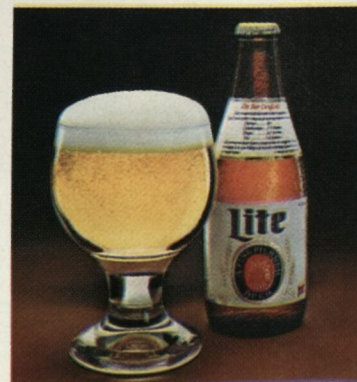

## Scouting Report

### Bulldogs Host Tigers in PCAA Encounter

**T**hey call it playing for pride. And Fresno State, one week after being removed from consideration for California Bowl IV, will be playing for just that. But the Bulldogs also will be playing to become only the seventh team in school history to win as many as nine games in a single season, and only the third since 1961.

The road does not appear to be an easy one for the 6-3 Bulldogs, who have remaining games against Pacific, Montana State and Nevada-Las Vegas. Head coach Jim Sweeney's first concern, of course, is the Tigers, who come into this afternoon's PCAA contest with an overall record of 3-6 and a league mark of 1-4.

"When you play the Tigers, like San Jose State, you throw out the record book; you expect them only to play at their best," says the seventh-year FSU coach. "I have not yet seen the film of UOP's game against Long Beach State, but (quarterback Paul) Berner threw 61 times. That is part of the personality of their (UOP's) team. You can't tell what they are going to do from week to week. One week, they will limit their passing, the next week they will fill the air with the ball. I imagine they will throw the football a lot against us. In order to win, we will have to play with emotion and excellent execution to compensate for Pacific's involvement."

Sweeney has good reason to believe Berner will throw the football against Fresno State today. The last time the Bulldogs faced a healthy Berner, back in 1982, he passed for 418 yards and three touchdowns in a game won by Fresno State,

49-30. Tiger tight end Tony Camp, who also is back this season, hauled in four TD receptions in that contest.

"Berner is certainly one of the best passers around," says Sweeney of the 6-2, 210-pound senior. Berner this season has completed 143 of 261 pass attempts (54 percent completion rate) for 1,818 yards and 12 touchdowns.

Berner, who sat out last season after injuring a knee in the season opener against Oregon, has spent the better part of the '84 campaign rewriting the UOP record book. He has already passed former Tiger great Eddie LeBaron on the career passing chart with 4,511 yards to his credit. In UOP's loss last Saturday to Long Beach State, Berner threw for a school record 61 times, and completed 31, one short of his school record of 32 set earlier this season in a loss to Fullerton State.

Three Tigers have caught as many as 25 passes this season, headed by halfback Bill Wolsky who has a team-leading 30 receptions for 232 yards. Senior wide receiver Michael Scott has nabbed 27 passes for 404 yards, including a team-high five touchdowns. Camp, who like Berner sat out last season with an injury, has 25 receptions this season and is the school's all-time leading pass catcher with 121 receptions. Camp caught eight passes for 92 yards last Saturday against Long Beach State. Wolsky is listed as probable for today's game after spraining a knee against Long Beach State.

Keeping opposing defenses honest this season has been an effective UOP ground game. Running back James Mackey, a 5-10, 180-pound sophomore, has been the mainstay in the Tiger backfield. He enters today's game with 753 yards rushing on 169 attempts (4.4 average), the second

best figure in the PCAA. Mackey's best outing of the year came against Northern Arizona when he piled up 161 yards and two touchdowns on 28 carries. Mackey's backup, 5-8, 185-pound junior Ron Thornton, has done a creditable job, as well, gaining 456 yards on 144 carries (3.7 average) and two touchdowns.

Pacific's record of 3-6 is deceiving. The Tigers have played well enough to win a few games had they only eliminated a mistake here or there. In league play, the Tigers played both Fullerton State (41-31) and Nevada-Las Vegas (35-21) tough before losing, and they played well in losing efforts against teams from the Pacific-10 (Cal, 28-12, and Oregon, 30-14).

Against Fresno State, the Tigers will be looking for their first win over the Bulldogs since a 27-7 victory in 1978.

"Both teams will be playing with pride, our basic motivation," says Sweeney. "I have great admiration for (UOP head coach) Bob Cope. I am sure he'll have his team ready to play."

The Bulldogs will be trying to bounce back from back-to-back PCAA defeats. Last week's narrow, 20-17 loss to Fullerton State ended all Fresno State hopes for a trip to the California Bowl at Bulldog Stadium on Saturday, December 15.

"We played very valiantly against Fullerton," Sweeney says. "We played our hearts out. We are playing with a freshman tailback (Calvin Scruggs) who has a joint separation in his shoulder, and a fullback (Malcolm Scott) who is out for football for the first year after four years of wrestling. We are playing under circumstances that are extremely difficult. But we are still playing in a winning fashion."

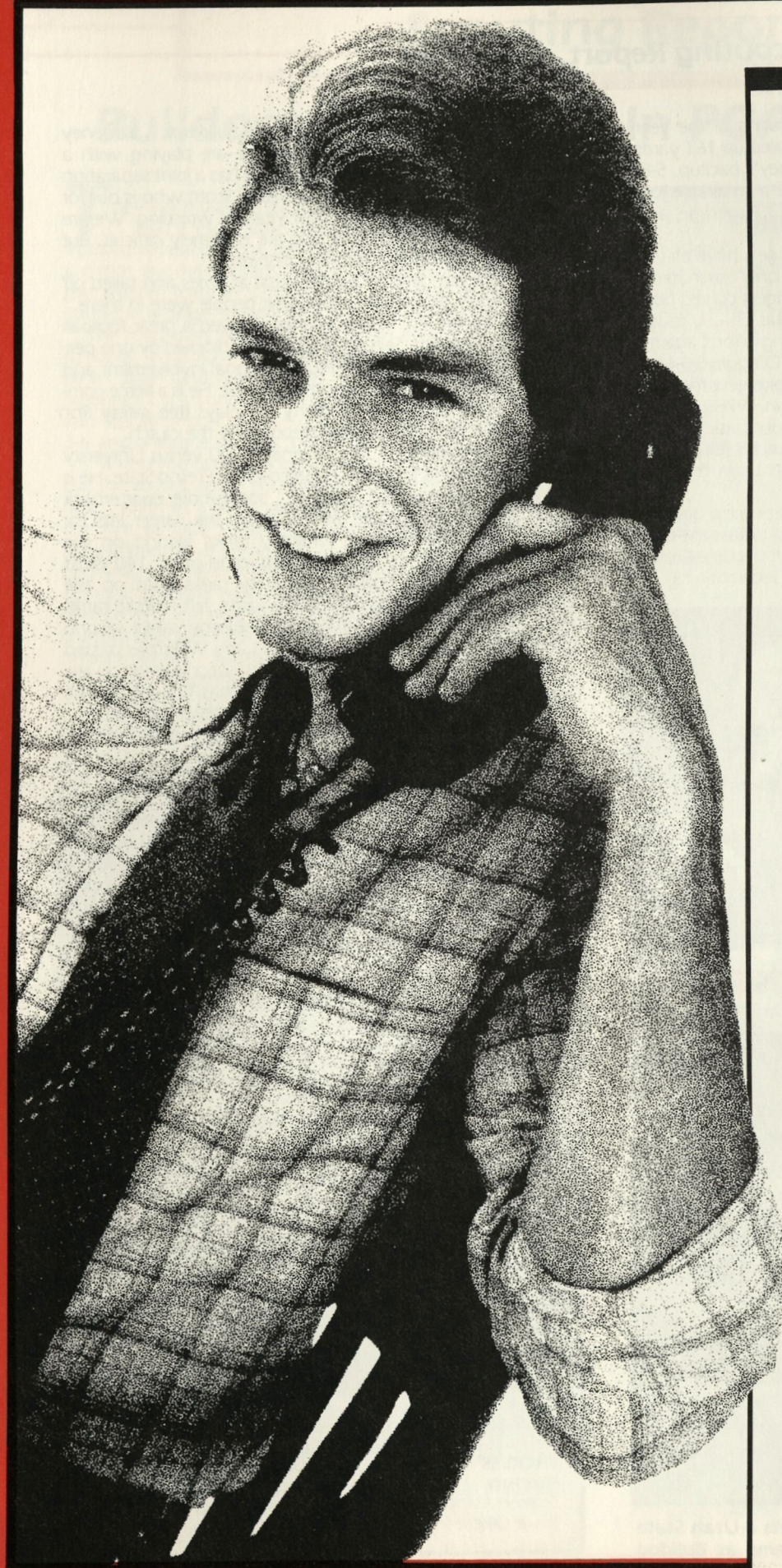
"I felt like our defense played great at times and tailed off badly at times when our second unit people were in there," Sweeney continued. "Chris Pacheco played a great football game at noseguard. Seldom was he ever blocked by one person. He played with tremendous emotional involvement and he has been hurt most of the time this year. He is a fierce competitor. I don't know how many big plays free safety Ron Cross made. He gave a great response in the clutch."

**EXTRA POINTS** — Jim Sweeney is 6-0 versus University of the Pacific in his tenure as head coach at Fresno State. He is 3-0 at home versus the Tigers ... sophomore quarterback Kevin Sweeney continues his move up the career lists for passing and total offense. Sweeney ranks second on the career passing chart with 4,732 yards to his credit, 140 yards behind all-time Jeff Tedford. Sweeney ranks third on the career total offense chart with 4,545 yards. Jeff Tedford ranks first with 4,814 yards and Danny Robinson ranks second with 4,587 yards ... senior split end Larry Willis has passed John Sexton (1968-70) and moved into second place on the school's all-time receiving list. Willis now has 112 catches, 26 behind Henry Ellard's record of 138 career catches ... freshman placekicker Barry Belli, featured elsewhere in today's program, remains perfect in both field goals (10 of 10) and PAT's (eight of eight) ... Fresno State's 1984 football opponents are a combined 57-49 this season, a winning percentage of 54 percent ... going into last week's game against Fullerton State, the Bulldogs were the sixth best passing team in the country with an average of 277.1 yards through the air ... Fresno State is undefeated in four home games this season and the Bulldogs are 18-7 at Bulldog Stadium since the facility opened at the end of the 1980 season.

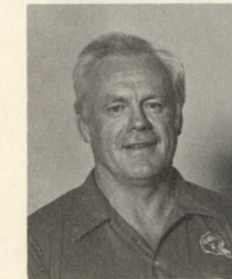

## Meet FSU's Head Coach

# Jim Sweeney

## 'The Irishman' Back for Seventh Season

**J**im Sweeney, who has guided Fresno State to a pair of Pacific Coast Athletic Association titles during his tenure at Fresno State, is in his seventh season as the Bulldogs' head football coach.



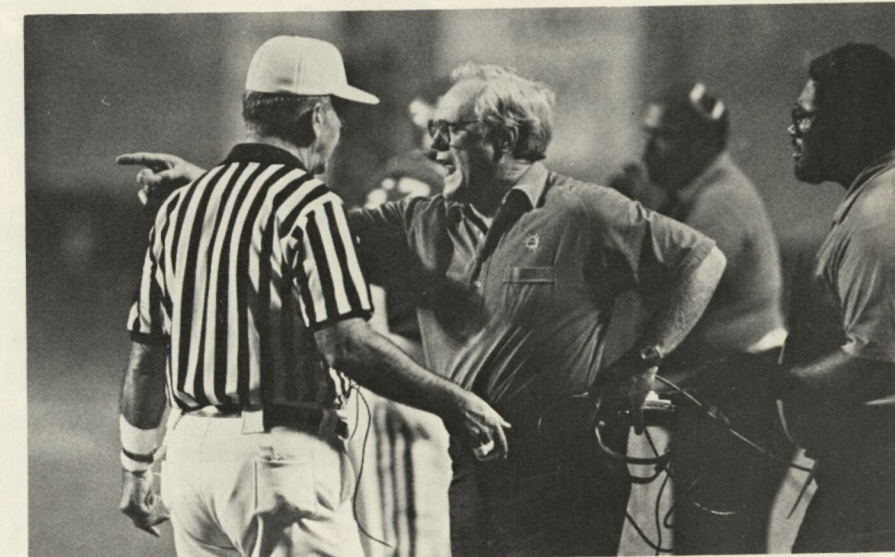
The colorful, quotable Irishman boasts an impressive 41-26 record in six previous seasons at FSU, a .612 winning percentage. Twice (in 1977 and 1982) during his stay at Fresno State he has been named the Pacific Coast Athletic Association Coach of the Year and once (1982) he has pulled down District-9 Coach of the Year honors.

