the Broncos lost their top two receivers from last season so Choates will have some tough work ahead as will Setencich and the rest of the offensive staff. On the offensive line the Broncos have All Big Sky tackle John Kilgo returning to anchor the line. Kilgo, 6-4, 265, should be a great influence on the younger linemen on the team.

Other offensive players returning that should help the Broncos include wide receiver Kim Metcalf, 6-1, 185, and Eric Andrade, 6-1, 180.

The defensive unit was one of the strongest areas of the team in 1983 and was one of the best in the Big Sky. They held Big Sky opponents to an average of 17 points a game. Leading the way in 1983 was 6-5, 255-pound defensive tackle Mark Koch. He had a team high, for linemen, with 77 tackles. The junior is expected to lead the way again and make the All Big Sky first team again in 1984. The inside linebacking chores will be left up to returners Carl Keever and Jim Ellis. With the rest of the people the Bronco defense has returning it will once again be their strong suit.

### IDAHO STATE UNIVERSITY OUTLOOK

Jim Koetter took Idaho State to 1983 NCAA 1-AA playoffs, where it was eliminated by Nevada-Reno in the first round, in his debut season at the helm of the Bengals. He did an admirable job as the year before the Bengals won only three games while losing eight. Koetter's first season the Bengals put together a 8-4 record.

The Bengals have seven offensive and six defensive starters returning for the 1984 campaign and again are considered to be one of the powers in the Big Sky. Last season the Lumberjacks traveled to Pocatello and came home with a 42-24 loss to the Bengals. Idaho State racked up 460 yards in the game as the passing attack accounted for 359 of those yards.

Offensively the Bengals should be strong even considering the loss of quarterback Paul Peterson. Peterson, who threw for 2,670 yards in 1983, will be replaced by junior Vern Harris. Harris was redshirted last fall after transferring from Fullerton College. Koetter feels Harris will be a strong replacement and places a great deal of confidence in the youngster.

The offensive line will be strong as they return 6-1, 223-pound All Big Sky center Todd Price and three other starters from 1983. Guards Tim Messuri and Chris Lacy will join Price and tackle Jeff Bartlow in providing the protection Harris will need to direct the attack.

Koetter forsee a better running game this year. This should balance the offense and boost the passing game. The running backs include Wade Wilhite, Chris Cawdery, Dale Goodwin and Merrill Hoge.

With six starters returning to the defensive team the Bengals will field a strong defense. Included in this group are safety John Berry, who had four interceptions last season, noseguard Steve Anderson and tackle Bob Otto. The biggest weak spot on the ISU defense will be linebacker.

Jeff Kaiser will hold the punting chores again this fall after leading the league and finishing sixth in the nation with a 42.5-yard average a year ago.

### UNIVERSITY OF MANITOBA OUTLOOK

The Bisons are coming off a disappointing 1-7 1983 season and sixth-year head coach Dennis Hrycaiko will hope to find the formula to carry his troops to the top of the Western Intercollegiate Football League.

Manitoba returns 25 lettermen that includes 16 starters from last season's edition. The Bisons run a Wing-T offense and their basic defense is a 4-3-5. The one win of the season for Manitoba came at the hands of the University of British Columbia, 12-9.

This will mark the first time the two teams have met on the football field, and the first time NAU has ever played a Canadian school. The teams play under different rules and to just name a few the Bisons play with 12 men at a time and the backs can be in motion at all times and they have five years of eligibility.

Manitoba will look for third-year quarterback Mike O'Donnell, 6-0, 180; to lead the offense. In 1983 he was good on 63 of 130 passing attempts good for 580 yards and one touchdown, while throwing five interceptions. O'Donnell also ran for 129 yards on 30 carries and scored two touchdowns. Joining O'Donnell in the back field will be running back Gerry Urbanovit. The 5-9, 180-pound third year player gained 439 yards on 86 carries and scored two touchdowns. He also caught 11 passes for 55 yards. Offensive linemen Randy Ambrose, 6-4, 245, All Conference tackle; and Ross Garland, 5-11, 210, center; will be returning for the Bisons and will provide protection and holes for O'Donnell and Urbanovit.

Defensively the Bisons return all three linebackers from 1983 as well as two defensive backs. The linebacking corps consist of Mitch Kiesman, 6-2, 230; Rod Ambrose, 6-1, 210; and Ron St. Mars, 6-1, 222. The backs are 6-1, 175-pound Peter Lawrence and Tim Hower, 6-2, 175.

## MONTANA STATE UNIVERSITY OUTLOOK

Second-year coach Dave Arnold is faced with a large task for the 1984 campaign, he must find a way to turn around the lay of his Bobcats that produced a dismal 1-10 overall record and a 1-6 Big Sky mark. He has 33 returning lettermen including 17 full-time and seven part-time starters to work with and there is nowhere but up to go for Arnold's Bobcats.

MSU was plagued with ineptness on both sides of scrimmage all season long. The offense scored only 109 points, less than 10 a game. The defense was just as bleak. The lone victory, 28-8 over Montana, was the only game the Bobcats held the opposition to less than 21 points. Also the defense yielded almost twice the yardage rushing the Bobcats could net.

