The theme of the play revolves around a romantic hero, portrayed by Christophersen, who rebels against the commonplace, disguising himself as a court jester. Dr. William C. Rust, Cal Western president, in four addresses will explore the theme, "From Awareness to Responsibility," thus giving a backdrop to the whole conference. His field will be the cultural situation, the insight of our Christian heritage and how these bring us to live and act responsibly on the campus and in the world.

There will be a wide variety of topics discussed in the seminars. Religion and jazz, inter-racial relations, responsibility is a scientific age, and forming opinions in a world of tensions are only a few that are scheduled. These will be thought-provoking, and it will be interesting to learn what students of other campuses think.

Recreation will not be neglected. New friends will be made and old acquaintances renewed. Dancing, sports, tours, beach parties will be climaxed by the New Year's Eve party and dance. All of this enlivens the days at Asilomar so that they will long be remembered.

33% Of Undergrads Receive Cinch Notices

Cinch note statistics were released this week by Pacific's registrar's office, showing that 479 undergrad students received one or more of the traditional warning notices during the semester's first official warning period. These figures display the fact that a full 33% of COP students are doing unsatisfactory work in at least one subject.

"Failure on exams is the reason for the majority of the warnings," reports the registrar, while reminding students the notices do not necessarily mean an eventual failure in the final analysis. Correctional measures may still be taken to improve individual work.

Parents of lower division students and faculty advisors of all students are sent copies of the notices. At the second warning period, beginning November 17, additional notices will be issued if students continue their poor work.

Pacific Hosts Student Presidents; Many Reps Scheduled To Attend

College of the Pacific is hosting the Northern California Regional Pacific Student Presidents' Association convention on the campus today and tomorrow.

Thirty to forty delegates will represent 18 of the 23 colleges which were invited to attend the convention. Among those present will be representatives from Stanford, Mills College, Humboldt State College and Fresno State College. Delegates will be the presidents and/or the vice-presidents of the various colleges. They will be the guests of campus living groups.

The theme of the convention will be "A Wheel Within A Wheel." The purpose of the convention is two-fold. First, the delegates will prepare for the Western Presidents Convention which will be held in Arizona in the Spring. Second, delegates will discuss school relationships and various problems on campuses.

In charge of the convention will be Bill Fowler, senior class president, with the senior class acting as hosts.

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EDITORIAL

Pacific's rallies have always been one of the traditions that the student body has looked forward to. The idea of collegiate entertainment and the possibility of big name artists (Sammy Davis Jr. in 1958, and Eddie Hodges earlier this semester) encourages new and old students alike to turn out.

Old timers of COP continue to attend rallies for various reasons. Sororities and fraternities require their members to attend or pay a fine for missing a "house function." Others not required to go attend out of curiosity and expectation or just because they want to go.

Last week, another of COP's "BIG" rallies was held. The freshmen were there, the frats and sororities sat in "saved" seats, and the curious waited.

To many, this was to be just another rally. The entertainment, on the whole, was very good and the participants represented the campus well.

However, it is hard to understand how college students can regress in just a matter of minutes into a mob of juvenile-acting, non-thinking delinquents.

California's new state law concerning "hazing" clearly states that in no way are students to be degraded or disgraced. Would this not hold true to publicly denouncing a person, or a group of persons, at a so-called "unharmful" rally? Is not the main purpose of the function to create a spirit of good will among the students for the forthcoming football game?

Humor is humor and comedy is comedy; both have their places on the stage, in a class, on the campus, or in a living group.

Far be it from this writer to point the finger of accusation at any one person and say that "You are wrong! Who are you to ridicule a fellow student?"

But, nevertheless, humor lost its original meaning, and personal cutting and uncalled-for remarks at individuals and at living groups were made by unthinking people who failed to see the true meaning of humor and of a rally.

We are undergoing a great change at Pacific. New rules and regulations are being put into effect at every corner. Emotions were running high at the Fresno State Rally, but surely this is not an adequate excuse to jeopardize the reputation of fellow students and of the school.

An old saying, "Think before you act and speak" would be a good rule for many to seriously consider following. We are no longer children who do not know the difference between right and wrong and between good and bad taste. We are adults! Therefore, let's act as adults!

Scholarship Exams To Be Offered By State; Applications Now Available For Students

Application blanks are now available in Room 105 of the Administration Building for the California State Scholarships to be awarded for the Academic year 1960-1961.

These scholarships will be for tuition and necessary fees to a maximum of \$600 and may be used at any college or university in California accredited by the Western College Association. They may be renewed annually.

To be qualified, a student must be a resident of California and under 24 years of age. It is also necessary to be a high school graduate by the summer of 1960 and to show a definite need for scholarship assistance. The applicant must be of demonstrated high moral character, good citizenship, and dedicated to American ideals.

It is also necessary to be either a United States citizen or a permanent resident of the United States.

The competitive examination for this year will be the Scholastic Aptitude Test of the College Entrance Examination Board to be given on the following dates: December 5, 1959 or January 9, 1960.

In order to apply for a State Scholarship one must file a State Scholarship Application with the State Scholarship Commission, Room 505, 1227 O Street, Sacramento 14, California. Applications must be postmarked no later than January 27, 1960. It is then necessary to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test and apply for admission to the college or university of your choice.

Tomorrow Pacific will send two teams of hockey players to American River Junior College in Sacramento. Those who are interested in playing and have not yet signed up may do so in the gym.