Since his arrival at Fresno State in 1976, positive things have continued to happen to the Bulldog football program.

The PCAA championship won by his '77 team marked the school's first conference title in football since 1968 and only the second since 1961. Sweeney left FSU for a two-year coaching stint in the National Football League following the '77 season but it was his championship team which spurred the community into financing a new football stadium.

Sweeney was not gone from the San Joaquin Valley for long. Following one season with the Oakland Raiders and one with the St. Louis Cardinals he returned to Fresno as the Bulldogs' head football coach. By the end of the 1980 season his team was playing the first-ever game in the school's 30,000-seat, on-campus stadium. The facility, often referred to as the "Pride of the Valley," was dedicated in glorious fashion in September of 1981 when the Sweeney-coached Bulldogs hung a 23-16 defeat on heavily favored University of Oregon.

Nearly 29,000 fans witnessed the dedication game at Bulldog Stadium, an attendance figure that has become commonplace in the last few years under Sweeney. In fact, Fresno State has led the PCAA in home attendance in 1982 and 1983, playing to nearly 90 percent capacity. Last season, the Bulldogs not only outdrew the rest of their PCAA competition but two Pacific-10 and six

Western Athletic Conference schools, as well.

The stadium's first sellout came during California Bowl II in December of 1982 and it was no coincidence that Sweeney's team was there. Over 30,000 fans turned out to watch the Bulldogs come from behind and post a 29-28 victory over Bowling Green to cap an 11-1 championship season.

Sweeney, who is entering his 20th season as a major college coach, has drawn the respect of his coaching peers for his technical and innovative approach to the game. He has been a successful coach with an offensive philosophy weighted more toward the run-oriented veer and, in recent seasons, has molded winning clubs with an offensive philosophy that prefers to lead with the pass. In 1982, the Bulldogs ranked ninth in the nation in scoring offense and 11th in passing offense. Last year, the Bulldogs ranked 16th in the nation in passing offense.

The 55-year-old Sweeney, a 1951 graduate of the University of Portland, launched his long and successful coaching career in 1951 at Butte Central (Mont.) High School, his alma mater. In three years there his teams won two state Class A championships. He then moved on to Flathead County (Mont.) High where in five years he coached his teams to a pair of undefeated seasons

and two state Class AA titles.

In 1960 Sweeney joined the coaching staff at Montana State as an assistant. Three years later he assumed the head job. Montana State won the Big Sky Conference title four of the five years he was the Bobcats' head coach. Twice MSU played in the Camellia Bowl, the NCAA Division II national championship game, winning it in 1964. He was named Big Sky Coach of the Year three times and District-8 Coach of the Year in 1966. He was runner-up for national Coach of the Year honors in 1966 as well.

From 1968-75, Sweeney was head coach at Washington State. In 1972, he was named District-10 Coach of the Year after rebuilding the WSU program and leading the Cougars to a 7-4 record in what was then the Pacific-8 Conference. Sweeney also coached in the Coaches All-America game and was the head coach in 1973 for the West squad in the annual East-West Shrine Game.

Sweeney is highly-regarded as a motivational speaker and is in constant demand to speak at coach of the year banquets and football clinics. He is currently serving on the West Coast Coaches All-America Committee and the Football Rules Committee.

Jim and his wife, Lucille, are the parents of eight children. Son Kevin, 20, is currently a quarterback on the FSU football team.

## Football Focus

### It's Catching FSU Offense Attracts Quality Wide Receivers

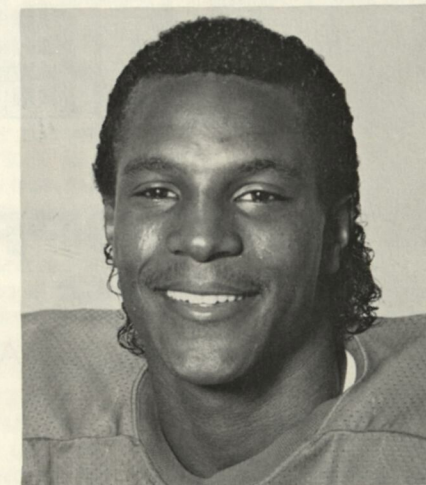
**F**resno State is becoming known as a manufacturer of National Football League pass catchers, and Henry Ellard isn't the only notable product of this factory.

Ellard, a first team All-America and co-MVP for the Bulldogs in 1982, is one of the NFL's great young receivers for the Los Angeles Rams. Two other ex-Bulldogs, Tony Woodruff (Philadelphia Eagles) and Stephone Paige (Kansas City Chiefs), are both integral parts of their team's offense. All three developed quickly in the pros, and seemed to have had relatively few difficulties adjusting to that level of play.

Ellard especially has paid high returns to his team, in only his second NFL season. He leads all Ram wide receivers in receptions with 19 after nine weeks, and tops the entire team in receiving yards with 329. Only tight end David Hill has more catches, with 20. It's more than a mere bonus that Ellard also leads the entire NFL in punt returning, and has scored twice filling that capacity. He's tied with sensational running back Eric Dickerson for the team lead in touchdowns with five.

Paige, the "other wide receiver" during his career at FSU in 1981-82, made a name for himself in his final collegiate contest in the '82 California Bowl against Bowling Green, when Ellard was ailing. He caught 15 passes for 246 yards and two touchdowns, and ran 4 yards for a third score to cap a superb senior year in which he constantly received second billing to Ellard. The Chiefs noticed him, however, and he's currently their third leading wide receiver in receptions and yards, and is tied for the team lead in scoring catches. As the third wide receiver on the Chiefs, he doesn't stay on the bench too much. Kansas City quarterback Bill Kenney directs an aerial-oriented offense which keeps Paige and starters Carlos Carson and Henry Marshall involved.

Woodruff is Philadelphia's third receiver in receptions after nine NFL games, and is second on the squad behind speedy Mike Quick in average per catch. He didn't have the numbers of Ellard or Paige during college, although as a senior at Fresno State in '81 Woodruff caught 18 passes for four touchdowns and 19.6 yards per reception.

Current Bulldog quarterback Kevin Sweeney redshirted in '82, when Paige and Ellard were burning PCAA secondaries each week. He probably thought he'd graduate before FSU's recruiting staff could find receivers who would even begin to match Ellard or Paige. But Sweeney didn't even need to wait a season.

Larry Willis picked up right where Ellard left off, and seems ready to become the fourth Bulldog receiver to enter the NFL since 1982. Quarterback-receiver coach Rich Olson says Willis has all the tools necessary to make it in the pros.

With three former Bulldogs in the NFL and Willis possibly on his way, one must wonder what Fresno State does to find and develop pro-quality wide receivers. The answer is quite simple, according to Olson.

"We're committed to throwing the football here, which gives our receivers experience, repetition and exposure," Olson explained. "Coach Jim Sweeney has a great knowledge of the passing game, receivers here don't need to adjust that much to pro offenses."

"Most important, coach Sweeney has recruited excellent athletes, who are smart enough to play receiver here. He's found the perfect people to build a passing offense around."

Willis spent two years at Taft Junior College languishing on a run-oriented offense of a perennial JC powerhouse. Well, he wasn't exactly languishing. Although the offense averaged only five

passes per contest his sophomore year, Willis managed to catch 19 balls for 435 yards (22.9 average) and five touchdowns. It's not accurate to say that Sweeney found Willis, however; they found each other.

"Even though we ran so much at Taft, I thought I had the tools to make it in the pros eventually," the senior from Santa Monica said. "I knew my chances of making it would be better if I went to a school that threw the ball."

"Fresno State was perfect, because of coach Sweeney's passing game. I also made the decision to come here knowing we'd have a good quarterback. I'd seen Kevin throw the ball, and I knew about his great high school career."

What Sweeney wishes, however, is that he could find more of his receivers right out of high school, like Ellard.

"As is the case with most transfers, Woodruff and Paige didn't blossom until the middle of their senior years. Before that they didn't have much mental toughness, they dropped a lot of balls. Willis had the physical attributes when he got here, and he learned and became toughened quickly."

In his junior year at FSU Willis eclipsed Ellard's year-old school mark for receptions in a single season, latching on to 63 passes for 1,009 yards and six touchdowns. In eight contests this year the senior receiver had 43 catches for 761 yards and five TD's. At that point he was second to Ellard on FSU's career reception list with 106.

With crafty possession receiver Vince Wesson and speedy deep threat Dave Williams sharing time opposite him, Willis has had to fill several receiving roles at FSU. Olson believes this versatility is something pro teams want in their receivers.

"Willis is intelligent, and he's been able to do everything we've asked of him," Olson remarked. "Everything he's learned here will help him in the pros, he shouldn't have any trouble adjusting. He's been involved in a lot of different ways here."

Willis may be even more equipped than Ellard to play any role an NFL team may ask, because he already relies so much on all his skills; his speed is an added bonus.

## **Fresno State's Athletic Leader**

# **Jack Lengyel**

## **A Breadth of Athletic Administrative Experience**

**E**fficient and innovative with an emphasis on accountability.

In short, that describes Jack Lengyel, now in his second year as director of athletics at Fresno State University.

Lengyel, 49, was appointed the Bulldogs' 18th athletic director in March of 1983 and administers FSU's 18-sport intercollegiate athletic program. He came to FSU from the University of Missouri where he spent three years as the Tigers' associate A.D. and he brought to the Bulldogs' top leadership post a breadth of experience in athletics and athletic administration.

Since his arrival on the FSU campus, Lengyel has overseen a tremendous revitalization of the Bulldog athletic department. His accomplishments during his brief tenure include:

- Reorganizing the entire athletic department, a project that has included a re-defining of job descriptions for all staff members and an expansion of departmental offices.
- Bringing the Bulldog Foundation (the university's athletic fund-raising organization) and all athletic-related booster groups under institutional control.
- Providing for an academic support system within the athletic department with Bob Knudsen serving as full-time director and Willie Perry serving as a full-time assistant.
- Overseeing the renovation of the "new" Beiden Field, a 3,575-seat on-campus baseball facility now recognized as one of the premiere collegiate stadiums of its kind in the country.
- Spearheading Fresno State's role in the \$8.5 million Selland Arena expansion project. Beginning with the 1984-85 season the home of FSU's men's basketball team will have a capacity of 10,072, up from the previous capacity of 6,582.
- Upgrading Fresno State's future football schedules by adding home-and-home series with Pacific-10 members Oregon and Oregon State and Western Athletic Conference member San Diego State.
- Complementing FSU's coaching staff with the addition of a full-time strength and conditioning coordinator who has responsibilities in weight training, flexibility and nutrition.
- Landscaping the west-side athletic complex (Bulldog Stadium, Beiden Field and the shower-lockerroom), a project featuring \$20,000 worth of trees, shrubs and ground covering expected to be completed in the fall of 1984.
- Supervising highly-successful season ticket campaigns in both football (school-record 18,500 sold in 1983) and baseball (school-record 2,000 sold in 1984).
- Adding the school's first full-time assistant coach in the sport of soccer in May of 1984.

To say that Lengyel came well prepared for the post at Fresno State would be an understatement. While at Missouri, a member of the Big Eight Conference, he had responsibilities in football, basketball, budgetary preparations, facilities, ticket office and promotions. He also developed a reputation as an idea man and staff liaison listening post as Missouri athletic director Dave Hart's top aide. Prior to his appointment at Missouri, Lengyel spent two years as an assistant athletic director at Louisville and served as acting director of the athletic program in 1980 when the Cardinals won the NCAA basketball championship.

His coaching background, spanning 22 years and a variety of sports, is extensive. Lengyel launched his coaching career in

1957 when he served as freshman football coach at his alma mater, Akron University. He spent the 1958 season as an assistant football coach at Ft. Bragg in North Carolina before returning to Akron in 1959 to assume assistantships in football and track and the head swimming job. In 1960, he became head track coach and assistant football coach at Barberton (Ohio) High School. Lengyel then moved on to Heidelberg College in Tiffin, Ohio as an assistant football coach and head baseball and wrestling coach.

