Farm July 16th 1868

Dear Dada

I think the time
long since I had a letter from
you, I wrote to you in Dec^r
and have not yet received
any answer - but perhaps
there may be a letter at Postage
as it is two weeks since we
were there, I have also sent
you a Messenger -

I hope your good health
continues I also hope you have
made a good use of those long
evenings - that are just passing
away - have you had any
letters from John lately - I am
very anxious to hear of him
about 3 weeks ago David
received a box of shells from
him but there were no letters
I trust a Merciful Providence will

match over him and bring him
 home in health when he is
 tired of travelling - I have not
 had any letters from him for a
 long time I do not know
 whether he has yet got over his
 sickness or not -
 I have been
 here for a week
 with out men
 good sleigh rides
 very good sleigh rides
 I went to visit Sarah yesterday
 and found them all well and
 happy David has been very
 busy hauling lumber for a time
 and putting up the house
 with out men - I have not
 been sleighing it very good -
 Sumner has been expecting a
 letter from you for a long time
 you will surely write soon
 she cannot get to school as

The snow is very deep she is very lonesome
Stinson's school term will close in three weeks then
we expect her home for a time she has 43
scholars and gets along with them very well

Mary is still attending to her studies at Portage
and expects to teach during the summer months

If you have had any letters from John
will you write and let me know all about
him - say where you think he will be
I have wrote to him twice but I think he has
not got them - I have not had any letter
from him since the one I told ^{you} about -
it was dated Nov^r - I was afraid he had had

as long a sickness as you had last summer
and so far from home -

I hope you are getting on
with your business as well as you expected
both pleasantly and profitably -

May God bless you
and keep you ever on the right way
