I received  
your very welcome letter  
of Dec<sup>r</sup> 8<sup>th</sup> and am

You write  
that greater changes will  
yet take place among  
us - than have yet occurred  
well I think I see  
the appearance of great changes  
during the last week -

we were surprised  
to hear your father say  
he had decided to sell



every thing he proposed in  
Marquette &c by auction -  
he is now busy distributing  
bills of sale - The sale to  
take place on Tuesday + 5<sup>th</sup>  
of March - he wishes to keep  
some of our best furniture  
but nothing more - only  
think the farm to be sold  
by auction - he says he  
cannot decide on where  
he will go, or what he  
will do, until after sale  
day is over - perhaps we  
may not move after all -

I presume you have  
been told about the man  
that came to our house -  
and told us he had left  
John on the 2 of Jan<sup>y</sup> - for  
nine days we listened to  
lectures about John and the

Yosemite valley - when  
Sarah received a letter from  
John dated 17<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>y</sup> which  
led us to believe he was  
an impostor - so we got  
rid of him as quietly and  
quickly as possible -

I suspected him the second  
day of his visit and told  
Anna of it - but she  
reproved me so sharply that  
I tried to think I was wrong  
but never could -

Your father had a letter  
from Mary about 2 weeks  
ago - she is in good health  
and spirits - and likes her