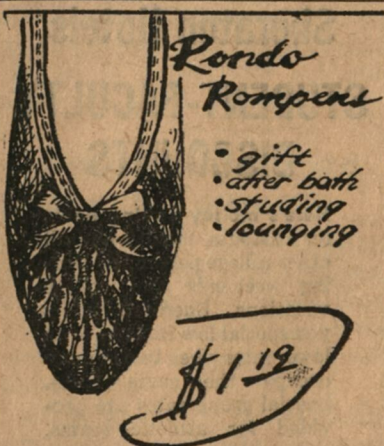

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Winless Idaho Faces Pacific Tigers Try For Fourth Win, Third Straight

Attempting to run their win streak to three games, the College of the Pacific Tigers will meet the University of Idaho Vandals tomorrow night at Pacific's Memorial Stadium. A victory would mean that the Tigers will end their season record at four wins and four losses. Pacific is hopeful of attaining this goal.

A member of the now defunct Pacific Coast League, the Idaho Vandals have never been known for strong football teams. However, this year coach Skip Stanley has a few standouts. Possibly the top player on the squad is a quick, 245 pound tackle named Jim Prestel. With exceptionally good depth at quarterback, the Vandals are known to have a very potent and a very well balanced offense. One of the favorite targets for the aerials of Idaho's quarterbacks is Reg Carolan, a 6-6 sophomore who calls Marin County his home.

Over the years the Tigers have been very successful in dealing with the Vandals. As yet Idaho has never been able to defeat the Orange and Black. However, in the last game (played in 1957) the potato-peelers were able to hold Pacific to a 7-7 tie. The score made in the 1957 game is the only

time Idaho has scored on the Bengals in the series of four games.

The fact that the Vandals have not tasted victory this season is also good news for Pacific. It must be admitted, though, that the Tigers have succeeded in making some pretty poor teams look good this season.

Frosh Topple Cabrillo, 26-22

COP's freshman football team, the Tiger-Cubs, came from behind last Saturday to edge Cabrillo Junior College 26-22.

The Tiger-Cubs, trailing 14-0 after two quick scores by Cabrillo, came back strong in the last three quarters to pull the game out of the fire by scoring two T.D.'s in the second quarter and one each in the third and fourth quarters.

Touchdowns were scored by Duane Isetti, Bill Kutzer, and Jay Olson on runs, and Dick Hernander scored another on a 65 yard pass and run play from quarterback Jack Sparrow. Olson added a conversion on a short plunge.

The Tiger-Cubs dominated the second half with exceptional line play and a good ground game on offense.

Today the Tiger-Cubs tangle with San Jose State's frosh in quest of their fourth win in five games. The game will be played in Baxter Stadium starting at 3 p.m. KCVN will broadcast the contest, starting at 2:50 p.m.

DU Wins Intramurals Cross Country Next

The championship game of the intramural football league was played last Tuesday between Delta Upsilon 5-0, and South Hall 4-0. DU won, 6-0.

Other games last week saw West Hall shutout Archania 6-0 on Monday and Phi Delta Chi play Rhizomia on Thursday.

In other sports, the cross country race at a distance of 1½ miles, will be run Wednesday, November 18. Trials were run yesterday in which each contestant qualified by running a mile.

On November 23 and 24 a fall swimming meet will be held in the COP pool. There will be a team trophy and awards to individual event winners.

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WATER POLO SEASON ENDS

Fresno must be the favorite town for the College of the Pacific water polo team, as Fresno is the home of the only two teams that Pacific has beaten this year.

Last Saturday the Tigers managed to down the Fresno State Bulldogs by a score of 12-3. Leader for Pacific's scoring was forward Pete Hunt who poured in eight goals. Previously the Tigers had downed Fresno City College.

Other action last week resulted in losses to Cal, 17-6, and San Jose State, 11-8. The San Jose game was a thriller since the Tigers were threatening very seriously until the final gun.

Pacific will play its final games at home today and tomorrow. At 3:30 today the Tigers will meet Long Beach State. The game tomorrow will start at 10:30 in the morning as the Tigers host the Athens Club of Oakland.

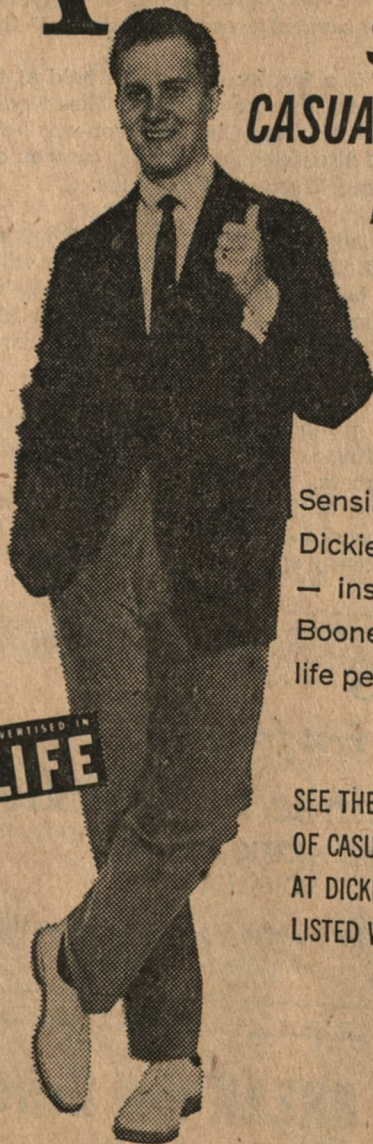
with only a few minutes remaining and Fresno in front, 13-12.
