## Letter from C[alvin] L[eighton] Hooper to John Muir, 1881 Dec 7.

Oakland Dec 7<sup>th</sup>, 1881.

Prof Miner

My Dear Sir

I forward by today's mail a couple of white shirts that belonged to you I found them in one of my drawers.

I also enclose a list of prices of trade goods. Our dress bill - was - \$120.40. Yours and mine and the the doctors. Nelsons in proportion. It would have been less but the Colovin Bay mine did not "pan out well". Your bill at Amalaska for clothing - Kyack &c. was 21-5-8. This with \$30.00 on arrival at S.F. makes - \$171-98. I owe you \$28.02 less the amount of trade goods.

I am all ready to go to Washington I have been notified to "stand by" for orders the first part of this month.

At the request of the Sec. Rec. of the Pacific I gave them a paper ~~and~~ on the "Far north" to read next Tuesday night

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I think - You will be duly notified.  
The doctor is still here. working hard for  
his King and Country - I hope you  
are well and enjoying yourself. I  
should like to think Mrs. Minn and the  
wonderful give before I go East. If  
you come down I wish you would  
come to our home or let us know  
where to find you.

Mrs. Hooper and the babies are well  
but somewhat undecided as to when  
to go about your East with me  
I have no idea whether I will come back  
in the spring - but shall try to remain East.

I have rec'd two letters from the children.  
Since he went East he is still in Washington.  
but expects to go to Chicago soon on a month's