Lengyel's next coaching stop was at Cornell University in Ithaca, N.Y., where he spent three years as an assistant football coach, head lacrosse coach and freshman baseball coach. In 1966, he was named the head football coach and head lacrosse coach at College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio. In 1971, Lengyel was appointed head football coach at Marshall University in Huntington, W.V., following the tragic plane crash that wiped out most of the team and coaching staff.

Lengyel earned his bachelor degree in physical education from Akron University in 1957 and completed his master's degree in P.E. at Kent State. He spent a year on active duty with the U.S. Army and from 1959 to 1971 he was in the Air Force Reserves. He was honorably discharged with the rank of captain.

He is a member of the American Football Coaches Association, the College Athletic Business Managers Association and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics.

Lengyel and his wife, Sandra, have three children: David, an officer in the Marine Air Corps and Peter, an officer in the Naval Air Corps, both graduates of the U.S. Naval Academy; and Julie, married and a graduate of University of Kentucky.

## FSU Facility Improvements

**F**resno State's athletic department is one on the move and nowhere is that more evident than in many of the facilities that now house Bulldog athletic teams.

Two of the most recent improvements include the renovation of the "new" Beiden Field and the expansion of the city-owned Selland Arena.

Both facilities are being financed in whole or in part by on-going community-wide seat option drives. Further information regarding the availability of seat options can be obtained through the Bulldog Ticket Office at 294-DOGS.



### BEIDEN FIELD

The 3,575-seat facility was completed in March of 1984 and was formally dedicated during the Me-N-Ed's/Pepsi Best in the West Classic later that month. The \$2.2 million project is one of the premiere facilities of its kind in the nation.

For years, the Bulldog baseball team played before turn-away crowds at the old Beiden Field, which seated around

The "new" Beiden Field has a seating capacity of 3,575.

1,000 people on a series of wooden and aluminum bleachers.

"The construction of the stadium is a solid commitment by Fresno State that it is 100 percent behind baseball," says Fresno State head coach Bob Bennett. "It is a commitment to the entire city that baseball is a big, big thing in Fresno. It will do nothing but upgrade all of the

baseball programs in the area."

The "new" Beiden Field, which now ranks as one of the largest collegiate facilities of its kind in the country, attracted an average of over 2,000 fans per home date last season and was selected to serve as the site of the NCAA West I regional last May.

## Improvements

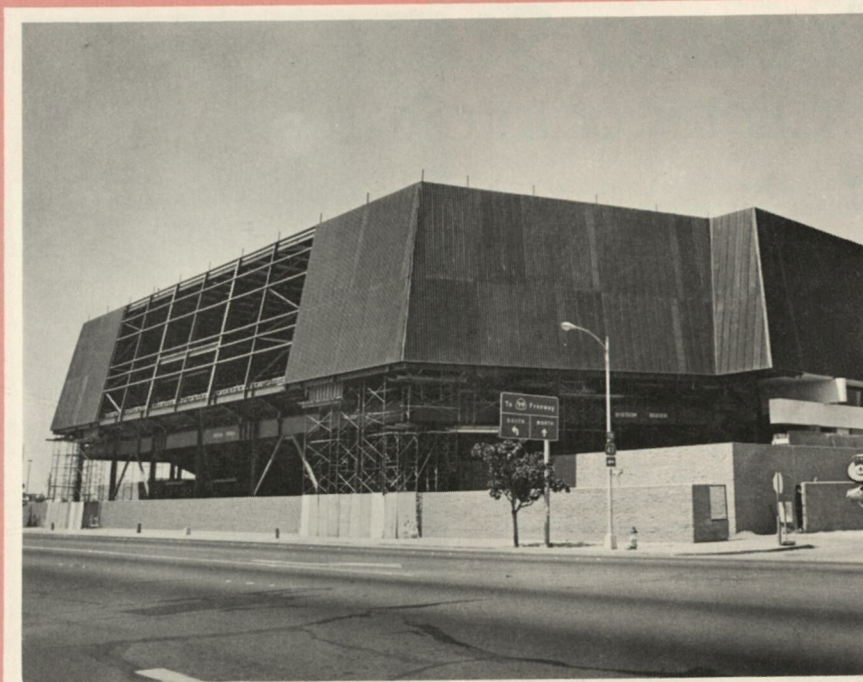
### SELLAND ARENA

The city-owned home of Fresno State's men's basketball team, located in downtown Fresno, will feature a seating capacity of 10,072 when an \$8.5 million expansion project is completed later this fall.

The major portion of the expansion financing is being provided through the sale of bonds backed by an increase in the hotel/motel room tax. Fresno State is assisting the city of Fresno by raising \$1.3 million through the offering of seat options. Ten-year seat options, which allows each donor the first right of refusal on season tickets for his or her particular seat, go to donors of gifts ranging from \$300 to \$500.

Only 300 seat options in the expanded Selland Arena remain.

Selland Arena was named after the late Fresno mayor, Arthur E. Selland, and opened its doors on September 27, 1966. It was built at a cost of \$10 million.



Selland Arena's capacity is growing from 6,582 to 10,072.

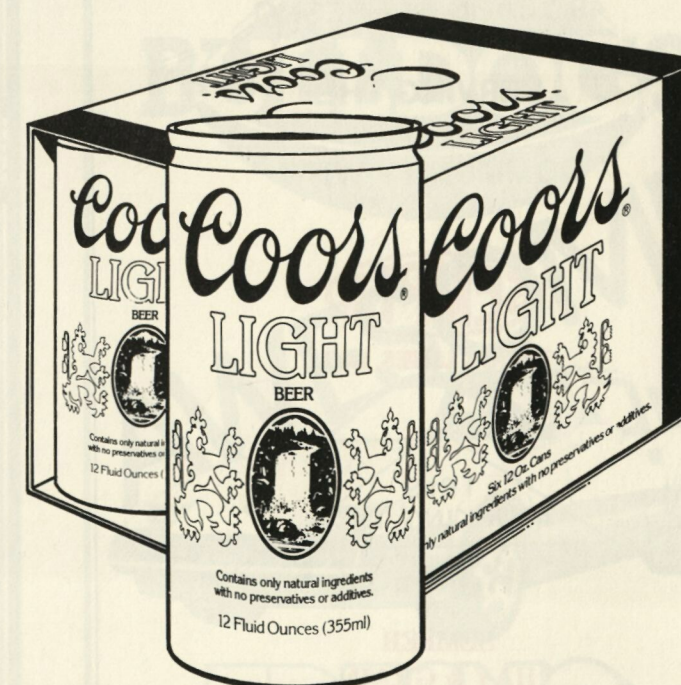

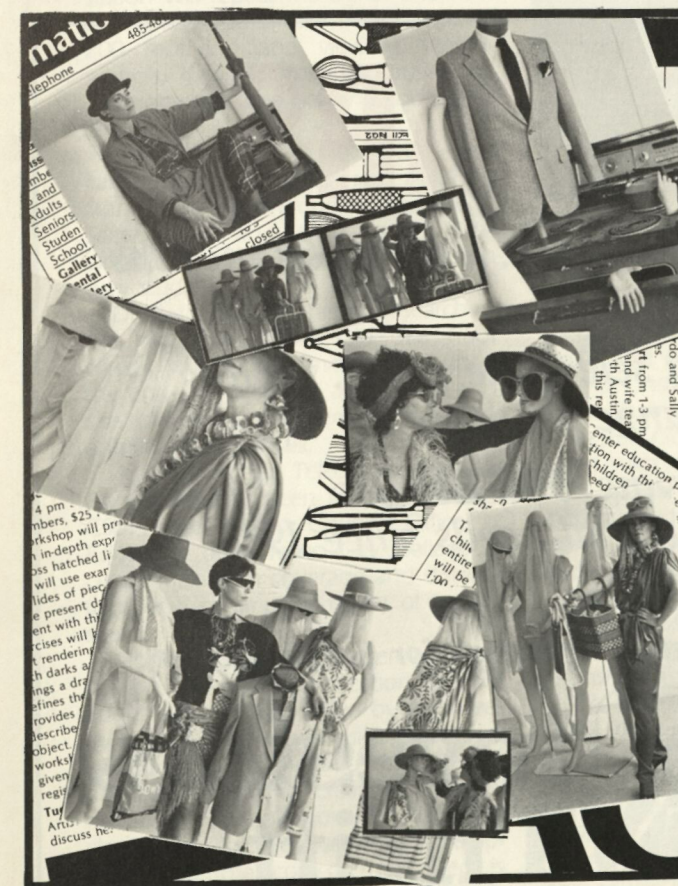

### On ITFS

### Classes Will Take To The Airwaves

Imagine for a moment the opportunity to take California State University, Fresno classes via a television screen in the elementary or secondary school near your home or at your office building during the workday or in the evening after work.

"CSUF's Instructional Television Fixed State (ITFS) project is being designed to provide just such an opportunity, using television to reach out into the community with a potential of offering classes through the CSUF system from other universities and consortia of several universities.

"That's why I get so excited about it," said Dr. Leonard Bathurst, assistant dean of The Division of Extended Education, "because it's for the people."

Classes will be transmitted live from CSUF to Channel 18 which houses the Fresno County Schools ITFS system. The station will repeat the signal and have the capability to send it to approximately 200 receiving and viewing sites in schools, libraries, hospitals, businesses, governmental agencies and community centers.

The idea of ITFS is not new. Several campuses in the CSU system—Chico, Stanislaus, Northridge, San Diego, Sacramento and Dominguez Hills—already offer ITFS classes for post secondary students.

Dr. Bathurst, who began research on the project in 1981, said that CSUF classes will be transmitted throughout the university's service area which consists of Fresno, Northern Tulare, Kings and Madera counties.

A Public Access Telecommunications Consortium has been formed between CSUF, the Fresno County Office of Education and Fresno City College to create maximum coverage and distribution for a minimum amount of money spent.

Monies for CSUF's ITFS were provided by the Continuing Education Reserve Fund, which is generated by class fees for the self-financing Division of Extended Education programs. So far, \$174,400 has been spent to create a "candid classroom"/control room for televising classes and for the purchase of equipment. The total cost of the project is estimated to be approximately \$320,000.

"We have converted Speech Arts 164

for our "candid classroom," Dr. Bathurst said. "The equipment is on order and will be installed during the semester break. During the spring 1985 semester, interested faculty members will be provided with opportunities to experiment with teaching through the television medium and will be encouraged to explore the feasibility of campuswide distribution of classes."

There are currently 16 classrooms in the Speech Arts, Social Science and the Old Science buildings designed to receive televised classes from Speech Arts 164.

Dr. Bathurst hopes that by summer 1985, the equipment to activate channels 11 and 13 for CSUF's classes will be installed and that by fall 1985 classes will be distributed throughout much of the service area.

"The flexibility of this is really limited only to the imagination of the faculty," said Dr. Bathurst. He went on to explain

that some advantages of televised instruction include opportunities for multiple sections of classes taught by one professor, telephones could be placed in the on-campus and off-campus viewing areas so students could interact or ask questions "on the air," classes could be recorded and shown later, people could save time by taking classes near their office or home without parking and traffic hassles, and classes for both regular and extension credit could be offered.

Eventually CSUF will modify its transmission capabilities and join the California State University Microwave Network with the Chico, Sacramento and Stanislaus campuses to receive classes from and send classes to these other schools.

"I like to describe the ITFS as a universitywide outreach program designed to better serve our clients," Dr. Bathurst concluded.

# Barry Belli

## 'Dogs A Leg Up With Freshman Placekicker

It is very rare to see a freshman making major contributions on the collegiate football field. Most first-year players are content to sit the sidelines, happy with the knowledge that their day will come.

For Bulldog placekicker Barry Belli, however, the future is now. And the freshman from Garces High School is making the most of his opportunity.

"My goal at the beginning of the season was to start," Belli said. "I'm glad that I have accomplished that goal, and now I just want to contribute."

And contribute he has. Belli has yet to miss in 1984, with a perfect 8 for 8 on extra points and an amazing 10 for 10 on field goals.

