Dr. Stephen Horn

President, CSU Long Beach

Now in his 15th year as President of California State University, Long Beach, Dr. Stephen Horn has emphasized ever-increasing quality in a period of fiscal constraints.

A native Californian, Dr. Horn received the Bachelor of Arts degree (with great distinction) in political science from Stanford University in 1953. He was awarded a Master of Public Administration degree from Harvard University in 1955 and a doctoral degree in political science from Stanford in 1958.

In 1958, Dr. Horn began a career in public affairs as a Congressional Fellow of the American Political Science Association. He also completed his first book, *The Cabinet and Congress*. In 1959, he was one of the two youngest appointees in the Eisenhower administration, having been named as the Administrative Assistant to Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell. In late 1960, he moved to Capitol Hill where he served as the Legislative Assistant to U.S. Senator Thomas H. Kuchel (R-Calif.), who was one of four leaders

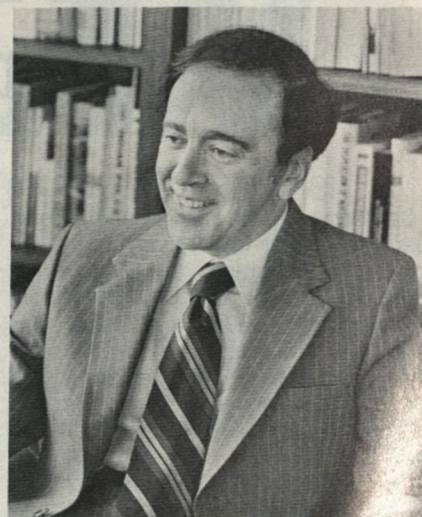
of the Senate.

In 1966, Dr. Horn began a transition to higher education as a Senior Fellow at the Brookings Institution where he wrote *Unused Power: The Work of the Senate Committee on Appropriations*. He next examined the problems of legislative ethics and campaign finances which resulted in a co-authored work after he came to CSULB. During that 1966-1969 period, he was also senior consultant and host for a 40-show TV series on Congress, the Presidency, and the Supreme Court.

In February 1969, he became Dean of Graduate Studies and Research at the American University in Washington, D.C., and the following year became the third president of California State University, Long Beach.

Dr. Horn has been active in community affairs, particularly in Long Beach. He is currently Chairman of the United Way campaign for Region III (Palos Verdes to Whittier).

From 1969 to 1982, Dr. Horn served as Vice Chairman and Commissioner of



the United States Commission on Civil Rights. He is a founding member of the Advisory Board to the National Institute of Corrections of the U.S. Department of Justice and serves on the Board of the Institute of International Education in New York.

John Kasser

Director of Sports, Athletics & Recreation

John Kasser took over the reigns of the athletic department at California State University Long Beach in August and brings a new vitality and a demonstrated ability to lead a top-notch Division I program.

Kasser, 46, comes to Long Beach after two years as the director of athletics at the University of Houston, in a period unequalled in that institution's storied tradition. Not only did the Cougars reach the Final Four three times in men's basketball during Kasser's two years as an associate director and two years leading the program, Houston won two NCAA golf championships, increased community contributions significantly and developed academic support services for student-athletes, with special emphasis on academic counseling and advising.

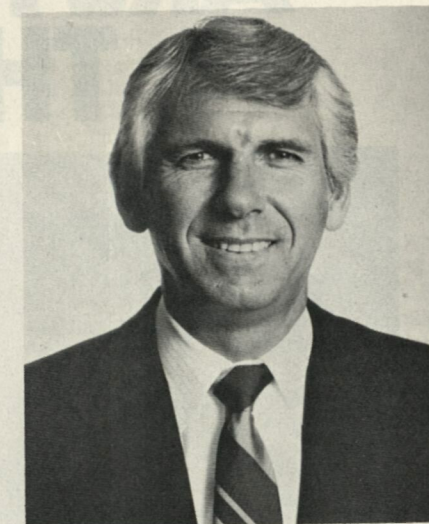
A native of Southern California, Kasser was appointed to the Long Beach position on July 5.

Kasser began his career in athletics

as a prep star at Inglewood High School before going on to Pepperdine University, where he started for three seasons at center for the Waves before graduating in 1959.

From 1960 until 1964 Kasser was the varsity basketball coach at Downey High before moving to Fountain Valley High in Huntington Beach as the head basketball coach and athletic director (1964-69). He entered the automobile business in 1969 and for almost 10 years worked in sales and management for Chevrolet until quitting to take over an assistant athletic director's post at UC Irvine in 1978. After two highly successful seasons working in the Irvine program, Kasser moved to Houston in May of 1980 to become an associate athletic director in charge of internal affairs.

In 1982 Kasser moved up to the athletic director's position when Cedric Dempsey left the post for the University of Arizona. He also serves as a member of the Division I Women's Basketball



Committee and has established a reputation nationally as one of the most competent and effective administrators around in just a short time.

Kasser and his wife Carol have two daughters — Karen and Sharon.