Last season the Bobcats went to the locker room with a 10-6 halftime lead, but the Lumberjacks came back strong in the second half and went on to win 33-16.

Heading the list of offensively is tightend Joe Bignell. The 6-4, 235-pound Bignell was the leading receiver for MSU with 38 catches for 320 yards and two touchdowns. He is on track to becoming the leading receiver in Bobcat history as he needs only 28 catches to surpass Ron Bain's career record of 109 catches.

The loss of quarterback Mike Godfrey opens up the position and the competition looks to be between Kelly Bradley, 6-3, 195; and Greg Andal, 6-2, 190. Bradley is a junior at MSU and Andal comes to Bozeman from Walla Walla CC. The other two backfield positions are open as well and junior Dave Pandt looks as the best bet to watch when the Bobcats run the ball. He was the leading rusher last fall with 325 yards.

The defense has 11 starters returning that could prove to be a real plus. Heading up the list of returners is first team All Big Sky linebacker Mark Fellows. The 6-1, 225-pound senior came up with 82 tackles last season and will be counted on for another banner year. At the end positions will be junior John Kinna and freshman Shane Quilling and Pat Gunderson.

Both the kicker and punter will return as they are probably the biggest plus for Arnold this season. Mark Carter, kicker, has scored 157 points in his first three seasons, hitting 36 of 50 field goals and 49 of 52 PAT's. Punter, Dirk Nelson carries a career average of nearly 41 yards.