Bulldog head coach Jim Sweeney has coached Belli since his arrival at Fresno State, and he has overseen the development of Belli's talents. "Barry is an excellent kicker," Sweeney said. "He has put in a lot of time on the practice field, and has improved his accuracy and his consistency."

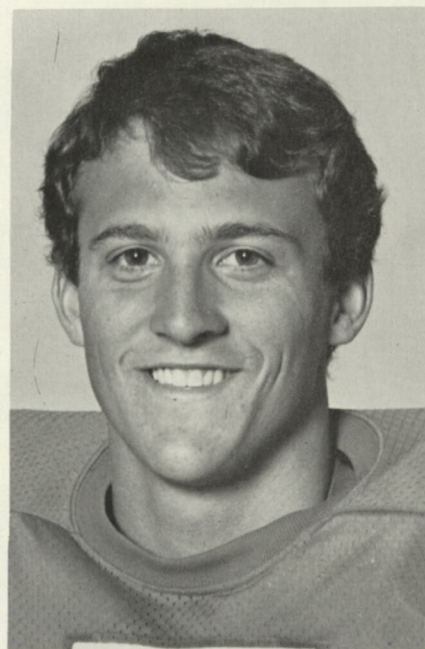
Coming from most coaches, this might not mean a whole lot. But when you consider that Sweeney has coached the likes of pro kickers Jan Stenerud, Joe Danelo and Don Sweet, his praise becomes much more meaningful.

The 5-9, 170-pound kicker has earned the praise of Sweeney and others this season by his performance on the field. But his performance this season is directly related to his hard work on the practice field, both this year and in 1983, when he red-shirted behind FSU standout Rocky Costello.

Belli joined the FSU program as a walk-on, and had to prove his abilities in order to earn a spot on the squad. "I didn't know if I would make the team, but I wanted to come to Fresno State," he said. "It is close to my home, and I knew that Rocky was a senior, so I would have a shot in a year."

Sweeney saw Belli's talent, but knew there was a lot of work to be done. "Belli is a gifted kicker, and he was a gifted kicker when he came here," Sweeney said. "He had the best early trajectory of any kicker I had ever seen, but he was totally inconsistent."

A year of working out and kicking later, Belli was in a fight for the starting position. The other man in the fight was junior kicker Craig Wiley, and Wiley was

awarded the job of kicking the field goals at the start of the year.

Belli's talents did not go to waste, however. His high trajectory was a

valuable tool, and he began to appear on kickoffs. The freshman from Bakersfield has kicked off the entire season, and his high kicks to the corner

have helped limit the opposition to a 16-yard return average.

Sweeney feels that just kicking off may have helped Belli as the season progressed. "The fact that he could go into a game this season and get rid of his butterflies by just kicking off helped build Barry's confidence," the Bulldog mentor said.

"Wiley, who was a much more experienced competitor, took the pressure off Belli by kicking some pressure field goals," he continued. "After three or four games of kicking off, he became more comfortable with the pressure. Then when he was called on to kick field goals, he was much more effective."

Effective, indeed. In his first start, Belli was three for three in field goals at Hawaii, including a 50-yarder. The very next game, he set a new FSU scoring record for kickers by connecting on five field goals and adding four extra points for a total of 19 points.

These are some pretty impressive statistics, but Belli is more concerned with winning. "When the season is over I'll look at the stats," he said. "Right now I just want to help the team win."

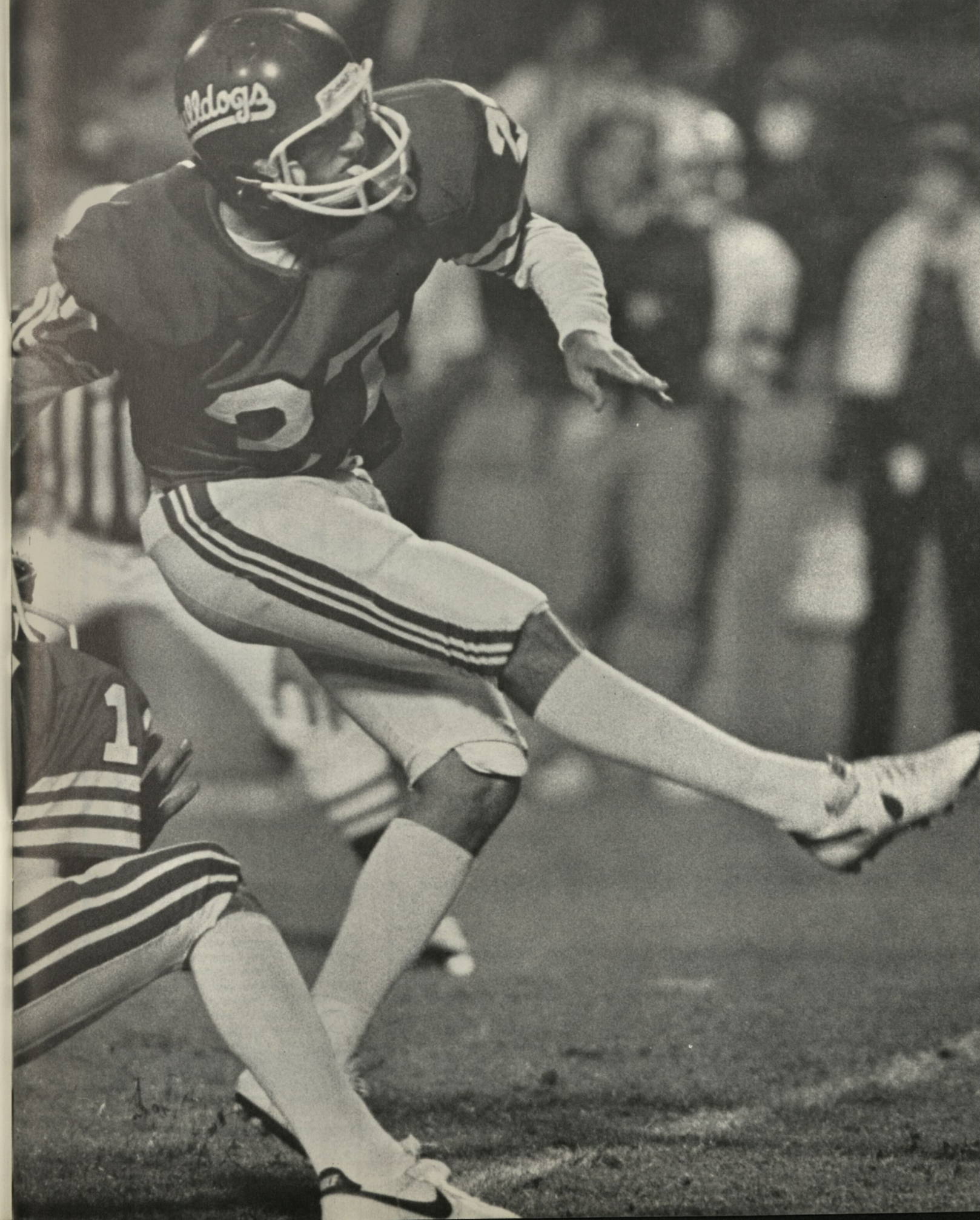
All this translates into confidence for the Bulldogs in the kicking department in 1984. The team can also be comforted, however, with the fact that Belli will be around another three years, a fact which makes Sweeney happy.

"When you talk about Barry Belli, you have to realize that he is a kicker for the future," Coach Sweeney pointed out. "He is a good kicker now, but he still has work to do. When he gets his timing down perfectly, he is going to be a great kicker."

The 19-year-old placekicker prefers to limit his thoughts to 1984, however. "I would just like to play well for the rest of the year," he said. "On kickoffs, I would like to keep the other team inside their 20. As far as scoring, I would like to average two field goals a game for the rest of the season."

With three seasons to go, Barry Belli is a shoe-in to shatter all of FSU's kicking records, barring a major catastrophe. With experienced coaching and a top-notch first-year man, it looks like the Bulldogs will have a leg up on the other teams in the PCAA for some time to come.

## Tigers' Greene Not Green on Defense

**K**evin Greene has experienced his share of dubious firsts as a football player.

After a stellar junior season at Ventura High School, Greene broke his arm in the first game of his senior season and had to sit out the year. A few years later, now at Pacific, after being named first team All-Conference in the PCAA and honorable mention All-America, Greene broke his arm again, this time on the very first play of the 1983 season at Oregon. Once again, he sat out the year.

Hard work and dedication brought Greene back again, and that certainly was no first. As one of the PCAA's standout secondary players and most punishing hitters, Greene is a key figure in the Tiger defensive scheme and plays an important leadership role on the team. His contributions in 1984 will go a long way in determining how well the Tigers do in their quest for the PCAA title.

In his senior season for the Tigers after sitting out last year as a redshirt, Greene is wreaking the same old havoc on opponents. A leading candidate for All-Conference and All-Coast honors this year, Greene is Pacific's only first team All-PCAA player. He earned that honor by leading the Tigers in interceptions (3), fumble recoveries (4) and was second in tackles (94) after starting every game as a junior in 1982. Twice he was named Defensive Player-of-the-Week and had 203 career tackles coming into this season. The broken arm kept Greene out of the Tiger lineup all of last year, but he came back strong last spring and led the Tigers with three interceptions in the spring alumni game. Coach Bob Cope and his staff knew the anchor to their defensive secondary was securely back in the lineup, and welcomed his presence.

Greene describes himself — quite accurately — as an aggressive, full-speed player who likes contact. As a running back in high school, he found he did not like being tackled. As a heavily recruited basketball player, he found he did not like the practices. So began Greene's defensive career in football where he could do all the tackling and he did not mind the practices.

"He's a great leader," says Cope of Greene. "He's one of the most dedicated, hard-working athletes I've ever been around. He adds so much to our team with his work and dedication."

Pacific secondary coach Ed Donatell points to Greene's remarkable self-determination as one of his notable qualities. The other, naturally, is his toughness.

"If I had to describe Kevin Greene as a football player I would have to use two words; he is self-motivated and he is tough," says Donatell. "He is always striving to be better. He is pushing himself constantly. One of the

biggest ways he helps this team is his leadership."

Donatell speaks of Greene as the quiet leader, pushing his teammates on by his example. Following the Tigers' Friday workout at Oregon, Greene could be seen in a corner of the stadium doing extra drills with Donatell.

"There is obviously a transition time," says Donatell of Greene's position switch. "But he is doing well. Every game is a chance to feature more of his strengths. He's a good run-support person and he is very physical. His leadership role on this team cannot be measured."

Donatell is quick to point out Greene's qualities not just as a football player but as a student-athlete and person. A mathematics and physical education major at UOP, Greene has excelled in the classroom and represents in his coach's words, and all-around student-athlete in the Pacific tradition.

"He's just an outstanding person and human being," says Donatell.

Greene admits that the losing seasons of

recent years have been difficult, but says he feels the Tigers are ready to produce a winning season.

"It has been tough," he says. "We've had excellent talent and the coaching staffs were excellent, but for one reason or another it just didn't click. Maybe it was just the wrong chemistry."

"That's why I feel so good about this year," he continues. "First of all the fifth year seniors add a lot of maturity and leadership, and everybody knows now what Coach Cope wants. We know what to expect. One heartbeat, as Coach Cope would say."

Cope calls Greene a definite pro prospect and a tenacious hitter who provides valuable leadership to the defense and the team. Of his chances in the pros, Green says he welcomes the opportunity and plans to capitalize.

"Of course I'd like to play," he says. "Hopefully I'll get a shot and I'll do my best."

"One thing my friends will tell you about me," says Greene with a smile, "and that is I'm confident."