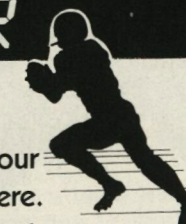

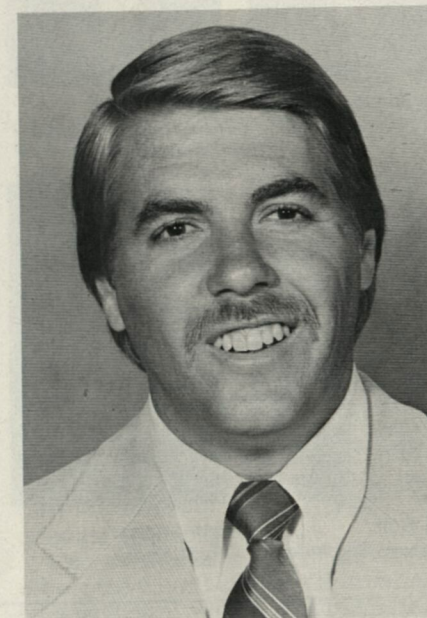

Mike Sheppard *Head Coach*



Mike Sheppard brings a proven record of success and a flair for an exciting passing game as he takes over as California State University Long Beach's sixth head coach in 1984.

With his return to Long Beach last Dec. 29, Sheppard gives the 49ers a coach that will not only continue the recent tradition of excellent passing teams, but someone that has built his coaching philosophy with input from some of the top minds in football today.

Sheppard, 32, was first introduced to Long Beach football fans in 1982 as he coached the quarterbacks and receivers for Dave Currey during a season when the 49ers led the nation in passing offense. He also tutored quarterback Todd Dillon that season as he finished the year as the nation's leader in total offense and set numerous school and conference records in leading the 49ers to a surprising second-place finish in the PCAA.

During the 1983 campaign Sheppard served as the offensive coordinator at the University of Kansas. He guided a Jayhawk offense that set a Big Eight single season passing record and was fourth nationally in passing offense. Kansas was second only to Nebraska in conference scoring and total offense. Senior quarterback Frank Seuer also set a Big Eight single season passing mark as Kansas racked-up eight school offensive records.

Before coming to Long Beach as an assistant in the spring of 1982, Sheppard served as recruiting coordinator and coached the quarterbacks and receivers at Idaho State University for two years. During his second season on the Bengal staff he helped guide the team to a 12-1 record and the NCAA I-AA crown as Idaho State led the nation in passing and was second in scoring and total offense. That same season Bengal quarterback Mike Machurek led the nation in total offense and passing efficiency.

For one season (1979) Sheppard was the offensive coordinator at United States International University working under the legendary Sid Gillman. He was also the recruiting coordinator

there and coached Bob Gagliano, who went on to play for the Kansas City Chiefs.

During the 1977 and '78 seasons, Sheppard worked on Lavell Edwards' staff at Brigham Young University as the Cougars led the nation's major colleges in total offense and won the Western Athletic Conference title in 1977. During his stint at BYU, Mike worked with the quarterbacks, receivers and runningbacks in addition to recruiting and scouting duties. He also earned a masters degree while at BYU.

It was at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks that Mike first entered the coaching field. For three years (1974-76) he coached the receivers and quarterbacks at Cal Lutheran and helped fashion a 28-3 record during that time, including an NAIA national runnerup finish in 1975.

Mike began his athletic career in Southern California as a standout football and baseball player at John Burroughs High in Burbank before going on to major in business at Cal

Lutheran.

Sheppard played both football and baseball at Cal Lutheran, where he earned All-American honors as a wide receiver in 1972 and was all-district in both sports for two years running. In the 1971 NAIA National Championship game he was named the Most Valuable Lineman, playing split end.

Following his graduation in 1973, Sheppard played one year of minor league baseball with the Portland Mavericks before returning to Cal Lutheran in 1974 to work in the Admissions Office and coach football.

Some of the best offensive minds in the game today have influenced Sheppard during his career, and he draws from a wealth of experience from not only people like Gillman and Edwards, but outstanding coaches like Doug Scovil (BYU) who is now the head coach at San Diego State, Wally English (BYU), who is the head coach at Tulane, Tom Walsh (USIU) now on the Los Angeles Raiders' staff, and of course Currey (who left Long Beach to take over the head job at the University of Cincinnati).

"We like to emphasize the passing game and will compliment it with our running attack," notes Sheppard in discussing his offensive philosophy. "We want to be diverse in our alignments and have motion. Our goal is to utilize our personnel in several different ways."

Sheppard inherits a team that went 8-4 a year ago and has 17 starters to replace. This is coupled with the toughest schedule in school history, featuring three Pacific-10 teams — including defending Rose Bowl Champion UCLA.

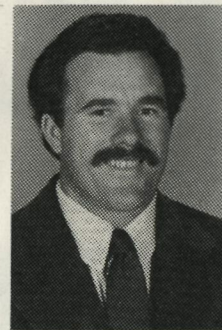
"We like the challenge, and hopefully one of our strengths is that we will play together," he adds. "We think our players believe in our system. We want them to believe they can score on any play we run. We want a smart offense with a number of ways to score and win."

