I have sent some of the newspapers that Louie sent me Scotland, and I will send you a Glasgow one for a change.

Your father has been home
for a short time, and has gone
now to Phillips, I don't think
he will go back again to
Hamilton as he has sold the
property he had there —

Mr Brown intends
going to Arkansas to make a
home there, and your father
is determined to go with him
he using your father's money,
your father is well, but very
feeble, and lame, walking and
leaning on two crutches but as
strong minded as he ever was

Oh what a severe trial
has befallen dear Joanne —
I expect you know her dear
baby died very suddenly when
she was two weeks and two days
old, the shock to ~~Jo~~ was dreadful
she has since been very sick —

but is now recovering
I hope she will soon be well.

David has good health
at present, and has had a very
prosperous business for a good
while past — his family are
all well, he is always much
pleased to hear anything about
you and your journeys —

Indeed all the family
considered Louie very kind
in sending papers to them
in your absence containing
accounts of your cruise in that
distant part of the world —

I shall still cherish
the hope that the good time
will arrive when you will
see your Wisconsin friends
again — I hope God will ever