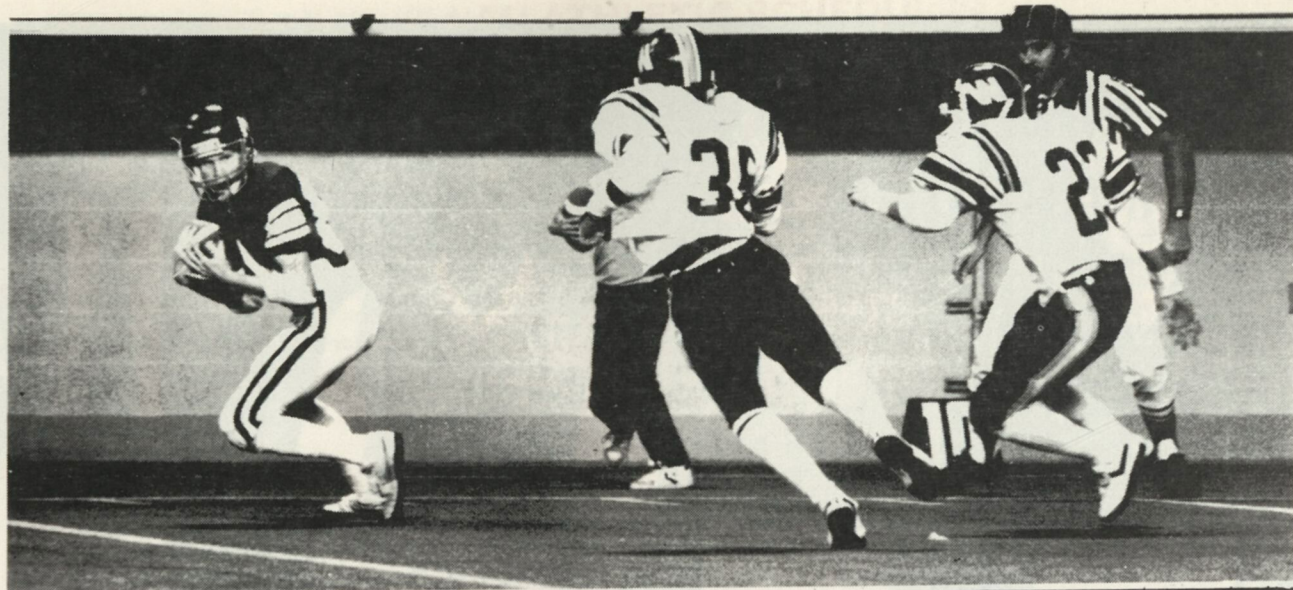

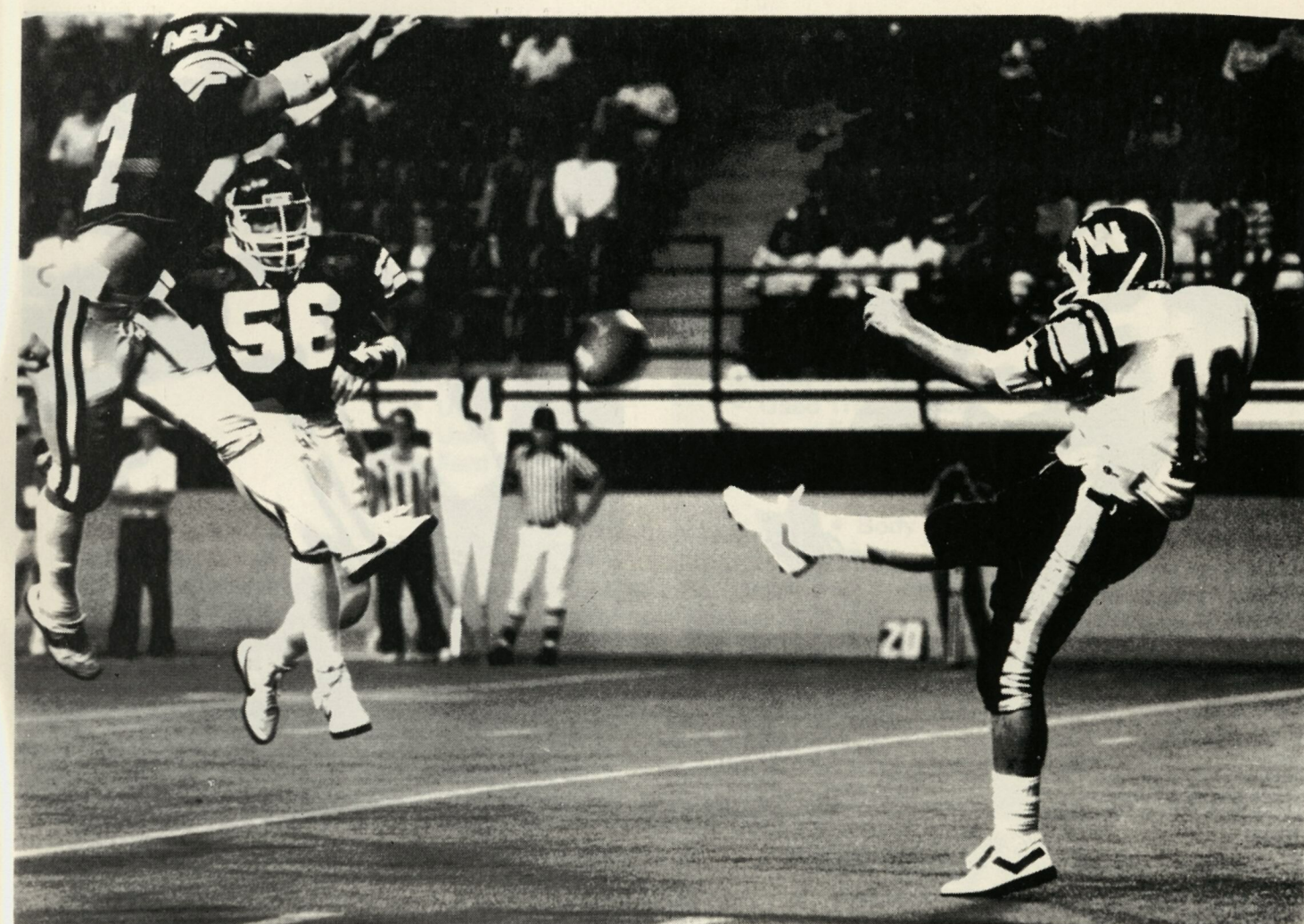

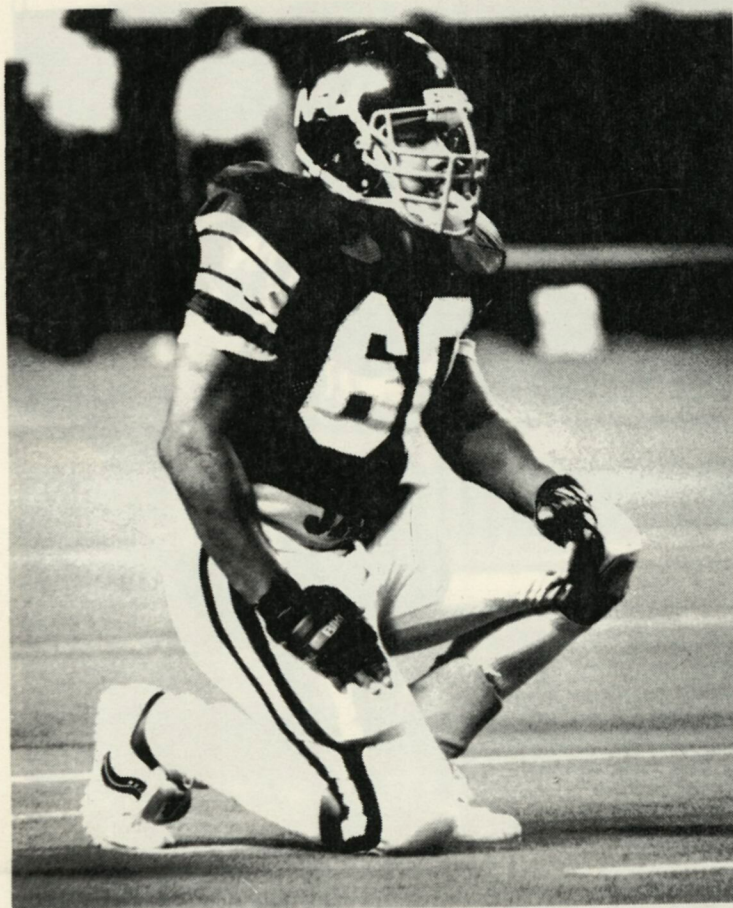