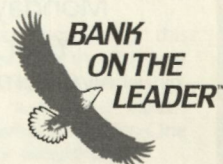

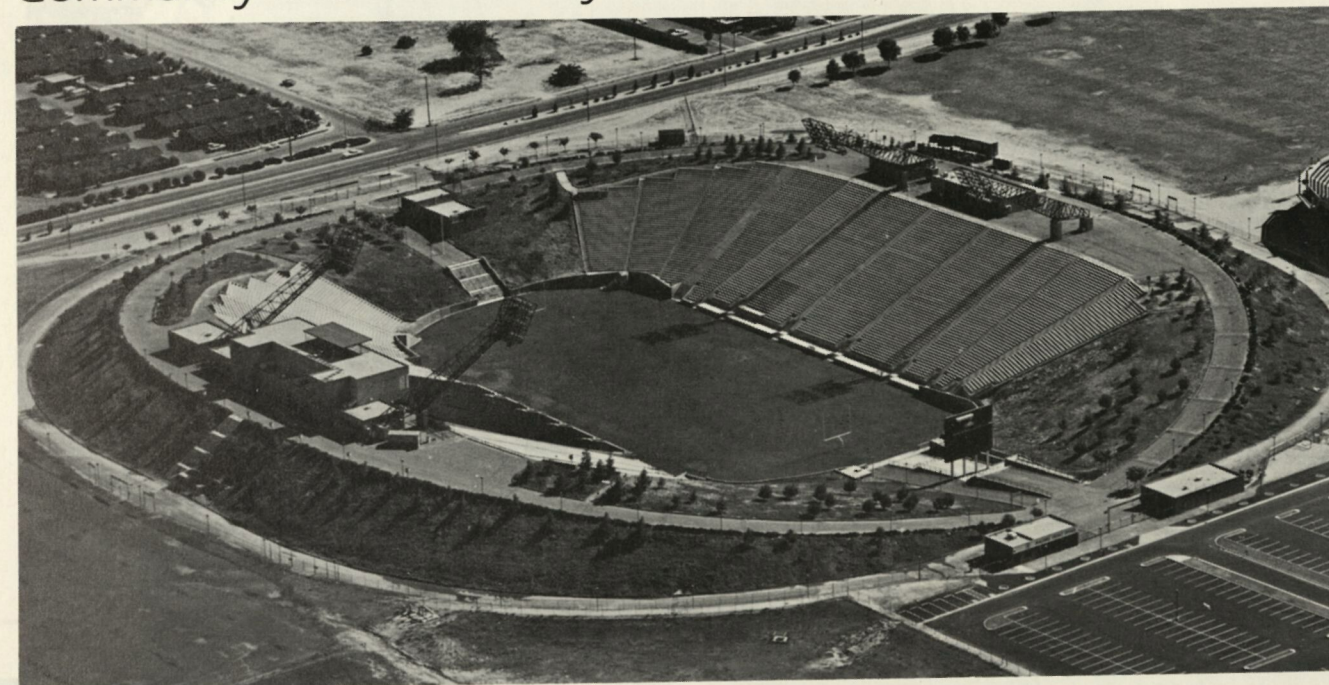

## Bulldog Stadium

Community-financed Facility the "Pride of the Valley"



Bulldog Stadium is the end result of the most massive fund-raising effort in the San Joaquin Valley.

**B**ulldog Stadium, the end result of the most massive fund-raising effort ever undertaken in the San Joaquin Valley, is in its fourth year as home of the Fresno State Bulldogs.

The construction of the 30,000-seat stadium, often referred to as "The Doghouse", began in June of 1979 after local residents raised in excess of \$7 million for the project. The stadium is located on a 60-acre parcel bounded by Barstow on the north, Bulldog Lane on the south, Cedar on the east and Millbrook on the west.

Built partially below ground level with the playing field 37 feet below grade, the bowl features a low profile appearance. A unique cantilevered lighting system extends toward the field and is directed downward to concentrate lighting on the playing field.

Chair seating for 4,564 spectators is located on the west side of the stadium between the 18-yard lines to accommodate the contributors of the \$7 million. The remaining seating is on aluminum plank benches. Every seat in the stadium offers an excellent vantage point to the playing surface.

The stadium is equipped with an up-to-date press box that includes seating

for 50 people in the main press area. The press box also features a television booth, two radio booths, booths for visiting and home coaches, and a television deck that sits on top. The press box also is equipped with an elevator for easy access to the main press area.

The complex at Bulldog Stadium includes a new shower-locker room that houses a weight training room, home and visiting showers and lockers, officials' showers and lockers, a team meeting room, offices for the head football coach and his assistants, offices for the soccer and baseball coaches and the

Bulldog Foundation, an equipment storage room, and security. The \$1.3 million needed to fund the project was raised through pledges and seat option donations.

Fresno State's athletic ticket office is located at the south entrance to the stadium. The south parking lot was paved this past spring.

Fans will be greeted by one of the nation's finest collegiate scoreboards again this season. The scoreboard, complete with animated special effects and expanded electronic message capacity, was built in the fall of 1980 and was sponsored by Great American Federal Savings Bank and McClatchy Newspapers, owner of the Fresno Bee. Great American Federal Savings and the Fresno Bee have their names on the scoreboard's base.

Bulldog Stadium also serves as home of the California Bowl, an NCAA-sanctioned post-season bowl game matching the champion of the Pacific Coast Athletic Association and the champion of the Mid-American Conference. The first sellout in the stadium's history came in December of 1982 when 30,000 fans watched Fresno State defeat Bowling Green, 29-28, in Cal Bowl II.



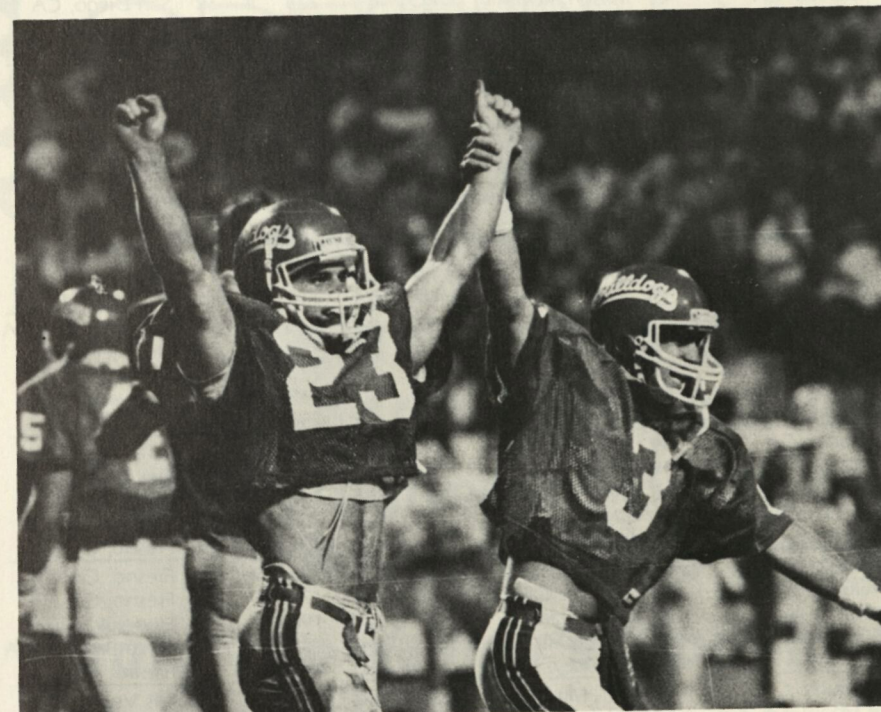

## Football Flashback

### Steve Cordle

He Went From Walk-On to Kodak All-America



"Nobody influenced a game more than he did," says Fresno State coach Jim Sweeney of former All-America Steve Cordle (23).

Cordle did that better than any. Nobody, as a single factor, influenced a game more than he did."

Making the Cordle story even more interesting is the fact that he had to ask -- yes, ask -- for a uniform when he showed up on the Fresno State campus.

"He was a walk-on, a little guy," Sweeney recalls, "and he wasn't recruited by any big school. When he showed up here we said, 'Sure, come on out.' He was quiet, and he said very little. But he did so much on the football field it made him unique among his teammates. His emotional content is unparalleled."

"I think of the football players we have coached here," Sweeney continued, "and on offense Dean Jones epitomized the little player with great heart making unparalleled contributions. Well, Steve Cordle exemplified those same qualities on defense. Both Jones and Cordle were able to play beyond their physical capabilities. Cordle was able to reach down and get that 'extra' when he needed it. He played with total physical abandon."

So much, though, that Sweeney would not let him go out on the practice field in pads during the '81 campaign just to protect his offensive unit from Cordle-style defense.

"We had to take him out of pads and put him in sweat clothes," remembers Sweeney. "Now the only other player I've heard of where that had to be done was Lee Roy Jordan when he played at Alabama."

But Cordle was not just a leader on the field. He was a leader -- and a team player -- off of it, as well. After being singled out by Sports Illustrated following his performance against Oregon, Cordle shrugged. "I'm happy and proud and thrilled and all that," he said. "I guess you have to have all of this. But it sets the team back, and the others are not getting what they deserve. It takes 22 guys to do it."

Said Sweeney, "Off the field, Steve Cordle is the most gentlemanly, humane and caring person that I have ever known. On the field, he played with a total love of the game."

The Bulldogs salute Steve Cordle -- tonight's honorary coach.

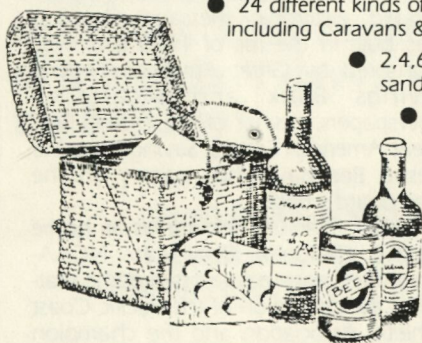

In this week's installment of Football Flashback, we take a look back at the career of former strong safety Steve Cordle, who is on the sidelines tonight serving as the Bulldogs' honorary coach.

Jim Sweeney said it more than once during the 1981 season. "If you want to know where the football is," the veteran Fresno State coach would say, "just look for No. 23."

Steve Cordle filled that uniform in those days, and you could always count on the 5-9, 180-pounder to be around the ball. During his senior season of 1981, the year he earned Kodak All-America honors, Cordle became one of the few players to score defensive points in every category. Check that. Almost every category. About the only thing he didn't do was score a touchdown.

Look at these stats: 78 unassisted tackles, 31 assisted stops, one kick blocked, five interceptions, one sack, two fumbles caused, two fumbles recovered, two pass deflections, five quarterback pass hurries. It all added up to a team-

leading 366 defensive points.

He may most be remembered for his all-out pull-all-the-stops performance in Fresno State's 23-16 upset over the University of Oregon in the dedication game of Bulldog Stadium. It was that good.

In the win, Cordle intercepted three passes (two in the game's final three minutes), recovered a fumble, had 11 tackles, deflected two passes, and blocked a kick. Sports Illustrated named him national defensive player of the week.

But the Oregon game is just a small part of the Steve Cordle highlight film. He also recorded 19 tackles in FSU's season-ending 23-17 win at Arizona, and he had 12 total tackles against Oregon State. His five pickoffs ranked him nationally in interceptions. Day in and day out, he was the leader of the Fresno State defense.

"Ever since Cordle played here we have told our football players that they should all strive to play 'Cordle Football,' Sweeney says now. "And that means from snap to whistle. Of all the players I have coached -- either at Montana State, Washington State or Fresno State -- Steve

The other band "VIP's" include Lori Ricken, a junior from Fresno's Hoover High School, who directs the flag corps; Uniform Manager, Ruben Amavisca, a senior from Corcoran High School; Equipment Manager, Chris Moglia, a sophomore from Madera High School; and Joe Oliveira, Librarian, a junior from Gunn High School in Palo Alto.

Up front is drum major Tyrone White, from Tulare Union High School. The band's feature twirler is Yolanda Castellanos from Fresno High School, senior women's world twirling champion.

