Camp Dennison, Ohio. Oct. 22d, 1862.

Dear Friend John:

You perhaps have come to the conclusion that I had forgotten my promise to write you. I have several excuses to make for my negligence. I received a letter from William dated Madison Sept, 18th stating that he would take my things home, etc. I thought it not necessary to write you immediately as I wished to write home. Well a few days after I took a severe cold which settled on my lungs, and in my head, and I was quite sick for several days. The news came for our Regt. to march. I was not well enough to go with them, and about a dozen of us were taken to a hospital in Covington, Ky., a place across the river from Cincinnati. I was in the hospital there about two weeks, and was sent to a hospital here at Camp D. where I expect to stay until I am well enough to go to my Regt. I am getting better slowly.

I would like to have seen William firstrate. What did he say about Camp Randal and the place generally there? Have you [drunk] (drinked) out of that favourite hat lately? - an extraordinary beverage that. Camp Dennison is quite a nice place. There are nearly 2000 patients here, with about 60 to a hospital, which makes quite a little town, together with the depot and other buildings. It tires me to write much, so I will be obliged to bring this to a close. You must excuse this short letter, and I will try to do better next time. Ans[wer] this as soon as convenient.
