Helen is writing a letter to Mr. McConnell who is a great favorite of hers and I should not be surprised if Dr. John Strentzel was favored with some of her effusions in the near future. It was her own idea to write to Mr. McConnell and she is getting up the letter herself with only the help of <sup>the</sup> spelling of an occasional word - I fairly long to see the little Muir girls. You don't know how much I want to see you all and shall not lose a moment as soon as mother is a little better. With much love I am

We were glad to get your letter with news of yourselves and Miss Baby, and doubly glad for the confirmation, from official sources, of our hopes of Mr. Muir's early return. Just think of the distinction of ranking not only among the explorers but the discoverers - now, at this period of the world's history, when nearly everything has been discovered since long ago - He will come back covered with laurels and stuffed brim full of the freshest and most delightful information and with his rare capacities

for imparting his stories my expectations are boundless. I think you will always be glad you let him go - when he is back and the separation is a thing of the past.

How much I should enjoy a visit from you - especially as we have not been able to have any company for some time now on account of my mother's severe illness - and she is yet - O so feeble. She cannot bear to have anything going on in the house the least exciting. Emily has to practise and give her lessons away from home. It began with chills and fever contracted at Mc Connells - and it has now taken the form of chronic nervous prostration - She has had a nurse eight weeks with no present prospect of her being able to spare her very soon either.

Still, slight and slow as it is, she is improving - from one week to another there is an appreciable gain, and as soon as she gets out of this nervous state there is nothing to prevent our having our friends again - Perhaps in a short time, by the time little Anna Wanda is ready to travel mother will be enough better to allow of our carrying out our pleasant plans laid last summer. Anyway I shall send you word just as soon as I can, and if it is not soon enough for your purposes, don't hesitate to come down to some other friends and visit us some other time - I should understand it, and shall look forward with very pleasant anticipations to the time of your coming.