The band staff spends countless hours preparing for each season's performances. Student recruitment, custom musical arranging, show development and drill design as well as the final details of show production are all included in the band's preparation for each season. 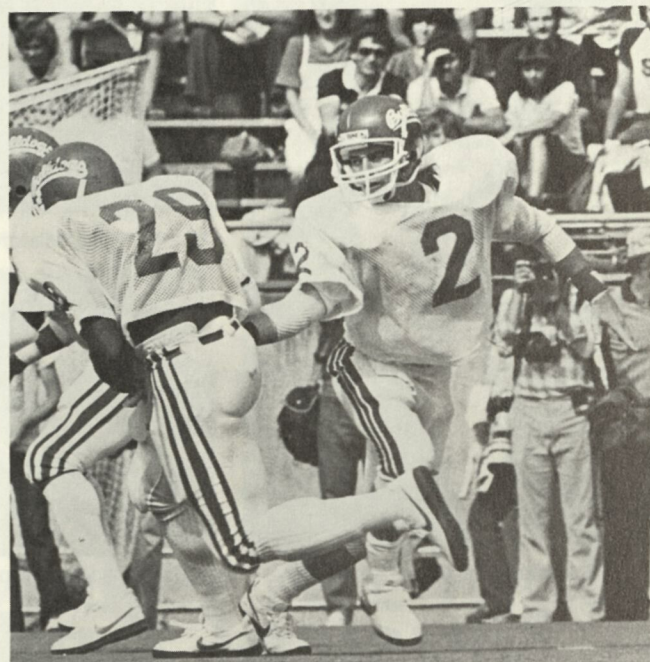

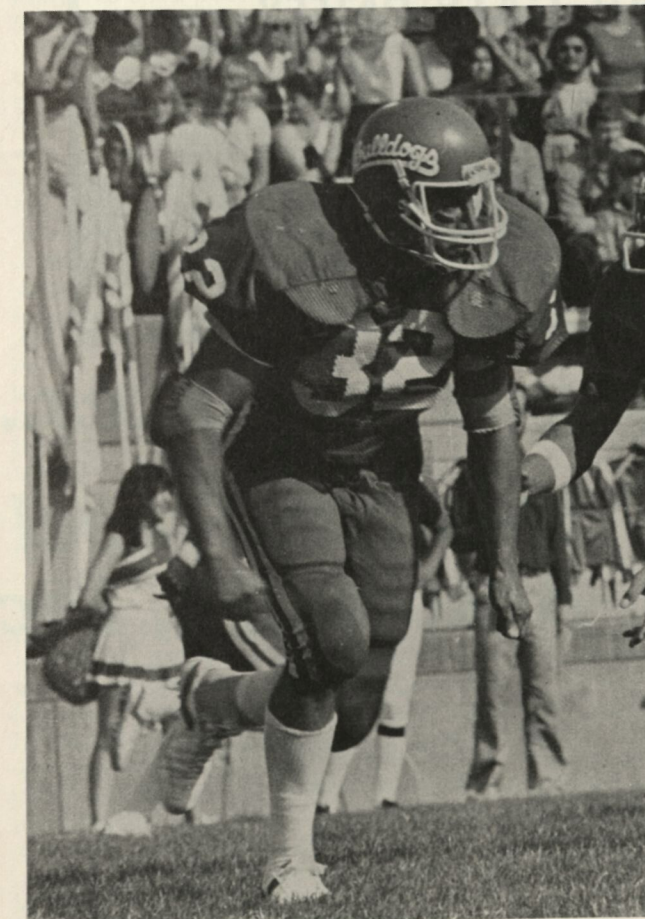

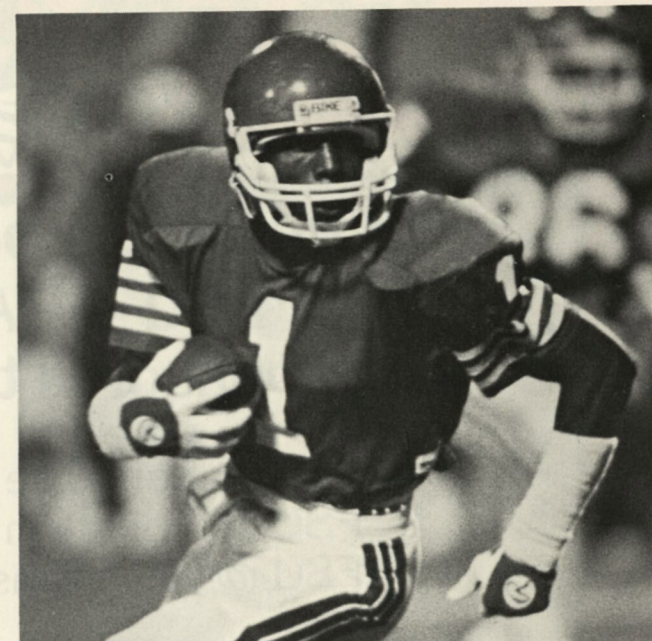

# PCAA Showdown

UNLV-Fullerton Winner Has Inside Track to Bowl

The Pacific Coast Athletic Association's automatic berth in the California Bowl could very well be decided tonight in Las Vegas when unbeaten Fullerton State (10-0-0, 5-0-0) and once-beaten Nevada-Las Vegas (7-1-0, 4-0-0) square off in the Silver Bowl.

The Titans and the Rebels are the only two PCAA teams without a conference loss; Fresno State and San Jose State, both 3-2-0 in league play, have been eliminated from the Cal Bowl race.

Fullerton State will have one conference game remaining after tonight's contest while UNLV will have two league games to play. The Titans will travel to New Mexico State (2-8-0, 1-5-0) to close out their regular season next Saturday. UNLV, meanwhile, will be at Utah State (1-7-0, 1-4-0) next Saturday before hosting Fresno State on Nov. 24. UNLV will play Southern Methodist in a non-conference match-up in Las Vegas on Dec. 1.

The race for the Mid-American Conference's berth in the Cal Bowl tightened up last Saturday when league-leading Central Michigan was upset, 8-7, by Northern Illinois. That allowed Toledo, a 17-13 winner over Western Michigan, to move into a first place tie with the Chippewas; both teams have 5-1-1 conference records.

**AROUND THE PCAA:** Fullerton State remained unbeaten in 10 starts with a 20-17 victory over Fresno State in Santa Ana. The Titans kept their perfect slate intact thanks to a 48-yard field goal by Greg Steinke with less than two minutes remaining in the contest. Fresno State, at one point in the first half, led Fullerton State by a 14-3 margin ... Nevada-Las Vegas improved its overall record to 7-1-0 with a 30-14 win over San Diego State in San Diego. The Rebels had a safety and returned an interception for a touchdown in the victory ... former Fresno City College quarterback Doug Gaynor had another big day, completing 27 of 41 passes for 329 yards and two touchdowns as Long Beach State beat Pacific, 24-22. The Tigers, who fell to 3-6 overall and 1-4 in league, intercepted five Gaynor passes in the loss ... Utah State was blasted by Arizona, 45-10, in Tucson. In that game, the Aggies were penalized 10 times for 80 yards, and the Wildcats' Alfred Jenkins passed for 336 yards and two touchdowns ... New Mexico State improved its overall record to 2-8 with a 31-24 non-conference victory over Wichita State.

**AROUND THE MAC:** Northern Illinois sent Central Michigan to its first loss of the season with an 8-7 victory in DeKalb, Ill. The Huskies won the game on a 20-yard touchdown pass and a two-point conversion with only 26 seconds remaining in the contest. The loss left Central Michigan in a tie for first place with Toledo in the MAC, each having 5-1-1 conference records ... Toledo posted a 17-13 win over Western Michigan ... Bowling Green remains in contention for the berth at 5-2. The Falcons kept pace by thrashing Ball State, 38-13. Every other MAC team has at least three losses.

Cal Bowl IV will be played in FSU's Bulldog Stadium on Saturday, Dec. 15 at 1 p.m. Tickets are priced at \$16, \$13, \$11, and \$9. A junior ticket, for those 18 years and under, is

# Jeff Negrete

## Linebacker Making Up for Hannemann's Loss

After linebacker Cliff Hannemann suffered a season-ending knee injury in Fresno State's 27-22 opening win against Arizona, head coach Jim Sweeney said he "wouldn't trade the loss of Hannemann for a victory over anyone." Sweeney said his strike linebacker would be difficult to replace down the road.

Well, the Bulldogs found a replacement for their defensive leader before they even began their journey "down the road." Senior Jeff Negrete took over against Arizona and has played his unique style of hard-nosed football so well that observers have all but forgotten Hannemann. Any team would miss the skills of such a talented player; but frankly, the Bulldog defense has been extremely effective without Hannemann.

It's difficult to fully appreciate what Negrete has contributed without considering Hannemann's contributions. Outside linebacker coach Greg Gibson knows this as well as anybody.

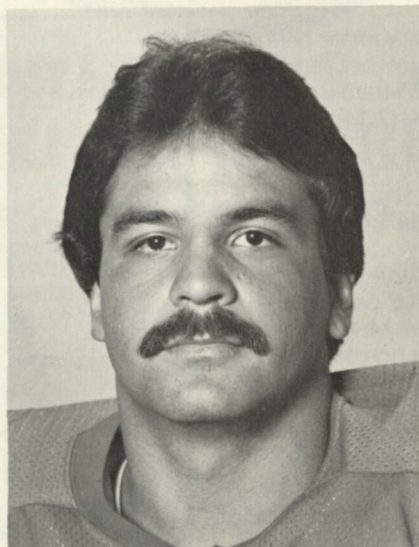
"Cliff was the core of this defense, and when a player of his caliber is injured you know there will be a drop-off," Gibson commented. "But Jeff just stepped in and filled the position. He's played better than we could have possibly hoped."

Understandably, Gibson is very appreciative of Negrete's contributions to the Bulldog defensive unit. He is especially thankful that the 5-11, 210-pound senior has been a team leader, like Hannemann was.

"He's always been looked up to, because he gives nothing but his best on every play," Gibson explained. "Now that he's starting it's easier for him to be a leader because he's contributing more." Coach Sweeney added, "Leadership is probably the most important ingredient of a successful football team, and Negrete is one of the greatest leaders we've had here. He keeps everybody on the same page."

Negrete, who is a valuable special teams performer and captain of them for several games, has mixed feelings about the entire season because of the way he earned his starting spot. He admits he's happy to be playing, however.

"Any athlete doesn't want to see his teammates hurt. Cliff and I are good friends, and I felt bad for him," the

linebacker remarked. "But I was overjoyed to be playing."

Hannemann, who missed just three games in 10 years of organized football prior to this season, still has two years of eligibility remaining. He'll be back, and says he'll be hungrier than he's ever been. This year he's learning to be content sitting out, and feels reassured to have such a capable replacement.

"I'm happy for Jeff, he's a more verbal leader than I was, and he gets the job done," Hannemann said. "I'm also pleased that the defense has played so well without me, it's encouraging."

The outstanding performance of the rest of the Bulldog defense substantially lessened the pressure on Negrete to be as effective as Hannemann. "But I didn't look at it like I was filling Cliff's shoes," he said, "I just tried to be the best I could, and contribute in my own way. You can't worry about the other guy and his abilities."

Because of his size, or rather the relative lack of it, Negrete describes himself as a typical "underdog" who has had to fight hard to gain respect. He enjoys this role.

"I'm not a real gifted athlete, but I've always liked to be considered the underdog, the over-achiever," he explained. "That's one reason why I like special teams; even if you're not that gifted, you can contribute if you play fired up."

Special teams are a third of any football game."

This is where Negrete's leadership abilities and his hard-nosed style come in especially handy — he inspired the rest of the squad. "A lot of the guys on special teams don't play much offensively or defensively, so they might only be in there five plays a game. It's tough to get fired up with that amount of involvement."

On defense, Negrete believes his biggest area of improvement is playing the run.

"I can't believe how much I've improved, coach Gibson has me working with my hands much better than early in the year," he said. "Sometimes I go up against big tackles, so I always have to be technique-conscious. The most difficult part of playing strike for me is the pass rush, I still have a lot to learn."

Because of his admitted lack of natural athletic ability, Negrete has worked hard for everything he's attained — by necessity. Maybe this is why he empathizes with all "underdogs," on and off the field — he feels he can relate to people who possess some sort of disadvantage.

"I especially love working with kids, and I intend to make a career of it after college," he said. "I feel like I can help kids who don't have much of a family or support from parents. Many of the kids I work with are like underdogs too, and it feels good to teach them to help themselves."

Negrete has coached Pop Warner football and in the Fresno Parks and Recreation programs, but he eventually plans to get his master's degree in Criminal Justice and become a state parole officer for juveniles, or something similar.