A resident of Long Beach, Mike and his wife, Cathie, have two children: a daughter, Christina, 5, and a son, Brian, 1.

Forty-Niners Host Pacific in Final Home Contest

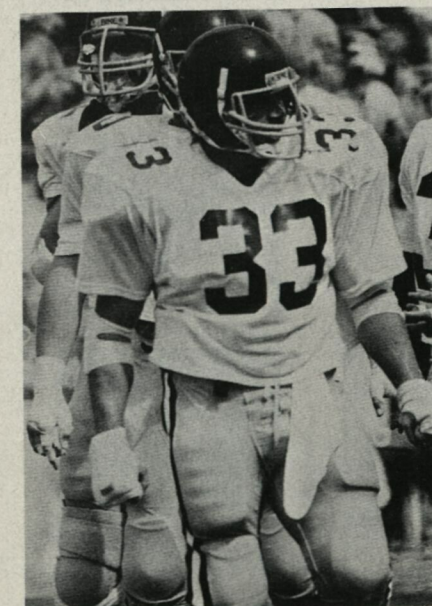
California State University Long Beach and its high-powered passing offense that ranks second nationally only to Brigham Young, closes out its home schedule today as the 49ers host the University of the Pacific Tigers.

The 49ers are 2-6 overall and 2-3 in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association after dropping their Homecoming game to Cal State Fullerton last week, 42-28, before 9,721 — the largest home crowd since 1981.

Mistakes — two interceptions and a fumble — helped the visiting Titans get off to a quick 21-6 lead, and a late 49er rally that saw CSULB close the gap to 35-28 with 2:20 to play fell short as the visitors scored in the final minute to put the game out of reach.

The Tigers, who are 3-5 overall and 1-3 in the PCAA, were surprised by winless Utah State last week, 41-14, after playing conference leader Nevada-Las Vegas close the week before.

UOP features one of the conference's top quarterbacks in senior Paul Berner, and two of the PCAA's top five rushers in James Mackey and Ron Thornton.

"On offense Pacific is the biggest team we've played all year long," notes 49er Head Coach Mike Sheppard. "They can run and throw equally well, and an indication of how good they are is the tough game they played two weeks ago against Las Vegas. They are a lot like we are in the fact that they have played everyone well, but seem to commit the penalties and turnovers that give the other team a chance to win."

Against Fullerton Long Beach won the battle of total yards (482 to 369) and first downs (25-18), but made three critical turnovers in the first half that led directly to Titan touchdowns. The 49ers have outgained and outfirst-downed six of eight opponents this year.

Last week's loss overshadowed an otherwise record-setting performance by the 49ers' junior quarterback — Doug Gaynor — who set a school single-game total offense record by completing 28 of 49 passes for 426 yards and rushing for five more, giving him 431 total yards. He also passed for four touchdowns and is now second nationally in offense and ninth in passing efficiency.

"Statistics don't win football games," adds Sheppard. "Some do — like turnover ratio and final score. Our goals going into the game were not to turn the ball over. If we could do that we thought we could compete. If you look at the game, that's what happened — Fullerton took our turnovers and scored on them. I felt we had a good game plan — we just didn't execute it."

Sheppard did point out the outstanding play of junior flanker Troy Ory, who caught seven passes for 127 yards, fullback Mark Templeton, who caught six passes for 52 yards and two touchdowns, center John Stapleton, end Thomas Hensley, linebacker Kevin Moore and cornerback John Hendy.

"Our football team has played extremely hard all year long and did so last week," says Sheppard. "We've shown a resiliency and an ability to bounce back, and we almost came back and stole it away from Fullerton at the end. The crowd and the student support was exciting on Saturday,

and we hope to be able to build on that in the future."

This week the 49ers face a potent passer in Berner, who in less than two full seasons has established himself as the Tiger career passing leader. This year in seven games (he missed one with an injury) Berner has completed 112 of 200 attempts for 1,489 yards and 10 touchdowns, with 14 interceptions.

Against Fullerton he hit on 32 of 47 for 446 yards and four TD's and now holds five UOP school records. Berner's favorite targets are halfback Bill Wolsky, who has caught 24 passes for 188 yards, and wide receiver Michael Scott, who has 21 catches for 336 yards and five TD's. Tight end Tony Camp has 17 catches for 290 yards and one score.

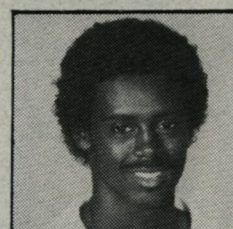
Mackey is second in the PCAA in rushing with 706 yards in 152 carries, and has scored five touchdowns, while Thornton is fifth in the PCAA with 422 yards in 114 attempts and has scored twice.

Defensively, the Tigers are led by linebacker Nick Holt and Sheldon McKenzie, who have 104 and 91 tackles, respectively, while cornerback Tommy Purvis has four interceptions to pace the secondary.
