Your letter

to send our congratulations.

to you both. How much of gladness
or sorrow may come to us with
just such a little life. May the
gladness and happiness only
be yours, I rejoice, with you
both. How delighted Grandee
must be with her little sister,
and how her eyes will open with
wonder at the sight of the little
feet and hands and indeed at

every movement. Your baby will be
a treasure to you all. I trust
that you Louie are growing strong
and will again, I wonder when
you, with your little girls will
be able to come to Wis- to see us
all. Have you found a name
beautiful enough for the baby yet
we are all anxious to know what it
will be. John Reid has been in
Portage for two or three weeks,
he started for home on the 2nd
we were all glad to see him and
had a pleasant visit. he took me out
to the Cemetery in Buffalo, then left
me at Levi Hates to stay while he went
on to visit with his Brothers. John
thinks that if Maggie is feeling well
enough she may visit us next summer.
Maisy thanks John for your kind re-
-membrance of the children, but you will
hear from them. All are about usually
well. I am feeling much better than when
you were here. David and the children are