He already possesses an undergraduate degree in Criminology, and has worked at the Kings County Probation Department.

"Some of the less-privileged kids I've worked with could really use a role model, someone to look up to and follow. Last spring I got tickets to the alumni football game for about 15 kids I was working with. I really got a kick out of that, it was exciting to know they were able to go, and that they were rooting for me."

## Fresno State's Head Coaches

### A Winning Team

#### Bulldog Coaching Staff: A Competitive Edge

**T**he head coaching staff at Fresno State is one that personifies hard work, loyalty, dedication and a competitive edge. Here's a brief look at FSU's head coaches:

**Duane Ballard**, men's tennis coach, guided the Bulldogs to their first-ever post-season tournament last year where they eventually finished 10th in the National Invitation Tournament. Head baseball coach **Bob Bennett**, one of the nation's winningest active coaches, coached FSU to its sixth straight conference championship and NCAA playoff berth in 1984. **Dennis DeLiddo**, now entering his fourth season at Fresno State, has developed the wrestling program into a contender with a three-year dual meet record of 35-28-2. Soccer coach **Jose Elgorriaga** with a career record of 57-22-5, has developed the FSU program into one of the winningest on the West Coast. The men's track and field program has become a force in the PCAA under **Red Estes**, who has coached the Bulldogs to back-to-back conference titles. Estes also handles the men's cross country program and coached FSU to a conference title in that sport in 1981. The school's first national title came courtesy of the **Boyd Grant**-coached men's basketball team, which captured the National Invitation Tournament championship in 1983. Former collegiate standout **Carol Jensen**, in charge of the women's tennis program, directed the Bulldogs to the NorPac tournament in the spring of 1984. **Lellani Overstreet**, the only coach FSU's volleyball program has known, recently reached the 150-victory plateau. **Tom Paganl** is building the women's track and cross country programs, sports that were added in 1982. FSU has made a name in softball behind the efforts of **Donna Pickel**, who has directed the Bulldogs to three league titles in six seasons and an NCAA runner-up finish in 1982. The women's swimming program, under head coach **Billie Poston**, has broken 18 school records in the past two years. The nation's winningest active women's basketball coach is FSU's **Bob Spencer**, who has led the Bulldogs to two consecutive school win records. In six seasons as head football coach, **Jim Sweeney** has a pair of PCAA championships and a California Bowl title to his credit. **Mike Watney**, FSU's energetic golf coach, has coached six All-Americans and three PCAA title-winning teams in six seasons. The water polo team, headed by third-year coach **Harold Zane**, has improved dramatically and finished the 1983 season ranked 11th in the nation.

## Year of the All-America

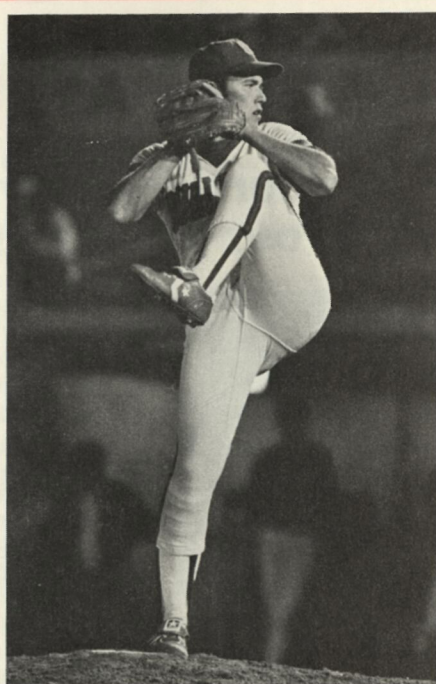
**T**he Fresno State athletic year of 1983-84 was one that could be referred to as the year of the All-America.

No less than 13 Bulldogs in nine sports earned the coveted award through outstanding individual achievement. Let's take a look back at FSU's 1983-84 All-Americans.

**Ron Anderson, Men's Basketball** -- Ron Anderson, the Bulldogs' team leader in scoring (17.6) and rebounding (6.1), earned honorable mention All-America honors after helping lead the Bulldogs to the PCAA tournament title and the automatic berth in the NCAA playoffs. The senior forward, a first team all-PCAA selection, was twice named the PCAA's Player of the Week during the 1983-84 season and was selected most valuable player of the Chaminade Classic.

**Scott Buss, Baseball** -- The senior center fielder and leadoff hitter captured third team All-America honors as announced by the American Baseball Coaches Association after becoming the first Bulldog since 1978 to bat over .400 in a single season. Buss, the NCBA's Player of the Year, batted .404 and set a school record for most hits in a season with 99.

**Sylvester Carver, Wrestling** -- The 167-pounder, a two-time PCAA champion, joined Mike Gallego as the only other Bulldog

to twice earn All-America honors in the sport of wrestling. Carver, an All-America last year, accomplished that feat with a third place finish at the NCAA championships last spring. Carver, ranked among the nation's best all season, compiled a record of 48-4, tying Gallego's single season win mark.

**Rocky Costello, Football** -- The senior placekicker was named honorable mention All-America by the Associated Press after a season which featured him kicking a school record 18 field goals. Costello finished the year with 80 points, the fourth highest point total in school history and the most ever by a Bulldog kicker. In PAT attempts, Costello was a perfect 26-for-26, a mark that extended his personal string of successful PAT's to 137.

**John Diepersloot, Water Polo** -- Diepersloot, Fresno State's first All-America in water polo, earned that recognition in only his sophomore year. The 6-3, 190-pounder was third on the team in scoring (41 points) and tied for second in assists (23). At the PCAA championships he led the Bulldogs in both goals (10) and assists (5) and was a first team all-PCAA tournament selection.

**John Hoover, Baseball** -- The most dominating pitcher in college baseball last season was Hoover, who was selected first team All-America by both the American

Baseball Coaches Association and Baseball America magazine. The NCBA Pitcher of the Year established 12 school records during a stellar season which saw him compile an 18-3 record and lead the nation in wins, strikeouts (205) and complete games (19), the latter an NCAA record.

**Pete Mansur, Track & Field** -- The junior decathlete placed sixth at the NCAA championships in his specialty for his first All-America effort. Mansur's point total of 7,526 came following marks of 11.53 (100 meters), 22-7 1/4 (long jump), 47-7 1/4 (shot put), 6-4 1/4 (high jump), 51.03 (400), 15.09 (110 high hurdles), 150-3 (discus), 15-5 (pole vault), 168-1 (javelin) and 4:54.15 (1,500).

**Wendy Martell, Women's Basketball** -- The freshman out of Bakersfield earned honorable mention Freshman All-America honors following a standout rookie season which included topping the team in scoring average (15.9) during NorPac play and finishing second on the club's scoring chart (12.0) for the season. Martell, who was named honorable mention all-NorPac and the Bulldogs' most improved player, scored in double figures in her last 15 consecutive games.

**Matt Mileham, Track & Field** -- FSU's hammer thrower extraordinaire claimed an NCAA title in the hammer throw for his

eighth All-America effort. Mileham's national title was the first by an FSU track and field athlete since 1964. Just three weeks before the national meet, Mileham rewrote the collegiate record with a heave of 252-8, a throw that also broke the British Commonwealth record.



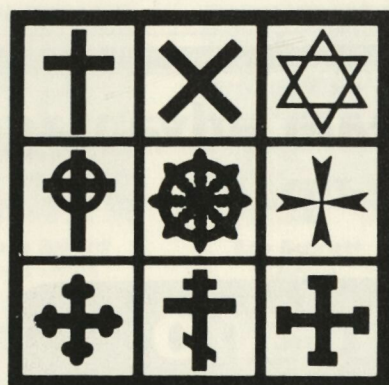

**Eric Peterson, Golf** -- The Bulldogs' most valuable golfer in 1983 was Peterson, who closed out his collegiate career by being named honorable mention All-America. Peterson competed in all 14 tournaments for the Bulldogs and finished second on the team in scoring average with a per-round figure of 74.8.

**Rene Polanco, Softball** -- Fresno State's senior second baseman finished her career by being selected second team All-America after a senior season which saw her lead the Bulldogs in batting average (.284), hits (58), walks (23), total bases (84) and slugging percentage (.412). Polanco also finished her career as the Bulldogs' all-time leader in triples with 20, 10 ahead of her nearest challenger.

**Bernard Thompson, Men's Basketball** -- Bernard Thompson, an honorable mention All-America by United Press International, was a first team all-PCAA selection after averaging 15.7 points and 5.8 rebounds per game. Thompson's 57 percent shooting from the field for a career was also a school record. Thompson, who was picked in the first round of the NBA draft by Portland, was named to four all-tournament teams his senior season: PCAA, Aloha Classic, Chaminade Classic and Sun Met Classic.

**Larry Willis, Football** -- It did not take Larry Willis long to make his mark in the FSU record book. Willis, a junior split end, caught 63 passes to erase Henry Ellard's one-year-old mark, a feat which spurred him on to honorable mention All-America honors by the Associated Press and Football News. Willis totaled 1,009 yards on his 63 receptions and joined Ellard as the only other Bulldog to go over 1,000 yards in reception yardage.

## Coming Up...

### 'Dogs Close Home Season vs. MSU

**F**resno State will close out a six-game home slate next Saturday when the Bulldogs play host to Montana State here at Bulldog Stadium.

Second-year Bobcat coach Dave Arnold should field a much stronger unit this year than the one that hosted — and lost — to Fresno State, 31-12, in 1983. Montana State went into last Saturday's Civil War against cross-state rival Montana tied for first with Boise State in the Big Sky Conference with a 4-1 league mark. The Bobcats are 6-2 overall.

That's a quick turnaround for the Bobcats, who last year endured a 1-10 season, the school's worst record in 15 years.

Two weeks ago, the Bobcats defeated Boise State, 22-18, in Boise for their fourth consecutive victory. In that game, Montana State jumped to a 15-3 third quarter lead but needed an 80-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Kelly Bradley to Jesse Jones in the fourth quarter to secure the win.

"We are in a position where a lot of people never thought we would be," said MSU head coach Dave Arnold prior to the game against Montana. "We are very pleased with it and it was a tremendous victory for our program against Boise State."

On the day, the 6-3, 195-pound Bradley threw for 269 yards and three touchdowns against the Broncos to continue his assault on the Bobcat record book. He went into the Montana game either holding or sharing eight passing and total offense records, breaking the single season marks for most passing yards (2,308), total offense yards (2,275) and touchdown passes (19). Bradley's other two scoring passes went to junior wide receiver Darin Dietrich, covering 50 and 33 yards.

Bradley, a sophomore, hit on 14 of 29 attempts for 162 yards against Fresno State last year. He scored one touchdown in the loss, that coming on a 1-yard run in the second quarter.

For the season, Bradley has hit on 194 of 355 attempts, a completion rate of better than 54 percent. He has an assortment of targets, headed by tight end Joe Bignell, who has caught 42 passes for 485 yards and two touchdowns. Jones, a fullback who caught the 80-yard TD against Boise State, is second to Bignell in receptions with 34 for 373 yards. Six others have caught at least 14 passes.

Dave Pandt, a 5-11, 185-pound junior running back, leads the team in rushing with 244 yards on 49 carries, a 5.0 averaged per tote. Jones is second to Pandt with 236 yards on 73 carries. Bradley leads the team in rushing touchdowns with five.

Defensively, the Bobcats returned nine of 11 starters off of last year's team, headed by first team all-Big Sky linebacker Mark Fellows. The 6-1½, 225-pounder ranks second to inside linebacker Kirk Timmer in total tackles this season with 79. Timmer leads the way with 102. Senior Gregg Wilks (6-1, 230) is third with 74 total tackles.

"The best things about Larry Willis are his hands and his ability to get open," quarterback Sweeney remarked. "But he can get deep if we need him to."

Willis agreed, adding, "I may not have blazing speed like Dave Williams, but relying on raw speed isn't the only way to go deep effectively. A receiver with quick feet can use deception to get deep."

Of course, coach Sweeney would be happy putting a receiver or any other FSU football player in the NFL every year.

"The program is serving each player's needs, and this shows when one of them becomes good enough to play pro football," he said. "We still emphasize education, though. A degree is the most important thing because football players need that back-up."

Willis will be missed when he moves on after this season, of course. But quarterback Sweeney doesn't even need to worry about having good people to throw to next year. Wesson and Williams are both sophomores, and Williams especially could be an NFL prospect by the time he's a senior.

Coach Sweeney will undoubtedly continue searching for intelligent, talented receivers for his passing attack, however. And by judging his success over the last five years, it's a good bet that he'll find the athletes he's seeking.

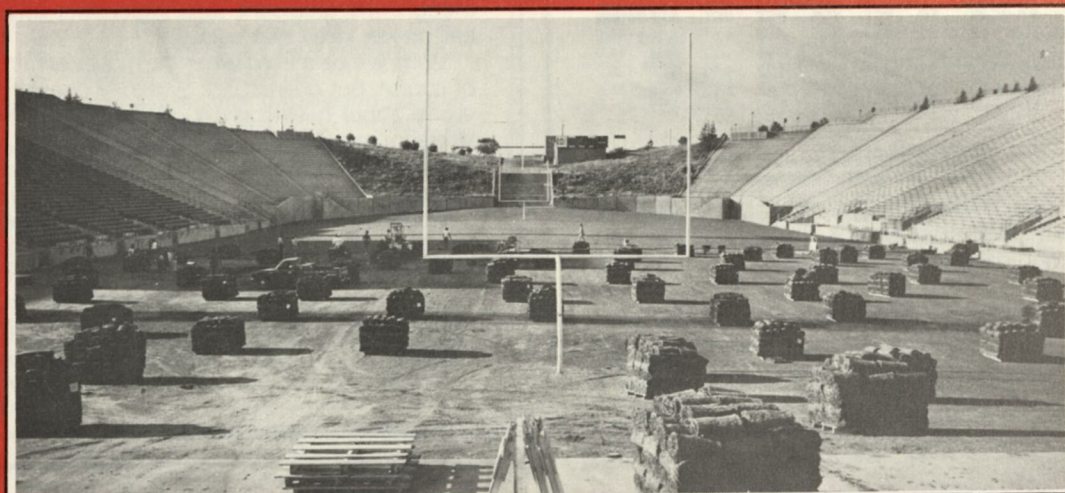

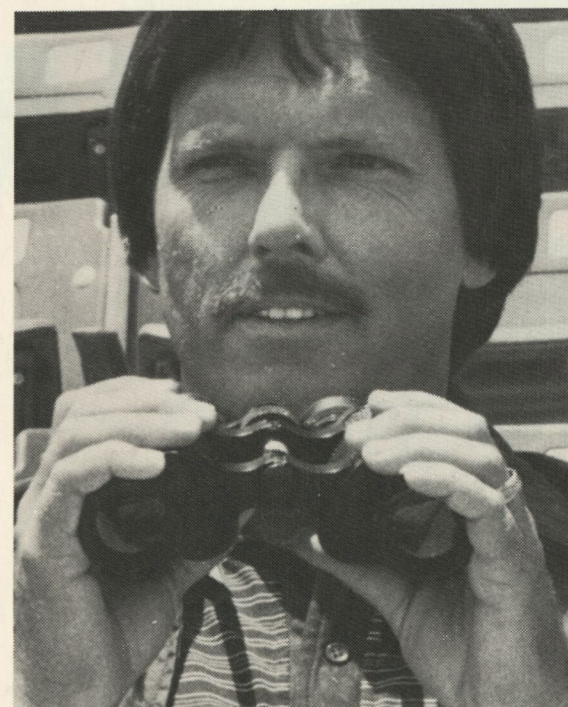
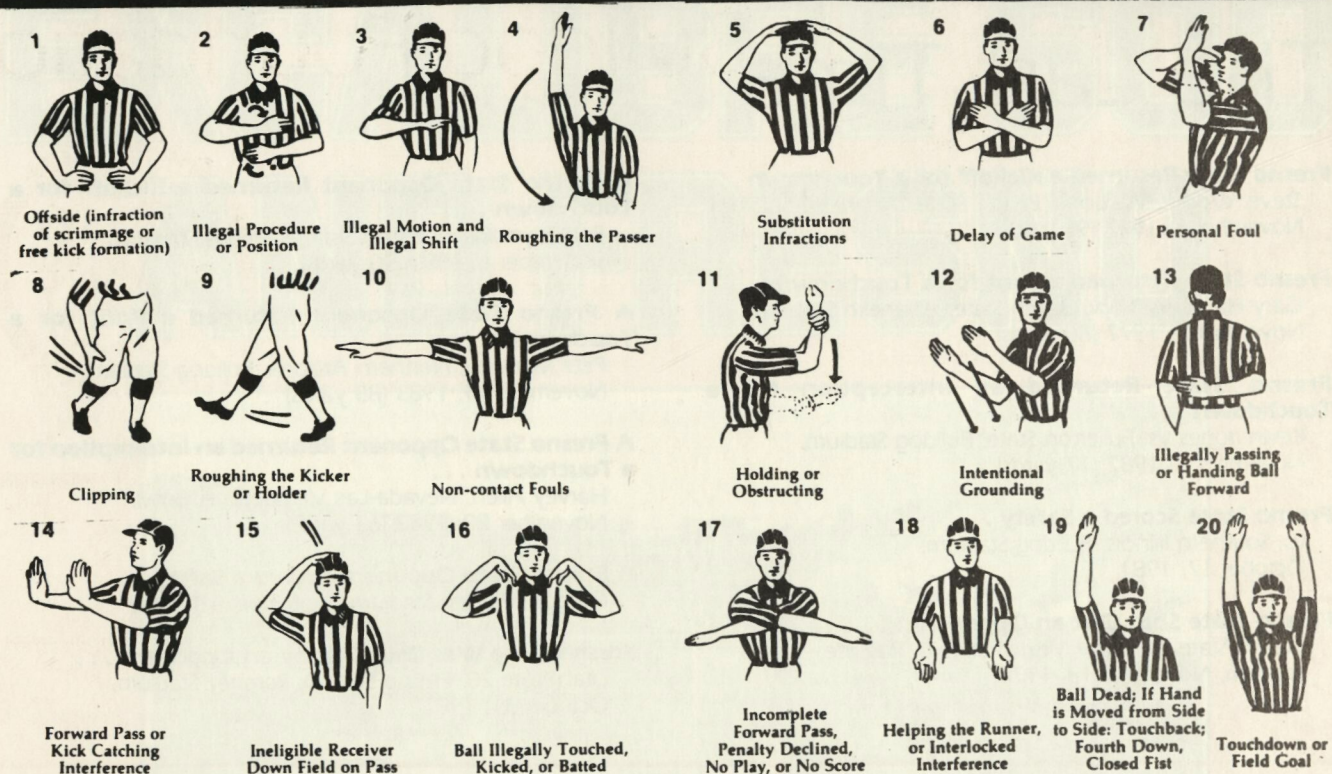

He is clever. His feeling regarding coaches who play for ties appeared in a column, "Ties should be worn. Period." He has foresight and advocated 30,000 seats for Bulldog Stadium when some considered paring the facility to 20,000, and predicted three new PCAA teams would be ushered into the association (they were). He is widely read and often quoted. It was Bob who coined the phrase "Grant's Tomb" to describe the Bulldogs' dominance in basketball at Selland Arena. Bob McCarthy -- another good reason to read The Bee.

## Fall Sport Spotlight

# Fall Round-up 'Dogs Making Noise in Various Sports

Fresno State athletic teams have not only enjoyed success on the field this fall, but many have received recognition in respective national Top 20 polls.

Here's a quick recap of the ongoings in FSU's other fall sports:

**SOCCER** — The Bulldogs have been in and out of the Top 20 all season, and went into last week ranked fourth in the country by Soccer America magazine and 20th in the nation by the Inter-collegiate Soccer Association of America. The Jose Elgorriaga-coached kickers compiled a 7-1-1 record during the month of October to improve to 13-3-3 overall. The Bulldogs went into last night's game against USF hoping to win the PSC title outright. FSU put itself in a position for its first PSC title since 1982 by winning its first five league matches, including a 2-0 win Oct. 27 against nationally-ranked California.

Much of FSU's success can be attributed to the Bulldogs' "No-Goal Patrol," headed by junior goalkeeper Chato Elgorriaga. The 6-2, 190-pound Elgorriaga went into this week with a school record nine shutouts, and had allowed just 15 goals in 1,785 minutes of action. All told, the Bulldogs have allowed just 17 goals this season, and could break the school record for fewest goals allowed. That record was set in 1977 and equaled in 1979 when the Bulldogs gave up just 19 goals in 17 matches.

Fresno State is in excellent position to make its first trip to the NCAA playoffs since the '82 campaign. Though there are no automatic berths to the 23-team national playoffs, Fresno State is generally regarded to be one of the prime candidates on the West Coast to secure a bid.

**VOLLEYBALL** — Defying the best guesses of the Northern Pacific Athletic Conference coaches, the 19th-ranked Fresno State volleyball team proved without a doubt that it is much better than its fifth place ranking in the NorPac coaches pre-season poll. Coach Leilani Overstreet's squad successfully clinched its first NorPac final-four championship tournament berth in school history two weeks ago, and a seed of no worse than second as well, as the Bulldogs completed a sweep of the league's out-of-California quartet.

After defeating 15th-ranked Oregon and Oregon State the previous weekend to gain their first ever national ranking, the Bulldogs downed Washington (three games to two) and Washington State (three games to none) to make it a two-team race for the conference's top tourney seed with current leader and ninth-ranked San Jose State.

Fresno State, now 21-7 overall and 9-1 in league, also stretched its winning streak to nine matches in a row before the Bulldogs dropped a non-conference match at Cal Poly-SLO. The Bulldogs' 21 victories was just one shy of the all-time school record for wins, set in 1979's 22-12 campaign.

**MEN'S CROSS COUNTRY** — Fresno State's 18th-ranked cross country team virtually assured itself of a berth in the NCAA Region 8 meet being held today by winning the PCAA Championship Oct. 27 at Santa Barbara.

Peter Brett, a sophomore from Adelaide, Australia, captured the individual title — the first Bulldog to do so at a league championship meet since Tim Holmes in 1980 — with a course record-setting performance. Brett won the race by four seconds with his finishing kick, and broke the course record by over a minute in the process.

The Bulldogs scored 28 team points to

second place UC Irvine's 51. Brett, who won the Hornet, FSU and Stanford Invitationals earlier this season, was named the PCAA's Athlete of the Year for his efforts. His coach, Red Estes, was named the PCAA's Coach of the Year after directing the Bulldogs to their third PCAA title since 1973 and their second since 1981.

FSU's victory in the PCAA Championships raised its multiple meet record this season to 39-2.

**WOMEN'S CROSS COUNTRY** — Fresno State, competing in cross country for only the third year, improved all season. The Bulldogs recorded their highest finish ever (fourth) at the FSU Invitational in September, and won the Hornet Invitational Sept. 15 at Sacramento State. The Bulldogs were competitive even after the team's top runner, Tammy Moore, suffered a stress fracture early in October and missed the remainder of the season. The Tom Pagani-coached Bulldogs finished sixth in a competitive field at the NorPac Championships on Oct. 27. Freshman Lisa Lewis led a tight pack of Bulldog runners, placing 28th.

**WATER POLO** — The Fresno State water polo team is currently ranked seventh in the nation, and is looking for a big push in the season's final matches, hoping to qualify for the NCAA Championships for the first time in the school's history.

Despite a 12-13-2 record going into last weekend's action, the Bulldogs have performed well against some of the stiffest competition in the nation. The team has not lost to a school outside the top eight, and has knocked off Stanford, the No. 1 team in the nation, in 1984.

Senior Jim Bates is currently one of the top scorers in the PCAA, and has passed Steve Heaston as the Bulldogs' all-time leading scorer. Junior All-America John Diepersloot leads the team in scoring, assists and steals, and should be a choice for All-America honors again this season. Junior goalie Steve Coupland has emerged as one of the top goalkeepers in the nation, and paces the Bulldog defense.

FSU takes to the water again tomorrow, with an important conference match against Pepperdine, the 3rd ranked team in the NCAA. Game time is 12 Noon at the Clovis West Olympic Swim Complex.
